Home Demonstration Women and 4-H Girls will hold their second annual achievement day at the community building Saturday, Sept. 4, from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m., Miss Mary Trammel, county home demonstration agent, has announced.

Plans for the event were made Saturday by the exhibit committee of the County H. D. council, composed of Mrs. T. J. Bowling, chairman, Mrs. W. E. Brewster and Mrs. Henry Wischkaemper.

All entries will be put in place Friday, Sept. 3, from 1:30 to 6:00 p. m. Judging will be done Saturday morning.

"Anyone wishing to exhibit may do so," Miss Trammel said. "Ribbons will be given everyone who exhibits. A gold ribbon will go to each club with 100 per cent of the membership having at least one exhibit.

All clubs, both 4-H and Home Demonstration, are being urged to have an educational exhibit of some phase of work studied within the past two years.

"You may exhibit anything you have made, anything in sewing, handicrafts, baking, etc.; or anything you have grown, such as potatoes, peas, melons, vegetables, corn, flowers, etc. You may exhibit eggs, both brown and white, but you are encouraged to exhibit only one exhibit in any class, Miss Trammel explained. Clubs will furnish their own tables for the educational exhibits; clothing must be exhibited on hangers.

## Users Billed at Higher Rate

### Phone Rates Raised-Council Retaliates With New Ordinance

An increase in telephone rates by General Telephone Company of the Southwest, and passage of a penalty-imposing ordinance by the City Council of Wellington were the two latest steps in the telephone controversy here. But in the meantime, most users were paying their bills at the old rate and payment was being accepted.

A number of city residents, however, have had their telephones

removed, either in protest to the August 19.

increase, or because they feel they can no longer afford the service.

The increase, unauthorized by the City Council, was made after that body had twice refused to grant the requested raise. The first known of the contemplated move by the telephone company came when users began receiving their bills for the August 16 to September 16 period Thursday,

After a series of special meetings of the City Council, called by Mayor Lester Hunter in a special meeting Tuesday morning, August 24, passed a penalty-providing ordinance which contains these provisions:

1. It shall be unlawful for any public utility, officer or employee of the utility, to charge for services at any rate other than the rate fixed by the City Council of the City of Wellington.
2. Any violation of this ordinance by a public utility, its officers, agents or employee, shall be a misdemeanor and upon conviction subject the offender to a fine of not less than 25 and not more than \$200. Each day of the violation shall be a separate offense. Each charge also shall be a separate offense.
3. A public utility, as defined in the ordinance, means any individual, person, firm or corporation regularly supplying the public within the corporate limits of the city with some commodity or service which is of special consequence and need, such as electricity, gas, transportation and telephone service.
4. This ordinance automatically repeals any previous ordinances

## Absentee Voting Breaks Records; Election Saturday

With only one county race involved, Collingsworth faces what will probably be its hottest second primary election Saturday, August 28.

When Absentee voting closed Tuesday, August 24, a record breaking 260 ballots had been cast, David Robinson, county clerk, an-

nounced. This more than doubles the number cast in the First Primary Election a month ago, the record to that date.

In the first primary election, 120 ballots were mailed out, and 106 were cast, while the remainder were either not returned, were not properly acknowledged, or

were returned unused, Mr. Robinson said.

Of the 260 Absentee ballots cast this time, 125 were by those with over age exemptions.

In view of this, an unprecedented number of votes, considering the eligible voters, is expected, according to Dick Sweat, County Democratic Chairman.

The polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m. and voting will be at the usual polling places.

At stake in the one county race is the office of sheriff-tax assessor and collector. Claude McKinney is asking re-election, while his opponent, John Rainey is in his first race.

Long-time observers of the county political scene say that never has a governor's race attracted so much heated activity.

Facing Governor Allan Shivers in his race for re-election to the state's top office is Ralph Yarborough of Austin.

Candidates for Place 1, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, are Alfred M. Scott of Travis County and Few Brewster of Bell County.

