

5,000 Attend County Fair On First Day

Howard County's 1949 Fair was off to a good start today with a record of more than 5,000 visitors Thursday, the opening day.

Paid admissions figured in excess of 4,000, said Fair officials, and there were an estimated 1,500 who were on hand in the grounds before the gates started operation Thursday morning. There were some working passes and some leakage, making it possible that 6,000 inspected exhibits the first day.

Woods Orders Speed-Up In Rent Decontrol

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The Federal Housing Administration has ordered a speed-up of plans to end rent ceilings in communities with 25,000 population or less.

Top-ranking aides who reported this today said Woods has set as a goal the removal of restrictions from 60 such areas each week "until the job is done."

The accelerated pace of decontrol results in Woods' own words, from an "assumption" that rents in most smaller localities have "come back to normal."

Just how long it will take to lift ceilings in all such areas, no one would say.

But housing authorities released figures showing that controls now have been lifted from an even 500 areas—most of them in areas having less than 100,000 population—in states scattered across the country.

A summary of decontrol activities since the federal rent act became effective in April showed that a total of 1,780,623 dwelling units were involved in the decontrol.

A spokesman for Woods made it clear that the situation governing the lifting of ceilings in small cities does not affect larger metropolitan areas. He pointed out that, under the law, the housing expediter is empowered to end controls only after the demand for rental housing has been reasonably met or local governing bodies legally ask to have ceilings removed.

In the case of the smaller localities, Woods said in a recent speech that the speed-up is based on the fact that such places never had a peacetime demand for heavy rental housing.

Twister Hits At Houston

HOUSTON, Oct. 7.—A swirling tornado raced across Houston's east side at 9 a. m. today, damaging several homes, automobiles and business houses.

There was no immediate report of injuries.

The twister formed during a brief rain storm.

Weather Bureau Chief E. A. Farrell said the tornado was more of a "magnified whirlwind than anything else."

At least two houses were picked up and carried several feet and an unoccupied automobile was carried 15 feet.

One house was reported smashed completely.

BERLIN, Oct. 7.—The East German Republic—Russia's newest satellite—was proclaimed today under the leadership of German Communists.

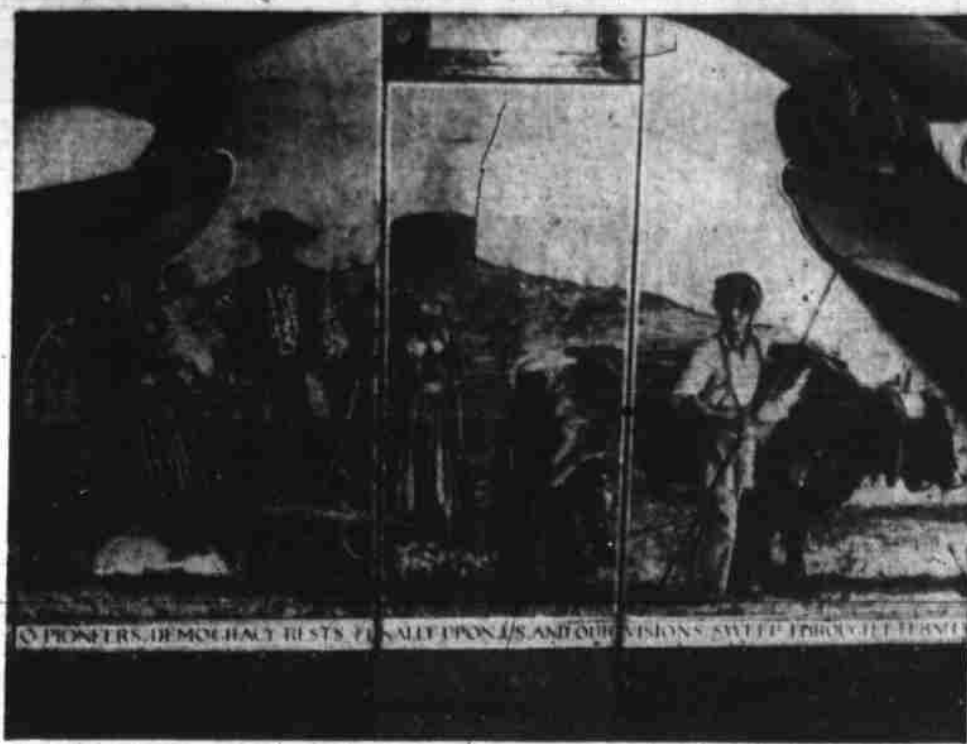

New DC-3 Plane Will Be Christened On Saturday

Local city, county and centennial officials will be presented, along with Patti McDonald, Centennial Queen and her court.

Mayor G. W. Dabney will welcome the visiting delegation to Big Spring and Gen. Smith is scheduled to speak.

Immediately after the christening ceremony the plane will make courtesy flights over the city with various officials as passengers.

The Pioneer Air Lines officials and the visiting delegation from Abilene will be guests of the Centennial association at a luncheon during the noon hour.

The plane is scheduled to arrive at the Big Spring Municipal airport at 10 a. m., and the christening ceremony will begin half an hour later.

The airport administration building is located on the north edge of the field, adjacent to West Highway 80.

Killer Of 13 Found Insane

CAMDEN, N. J., Oct. 7.—Psychiatrists today found Camden's mass killer Howard B. Unruh insane, Prosecutor Mitchell H. Cohen said he will be sent to an insane asylum without ever standing trial for the slaughter of 13 people on a Camden street on Sept. 6.

The decision came after a month-long study of Unruh at the New Jersey State Hospital at Trenton. Psychiatrists reported to Cohen today that they found Unruh to be "a case of dementia praecox."

Unruh was arrested after a shooting spree that ended in a police chase and a crash landing in a field.

Unruh was charged with the murder of 13 people, including a police officer, and the attempted murder of several others.

Action Taken Toward Ending Coal Walkout

U. S., However Keeps Hands Off In Steel Strike

The government stepped in today in an attempt to settle the coal strike but no move was made to bring peace in the steel dispute.

