Four Tech College Co-Eds Injured In Car Collision

Girls Are Badly Shaken When Two Automobiles Hit

Victims Carried To Local Sanitarium For Emergency Treatment; Injuries Not Serious, Doctors Say

Blinded by Sleet

Snow-Covered Windshield Is Blamed For Accident On 13th And Avenue X; Other Driver Unknown

FOUR popular Texas Tech co-eds were painfully injured Wednesday afternoon about 3:10 o'clock when the automobile in which they were riding collided with another at the intersection of 13th street and Avenue X and was overturned.

The injured included:

Miss Alma Ralls, 1919 Broadway, 18-year-old daughter of Percy B. Ralls, of Ralls.

Miss Mary Lee Bardwell, 17, daughter of S. B. Bardwell, 2205 Broadway.

Miss Zona Stiles, 19, 2002 22nd street, daughter of Dr. J. M. Stiles, of Annona.

Miss Anne Thompson, 19, 1106 19th, daughter of J. P. Thompson, Jr., of Gonzales.

No one was hurt from the wreckage of their car by three Texas Tech boys and Miss Mary Snyder of this city, and rushed to the Lubbock sanitarium for emergency treatment. X-ray examinations by physicians showed that while no bones were broken, all of the victims were suffering from severe shock, bad bruises and lacerations about the arms and body.

Miss Bardwell was driving the car, a Ford coupe, which was headed east on 13th street. According to Miss Ralls, another car flashed into view from the north, unseen before.

Five new directors for the 1930 board of the Lubbock Board of Commerce will be named at the regular meeting of the city commission at the city hall this morning.

Nomination ballots were issued last Saturday to members of the chamber of commerce and voting on candidates closed Tuesday night. The fifteen names receiving the highest number of votes are to be declared nominated and from this five will be selected by the civic body.

Child Wins In Race With Death

DALLAS, Jan. 8. (AP)—A race with death over 294 miles of slippery highways in sleet and rain and the use of a rare surgical instrument at a Dallas hospital today saved the life of a San Angelo girl, choking from a piece of walnut meat lodged in her windpipe.

The child, Martha Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Jones of San Angelo, arrived here early today. She swallowed the walnut kernel when she cried after a brother teased her. Her breathing almost cut off, doctors at San Angelo advised removal to Dallas where a bronchoscope was available.

The parents bundled the child in blankets and raced in their automobile toward Dallas, frequently relayed by stops when rain froze on the windshield of the car.

Robbers Get \$100 In Confectionery Early Wednesday

No Clues Left By Culprits Who Entered Firm By Way Of Transom; Cash Taken From Deposit Box

Continuing a series of robberies over the South Plains, robbers early Wednesday morning entered the Lindsey Confectionery on Main street and escaped with \$100 in cash.

Entrance into the building was gained through the transom over the front door after screws and nails which held the barrier had been chiseled away.

Deposit Box Looted

S. D. Buchanan, owner of the confectionery, stated last night that a small portion of the money was taken from the cash drawer while a larger amount was taken from deposit boxes in the rear. He was of the opinion that the robbery was committed by persons knowing the whereabouts of the cash. Nothing else was taken.

Officers, after an investigation, declared that the prowlers entered the store between 4 and 5 o'clock as persons were working in buildings on each side until early in the morning. No clue as to identity of the culprits had been revealed last night.

Audience Safe In Tabernacle Crash

OKMULGEE, Okla., Jan. 8. (AP)—Warned by the creaking of timbers 300 persons attending a mid-winter revival in a frame tabernacle here fled from the building just before the roof, weighted down by tons of snow and sleet, crashed.

The accident occurred in the midst of a sermon by the Rev. M. F. Ham of Oklahoma City. Several persons in the audience interrupted the minister during his sermon to tell him of the danger, and suggested that the building be cleared.

Members of the audience fled out despite the assurance of Dr. Ham that the building was safe.

Hardly had Dr. Ham, who followed the audience from the building with a roar, supports of the roof collapsed and an avalanche of sleet and timbers buried the seats.

SILENCE MAINTAINED

Decline To Discuss Laredo Consulate Opening

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8. (AP)—State department officials declined today to discuss reports that the Mexican government had accepted American suggestions under which the Mexican consulate at Laredo would be re-opened.

