

## Hospital Board Adopts Budget

# Vow Of Quality Service Despite Loss Of Revenues

Mitchell County Hospital Board of Directors Tuesday in their regular monthly meeting approved a budget of \$2,193,287 for hospital operations during the coming fiscal year which starts Friday, Oct. 1.

General insurance totaled \$20,123 of which \$16,063 is for malpractice insurance. Last year, malpractice in-

surance for the hospital cost \$13,543. The board also accepted a bid of \$25,536 for workmen's compensation insurance for the hospital district as compared to a bid last year of \$16,699. However, the hospital will get as much as a

one-third discount premium because of lack of claims filed on workmen's compensation.

Out of the hospital district's budget for the coming year, \$310,000 for operations will come from taxes while \$1,374,491 will come from hospital operations and \$337,626 will come from lodge operations.

Expenditures call for \$1,486,215 for the hospital operation and \$397,623 for operation of Root Valley Fair Lodge. Another \$7,748 has been budgeted for the Mitchell County Ambulance Service and \$223,528 for capital improvements, most of which will be a surgical suite which is now under construction in the basement of a hospital wing.

In a cover letter to the budget by hospital officials, it is explained that the budget "continues to be based on the philosophy, expressed by the District's Board of Directors, that the citizens served by Root Memorial Hospital and Root Valley Fair Lodge are to be provided the best possible service consistent with the availability of funds from all sources."

The letter also states that "the loss of about \$27,000 in tax revenues next year (primarily caused by a reduction in valuations of oil property within the county) will have an effect on the Hospital District's operations. Consequently, the budget for the new year anticipates that revenues will not increase as they have in the past and that expenditures must be adjusted accordingly."

The letter further states that, "On January 1, 1977, the minimum wage will be raised from \$2.20 to \$2.30 an hour. However, because of planned reorganizations and reductions in personnel, this mandatory increase will result in the new year's payroll costs being only about one per cent above those for the 1975-76 year."

In a series of charts accompanying the budget, it is shown that compared to 36 Texas hospitals and 257 nation-wide with 50-beds or less, Root Hospital ranks far better in management than the state and national medians. Root Hospital has a higher occupancy rate, less days average patient length

of stay, higher hospital utilization rate, about average national nursing hours per patient day, lower administration hours per bed, more lab tests per man hours, lower lab costs per test, lower x-ray expense per procedure, lower physical

therapy expense per treatment, lower diet expense per meal, lower maintenance expense per 1,000 square feet and higher housekeeping expense per 1,000-feet.

The survey shows that Root Hospital is slightly higher than the state and national median on inpatient cost per day at \$138.70 as compared to \$114.28 statewide and \$112.95 nationwide, possibly because of more services offered at Root Hospital than at most hospitals its size.

Colorado City's Wolves will open 6-AA district competition against Merkel Friday at 7:30 p.m.

Merkel is a new member of the district, just having moved up from one-A classification this year.

The Wolves enter the district opener against the Badgers with a 2-2 record while Merkel has won three

games and lost only one. It's a tough district opener, said Colorado High Coach Mike Farda. "They're better than people think."

In Merkel, the Wolves face the best linebacker they have seen this year in No. 42 Paul Smith. Another of Merkel's assets is a noseguard with real good quickness who stunts on every play, Farda noted.

Merkel runs out of the Wishbone and the wing T. They depend on their running game but also throw the ball on occasions, Farda said, pointing out that they threw a pass last week in their only loss of the season, 20-15 to Eastland.

The Wolves are having trouble with the flu this week as Pete Parham had to be sent home with high fever Tuesday and Ruben Ornelas hasn't been at school or practice all week because of sickness.

### Gets Statewide Attention

John McElligott, a Physicians' Assistant in Colorado City along with Charlie Clark, has drawn statewide attention as a result of a picture and mention in the *Texas Monthly*.

In the October edition of the magazine, the short article about McElligott appears in "The Texas Monthly Reporter" section by Richard West.

West tells how McElligott, 29, came to Colorado City via a pilot program at Duke University to train physicians' assistants and from the staff of the PA program at the University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas.

"His job entails about 80 per cent of what a family physician does," West says. "He sees emergency patients, assists in surgery, makes house calls, works with therapists, and generally fills up a hundred hour week."

The article goes on to note that "for his services to four doctors at the Rhode Clinic and Root Memorial Hospital, where he works with another PA, he is paid upwards of \$20,000 annually. The starting salary for such work is normally \$13,000 to \$18,000."

McElligott was the first PA to come to Colorado City about a year and a half ago and has become a part of the local sports scene along with Clark. McElligott helped with a Little League team this summer and both he and Clark assist at the Wolves sidelines.

Colorado City's being the scene of much of Preston Jones' *Bradleyville Trilogy* is also mentioned in the short article about McElligott.
