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# 285 Put Conservation To Work All-Star Teams

## They're Farmers And Ranchers Told For Majors

Throughout the country, about 900,000 farmers and ranchers participated last year in a program of soil, water, woodland, and wildlife conservation serving 50 million acres and providing major anti-pollution benefits to the public.

In Mitchell County about 285 farmers and ranchers participated, according to Curtis E. Latimer, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Emphasis on local involvement and broad public benefits were key points of the 1969 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) and continue in the 1970 program.

The ACP, acted with the assistance of many interested groups, including other agricultural agencies and soil and water conservation districts. Our farmer-elected county ASC committee followed through with planning and operation of the program throughout the year.

In operation of the 1969 ACP, steps were taken to place increased emphasis on long term enduring conservation practices, the benefits of which extend beyond individual farm boundaries and into the community at large. Assistance for enduring type practices made up 87 percent of the 1969 national program total.

Additional steps also were taken to make sure the program for 1970 reflects genuine, locally known conservation and anti-pollution needs. Among these were invitations for the Governor or his designee, and the head of the State pollution control or environmental quality agency to participate in delegations on the Agricultural Conservation Program in each State.

Latimer said that sometimes "people misunderstood this conservation program. It is designed to help assure protection of land resources for the future. Frequently farmers take short-term losses in in-

stalling conservation practices in order to provide for long-range benefits which they themselves may not directly profit from.

"This occurs, for instance, when farmers give up part of their cropland to provide for conservation structures and for water retention to reduce erosion and prevent stream siltation and sometimes to prevent flooding of downstream communities," he explained.

Use of ACP funds takes into account the relative urgency of the conservation measures to be undertaken and the need for cost-sharing assistance in solving conservation problems.

Specific pollution abatement responsibilities were added to 1970.

Last year under the program, conservation measures on Mitchell County farms represented a total investment of around \$133,000. ACP cost-sharing accounted for about half this amount, and producers matched or exceeded the public investment with their own resources.

Important conservation practices—most of them with substantial anti-pollution benefits—carried out on participating farms in Mitchell County included controlling competitive shrubs, constructing wells and storage facilities, stock water ponds, pipelines, permanent cross-fences, constructing terraces, waterways, diversions, reorganizing irrigation systems and seeding summer cover crops.

"I want to point out the extent of local involvement in the 1969 program," the ASC Committee Chairman said. "ASC farmer committees in the counties and States were responsible for program development."

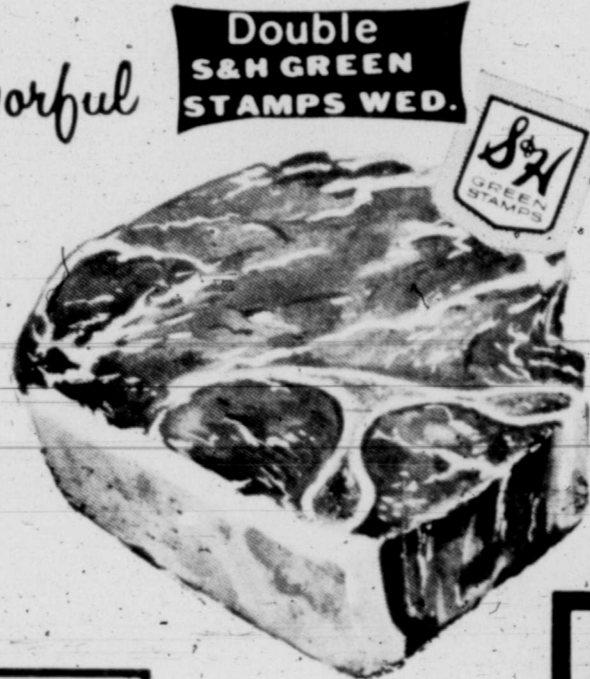

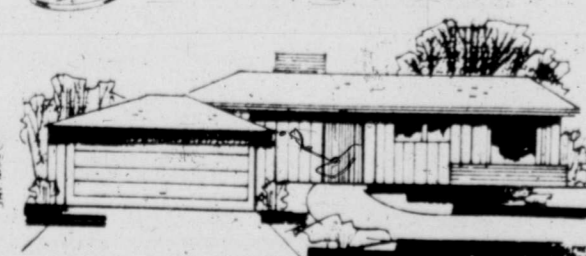
