## Meeting On STEP To Be Held Tuesday

A meeting with City of Memphis and Hall County officials with David M. Hartwig, Project Director of Seniors Texans Employment Program, has been arranged for Tuesday, Feb. 19, at 10 a. m. in the Chamber of Commerce Office.

Hall County has been selected as one of 21 counties in Texas to be eligible for Senior Texans Employment Program (STEP). STEP was created by the last session of the Texas legislature as a work-training program for low-income persons age 55 and over.

STEP enrollees may work on projects of beautification, conservation, recreation or restoration of historical sites and public buildings.

The purpose of the meeting is to establish sponsors, who can be any city, county, state or region.

al government agency. The Cost-share program is financed to a large extent from state funds.

STEP enrollees are paid \$1.60 per hour with a possible maximum of \$1,600 per year. Enrollees are covered with workmans compensation and general liability insurance. Mileage is paid to the driver if a crew must travel to a project site. A general physical examination is paid for by STEP on each elected enrollee.

STEP is in 21 counties: Bexar, Burleson, Cameron, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallas, DeWitt, Foard, Hall, Hidalgo, Lampasas, Lavaca, Leon, Limestone, Mills, Robertson, Starr, Tarrant, Victoria, Wilbarger and Zapata.

## Cyclone Loses Play-Off Game To Claude Fri.

A basketball championship for 1974 for the Memphis Cyclone was just not to be as the local lads, playing under less than desirable conditions of illness, lost to a fired up Claude Mustang team Friday night before a overflow crowd at Clarendon Jr. College gym.

The illness which began spreading through the Memphis student body last Thursday has brought about the closing of school on Tuesday of this week.

The Cyclone led 8 to 6 at the end of the first quarter, and got a 4-point lead in the second period, 18 to 14, but the Mustangs rallied to enjoy a 21 to 19 half-time edge.

The third period was the major point for the Claude team, as the Cyclone was unable to score much of the quarter, and Claude jumped to a 40 to 29 edge, enjoying a 15 point lead at one point.

The fourth quarter saw the Cyclone try to rally and get back into the ball game. Shooting percentages improved and the local team pulled to within 7 points, and had two additional opportunities to narrow the gap.

The game ended on a 62 to 53 note in Claude's favor.

"We had been very lucky all year long not to lose any boys to sickness," Coach Jimmy Pope said, "but sickness hit us at a crucial time and it definitely affected our play in the play-off."

"Claude played very well and in the last game they hit 51 per cent of their shots, 58 per cent in the last half, while the Cyclones only hit 38 per cent for the game."

The Cyclone coach in reviewing the game said that James Beck, the team's leading rebounder, got three fouls in the first half and had to sit out the entire third period. "Losing our best rebounder hurt and turnovers also hurt our effort," the coach said.

Practice sessions are already underway by team members and a hard-fought battle will ensue the night of the game, it is predicted.

## Area Girl's Teams Compete In Bi-dist. Action Tuesday

Hall County gins are just about all wrapped up as far as the 1973 cotton harvest is concerned as 8 of the 12 gins report completion and three of the other four expect to receive 50 or less bales each. So far, 99,394 bales have been received at county gins.

In all, less than a thousand bales remain to be brought to the gins, a survey this morning revealed.

According to a survey this morning, 99,394 bales were ginned by the 12 gins in Hall County. How much of this figure will be accredited to the county for the official figure is not known, but the Bureau of Census attempts to accredit each county with its cotton production.

Since Hall County has more gins, it seasonally gins more cotton than the county produces, as neighboring areas bring cotton into the county for processing.

A report from the three Turkey gins indicate their area is complete. There might be 100 bales remaining in the county north of Red River. Esteline is the only area still receiving "ricked" cotton and a rough estimate is about 500 bales remaining.

With all the scraping that could be done, Hall County gins might, in the final figure, reach the 100,000 mark, but could, also, fall short by a 100 bales or so. The gins need to harvest 606 more bales to reach the 100,000 mark.

Weather, which has remained ideal for harvesting, is becoming a big concern for farmers wanting to plow their fields. This county needs rain or any type moisture at this point.

### Sound Protection Advice!

Law Enforcement Officers have tried and tried to impress upon the American public some sound practices to observe in protecting themselves and their property. With things going as they are now, maybe it would be appropriate to review some of this advice.