John L. Lewis, whose 380,000 United Mine Workers have been away from their jobs for three weeks in a dispute over pensions and insurance, said he will attend the session called in Washington by Cyrus Ching, chief government mediator. The operators earlier said they will be at the meeting.

In the week-old strike of 50,000 United Mine workers, no union-management sessions were scheduled. But Ching was expected to call for talks next week with union and steel industry representatives. Pensions and insurance are the main issues of the dispute.

There was one bright note on the labor front. The CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union and seven stevedoring firms agreed to settle Hawaii's five month old strike. The union's 2,000 dock workers ratified the agreement which provides for a wage hike of 14 cents an hour. The union struck for a pay boost of 32 cents.

An immediate back-to-work order was delayed pending settlement of non-stevedoring issues in ports other than Honolulu. However, early agreement was expected and docks strike-bound since May 1, were expected to be humming at a normal rate next week.

The meeting in Washington called by Ching broke up negotiations between Lewis and operators for a new coal contract. No date was set for resumption of conferences which Lewis has kept going all summer at White Sulphur Springs and Bluefield, W. Va.

Shick To Extend Foot Mail Carrier Service In City

Postmaster Nat Shick has obtained permission to extend foot carrier service to areas east of State street, including Washington Place, Highland Park and Merrick-Greene additions, south to the city limits and west to Lancaster street and Edward Heights.

Those areas have heretofore been covered by motorized carriers.

Shick said the post office would be in a position to make the change about Nov. 1. At that time, notices will be placed in mail boxes, notifying residents that they can move the boxes from curbs to porches.

The new service makes it possible for the areas to have two deliveries daily, compared to the one now offered by the motor carriers.

And when Grandstaff and Sheriff Wolf walked down the streets of Nashville after a private plane trip from Texas, crowds halted them to beg both for autographs. Minutes later—the gates of the big house clanged shut behind him, presumably for life.

CHANCES OF PARDON ARE REMOTE

Grandstaff Back In His Cell At Tennessee State Prison

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 7.—Six days of freedom have ended for life-terminer Frank Grandstaff.

He was returned to Tennessee state prison last night after a four-day trip to hear a 70-page cantata he composed on the wall of his solitary cell.

Uppermost in his mind was the question, "What's all this going to lead to?"

"I'm like a thirsty man who's had a drink of water," he added. "Am I going to get any more?"

Only Gov. Gordon Browning can answer Grandstaff's questions, and he holds out little hope of a pardon for the near 47-year-old man who is one of the few ever given a life sentence in this state as an habitual criminal.

B-36 Fleet Is Called Billion Dollar Blunder

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Admiral Arthur W. Radford, a top Navy flier, today labeled the Air Force fleet of B-36 bombers a "billion dollar blunder" that will be "useless defensively and inadequate offensively" in an atomic war.

In a slashing attack, Radford said that putting so much of limited military funds into the B-36 is a "bad gamble with national security" based on an unsound theory that there can be "a cheap and easy victory" through strategic bombing.

Radford was before the House Armed Services Committee—the first of a group of Naval officers who last are getting a chance to put before Congress their dissatisfaction with present defense policies.

He told the lawmakers that claims made for the B-36 international bomber are not "valid," that it is not true that it can perform unescorted missions; by day or night, escaping interception, and that it can bomb with precision from 40,000 feet.

Without escort, he declared, it can be intercepted and destroyed in unacceptable numbers.

Just before that, he had told the committee that unless the B-36 could attack successfully without unacceptable losses, then "the B-36 is a billion dollar blunder."

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Merit Of New Marriage-Health Law Is Yet To Be Determined

A whole mass of new laws adopted by the 81st Legislature went into effect Wednesday, the 90th day after adjournment.

Texas who deplore the steady rise of boards, bureaus and commissions are entitled to view with alarm, for no fewer than eight new state agencies came into being as a result of the lawmakers' activities. One or two of them will go out of existence with completion of work specifically assigned to them; but some of the "temporary" boards, commissions, bureaus and agencies have exhibited all the vital tenacity of a bull elephant.

Of special interest among the new laws is the one requiring a certificate of health from both contracting parties to a marriage. Until now only the groom was required to present a certificate, and there was considerable laxity in its enforcement. The new law requires both bride and groom to undergo a blood test, and calls for pre-natal blood tests of women during pregnancy. The blood tests must be made by laboratories that have

been certified, and the blood-purity certificate together with proof of a medical examination must be presented by applicants for marriage license. Total cost of a license probably will rise to a minimum of \$3 from the present approximate \$2.50.

The principle of requiring a health test is sound, but it is too early to predict its effect on matrimony in this state. At one time, to end hasty marriages, there was a law requiring a three-day wait between application and issuance of a license, and this sent thousands of Texas couples into Oklahoma and New Mexico to have the knot tied.

A similar situation may develop from the new Texas law, for it is obvious that so-called "sin-marriages" will be impossible due to the time element involved, and the cost factor may influence some couples.

Still the principle is sound, and the new law should be enforced with a great deal more persistence and determination than was the case with the one it supersedes.

Newest Wage Settlements May Bring Higher-Paced Business

It is altogether possible that the steel-coal strikes are a prelude to a new period of boom times and inflation in this country.

If it continues long enough the shut-downs will create scarcities in many lines even in automobiles, where the current supply is lush compared to only a few months ago. It will create scarcities in household appliances and many other items in daily demand. It will increase costs in the building industry and in construction generally.

So if the strikes continue long enough to create scarcities, and just short of industrial paralysis, the swing-back will be immediate and substantial—and in the direction of high demand at higher prices.

It is fairly obvious that this is the thought in the minds of those who operate in the stock market. The stock market reached a new high for 1949 this week—not, as most news commentators phrased it, in spite of the strikes, but quite possibly because of the strikes. When the strikes are settled, as inevitably they will be, what was expected to be a mild bust-

wage demands. Basically, this is what the coal miners and the steelworkers are now rising anyhow may take on the appearance of a new boom.

All this will lead to a new round of after, and that is what the Ford Motor company employees really go under their new contract. The wage rise is indirect, but genuine. It is represented by pension schemes to when the workers contribute nothing. The steel workers are asking ten cents an hour for pensions, and if finally granted this will be ten cents an hour wage increase, regardless of what name it is called by.

