Highway Accidents Claim Two Lives In Succession

Two grinding wrecks within a 12 hour period claimed the lives of two men in Mitchell County Thursday, bringing the total highway death count for the year to three, as compared to six last year.

Mark Edmonson, 22, Rt. 1, Colorado City, lost

his life as he was driving north on Highway 208 about midnight Wednesday.

Thomas Waylen Holder, Jr., 19, of Snyder, died when a pickup he was driving collided head-on with an oil transport truck Thursday about noon.

Edmonson apparently lost control of his vehicle, while travelling at a high rate of speed, just before reaching the Scurry County line.

The vehicle ran off of the highway on the west side and travelled a short distance on the gravel shoulder before coming back up onto the asphalt surface, sliding sideways down the highway.

The car left the highway, traveled up a sand-drift along a fence line, was airborne for a moment then crashed to the ground and rolled four and one-half times, throwing Edmonson out on the first roll and apparently rolling over him.

The car came to rest on its top.

Highway Patrolman James Burson was contacted by the Colorado City Police dispatcher after a person residing near the scene of the accident contacted the station reporting he had heard the wreck.

Burson arrived at the wreck site to find several persons near the wreckage.

He noted they were under the impression the driver had walked away from the wreck because there was no one in the car.

Burson began a search of the area and located Edmonson. After testing for vital signs and finding none, Burson immediately contacted the Mitchell County Ambulance Service and Justice of the Peace Mary Lee Moore, who arrived and declared Edmonson dead.

Shortly after Burson's arrival on the scene, Highway Patrolman

Buddy Hertenberger, Deputy Mike Stutts and Highway Patrolman Tracy Tipton arrived to assist.

Holder, the second fatal accident victim, was

travelling east on Mary-Neal Road (a caliche and gravel road) one mile off of Highway 208 about 17 miles south of Colorado City in a 1979

Lightning Strikes Oil Tank-Battery

Thursday evening a tank-battery just outside Westbrook toward Iatan flats was struck by lightning and exploded.

Pumper Rita Ellett, who resides in Westbrook, heard the explosion and report on the scanner that a tank located near highway mile marker 200 had been hit by lightning.

"Because I have several tanks in that area, I rushed to my pickup and drove over there," Mrs. Ellett said.

"It was raining and hailing hard when I arrived," she said. "When I got there, I was relieved to discover it was not my tank that had been hit."

She had a two-way radio in the pickup and radioed to report the tank was on fire and be-

longed to J.R. Frizzell.

She requested the Coahoma Fire Department be contacted and then took a closer look at the damaged tank.

The top of the burning 210 tank had been blown off, falling about 20-30 feet away.

The gun barrel (the separator where oil and water are divided, with the oil flowing on the top and the water on the bottom) had been completely melted, she said.

Only a few feet of oil remained in the tank and fire was shooting out of the gas vent over a nearby tank.

As the fire trucks began to roll in, the rain and hail subsided. Two trucks were forced to remain on the road and could not follow the four-wheel drive truck down into the muddy

Sales Rebate Shows Local Economy Good

Contrary to the apparent downward trend of national economy, Colorado City is apparently experiencing a definite upward trend with the city sales-tax receipts showing about 35 per cent increase over last year.

Since the beginning of the states fiscal year, October 1, the city has received \$78,536.40 in retail sales-tax returns.

This is an increase of \$27,387.83 over the \$51,148.57 reported to date in 1979.

These tax receipts are derived from the five per cent sales-tax (five cents on every one dollar) added to every taxable purchase in the city.

From each five cents collected, the city gets one cent and the state receives the other four cents.

City officials estimate

how good retail sales will be for the 12 month period and include that amount in forming the city's budget.

If the sales-tax receipts are more than estimated, the city has money left over at the end of the year.

Revenues for the 1979-1980 city budget year ending in May were estimated at \$140,000 and actual receipts derived from the tax were about \$139,000.

For 1980-81 budget year, the city hall estimated about \$145,000 in sales-tax revenue.

Town Talk

The details on the community survey conducted by Wallace Center last month are very enlightening, especially the comments.