First off, having a night light at your home or business is most valuable to discourage burglaries. More and more cases of gasoline theft from auto tanks is being reported as this light practice could be valuable advice for the area in which you park your vehicle.

Businessmen need to listen to Law Enforcement Officers on another matter also. That is the situation of the so-called "hot" checks. Businessmen get all upset if they get stuck with a worthless check and must go to the Law Enforcement Agency and seek punishment (or reimbursement) for the wrong.

But consider the facts they bring. "This fellow came in a bought some merchandise and asked if we'd take a check. My clerk took it for \$455. As near as the clerk can remember he was about 40 years old. . . . The check contains no identification of any kind. No driver's license number, any credit card number, or anything. It's written on a counter-type check on a distant bank. After a long investigation, Peace Officers find the same man wrote about five checks in Memphis before digging holes and no merchant asked for identification. What can be done? Unless some other town catches the man and he just happens to confess to writing the hot checks here, there really isn't anything that can be done.

Big city merchants demand identification before accepting checks from those customers they do not know personally. Why don't small town merchants do the same thing? The big danger is the "hot" check from the stranger. An individual living in this area, who goes on a hot check writing spree, usually gets caught and has to face the music. Merchants sometimes get at least a portion of their goods back.

Dogs are another good thing to discourage prowlers or would-be burglars. Even a dog penned in a back yard can let out a sufficient alarm to keep all but the brave hearted or foolish from a home. Dogs are not much protection, unless they are specially trained, but they are good alarm givers.

Some local firms have installed burglar alarms and some have doghouses. All firms, at one time or the other, have had problems with shop lifters. These are those individuals, young and old alike, who want merchandise without paying for it. The best defense against the shoplifter is alert sales personnel.

There is one thing which would aid Peace Officers in all investigations. This is an alert cooperative citizen. It is amazing how bits of information can lead to apprehension and conviction of those who have committed criminal activities, if the people keep their eyes open and are willing to cooperate.

In a small community, a strange car stands out like a sore thumb, especially if it has a new appearance. Possibly the biggest recreation activity in small communities is the practice of riding around. Little escapes the notice of these sight-seers.

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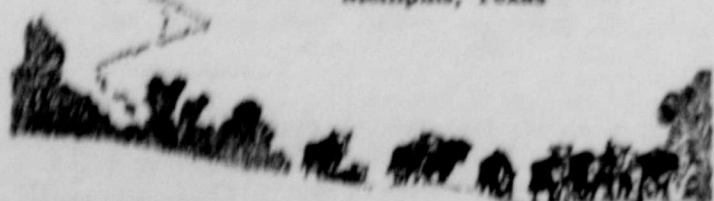

What Other Editors Say

Protecting Privacy

A "major initiative" toward protecting the personal privacy of Americans announced by President Nixon in his State of the Union message comes not a moment too soon.

Wildly multiplying computers of files containing the most intimate details of the lives of millions of individuals have created what some critics describe as a "foster state" in this country. Adequate safeguards against misuse of this enormous mass of information simply do not exist.

Data banks in the United States number in the thousands, ranging from 120 million records in the files of some 2500 credit agencies to the elaborate criminal history records on 4.4 million persons maintained in the FBI's National Crime Information Center.

The Civil Service Commission keeps files on more than one million Americans with real or imagined "subversive" associations. Some 40 million records of the most private nature are maintained by group health systems throughout the nation.

Many of these files are thoroughly documented. Information is routinely bought, sold and traded among credit agencies, after perpetuating error that damage individual credit ratings.

Police files are a notorious source of injustice, for all too often denials or not guilty verdicts just don't catch up with arrest records. Thousands of lives have been blighted because records of this sort take on a species of Orwellian immortality, surviving any rational need for them.

Fortunately, help seems to be on the way. Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N.C., is writing a bill to curb some of these abuses, and this week the Justice Dept. sends its own bill to Congress. Both measures seek the same objectives—to insure that police files are available only to bona fide law enforcement agencies, that files will be sealed after a fixed number of years, that police files must be kept current so disposal

tion of charges becomes a part of the record and, finally, that named individuals will have the right to inspect their files and require correction of errors.

These bills are only a halting start toward coming to grips with a monstrous problem and much work remains before acceptable legislation is written. Particular care must be used to guard against language that would restrict the right of news media to publish legitimate background information regarding individuals who find their way into the news.

