Employees Held Up As Bandits Scoop Up Money, Escape

Motor Left Running Near
Bank For Hasty Retreat;
Kemp Officers Start In
Pursuit Of Pair

Car Is Abandoned

President Of Bank Fires
Two Shots At Departing
Yeggs; One Of Robbers
Is Only Youth

(By Associated Press)

KEMP, Jan. 17.—Two robbers late today held up and robbed the First National bank of Kemp, between \$850 and \$1000. They escaped in an automobile that had been left with the motor running in front of the bank.

The men entered the bank shortly before closing time and ordered L. J. McDougall, president, four employees and a customer to throw up their hands. They then gathered up all available cash in a cage and fled.

Two Shots Fired

As soon as the men reached the sidewalk, Mr. McDougall rushed to his desk for a revolver and reached the street in time to fire two shots at the speeding automobile. Neither of the shots was believed to have been effective.

Officers immediately started in pursuit of the men. An automobile believed to have been the one used in the robbery was found abandoned on the State highway seven miles west of Kemp.

One Bandit Young

One of the men appeared about 19 or 20 years old and weighed around 135 pounds. He was about five feet seven inches in height. His companion looked about 10 years older and weighed about 180 pounds. He was more than six feet tall. Kemp is in Kaufman county.

Director Of Tech Claimed By Death

Dr. C. G. Comegys Victim
Of Heart Attack Friday
At Home In McKinney;
Is Well Known Here

Dr. C. G. Comegys, of McKinney, a member of the Texas Technological college board of directors for a period of two years, died at his home in that city yesterday afternoon, according to a message received here by Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college.

Dr. Comegys was appointed to the board about two years ago by Governor Dan Moody and, according to Dr. Horn, was one of the "most faithful and regular in attendance with the interests of the institution at heart." Dr. Comegys, having visited in the city several times and having been a speaker here on various occasions.

Death was said to have been very sudden and was attributed to heart failure.

Broadcasters In Move To Improve Radio Reception

Authorities Hold Session
With Federal Radio Commission
In Attempt To
Reduce Interference

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (P)—Broadcasting authorities meeting with the Federal Radio commission today to consider ways of improving program reception for the listeners of the United States, discussed the use of synchronization and special antenna systems in reducing interference.

Called into conference by the commission, government experts and leading commercial engineers agreed that synchronization, or the simultaneous operation of two nations on a single wave length, offered future possibilities but was of little value as an immediate remedy for congestion in the ether.

Engineers of the Westinghouse Electric company described an antenna system which is being developed at Station KDKA with a view to improving reception. When a strong local signal, without distance transmission is desired, the antenna is designed to radiate a powerful wave along the ground but does not send one into the air where it would be deflected by the heavy layer to distant regions.

If the station desires to provide clear programs for listeners thousands of miles away, the antenna is arranged to transmit a strong sky wave and a feeble ground wave. This, it was explained, would permit powerful stations to cover larger areas without interfering with reception in the immediate vicinity of the transmitters.

Stimson, Ramsey MacDonald Stage Pre-Parley Talk

Secretary Of State From
U. S. Silent After Visit
With British Prime Minister
On London Arrival

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, Jan. 17. (P)—Cordially welcomed to England at Plymouth today, Secretary of State Stimson hastened up to London by fast train with the American delegation to the naval disarmament conference and a bee-line for No. 10 Downing street, official residence of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald. For more than three hours Colonel Stimson remained closeted with the British Prime Minister, but he was completely silent about the significance of their talk.

Beyond saying that the talk was "pleasant" and interrupted only by a nice cup of the prime minister's tea, he offered no information about it and successfully parried the efforts of journalists of all nations, who he received tonight, to find out what really passed over the tea cups between America's chief delegate to the five-power conference and the head of the British government. It was the longest pre-conference meeting yet held in London.

With a very busy week-end still facing him, Secretary Stimson tonight gave the impression of being a tired man after the stormy finish to his trans-Atlantic voyage and the rush and excitement of landing in England and beginning work for the conference.

Railway Officials Investigate Crash

PALESTINE, Jan. 17. (P)—Officials of the International Great Northern railroad today started an investigation into the collision of a passenger train and a locomotive near Jewett last night that resulted in the death of two trainmen and the injury to six persons.

Wreckage from the collision was cleared up early today, and service over the main line resumed.

John Hall of Palestine, engineer of the passenger train, stayed with his engine and was killed. The body of L. J. H. Hughes, express manager of San Antonio, was taken from his car several hours after the crash.

HUNGER STRIKE ON

Prisoners Stage Protest
Against Discipline

HUNTSVILLE, Jan. 17. (P)—After a day of fasting, prisoners at Wayne state prison here, all of whom, tuberculosis, still were maintaining a hunger strike late tonight as a protest against disciplinary measures instituted after an attempted break was frustrated.

Meanwhile, Manager D. E. Wright, recently placed in charge of the farm, is adamant. He says the convicts can continue their strike as long as they please. No attempt will be made to force them to eat, he said.

B. C. D. Railroad Fund Surplus To Be Refunded Here

About \$6,500 Remaining In
Denver Right-Of-Way
Collections Will Be Given
Back To Contributors

\$145,000 In Fund

Surplus To Be Returned In
Proportion To Amounts
Donated; Refund Is In
Keeping With Policies

ANNOUNCEMENT was made yesterday following a meeting of directors of the Lubbock Board of City Development that a refund of the surplus is to be made within the next few days to all contributors to the Denver railroad right-of-way fund. The refund will approximate \$6,500.

Approximately \$145,000 was collected in the fund and the entire surplus, what was not used for actual purchase of right-of-way and terminal facilities, will be returned to the original contributors in proportion to the amount subscribed by each.

