AMERICANS SLAIN
IN OTHER LANDSATTACKS ON U. S. CITIZENS
REPORTED IN MEXICO,
CHINA, DOMINGO

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16. (AP)—From three countries, Mexico, Santo Domingo and China, word has reached the state department telling of the murder of two Americans and of other attacks on this country's nationals.

The fatal shooting of David L. Fisher of Philadelphia, a chief clerk of the Southern Pacific of Mexico railroad offices, by a Mexican employee was reported by the American consul at Guadalajara who also sent advice about a radical disturbance at the Matamoros in that region from which the foreigners were forced to flee and of a renewal of radical activities at the Amparo mines after the protection of Mexican federal troops had been withdrawn. The same consulate also reported that Javier Diaz had been arrested for the recent murder of Arthur Bremer, an American, and a former Harvard football player.

In Santo Domingo, according to consular advice, Rene R. Dumarest, said to be a naturalized American from New York City, was slain by Robin Saso, a Dominican, in a dispute over the collection of an overdue \$25 account. Saso was arrested; the consulate reported.

Marion Duncan, an American missionary, and his family were robbed of all their possessions by Chinese brigands who attacked them in the vicinity of Tsakel Pass, the Yunnan consulate advised the department.

SEARCH FOR ROBBERS

CENTERS AT DALLAS

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 16. (AP)—Search for three or four men who Thursday afternoon held up and robbed the Plano National bank of more than \$1,000 shifted to Dallas today as city and county officers joined in combing resorts where underlings ordinarily stay.

A burned sedan found in a clump of trees in the Trinity bottom, five miles northwest of Lott in regard to the robbery, was an important clue. Four men from Plano identified

the automobile as that used by the bandits.

The sedan was found by a M. Nichols, farmer who saw the car driven into the woods near where he was working. Nichols said he saw a man throw what appeared to be gasoline over the car and apply a match. As the automobile began to burn, he said, this man, whom he believed was joined by others, disappeared.

H. G. Wells speaks in his "World of William Gladstone" of a certain lady who should "permit her emotions which flow in a canyon to spread beyond the canyon walls." Reading the line, one recalls horde of people, men and women, but women in the main, who strut their entire lives in "a canyon," only to reap a harvest of emptiness when, someday, the waters of the canyon are gone and there is nothing left outside the canyon walls.

One thinks of mothers of one child who refuse any life that does not pertain to this child. I recall once saw a certain mother who spends her days in hurling reproaches at her daughter. The daughter married not long ago. She lived home with her mother for a while, then moved.

"That's the worst sort of ingratitude," mused the mother, "and after I had dedicated my entire life to her and intended to keep right on doing it whether she was married or not."

I remember years ago of entering the house of this particular mother to find her with the small daughter seated at a festive little table in the play room, having a birthday party. There was a pink round cake on the table with seven candles and pink ice cream and everything that should attend a small girl's birthday party, except some other little faces.

"Betty Jane and I are having a party all by ourselves!" said mother perched on the edge of a nursery chair, like a queen on a throne. "But I did want Martha Anne," said Betty Jane, her little face wide-eyed and serious. "When your very own mama has your party with you? You're the only little girl mama has to play with, Betty Jane."

And so it went from babyhood until childhood. Betty Jane was invited to a party, and mama reminded her that she was "all she had," and if she went away that night mama would be all alone.

Betty Jane got a job. She loved it—chance to make friends and to be with people other than mama with her eternal chorus, "you're all I have."

But Betty Jane was rescued. "See, we'll live with your mother," said Tom in the delicious stage when he would have agreed to anything and everything. They did for six months. Then they moved. Betty Jane told me just a very little about it.

"All my life I've heard about being all that mother had," she said. "I was just strutting my life in a high heel. I didn't mind giving her her share, but she wanted everything. She was jealous of my own husband. She made it hard enough for me to marry him in the first place, and she was making it hard for me to stay married."

