Bomb threat at local hospital

The 2 a.m. male caller to the Root Memorial Hospital early Sunday morning wasn't worried about Medicare; he told the nurses that a bomb was planted in the hospital.

Next he called the Sheriff's Office and told them that a bomb

had been placed in the hospital. He again called the hospital and told them that a bomb was hidden in the hospital and said, "You've got thirty minutes before the big bang!"

Almost immediately, Administrator Ray Dillard and Assis-

tant Administrator Ray Mason were arriving at the scene, along with police and Sheriff's department officers.

"In the time we had," Dillard said, "there was no possibility of evacuating sick people."

Dillard said the fire depart-

ment was placed on standby at the police station and an intensive search was made in the hospital. Fire doors were closed and nurses placed in each wing of the hospital.

Nothing was found. Hospital personnel have been alerted to watch for anything unusual but Dillard credits the call with being a harassment call.

Commissioners set budget hearing for August 13

Mitchell County Commissioners have hammered together the tentative 1985 county budget and

await the regular meeting on August 13th, hold a public hearing and finalize the budget.

The budget will be up from last year by 7.9 percent or in dollars—\$168,587.00.

The proposed budget includes a five percent salary raise; \$10,000 more for court appointed attorneys; \$7,000 for the appraisal district, and about \$7,000 more for the road fund because of the increased cost of equipment.

Other extras include a computer terminal for the office of Tax Assessor and Collector, and a possible computer for the District Attorney's office.

"There will be some cutback in personnel to stay within the

The Colorado City Council had a busy four hour called meeting Tuesday night, first picking up forty bags of trash at the north end of Chestnut Street, listening to Walter Staats in a discussion of problems at the Country Club and possible sale thereof, discussion and criticism of the police reserve system, a ques-

tion, "What do we do with stray dogs?", and a zone change.

Walter Staats, president of the Colorado Country Club, built sometime back in the '20s, told the council that the Club was putting out feelers for possible sale, and that this was a feeler. Would the City like to operate a golf course? Golfers on the See CLUB, Page 2

Gramm campaign makes stop in C-City

Rep. Phil Gramm of College Station came to Colorado City Sunday asking local voters to help him in getting a new job, that of Senator from Texas. Gramm appeared at the Lone Wolf Electric Building before about 50 people. Following his talk, he left for Snyder.

Gramm, who went to Congress as a Democratic representative, said that he was unhappy there as Northern congressmen and the Democratic leadership attempted to force him to vote with them and against his Texas District.

He resigned from Congress and came back to Texas and ran as a Republican. He said that Tip O'Neill and the Democratic leadership came to Texas and tried to beat him in that race. "And we kicked their fanny all the way back to Washington."

This comment drew applause from the crowd, which did, in fact, applaud several of his remarks.

His comment that he "didn't think a man ought to have to join a union to get a job," drew a chorus of "Amen's" like the sounds from the front row seats of a brush arbor revival.

Gramm said that the only

difference between himself and his opponent, Lloyd Doggett, was one of philosophy. "We don't think alike about anything."

He said that able bodied welfare recipients should be given work that he believed in a strong defense and that he has no sympathy for gays.

The difference is clear cut, he said and Texans shouldn't have any difficulty in making a decision at the voting booth. The choice is, he said, between conservative and liberal philosophies.

Cotton referendum voting set Sept. 7

On September 7th, a cotton referendum will be held for the cotton growers of Mitchell County, with reference to a maximum of a dollar checkoff on each bale grown, to fund an insect pest survey made each year all over the county.

The voting will be at the Mitchell County Courthouse and voters will need to show or know their 1983 base acreage and PIK acreage in order to vote.

The survey has been made since 1974, with about 20 cotton

'School work' continues with work on schools

The school halls around Colorado City have not been silent this summer but it wasn't the footsteps of children that echoed but the sounds of hammers, saws and machinery.

Some extensive remodeling and repair work has been done on three of the four schools and the administration building and work is nearing completion as school is set to open August 20.

Hutchinson has received the most attention with the entire south wing needing new tiles in the halls. Four classrooms were carpeted by Teal Carpets, Snyder, who also replaced carpeting in the Commons area at Colorado High School.

Tiles were also replaced in the dining room at Hutchinson by Johnson Construction, who built the dining area last year.

Outside work at Hutchinson is currently going on as Felix Franco Construction in Colorado City is building a retaining wall.

A special thanks should go to the Soil Conservation Service who shot all the grade for the retaining wall. Paul Hunter had the county maintainers level it all up.

Fencing will be put up by Lewis Construction, also a local concern.

Mitchell County Utility is currently laying a new sewer line to the Colorado Middle School gym to alleviate a recurrent stoppage problem in the dressing room and shower rooms.

