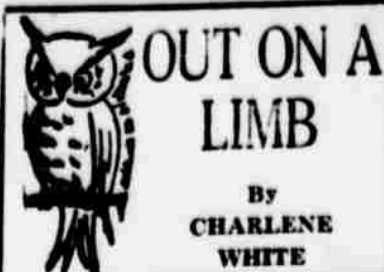
30 Years Ago—May 21, 1906

30 Years Ago—May 20, 1906

City this week. They came from
the Scott Ranch east of town
which the Wichita Falls rancher
has leased. The cattle brought
eight cents per pound, he report-
ed.Clarence Gauntt, 25 year old
Rochester man, was fatally in-
jured Saturday morning when an
automobile he was driving went
out of control and overturned.
The accident occurred in the west
part of Rochester.The Wichita Valley Railway
depot at Goree was entered by
burglars Saturday morning. An
adding machine was taken, but
the thieves were unable to open

fee of 10 cents will be charged
Friday evening and this amount
will go toward establishing a
physical laboratory or a school
library, Supt. F. L. Morrow
stated.Mr. Hulien is building a resi-

town near J. S. Boone's.W. L. Perry, one of the old set-
tlers on Paint Creek, was doing
business in town Tuesday.Supt. F. L. Morrow has been
re-elected as head of the Has-
kell school system for the 1906-

his last bale of cotton to a gin
about two weeks ago, thinking he
was about the last to have cot-

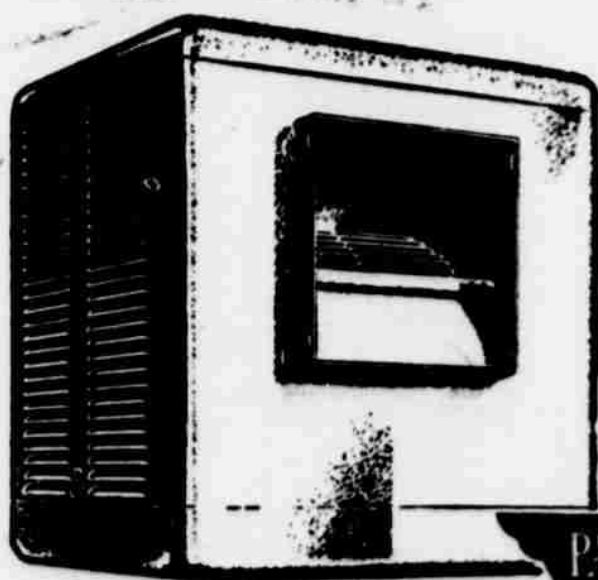

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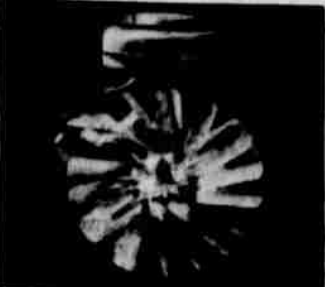
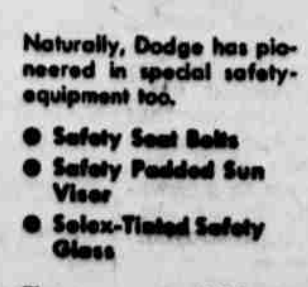

A SAFETYLESS HOME

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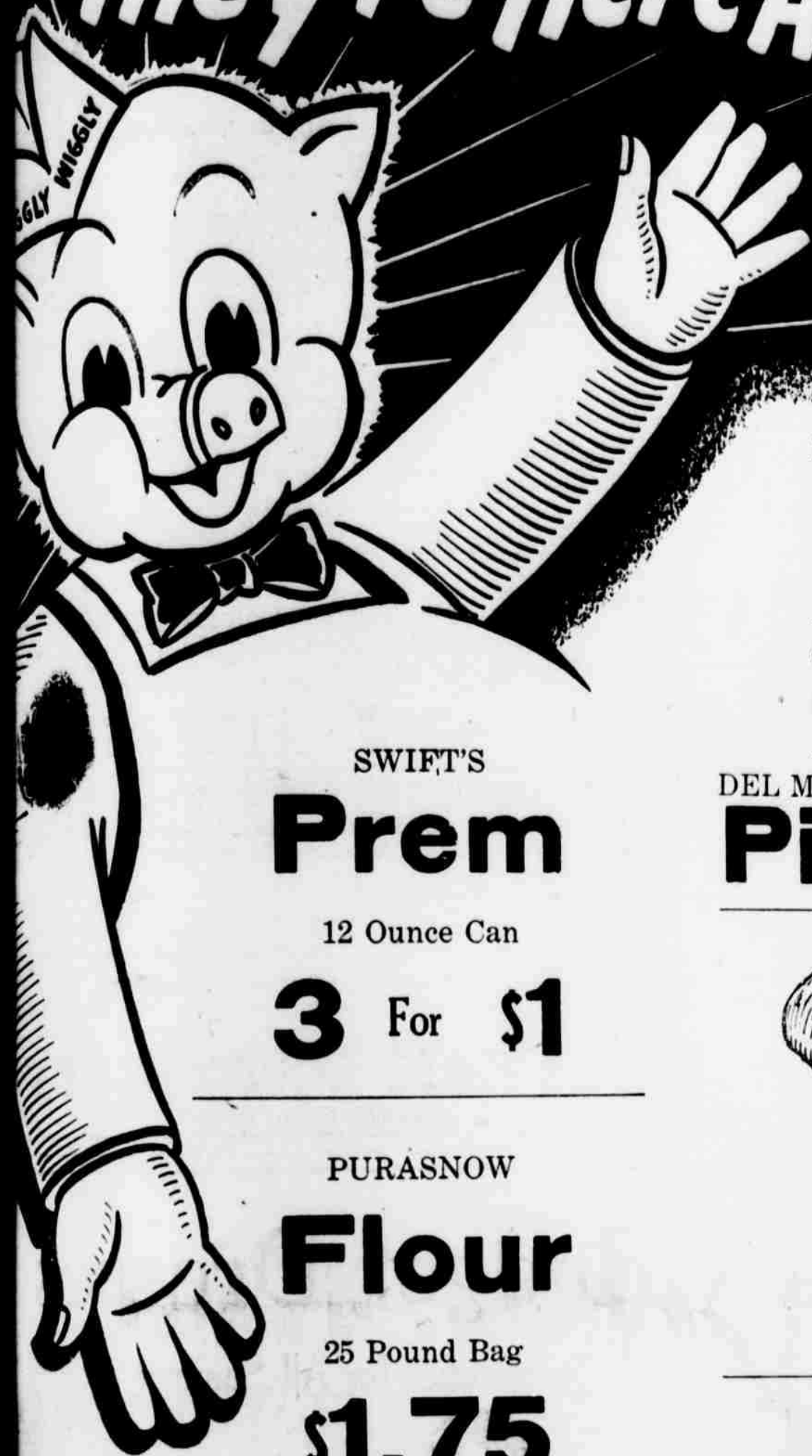