"Tom wasn't home right on the dot for dinner she would insist that we eat without him. If Tom wanted to go to the theatre or driving, mother took it for granted that she would go along. One day Tom and she had a real row. He was very patient with her, but that night he burst out. I had brought a new dress, a chiffon velvet. Tom loved violet color. Mother criticized. She thought I should have bought pale green. But Tom likes violet. I said, And she said, But dear, mother likes green, and you're all she's got. Tom yelled, For the love of Mike, why don't you get something else?"

"He insisted that we move. He said that mother wasn't so old but what there was some hope for her—that we just had to make it a case of sink or swim for her. He said that he loved me as she had me, she would just go on wringing my very life, sucking at me like a leech, and that he wouldn't have it. I believe it's working. It nearly killed her at first, but she's beginning to invite people in, go to shows with some friends. I find a club or so, and looks better than she has in years."

Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Peaches, cereal, cream, French toast, syrup, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Bouillon, toast, chicken, individual potato salad, brown bread, baked apples with whipped cream, milk, tea.

DINNER—Chicken with mushrooms, creamed corn, tomato surprise salad, peach-ice cream, milk, coffee.

As long as tomatoes are in the market there is no salad that can surpass them in some form. When an elaborate salad is wanted smooth tomatoes of uniform size are delicious filled with any preferred combination of fruits, vegetables or fish jelly or fruit.

The dinner suggested would make an ideal company luncheon of reasonable foods. The addition of a soup or cocktail would make the menu proper for a formal dinner. The rest of cocktail used will be determined by the stuffing used for the tomato salad.

Individual Potato Salad
Four of six red boiled potatoes, sweet green pepper, 1 cooked beet, 1 hard cooked egg, 3 small slicing cucumbers, 1-2 onion, 4 tablespoons broken nut meats, tart cooked salad dressing, lettuce.

Chop potatoes quite fine. Remove seeds and pith from pepper and chop fine. Chop beet and egg. Peel and chop cucumbers. Mix onion. Combine potatoes with pepper, beet, egg, cucumber, onion and nut meats. Sprinkle with salt and add salad dressing to make quite moist. Pack in custard cups rubbed lightly with salad oil and chill for several hours. Garnish on a bed of lettuce and mark each mold with mayonnaise. Serve at once.

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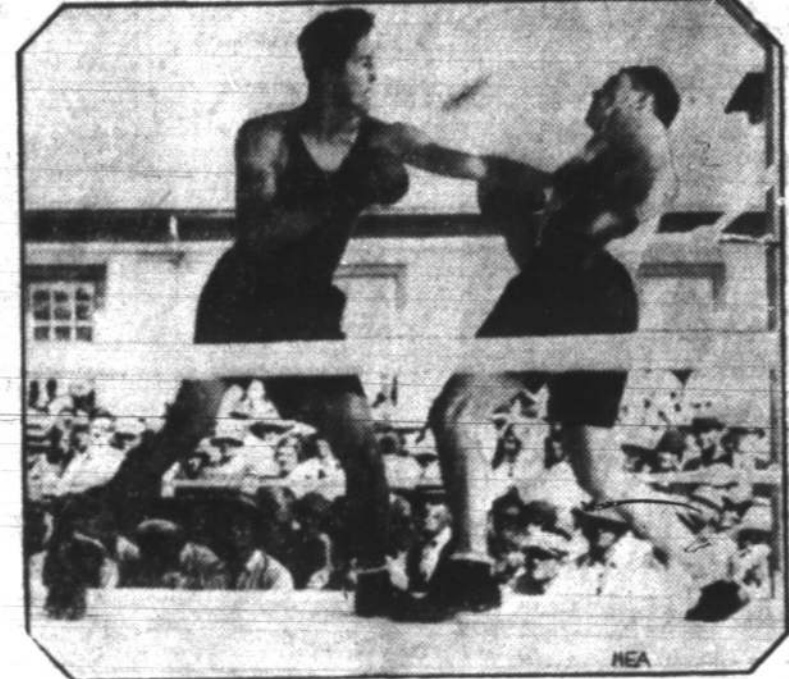

MAKING FRIENDS

THE CONSTITUTION

A series of articles now being published in the Avalanche, discussing the American Constitution and written by Harry Atwood, president of the Constitution Anniversary Association, should be read by every man and woman and boy and girl in this part of Texas. The articles present many important historical facts in addition to their discussion of the Constitution and its influence upon the governments of the world, and since the one hundred and fortieth anniversary of the signing of the Constitution is to be observed next Saturday, this is a particularly timely presentation of the subject.

