GIRLS STATE

PROMOTES CITIZENSHIP

Bluebonnet Girls State is a non-partisan government workshop sponsored by the Texas American Legion Auxiliary. Girls just completing their Junior year in High School are eligible to attend and are sent by individual auxiliary units or other organizations. All fifty states and Panama now support a Girls State program.

The first session of Texas Bluebonnet Girls State was held at Baylor University in 1941. After 1942, Girls State was abandoned because of WW 2. The program was resumed in 1947 and has been located in the Texas School for the Blind, Texas School for the Deaf, Saint Edward's University, and it's present location at Texas Lutheran College in Seguin.

The purpose of the Girls State program is to instruct the youth of America in the rights, duties and privileges of American citizenship. By encouraging active individual

participation in the operation of a mythical 51st state, Girls State teaches a broader understanding of the responsibilities of citizenship in a democracy. The girls themselves participate in either the House or Senate, become members of a political party (which has no reference to existing parties) and make government work on the city, county, and state levels.

The girls chosen for the privilege of attending Girls State are expected to enter wholeheartedly into the program. But, after the session is over, the participants are charged to carry back to their homes and schools their increased knowledge of governmental activities and heightened ideals of American citizenship. For 25 years now, Bluebonnet Girls State has been enlightening young citizens to safeguard and preserve the liberty and freedom that is ours.

Across the Fence

Usually heavy moisture fell in the Wheeler County area this past fall and winter. Home gardeners are planting big gardens this year. Seems like folks are doing all they can to combat higher feed prices caused by flooding of soybean crops and shortages of some vegetable crops.

We appreciated the recognition by the trustees of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation in cooperation with the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program. They said "without the intense interest and education leadership shown by you and your associates in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, we could not have had a relatively screwworm free period dating from 1962 until the present". They went on to say that they are aware that weather conditions and other factors created problems last year, but that nevertheless, the screwworm program has saved livestock producers an estimated \$1 billion in damages since the program was started in 1962.

A lot of healthy looking catfish fingerlings arrived in Shamrock last week. A grower from Vernon had delivered a load of fingerlings to the Blakemore Brothers and home extras to pond owners in the area. I drove out to John Vermillion's pond with a few hundred fingerlings he had purchased. Can't disclose the location cause the fish are for his grandchildren when they come to visit.

Mobeetie had a big day last week. The program and tour in conjunction with the Texas Community Improvement Program Contest was outstanding. The community support was evident as many turned out for the tour. A lot of work had been done on the yards, fences and farms. All along the tour route you could see that the community had done a lot of cleaning up to show their best faces to the community judges. There were people there from Amarillo and Pampa to encourage the community in their efforts. This is perhaps the most historical town in the area and at the same time is making real progress in agricultural production. Carroll Langley and Jim Selby had done an outstanding job in gathering and presenting agricultural data about the community as well as oil and gas production. The new corals constructed by Orphus Tate, Jr., the very capable and competent vocational agricultural teacher, on the Ernest Gordon ranch are among the finest in the area.

The scout camp is a very fine asset to this community and represents close to a half of a million dollars in

equipment, etc. Jack & Bernice Hefley's home that we visited is truly a modern and beautiful place. Cliff Walser's starter and feed pens, nearby, are among the best in the area. Prime Feeder's new feedlot, is also considered a part of the community and is a modern and efficient asset to the community.

I thought one of the highlights of the reports was presented by Mrs. Horton when she reported "Why A Family Would Like to Live in Mobeetie". She pointed out that California was pretty crowded and had a lot of smog. Friendly people, good school and a proper environment to raise children were factors in convincing her that Mobeetie was a good place to live.

What Mobeetie will be doing to make improvements in the future was covered very effectively by Melvin May.

District 1 4-H Contests will be held this Saturday, May 5 at West Texas State University at Canyon. 4-H clubs from Briscoe, Shamrock and Wheeler will be represented as Wheeler County's representatives. For the first time in several years we will be without a senior Share-the-Fun Act. Our senior Share-the-Fun act won third place in state last year at A & M.

Across the Fence

By Max Hatter, CEA

Cowmen are tempted to
add to their stock. Plenty
of grass, favorable prices
and growing beef demand
are factors.

More cautious observers
here get to remembering the
drouth of 70-71. Some more
conservative folk are indeed
increasing production by
purchasing or keeping heifers.

Light heifer prices are
as much as 20c per pound
below steer prices due to the
demand for steers for the
feedlot and fixed feeding
programs. Heifers could be
grown through the spring
and summer for sale as heavy
feeders or fattened for the
slaughter calf market. Another

alternative is to keep them
as breeding herd replace-
ments.

