District Judge McGuire Dies of Heart Attack Saturday, March 27th

Judge Gordon B. McGuire, 59, District Judge of the 106th Judicial District, passed away at his home on Saturday evening, from a cardiac ailment. Judge McGuire had been ill since Thursday, and was alone at the time of his death. Mrs. McGuire found the body at 6:30 o'clock. For more than a year the judge had suffered heart attacks, and had collapsed two or three times recently.

Recognized as one of the pioneer jurists of West Texas, Judge McGuire enjoyed a unique reputation. He was the only judge to have presided, except through exchange of benches, over the 106th Judicial District.

He was appointed to that position by former Governor Miriam Ferguson when the 72nd judicial district was broken up so that four counties remained with the 72nd and six with the newly formed 106th. Judge McGuire was then district attorney of the 72nd district.

The judge gained much attention from his prosecution in the sectionally famous Mill Goods and Tom Ross cases and was sitting in the old Gaines Hotel at Seminole the night the two cattle inspectors, Robinson and Allison, fell before a fusillade of shots that raked the lobby of the hotel.

Judge McGuire attended law school at Southwestern University at Georgetown, where he was associated with numerous students that later were to become readily recognized by the reading public, among these are Senator Tom Connally, Associate Justice John H. Sharp of the Texas Supreme Court, former Senator Earle B. Mayfield, and Atticus Webb. He practiced law in Dallas, Haskell, and in Dawson county, and from 1919 until his appointment to the judgeship was associated with J. E. Garland, local attorney. Before beginning practice he was a member of the state comptrollers office at Austin.

He had been a member of the Methodist church for 40 years, and also belonged to the Masonic and Odd Fellows Lodges.

Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the First Methodist church, with the Rev. M. M. Beavers pastor, and Rev. David Murray, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, officiating. Burial was made in the Lamesa cemetery.

Survivors are his wife, one son, Gordon B. McGuire Jr., one daughter, Mrs. I. W. Freedy, both of Lamesa, and one brother, Jack McGuire of Texarkana, Arkansas.

Soil Program To Be Held Friday Night

A meeting will be held on Friday night, April 8, at 8 o'clock in the District court room, at which time talks will be given, and both moving pictures and slides shown by representatives of the Soil Conservation Service of Region Six.

The principal speaker will be B. W. McGinnis, Associate Regional Conservator, first assistant to H. H. Fennell, Regional Conservator and chief of this region.

Mr. Fred C. Newport, Chief Agronomist of the Region, and O. T. Williams, manager of the Hereford project, and the camps at Littlefield and Lamesa will also be present and discuss in the program. A round table discussion will be held later, and all questions will be answered.

School Trustee Elections Saturday

The annual elections for school trustee positions in Dawson county districts will be held Saturday, April 3rd according to the general State law governing such elections. The places for most of these elections will be at the district schools.

The election of county trustees is also held at this time for two places on the county board, and one in each district for the county school board member at large.

The trustee election in Lamesa Independent School District will be held at the school district's tax and record office in the E. C. Nix building. The names of the members of the Board of Trustees whose terms expire after three year terms of office are the only names printed on the ballot since no other petitions or personal applications were filed for the ballot. The gentlemen whose names appear are: W. D. Arnett, J. R. Flaniken, and Fred Sanders.

Louis B. Reed Named District Judge

Louis B. Reed, county attorney of Dawson county, has been appointed by Governor James V. Allred as successor to the late Judge Gordon B. McGuire of the 106th District Court.

Mr. Reed received notice of his appointment late Monday afternoon. It is believed that the Senate would take action on the appointment soon.

Mr. Reed has been a resident of Lamesa, since February 1931. He was associated with J. E. Garland in a law firm here before becoming county attorney three years ago. He was born and reared in Red River county, being county attorney there for two years. He also taught in the public schools there. He obtained his law degree from Texas University Law school.

He is a Lieutenant Colonel in the Officers Reserve Corps, having been overseas with the American army in the World War.

Mr. Stone had resided in Dawson county for many years, making his home in the Hancock community.

Funeral services were held at the Lamesa cemetery on Wednesday morning, March 31, at 10 o'clock with Rev. Foster, pastor of the Church of Christ officiating.

Survivors are his mother, Mrs. Junnie Stone, Lamesa, one brother, Jack Stone of Lockney, and two sisters, Mrs. W. P. Blessington, Topeka, Kansas, and Mrs. Carl Long, Alameda, California.

Car Owners Urged to Return Survey Cards

In order for Dawson County to participate actively in the Federal-Farm-to-Market-Road, it will be necessary for every person who registers his car to fill out the information card, which he receives at the Tax Collectors office, and mail it in to the department. The amount of roads the county receives will depend on the number of cards filled out and mailed.

The Farm-to-market roads are included in the Federal Government's road building program, and the need for these roads in a county will be determined by the number of cars sent in. This is an appeal to everyone who has registered his car and has not filled out and mailed a card to go to the Tax Collector's Office and secure another card and mail it in as soon as possible. Just a few days ago only 81 cards had been sent in from Dawson county. We all want our county to be included in the road program, and for that reason, we should see that a card is mailed in for every car registered. Please attend to this now.