Those who have feared that the period of inflation was not over, that the country faced a serious rise in living costs and must struggle against a runaway boom—and President Truman, he said to his credit, has been the most outspoken prophet on this point—may soon see their worst fears come true.

The end-result of the strikes in coal and steel will, therefore be a new period of high employment, boom prices, and "prosperity."

NEW YORK, N.Y.—THIS IS A ROUGH week for us men who don't wear hats.

By tomorrow night, if we make it that long, we'll probably feel un-American. You see, the people who make and sell hats sold only about 72 million hats last year for about \$250 million and this year they would like to make and sell more, \$600,000,000.

This is National Hat Week.

AN INTENSIVE CAMPAIGN TO ELIMINATE the hatless man is being waged in about 500 cities, by more than 9,000 hat retailers and 125 manufacturers. The industry calls this the greatest promotional campaign in its history.

There are or will be more ads in the papers and more commercials on the air about men's hats than ever before. On

television, they're sending fashion shows and one clinical program which takes a hat apart and shows how it made.

Fashion shows with live models are planned by department stores in Chicago, Washington, Richmond, and many other cities. On the air, there is talk about the "importance of hats in the history of freedom" (i.e. when Greek slaves became free they wore a felt hat as the symbol of their freedom).

THE HAT RESEARCH FOUNDATION, sponsors of the project, tried to get the historic campaign fedora worn by Franklin D. Roosevelt but the government won't let it but of Hyde Park.

The foundation did get Lincoln's stove-pipe hat and a similar model worn by a man who attended his funeral as well as an admirer's of the old-time beaver of 1770. Theodore Roosevelt's inaugural top hat, Wendell Wilkie's, Elihu Root's, Woodrow Wilson's elegant tasseled smoking cap, W. C. Fields' black snap-brim felt, a Dutchman's leather helmet of 1702, a replica of Al Smith's famous brown derby and the original big, black curled brim headgear which made Fiorello LaGuardia known as "The Hat."

White House Pressure Instrumental In Ending Percenter Investigation

WASHINGTON — When good old Clyde Hoy, the swallow-tailed Senator from North Carolina, announced there would be no more hearings on Gen. Vaughan, John Maragon and the five-percenters, it didn't surprise anybody on the inside.

For insiders have known how much pressure has been exerted by the White House to shut the investigation up.

One month ago it was announced that public hearings would be suspended in order to give the committee staff a chance to do more investigating, also to give Committee Counsel Rogers a two-week vacation. Since then, however, White House pressure has been terrific with even staff investigators threatened with loss of government pensions.

Since then also some sensational leads have been glossed over by committee investigators or carefully stowed away in pigeonholes.

One of the most interesting figures which Sen. Hoy and his staff have turned their back on is David A. Bennett, the perfume manufacturer, who sent seven deep freezes to Gen. Vaughan, Mrs. Truman and other bigwigs at about the time Vaughan was trying to smuggle Bennett's perfume into the United States disguised as champagne for the White House.

AND DEEP FREEZES

There are some other interesting things about Mr. Bennett which the public doesn't know, and most of the record is in government files where any Senate investigator could easily dig it out.

This column doesn't have the same power to subpoena records as does Sen. Hoy of North Carolina, but since the Senate Committee has decided to backslide on the job, this writer has done his best to take up where the Senator from North Carolina left off.

For instance, here are two interesting things which the public has a right to know about Mr. Bennett. At the time he was giving away deep freezes, acquired four government airplanes without competitive bidding, and four luxury yachts, three of them from the U. S. government.

Four yachts are a lot for one man to have. For that matter, so are four airplanes. However, deep-freeze-giver Bennett wasn't satisfied with four yachts and wanted to buy another. To this end, a letter was written to John Maragon, care of Gen. Vaughan at the White House, by one of Bennett's subordinates.

The letter, dated Nov. 19, 1945, is in the files of Sen. Hoy's committee, but since he doesn't seem interested in doing anything about it, this column is glad to publish the letter as follows: "Mr. John Maragon, C-O Brig. Gen. Harry Vaughan's Office, Washington, D. C.

"Dear John:

"At the request of Mr. Bennett, am sending you herewith reprint of an advertisement on 'yachting' and 'motor boating.' Mr. Bennett would like you to contact Commodore Moran, of the small boats division, Maritime Commission—Miss Barrett, sec'y, and find out what conditions this is in, and what price they are asking for same.

"Mr. Bennett is feeling fine after his little rest in the country, and is planning on leaving here again tomorrow to spend Thanksgiving there.

"Hope you are in the best of health, and with kindest regards.

POKER PARTIES

At the time this letter was written to Maragon, Bennett already had the following luxury yachts: "Carman," 600 horsepower, 121 foot, 223 tons; "Valerie V.," 84 foot, 124 tons; "Caroline," 45 foot, 24 tons; "Nedra B.," 111 foot, 101 tons. All these, except the "Valerie V.," were purchased direct from the Maritime Commission. And when the Maritime Commission was asked to disclose who else bid on the vessels, and how much was bid, the information was refused.

When asked whether the bids had been advertised, Miss Mary Barrett, referred to in the above letter to Maragon, flew into a rage.

One reason why Senator Hoy may wish to deal lightly with the man who had so many deep freezes and yachts at his disposal was because Harry Truman, when vice president, was a guest aboard the Bennett yachts. In fact, the yachts were used for some of the famed Truman-Vaughan poker parties, and this long-time intimacy between the President of the United States and the President of the Verley Perfume Company may be why Maragon felt that he could with impunity label his perfume as

consigned to the White House and try to smuggle it through U. S. customs.

At that time—around 1945—one Bennett yacht was moored on the Potomac, another at Saginaw, Mich., and another in Florida. Since then—perhaps because he has been less active in lobbying—Bennett has disposed of three yachts, but still keeps the Nedra B.

AND AIRPLANES

Bennett's government—purchased airplanes also open an interesting chapter which Sen. Hoy's committee has strangely neglected. Bennett purchased, without competitive bidding, three Navy Grumman JRF-6-B's, together with an Army C-54 transport plane.