It was amazing how similar the results were on the polls of adults and teenagers. Almost every category came out the same, percentagewise.

High school students were polled on suggestions for improving the educational environment of the community and their suggestions, in their words, for the high school campus included:

-More required math, more emphasis on fine arts.

-Picnic tables around the campus.

-English, I feel that it is not as it should be. I feel that people are overreacting to the whole situation.

-End English IV as a requirement. Another comment on English IV was that, since the requirement of English IV, people have begun to fail. I think English IV should be eradicated—should only be an elective.

-Strive for more strict discipline in schools—more distinct rules and regulations.

-Stricter punishment for kids who tend to have too many tardies or bad conduct.

-More extra-curricular activities—English IV should be an elective because so many kids have failed this year.

General comments from around the community on the schools included:

-Less emphasis on sports and more on academics.

-Raise the passing grade from 60 to 70—pay teachers more to help draw more quality teachers.

-Sex education to be taught before high school age.

-Provide rodeo team activities.

-Giving each child more personal attention on subjects that he or she is having trouble with.

-Parent discipline of own children, support, help if and when necessary, more teachers, better pay, return to reading, writing and arithmetic, look at the necessary things, fine arts, money needs to be carefully spent—teachers furnish their cars, large expensive trips—are they necessary or are they a fringe benefit? Trips on buses—extra ones—contest—are they worthwhile or is it a payoff for good work all-or some of the year? I'm for good and valuable educational participation but not just a payoff.

-Most kids we know can barely read or spell—their math isn't too good either. I think these areas in school need a lot of attention.

-Passing grade to 70 or above—require more basic subjects in eighth grade—more time spent on basic reading in K-3—probably more than one period.

-Educate the parents of students so that all parents will know what grade level should be learning—education should be tripartite effort with the teachers, the parents and the community working together to educate the whole child—with the teachers doing the actual teaching of the basics, with the parents and the community setting the example for acceptable social behavior, the parents seeing that the children do their homework, and teaching acceptable social concepts.

-That school children be required to know how to read, write sentences and spell words correctly. This area of education is deplorable in too many students.

-It is discouraging to observe the poor spelling of students who are already in high school.

-Less emphasis on extra curricular activities—elimination of the use of school time for club meetings.

-There should be more vocational classes—not all students will go on to college and the student who goes into the job market needs to be better able to compete for jobs.

-A greater emphasis on speech and drama classes plus more reading preparation in grade school. There should be periodic checks on reading level and those who have not reached that level should be retained in a remedial program until proficiency is obtained.

-A serious look should be given to the grade passing level of 60. This should be raised to 70. Also our exemption policy needs to be revised. No student should be exempt for making the minimum requirements regardless of the number of days he attends class. Such policies as these attribute to low achievement.

-More parents to take an interest in their children.

-More work from textbooks instead of memo sheets.

All of the comments in the survey are being funneled to the persons involved.

"The public is invited to come join in our Dedication Day Services," Rev. Grayson said.