But we welcome the start that has been made, and urge that it be pursued with dispatch. Computers never forget and can't discriminate between a legitimate

bid for the information they contain and one not so legitimate. There must be a strong law to protect the right to privacy regarding information in the computer banks.

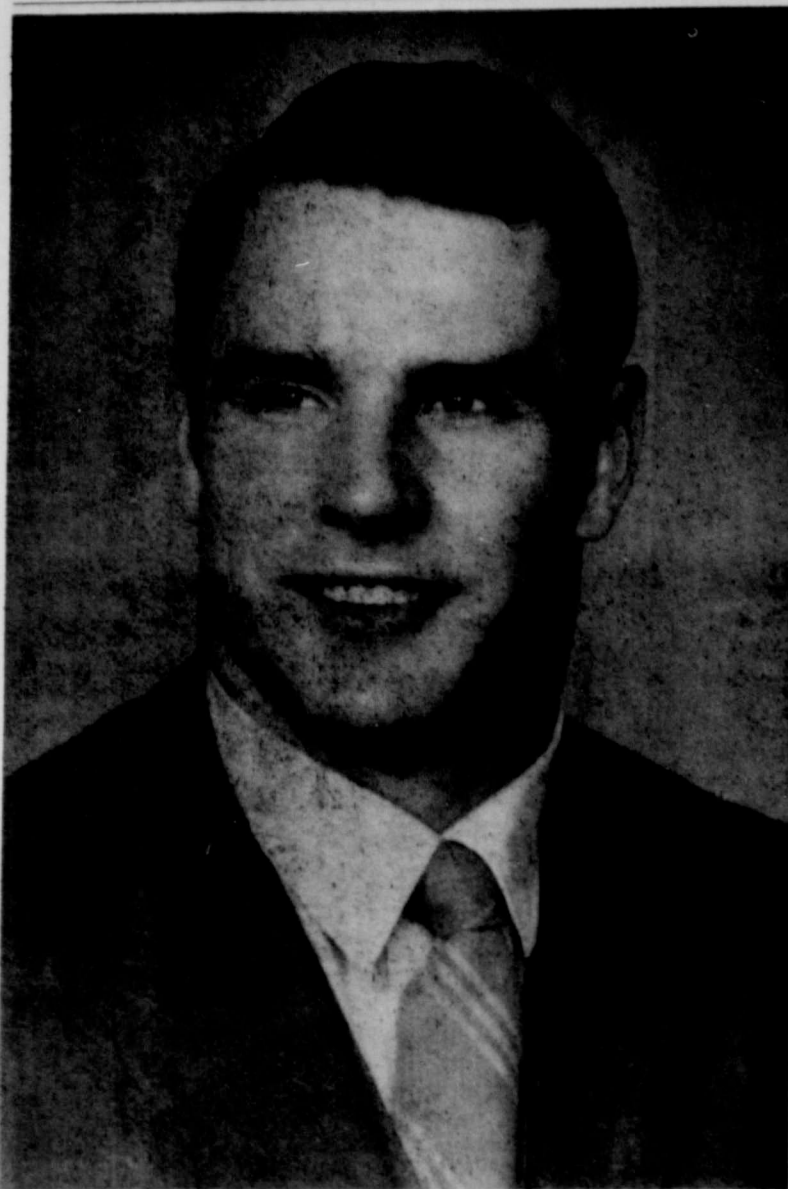

## Big Hike In Postage Due Here March 2

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—For business establishments and for the general public in Memphis, it will cost more to use the mails in 1974.

It is estimated, based upon their expenditures in prior years, that they will have to spend an additional \$11,700 in the next 10 months.

The added cost, which comes to about 15.8 percent, is the result of rate increases that will be put into effect by the U. S. Postal Service on March 2nd.

The Postal Service came into being in 1971, replacing the former Post Office Department. It is a semi-autonomous body, free of Congressional control.

This is the second rate hike it has put through since its inception. In May, 1971, it boosted rates by 21 percent.

To a large extent, states Postmaster General Elmer T. Klassen, the added revenue will be used to cover the wage increase of 14 percent over two years that was granted to its 650,000 union employees last year.

The Postal Service had sought to increase its revenues by \$1.5 billion, or 18.7 percent above the 1973 level. The Cost of Living Council, however, decided that this was excessive and reduced it to \$1.3 billion.

