## Next Tuesday Sees City Election

### FOURTH PRODUCER COMES IN AT CEDAR LAKE POOL

#### Edith Johnson Well Flows 390 Bbls. in 16 Hours

#### Fourth Producer Brought In For New Field Without Failure Reported Thus Far

Flow of 390 barrels of oil the first 16 hours of Railroad Commission gauge, by air lift, was reported Wednesday at the Stanolind Oil and Gas Company No. 1 Edith Johnson well.

This is the southwest offset to the discovery well in the Cedar Lake pool and marks the fourth producer in the area.

The well has been shot with 920 quarts from 4,565 feet to 4,740 feet ten feet off bottom.

Other activity in the field is expected shortly after the first of the month, but no definite location has been announced at this time.

### Farmers Asked To Complete Work Sheets

Farmers of Dawson County have cooperated with committeemen in a fine way in completing the Farm Plan Sheets for 1940, said Mr. F. E. Hardy member of the county committee. Approximately 75 per cent of the farmers in each school district where each of the committee spent the day came out to sign a farm plan sheet.

The purpose of the plan sheet is to advise the farmer how he can earn 55c per acre on his reduction acre even though he grazed his sudan and bundles his cane from these acres. From the number of farmers signing up to plant two rows of maize and one row of peas it seems the lowly black eye pea destined to rise to an agricultural importance heretofore unknown in Dawson County. A field of 60 acres planted two rows of cotton or maize and one row of peas will be classified as all cotton or maize (then credit on 20 acres of soil built practices or 15 units will be given on the peas. Another important feature of this practice is that the peas may be picked dry and sold on the market.

Any farmer who did not fill out their plan sheet at one of the school houses may come to the A. C. A. Office next week, April 1 to 6 and will be assisted in planning to earn all A. A. payments possible this year, said Mr. Hardy.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at 4 p. m. at the Bryan Street Baptist Church for Mrs. Sarah Adaline Pounds. She passed away at her home Thursday. She was born in Alabama April 7, 1858. She had been a resident of this county for the past 18 years. Services were under the supervision of Rev. A. P. Aslin and Rev. F. F. Cole.

She is survived by the following children: J. W. Pounds, Lamesa; J. E. H. F. R. A. and O. K. Pounds of Mountaire, New Mexico; Mrs. Addie Beavers, Lamesa; and C. D. Pounds of Lamesa, 32 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

All household goods and clothing, with the exception of those which the family were, were a total loss.

### Dr. Nicholas R. Doman Of Budapest To Speak In Lamesa Monday Night

Third in the series of lectures in the Institute of International Understanding, being sponsored by the Lamesa Rotary Club, will be heard at the Lamesa High School Auditorium, Monday evening.

Dr. Nicholas R. Doman, of Budapest, Hungary, will speak on "Central Europe—Battlefield of Imperialism." His talk should prove equally as interesting as the two which have already been given, and the hundreds who have heard them bear testimony as to their interest.

Last Monday evening saw a large crowd than the week previous hear Mrs. Margarette Kaiser give a most interesting talk on "The German Rise to Power." Visitors were in evidence from many surrounding towns.

The lecture Monday will be heard at the same hour, 8 p. m. Dr. Nicholas R. Doman studied at the Universities of Oxford, London, Paris, Milan, and the Institute of International studies at Geneva. He received his doctor's degree from the University of Budapest.

During the past few years, Dr. Doman has been on the Board of Editors of Central Europe's first ranking review of international affairs, the Kulogyi Szemle, published at Budapest, and was lecturer at the University of Budapest. He is secretary of the Danube League, an institution seeking the solution of the many problems of Central Europe. He has been a frequent contributor to European periodicals and has written extensively in the field of international relations. He has visited most of the large cities of Europe many times and participated in numerous European conferences.

During the summer of 1939, Dr. Doman came to the United States to participate in a conference on Central European affairs at the University of Colorado summer school.

### Saturday Is Final Day To Check Number Bales Ginned During 1939

The final date for cotton farmers in Dawson County to check their 1939 production with the number of bales the gin reported to the A. C. A. office has been set for Saturday March 30 according to Mr. W. T. Meeks.