Armstrong Heating and Cool-

ing Lubbock has already put an air conditioning system in the kitchen at CMS.

Lockers were also replaced on the third floor.

The Administration building is getting a facelift with a new coat of paint. The CISD contracted

with Jimmy Harrison of Big Spring for the work.

Sammy Parham replaced flooring in three offices and a hall which had been damaged last winter from pipes bursting during the freeze around Christmas.

Tony Espinoza has spent the summer repainting the inside walls of all the school buildings.

Still to be done is the construction of the press box at Wolf Field. Specifics were determined Wednesday and bids will be taken through August 9.

council thought it was an attractive possibility.
Staats stressed that the Country Club was not officially for sale but that the stockholders would meet August 14th to make a decision as to what course to take.
Staats said that there simply was not enough traffic through the club to make ends meet. He

said that club income last year was \$73,000 and outgo was \$80,000.
Councilman Ray Mason suggested that some form of lease agreement might be made for the golf course that would make it a municipal course, open to everyone, leaving the Country Club building in the hands of the present stockholders as well as the ownership of the land.
Mayor Elmer Martin appointed a committee of Jesse Munoz, Dee Hearn, and Robert Hoback to work with City Manager Brenda Tarter and City Attorney Pete McKinney to investigate the possibilities involved.
The stray dog question came

as Brenda Tarter asked the council for guidance as to whether to continue to kill obviously stray dogs or whether to keep them in the pound for three days, and pay the resulting expenses.
Ms. Tarter got no firm answer, but the consensus of opinion was to "play it by ear" and continue to "do it like we're doing now." Robert Hoback and Dee Hearn dissented, feeling that the dogs should be kept three days before being killed.

The question regarding reserve officers was raised by councilman Jesse Munoz.
There are six permanent reservists, according to Police Chief Ken Farrow, and two "reserve reservists."

Munoz said that he had complaints from citizens regarding reservists who ride by themselves, and felt they were overpaid, (\$6.00 an hour) and he said that the ordinance setting up the reserve program specified that reservists should live in the city. At least one, he said, does not.
Mayor Elmer Martin appointed a committee to study the present ordinance and to make changes in it.

The committee was Jesse Munoz, Robert Hoback and Dee Hearn, who in consultation with Ms. Tarter, Chief Farrow, and McKinney would propose changes in the ordinance.
A zone change was made at the corner of 18th and Hemphill, allowing Belinda Rivera to place a mobile home at that address.
The council voted to accept the bid of Motorola of Midland to replace the communications unit in the police department with a new one for \$5,430.
By the way, if the north end of Chestnut looks cleaner, it should. The council came to work thirty minutes early and picked up 40 bags of trash from the block beginning at 22nd Street and ending at the IS 20 access road.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Sir:
I would like to come to the defense of Ray Dillard, the Hospital Administrator that some people are trying to make a scapegoat of. If the man getting the petition signed to get rid of him knew what he was doing, it would be in support of Mr. Dillard and asking the doctor or doctors responsible for this mess to leave town or get on the ball. I realize though, that in a lot of communities this is "holy ground." Don't touch our doctors!

The community has either elected or appointed a board of directors to be responsible for the operation of the hospital. They need to bite the bullet and suspend some medical staff privileges. Don't fire the administrator just because of a petition.
I have had over 30 years of experience in hospital administration and I know the problems an administrator faces in trying to get doctors to complete their charts on time. It is heck if you do and heck if you don't. It is the responsibility of the Medical Staff and the Hospital Board to set rules and regulations regarding this and it is their responsibility to suspend staff privileges when necessary. I also know how hard it is to please everyone in the community. It just cannot be done.
It may be true that the hospital had other deficiencies, but show me a hospital that does not have. It is next to impossible to pass a Medicare inspection without any.

It seems to me that Medicare is out to close as many small hospitals as they can and you will be seeing more and more of this. The whole community should be pulling together instead of pointing fingers. Remember when you point your finger at someone, you have four pointing right back at you.
I hope the Hospital Board will use their good judgment and pay no attention to that petition and stand by their administrator.

office. Deadline for applicants is Tuesday, August 7th.

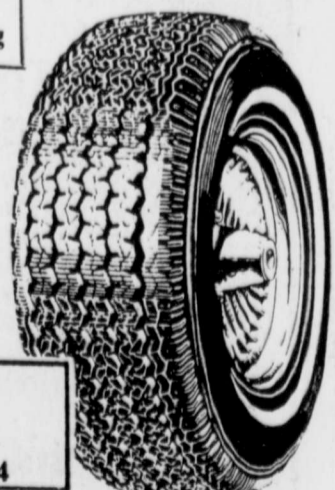
Each application must be accompanied by ten signatures of producers or landowners.

tax structure," says County Judge Bill Carter.