NEW LONDON SCHOOL MEMORIAL SET FOR APRIL 7

Livestock Show Winners Announced

The 4-H Livestock and Poultry Show which was held last Friday and Saturday had a large number of 4-H exhibits in addition to the dairy cow exhibits. Exhibits included eighteen beef calves, five dairy heifers, twenty swine exhibits and twenty poultry exhibits. The show was judged by N. C. Fine, Instructor in Animal Husbandry, Texas Technological College, Lubbock, and George M. Tate, senior student, Animal husbandry major at Tech.

Several of the winning beef calves were sold at auction on the courthouse square Friday afternoon. The Grand Champion calf, fed by Ted Turner, Welch, and bred by Holton & Jones, Lamesa was bought by the Green Hut Calf at 20.00 per pound. The champion calf weighed 800 pounds and was from the group of senior calves. The first prize winner in the junior calf group was fed by Van Greene of Lamesa. This calf was given to Greene by John Henry Dean as a reward for purchasing a prize winning calf from him last year. Davis Food Store bought this calf at 17c pound. Billie Braswell sold his third prize senior calf to Hatch Grocery & Market at 13.00 cents per pound. Barrett Grocery paid 12.34 cents per pound for the senior calf fed by Don Anderson of Lamesa and bred by Weaver ranch. Harold Grissom sold his senior calf to Wilkes Grocery at 12c per pound.

The second prize calf from the senior group was not sold and will be fed by the owners H. T. and L. A. Duff Jr. for fall show. The calf now weighs 775 pounds, and was bred by Holton & Jones.

John Price Dies Here Saturday Morning

John Price, aged 95 years, passed away at his home here on Saturday morning, March 27, following several days illness.

Mr. Price, father of Dr. Noble H. Price, was a retired Texas and Pacific locomotive engineer, having worked for that railroad 45 years and 3 months, being their oldest employee when he was pensioned in 1925.

Mr. Price was born in Shropshire, England on October 13, 1842, coming to Boston in 1888 working for the Boston and Pittsburg Railroad a short time. He later went to British Columbia where he worked two years for the Canadian Pacific. Before coming to America Mr. Price had worked on the King's Royal Railroad in Australia.

In 1888 he returned to England for a visit, and on the boat met the lady he later married. The next year 1890, he returned to the United States going to Louisiana where he worked for the Texas Pacific. This same year he moved to Big Spring where he was the first engineer to run a locomotive between Big Spring and El Paso.

In 1890 he was married in Big Spring to Mrs. Price at the old Birdwell Hotel. Mrs. Price being from Cologne, Germany. They continued to make their home in Big Spring. Mrs. Price died several years ago.

Mr. Price has been a member of the Masonic Lodge for 35 years. He moved to Lamesa in 1933 to make his home with his son, and had since that time lived at the Tom Burnside home.

Funeral services were held in Big Spring at the Episcopal church at 3 o'clock on Sunday. Burial was made in the Big Spring cemetery with the Masons in charge.

Three sons survive, John Evan Price, Midland, Roy V. Price, Dallas, and Noble H. Price, Lamesa.

Sign-up Dates for 1937 Farm Program To Be Announced

Announcement of the sign-up dates in this county of 1937 Work Sheets in connection with the farm program will be made soon. The sign-up for 1937 has been delayed due to the concentration of the county agents office upon getting the Application for Grant forms signed for the 1936 program. The 1936 program was the first farm program which has required the use of the applications. The applications became necessary when the Bankhead Act was abandoned and the change was made to the voluntary program. They are in the form of a voucher requiring as careful execution as a check and must be signed by every party interested in the check, the supervisor who measured the land, a county committee member and finally after all the others have signed must be certified by the county agent. They are made in triplicate and must be checked against several other forms as any error will cause suspension of payment. The division of payments among interested parties is made in the form of division of acreage and amounts of money do not appear any where on the voucher. Calculation of acreage divisions is made in the local office. The state office is now between sixty and seventy thousand applications behind in auditing applications for payment. Applications are being forwarded to the state office from the local office as fast as they can be completed.

"When nature takes 500 years to make an inch of topsoil, it's a shame folks don't realize how fast good land goes when erosion starts."

Approximately 500 million acres of farm land in the United States are already so badly eroded as to be essentially unfit for cultivated crops; another 50 million acres are in a condition almost as bad.

There are now in cultivation some 100 million acres seriously impaired by erosion and misuse, and another 100 million acres on which erosion and poor management have begun to take toll.

Part of this condition has been due to the plowing up of grasslands which should have been left in sod. Most has been due to the farmers' inability, in the face of distressingly low prices for their products, to take proper care of their land.

A recent report from the National Natural Resources Committee to the President pointed out that in another century this great American granary may have become inadequate to support our population if erosion is permitted to continue at the present rate.

