

## DAWSON CO. CROPS DAMAGED BY RAIN AND HAIL TUESDAY

Serious damage to growing crops and to property by hail, estimated to cover a third of the county, was done during the rain and hail storm that swept over part of the county Tuesday afternoon shortly after three o'clock.

Center of the hail damage in the county was reported to be in the Munger community, where hail completely wiped out all the crops and did considerable damage to houses and livestock. Many houses have to be re-roofed and new window glasses added. It was stated that the Munger school house was seriously damaged, getting all the window lights broken and the roof badly damaged. Citizens of that community state that hail fell as big as baseballs for a few minutes. The Welch community also report a very serious damage.

The crops south of the Klondike community were washed away by the heavy rain, and it is also reported that crops southwest of Key were washed away.

Considerable damage to property was reported at O'Donnell and in a four mile strip east of O'Donnell, heavy rainfall completely packed the fields, of course making it necessary for many of the farmers to replant.

Farmers who lost their crops to the rain and hail are busy replanting this week. A shortage of cotton seed caused some delay.

Hail and heavy rains ruined most of the crops in Lamb, Hockley, Lubbock, Terry, Cochran, Lynn and Martin counties. Much property damage also has been reported in these counties.

## Plans and Bid Forms Received for Constructing CCC Camp

Plans and bid forms for the construction of the Soil Erosion CCC camp here were received this morning (Thursday) by the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce and the Mayor, and all local contractors interested in bidding on this job are requested to call at the City Hall and look these plans over before bidding. The city is interested in local people doing the bidding, for if they do not, outside interests will get the work. Government officials state that the construction of the camp would probably start about June 15.

Receiving of his information assures a Soil Erosion Camp for Dawson County. The site has already been selected by a committee several weeks ago. The camp to be located just south and southwest of the city which included the old Tourist Camp and Ball Park and extends west on the land belonging to S. L. Forrest. Arrangements have already been made for the furnishing of gas, water and light connections.

Information has been received that the camp would have 200 men and that in equipment and materials alone the government would spend about \$6,000 per month here. The boys will spend on the average of \$4,000 per month. This will mean that Lamesa will get about \$10,000 per month for the next twelve months and it is possible that the camp will remain here two years.

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## Congressman Mahon Asks For Continued Reduced Freight

Congressman George Mahon has conferred with Government officials in Washington in an effort to secure an extension of the aid that has been rendered farmers of the drought area. He has been working with the Commodities Purchase Section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration and the Interstate Commerce Commission regarding a 30 day extension of the reduced freight rates on hay and feed being shipped into the counties that have suffered most from the drought. The agreement which made possible the reduced rates during the last few months expired May 31. The Commodities Purchase Section has included 131 Mid-Western counties in the proposed area to be benefitted, 60 of which are in West Texas.

He has also made an effort thru the Farm Credit Administration and the Texas Relief Commission to secure an increase in the amount of the loan allowed farmers for feed for livestock.

Mr. Mahon said: "Now that rains have come over West Texas, our farmers have an opportunity to bring themselves back to a basis of prosperity if they can only be carried over a few more months until a new crop can be raised. I believe that those steps which the government has taken to help the farmers in the drought area should not be withdrawn at this crucial time, but should be continued until returns from a new crop can be realized."

# FARM NOTES

**Applications for 1935 Cotton Tags**  
The contemplated taking of Bankhead applications for bale tags for the 1935 crop if having to be put off indefinitely due to the fact that the State headquarters have no blanks for the work and consequently this office cannot get the blanks for use in the county. As soon as the blanks arrive for the work in this county the work will be ready to go on. It is hoped that we will be able to make the exchange of old bale tags certificates for the new ones at the time the new applications are made out.

**Final Payment on 1934 Tags**  
According to a letter received from the Washington office the final settlement on the tags pooled in the 1934 pool should reach this office any day now. This will represent a balance of \$3.80 per bale yet to be paid and a balance of 30 per cent of the certificates will be issued at the time the checks are delivered. Dawson county pooled 9,700,260 pounds, 70 per cent of which were sold through the pool or 6,790,182 pounds were sold, leaving a balance for the county of 2,910,078 pounds to be returned to the producers for use on the 1935 crop. As each check is delivered the producer who gets his check will be given a sheet showing how many pounds that he pooled and how many that are being reissued to him. The producer will have ten days in which to make up his mind to pool the balance in case he desires to repool and the new pool or special pool according to the letter received will be liquidated within 120 days from the start and producers will receive five cents per pound for the certificates less the cost of selling. The cost of selling the 1934 pool was less on four one hundredths of one cent per pound or approximately 20c per bale, whereas the rumor had been from 75c to \$5 per bale.