In his first article, Mr. Atwood pointed out that although the Constitution is the basic law of the nation and the pattern after which many other nations have fashioned their magna chartas, little is known of it in the rank and file of American citizens, and comparatively few persons holding places of responsible leadership in the average American community are familiar with it. Any one can read the entire document, with all its amendments, in fifteen or twenty minutes; but many learned men have devoted years to study of it without mastering all of it. Every man and woman and boy and girl should at least read it, if for no other reason than to become acquainted with the masterful style in which the forefathers of the country set forth the fundamentals.

This is an era of law. Much of the time of the people is taken up with discussions of laws and proposed laws, and of the various phases of government operation. The Constitution of the United States is the master instrument in the system of law which maintains all government, and every law that is enacted, whether by the Congress or by the state or municipality, must conform to it or be invalidated and worthless. We can not very intelligently discuss law, or government, or governmental agencies, unless we have at least some measure of knowledge concerning the fundamental law of the land which governs all other law that may be enacted by agencies set up under the constitutional directions. For our own information, therefore, and to qualify us for better citizenship, all of us should devote some time to an understanding of the system of government which it sets up, and which will enable us more clearly to vis-

ualize the democracy that is established and guaranteed by its provisions. A reading of Mr. Atwood's splendid articles will be of great value in such a study of the Constitution.

THE MORAL SLUMP

That the country is in the midst of a moral slump cannot be successfully contradicted. People are simply pleasure crazy, and allow their thirst for pleasure to outdo their better judgment and allow themselves to sink deeper and deeper into the quicksands of sin until they are sometimes brought to a very low level in the scale of morals.

The country is in the midst of a moral slump. Several symptoms indicate it. One of the most striking is public acquiescence in and support of prize fighting. Who does not remember when such contests were looked upon as harmful and degenerate? When participants were driven from pillar to post? When promoters were under the ban? When governors chased the whole crew of principals and spectators over state lines? When, even under protection of the law in the few states permitting such exhibitions, only small crowds attended?

All this is changed. Now these fights, with all their brutality, are conducted before the largest crowds ever assembled on this continent and are held under the auspices of the agents of the state, who fix the limit of prices, making rules governing the colors which pugilists shall wear, and otherwise supervise the thing.

The recent spectacle in New York City was managed by a boxing commission appointed by the governor. It was held under the auspices of agents of the state.

No legitimate sport is thus honored. Why not?

That brings us to the milk in the coconut. Prize fighting is so directly in the hands of crooks and degenerates, that without some form of governmental supervision, it would fall of its own weight. To give it any semblance of decency, those who are engaged in it professionally as fighters or promoters are more than glad to accept state regulation and supervision. Without it, the business would perish. Football does not need it. Baseball gets along without it. Tennis and golf do not require it. Prize fighting would be stuck in its own muck and mire, but for the sustaining hand of the state.

It is a pitiful spectacle, Illinois, New Jersey, New York, Massachusetts and other supposedly progressive and Christian states have gone into partnership with this disreputable, dishonest so-called sport.

The forces of decency seem to be thoroughly subdued. Almost no preacher lifts his voice against it. One in the vicinity of Pittsburgh attended the recent disgrace in New York and reported it for the papers.

That was a sweet morsel for the pug-uglies. The same papers which published his account of the fight also told the story of the drunken sports who, making the trip from Baltimore to New York on a special train, showed their resentment of any interference by the train officials with the booze party they were holding, by starting a fight with those representatives of the company. They were subdued only by a great show of force in Philadelphia and brought to their senses only by a threat of the count to lock them up and prevent their further progress.

No one ever heard of a drunken fight on a special train enroute to a Methodist General Conference or a Presbyterian General Assembly, or a Christian Endeavor Convention.