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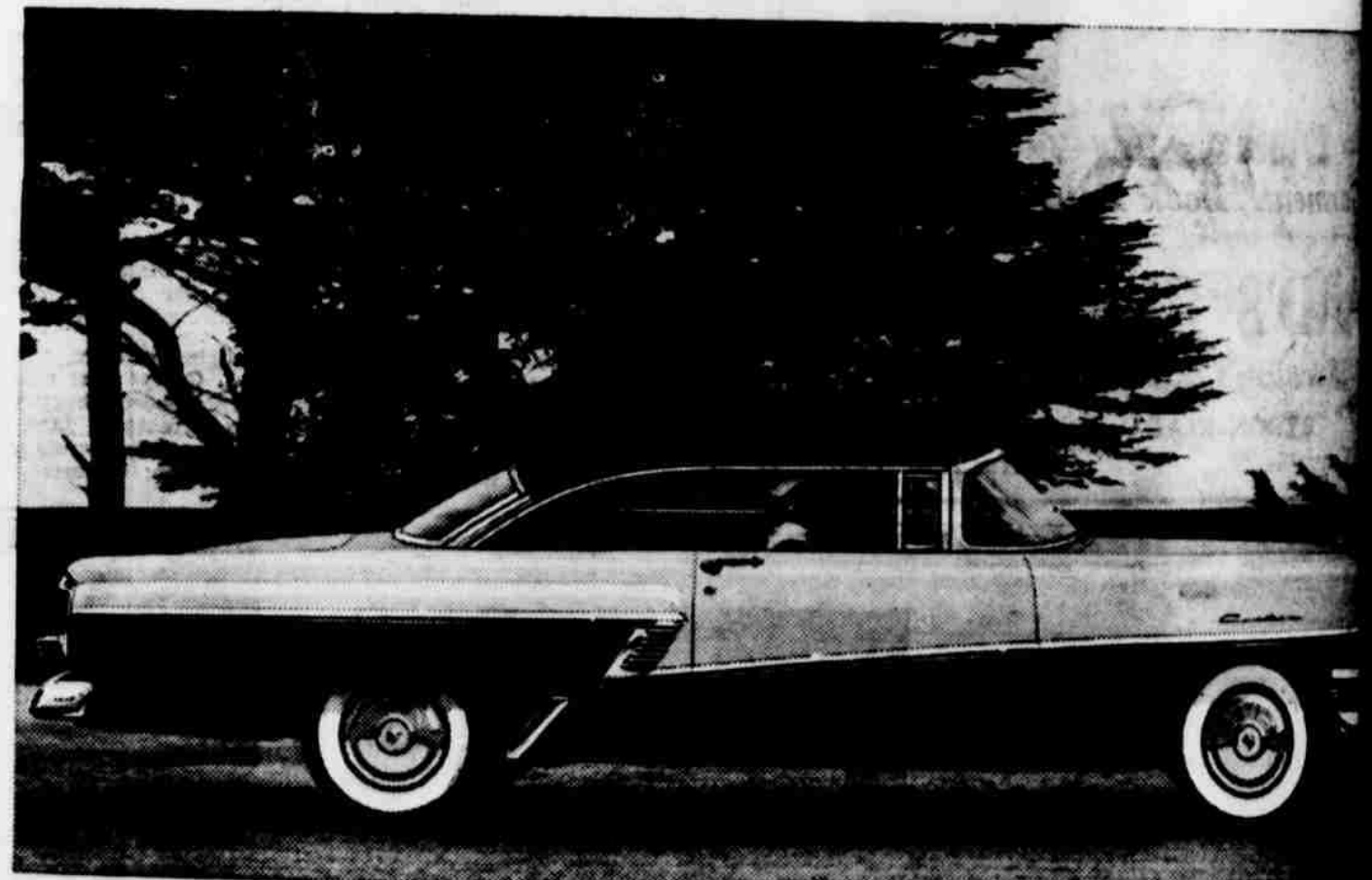