**1935 Corn-Hog Contracts**  
Mr. E. N. Holmgren, chairman of the State Corn-Hog Board visited in the county Wednesday and stated that the contracts for Dawson county were in good shape but that the 168 signers for the first time in 1935 will of necessity have to be adjusted downward by the county corn-hog control association. He was very complimentary toward the work of the Board and especially the work of Buster Herndon the secretary of the local association.

**Wind Erosion Applications**  
All parties who signed application blanks for the wind erosion control funds and received the funds for use will receive a letter within the next few days for their signature showing that such agreements were fulfilled by the parties who received the money or the feed and fuel for such work. It is very important that these papers be signed up and returned immediately or else these parties not sending them in will be called on for a refund of the money to the Texas Relief Administration.

## Miss Arlene Drennan Wins 4-H Bedroom Contest

Miss Arlene Drennan, 4-H bedroom demonstrator of the Woody 4-H club received the highest score in bedroom improvement work in Dawson county.

As a reward for her efforts Arlene will be sent to Short Course at College Station by the Chamber of Commerce.

"When I entered the contest several of the windows were out of my room, the door was broken so that it would not close, there were no screens and I had no furniture except a bed" said Arlene in the story of her achievement.

The floor of Arlene's room was rough and full of cracks. It was planed smooth and the cracks were filled with a filler made of glue and saw dust. Over this Arlene put a good grade of oak floor paint.

An old table was remade by adding new legs. This was painted ivory and used for a bedside table. A lamp was made from a preserve jar for her study table. The study table was made from an old dining table. Rockers were added to an old chair, a new bottom was put in a straight chair, new cushions were made for chairs, new curtains were added, a new mattress was made, a bedspread was made, new bedding added, a dressing table was made from scrap lumber, a dressing stool was made, a washstand was made from an old dry goods box.

Arlene added a new closet to her room in which she has provided space for hanging clothes, storing bedding, for shoes, hats and soiled clothes. This closet is one of the very best in the county.

"After we started improving my room, we did not stop with that, but added another closet to the house, papered the entire house, added new screens and are planning to paint the outside" Arlene stated.

The total cost of the improvement of Arlene's room was \$10.55.

Arlene's room will now enter the district contest and be judged with all the county winners in a few days.

## New Agent To Take Over Duties June 1st

"Miss Mattie Phenix, the new home demonstration agent, will take up her duties June 1," stated Miss Madeline Cox, county home demonstration agent, to those present at the council on the 25th of May in the District court room. There were 18 clubs represented.

Miss Cox expressed her hope that no change would be made in the interest and enthusiasm of our club work during the time Miss Phenix is adjusting herself to the county.

Plans for the dress contest and women's encampment were made.

The date set for the dress contest and encampment was July 2 and 3. The council presented Miss Cox with a set of Community Plate silver.

## Thirty-five Bedspreads Exhibited

Thirty-five attractive and inexpensive tufted bedspreads were exhibited Saturday by the 4-H girls of the county.

The materials used in the spreads ranged from feed and sugar sacks to new sheeting. They were tufted in varieties of colors and designs. The cost of the spreads ranged from 25c up.

In the class of spreads made of sacks, Miss Modene Jones, Munger, won first place, Miss Florence Pound

of Munger, second, and Miss Aladine Drennan, Woody, third.

In the class of spreads made from new materials, Miss Mildred Cox of Fairview placed first, Miss Beatrice Tipton of Fairview, second, and Miss Allene Baxter of Higginbotham third.

The McCarty 4-H Club with Mrs. A. P. Hamilton as sponsor, exhibited twelve spreads, which was more than any other club.

## Sisters Improve Bedroom

"I started by bedroom improvement with a bare room built from a south porch with unfinished floor and walls," stated Miss Oneta Hamilton, bedroom demonstrator of the McCarty 4-H Club.

When Oneta started her bedroom improvement, it was necessary to build a room to improve. The room is occupied by her twin sister and herself. Each girl made a set of curtains, bedspread and table covers in order that the room might be transformed from one color to another.

"We made a dressing table, study table and bedside table from dried fruit boxes, and the entire cost of my room improvement was \$9.79."

## Improves Bedroom for \$3.80

"The total cost of improving my bedroom was \$3.80," stated Miss Evelyn Robinson, 4-H bedroom demonstrator of the Mullins 4-H club.