Something is the matter with a business which calls such vipers and renegades into public notice.

Yet everyone of them bought a ticket which was issued under the authority of the boxing commission of the state of New York.

The Christian people in every state ought to wipe out this disgrace which discolors the statute books of the commonwealth. If we must have prize fighting, let it be as in the old days when brutes engaged in it rented barges and pushed off into streams to fight by torchlight, or met in barns or secret halls for their degenerate exhibitions.

The last one held in New York in the full blaze of publicity did more harm than a thousand contests such as marked the old days when fighting was under the ban.

If there is not enough vitality and moral fibre in the ministers and churches of this country to prevent this disgrace, we are in a bad way.

It is time the moral conscience of the nation made itself felt. — National Enquirer.

A neighboring city, some 140 miles away from here is of the opinion that Lubbock folks are not excitable enough. THE MISSISSIPPI.

In its own way the strange loss of interest by the Nation in the question of Mississippi flood-control now that this year's physical crisis on the lower river has passed, is a sadder tragedy than the flood itself.

The economic crisis confronting the vast devastated region is not passed. Its peak is not yet reached. The war with crushing debt, the long struggle back to economic health is scarcely under way. If the tens of thousands of stricken workers who are carrying on in the knowledge that the sudden sympathy displayed by the Nation during the flood was more than a fugitive sentiment, and that the subject of flood-control has become a matter of permanent concern to the stricken Nation, so that once restored economically they would not be plunged into wretchedness, their burden in this battle would be measurably lightened. Yet no such hope is extended them. They struggle back with no assurance that the future does not hold a similar disaster. Not a single practical movement toward flood-control has been made. It becomes apparent that Congress should have been called into session months ago and that now, as the country's inexplicable apathy increases, the reason for such a session are every day more urgent. — Detroit News.

With high schools trying to imitate much of college life, the high school senior is raised somewhat above the level of his underclassmen. And although the governor may speak in learned phrases now, stories of his college days include mention of a few low grades, some in the subject of government.

Freshmen days are now considered frankly as days of adjustment. In the large universities, the freshmen often are too numerous to get individual attention, and if they have an abundance of energy and sufficient funds a gay time is had by many. Freshmen require a lot of time, and then there is the fraternity life and the desire to "get on" socially. Many underclassmen have lately been thinking more about fraternity "rush" week than about study.

For the youth who can keep his balance socially and academically, the social fraternity has its advantages, and parents should not be alarmed if son believes it absolutely essential to his peace of mind and future prospects. To belong to the fraternal order upon scholastic attainment, and a flunker is not popular in the better ones. The spirit of the student is the main thing, and some of the great men of the country have been kicked out of college. This is no argument for the procedure, however.

although all is not gold that glitters, even in college. But much depends upon how the freshman gets started. Participation in a few well selected student affairs and formation of acquaintanceships with the leaders in various activities are desirable. — Panhandle Daily News.

But on the other hand, even with all of this inclination on the part of the Freshmen and others to bring more of the "franky" features of college life into the Freshman year, the trouble will not be corrected unless they are brought face to face with some of the more serious things in life, and are brought to think more seriously about their first year's work in an educational institution. We think it is a great thought on the part of the heads of the newest state educational institution in Texas to bring about this more serious consideration of the work that is to be done in the college this year.

Governor Dan Moody is one man among men who is suited to bring a message to the Freshmen who are entering upon their first year in the college. Clean in his life politically, a Christian gentleman, an educated, refined college man, he can tell without fear of criticism of the life of the student, and give advice that will be heeded. He knows the temptations and the problems of the freshman. He knows what they shall encounter in their first year's work here, and we are of the opinion that his visit to the school will be worth much, not only to the Freshman group, but to the entire student body, and to the people of Lubbock and the South Plains in general. Preamble—A Sublime Creed

EDITOR'S NOTE: An analysis of the purpose and plan of the Constitution is contained in this article, the fifth of a series of 12 articles in keeping with Constitution Week, Tomorrow: The Constitution's Vesting of Powers.