Amount Intact

The amount has been kept intact and all promotional expenses in getting the Denver here, the handling of funds and other incidents have been paid for by the Board of City Development. Reasons advanced for the delay in refunding were that only recently have all matters been consummated and that the committee in charge of collections had held up until the largest possible percentage of the collections could be made in order to prevent the necessity of having more than one collection. The refund will run between 1-1 and 5 per cent on the original amount and officers of the organization stated that checks would be mailed within the next few days.

High Water Still Menace In Lower Mississippi Area

Fifty Families Forced To
Move To Higher Ground
As Breaks Occur In Dike
Of St. Francis River

(By Associated Press)

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 17. (P)—The fight against high water in the Lower Mississippi Valley concentrated tonight on the St. Francis river, which flows through southeast Missouri and eastern Arkansas.

Already the stream had pushed four feet in one stretch of its levee and workers were bolstering other embankments against a new rise in the upper reaches of the river.

Breaks occurred today in the dike which protected about 10,000 acres of farm and timber land in Greene county, Arkansas. The breaks occurred north of the town of Berling and forced about 50 families to higher ground.

Levee Crews Work

Levee crews worked in a snow storm to tie together stretches of old and new embankments near Holcomb, Ark., to combat a second rise in the river due to reach that section Sunday.

Meanwhile, water pouring through a crevasse in Big Lake, in northeast Arkansas, was spreading over an area estimated at 170,000 acres into drainage ditches and subsidiary streams to eventually find an outlet through the St. Francis, below Marked Tree, Ark.

CANTONESE WINS

Lubbock, South Plains Shiver Under Sub-Zero Temperature As Cold North Wind Spreads Icy Fury Over Section

Driving Sleet Menaces Traffic Here Friday As Mercury
Remains At Two Below Throughout Day; Schools
Are Dismissed; Livestock Losses Recorded

LUBBOCK and the South Plains yesterday were frozen in the grip of the worst blizzard experienced in several years, a storm that arrived early Friday morning in the wake of a bitterly cold north wind which spread its icy fury over the entire northern section of the state.

Traffic and other activity struggled in the teeth of a driving gale which sent the mercury sliding downward to two degrees below zero, a point which held throughout the day, rising slightly with nightfall and laying of the wind.

At mid-afternoon a light snow started falling which soon changed to hard driving sleet which added to the wind and froze hard to pavement, making auto traffic extremely hazardous and walking difficult.

Little relief from the biting cold was offered in weather forecasts last night, predictions being that mercuries would experience only a slow rise.

Livestock Losses Reported

Some livestock losses have been reported in the area with the problem of food and water for range cattle becoming more serious. Streams have been frozen and the recent coverage of sleet and snow has left an icy blanket over grazing regions. Reports from regions further north were that heavy livestock losses as a result of the blizzard are expected.

Schools Dismissed

All public schools of the city were dismissed yesterday afternoon as a measure of authorities to safeguard the children against possible injuries.

Phyllis Bower, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Bower, 2422 Ninth street, while en route to school yesterday morning, suffered severely from the blizzard and was taken to a nearby residence for shelter.

Charitable agencies over the city have been busily engaged in caring for unfortunates in providing clothing.

Senate Drys Will Vote On Pro Laws

United Forces Are Ready
Accept Challenge Of Sen.
Blaine To Determine On
18th Amendment Repeal

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (P)—Suddenly uniting, senate drys served notice today that they were ready for a vote on the challenge of Senator Blaine, republican, Wisconsin, for repeal of the Eighteenth amendment.

The prohibitionists, who have given scant heed to attacks on the law by the wets since the Eighteenth amendment went into effect 15 years ago, accepted Blaine's proposition as meeting the issue. They are fully confident of having the votes to win.

There seemed to be little likelihood of a vote before the tariff contest is ended sometime next month, however. At that time there is every prospect of a held day on prohibition in the senate.

Meanwhile, over in the house the organized wet group was seeking to centralize its efforts in behalf of a campaign for modification of the dry law. Representative Stowitch, democrat, hammered away on the floor for modification.

Anti-Saloon Meet Views Prohibition In Various Angles

Officials Of Dry Bureau On Program At Conclave In Detroit; Progress Is Cited By James M. Doran

DETROIT, Jan. 17. (AP)—Prohibition was viewed from a variety of angles in addresses delivered at today's sessions of the national convention of the Anti-Saloon league.

Two officials of the Prohibition Bureau were numbered among the speakers. They were Commissioner James M. Doran and James J. Britt, attorney for the bureau.

Progress Cited. Dr. Doran said he regards it as indisputable that progress has been made and profit gained through past efforts in enforcement of the dry law. His forecast was optimistic, and he declared President Hoover's leadership was inspiring to all officers and citizens.

"This organization can do no better work than to devote its efforts to building and strengthening sentiment, starting with the smallest community unit and going up," was the commissioner's suggestion to the league.

Stand Approved.

Approval of the stand of Admiral Billard of the coast guard as expressed in his remark, "we mean business," was given in a talk before the convention last night by Bishop Thomas Nicholson of Detroit, president of the organization.

The Methodist prelate, however, gave emphasis to the educational program of the league, especially as it seeks to develop public sentiment against the law violator. He said he doubted the wisdom of legislation to make the buyer of liquor equally culpable with the seller, believing the buyer's guilt should be in the attitude of the public mind.

Stable Livestock Production Shown At Denver Confab

Readjustments Since World War Result In Profitable Basis Of Industry Railway Head States

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 17. (AP)—Livestock production throughout the United States is reaching a more stable and profitable basis as a result of readjustments since the World war, J. S. Pyatt, president of the Denver & Rio Grande Western railway, told the convention of the American National Livestock association here today.

The market for young beef steers is growing with the demand for "baby beef," Pyatt said, adding the producers have met these requirements with accelerated feeding.

Effects Far-Reaching. "Effects of this trend toward rapid finishing of beef cattle are far-reaching," he continued, "in the first place a better turn-over is afforded. The producer now can mature two steers in the time it formerly took to bring one to maturity. Then the financial strain is relieved. Shorter terms are provided for cattle loans."