Secretary Cotton said he had been in communication with Gov. Moody of Texas over the long distance telephone regarding the reopening of the consulate, but he would not go into further details of the conversation than those given by the Governor.

South Plains Blanketed With Heavy Snowfall As Winter's Grasp Tightens

Temperature Hovers Near 15-Degree Mark In City

ACCOMPANIED by a steady fall of snow which had reached an approximate depth of over three inches at an early hour this morning, winter's grasp tightened on Lubbock and the South Plains Wednesday, with forecasts of even lower drops in temperature Thursday.

Opening the day with an icy crust over the entire city, sleet fell continuously throughout the forenoon changing to a heavy snow at mid-afternoon, which was steadily blanketing the area this morning.

Traffic Impeded

Traffic throughout the city was impeded while driving of automobiles was limited to only those who found it necessary. Traffic lights were abandoned, as the streets were vacated by motorists and last night only one accident, attributed to the cold, had been reported.

Temperature at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon was 18 degrees but with night fell even lower and hovered near 15 degrees.

Divorced Husband Kills Self After Shooting Of Pair

Accountant Slays Former Wife And Her New Mate With Home-Made Machine Gun; 5 Notes Left

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 8.—Mrs. Doris Elizabeth Mason, 26, and her husband, George Mason, 31, were slain today by Mrs. Mason's divorced husband, John Ernest Barnett, 34, Chattanooga, Tenn., accountant, who then fired a bullet into his own head.

The Masons were killed while on the way to work. Barnett drove his automobile alongside the Mason car, forcing it into the curb, jumped to the walk, and poured fusillade into the other car with a home-made machine gun. He then killed himself with a pistol.

In Barnett's car, police found a shotgun, ammunition and an automatic pistol, in addition to five notes, one of them a diary detailing the slayer's three-day vigil in the vicinity of his former wife's home waiting for an opportunity to kill her.

Barnett left four notes, one addressed to the police.

"My companion in death is my former wife, Doris, who is still my wife," he wrote in one. "If any one except us two are killed it will be an unfortunate necessity. It is not premeditated."

He told of his marriage to Doris Elizabeth George in October, 1924. She obtained an uncontested divorce in 1928 and married Mason in July, 1929.

One note, named as his nearest relative his father, "Albert H. Barowsky" of Atlanta. Barowsky explained that his son changed his name to Barnett when he entered the army in the World war.

LOCAL MAN HELD

F. M. Wilson, of Lubbock, was arrested and lodged in the county jail Wednesday on charges of violation of the prohibition laws. No bond had been set last night.

Mr. Wilson's arrest, according to officers, followed a raid several weeks ago when a 75-gallon still, several gallons of whiskey and a quantity of mash were confiscated.

Classics, Irony Invoked By Wets In Prohi Debate

Bishop Cannon Suggested As "Cheer Leader" For Senate Drys In Heated Prohibition Controversy

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The ancient classics were invoked today by wets in the house as they led debate on the war department supply bill into the field of prohibition to assail the drys for applauding what they termed "dry killings."

Representative Black, democrat, New York, as he nominated Bishop Cannon Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to be a "cheer leader" for the drys.

Might Lose Stocks

"Of course," he said, "I do not want him to turn any somersaults here, because some chips and stocks might fall out of his pocket."

Representative Schaefer, republican, Wisconsin, drew an analogy from the Bible.

"Each day's tragic news," he asserted, "indicates more human lives sacrificed on the altar of prohibition."

He characterized this figure as a "god" of the drys, "which must have blood."

Giving what he termed a theme song of Horace, the celebrated Latin poet, Representative Black shouted "nunc est libendum" (now is the time to drink).

New Cotton Co-Op To Be Ready Soon

Carl Williams Says Thirty Million Association To Be Chartered On Saturday; Headquarters Not Named

(By Associated Press)

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 8.—Carl Williams, member of the federal farm board, today told a meeting of New Orleans business men that the \$30,000,000 national cotton corporation would be ready to do business next Monday but failed to disclose where the headquarters would be located.

Williams said the charter for organization of the corporation would be filed Saturday.