The next few weeks will
be a fine time to seed love-
grass. Looks like folks in
Mississippi and Florida are
real interested in seeding
lovegrass. We've sent
several people information
over that way this spring.

We got a question on what
pre-emergence chemical
could be put out to control
thistles before seeding love-
grass. It didn't take us long
to answer. There isn't one.

The proper procedure is to
prepare a good seedbed,
plant the lovegrass and
spray the field with the

amino form of 2, 4-D when the
grass is a few inches high
and tough enough to take the
chemical.

If you live in a cotton
growing community, be sure
that you spray on a still day
and tell your next door
neighbor you're fertilizing
your grass. If you don't,
you could be a party in a
lawsuit. However, thistles
won't hurt the grass if you
have enough moisture. In
fact, the other weeds will be
no problem the next year.

We now have 22 head of
400 pound heifer calves on
100 acres of Elbon rye over-
seeded on weeping love-
grass sod with a grassland
drill. The demonstration
plot is 1 mile south of
Wheeler. The primary grass
at present is rye since the
lovegrass is late putting out.

When it puts out, we should
have quite a grasing study.
Look this over and see if
you think it's going to be
practical.

Home gardening is becom-
ing big business in the

Vegetables and fruit from
the home garden taste better
and are more nourishing be-
cause they may be harvested
at the peak of maturity.

Gardening has also in-
creased among today's young
married couples who seem to
be more active as garden-
ers than previous generations.
They are planting larger
gardens to help stretch
tight budgets. And garden-
ing is a hobby they can en-
joy together at a lower cost
than many other recreational
activities. It also elimi-

ates the need for a baby
sitter.

Flower growing is still
an important part of home
gardening. Roses are the
most popular flower with
zinnias second. Garden
clubs are flourishing and
promoting interest in garden-
ing.

Aside from growing vege-
tables, fruit and flowers,
home gardening involves direct
and important improve-
ments in the beauty, use-
fulness and value of residen-
tial property. It makes liv-
ing more enjoyable and pro-
vides a place where friends
may be entertained with pride.
Some real estate dealers es-
timate that landscaping and
gardens may add as much as
20% to the value of a home.

Home gardening also
tributes to the econo-
mical success of the busi-
ness community due to the
fertilizer, plants, tools
equipment that is to be
purchased.

It has been estimated
the average homeowner
spends a minimum of
\$50 per year on garden-
ing that vegetables grow
of at least \$100 each.
Thus home gardeners
100% return on their in-
vestment in food alone.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

A LETTER FROM ERN

It was May 1919 that I was in the U.S. Army in Southern France in the Remount Service, a cavalry branch tending to horses and mules. After the war was over we had the animals by the thousands over there on our hands. The French were very much cowards of our U.S. horses and mules as some of the meanest were sometimes to be found.

On one occasion, we, about 20 men each with 4 head were about 40 miles from the Remount Depot to sell them at auction a few days after we got there by a French Auctioneer.

No bugle calls for a short week. On one occasion 4 of us fellows went to a river a short distance from where we were to pass time. I said, "Let's go swimming, the others all agreed. I said I will watch our clothes, someone might rob us of our money— all 3 others agreed to be watchman. I started to undress as did the others, I was first in the water, soon deep enough to swim with the other two behind me. I said let's swim the river— they said alright. When I was across I saw the others had gone back. I said to myself— I will walk up along the bank up stream and swim back to where the others are. I was stark naked and bless your life there was a residence within a stones throw. I said looks vacant and kept on walking upstream. Saw a fellow in a row boat, I said to myself— "motion to him and ask him to take me upstream as the water was swift enough to drive a fellow further than he had expected. I said to myself— doubt if I can make him understand— as soon as I started talking English I found he was English too, so he gave me a boat ride as far upstream as I wanted to go. I thanked him and I never saw that fellow or that river again.

I had a lot of fun in the Army, lot of hell too. I tell you what hurts is to see the horses and mules and men come back from the front nearer dead than alive— some so near dead tired that

What Is A Jehovah's Witness?

Now the cult— "Jehovah's Witness"— has had a variety of names. Back in 1874 at its inception, it was called Millennial Dawn. When it was exposed under this title, the self-styled "Pastor" Charles Taze Russell changed the name to Watchtower and Tract Society. Later it was known as the Brooklyn Tabernacle. And shortly before the founder died aboard a Santa Fe train, the cult became known as The International Bible Students Association.

Charles Taze Russell is one of the tragedies of the Christian church. We are told that his parents were God-fearing Congregationalists. He spent his boyhood in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where, during his youth, he was haunted by a great fear of Hell.