Cattle finishing is a contributing factor to stabilization, for it provides a reservoir for holding back stock ultimately designed for slaughter, thus distributing more evenly the run to market.

The railroad president explained railway have been among the first to notice these changes, for they have greatly affected the livestock traffic of various routes in the cattle-producing regions.

Shift Taking Place. "An interesting shift is taking place in the location of various feeding districts," Pyatt pointed out. "The number of feeding cattle shipped into the Southwest since 1920 has declined, while the number of feeder stock sent to the West has increased during the past decade."

Colorado increased its feeder cattle receipts approximately 50 per cent between 1920 and 1928, while Nebraska gained 23 1-3 per cent in the number of feeder cattle handled. Texas was the greatest loser of feed cattle with a 36 per cent decline, while Missouri and Oklahoma each lost 23 per cent in feeder cattle receipts during the period."

Hoover Opponents Ask Borah Support

Opposition To Proposal To Change Dry Law Enforcement Awaits Expression Of Opinion From Solon

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (AP)—Opponents of the Hoover plan for strengthening prohibition enforcement are awaiting some expression of opinion from Senator Borah of Idaho and hope to gain his partial support at least in combatting the administration's legislative program.

Borah is a leader among the drys, a power in the independent republican faction of the senate and an outspoken critic of present enforcement conditions. Thus far, he has made no comment or recommendation of the chief executive or his law enforcement commission.

Although fully appreciating that Borah's support would be purely incidental so far as the senator himself is concerned, those who oppose the Hoover program pin their hopes of making him a valuable, if partial ally upon two circumstances—the nature of his recent criticism of enforcement conditions and his habitual and insistent application

of constitutional principles to all legislation. To date the principle fault that has been found with Mr. Hoover's proposals has been that the suggested broadening of the powers of the United States commissioners to enable them to try minor violations of the dry laws may possibly be unconstitutional, or threaten invasion of the constitutional right of trial by jury.

In Second Decade. Prohibition today was entering upon the second decade of its existence. Its tenth anniversary marked by speeches or other comment from nearly a dozen members of the senate and house, including Senator Sheppard of Texas and Representative Cooper of Ohio, the one a democrat and the other a republican, but both veterans of the struggle which brought the eighteenth amendment into being.

Among the day's developments was the introduction of a resolution by Senator Blaine of Wisconsin, under which the eighteenth amendment would be repealed, and of another by Representative LaGuardia of New York, declaring the eighteenth amendment invalid for faulty ratification. He asserted that although the necessary 36 states had ratified the resolution creating the amendment, only ten had actually ratified the amendment itself.

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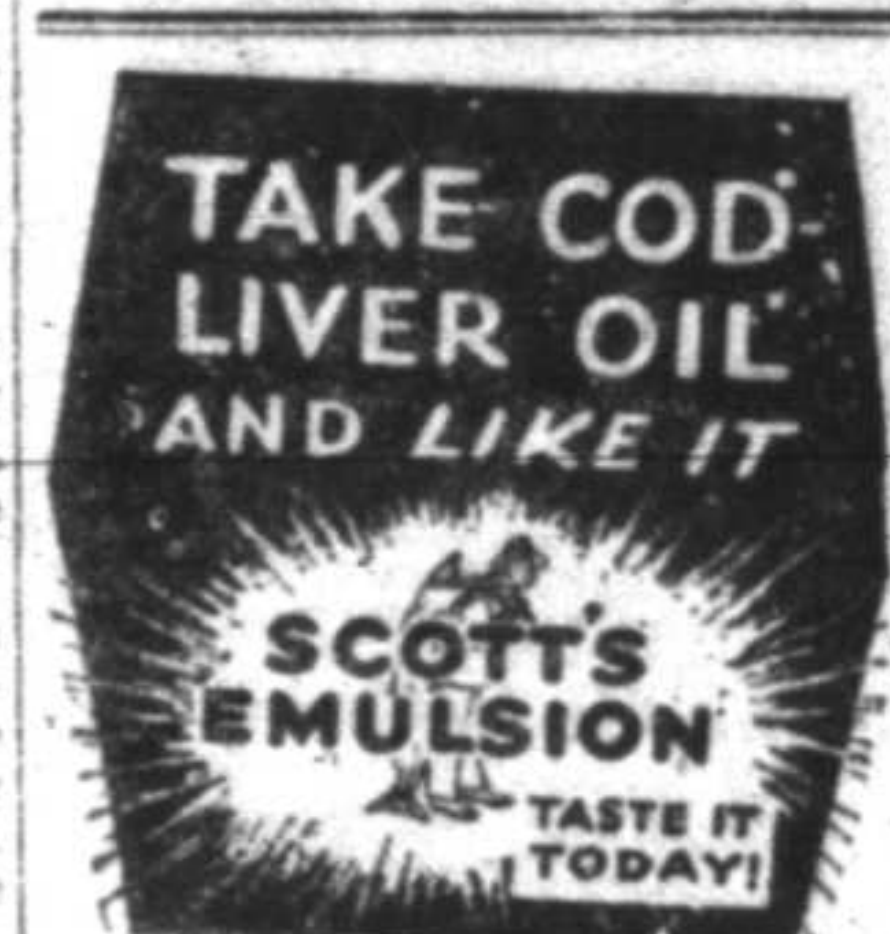

ROBERT E. LEE

THE BIRTHDAY of Robert E. Lee will be celebrated tomorrow. He began life as a soldier and ended it as the president of a small college, urging the men who had followed him to lay aside the bitterness engendered by the war and try again to make their South a great part of this nation.

To Southerners he was their great leader, a man who represented all that is best in manhood, and who took with him in silence to the grave the heartache of defeat, and sorrow for Virginia and the South in their hours of poverty and oppression.