Only one name appears in the place for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, that of Lloyd W. Davidson of Travis County. Judge Davidson was left in the

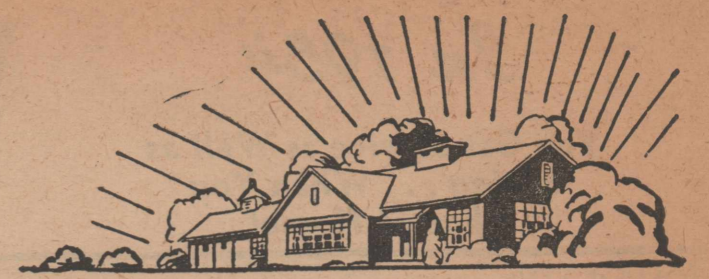

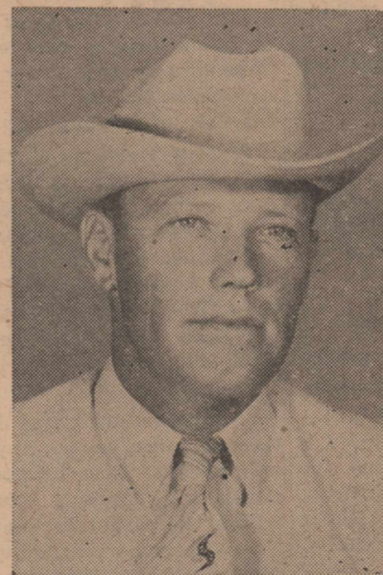

## "Allan Shivers of Texas Has Stubbed His Toe Again"

NOTE—Following is a syndicated column written recently by Drew Pearson which appeared in numerous daily newspapers throughout the United States. All statements and figures given by Mr. Pearson are factual and not guess work or daydreaming. Read the column and be guided accordingly in casting your vote for governor on August 28th.

WASHINGTON -- It looks as if Allan Shivers of Texas has stubbed his toe again.

On top of the \$1000-a-month fee given his campaign manager to keep a bankrupt insurance company in business, and on top of the disclosure that his son has been attending a non-segregated school while Shivers was blasting the Supreme Court ruling on segregation, it develops that Shivers' wife and mother-in-law have been profiting from state printing contracts.

In brief, the handsome governor of Texas has been awarding contracts to his own wife and mother-in-law to print part of the documents, legal forms, reports, etc., for the state of Texas. One of these contracts alone ran into \$27,000.

Such a contract is directly contrary to the Constitution of Texas, which states in Article 16, Section 21: "No member of or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contracts (for printing); and all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the governor. . ."

Despite this, the files of the State Board of Control in Austin show that, for the year 1953, a contract was awarded to the Times Publishing Company of Mission, Tex., owned by the Shivers family, for printing all papers for the following Texas institutions: "Agriculture Department, Architectural Examiners, Board of Hairdressers and Cosmetologists, College of Agriculture and Industry, Firemen's Pension Fund, General Land

Office, Labor Department, Lamar State College, TEA, Texas Southern University, Miscellaneous departments inside Austin, miscellaneous departments outside Austin.

The contract is signed on behalf of the Times Publishing Company by Mary O'Brien Shary, who happens to be Governor Shivers' mother-in-law; while it is approved for the state of Texas by Governor Shivers himself.

### ACTIVE IN PUBLISHING

The files of the Texas secretary of state show that the Times Publishing Company, chartered June 1, 1946, is owned by Mary O'Brien Shary, with 8000 shares of stock; by Allan Shivers, with 7000 shares; and by Joe T. Cook, with 5000 shares.

When Texas officials were queried about the violation of the Constitution by this printing contract, it was explained the governor had transferred his 7000 shares of stock to his wife. However, under the community property law, the governor shares equally in the income of his wife.

Furthmore, Joe T. Cook, manager of the Mission Times Publishing Company, wrote a rather damaging letter less than one month ago stating that Governor Shivers was active in the Times Publishing Company.

Writing to all Texas weekly newspapers on July 12, Cook said: "Allan with whom I am associated in the publication of the Times, is one of our group. He is an active member of the Texas Press Association. . . Allan Shivers speaks our language because he is in the publishing business."

One interesting angle to the Shivers family printing award is that their publishing company is located at Mission, in the Rio Grande Valley. This is some distance from the more populous areas of Texas, and although the contract is stated to have been let to the lowest bidder, it would seem more practical to have placed the contract in a central area such as Houston and saved trucking costs all over the biggest state in the union.