The C-54 was purchased by Bennett on June 24, 1946 for \$75,000. Its original cost to the government was \$75,568. The three Navy Grumman were purchased for \$25,000 each on Oct. 9, 1946. Their original cost to the government was \$83,319 each. The planes were purchased in the name of the Albert Verley Co.

The War Assets Administration, which sold the planes, almost had kittens when a representative of this column asked for the facts on the sales. However, fair-minded Admiral Paul Mather and his deputy, Capt. H. R. Greenlee, when consulted, decided that since the public had paid for the planes in the first place, they had a right to know who bought them and for how much.

Tennessee Newsmen Get Taste Of 'Real Texas' In Big Spring

It seems that newspaper people are always asking someone to comment on something, and their eagerness to obtain authoritative opinions on various problems may appear ridiculous at times.

Personally, we were expecting it at any time, but came away highly elated when not a single reporter asked Frank Grandstaff to comment on the devaluation of the pound, or some similar topic of significance.

We once heard of a reporter who got fed up with "asking silly questions" of well-known people in fields not remotely connected with the subject. As we remember the story, the reporter literally blew his top when he was asked to question a man about a highly technical financial problem. The reporter apparently knew the man—knew that he had inherited his millions only a short time earlier without so much as turning a hand.

In contrast, newspaper people themselves are seldom questioned or quoted

in the papers, almost never in their own paper. So, a visiting reporter probably had no idea that his opinion would be published in the Herald when this writer sought his reaction to the Big Spring Centennial celebration.

The questions were directed to H. B. Teeter of the Nashville Tennessean, who made the trip here last Saturday and returned Thursday with Frank Grandstaff.

MacArthur's Sure Democracy Now Firmly Rooted In Japan

TOKYO.—(By Airmail)—Japanese militarism died for good when America, with a backward sweep of her hand, knocked out a Japan at the height of her power.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur states this as a fact. He adds: "Remember this is the only country which has actually been the victim of an atomic bomb."

He is equally sure that democracy is firmly rooted here.

Elaborating his view, the general describes the Japanese as an intensely practical people, studiously imitative but wanting to imitate only that which is successful. They learned so terribly the lesson that war is not for their overcrowded, resourceless island that they will not try it again, he insisted.

General MacArthur cited the Japanese constitution which, uniquely among constitutions, renounces war as an instrument of national policy. This was their idea, he said. Occupation authorities describe the constitution not as dictated but hammered out in conference between the Japanese and occupation experts and conforming as much as possible to Japanese ideas.

Chapter II, Article 9, reads: "Aspiring sincerely to an international peace based on justice and order, the Japanese people forever renounce war as a sovereign right of the nation and the threat or use of force as means of settling international disputes. In order to accomplish the aim of the preceding paragraph, land, sea and air forces, as well as other war potential, will never be maintained. The right of the belligerency of the state will not be recognized."

To an extent perhaps little realized at home, certainly among politicians, General MacArthur speaks of the occupation as a dedicated man with an evangelistic fervor unusual and unexpected in the military. Americans have learned to expect humanity and vision from Generals Bradley and Eisenhower now, that they know them; the remote MacArthur who never comes home still seems, to most,

West Point—highly glamorized, but still West Point.

Over the luncheon table General MacArthur firmly refused to let the conversation escape the occupation on its merits. Perhaps he has had a long experience with Washington's self-centeredness which wants to talk about a situation on terms of its own problems; in any case, he has a favorite child, the occupation, and he proposed to tell his story.

He is sure this is truly a liberation of the masses of people from their militarists. For the first time really in Japanese history, they can now speak and move freely, govern themselves and look clearly at the western world.

The general suffers from no fuzziness about Japan's problems as a nation nor the long way she has to fight back into the esteem, even tolerance, of nations. Japanese population problems grow in intensity as better health and sanitation guidance coincides with their being thrown back on their densely inhabited islands. Trade can be their salvation as it is that of England but, unlike England, they do not enjoy the world's good will. Their trade must be financed and their natural markets developed in this part of the world.

General MacArthur believes that the sure and steady growth of basic democracy in Japan is little understood in America. He does not accuse anyone; he paid tribute, in fact, to correspondents here for their fairness. He recognizes the old principle that the news is man bites dog. And he is not claiming that Japan can soon be American, he does believe that Japan can attain the sure foundation of democracy and civil liberties on which a young American once built and that time they will work for her.

The evangelist, the prophet, the fond father, suddenly vanished in a boyish grin. "You better watch yourself when you start writing all this," counseled the general, "or those people back in Washington will say, 'Well, you went to Tokyo and MacArthur sold you a bill of goods!'"

Expanded Social Security Plan Would Cover Many More People

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—THE BILL TO change the social security program, passed Wednesday by the House and due for Senate action next year, would give help to a whole new group of people who can't get it under the present law.

They are:

1. Those who are covered by the law but become totally and permanently disabled before reaching 65 when they would have been eligible for an old age pension. Under the bill, if it became law, they'd receive a pension at the time they'd become totally and permanently disabled, equal to the pension they'd have received if they reached 65. This would cost the government about \$700 million a year.

2. Those who are not covered by the law, and therefore not entitled to a pension at any age, but who are now or become totally and permanently disabled.

THE GOVERNMENT WOULD GIVE money to help them too. This No. 2 plan is called assistance and would cost the government about \$66 million a year.

Here's a further explanation of what the present law does and how the bill, if it became law, would make changes:

Old Age Assistance.—Every state has a program for making cash payments to people over 65 who live at home and are in need.

(This is not to be confused with the old age insurance program.)

Under the present law the government gives states and local governments money to add to the money which they give needy old people. The government now is footing about 55 per cent of the bill at a cost of about \$800 million a year. If the bill became law, the cost to the government would go up about another \$75 million.

THE NEEDY BLIND.—THE FEDERAL government and the states—except Missouri, Pennsylvania, and Nevada which have their own program—chip in to help needy blind people. About 70,000 needy blind people are receiving this help. The combined average payment to them is \$46.

The federal contribution in this program is about 45 per cent—or \$16.5 million a year.

Under the bill federal help would be increased about \$1,900,000.