Until recently his genius was too near the whole world, but since the World war the figure of Robert E. Lee has begun to grow into that of a hero for all time. He has not once, but many times, been placed beside the greatest men of history. Writing of him from many sides, the great American biographer, Gamaliel Bailey, a northerner, draws him on an immense canvas with a background of the few great heroes of the ages. Sir Phillip Maurice, general in the British army, in the World war places him with the six great soldiers of the world, and believes him to be the greatest of all English speaking generals.

In four years, faced with superior numbers and resources, Lee actually was defeated in but two battles, the one at Gettysburg, the other that running fight from Petersburg to Appomattox when, already, the heart of the Confederacy was shattered.

He lost Gettysburg because Stuart, the eyes of his army, was allowed to go off on a raid, and cut off by superior forces, did not reach Gettysburg in time to keep Lee informed; and because Longstreet, stubbornly convinced that the battle should be fought elsewhere, failed to fully do duty. But in spite of this he said, as he should have said, when that battle was over, "The fault is all mine. I lost the battle."

Of the six great leaders with whom his name is now placed, he stands out as the only one who did not fight for conquest or for glory. He fought only for his people and his honor.

He did not murmur at the injustice, the abuse and the humiliations that were inflicted upon him when the war was ended. He refused to take lucrative positions because he knew they would employ him were but buying his name. He went when the opportunity came, to the little village of Lexington, to Washington College which afterwards was renamed Washington and Lee, and there quietly trying to do all that he could to rebuild his state and the college, he died. So humble was his spirit that he wrote no memoir and discouraged those who would do so. Yet his fame has reached over the world and nations who gave great heroes of their own do not hesitate to place Lee's name with all others.

He abandoned his home to the enemy, he threw aside the honor of commanding the forces of the United States, he met hardship, obstinacy and defeat, he lived on a meager salary, and a bitter of no record of his ever having said a word of unkind thing.

The genius of Lee as a soldier, however, is what most interests the world. General Maurice in his book "Robert E. Lee, The Soldier" views him purely as a military man. He deals with the reasons back of Lee's genius. He tells us that Lee's movement to Gettysburg was a master stroke of war and that even as a defeat it saved the Confederacy's immediate dissolution.

Driven into a corner and with an inferior force, General Maurice shows us, the Confederate commander rose above all technique and invented methods of warfare of his own, which became the basis of World war principles. At Spotsylvania General Lee first used "trenches" as distinguished from "breastworks." Having arrived there, by brilliant movements, simultaneously with Grant, he "dug in" his trenches, and then, with firing steps, invented the zigzag trench, used traverses and approaches and anticipated the whole tactics of the World war. General Maurice says that if Lee's campaign from Spotsylvania to Petersburg had been studied, the lessons the Allies learned in the first year of the World war would have already been known to them. There are standing now at Spotsylvania trenches with perfect zig-zag traverses and approaches.

A dozen books about him have been written within the last few years, one of them classes as one of the finest biographies known, the other, as among the first rate military studies in existence.

SHEARER MUST STAY AWAY

Dispatches from Washington indicate that William B. Shearer will be barred from Great Britain if he attempts to leave his way into the forthcoming naval disarmament conference at London.

This is very good news. There seems to be a good deal of business about the exact nature of Shearer's activities at the last conference, but there is little reason to doubt that he was sent there to lose a monkey wrench into the proceedings if he could, and he did his blarney best to fulfill his mission.

How much influence the man may have had is another question. However, there is no use in taking any chances. His role at such an affair seems to be that of troublemaker. Both the United States and Great Britain will be much better off if Shearer is kept at least 2000 miles away from London while the conference is in session.

DRINKING THE EVIDENCE

The South Carolina supreme court has ruled that a jury in a prohibition law trial may drink the evidence in order to satisfy itself whether it is intoxicating.

This sounds like common sense. Yet it seems to us that it might, just conceivably, open the way for queer doings.

The supreme court made its ruling in denying the appeal of an Alken county bootlegger, who wanted his conviction thrown out because the jury that convicted him drank 40 bottles of seized beer during its deliberations.

Of course, one would think that the man had grounds for complaint. It would hardly seem that a jury would need to drink four dozen bottles of beer in order to learn whether the stuff had an illegal kick. Still, the jurors may have figured that it's best to be thorough.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

SECRETARY OF TREASURY GOES BLANDLY ON HIS ENFORCEMENT WAY DESPITE CRITICS CHYING FOR SCALP

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon can appear more serenely indifferent to the progress aught untoward, with a blood-thirsty war party at the congressional end of Pennsylvania avenue clamoring for his official scalp, than any other man in public life.

Persistently denounced by political critics, the average individual in a high government post betrays perturbation or resentment by trying to explain or defend himself, or mayhap by some defiant utterance.

Secretary Mellon simply gives no indication whatever of even knowing that a voice is being raised against him, though the Capitol dome may be reverberating with it.

Mr. Mellon does not look or behave like a thick-skinned person. On the contrary, he seems sensitive. My impression is that he would feel a jab keenly from anyone whose good opinion he valued. I imagine he could be driven to resign quite easily, if he considered himself justly found fault with.

However, I judge that he feels that the rank and file of congressmen, as well as about 99 and a fraction per cent of ordinary folk, have not the slightest idea what they are talking about. When they do talk and howler and orate he evidently considers that it does not amount to anything.

It may or it may not annoy him, if it does presumably it annoys him as one might be annoyed by a swarm of gnats—the kind of irritation it would be childish to give way to and make a big fuss over.

Mr. Mellon is under the congressional prohibitionists' fire just at present, though no one would be aware of the fact, from any attention he is paying to it.

The dries doubtless are right in their judgment that he never has been in sympathy with the Eighteenth amendment or the Volstead law in principle, but it strikes me that they are mistaken in believing that that has hampered his department's enforcement efforts.

On the contrary, I always have thought that the coast guard, which is a treasury adjunct, is the one agency that really has made something of an effective enforcement effort since it was equipped to take an active hand in combating rum smuggling.