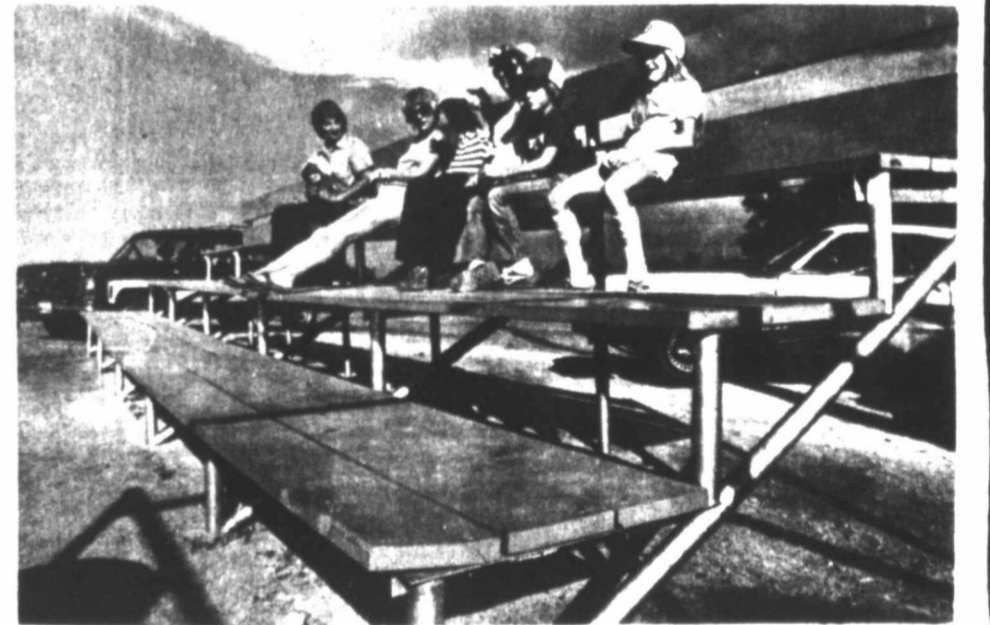
Day Care Center To Host BBQ

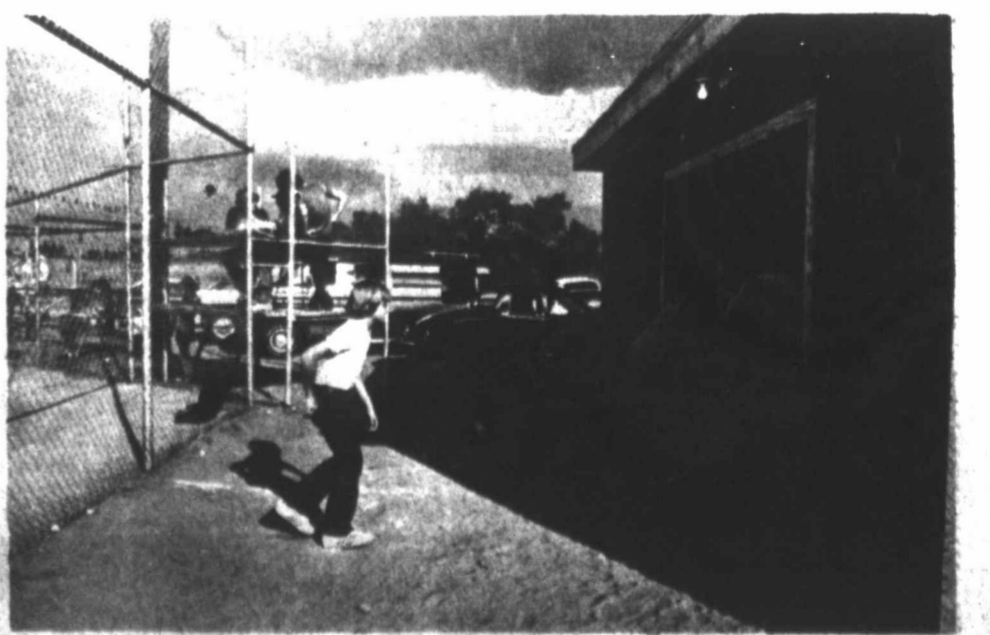
Rev. Robert Bracy will wield the basting brush and personnel from the center will act as hostesses.

This money is allocated for use in the general fund operations and according to City Tax-Assessor Collector Brenda Tarter, a low estimate of revenues is always used when figuring the budget to allow for a slight leeway.

"In light of the deficiency last year, because of an error by Comptroller Bob Bullock, which resulted in a local taxpayer over paying the sales tax, we received less than what we budgeted," she said.

"However, sales receipts exceeded our anticipations and we are pleased that sales-tax receipts are up. This is a compliment to our local economy," Mrs. Tarter said.

Sales-tax receipts for this period totalled \$27,081.37, while they totalled \$20,143.27 for the same period last year.

Chevrolet pickup. A 1979 International tank truck, driven by Jerry Ray Rhode, 39, of Clyde, was travelling west on the same road.

The 10,000 gallon tanker, owned by Dono Company, of Abilene, was nearly empty with only 2,500 gallons remaining in the tank.

The pickup and tanker collided at the crest of the hill, knocking the pickup sideways into the south bar ditch in an upright position, killing Holder instantly, according to investigating officer Highway Patrolman Frank Costabile.