Well On Way

"The \$30,000,000 cotton corporation is well on its way to functioning," he said. "It will start with a million bales of cotton, unlimited government credit and with all the powers to buy and sell enjoyed by any cotton merchant. It means an entirely new factor in the cotton business."

Several cities, including New Orleans, Memphis, and Dallas have been striving to get the headquarters.

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Tech Enrollment Establishes New Record For Year

Total Of 2,264 Students Registered For Winter Term By Late Wednesday—One More Day

Expect Graduates

Over 5,000 Are Thought To Have Enrolled In Local High School Following Holiday Period

ENROLLMENT at Texas Technological college for the winter term, with one more day for registration, Wednesday had reached 2,264 students according to an announcement yesterday from the office of E. L. Dohoney, registrar.

The present enrollment is the largest that has ever been recorded in the history of the institution, last term's figures only totalling barely past the 2,000 mark. Officials of the college expect at least 2,400 students before the end of the present term.

Others Expected

It has been pointed out that a number of high schools in this section do not complete their semester's work until the latter part of January, and several students from them have indicated intentions of enrolling at Tech immediately after graduation.

No exact figures could be obtained last night from Lubbock public schools though Superintendent M. H. Duncan stated that he expected, with report at the end of January, to have enrolled at least 5,000 students. The last month's report before Christmas holidays showed 4,892 pupils and this figure has been materially added to.

"We expect to have at least 5,000 students before the end of the year," said Mr. Duncan.

Leidigh To Talk For Farm Bureau

Member Of Gov. Moody's Committee To Form State Cotton Cooperative Will Report On Austin Meet

Dean A. H. Leidigh, member of Governor Dan Moody's committee to work out details for a state cotton cooperative, will be the principal speaker before the regular meeting of the Lubbock County Farm Bureau Cotton association next Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, according to an announcement yesterday by N. H. Payne, field representative of the state organization.

Every member of the local association is urged to attend Saturday's meeting and hear Dean Leidigh's report of the state meeting held Monday in Austin with Alexander Legge, chairman of the Federal Farm Board. Carl Williams, of Oklahoma, cotton member of the board, and representatives from this state.

Attendance Urged

Mr. Payne Wednesday was mailing out letters to all members, urging their attendance. Substances of the meeting were:

"The Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association has progressed in its nine years of development to such an extent that it is the parent organization. The value of this work is so recognized that Governor Dan Moody called a special committee together, with members of the Farm Board, to discuss details for development of cooperative marketing of cotton in Texas."

"Young Guard" Is Recognized After Two-Day Struggle

Reorganization Of G. O. P. Machinery Effected By Recognition Of Western Independents Wednesday

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8. (AP)—Senate republicans gave recognition today to the western independents and the "young guard" element after a two day struggle over reorganization of the party's machinery.

Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin, one of the independents, and Senator Thomas of Idaho, a member of the "young guard," were tendered places on the powerful finance committee, which shapes the revenue tariff legislation—a committee usually reserved for the "old guard" regulars.

Smoot Makes Decision

The veteran Senator Smoot of Utah, chairman of the finance committee, himself cast the deciding vote in the committee on committees which overruled the attempt of Senators Reed, Pennsylvania; Moses, New Hampshire; and Bingham, Connecticut, to keep LaFollette from this committee assignment.

The western independents, who opposed the republican tariff bill now before the senate and in coalition with the democrats have rewritten it. Both the independents and the young guard had no representation on the finance committee. Now for the first time in several years the northwestern agricultural area will be represented.

The decision today of the committee on committees will be formally voted upon tomorrow and on Friday will be put before the republican conference. It avoided an open rupture between the western independents and the republican regulars who have been at odds ever since the Hoover administration was inaugurated.

Baseball Magnate Commits Suicide

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 8. (AP)—A. J. Heinemann, president and owner of the New Orleans Southern Association baseball club, shot himself fatally tonight in his office at the local ball park that bears his name.

The baseball magnate had been in ill health for some time, friends said, and had been given to fits of despondency.

Coroner George F. Roeling pronounced the death a suicide.