The treasury's dry personnel ashore naturally have been lower grade men than the guardsmen from the beginning. That was to have been expected. The guard started as a picked, well-trained corps. As is generally recognized, every circumstance militated against the upbuilding of a capable dry land organization.

The guard certainly has deteriorated under prohibition, which also was to have been expected. It has been exposed to greater temptations. At that, it has been charged often with undue violence than with laxity or crookedness.

The shore force has been involved in a good many scandals, but to have the justice department's representatives, perhaps just as many as the treasury's, in proportion to numbers.

That Secretary Mellon has not been an enthusiastic prohibition enforcement head may be true. After all, it is only one of the multiplicity of treasury duties.

On the other hand, it is hard to think of anyone who could have had any less real objection to enforcement.

Many times a millionaire, no one could possibly have made it worth his while to wink at violations—or let his subordinates do so. Unquestionably supplied with ample stores of legally acquired refreshments, prohibition can mean nothing to him personally.

It is not disputed that Mr. Mellon owned some distillery stock during the ante-Volstead period, as a financier on a huge scale, he acquired interest in all sorts of industries, and distilling was only an incidental one among them; by no means his most important.

Still, obviously he was not a total abstemious advocate.

Your Health

EMOTIONAL TROUBLES CAN BE AS HARMFUL AS PHYSICAL ILLS

In our public schools today, as pointed out by Dr. James L. McCartney, there are about four hundred thousand children so handicapped mentally that they could not possibly follow the ordinary courses of study. Nevertheless, we have not yet elaborated a system that would detect these cases before they begin school, so that both their time and that of the teachers and other pupils could be saved.

It is generally recognized that there are a half million feeble-minded people in this country demanding the constant care and attention of those whose mental states approach more nearly what is called the normal. True, these defectives constitute a great problem, but in many ways they are not so difficult of control as those with good mentalities but with emotional instability.

Think of the hundreds of thousands of people who react too sensitively to simple little situations in everyday life. Think of the boy, tied to his mother's apron strings in youth, shoved out into a cold unfriendly world to make his own way. Again and again in great industries he is seen hanging like a parasite on the decisions of some motherly executive, male or female, whose pity has been aroused.

See the woman in industry who stays home every two or three weeks with headaches and dizzy spells because she has learned to avoid the difficulties of life by sickness.

Then there is the man who comes down to work disturbed by some domestic trial that is not known to those with whom he works. If he is an executive the workers under him suffer for the pettiness that he has been made to feel at home. If he is a worker far down in the ranks he plods hopelessly and without inspiration at his work because he feels that he is getting nowhere.

The human being, as has been emphasized again and again in these columns, is a composite of a mind and a body. In his daily life the reactions of his mind are far more frequent and disturbing than the reactions of his body. How many people have been taught consciously to rationalize themselves out of their emotional conflicts? And yet in the great storms and stresses of life, such rationalization is probably just as important, if not more important, than the ability to relieve an obstructed intestinal tract by a suitable laxative, or to cure a crop of boils by the right antiseptics.

Hours and hours of sleep are lost, particularly to people beyond middle age, who carry great responsibilities because they have never learned to say to themselves convincingly that tomorrow is another day, and because they have never studied enough of life and of history, to know that the great biologic mechanism of life moves steadily onward in repetitious cycles.

Today also is the anniversary of the institution of the United States Departments of Commerce and Labor, on Jan. 18, 1903.

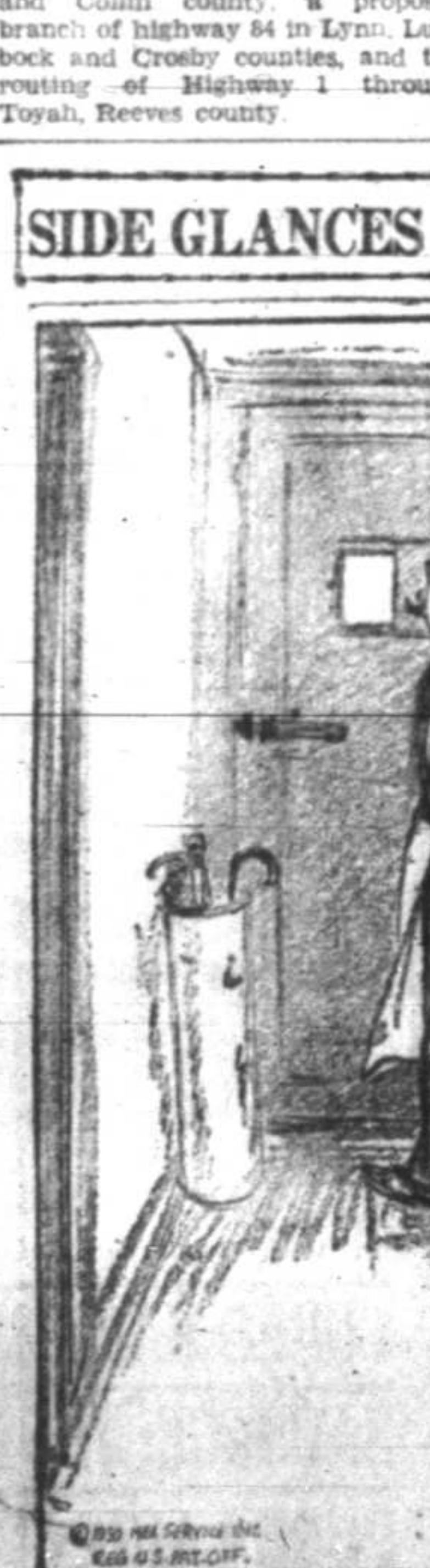

Abolishment Of Battleships Thought Unlikely

LONDON, Jan. 17. (AP)—There was little expectation in England today that the forthcoming London naval conference would result in early abolition of battleships, although that development undoubtedly would be welcomed by a large section of the British public.

