BULLDOGS WIN DISTRICT S-B TRACK CHAMPIONSHIP

The Lorraine Bulldogs out-distanced and out-ran all competitors at Snyder last Wednesday afternoon to win District S-B with 152 points.

The Bulldogs' nearest contenders were Hermleigh and Westbrook. Hermleigh finished 2nd to the Bulldogs with 102 points and Westbrook followed closely with 94 points.

The Bulldogs won both relays and 5 other first places to win going away.

Bulldogs established one new record in their race to victory. The new record came with the first event of the meet, the 440 relay. The 440 relay team composed of James Linder, Larry Blair, Larry Beights, and Tony Bugarin ran a 46.9 to better the record of 47 flat set in 1961 by Hermleigh.

The mile relay team composed of James Linder, Alex Adams, Larry Beights and Tony Bugarin also finished first with little trouble in 3:49 flat.

James Linder won two other first places for the Bulldogs and finished 2nd in another to easily win high point honors with 38 points. He won the broad jump with a real good jump of 29 3/4 feet.

County H.D. Agent Goes To Workshop

Mrs. Cricket B. Taylor, Mitchell County Home Demonstration Agent will attend the Human Nutrition Workshop to be held April 9-13 on the campus of A&M College of Texas. Thirty six county Home Demonstration Agents—representing all 12 Extension Service Districts of Texas will participate in the Human Nutrition Workshop. Mrs. Taylor will be among those attending from Local District 2.

Theme of the week-long non-credit workshop will be "Steps to You".

The annual Cancer Drive for Loraine will get underway Friday, April 6, as announced this week by the local chairman, Mrs. Alfred Hackfeld.

1962 marks the twenty-fifth anniversary of the following two significant events in the American struggle to conquer Cancer: 1. Enactment of the National Cancer Institute Act which created the National Cancer Institute, and 2. Launching by the American Cancer Society of its first nationwide public education campaign out of which was to come a broad program of education, research and service through voluntary support.

Cancer is a family of diseases characterized by abnormal growth and spread of cells. If this malignant process is not controlled or checked, the patient will die. However, many cancers can be cured if detected early in their development and treated by surgery or radiation.

Cancer can strike anyone at any age. Children as well as adults are stricken. This year about 800,000 Americans will be under medical care for cancer.

One in four persons out of 45 million Americans now living will eventually have cancer, according to present rates. About 173,000 Americans will be saved from cancer this year and about 87,000 cancer patients will probably die in 1962 who might have been saved by earlier and better treatment.

The American Cancer Society is working to find what causes cancer, to find new ways to cure it, to find ways to prevent it and to alleviate pain and suffering from it.

Lung cancer is now by far the leading cause of cancer deaths in men. Elimination of cigarette smoking would eventually reduce lung cancer deaths. Today about 44 percent of all high school seniors and 21 percent of all freshmen smoke. If parents smoke, their children are more likely to smoke while still in high school.

The relation of tobacco to the health of the American people is causing great and increasing concern not only to the American Cancer Society but to the American Heart Association, the American Public Health Association, and the National Tuberculosis Association.

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HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION (Hiccups)

The remedies that have been suggested for hiccups are unlimited. Everyone has hiccups now and then, and everyone has had "helpful suggestions" from friends and acquaintances on how to stop them.

Hiccups are spasmodic contractions of the diaphragm. They occur in healthy people spontaneously or from trivial causes. In rare cases hiccups will continue for long periods and control becomes difficult. In these instances medical attention is required.

Babies often hiccup after rapid feeding, or swallowing of air. Sometimes hiccups are noted along with neurosis and with certain diseases, such as flu.

Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association, offers several suggestions for curing the hiccups —

— In the case of babies, administer sips of warm water; take the child in your arms, patting his back.

— One of the best remedies for simple hiccups in older children and adults is to lie down and relax.

— Other measures that sometimes help include: Drink water slowly, trying both warm and cold water if necessary; if an upset stomach sets off the hiccups, take a teaspoonful of baking soda in water; breathe in and out into a paper bag, so that the carbon dioxide level in the blood is raised.

The important thing in stopping the hiccups is to relax, and any prudent thing that helps the subject relax and gets his mind off the hiccups may be helpful.

There are occasional cases in medical history of individuals whose hiccups have persisted for hours or days. If hiccups don't go away after a reasonable period, say, an hour or two, call your doctor.

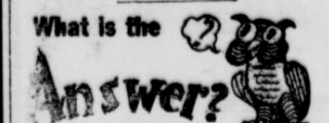
COLORADO CITY BOY TO COMPLETE TRAINING

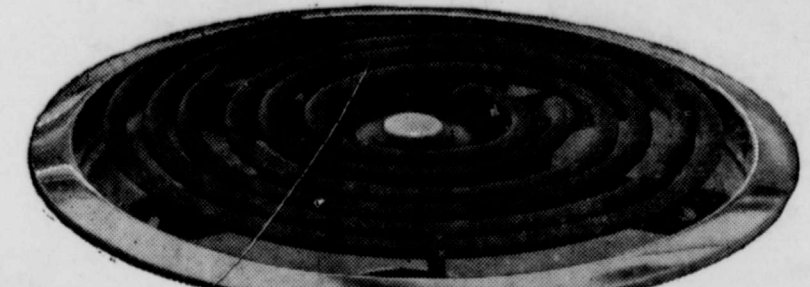