Carter says the rate if approved, would go to .2987 per hundred dollars of valuation, an increase of .0487 cents. If you have \$10,000 in valuations, this will cost you \$4.87 more than last year.

"Also," said Carter, "There is a good possibility that the Commissioner's Court may decide to place a \$5 charge on all license plates issued in the County."

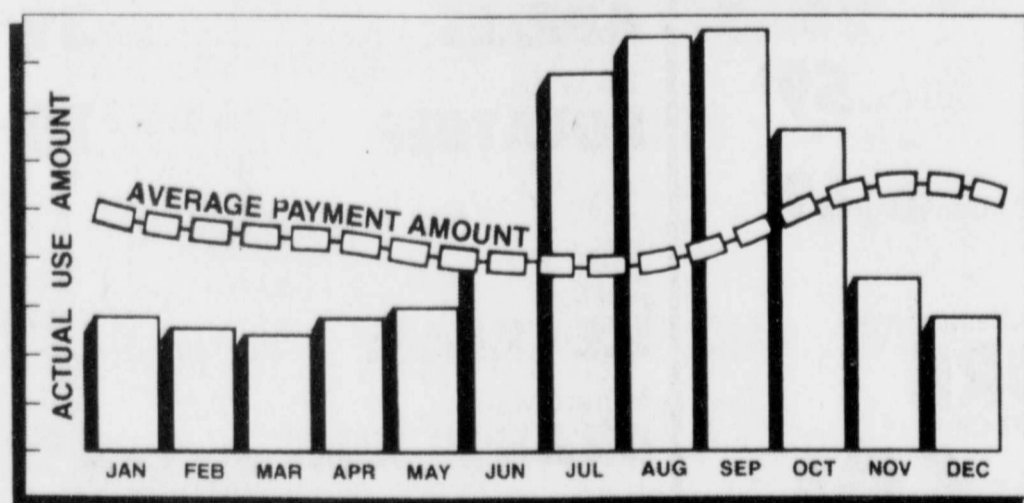

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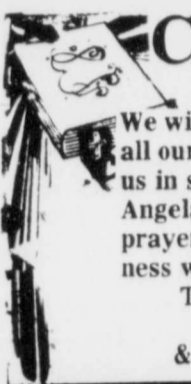

Disabled veteran should be influence to everyone

Gene Murphy didn't have to go on that patrol into the jungles of Vietnam just 30 days before he was scheduled to return to the United States. But the 20-year-old sergeant wanted to be with the men of the squad he led.

"Six of us were hit by small arms fire," recalled the Sioux Falls, S.D., man 15 years after that harrowing day.

"After being hit, I felt a burning and stinging feeling. I thought I'd bought the farm," he remarked, meaning that he believed he would die.

"I couldn't feel my legs when I fell, so I moved to see if my legs were still there. When I moved, they opened fire again, and I was hit in the ankle. So I quit moving."

That was the beginning of a day and a night of anguish and pain as Murphy waited for military choppers to get close enough to lift him out of the dense Vietnamese jungle. For 14 hours he waited.

Months of hospitalization could not cure the paralysis of Murphy's legs, but that didn't dim the will to live that sparked Murphy's soul as he lay wounded in the thick heat of Vietnam. And that determination has since carried him to a prominent position of leadership among South Dakota's handicapped citizens.

Murphy's accomplishments were recently recognized by the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), which chose him as 1984's National Disabled Veteran of the Year. The stocky Vietnam vet will receive the award at the opening of the DAV's national convention in Washington, D.C., Aug. 26.

When he first returned from Vietnam, Murphy was angry, demanding that doctors and clergymen stay away, but that mind-set didn't last long. "I guess I've had a positive attitude all my life," he remarked. "Looking around and seeing others worse off than I has made me feel very lucky to be alive."

Even so, he was apprehensive about returning to his hometown, White, S.D., in a wheelchair. But before long, he was out hunting from a standing vehicle with his brothers and cruising around with his buddies. And he decided to enroll at Dakota State College in Madison, S.D., where he majored in business administration.

There he met a nursing student named Eldine, whom he married in 1972. Today, they enjoy swimming and playing computer games with their perky, 7-year-old daughter, Erin.

After his marriage, Murphy continued his studies at Augustana College in Sioux Falls and became active in the DAV. He's held just about every elected position in Sioux Falls DAV Chapter 1 and the DAV Department of South Dakota, currently serving as commander of the state DAV organization.