Aid to Dependent Children.—They're children who—with one or both parents dead, or disabled, or separated—are living with one parent or a relative.

The combined government-state payments to families for such dependent children average \$72.75, with about three children per family.

THE GOVERNMENT CONTRIBUTION to this program is about 42 per cent—or around \$200 million a year. If the bill became law, the cost to the government would go up another \$106 million.

Child Welfare Services.—Every state has a program for child care, such as protecting those in danger of becoming delinquents. The government contributes \$3.5 million to this. The bill would double this, making the total cost to the government \$7 million.

The present programs outlined here cost the government around \$1,020,000,000.

The changes proposed under the bill—including the new program for the disabled—would bring the total cost to the government to \$1,968,900,000.

The House has passed the bill but the Senate probably won't act until next year, if then, so there'll be no changes before 1950.

DROP BELOW 13 INDICATED

Puberty Coming To Children Earlier, Specialist Reveals

BERKELEY, Calif. — Puberty now is coming to children 1 to 2 years earlier than it did two generations ago, says a University of California child welfare specialist, Prof. Harold E. Jones.

The average age for the beginning of adolescence in American and European girls now is around 13 years, he said, and recent data indicate a drop even below 13. Sixty years ago the average was between 15 and 16 years.

In the last 9 years boys have been reaching puberty at around 14 years of age, Jones reported. Prior to 1900 the average was 15 to 16 years.

Why this is happening Jones does not know. Some of the factors influencing the lives of children should delay rather than advance adolescence, he said. Among them are the efforts to reduce child mortality. This might be expected to produce a larger number of physically below average children with a tendency toward late maturity.

The best available explanation, Jones said, is that environmental factors such as better nutrition, improved medical care and greater emphasis on mental welfare.

Earlier than average puberty is a handicap to girls, but an advantage to boys, Prof. Jones found. The precocious girl finds herself "physically very conspicuous" at a time when consciousness is not valued in her age group. She is below average in prestige, sociability, leadership, cheerfulness, poise and expressiveness.

This girl has interests in boys and social activities more mature than those of her own age. Physical

ly she is a year or two out of step with the girls of her class and three or four years ahead of the boys. Late maturing girls do not have this trouble, Jones said, because they are in step with the average boy of their age group.

Boys who develop slowly, however, are handicapped because their age group values physical strength and sports prowess. The boys who reach puberty early are free of these psychological difficulties and thus less hampered in their striving for leadership and

prestige.

Contrary to popular belief, puberty does not occur earlier in the tropics than in the temperate climates. The mean age for California girls was 13.1 years. This figure matches closely the age average found by other researchers elsewhere in the United States and Europe.

Studies in Brazil, Peru, Panama and the Philippines show the mean age for puberty in girls is one to two years more than 13.1, Prof. Jones reported.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Prophet Warns People To Repent Evil Ways

Scripture—Isaiah 1:10-20; Jeremiah 7.

Isaiah, Prophet of God, warned his people that disaster would inevitably follow if they persisted in their evil ways. Isaiah prophesied probably about the year 740 B. C., Jeremiah around 615 B. C.

"Is this world any better today, or is it still in need of these prophetic warnings uttered so many hundreds of years ago? Alas, the answer is no! as we read the day's news we know that men are still worshipping strange gods. Murder, persecution, selfishness, greed, envy, are everywhere in the globe. We must admit, the world as a whole is better in some respects, but still very far from what it should be.

Modern prophets are still calling upon the people to "Wash you, make you clean, put away the evil of your doings from before Mine eyes; cease to do evil."

"Learn to do well; seek judgment, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow."

Many go to church, perform the various rites of their particular denomination, but how many think seriously of what they are doing and its meaning? How many try to live the Christlike every day? Many do, of course, but not all far from it.

Isaiah's words about the worthlessness of religious rites which are not backed up by right living, are also pertinent today as they were before Christ's coming.

"What unto Me is the multitude of your sacrifices? saith Jehovah. I have had enough of the burnt-offering of rams, and the fat of fed beasts; and I delight not in the blood of bullocks, or of lambs, or of he-goats.

"Bring no more vain oblations; incense is an abomination unto Me; new moons and sabbaths, the calling of assemblies, I cannot away with; it is iniquity even the solemn meeting.

"Your new moons and your appointed feasts My soul hate; they are a trouble unto Me; I am weary to bear them.

"And when ye spread forth your hands, I will hide Mine eyes from you; yea, when ye make many prayers, I will not hear; your hands are full of blood."

"Your appointed feasts," refers to the great assemblies at the Jews' Passover, the Feast of the Tabernacles, and others. The solemn meetings were the solemnities which concluded these festivities.

Jehovah, through Moses, had ordained these meetings, but they were now abominable to Jehovah, because they meant nothing; the people's hands were "full of blood."

They committed horrible crimes and sinned terribly.

Isaiah could tell the people what they should do to please the Lord, but they themselves were the only ones who could cleanse their hearts and lives of all sins and return to Him.

The Lord promised that if they did this, "though your sins be as

scarlet, they shall be as white as snow." He does not despair of human beings; they have the power to turn from evil and do good.

In the prophet Jeremiah's time the Jewish people had fallen to a very low spiritual state.

"Stand in the gate of the Lord's house," Jehovah said to Jeremiah, "and proclaim this word, and say, Hear the word of the Lord, all ye of Judah, that enter in at the gates to worship the Lord."

"Amend your ways, and your doings, and I will cause you to dwell in this place."

He accused them of making His temple a den of robbers, defiling it. If they would not change their ways, He would cast them out of His sight and He rebuked their heathen ways—gathering wood, kindling fires, kneading dough to make cakes to the queen of heaven—called Ishtar by the Babylonians; Ashtoreth in Zidonian inscriptions—heathen deities.

Obedience to God's laws was what He wanted most of all. That is what He asks of us today.

U. S. To Support Cottonseed Price

Government price support for cottonseed has been announced in the amount of \$46.50 a ton, according to information relayed by the Commodity Credit Corporation to the local AAA office.