Note--The Shivers family is not exactly poverty-stricken. Mrs. Shary, the governor's mother-in-law was married to one of the biggest land developers in Texas, and Sharyland, where Eisenhower was entertained last year, is considered one of the show places of Texas. The governor himself made a cool profit of \$425,000 on a quickie land deal in the Rio Grande Valley when he was lieutenant governor. His labored explanations of the circumstances by which he was able to make this profit in a scant seven months is one of the things that contributed to the huge recent vote against him.

### The Real Fight on Shivers

It is obvious, both to supporters of Allan Shivers and to backers of Ralph Yarborough who will admit it, that an all-out effort is being made by the powers of the National Democratic Party to eliminate Shivers from the Texas governorship.

Why is this being done? What does it matter to these people who is governor of Texas?

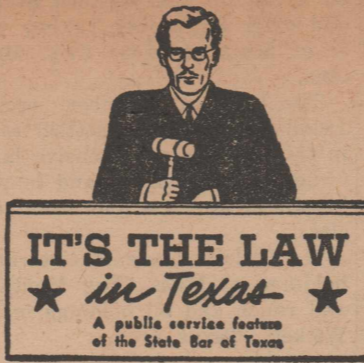

### WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Albert Charles Smith died and his lawyer filed the petition of probate for his estate, entitling it: "In the Matter of the Estate of Albert Charles Smith, also known as Albert Smith, also known as Charles Smith, also known as A. Charles Smith, also known as A. C. Smith and also known as Charley Smith."

With such a simple name, what did Mr. Smith do to make the probating of his estate so complicated?

When Albert Charles Smith was born, the attending physician filed a birth certificate with that name. During his school years, his friends called him "Al".

Mr. Smith went to college and decided that his name would look more distinguished if he wrote it "A. Charles Smith," and he was so regarded. His college diploma carried that name.

Starting out in business Mr. Smith took a job that required him to write his signature many times a day. To simplify the work, he signed his name "A. C. Smith." His bank account and telephone number were recorded that way. Mr. Smith lost a part of his identity, since there were eleven "A. C. Smiths" listed in his telephone book.

Mr. Smith decided to get married and he rushed to the courthouse to get his license. Without giving the matter much thought, he told the clerk his name was "Charles Smith." The name was recorded on his marriage certificate.

Mr. Smith bought a house, and the lawyer who handled the transaction asked for his full name. The deed was registered at the courthouse under the name "Albert Charles Smith."

A life insurance agent had previously written a policy for Mr. Smith under the name, "Al C. Smith." During his middle life, Mr. Smith took out other policies from another agent, and all of them carried the name "Albert C. Smith." He took a position with a

railroad and appeared on the pension roll as "A. C. Smith."

Mr. Smith owned some securities and several pieces of real estate and also owned various bills. They were all listed under various combinations of his name.

Then Mr. Smith made his will under the name of "Albert C. Smith." A year later he died; and that is when his attorney started working and trying to find out just who Mr. Smith was and what he owed and owned.

Of course this case is imaginary but it illustrates how difficult and costly such practices can be.

Every person should use the name appearing on his birth certificate and should make sure that documents which have a legal bearing, such as school diplomas, deeds to property, certificates of stock and bond ownership, and insurance policies, carry the same name. This will often avoid complications in the probating of an estate.