Heinemann was 51 years old and was a prominent figure in the organized baseball field. Although he lost heavily in the recent stock market fluctuations, friends said they believed his health, and not his financial affairs, induced his act.

Sale Marks Step In Realization Of Proposed New High School Building Here; Erection Authorized July 9th

Contract To Be Awarded Latter Part Of February For Structure To Be Located On Nineteenth Street; Dallas-Wichita Firm Buys At Par Value

REPRESENTING the highest bidder, the Brown-Crummer investment company, of Dallas and Wichita, Kas., yesterday afternoon purchased \$650,000 worth of bonds from the Lubbock Independent School district, which were voted in this city on July 9, 1929, for erection of a new high school building, according to an announcement by A. C. Jackson, secretary of the board.

The bonds were sold at par value with accrued interest, and a premium of \$650, dated January 1, 1930. C. M. Smith, representing the successful bidders, met in this city with members of the board on Tuesday night and submitted his proposal, which was accepted Wednesday.

A public sale of the bonds was advertised and held on December 10, but at that time the board refused all bids. Since then it has been negotiating with several companies.

Let Contract Soon

The announcement last night stated that contract for the building probably would be let the latter part of February and that actual construction would start soon afterwards.

Site for the proposed new structure is bordered by Avenues T and U and Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets. The new building will provide for the accommodation of 1,200 new students and will have provisions for future additions for 1,500 and possibly 1,800 students.

Sites already have been purchased for ward school buildings in the Ellwood addition and the south-east part of the city and these will be erected when the need arises, according to members of the board of trustees.

Play Conditions In Lubbock Jail

Crowded Circumstances Of County Jail To Endanger Health Of Prisoners, Dr. Baugh Reports

The present condition of the Lubbock county jail was rapped late yesterday afternoon in a statement issued by Dr. W. L. Baugh, county health officer.

"Health conditions in the jail at the present time are as well as could be expected under the crowded circumstances," he said, "but unless something is done to relieve the tension the conditions as regards health of prisoners will be even worse."

"Only recently two federal prisoners were held; both of them with cases of smallpox. They have recovered and been released or transferred but others may develop. This can be traced to only one specific cause—the lack of facilities in handling the large number of prisoners. There is just space enough for twenty-seven and each day has seen an average of between 35 and 40."

"There should, by all means, be separate wards for sick prisoners and for other classes, where they could be isolated and the health of other inmates guarded. We are doing the best we can but even now we have several venereal cases—all of them thrown together."

County Judge Robert H. Bean also stated that unless relief could be obtained a measure would have to be enforced where every prisoner would be vaccinated upon entering confinement.

VERY MUCH ALIVE

Youth Thought Dead Tells Of Whereabouts

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Jan. 8. (AP)—Believed to have been found shot dead in a stalled motor car near Greenville, Ill., yesterday, R. C. Holes, 17, a former hell boy at the Bowles hotel here, this afternoon was reached by telephone here and insisted that he is very much alive.

Police at Amarillo, where young Holes recently visited, had expressed belief earlier in the day that an unidentified red-headed youth found dead near Greenville was Holes. A needle bearing the label of Blackburn store at Amarillo was found on the body of the slain boy. Holes admitted when reached by telephone here that he recently had been in the neighborhood of Amarillo and that he was undoubtedly the Holes referred to by the police there.

Grady Kinsolving Will Speak Here On "Tax Experts"

South Texas Chamber Of Commerce Head To Make Main Address At Kiwanis Club Luncheon Today

The program of the regular weekly luncheon meeting of Lubbock Kiwanians will be headlined today by the appearance of Grady Kinsolving, of Corpus Christi.

President of the South Texas chamber of commerce and leader of a campaign against "tax experts" in Texas.

Mr. Kinsolving, also publisher of the Corpus Christi Times and Caller will arrive in the city this morning.

Plays Tax Expert

He has stated that the practice of allowing "tax experts" to aid in assessing and collecting in many Texas counties is a form of "legalized hi-jacking."

He is leading the campaign in which he hopes to enlist public sentiment for legislative enactment barring tax experts. He says that the chamber holds nothing against the tax experts "per se," but insists that the practice is flagrantly abused in many districts.