Local ginners have been paying \$36 a ton for the seed, compared to the \$80 minimum they were paying a year ago. The price drop resulted when a shortage of the cottonseed oil was eased. The local price started at 45 a ton this year, then dropped to \$40 before skidding to \$38.

The loan offer will expire Dec. 31, according to M. Weaver of the local AAA office.

Local agricultural observers expect at least 17,000 tons of cottonseed to be gathered in Howard county this year, compared to the 7,000 yield of a year ago.

The added income resulting from the CCS's decision to jack up the price could amount to as much as \$50,000 this year for Howard county farmers.

Market Steady In Livestock Sale Here

The market remained steady compared to the decline in other markets at the Big Spring Livestock Auction company's sale Wednesday.

Fat cows brought from 14.00 to 16.00 and bulls from 16.00 to 17.00. Butcher cows sold for 12.00 to 14.00, good butcher calves and yearlings from 19.00 to 23.00 and stocker steer calves from 20.00 to 22.00.

Heifer calves inspired bids of 19.00 to 20.00, cows and calves up to 19.00 and hogs from 20.00 to 25.00.

The barn handled approximately 600 cattle and 75 to 100 hogs during the afternoon.

House Passes Security Bill

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7. — Riding a triumphant 333 to 14 House vote, legislation vastly expanding the nation's social security program moved over to the Senate Thursday.

It would add 11 million to the 35 million workers now covered by old age insurance.

Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the Senate Finance Committee said the Senate is bound to vote for higher security benefits, but will not be able to act before the second session of the 81st Congress convenes in January.

The new bill would raise the minimum old age benefit from \$10 a month to \$25. It would increase the maximum benefit for an elderly couple from \$85 to around \$126 a month.

In addition to blanketing new millions under old age and survivors insurance, for a total of 46 million covered workers, the 201-page bill would:

1. Boost benefits by 70 to 80 per cent or more.

2. Create new disability insurance, to take care of persons who by illness or accident can never work again.

3. Increase the payroll taxes on employee and employer. The tax would go up from the present 1 per cent on each, to 1 1/2 per cent next year; 2 per cent in 1951; 2 1/2 per cent in 1952; 3 per cent in 1953; and to 3 1/4 per cent on each in 1970.

Among new groups wrapped into the program are self-employed persons, domestic servants and employees of state and local governments. This might mean the institution of a stamp book plan for 750,000 servants and their housewife employers, to collect the security taxes.

Odham Fined \$100

L. E. Odham entered a plea of guilty in county court this morning to the charge of driving while under the influence of intoxicants and was fined \$100 and costs by Judge J. F. Brown. Odham also lost the right to use his driver's license for the ensuing six months.

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Odessa Nitroglycerine Explosion Was No Accident, Says Sheriff

ODESSA, Oct. 7. (U. S. A.)—Sheriff Earnest Broughton said a shattering explosion of a nitroglycerine dump Thursday was no accident.

He said tire tracks indicated someone had stolen some of the explosives and then deliberately set off the remainder.

The blast was heard for miles. The Odessa American received calls from as far as 15 miles west and 32 miles south inquiring about the explosion.

No one was injured. The solidified nitroglycerine was in a small storage building in a desolate area of mesquite and cactus ten miles southwest of here.

The building, containing 2,000 quarts of the explosive, belonged to the Larkin Torpedo Company of Odessa. It is one of several Odessa firms supplying oil operators.

The blast dug two craters five feet deep, destroyed the building and ripped up the surrounding area.

Broughton said tire tracks leading away from the scene indicated someone had backed a truck up to

the magazine, stolen some of the explosives and then set a time bomb.

He said solidified nitroglycerine usually can be exploded only by a detonator or time cap.

Shorty Windham, employee of the Larkin firm, was the first to discover the source of the explosion.

The sheriff said whoever stole the explosives and exploded the remainder "knew his business" because he went to the solidified nitroglycerine dump, ignoring nearby liquid nitroglycerine.

21 Persons Injured As Elevator Drops

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 7. (U. S. A.)—A crowded passenger elevator in a downtown store suddenly plunged two floors Thursday and then halted with jarring impact, injuring 21 persons.

Automatic safety devices halted the elevator after it went out of control. Many of the injured were released after a hospital examination. Three, however, suffered leg fractures.

The accident occurred in fashionable Hartford Store during a heavy afternoon shopping period. The elevator, dropped when a heavy steel plate holding the car's cables gave way. Building Superintendent Russell Faubion said.

Navy Bomber Makes Flight Of 4,863 Miles

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 7. (U. S. A.)—The Navy Neptune bomber "worked like a clock" when it made the longest flight — 4,863 miles non-stop — from an aircraft carrier.

Commander Frederick L. Ashworth of Palo Alto, Calif., was the pilot. He alternated at the controls with Lt. Cmdr. G. S. Morrison of Clearwater, Fla., co-pilot, and Lt. (jg) L. A. Cox of Atchison, Kan., the navigator. All got some sleep.

The plane, a twin-engine craft capable of carrying the atomic bomb, had 250 gallons of gasoline left when it landed here Thursday. It was 25 hours and 42 minutes in the air.

It was launched Wednesday from the aircraft carrier Midway off Norfolk, Va.

The plane left the Midway with a crew of seven on what the Navy termed a training flight.

Although the Navy declined comment, the flight coincided with Congress reopening investigation into charges that the Air Force is expanding at the expense of the Navy.

The plane refueled here and then left for its home base at Moffett Field, Calif.

Crewmen included John Hay, Jr., of Andover, Mass.; Warren Mason of Gastonia, N. C.; I. E. Lovett of Alachua, Fla.; and L. M. Bertstrom of Jersey Shore, Pa.