For the successful accomplishment of a desired project, it is important to have a clear, definite, and definite what is to be achieved. History records no finer illustration of a clear concept of the aims sought and of the results desired from an undertaking than this remarkable proclamation of the purposes set forth in the preamble to the Constitution of the United States.

"We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

This preamble is a sublime, a comprehensive, and an accurate statement of the purposes of government. Every proper governmental activity can be classified under one or more of the six great purposes set forth in it.

Its Deeper Meaning
For some unaccountable reason there has been a disposition not to attach to the preamble the significance which it possesses. It is highly important, because the Constitution was dedicated to the six purposes set forth in the preamble and to no other purposes.

It is proper to assume that, in the making or interpreting of any law, or in the carrying out of any governmental activity, should ask themselves: Is this law being made or interpreted or enforced in accordance with one or more of the six purposes set forth in the preamble? Such a test adhered to would greatly improve the functioning of our government.

Prior to the writing of this preamble, there cannot be found a good, brief, clear, comprehensive statement of the purposes of government, though one may have access to all that was said by Socrates, Plato, Aristotle, Cicero, or Montesquieu, and all that was ever said by any individual or group of individuals in any country, including our own, before that time.

Influence For Peace
This fact is a striking illustration of what a sage statesman government had been before the Constitution was written. Not even a good statement of the purposes of government had been made, to say nothing of providing a good plan.

The right mental condition for a real understanding and just appreciation of the purpose and plan of the Constitution is to regard each of the 15 elements set forth in this outline as a part of an excellent plan for government, just as each letter in the alphabet, each one of the ten digits, and each note in the scale of music is a part of an excellent plan.

U. S. TO REJECT FRENCH OFFERS

DETAILS OF NOTES NOT
MADE PUBLIC BUT
REJECTION SURE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—The American reply to the French tariff note probably will be forwarded early next week to Paris and although no word was forthcoming from the state department today, it was a foregone conclusion that it would reject definitely French desires to negotiate a give and take agreement.

The French note still was withheld from publication as it has not yet been made public by the French government itself, and in the absence of official word as to the attitude the Washington government will take, it has occurred to some observers that it might be possible to impose an increase in duties on French products, under the flexible provisions of the tariff act and then negotiate with France for a reciprocal readjustment of rates down to the French minimum rates as the limit of French negotiation on the one side and down to the statutory rates in the United States as the limit of negotiation on the other.

Whether this method is in actual contemplation by government officials is not known. Available figures on the commercial business interchanged with France last year showed that the American export to France amounted to \$1.2 percent by value of the total American foreign commerce while the French export to the United States amounted to between six and seven percent of the total French export trade.

The total value of American exports to France for the year reached a figure of approximately \$23,000,000, while the corresponding French figure was \$122,000,000. A very substantial portion of the American sales to France was in cotton, copper and oil while the French export to the United States was almost wholly in manufactured goods.

PICK ELEVEN JURORS

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 16 (AP).—Eleven jurors were in the box when the evening recess was taken today in the trial of John A. McKenna for the murder of Sam Street, chief of San Antonio detectives, last Saturday night.

The second special venire of 100 men were exhausted in selecting the eleventh juror and a third special venire of twenty men was ordered to report tomorrow morning.

This Is Report Reaching Siberia
After Ship Is Sunk
Off Coast

ITY GETS BLOCK 36 FOR PARK; OTHER TO BE DIVIDED

A compromise yesterday ended five years of litigation which has attended the triangular municipal park suit of the city. Dr. M. C. Overton and T. T. Price of Dallas, the result being the city of Lubbock receives block 36, constituting 48 lots, to be used as a park, and that block 36 of the Overton addition be divided equally between Dr. Overton and Mr. Price.

The compromise was announced yesterday morning after a conference of attorneys representing the parties. It followed several days of reviewing the case's history.

The block to be given the city, to be used as a park, is located in the northwest part of town, being bordered by Avenues T and U and Sixth and seventh streets. The block to be divided is lined by Avenues T and U and Sixth and seventh streets. Dr. Overton took the south half of this lot and Mr. Price the northern half.