The tanker truck slid about 72 feet down the road and into a bar ditch, where the left front wheel fell off.

A vehicle following behind the tanker, alerted by the rising dust, stopped just short of the wrecked pickup.

The driver leaped from his vehicle and rushed to the pickup to check for any signs of life, finding none and seeing the driver of the tanker uninjured and running toward the pickup, the man returned to his vehicle and drove to the nearest phone to call an ambulance.

Mitchell County Ambulance Service contacted the Colorado City Police dispatcher, who contacted Costabile.

The ambulance arrived only moments before the THP and reported the driver of the pickup was dead and pinned in the wreckage.

Costabile checked the body for life signs and finding none sent for Justice of the Peace Mary Lee Moore and the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department Rescue Squad.

THP Officers Tom Johnson and James Burson and Deputy David Ginkinger assisted at the scene of the accident.

The tanker was checked for any possible leakage or spillage.

The Rescue Squad arrived to pry the steering column, left door and dashboard away from the victim.

The left side of the pickup was completely demolished. It was necessary to remove the victim from the right side of the vehicle.

A wrecker service from Big Spring was contacted and removed the tanker to Abilene.

Dooney Wrecker Service was contacted and removed the pickup, owned by Holder Construction Company, to Snyder.

You do not so much let the pastor down as you let yourself, your God and your whole congregation down because your neglect says that your faith, your church and your neighbor are just not that important!

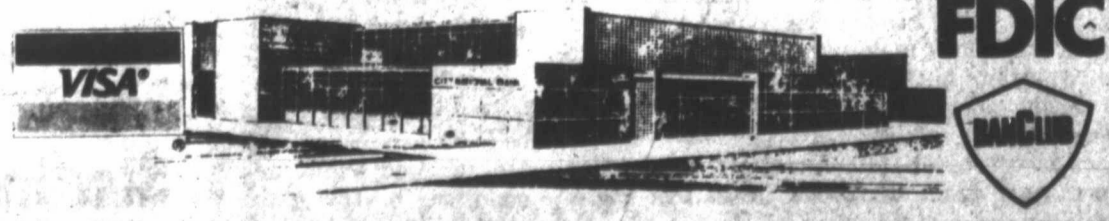

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Monthly Police Report

Thirty-one adults and four juveniles were arrested in the month of May following crimes in Colorado City.

Crimes against persons involving two assaults were cleared by the Colorado City Police Department.

Two vandalism occurred with \$300 in damages reported; neither was cleared.

Crimes against properties numbered four. All were burglaries and there was only \$65 in lost goods and \$36 in damages reported. One was cleared.

In the crimes against autos category, there were three reported. None were cleared and \$390 in merchandise was lost.

Eight thefts, under \$200, were reported in the month of May. Of those, only two were cleared. \$400 in merchandise was taken and \$180 was recovered by city police.

One car was stolen in May; the car was priced at \$1,500. The theft was cleared and the car recovered.

Twelve accidents took place in May and of those, only one was major. There were three hit-and-runs reported. The damages in those accidents totalled about \$4,200.

Overall, it looks like crime is on the upswing from this same time last year.

Accidents are down with 77 reported so far this year and 80 at this time last year.

We have now had 70 minor "bump-ins" to 74 last year. There have been seven major accidents this year compared to five major accidents last year.

There was also one fatality last year.

Damages in wrecks this year totalled about \$30,700 compared to \$40,000 last year.

Comparison of crimes from this year to last year are as follows:

Crimes against persons to date total eleven, with eight cleared. This compared to just seven last year.

Property crimes rose from 10 to 16. Five of those 16 were cleared with \$1,500 taken and nothing recovered.

There have been 14 reported auto burglaries with none cleared, compared to nine last year. There was \$2,900 lost in merchandise.

Auto thefts have stayed the same with four reported and to date the clearance rate is 100 per cent.

There were four thefts over \$200 last year compared to three reported this year with a loss of \$9,200.

Total arrests are up from 152 to 173. Adult arrests are up from 130 to 143 and juvenile arrests are up from 22 to 30.