What it means, for the average Memphis citizen using the mails, is that 10 cents in stamps will have to be put on letters rather than 8 cents, that 13 cents will be required for airmail letters instead of 11 cents and that 8 cents will be needed on postcards, 2 cents more than before.

For a local resident who mails an average of one letter a day, the added cost in a year will be \$7.30.

For commercial mailers, chiefly newspaper and magazine publishers who use second class, the rate increase is especially high, about 39 percent over the next few years.

Third class mail, used mostly for advertising matter, and fourth class, for books, records and the like, will also be more costly.

On the basis of the latest official figures, expenditures in Memphis last year for postal services came to an estimated \$74,200.

During the current fiscal year, the total is expected to climb to about \$85,900.

"I intend to devote virtually full-time to my duties as a legislator but hope to campaign on weekends until the Convention adjourns," Hightower said. "During the past several weeks I have been actively campaigning and I am most encouraged about my prospects in the Democratic Primary and in the General Election."

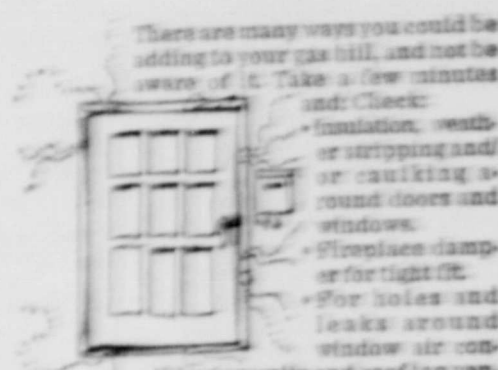

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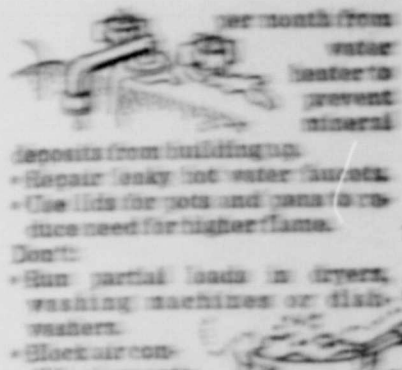

One of the big votes in the Education Committee was for retention of the \$680 million permanent University Fund for use of the University of Texas and Texas A&M University.  
Voting rights (postponed due to a last-minute committee hang-up) and education proposals are expected to be considered by the full convention late this week.  
Presiding Officer Price Daniel Jr. said the convention probably will be voting every day next week, and committees which have not finished their work will have to hold night sessions.  
**TRUCKERS IRATE**  
Unhappy Texas truck drivers called on Governor Briscoe for aid in getting diesel fuel prices rolled back.  
In an effort to end their strike, Briscoe dispatched an aide to Washington to confer with Federal Energy Administrator William Simon on the situation.  
The governor's aide, James Rose, said his mission was "simply to convey (the trucker's) position to federal agencies and congressmen."  
Texas truckers also demanded

an increase in the speed limit between 10 p. m. and 6 a. m.  
**COURTS SPEAK**  
The State Supreme Court affirmed a trial court verdict that the City of San Antonio does not owe hotel operators damages because a parking garage hampered access to their hotel.  
Former House Speaker Gus Muther's appeal from a bribery conspiracy sentence (five years probated) will be heard by Texas Court of Criminal Appeals April 10 or 17.  
The Supreme Court threw out a 150-day sentence for contempt of court assessed Jody Martin Parr, wife of Duval County Judge Archer Parr, because the punishment was increased without hearing.  
Testimony about a previous assault led to a Dallas man's winning retrial on rape charges.  
**AID URGED**  
Federal Aid has been urged for 10 Southeast Texas counties hit by rain, winds and flooding last month.  
Governor Briscoe called on President Nixon for assistance through Small Business Administration, Farmers Home Administration and the Crops of Engineers.  
Counties are Angelina, Hardin, Jasper, Liberty, Nacogdoches, Newton, Orange, San Augustine, San Jacinto and Shelby.  
**VEGETABLE SEASON DISAPPOINTING**  
Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said a winter freeze, strong competition and fall rain-lowered prices on winter vegetables in South Texas.