Since the regulations governing 5 year average yields require that 1934 be dropped and 1939 added to the 5 year period, it is important that each farm receive credit for the amount of cotton produced each year. In making the report to the A. C. A. Office the Gins sometime get the farm serial numbers listed incorrectly which gives one farm a bale of cotton which was produced on another farm. The Marketing Quota law provides a penalty for any person guilty of giving erroneous information to Gins which would deprive a farm of its actual production. After April 1, the record of production for each farm as reported by the Gins will be used in determining the 5 year average production for any farm on which the 1939-40 producer or land owner has not corrected the original gin report by his gin tickets and a supplemental report from the gin. The committee is very anxious said Mr. Meeks, to have every farm in the county receive credit for the 1939 production, and we hope every producer will cooperate in this important matter.

### IRRIGATION RATES FOR SUMMER ARE ANNOUNCED

#### Cheaper Rate To Aid Garden And Lawn Lovers

#### New Rate To Be Effective Thru-out Summer Months As Aid To Home Owners

Announcement was made this week by the city that the regular summer irrigation water rate is again being put in effect this year. The new rate will apply on water used after the March reading, that is water used through April and billed to the customer May 1st.

### Lamesa's Mother Dies Tuesday At Eastland

Mrs. Charlotte Belle O'Brien, 85, died at Eastland Tuesday morning. Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. at the First Baptist Church in that city, with burial in the Pleasant Hill Cemetery.

Mrs. O'Brien was the widow of Charles H. O'Brien. The couple came to Texas in 1872 from Arkansas. He fought 3 1-2 years under Joe Wheeler in the Confederate Army. He was a courier for General Wheeler and was twice cited for bravery.

Mrs. O'Brien was the daughter of a Baptist preacher, the sister of another, the aunt of a third and the mother of two Baptist preachers. Her husband was a Baptist deacon for more than 50 years and three of her sons are preachers. She and her husband were charter members of one of the first Baptist churches in Sherman, Ark., and the first churches in this section.

Surviving are a brother, W. J. following children, J. B. O'Brien, Artesia Wells; E. N. O'Brien, Corpus Christi; J. E. C. A., and N. T. O'Brien, all of Lamesa; Rev. L. E. O'Brien, Goldsmith; Rev. P. ### First National Bank Is Now Installed In Newly Remodeled Building

This week marks the completion of the remodeling and modernization program of the First National Bank in Lamesa.

They have completely changed the interior of their building to make it one of the most attractive and convenient banking institutions in West Texas. The old metal ceiling was removed and modern celotex installed, which not only greatly beautifies the building, but tends to lessen the noise. The walls were all refinished and the floor covered with a beautiful inlaid linoleum which has all the appearance of tile.

All fixtures have been completely modernized. The old grill work removed and a low glass wall is the only divider between the cages. These were moved to the south side of the lobby so that tellers have their back to the light, instead of having it in their faces, as was the case heretofore. Officers offices were built along the North wall, immediately in front of the large and spacious customers vault, which opens out in to the lobby for easy access.

They now have a much larger vault space for customers use and it is also more convenient. The First National has been a business institution in Lamesa since 1905 when it was organized as the Dawson County Bank. W. K. Crawley, active vice-president has been with the bank since 1926, serving as both cashier and later as Vice-President. M. E. Boren is cashier and E. R. Yates president of the institution.

This marks another step in their forward progress of keeping, not only abreast of the times, but ever a step ahead.

### Mayor And Two Commissioners To Be Elected

#### Record Vote Is Expected As Lamesa Citizens Select Officials For Two Years

Next Tuesday marks the regular election of the City Officials of Lamesa when a mayor and two City Commissioners will be chosen, for the next two years.

Interest in the election is gradually mounting and it is expected that something of a record vote will be polled.

In the mayors race, there are two candidates, W. Y. Marr, who is seeking re-election and L. E. Bizer, long time Lamesa resident. In the Commissioner's race, there will be two to elect, there are a total of seven candidates. Vernon W. Bryant is seeking re-election, and the following other candidates: F. (Slim) Reynolds, Roy E. Speck, W. G. Guy, Weeks, Carl M. Cox, M. Hatch and Leonard Scott.

Two years ago there was a total of slightly over one thousand votes cast in the city election, and it is believed that the election Tuesday will see this figure topped. An effort is being made by all city candidates to see that a large vote is polled, as to secure an expression from the majority of the citizens of the town.

The races thus far have been decidedly clean, with none of the mud-slinging which sometimes occurs in elections of this sort. There are a fine group of men running for all offices and it is not believed that any serious mistakes could be made, regardless of whom the voters choose.