By papering the walls, refinishing a bed, dressing table, wash stand, study table, and chair, the room was made more attractive and comfortable. Evelyn's curtains and bedspreads were made of sheeting tufted with yellow thread.

"I put a door on my closet and built the closet to the ceiling to prevent dust and rubbish from collecting on top," Evelyn said.

## Cooperator Improves Room for \$3.69

"After I complete my own bedroom I plan to improve my mother's bedroom," stated Miss Maxine Moore 4-H Club cooperator of the McCarty club.

Maxine has papered her room, refinished her bed, started a built-in closet, made a tufted bedspread, plans to upholster an old chair, made a dressing stool from a nail keg, and tufted curtains to match her bedspread. The total cost of her bedroom improvement was \$3.69.

Besides being enthusiastic in her bedroom improvement, Maxine is putting down 114 feet of tile, she has set out 50 tomato plants, 25 pepper plants, and added carrots as her new vegetable. She also has lettuce, cucumbers, and okra planted. By the end of the summer, Maxine will be one of the many who is 100 per cent in goal achievement.

## Key 4-H Demonstrator Remakes Bedroom for only \$5.38

"When I started my bedroom improvement work, all I had was a very dark room with bare walls and a bed was the only piece of furniture in it," reported Miss Rachel Hogg, bedroom demonstrator of the Key 4-H Club.

By remaking a 15-year old wash stand into a neat dressing table and making an old nail keg into a vanity stand stool, Rachel had a very attractive dressing center at a cost of only 28c.

## ON TEXAS FARMS

With the help of 20 men, logs and shingles donated by other citizens, the Arbor community in Houston county has built a relief canning center at a cash expense of \$16. Six more dollars for materials came from the home demonstration club which initiated the project.

Cash for concrete being scarce and old tin cans plentiful for the picking up, a Williamson county garden demonstrator has put down a hundred feet of tin can subirrigation. It is more work than concrete tile and not permanent, but beats no subirrigation at all, is the report.

Collis Bouldin in Gonzales county has 150 acres of terraces which he allows paid for themselves in one April day when seven inches of rain fell—three and one-half of that within less than one hour. Without the terraces, erosion would have carried off his whole crop as well as the top soil, he says.

Robertson county has terraced 3,085 acres of land in 1935 by the end of April. Relief labor has been used and the Commissioner's Court furnished machinery at actual cost of operation.

In a county poultry contest in Llano county, first place went to the flock of R. Fishbeck whose flock of 22 hens produced an average of 29 eggs per month per hen. Second place winner was the flock of Robert Boxell, with an average of 24 eggs per month per hen.

## BE VACCINATED AGAINST TYPHOID FEVER NOW

Austin, June 4.—Now is the time, according to Dr. Charles D. Reece, Director, Bureau of Communicable Diseases, to be vaccinated against typhoid fever, a disease that has cost the lives of more than 2,000 Texans past four years.

Typhoid fever has been eliminated in our army and navy through vaccination. The typhoid vaccine is not a serum. This preventive treatment of typhoid fever consists of three small hypodermic "shots" given every 5 to 7 days until three injections are given. Such a treatment protects you from taking typhoid fever for two or three years.

Consult your family physician today in regards to typhoid prevention. Invest in typhoid protection against this often fatal disease. This form of protection insures you and your family against possible long confinement, great economic loss, and perhaps death.

You may be so unfortunate as to drink contaminated milk, water, or other food containing the typhoid bacilli and contract the disease this year. In selecting a place for a vacation choose one where you know that the water and milk supply is pure. Be sure that the kitchen and dining room are screened to protect food from flies. When camping it is best to boil water used for drinking, unless you know that it is pure. Clear, sparkling spring water may be polluted by drainage.

## TIPS TO TOURIST ON SAFE DRIVING

By C. W. Wood, National Service Director, Chevrolet Motor Co.

Alertness is the chief requirement for the driver on a vacation tour. He doesn't know the road and its hazards, he is unfamiliar with local traffic customs, and at any moment he may be called upon to cope with a situation that he is not accustomed to meeting in his ordinary driving.

Therefore, if he does not concentrate on his job, he is much more likely to have a mishap than when he is traveling the old familiar roads around his home.

Most driving over accustomed routes, is done subconsciously; the driver slows down for curves and busy intersections, halts at stop streets, and observes the traffic lights without giving thought to them. This is the safest condition of driving, because it permits the man at the wheel to be on the alert for any unusual happening. Since he does so many of the necessary things from force of habit, he is better able to act when the unexpected happens.