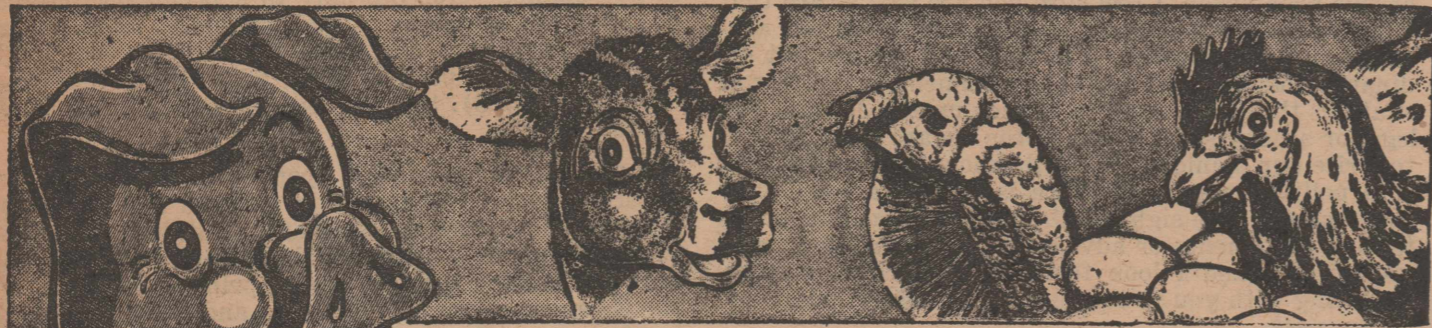

5. If any provision of the ordinance is proved invalid, the remainder shall not be affected.  
6. The ordinance was declared an emergency measure, relating to the welfare of the citizens of Wellington, and because of this, the council can legally introduce and pass an ordinance at the same meeting.  
“The council took the steps it did because they felt it was for the welfare of the people,” Mayor Hunter declared.

race after his opponent, Alan Haley of Wichita Falls, withdrew, but under state law, his name must appear on the ballot.  
Both Mr. Robinson and Earl Hunter, election judge for the Wellington South Box, have called attention that a number of people did not mark their ballots properly in the first primary and these had to be thrown out as mutilated.  
The choice of voting by either of two ways, given on the ballot, is confusing.  
The law provides that a voter may vote for a candidate by marking through the names of his opponents. This formerly was the only way a person could vote in Texas, and Robinson recommended that if any person feels he may be uncertain on the matter, to vote as he always has.  
The alternate way is this: You may vote for a candidate by marking an X in the little box beside his name. Nothing should be put in the other boxes in that race.

# KNOW THE FACTS

## About The Printing Contracts

Dear Tom:

Supplementing my telegram which was personally handed to Western Union at noon yesterday, I will attempt to answer, on a personal basis, your letter which was received in this office late Thursday, August 19th. I would like to reiterate that this does not purport to be an official opinion of this office since I am prohibited by law to render an opinion of this type to you as district attorney. I think you are well aware that when requests are submitted to this office we are asked to give our considered opinion and we are not ordinarily told to what degree of comment or number of citations that will be put in to back up any conclusion—legal or otherwise. In other words we are not told how to write our opinions. We both know that in the heat of a political campaign there is always a possibility that one will lose sight of the proper procedure in obtaining statements or advice. In any event, you and I are friends, and I look forward to working and cooperating with you in the future just as we have done in the past.

According to your letter a suit against the State is imminent. Although you are purporting to act in your official capacity as district attorney, you would be attempting to enjoin the State Board of Control, the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller from performing their mandatory duties required by the Constitution, and forcing the State to reject the bid of the lowest responsible bidder. It is my duty as Attorney General to represent these agencies of the State in their official capacity in such litigation.

Based on my examination of the stock transfer book and minutes of The Times Publishing Company, the following facts from the records are submitted for your consideration:

The minutes of a special stockholders meeting held on July 12, 1949, show that Allan Shivers submitted his resignation as an officer and director of this Company effective July 11, 1949, which was duly accepted. The stock transfer book of the Company shows that on February 1, 1951, all shares of stock heretofore held for Allan Shivers and Marialice Shivers had been transferred to B. H. Holcomb and Joe T. Cook respectively. The minutes of the annual meeting held on January 17, 1951, further reflect that Marialice Shivers submitted her resignation as an officer and director of the Company. Since February 1, 1951, neither Allan Shivers nor Marialice Shivers has been an officer, director or stockholder in this Company according to these records, and thus no conflict of interest.

When state agencies are called upon to pass on the legality of a corporation's operation based upon ownership of stock, they ordinarily look to these corporate records above referred to, the franchise tax returns, the corporate charter and all amendments thereto. Statements to trade associations or to the Federal Government are not ordinarily within the scope of inquiry.