That rise to prominence brought new responsibilities as he was appointed to various boards and committees charged with improving conditions faced by disabled South Dakotans. He also lobbied before the South Dakota legislature, advocating the needs of disabled vets, veterans generally, and handicapped people.

But most meaningful, personally, to Murphy is the one-on-one counseling he's often called upon to do with others who've recently undergone spinal cord injury.

"Some of them want to give up entirely," he noted with concern. "They don't even want to live anymore. I try to encourage them, tell them of their potential, their abilities. There are

still so many things they can do."

Paralysis didn't dim Murphy's enthusiasm for sports, and he's taken on a leading role with the Sioux Wheelers, a group of disabled vets and other handicapped people who've achieved an enviable record in such athletic fields as basketball, softball, trap shooting, and track and field.

Describing why he and two others organized the Sioux Wheelers, Murphy said, "We liked the exercise and the fun of competing, and we wanted to show other handicapped individuals that you don't have to crawl into a corner or sit in a back room at home just because of some physical impairment."

Murphy is one of the team's top competitors, and his home and office sport shelves of trophies, including gold and bronze medals won at the National Wheelchair Veterans Games in Long Beach, Calif., last year.

After a careful review of the facts, the Health Care Financing Administration has determined that Root Memorial Hospital no longer meets the requirements for participation as a provider of services in the Health Insurance for the Aged and Disabled Program (Medicare) established under title XVIII of the Social Security Act.

To continue to participate in the Medicare program, a hospital must meet all of the statutory provisions of section 1861(c) of the Social Security Act and be in compliance with the Conditions of Participation issued as Regulations by the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services.

The unmet Conditions of Participation are:
Condition VII (405.1026) Medical Record Department
Condition VIII (405.1027) Pharmacy or Drug Room

Federal regulations require that providers meet the applicable Conditions of Participation. On February 6, 1984, we notified you that failure to correct the deficiencies found on the April 12, 1983, and November 4, 1983, Medicare surveys could result in termination of your hospital's Medicare agreement. On February 13, 1984, you advised us in writing of progress made toward correction of the deficiencies. On April 27, 1984, the Texas State Department of Health conducted a full resurvey. While the State found that a number of deficiencies had been corrected, its report indicated that your hospital still did not meet the Conditions relating to medical records and pharmacy services.

In addition, there were numerous other significant deficiencies with respect to compliance with the Medicare Conditions on Medical Staff, Nursing Department, Dietary Department, Radiology Department, Complementary Departments, and Laboratories. A detailed, 13 page listing of those deficiencies was furnished to you by the State survey agency.

The combination of multiple deficiencies in your hospital's operation constitutes a hazard to patient health and safety and warrants termination of the Medicare participation agreement. Considering the history of the hospital's deficiencies over the last two years, it does not appear likely that substantial and consistent compliance can be expected in the foreseeable future.

The date on which the Medicare agreement terminates is August 1, 1984. No payment for patients admitted on or after that date will be made by the Medicare program. For patients admitted prior to August 1, 1984, payment may continue to be made for up to 30 days of covered inpatient hospital services furnished on or after August 1, 1984. A list showing the names and health insurance claim numbers of the Medicare patients remaining in your hospital on August 1, 1984, should be immediately forwarded to the Health Care Financing Administration, 1200 Main Tower Building, Dallas, Texas 75202.

We will arrange to publish notice of this termination in the Colorado City RECORD at least 15 days before August 1, 1984.

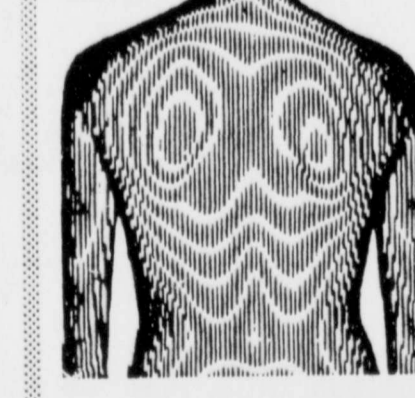
Because the requirements for participation in the Medicaid program are substantially the same as those for Medicare, we are notifying the appropriate Federal and State officials who administer title XIX of the termination of your provider agreement under title XVIII.

If you believe this decision is not in accordance with the law and regulations, you may request a hearing before an Administrative Law Judge of the Social Security Administration, in accordance with 42 CFR 489.53(c). A written request for a hearing must be filed no later than 60 days after receipt of this letter. Such a request should be mailed to the Health Care Financing Administration, 1200 Main Tower Building, Room 2335, Dallas, Texas 75202.

Any request for a hearing should state why you consider the decision to be incorrect and should be accompanied by any evidence and arguments you may wish to bring to the attention of the Department of Health and Human Services. Evidence and arguments may be presented at the hearing, where you may be represented by counsel.