The growers' loss is the consumer's gain, however, White said.  
Spinach is an exception, Cabbage growers, said White have been hit unusually hard — with prices dropping to seven cents a pound.  
The truckers' strike threatens further complications, according to White, and shipments are not being accepted for delivery east of the Mississippi River due to trucking problems.  
**COLLEGE TAX SNAGGED**  
A proposed constitutional change to allow an increase in the property tax for broadened support of 21 public colleges and universities appears to be losing ground.  
Constitutional Convention Education Committee Chairman Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale indicated a new proposal will call for legislative appropriation to the institutions equal to revenue to The University of Texas and A&M University from the Constitutionally-dedicated Permanent University.  
**LOBBY BILL CHALLENGED**  
Austin District Attorney Robert O. Smith has called on Attorney General Hill for a ruling on constitutionality of the 1973 lobby control act.  
Smith said the act may require lobbyists to incriminate themselves by reporting expenditures which could be held as bribery under a new statute effective January. The bribery law outlaws holding out "any benefit" to an official to influence his decision.  
The district attorney has asked if the term "benefit" includes loans, political contributions, entertainment expenditures and gifts.  
**SHORT SNORTS**

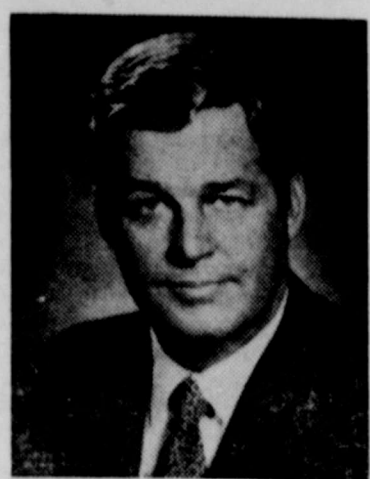

# Republican Congressman, Bob Price, Announces For Re-election to 5th Term

Congressman Bob Price officially announced Friday, Feb. 1, he will seek re-election to a 5th term as a member of the U. S. House of Representatives from the 13th Congressional District of Texas.

In his announcement, Price reaffirmed his commitments to a strong national defense, a viable domestic economy, continued re-education of rural America, law and order, a stepped up fight against the rise in illegal drug use, agricultural profits equal to other businesses in the country, and increased water supplies for southwest Texas.

As we approach our country's 150th anniversary, I think it is important to re-awaken the American people's confidence in their ability to do things for themselves," Price said. "Washington, D. C., is not the final repository of wisdom," he stressed. The Congressman made his announcement Friday evening at a gathering of friends in Pampa. He went on to repeat his decision to forego press conferences Saturday in his district office in Amarillo (9:30 a. m.) and Wichita Falls (3 p. m.).

Among Price's announced supporters are former Texas Governor John Connally, who recently endorsed the Congressman's "understanding of people, intelligence, honesty, integrity, reliability, steadfast beliefs and conviction," and former State Senator Haskewood who said Price has a proven record on the issues he is just beginning to attain seniority in the Congress which can benefit us all."

Price is presently serving in his 4th year in Congress. He is ranked 10th in his district and 10th in the House Agriculture Departmental Appropriations Subcommittee. He is an influential member of the full committee as well, and will be ranking minority member if selected. He also serves on the important Livestock & Grains, & Forestry subcommittees. In addition, Price is a member of the House Armed Services Committee—one of the few House members with two major committee assignments. He is active on the Armed Services Research & Development Subcommittee and is mindful of the important role played by Sheppard Air Force Base near Wichita Falls. Additionally, he serves on the House minority Policy Committee and the Committee on Committees, which determine policy and committee assignments, respectively.

An informal poll conducted by the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe found Price named most often as "most admired Texan;" and, the Adobe Walls Boy Scout Council recently awarded Price its highest honor, the coveted Silver Beaver Award.

Price, 46, has owned and operated a ranch near Pampa the past 20 years and served four years active duty in the Air Force flying 27 combat missions as a fighter pilot during the Korean Conflict.

He lives with his wife, Marty, and three children, Grant, Carl and Janice, in their Virginia home while Congress is in session, and also maintains his Pampa ranch.

He is a member of the Baptist Church, the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Air Force Association, and the Masonic Order. He is past president of the Top O' Texas Kiwanis Club, a member of the board of development of Wayland Baptist College, and a director at large of the Top O' Texas Rodeo Association. He has been active in the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association, the Texas Cattle Feeders Association and the Panhandle Producers and Royalty Owners Association.

Price is a graduate of Oklahoma State University, where he majored in Agriculture, with a minor in field crops and business, and where he was active in Sigma Alfa Epsilon fraternity.