Mayor Parrish expressed satisfaction over the settlement and said that improvements would immediately be made upon the park. Dr. Overton's petition showed that in 1908 he sold and deeded two lots to Mr. Price and Blodgett, including in the deal two lots with stipulation that they be used for park purposes. About five years ago Price and Blodgett maintained that the blocks were deeded to them and assumed ownership.

Based on Dr. Overton's testimony, the city also entered suit. The case came to trial in October of last year, resulting in a jury verdict of 8 to 4, in favor of the plaintiff.

OVERRULE MOTION IN FRAUD CASES

MOVE TO EXCLUDE GOV'T. EVIDENCE FINDS NO SUPPORT

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 16 (AP)—Motions by the defense to exclude much of the government's evidence against B. Frank Wood and 13 associates of the Invader Oil corporation of Muskogee, Okla., charged with mail frauds, were overruled in federal court here today.

A plea on immunity by Wood also was denied by Judge William P. James. He had asked to be freed by the government inasmuch as he appeared before a federal grand jury two years ago and gave testimony said to have furnished a base for the government's present case. Wood contended that government records had been obtained by duress.

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Sunday-School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic: The Kingdom of David
Scripture Lesson: I Kings 12:15-26

12. So Jeroboam and all the people came to Rehoboam the third day, as the king bade, saying, Come to me again the third day.

13. And the king answered the people roughly, and forsook the counsel of the old men which they had given him.

14. And spake to them after the counsel of the young men saying, My father made your yoke heavy, but I will add to your yoke; my father chastised you with whips, but I will chastise you with scorpions.

15. So the king hearkened not unto the people; for it was a thing brought about of Jehovah, that he might establish his word, which Jehovah spake by Ahijah the Shilonite to Jeroboam the son of Nebat.

16. And when all Israel saw that the king hearkened not unto them, the people answered the king, saying, What portion have we in David? neither have we inheritance in the son of Jesse: to your tents, O Israel: now see to thine own house, David. So Israel departed unto their tents.

17. But as for the children of Israel that dwell in the cities of Judah, Rehoboam reigned over them.

18. Then king Rehoboam sent Adoram, who was over the men subject to travail; and all Israel stoned him to death with stones. And king Rehoboam made speed to get him up to his chariot, to flee to Jerusalem.

19. So Israel rebelled against the house of David unto this day.

20. And it came to pass, when all Israel heard that Jeroboam was returned, that they sent and called him unto the congregation, and made him king over all Israel: there was none that followed the house of David, but the tribe of Judah only.

21. The division of the kingdom took place B. C. 925.

Place: Shechem, ancient and important city in central Palestine, in the territory of Ephraim, called Samaria in the time of Christ.

Golden Text: Pride goeth before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall—Prov. 16:18.

Introduction
As in case of David, so in that of Solomon, we have a peak of glory and a valley of humiliation.

After bringing up the Ark to Jerusalem as the expression of glowing religious fervor, David fell into sin and his last years were clouded.

After dedicating the completed Temple and uttering a noble prayer, Solomon became worldly and sinful and left behind him an oppressed and angry people to the government of a weak and incapable successor.

Solomon's Despotism Rule
"On the whole, the reign of Solomon, with all its outward magnificence, gives one the impression of an Oriental despotism rule, in which the welfare of the people is made quite subordinate to the personal interests and caprices of the king."

Solomon's harem, with a thousand members, included many women who were foreigners and idolaters. For them he erected many idol shrines. Thus he added licentiousness and idolatry to his despotism.

Besides the superb temple, he built for himself a wonderful palace which took thirteen years in building. In various parts of the country he had out gardens and vineyards. He maintained a large army. He sent ships and caravans in all directions and built

store cities in distant regions to facilitate commerce. All of these tremendous operations were built upon the toil and sufferings of his people."

Jeroboam, a young man of the tribe of Ephraim, was placed by Solomon in charge of a part of his building operations in Jerusalem. He had an important post and was evidently a man of ability. One day he was met by the prophet Ahijah who took the new garment Jeroboam was wearing, tore it into twelve pieces, and gave the young man ten of them. The prophet informed him of the meaning of his acted parable: on account of Solomon's complicity with idolatry the kingdom was to be torn away from his family, all but Judah (and most of Benjamin); and the ten tribes were to be given to Jeroboam, who was to be their king.