Eventually he succumbed to the teachings of an infidel who was an apostate from Christianity. This man convinced him there was no place of eternal punishment. Soon Russell was found spending his time and talents trying to convince all who would listen to him that there was no Hell. It is not surprising to learn that he was one of the most brazen men imaginable. He has been called "The Great Paraphraser," so promiscuously did he alter the meaning of Scripture to suit his purposes.

To say that he employed exaggeration and subterfuge to further his ends is an understatement indeed. Once he promoted the sale of what he called "Miracle Wheat" at the exorbitant price of sixty dollars a bushel. It was supposed to grow five times as much as the average wheat and could be purchased only by the "faithful".

When his wife sued him for divorce, he admitted his improper relationship in court and later transferred his property to corporations and societies of which he himself had control in order to

avoid paying alimony. However, despite his unorthodox practices and tarnished reputation, at the convention of the Jehovah's Witnesses held in Yankee Stadium several years ago, this statement appeared in the New York press:

When the history of the church is fully written, it will be found that the place next to Saint Paul in the Gallery of Fame as expounder of the Gospel of the Great Master will be occupied by Charles Taze Russell.

Now, when Russell died in the fall of 1916, his funeral oration was delivered by ex-Judge Joseph Franklin Rutherford, who was destined to take up the reins of leadership. This is what he said of the beloved "Pastor" who had taught the erroneous theory of "soul sleep," i.e., the dead sleep until the resurrection:

Our dear brother sleeps not in death, but is instantly changed from the human to the divine nature, is now forever with the Lord.

Now this man Rutherford was both militant and mysterious, and was disliked by a number of his members. However, he was able to keep things going, even through the year 1925 when Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob were to have returned to set up their Kingdom, as Judge Rutherford himself had foretold.

By 1931 the new leader had stopped the sale of Russell's books and had caused all mention of the founder to cease. He changed the name of the organization to "Jehovah's Witnesses," and convinced his followers that everyone of them was one of the final messengers to the nations.

Now, let us turn the searchlight of God's Word on some of the teachings of this cult. First of all, what do Jehovah's Witnesses say about— THE HOLY TRINITY?

Notice! "This view the doctrine of the Trinity of the Godhead suited well the Dark Ages, which it helped to produce." This is taken from the fifth of Russell's six volume work, Studies in the Scriptures, page 166, which constitutes the basis for the dogma of this cult.

In the same volume, and on the same page, we also find the two following quotations: "This...theory is as unscriptural as it is unreasonable...if it were not for the fact that this trinitarian nonsense was drilled into us from earliest infancy and the fact that it is so soberly taught in theological seminaries by gray-haired professors...nobody would give it a moment's serious consideration."

But what does the Bible say about the Trinity? In Genesis 1:26 we read: "And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness."

Notice "us" and "our" Here Jehovah, in speaking of creation, applies plural

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, THAT IRVING P. KRICK, INCORPORATED, OF TEXAS, of Suite 216, 611 S. Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, California, 92262, who holds License No. 724 of the State of Texas, is now applying for a permit to engage in operations and to locate ground-based generators for operational purposes in certain counties of the State of Texas and for the purpose of augmenting precipitation within said area of Oklahoma. These operations shall be by means of ground generators as follows:

1. Area in which equipment will be operated is the following: Counties in Texas consisting of: Dallam, Lipscomb, Hansford, Roberts, Hamphill, Oshkosh, Moore, Sherman and Wheeler.
2. The target area will be the farm and ranch lands within counties in the State of Oklahoma consisting of: Texas, Beaver, Harper, Woodward, Ellis, Custer, Washita, and Kiowa.
3. The areas adjacent to target areas which may be subject to the effects of the operation are within the State of Oklahoma and in general within 15 to 20 miles of the target area. The maximum intentional effect is in the target, but some downwind effect may occur in Oklahoma mostly to the immediate northeast of the target. There would be no significant effect in Texas from the operation of any of these proposed generators. It is important to note that this notice is simply to apply for permission to install generators in Texas, not to increase rainfall in Texas, and for the sole purpose of increasing rainfall in the target area located in the State of Oklahoma.
4. The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are silver iodide electric arc (Model 1700) ground-based generators that have an output of an optimum amount of 0.5 grams per hour per generator.
5. Person who will be in charge of operations is Mr. Newton C. Stone.
6. The operations will be performed in the State of Oklahoma for the following clients: Henry C. Hitch Ranch, Inc., Beaver County Weather, Inc., Harper County Weather, Inc., Woodward County Cloudseeding Assn., Ellis County Weather, Inc., Custer County Weather Assn., Washita County Weather Modification Assn., and Kiowa County Weather Modification Assn.

The operation will extend during the period beginning around 6 June 1973 and continue through 5 June 1974.