He said Japan was agreeable to an extension of the holiday on construction of capital ships to 1936, and "if within that period American and British opinion approved the abolition of the ships the Japanese people probably would be ready to follow their lead."

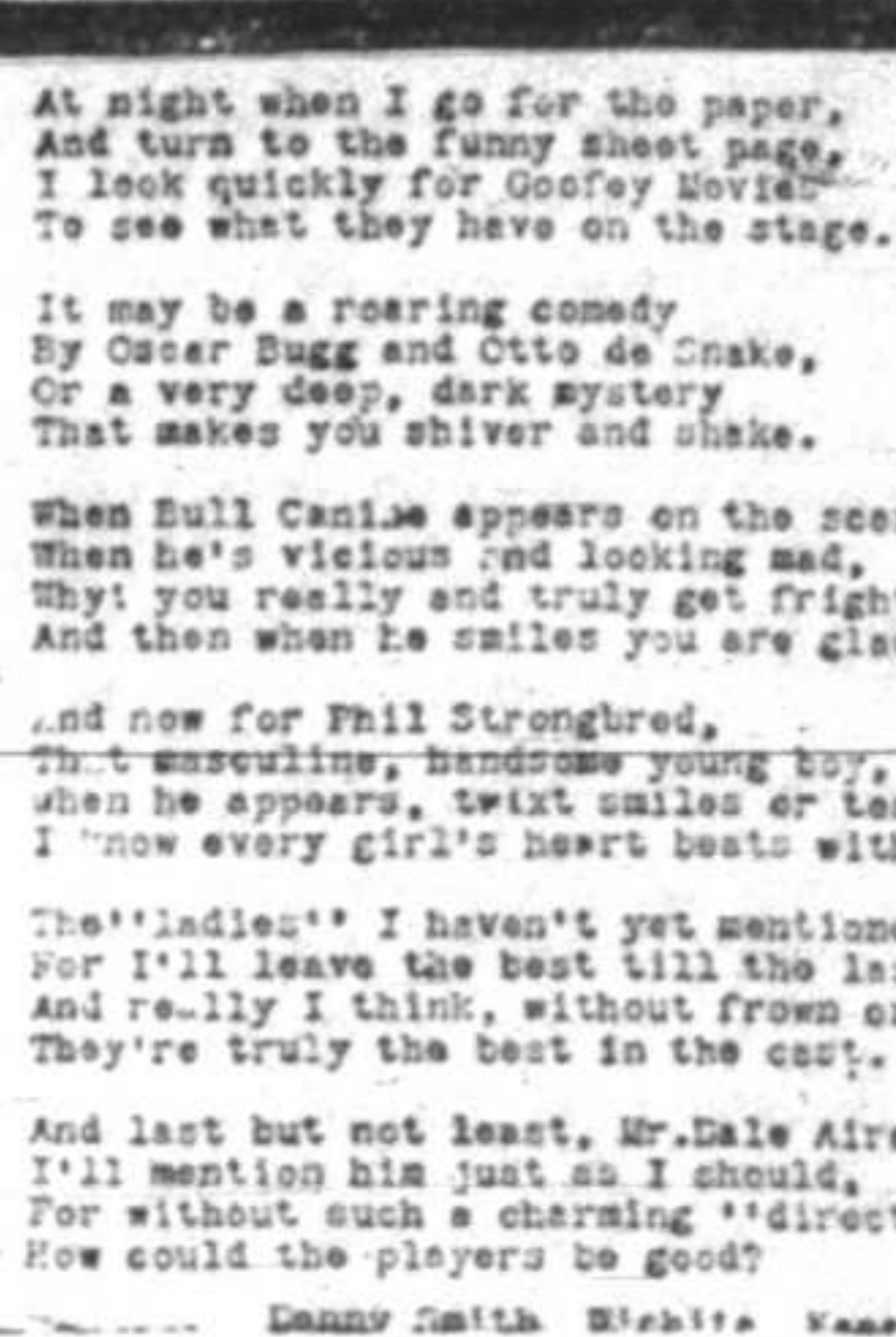
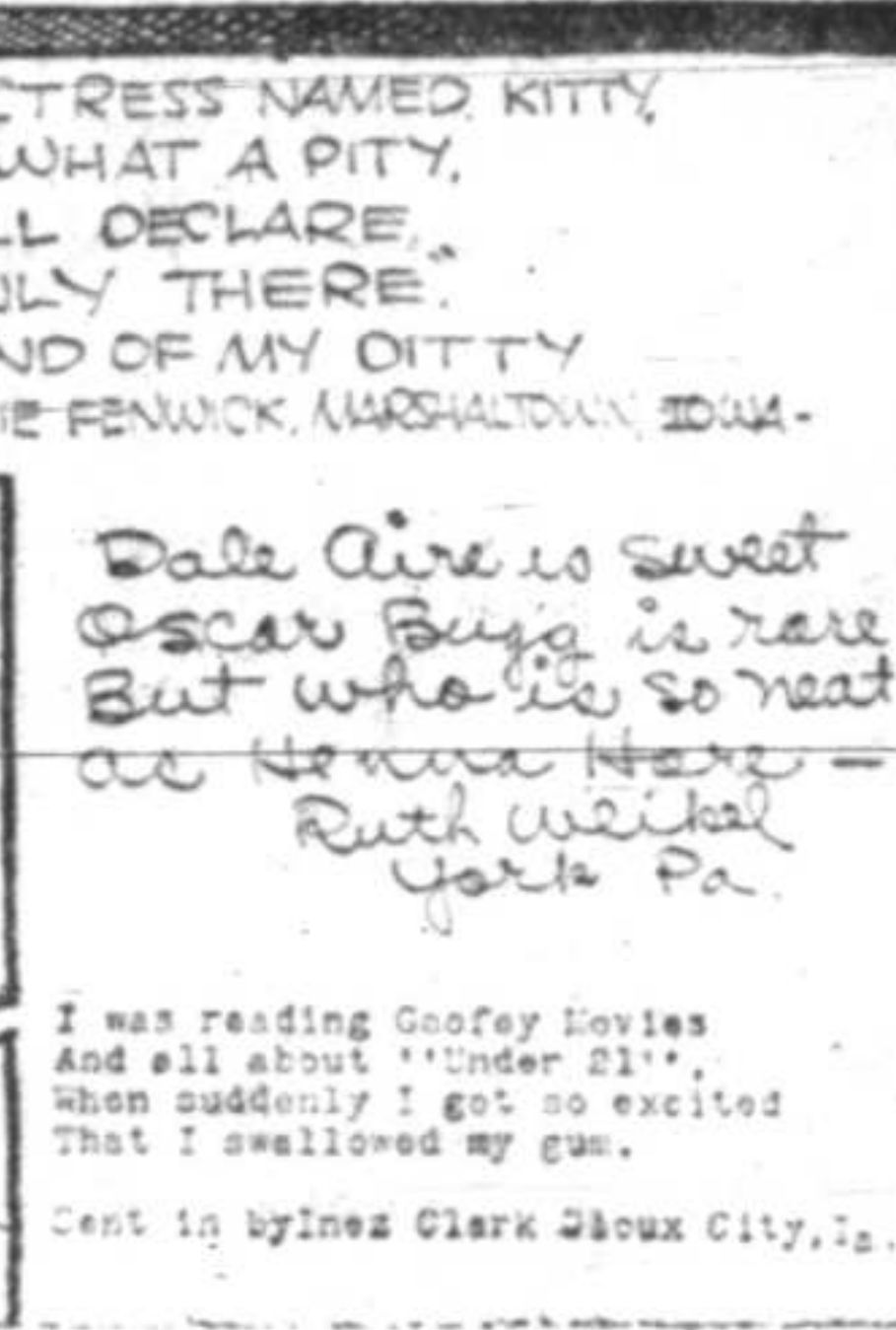