Rehoboam
Solomon died at the age of about sixty, after a reign of forty years, leaving as his successor his son Rehoboam. The crown prince had been reared under circumstances as unfavorable as possible for the production of noble manhood. On the death of his father, Rehoboam seems to have at once, and without opposition, assumed the reins of government. His enthronement at Jerusalem implied the homage of Judah and its neighbor tribe, Benjamin. But, instead of regarding to Jerusalem, the representatives of the ten northern tribes gathered at Shechem, the ancient capital of Ephraim, where important popular assemblies had previously been held. They presented to Rehoboam a series of bold and just demands, their spokesman being Jeroboam, whom they had brought back post haste from his exile in Egypt. "Thy father," they said, "made our yoke grievous: now make our service lighter and we will serve thee." It was a righteous demand, and should have been granted instantly by the young king. Instead, he asked and obtained three days in which to consider it.

Rehoboam Seeks Advice
In the meantime, Rehoboam called the older men in counsel and consulted with them as to what should be done. These wise representatives of the people urged him to adopt a kindly tone toward the discontented. But Rehoboam made the fatal mistake of calling the younger men who in their pride of youth advised him to speak roughly to the people, assert his authority, and declare that he would go even further than his father had done in his executions and in the penalties for disobedience. It was a boastful and foolish speech and action and the consequences were disastrous.

Rehoboam's Folly
The result of Rehoboam's folly was to precipitate what had long been brewing among the people and bring on a permanent division into two small kingdoms. Jeroboam, representing the people, came to Rehoboam at the end of the third day and received a rough and harsh answer. He repeated the words suggested by the young men and declared that whereas his father had made their yoke heavy, he would make it heavier, and whereas his father had chastised them with whips, he would use scorpions. This was either a merely boastful speech, or there may have been a kind of whip called scorpions because they sting so severely. Here the inspired writer recognized that Rehoboam's action was in the mind of God who had prophesied through Ahijah that this would be his course of action.

The Kingdom Divided
The expected came to pass. The people were aroused. Their outcry showed a deep movement of their minds. There had always been jealousy among the northern tribes toward Judah and that broke out in the saying, "What portion have we in David? Neither have we inheritance in the son of Jesse." It will be remembered that even in David's lifetime the hostility of the northern tribes had appeared more than once. All that the smoldering embers needed was a breeze, and it came, so they shouted, "To your tents, O Israel." This was not a call to assemble, but to break up the assembly. The phrase came down from the old time of tenting in the wilderness. It simply meant, Scatter to your homes, break up anything that looks like union so as to continue the house of David. So, of course the assembly broke up, the people went to their homes, but moved with deep indignation and ready to be assembled again in case of war. On arriving at Jerusalem the king sent Adoram, who was the superintendent of the forced labor to carry on his unpopular work. But he was stoned to death. Then the king realized that all was lost and he returned to Jerusalem. The breach was now complete. It was never healed. The northern kingdom continued for more than two hundred years and then fell beyond rescue and passed out of history. Rehoboam retained Judah and those who had become identified with that tribe, probably including Benjamin and Simeon.

Special Lesson

All Ready To End Mims Test Well

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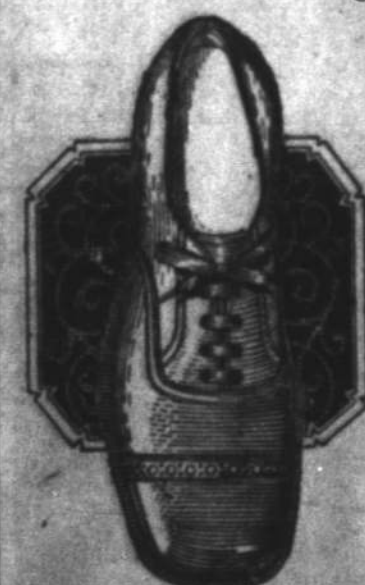
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