### 4-H Club Boys Make Many West Texas Shows

Dawson County 4-H Club boys, under the direction of County Agent B. J. Baskin, have made good accounts of themselves at various West Texas shows during the past few days.

In the Sand Hills Show at Odessa, E. V. Dunn Jr. took 7th place with his drylot heavyweight, D. L. Adcock, took 9th place with his drylot lightweight, Ted Turner took 10th place with his drylot lightweight Lewis Glenn Clark took 9th honors with his milked heavy, which was adjudged grand champion of the Dawson County Show last month.

In the Junior Fat Stock show held at Lubbock the first three days of this week, Baskin took two boys and three calves for entrance. Lewis Glenn Clark's calf, OK Pride weight 900 pounds, took 9th place in the senior or heavy weight division, and sold for 14c per pound. His other entry, OK Champ, did not place in the lightweight division and sold for 13 1-2c per pound. Bobbie Ray Clark's entry Buster, weight 830 pounds, showed in the senior class but did not place and sold for 13 1-2c per pound.

Out of all the calves County Agent Baskin has taken to different shows, not a single one has been sifted. When it is considered that Lubbock show started out with 216 calves and was sifted down 84, it is readily realized that this within itself quite an honor for the boys of this county and their agent.

Baskin stated that the Lubbock show offered the keenest competition of any show in this section, although the San Angelo show is a stronger one.

**Dental Program Of Inspection Will Be Made**

A Dental Inspection program was started in the public schools this week under the sponsorship of the Five County Health Unit. The local dentists, Dr. Lawson, Dr. Nix, and

Dr. Burleson, are cooperating by making the dental inspections. It has been definitely proven in many schools and institutions that school efficiency has been highly increased by the application of a thorough dental program. It was found in a dental survey of the school children of one of the larger cities of Texas for the year 1934-35 that only 13 per cent were without dental defects. The next year after the survey and follow-up, statistics revealed one school with as high as 60 per cent improvement over the previous year.

**County School Board Held Meet Saturday**

The County School Board met in called session in the county court room Saturday, March 23. O. E. Witte, Clay Randolph, A. W. Matthews and F. L. Grissom were present. Mr. Witte presided. No particular business was to come before the board but since the regular meeting was not held, it was thought best to hold the meeting at this time.

The county superintendent explained the plans which had been worked out whereby teachers were to be paid cash for each month's salary from now on. It was agreed that it was the duty of the schools to make such arrangements rather than force the worry on the teachers. It was also agreed that the schools would receive increased efficiency many times over the cost of such a plan. The plan was unanimously adopted by the board and recommended to the local boards for their immediate adoption.

The County Board also recommended that another County Handbook be issued for the coming school year. Plans are already under way among the teachers for this project. Committees are already working on several problems which will be worked out before school is out so that the solutions may be published in the book this year.

## CAR ACCIDENT SUNDAY IS FATAL TO AMARILLO MAN

### Car Hits Culvert And Overtakes As Salesman Sleeps

Accident Occurs Early Sunday Morning About Four Miles From Town

W. H. Magee, 49, of Amarillo, was killed instantly Sunday morning when his car hit a culvert and turned over on the Big Spring road, about four miles southeast of Lamesa.

The accident occurred in the early hours of Sunday morning, presumably between 5 and 6 o'clock. He was coming from Big Spring toward Lamesa and hit a culvert, which turned his car over and around, and it came to a stop in the bottom of the barrow ditch on the opposite side of the road. The scene was at the cattle overpass near the T. A. Kellam farm and is possibly the highest place on the highway between Lamesa and Big Spring.

Magee was alone in the car and the accident was not discovered until some time after it occurred. A Higginbotham Ambulance was notified about 7:30, and upon arrival they found the body still warm, so it is assumed that he had not been dead but a short time.

He was a salesman for a scale concern and had several sets of scales in his car. It is presumed that he fell asleep.

A funeral car from Amarillo arrived in Lamesa Sunday afternoon to take the body back to that city for burial. It is understood that he has a family there.

Within less than two hundred yards of where this accident occurred, a caliche cave-in snuffed out the lives of four highway employees a few years ago, in the worst single tragedy in the history of this county.

The project is sponsored by Dawson County and the State Department of Health. In the work free labor is furnished by the government to all of those wishing to have a Sanitary Privy constructed. All that is necessary for any individual or concern in the county to receive the benefit of the work is to furnish the necessary material to construct the unit.