"We want to turn the spotlight on tax experts so brilliantly that every chamber of commerce fabric will be revealed to public gaze," he said recently in a speech at Dallas.

Woman Silk, Rayon Expert In Senate

Has Distinction Of Being First Woman To Sit In Congress Except Member; Entrance Allowed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8. (P)—Distinction of being the first woman other than a member of congress, ever to sit in the senate during a session went today to Miss Ruth Peterson, silk and rayon expert on the tariff commission.

It has been customary during debate on the tariff bill to admit commission experts to assist senators, but Miss Peterson had some difficulty with a doorkeeper during the special session when she asked to go on the floor. She was told it was against the rules to permit women.

Today the rayon schedule was reached, and Senator Walsh of Massachusetts asked unanimous consent that Miss Peterson be admitted.

Senator Norris of Nebraska called attention that male experts had been admitted and held the unanimous consent request would be required. Vice-President Curtis ruled the request was unnecessary, and when Senator Heflin of Alabama asked that the ruling be conveyed to the doorkeeper if we are going to have any trouble about it, Curtis banged his gavel and said:

"The chair will state that there will be no trouble."

Miss Peterson was ushered in a few minutes later.

For a while last season it appeared that Fox would have to be shifted when Mickey Cochrane was out of the game with a broken rib. After much dickering, searching for suitable opponents, speech making by the principals, an agreement for Scott's services was reached last night between Madison Square Garden officials and the British heavyweight's American representative, Jimmy Johnston. It was announced at the official signing today that the gladiators will share 50 per cent by the net proceeds. Scott will receive but 20 per cent if the gate falls below \$300,000.

The lanky Englishman, who won a disappointing victory over Otto Von Porat on a foul here several weeks ago, is resting in London. He will sail for New York on a fast boat January 14, leaving for Miami to start training shortly after his arrival here. Sharkey already has set up headquarters in the Southern playground.

The contracts signed today brought the heavyweight division a full step closer to a successor to champion Gene Tunney, who retired from the ring in the summer of 1927. Both gladiators gave the garden an option on their services for the remainder of this year. The winner probably will be matched with Max Baer, the German, Schlager for the title next September.

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"Owl Football" Past Experiment Stage At School

Bulldogs To Give Chicago Fans First Taste Of Night Football In Game With Oregon University

DES MOINES, Iowa, Jan. 8. (P)—"Owl football" has passed the experimental stage at Drake university, and five of the eight games on the 1930 schedule will be played at night. Ed C. Lytton, business manager of the university, and Coach Oate Solem have announced.

Chicago fans will see their first major college game at night in the Soldier Field October 3, when the Bulldogs meet Oregon university. The following Friday night, Drake clashes with Marquette at Milwaukee under the powerful arc.

One Home Day Game
Local followers will see Drake in action in the daytime in only one game, the Iowa State contest, Grinnell and Washington university of St. Louis are both scheduled for after-dark contests in the Drake stadium.

The fifth night game with Creighton at Omaha, is contingent on weather conditions, as night games in extreme cold are considered less successful.

Has Set Pace
Although not the originator of night games, Drake set a new pace by playing four such contests in 1929, after a tryout in a single game in the 1928 season. Powerful lights, set 50 feet above the playing field at Drake stadium, flood every point of the gridiron with intersecting beams, eliminating all shadows and illuminating the sky beyond the range of the highest punters, according to Mr. Lytton.

"Although opposing teams were dubious at first," Mr. Lytton says, "a trial convinced them of night football possibilities and it is here to stay. Attendance was increased from 100 per cent to 400 per cent, at comparable games."

Cortes Descendent
Ordered Deported

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 8. (AP)—Antonio Aragon Cortes, Prince of Pignatelli, who traces his lineage directly to Cortez, the conqueror of Mexico, has been ordered deported as a "pernicious foreigner."

The government charges that Pignatelli, whose title is derived from an Italian house dating to the twelfth century, has disposed of family archives of intense historical interest to Mexico to American millionaires and universities.

Archives Found
The newspaper Excelsior said some of the archives had been found in the library of the United States congress. Archives which the government announced December 31 had been turned over to it by Pignatelli were said to be only bills and administrative records of the Hospital of Jesus, founded by Cortez, known familiarly as the "conquistador," in 1526.