Certainly the facts as above stated are contrary to the fact assumptions that I would have to make in order for me to comment on the status of the law as requested by you. Due to the hypothetical nature of these questions and the probability of having to defend a lawsuit for the State, I would deem it unwise and a breach of duty to brief a case to be used against the State.

I will, however, make this statement as to the general law on the subject of "conflicting interests" and that is that the "interest" referred to in Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, although never having been clearly construed by the courts, is in my opinion referring only to a pecuniary interest of the officer involved in each individual case, and as such depends upon the facts surrounding each case. See City of Edinburg v. Ellis, 59 S. W. 2d 99 (Tex. Com. App. 1933). See also Appeal of General 67 A. 2d 565 (1949).

I feel personally called upon to answer your last question since I feel that it is a veiled insinuation on my official conduct as Secretary of State, and I must presume, on the conduct of the Comptroller Bob Calvert. Concerning the approval of printing contracts by the Governor, Secretary of State, and the Comptroller, I refer you to Teer v. McGann, 65 S. W. 2d 362 (Tex. Civ. App. 1933) which held that a refusal to approve a valid contract which was awarded the lowest responsible bidder was arbitrary and that mandamus would lie to compel such approval. Thus in view of this decision, once the Board of Control determines which bid has been submitted by the lowest responsible bidder, it becomes the mandatory duty of the Board of Control to award the contract, and the duty of the Governor, Secretary of State, and the Comptroller in approving the contract is merely ministerial. Before the Board of Control makes the award, the contract is submitted to the Attorney General for approval. When approval is given by the Attorney General, the contract is returned to the Board of Control, the award is made and it is then sent to the Governor, Secretary of State, and the Comptroller. While I was Secretary of State in 1951, these contracts had gone through this procedure and had been approved by the Attorney General's office during the Hon. Price Daniel's administration, and were subsequently approved by the Board of Control. I was not then aware, nor am I now aware that Mrs. Shivers owned an interest in this company—quite to the contrary.