We all know the hazards and the unsanitary condition directly attributable to the continued use of the open-backed privies. In fact, much of our sickness can be traced to the continued existence and use of these old, broken-down, unsanitary privies. Everyone in the County should do his part and build a Sanitary Privy at this time when free labor and competent government supervision is available for the purpose. Residents of Lamesa that are not available to a sewer connection should take advantage of this work for the protection of his own family and that of his neighbors.

### TO THE CITIZENS OF LAMESA

In once again asking for the office of Mayor of your City. I wish to base my present candidacy on my record for the past few years as your servant in this capacity. I am sure that most of you are familiar with what has been done by the present administration, but in order that these things may be fresh in your mind, I should like to call your attention to a few of the things which have been accomplished and are in process of being accomplished at the present time. Please do not think that I am, in any way boasting about the good things done, or dodging the mistakes which have been made (and I am sure that they have been numerous). I merely want you to know things as they are, as is the privilege of every citizen at all times.

Through your cooperation and support, it has been possible to make several worthwhile improvements toward the future development of our city. I realize as well as any of you that the time has come when these improvements must be made if Lamesa is to properly compete with other cities on the South Plains for the business which is bound to come to this section of the State in the near future. In my humble opinion, no move should be overlooked which will make Lamesa more attractive as a location for industrial business with a payroll and as a place in which outsiders may wish to make their homes. Our present problem, in light of our heavy bonded debt, is to meet this situation without further call on the already overburdened tax payer to foot the bill.

If taxes must be raised to meet the expense of our improvements, we will be defeating the very object of making such improvements, for it is no secret that many businesses dodge the cities where local taxes are so high as to be burdensome. During the past three years, it has been my intention, along with other members of the City Commission to take care of the added cost of civic improvements by economical operation of the City and by participation in carefully selected government projects. By so doing, we have been able to save tax payers thousands of dollars, and at the same time make the following badly needed improvements: a sanitary sewage disposal plant the equal of any in the state; slightly less than three miles of up-to-date sidewalk; modern markers; and the paving of 39 blocks of city streets with fine pavement. In addition, we have gone 50-50 with the County in co-sponsorship of the following programs: a co-ordinated recreational program which affords both employment and recreation to many of the underprivileged of our city; an N.Y.A. project to furnish part time employment to the young men of Lamesa and to enable them to acquire training for a permanent vocation; a sewing room project for widow women and other poor women of the community, most of whom have no means of support; and at the present time we are working on a Sanitary Toilet Program whereby several sections of town which cannot be on the sewer line, or cannot afford septic tanks, may obtain sanitary fly-proof toilets. We now have pending approval by W. P. A. Govern-

mental authorities the following projects: 50 blocks of paving of the same type just put down; a Water and Sewer Extension program, where by water and sewer lines will be laid in portions of town now without them; and a Park project by which we hope to create a place of beauty and a center of recreation for the citizens of Lamesa to enjoy in their moments of leisure. If I should be re-elected, it will be my policy to continue this improvement program by securing other government projects wherever they will aid in economically meeting our needs.

I might further state that through the cooperation of other members of the City Commission, we have made some progress toward reducing our Bonded Debt. In the year 1935, we brought about refunding of all City of Lamesa Bonds, reducing the interest rate 1 per cent, thus saving the annual interest expense of approximately \$4,000.00. At the beginning of the year 1936, our Bonded Debt totaled \$344,500.00. Since that time, such debt has been reduced to \$317,000.00 with \$11,000.00 worth of bonds having been purchased in advance of their due date. In addition, all interest on our bonds (\$17,000.00 per year) has been met promptly, with enough money on deposit in the Sinking Fund to care for all obligations the balance of the year.

Our general or operating fund is also in satisfactory condition. This fund now shows a balance of some \$8,000.00, with something like double that amount in assets quickly convertible into cash. The fulfillment of the necessary duties of my office will prevent my seeing each and everyone of

you. To those of you who have known me for the past few years and are familiar with my record, I shall sincerely appreciate your vote and influence. To our many new citizens, I should like to say that if I fail to meet you and personally solicit your vote, I earnestly request that you contact any fair-minded citizen who is familiar with my record and get his opinion as to my ability to fill the office.

In closing, I will repeat that if re-elected, I shall strive to always keep before me the needs and problems of our city, and at all times try to serve you in the same conscientious manner as in the past. Sincerely your friend and a candidate for your Mayorship