Hidden in the archives, or retained in the memory of the family of the prince, and possibly one of two Roman Catholic priests, is said to be the secret of the burial place of the remains of Cortez.

The government contends that the documents really are the property of Mexico and Pignatelli had no right to dispose of them outside the country.

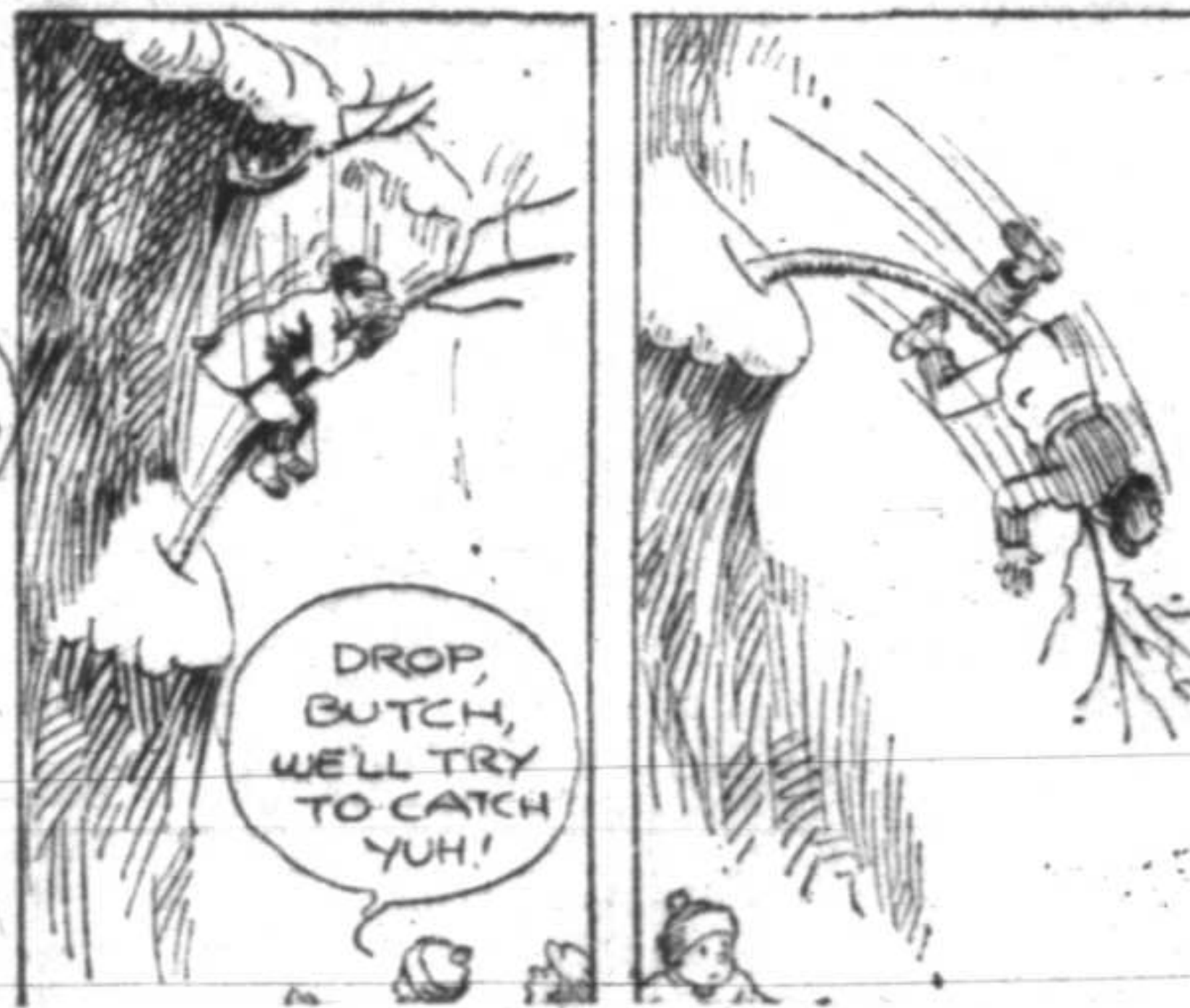

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Cotton Steady; Stock Market Quiet