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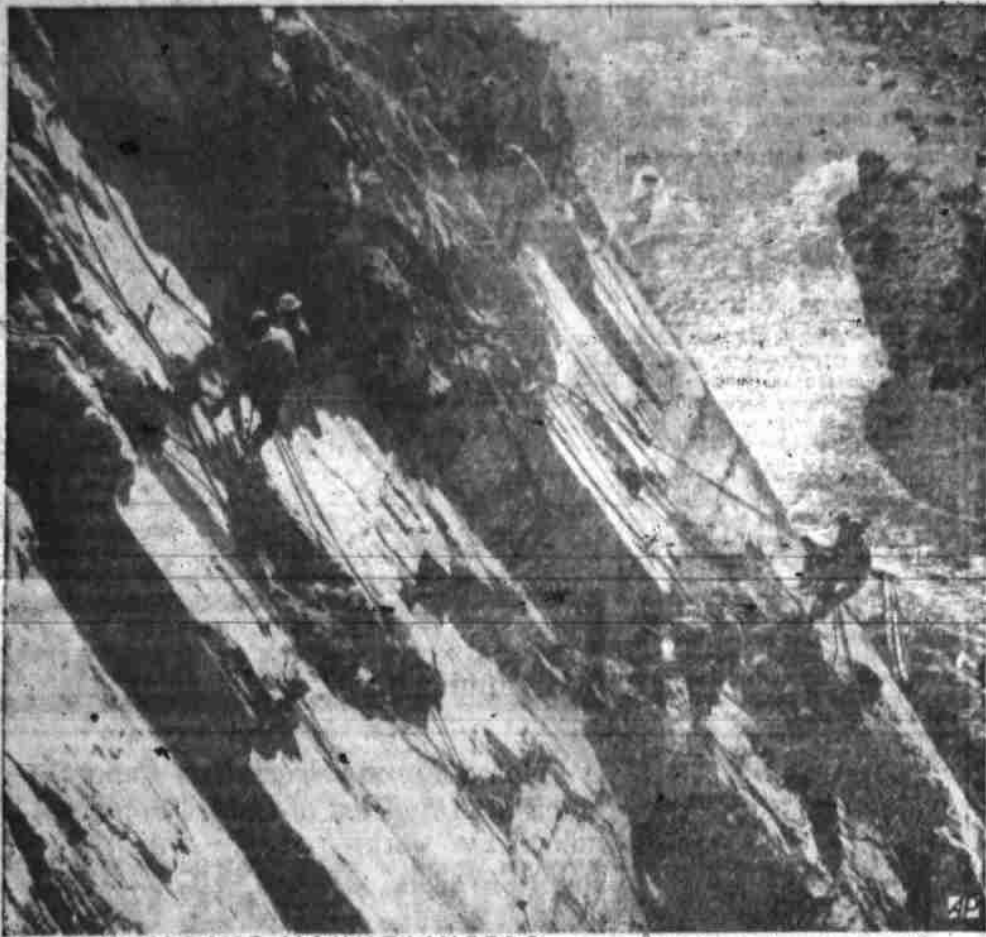

Pre-School Training Should Start At Home

Parents are responsible for guiding junior's early learning experiences. In the day-to-day living before school, opportunities must be provided a child to develop a strong healthy body, an alert inquiring mind, enjoyment of friends of his own, increasing independence in thinking and action, and a sense of well-being in living. The patterns which are established during the years before six will have an important bearing on the way a child finds his place in a school situation.

That is what Bess Goodykoonz director, Division of Elementary Education, says in a foreword of the recently published pamphlet of the U. S. Office of Education, "Preparing Your Child For School" (Pamphlet No. 108).

This little volume answers such questions as "When Is A Child Ready For School?" "What Does The School Expect?" "How Can The Home Help A Child Make A Good School Adjustment?" and "How Can Home And School Work Together?"

When is a child ready for school? The answer lies in junior's development, in his strong and weak points. And, says the Office of Education, it is not fair to decide this by comparing him with neighbors or friends' children.

It is important to take into account the kind of experiences he has had before going off to school, as well as to know what kind of a child he is, that is, how he has been growing. For example, junior may be well-developed physically, yet be quite immature in getting on with other children. A 6-year-old may be as advanced as a 7-year-old in language, yet so clumsy in using tools or drawing that a 4-year-old could surpass him.

Growing up is a two-way process demanding adjustments on the part of the child and his parent all along the way. Long before the time arrives to send junior to school there will be opportunities for him to have experiences through which he will gradually learn to guide his own actions. He may go to a playmate's home for an afternoon, to grandmother's for a little vacation, or stay with a friend while Daddy and Mother are away on a trip. These and similar experiences, meeting new people, being in strange places, and learning to get along without his parents are important to his growing before he needs to know how to read. He led around.

What does the school expect? Not much from junior. There is no

expectation that he will know his ABC's or be able to count to 10. He needs to know how to read. He goes to school to learn how. There may be a few children who are ready for reading early in the first grade, but the majority need to have experiences of many kinds to build sufficient background with words and their meanings. If children are forced to try to read before they are ready, they may even develop a distaste for reading, which may effect their desire to learn and retard other progress throughout school.

Learning is a step by step process according to the child's own readiness to mature and organize his impressions of the world. The experiences which junior is offered all the way from birth to his fifth or sixth year and his relationships with others are tremendously important in determining the progress he makes. Good sound preparation for school is found if the planning for growth allows opportunities to explore growing in dependence, and learn about the world.

It is really "at a parent's knee" that children begin to get ready for school. Parents may have no conscious thought of school as they gradually drop off doing for the child so that he may do more for himself. Nevertheless, they are encouraging the child to learn by what they do or do not do for him. And the child who takes an active part in family life is more likely to cope with situations outside the family than is one who has never helped.

Parents can help a child grow in independence through allowing time and opportunity for him to carry responsibility for such simple things as: dressing and undressing himself; hanging up his wraps; caring for his toileting needs; putting his toys and personal belongings away; helping in simple family chores; going on errands; answering the telephone; meeting visitors in the home and entering into the table conversation.

Living in a family circle, a child absorbs many things. He will notice, for example, that adults cover their mouths when coughing, use handkerchiefs, and keep things out of their mouths. These are important health lessons to be practiced before junior enters a group.

A child who knows there is no place like home finds school a good place too. He can leave his parents and go into the new experience confidently; he can put his full attention on the tasks ahead. The child who is uncertain of the love of his parents, who is unhappy at home, is torn within and can give only a part of his attention to his school work.

Ex-Socialite Cleared In Slaying Of Son

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Oct. 7. (AP)—Mrs. Martha Woodson Kalwa, former Virginia society girl and child psychology student, has been acquitted in the fatal beating of her 15-months old son.