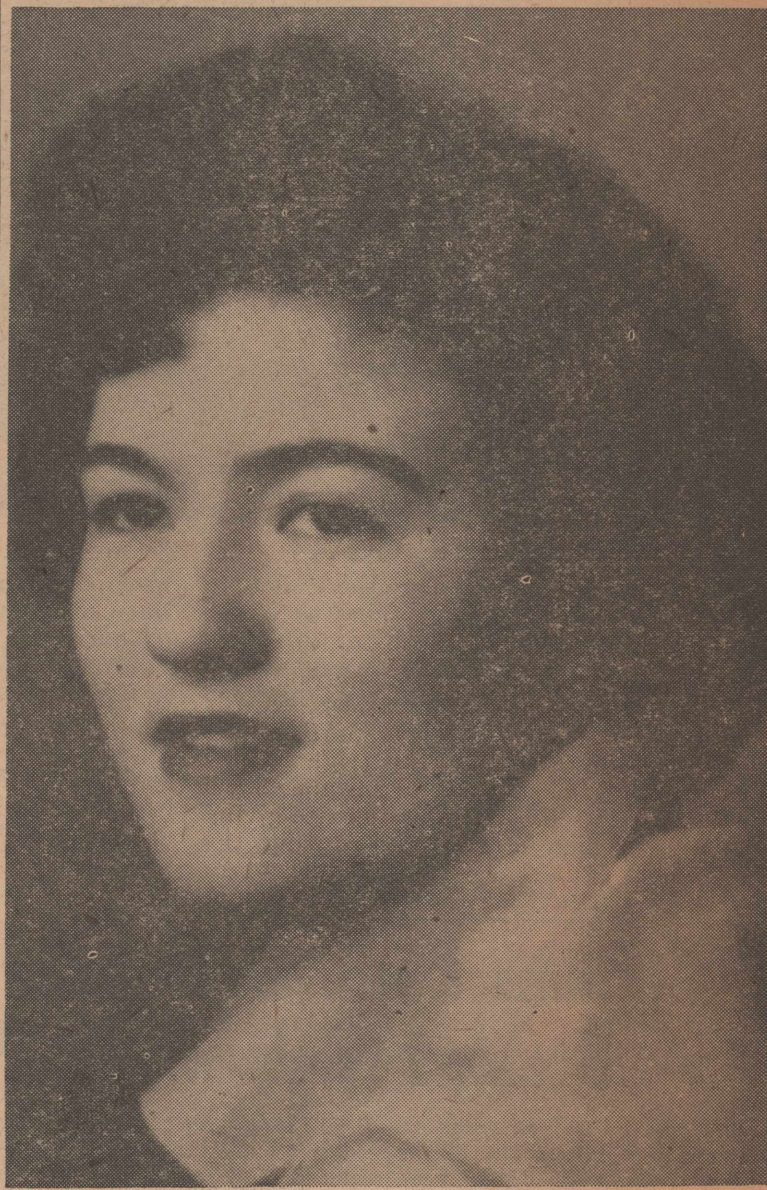

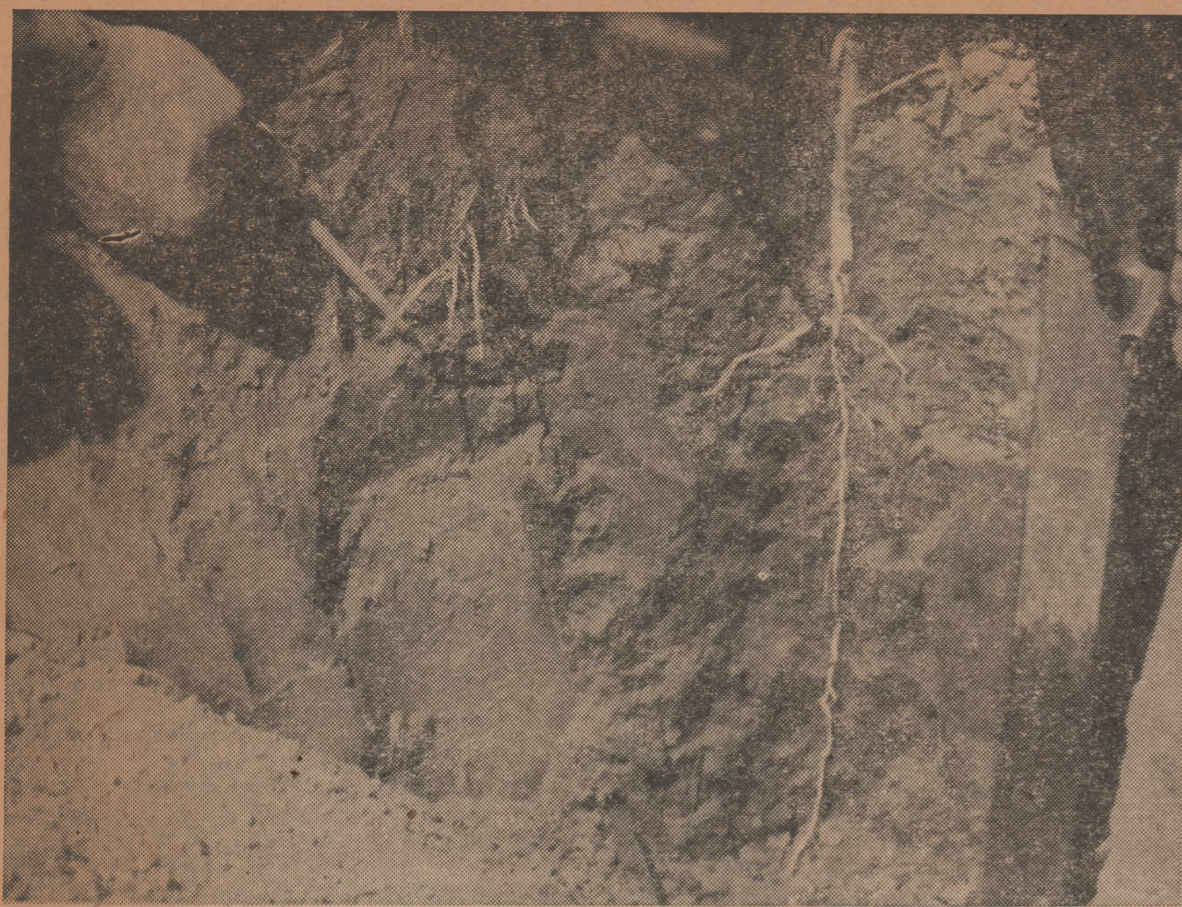

**Grazing Qualities Good**

**Williams Farm Evidences That Guar Can Break Hardpan on Area Farm**

The Hayden Williams farm located one mile east of the Fresno gin, is evidence that Guar can break the hardpan on the county farms.