Prices Higher On

And On CoveringsGeneral Market Closes At

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. (P)—Cotton was quiet but generally steady today with prices higher on a moderate demand from the trade and covering. March contracts sold up to 17.11 and closed at 17.10 with the general market closing steady at net advances of 5 to 9 points. The opening was steady at an advance of 3 points to a decline of 1 point. There were a few overnight selling orders from the south which may have been brought in by the reaction of yesterday's afternoon, but they were quite readily absorbed and there were rumors of trade buying orders in the market at about the 17c level for March. That delivery sold at 17.02 during the early trading but soon steadied up, while May advanced from 17.27 to 17.36 with active months generally showing net advances of 6 to 10 points before the end of the morning. These prices attracted some selling and a little southern selling but it was absorbed on setbacks of a few points and the market stiffened up again during the last hour. Closing quotations were within a point or two of the best for the day on most positions.

Upturn In Hog Prices Is Feature of
Livestock Trade Around Mart Circuit

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 8. (P)—Livestock trade around the 11-market circuit was featured by a 10 to 25c upturn in hog prices with all interests purchasing freely in the advance. The day's extreme top of \$10 was paid at St. Louis for 100-220 lb. averages. Total offerings were around 10,000, an increase of 61,500 over a week ago but 21,000 short of the corresponding day last year. Fat lambs were unevenly steady to 25c lower as compared with Tuesday's average market while a limited showing of aged stock ruled firm to 25c higher. Chicago had a top of 14.25 on choice fed wooled lambs of light weight and realized 7.85 on best fat ewes. The supply approximated 52,100, against 12,465 last Wednesday and 71,108 a year ago. Aggregate receipts of cattle, estimated at 31,200 were 12,500 heavier than a week ago and 8,500 less than a year ago. Although demand at eastern dressed beef markets was rather slow, there was a fairly broad demand of most killing class of cattle at firm to 25c higher prices. Choice yearlings in Chicago scored 16.25 and on the same market weighty steers sold up to 15.50.

Paralysis Holds
Sway In Session
Of Light TradesDay's Business Smallest
Since August 13, 1928:
Lull Before Storm Theory
Advanced On Wall Street

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. (P)—Paralysis penetrated further in the stock market today. The day's trades aggregated only 1,638,830 shares, the smallest full session's business since August 13, 1928. The ticker tape stood still for minutes at a time. Rarely has there been such a divergence of speculative opinion as there is in Wall Street at present, and pending visible signs of a definite market trend, most traders prefer to express opinions rather than act on them. Experimental efforts on the part of both speculators for the rise and for the fall have gone unrewarded by definite results.

Lull Before Storm
Some observers liken the present pause to the lull that precedes a storm, and predict that the market will soon have a violent awakening. Others, however, believe that business and industrial conditions will improve but gradually during the next two months, and that indecisive results of the current quarter will dampen speculative enthusiasm on either side of the market. The day's news was mixed. Freight car loadings for Christmas week were reported as falling off sharply from the previous week, but showing only moderate declines from the corresponding weeks of 1928 and 1927.

Allen Brothers Post, American Legion, Appoints Service Committee For Aid To Vets

Announcement was made yesterday that a service committee has been named by the executive committee of 17 members of the Allen Brothers post, local American Legion, for the purpose of assisting war veterans in securing loans on policies and certificates.

Extortion Charge Facing Five Men

CHICAGO, Jan. 8. (P)—The state today indicated that the bullet that killed Jean B. Hasever last night had automatically nolle prossed the case against five men, charged with extortion.

Hasever, 55-year-old cabinet manufacturer, was the principal witness against police sergeant William Begley and for other men who he charged defrauded him and extorted money from him.

The body of the manufacturer was found at the foot of a stairway leading from his office to the basement. The bullet had entered the top of his head, apparently fired by a person on the landing above.

Pat Roche, chief investigator of the state's attorney, believed Hasever had accepted bribes not to testify in the extortion case and then, after getting the bribe money, had decided to press the prosecution.

The charged on which Begley and the others were arrested were based on the sale to Hasever of a "money making machine."