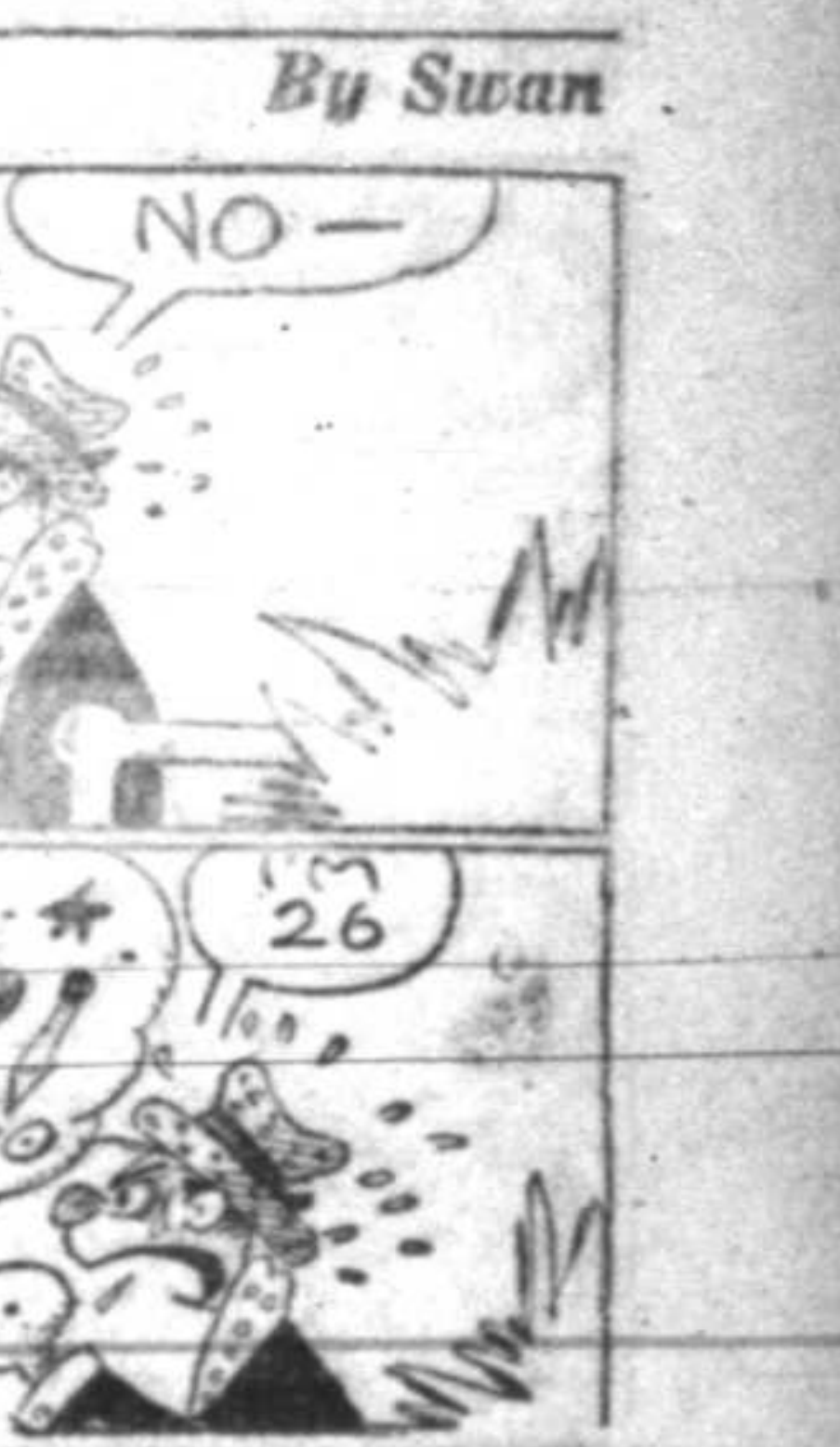

Cotton Irregular; Stocks Are Lower

Early Decline In Cotton Prices Is Checked In Mart

Trade Buying And Covering Cause Prices To Rally Late In Session After Liverpool Reports

NEW YORK, Jan. 17. (AP)—Cotton was somewhat irregular today but early decline was checked by trade buying and covering and prices rallied later on reports of a somewhat better tone in the Liverpool market. March contracts sold up from 17.27 to 17.39 and closed at 17.38 with the general market closing very steady at net advances of 6 to 11 points.