On the summer tour, over strange highways, the driver must conscious-

ly direct his mind to warning signs, crossings, curves, steep grades, etc. and it is on this kind of a drive, when he needs all his attention on the road that he is most subjected to distraction. He has to observe the scenery, keep an eye on the youngsters, converse with his wife, see that the baggage remains in place, and look after a dozen things that in ordinary driving cause him no concern.

The first rule of safe touring for the driver, therefore, is to keep constantly on the alert. The rule for the passenger is to avoid distracting the driver.

It is believed by drillers that Garza county has another oil producer in the Sullivan No. 1 well about three and a half miles south of Post. A pump test will be made of the well at its present depth of 2940 feet.

Two thousand quarts of muri-acid will be placed in the hole as soon as

it is cased and cement hardens to permit reaming out.

M. L. Richards, driller, expressed his belief that the well at its present stage will produce from 10 to 20 barrels daily. The oil was encountered about 100 feet higher than in any well drilled nearby.—Post Dispatch

After repeated but unsuccessful efforts to remove a section of the pipe which had hung in the well, the drillers of the Wanete-Hart test oil well a week ago decided to drill around of through the obstruction. beginning at a level of about 2400 hundred feet they proceeded to a depth of about 2900 feet with the new hole. They then set the casing and are waiting for the cement to settle before proceeding with the drilling. I. L. Dillard, superintendent of drilling, has gone east but is expected back about the end of the week, when it is expected that drilling will be resumed.

Drillers had reached a depth of 4817 feet in the original hole when the drill became lodged. The new hole, which evidently diverges some distance from the original hole, is said to be logging about 100 feet higher than the original.—Lynn Co. News.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas over the age of sixty-five (65) years, who are not habitual criminals, nor habitual drunkards, nor inmates in any State supported institution; and providing that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance; providing for the necessary proclamation and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of proclamation, publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power by general laws to provide, under such limitations and restrictions and regulations as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no habitual criminal, and no habitual drunkard while such habitual drunkard, and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such old-age assistance; provided further that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for old-age assistance as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinbefore provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday of August, 1935 at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"For the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

"Against the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per person per month and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same printed as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas by striking out Section 20a to Section 20e, both inclusive; prohibiting the open saloon and vesting in the Legislature the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of intoxicating liquors, including the power to provide for a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered or exchanged in any county, justice's precinct or incorporated city or town

quors had been prohibited by local option election held under the laws in force at the date of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters of such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing that such shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverage containing less than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties or political subdivisions in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such Amendment prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication of such by the Governor and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20a to Section 20e, both inclusive, and substitute in lieu thereof the following:

"ARTICLE XVI Section 20. (a) The open saloon shall be and is hereby prohibited. The Legislature shall have the power, and it shall be its duty to define the term 'open saloon' and enact laws against such.

Subject to the foregoing, the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

"(b) The Legislature shall enact laws or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within the prescribed limits; and such laws shall contain provisions for voting on the sale of intoxicating liquors of various types and various alcoholic content.

"(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange in any such county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, any spirituous, vinous, or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicants whatsoever, for beverage purposes, unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; provided that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties, or political subdivisions thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

It appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas providing that Constitutional Amendments may be submitted by the Legislature at Special Sessions under certain conditions; providing for an election on the ques-

tion and providing for the proclamation and the publication thereof; describing the form of ballot, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. How the Constitution is to be Amended. The Legislature, at any biennial session, by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the Journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed Amendments shall be duly published once a week for four (4) weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said Amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any Amendment, the said Amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof; provided however, that in cases of extraordinary emergency affecting the State as a whole, Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed in the manner hereinabove set out upon the submission of the proposed Amendment by the Governor at any Special Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State who are qualified to vote on proposed Constitutional Amendments at an election to be held on the 24th day of August, A. D. 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon for those favoring the Amendment the words:

Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which does not indicate his desire regarding the above proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the above proposed Amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend Sections 3 and 5 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to permit the furnishing of State official text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of One Dollar (\$1.00) on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed Thirty-Five Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of the State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside, under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law, a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children within the scholastic age attending any school in this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation

and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by General Laws, and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property-taxpaying voters of the district voting an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year, One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law."

Sec. 4. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 5. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as shall be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay the expenses of the publications and elections provided for in this Resolution.

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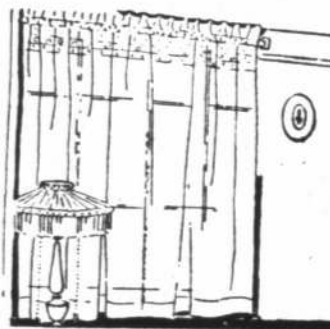