More than a score of years ago the Texas Extension Service began its campaign to save soil and conserve moisture by terracing. More than 12 million acres have been terraced and contoured in Texas since that time, and in 1936 under the stimulus of the Agricultural Conservation Program, more than two million acres were terraced or contoured under the supervision and leadership of county agricultural agents in this State.

CAR OWNERS HELPING IN HIGHWAY SURVEY

'Car owners who pay their 1937 license fees late in March should take part in the highway planning work now being conducted by filling in and mailing the postage free, self-addressed post cards handed to them at the Tax Collector's office,' according to G. G. Edwards, State Manager of the Highway Planning Survey. 'Motorists should guard against any tendency to neglect this valuable work during the rush and confusion of late registration since the success of this effort to give car owners a direct chance to help plan their own highways depends on their cooperation during the days when the greatest number of cars are registered. Finally, this survey work is of major importance to most counties because the facts compiled by the several branches of the Highway Planning Survey will be used not only in forming the policies which govern the construction and maintenance of highways but also will be used in allocating future Federal and State Funds that will soon be spent in improving secondary roads in many Texas counties,' concluded Mr. Edwards.

The Texas Highway Department and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads are jointly sponsoring this work to obtain reliable information from each county. Dawson county stands to gain materially by furnishing information to reliably portray local needs. According to a recent report only 81 of the car and truck owners in this county have returned to the Highway Department the post cards handed them at the time of registration in the office of Mr. R. W. Herndon, Tax Collector. Time yet remains for the county to make a good record of returns for itself, and its citizens should cooperate in the Highway Planning work.

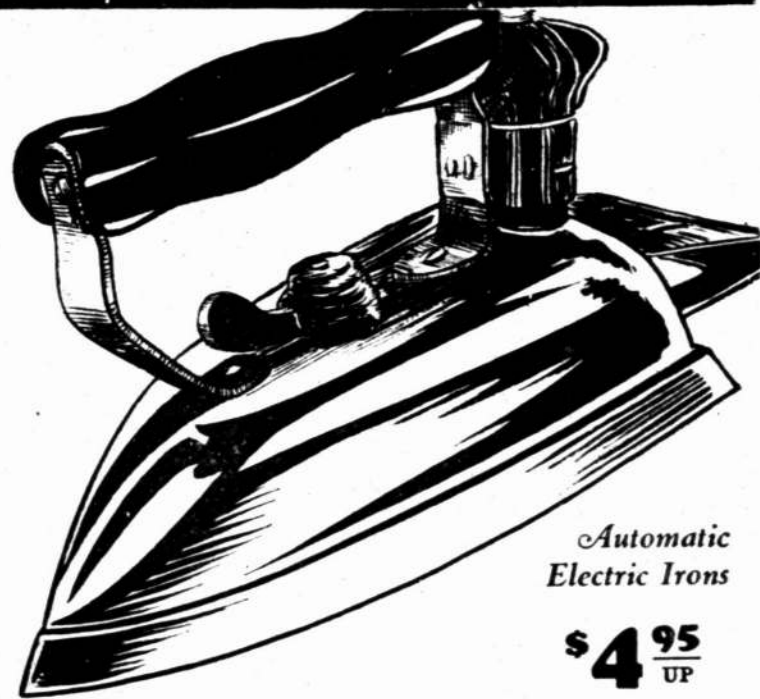

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Explains Federal Housing Act

R. E. Sikes, representative of the Federal Housing Administration out of the Fort Worth office, had a conference March 26 with representatives of the banks, building and loan association, and lumber men, explaining the insured mortgage system of the National Housing Act. Mr. Sikes said there had been some confusion and misunderstanding as to the expiration date of the National Housing Act.

Title One of the Act, known as the Modernization Credit Program, designed to assist property owners to repair, alterate, or make additions to real improved properties, will expire on April 1, 1937, unless this Congress extends the time.

Title Two of the Act, known as the Insured Mortgage System, which makes it possible for a person with a regular monthly income in proportion to his monthly payment which will come due under the terms of his mortgage, to build, to buy, or refinance his personal indebtedness. This part of the Act is permanent legislation, and the Federal Housing Administration is a permanent governmental agency, and does not have any expiration date. The United States Treasury guarantee of the Mutual Mortgage Insurance Funds Deben-

ture would have expired on July 1st, 1937. This congress recently extended this guarantee to July 1st, 1939.

Mr. Sikes stated that it is not difficult to secure commitment from the Federal Housing Administration to insure loans. The Administration requirement is neither difficult or unusual. The applicant must have a regular monthly income in proportion to his monthly payments as will come due under the terms of the mortgage. The person must have the reputation of paying his bills, must show that he is living within his income, and a statement must disclose an equity of at least 20 per cent. The security must be a dwelling or four unit apartment. Each unit must be three rooms with a bath. Certain requirements as to area, lights, ventilation, and coverage of the lot are required, and too, the dwelling must be located in a desirable neighborhood.