Williams is confronted with the same problem that many area farmers have been and that is the hard surface of land that lies about four inches below the earth's surface.

During the late spring, he added 15 acres of Guar to his program. He used the strip-cropping method on the grain sorghum and

Guar. Under the same climatic conditions and soil type, the sorghum had been stopped by the hardpan, while the Guar penetrated the concrete-like soil and it went on to get the moisture that was in the sub-soil.

Some 4000 acres of Guar have been planted in the Salt Fork Conservation District, which is serving to build up the soil and add needed nitrogen to the depleted soils of the area.

"Besides the soil-building qualities of Guar, it is also useful in

holding and storing moisture," Fred Squyers said in regard to the need of water for plant life during this hot, dry August days. "After the plant has died, it leaves the hollow, fibrous tude in the ground and this provides an avenue which rain falling in the field can drain into the sub-soil and be stored far use during dry periods.

"This plant that came from India is being used for grazing since many pastures have been burned by the intense heat. All of those reported that they are highly sat-

isfied with the quality and value of Guar as a grazing legume, Squyers declared when asked about other uses of Guar. "It is good from the standpoint that it is not toxic to cattle and bloat in cattle can not be caused by the plant, which takes a worry off of the mind of the farmer, Squyers went on to say. "For the most part, it is the opinion of the growers that this plant—Guar—is our answer to the farming problems of the Salt Fork Soil Conservation District," the Work Unit Conservationist concluded.

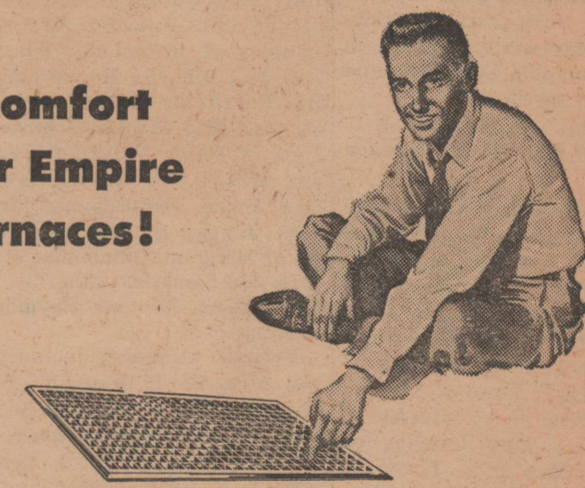

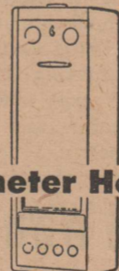

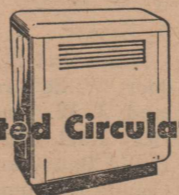

**TEXAS FARMERS-RANCHERS WARNED OF CIO LABOR PLANS**

AUSTIN, Tex., Farmers and ranchers of Texas were warned this week that the CIO plans to organize the farm workers of Texas if its candidate wins the Governor's race.

This warning came from Governor Allan Shivers who charged that the backers of his opponents "want to turn the state government over to the same bunch that is trying to wreck Port Arthur."

"One of the first things they would do is put one of their red-hot organizers from Port Arthur in as labor commissioner. Then every time a farmer or rancher wanted to hire someone he would have to go through the CIO."

Governor Shivers said there was no doubt in his mind that the aim of the CIO after the job of organizing industry in Port Arthur and along the Gulf Coast is finished is to begin organizing farm/labor in all parts of Texas.

"You can imagine what will happen when the CIO starts dictating how many laborers are needed to plow ten acres of land, refusing to allow a man to work more than thirty-five hours a week during the harvesting season and telling how much a farmer can charge for his crop," he said.