But the tall, blonde wife of a Hazleton, Pa., dentist is not free to return immediately to her home and two other children—one born while Mrs. Kalwa was in police custody.

A neutral psychiatrist—one who did not testify during the trial—was to examine her today to determine if she can safely be discharged. Mrs. Kalwa had pleaded temporary insanity while beating her son, Henry, to death on May 1.

Defense Counsel John H. Bigelow sought immediate release of Mrs. Kalwa last night after the jury of nine women and three men brought in its verdict following nearly four hours of deliberations. District Attorney Leon Schwartz

Mrs. Kalwa showed no emotion as the verdict was read. Finally, as she fully realized the significance of the decision, a wave smile spread across her face.

Then she rose and thanked the jurors individually for their acquittal verdict.

Mrs. Kalwa's husband said after the verdict had been returned that he hopes to return with his wife to Rustburg, Va., her former home, to "pick up the threads of our life together."

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Young Woman Held In Killing Of Police Chief

HEARNE, Oct. 7. (U. P.) — Police Chief N. L. Miller Thursday was killed by a blast from a .12 gauge shotgun when he went to investigate a disturbance at a home in East Hearne.

Sheriff Bob Reeves said officers arrested Mrs. Lucille Winck, 21, and took her to the county jail at Franklin.

Knox Tidwell, an officer who had accompanied Miller, said the shot came through a glass window in front of the house about 20 feet from the officer.

Tidwell went for aid and was joined by Reeves and deputies from Franklin. The house was surrounded and the officers fired several shots before Mrs. Winck walked out the back door.

The one-year-old son of Mrs. Winck was in the house at the time. Justice of the Peace J. E. Mooney held an inquest. Reeves said Moore entered a verdict that Miller's death was "due to gunshot wounds at the hands of Mrs. Lucille Winck."

County Attorney Bill Palmer said that he would file murder charges today. She made a written statement.

Tidwell said that Mrs. Winck was a housekeeper for Tom Luster and that Luster and Mrs. Winck had been arguing before the shooting took place. Tidwell said it was Luster's telephone call that brought Miller to the house.

Reeves said that Mrs. Winck had once been treated in an institution for epilepsy.

Big Snails Will Get Bum's Rush

BALTIMORE, Oct. 7. (U. P.) — Giant, crop-destroying snails, stowaways from the Orient, were slated to get a scientific bum's rush today.

The snails were discovered aboard the Greek freighter Aspasia Nemikos amid a cargo of scrap iron from the Pacific Island of Salpan.

Unloading operations were halted and officials of the Bureau of Plant Quarantine and Entomology ordered a fumigating job. The government scientists had to accumulate about 1,000 pounds of deadly hydrogen cyanide gas for the work.

Officials estimated the fumigation will cost from \$20,000 to \$25,000 but said it would be worth the price. One of the fast-multiplying creatures can devour a head of lettuce in a single night when it reaches adult size—five inches.

Authorities said the plant snails had moved from the Orient to Salpan with Japanese forces in World War II.

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Modern Medicine Still Virtually Helpless Against Common Cold

CHICAGO, Oct. 7. (U. P.) — Modern medicine, which slays germs by the billions, is virtually helpless against the sniffles of a common cold, the Journal of the American Medical Association said today.

And, the publication says, patent medicine makers don't know the cold cure secret either. Nor do those people who always ply the cold sufferer with advice.

Apparently, you just can't (underline can't) cure it. It runs its course.

The magazine's consultant says in his article, however, that it's a pretty safe bet that the best way to ease a common cold attack is to rest quietly in bed.

There are a few ways to ease cold symptoms temporarily. And, it seems well established that an on-coming cold can sometimes be aborted by "reasonable doses" of alcohol. This, the magazine says is because "it causes peripheral vasodilation and re-establishes circulation in chilled cutaneous and mucosal surfaces."

It other words, it brings a rush of blood into cold skin or nose lining.

So when a doctor does something for your cold, he just eases the acute symptoms, such as headache (with aspirin).

But, the "same and effective measure," is to stay warm and relaxed in bed, especially if fever is present. It "diminishes the severity of the common cold, limits its spread to others and reduces the frequency of complications."

Nose drops? Gargles? Volatile inhalers? Diet? Water-drinking Salves? The Journal says their benefits are generally exaggerated in conversation and advertising.

The gargle, for example. The Journal says "although popular with the public, gargling has little therapeutic utility. A number of investigators find that gargled material will not pass beyond the third molar tooth... because the act of gargling produces a restrictive influence."

Navy Captain Is Suspended In Morale Case

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7. — The Navy Thursday suspended Capt John G. Crommelin from duty and denied to Congress that the morale of Naval officers and men is in sad shape.

These developments piled up quickly in the wake of Crommelin's admission that he is the man who gave news reporters on Monday official correspondence about Navy morale.

The Navy suspended Crommelin, 46-year-old aviation veteran, from duty and ordered him restricted to his home. That is a preliminary action pending final disposition of his case. There is the possibility of a court martial.

Secretary of the Navy Matthews went before the House Armed Services Committee and said he believes Navy morale generally is good. Without calling Crommelin's name, Matthews in effect accused him of disloyalty, faithlessness, and insubordination.

3. President Truman told a news conference he has instructed Matthews to get to the bottom of the controversy swirling about charges that the Navy is not being given a fair deal in present military unification policies.

Mr. Truman declined to comment on Crommelin's release of private Navy correspondence critical of defense policies.

Wife Remains True To Fire Department

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7. (U. P.) — While Fireman Frederick Naranjo was on duty at the station house, he charges, fellow Fireman Paul Fox took his place at home.

Naranjo, 31, conceding his wife Terry, 24, had remained true to the department if not to him. Thursday pressed his divorce action, naming Fox, 30, as co-respondent. They worked at the same station but not the same shifts.

"Some of the neighbors thought Fox was a boarder and were amazed when they found that Mr. Naranjo didn't know about it," said the latter's lawyer, Maurice J. Hindin. "The Naranjo children were even referring to Fox as 'daddy.'"

Mrs. Naranjo denied all.