The Shivers administration, the Governor said, has worked hard to help preserve and protect the rights of the working man.

"But as long as I am Governor, the professional labor bosses who have been sent to Texas from the East—specifically those in the CIO and its Political Action Committee—are not going to run our State Government," Shivers promised.

Shivers said the average working man in Texas appreciated good government and that they were not going to let CIO bosses and professional organizers from the East do their thinking—and voting—for them.

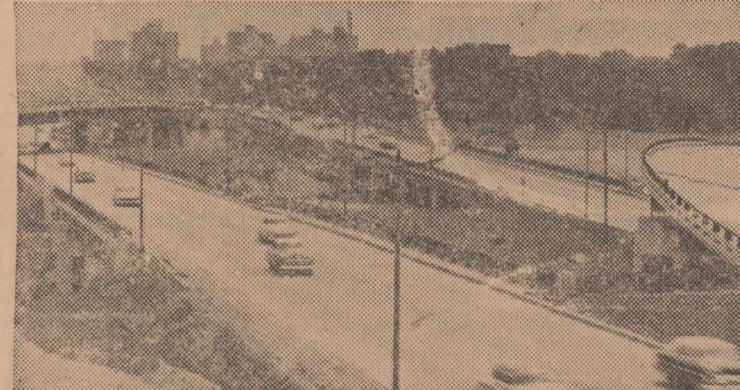

# Frank Coleman Looks Ahead With Grass, Cattle And Conservation

Looking into the future with soil conservation in mind is the aim of Frank Coleman, prominent county resident and one of the first members of the board of directors on the Salt Fork Soil Conservation District. He is still a director of the district.

Coleman's farm, located in the Marella community, is marked by timely improvements in soil control and actual methods that have been put into practice.

This devout believer in conservation started out in his farming career on this modestly sandy farm. Since his beginning with such a venture, he has utilized every inch of his farm, and the still director of the district has done it with gains in soil-building.

Mr. Coleman has planted some 34 acres of Weeping Love Grass on his farm and he is anticipating an increase in his acreage, which

will amount to 90 acres. The pre-grazing during the early months of this year, Luther Gieger, local work unit conservationist for the district, said in regard to Coleman's grass potential.

"Coleman will plant sorghum stubble crop that will serve as protection for growing grass during the windy days of next spring," Gieger revealed as he went over the proposed grass increasing program.

The Coleman farm in recent years has been plagued with shininess, which is fatal to cattle when it is eaten during the early spring for the past two years and this has permitted the native grasses to grow and reproduce seed in a bountiful fashion. This plan will insure good pasture for Coleman's Hereford cattle in years to come and at the same time prove its worth in the extra poundage

gains. "Coleman, with his zeal and effort, has proven to county farmers that have watched him that one can take the soil, irrespective of type, and come up with something that is of value," the district technician stated.

LEGAL NOTICE

No. 332  
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF PUBLIC UTILITIES RATE CHARGES, MAKING EACH CHARGE AND EACH DAY A SEPARATE VIOLATION AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Wellington, Texas, exercised its legislative authority and promulgated certain ordinances regulating rates to be charged within the City of Wellington by public utilities;

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined it advisable that certain penalties be executed for charging by public utilities, rates for services other than those rates set by the City Council. NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WELLINGTON:

SECTION 1: It shall be unlawful for any public utility, officer or employee of any public utility to assess or charge for services any rate other than the rate fixed by the City Council of the City of Wellington.

SECTION 2: Any violation of this ordinance by any public utility, officer or agent or employee of any public utility shall be a misdemeanor and upon conviction, subject the offender a fine of not less than Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) and each day of such violation shall be a separate offence and each charge shall be a separate offense.

SECTION 3: A public utility, as set forth in this ordinance, means any individual, person, firm or corporation engaged in regularly supplying the public within the corporate limits of the City of Wellington, Texas, with some commodity or service which is of special consequences and need, such as the electricity, gas, transportation and telephone service.

SECTION 4: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed to the extent of the conflict.

SECTION 5: If any provision of this ordinance or the applicat-

ion thereof to any individual person, firm or corporation shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and the application of such provision to other individuals, persons, firms or corporations shall not be affected thereby.