The opening was steady at an advance of 1 to 4 points with active months showing net gains of 4 to 5 points during the first few minutes in response to the early showing of Liverpool cables and rather more encouraging reports from the Manchester goods market. The initial demand was promptly supplied by realizing and southern selling which eased prices off a few points, but the market soon steadied up again on trade buying and covering.

Except for somewhat better tone of Liverpool, no particular news factor was emphasized in connection with the advance which, however, may have been encouraged to some extent by the week-end figures showing a decrease of 112,104 bales in the world's visible supply of American cotton for the week compared with 108,941 for the same week last year.

Cotton Relatively Steady Friday

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 17. (AP)—Cotton was relatively steady today in response to better Liverpool advice and on good trade buying and covering. Although an initial advance was lost in a flurry of realizing the market rallied later and March contracts which had sold off to 17.08, recovered to 17.23 and closed at 17.20 for a net gain of 6 points. The general market closed steady at net advances of 7 to 11 points.

Liverpool came in 4 points higher than day with spot sales in that market totaling 10,000 bales, the bulk of which, however, were of grades other than American. Nevertheless, initial transactions here showed advances of 2 to 3 points and after the start March traded at 17.16 and May 17.40, or 3 to 4 points over the previous close.

Demand was not aggressive and was supplied at the small advance by realizing by recent buyers. The market weakened under increased offerings, and active positions sold off a point from the early high with March trading around 17.08 and May 17.30.

Bear Traders In Friday's Session Keep Up Barrage

Entire List Is Driven To Moderately Lower Levels But Volume Of Stock In Market Is Light

BY CLAUDE A. JAGGER Associated Press Financial Writer

NEW YORK, Jan. 17. (AP)—Bear traders kept up their barrage on the stock market today, and succeeded in driving the entire list moderately lower, but uncovered few vulnerable spots. They were unable to bring any considerable volume of stock into the market, and trading slackened moderately, the day's turnover totaling 2,300,000 shares, compared to 3,043,620 yesterday.

The market remains almost entirely professional, although trading has picked up a little during the past three sessions. Commission houses report that the volume of public participation is negligible, consisting largely of stock and odd lot buying.

The recent extreme dullness caused some observers to conclude that the market was oversold, but it appears that bears, after adhering for a time to the Wall Street maxim: "Never see a dull market," were finally encouraged by the lack of enterprise shown by speculators for the day.

Bearish operations of the past two days have depressed the price index of 90 leading stocks nearly 3 points, while the gradual rise in the three preceding sessions resulted in a net gain of only about 1-1/2 points. These narrow fluctuations primarily reflect lack of convincing industrial news, rather than any definite outside influences. Operators for the advance still appear to be marking time pending the appearance of such definite signs of business acceleration as will provide the market with some impetus.

Limited Receipts In Cattle Market

FORT WORTH, Jan. 17. (AP)—Limited receipts of cattle today cleared fairly well at generally steady prices.

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Missing Hunters Return on Friday

BEAUMONT, Jan. 17. (AP)—Suffering from exposure, seven lost hunters of Orange returned here this afternoon after being missing for more than 48 hours. Their boat was grounded by high winds and they wandered in the marshes until they found a trapper's hut and shelter from the cold.

The tent of a lone trapper, camping on the banks of Green's Bayou, gave shelter to the party when the boat grounded in the bayou Wednesday night, after a sudden strong wind had blown them out into Sabine Lake. Bucking the wind and unexpected leaks developing in the boat, the seven men were drenched for hours as the boat drifted about Sabine Lake before being driven ashore today by the wind.

The trapper, in whose tent the men took refuge was said to be the only person within miles of the spot.

LAMESA, Jan. 17. (AP)—Contrary to the weatherman's predictions, the lower South Plains today was gripped in a blizzard with the thermometer hovering near five above zero. Sleet, rain and snow, accompanied by high winds, whipped this section all of today with no indication of a let-up.

SEAGRAVES, Jan. 17. (Special)—Light drifting snow with a strong blizzardy wind visited this section today. The mercury's lowest drop was registered at 6 below zero.

SLATON, Jan. 17. (Special)—Friday brought the bitterest cold to Slaton that this section has known in 12 years, according to old timers. The temperature at mid-day stood at zero and was slowly falling. Snow flurries and a driving wind intensified the effect of the bad weather. Losses of livestock were feared by cattlemen and farmers, if the mercury continues its downward trend as expected.

The four Slaton public schools were suspended Friday morning on account of the cold, despite having good brick buildings and excellent heating facilities.

FLOYDADA, Jan. 17. (Special)—The worst blizzard and snow storm of the season struck Floydada early this morning. Livestock throughout the area are suffering from the mercury stands at two degrees above.

Beginning all previous cold of the 1929-30 season, winter struck Texas as Friday with vengeance, spreading a blanket of snow over the Panhandle and much of North Texas, sending the mercury tumbling to below zero in many northwest areas and threatening to bring freezing weather as far south as the lower Mexican border tonight.

Striking in the Panhandle last night, the cold wave slowly extended its domain southward throughout Friday and Friday night. All previous records for downward slides of the mercury were broken, as drops of as much as 35 degrees in six hours were recorded. Readings below zero were general over the Plains, and forecast for possibly as far south as Dallas.

Earlier Friday a cold north wind preaged the coming blizzard. Sleet and snow followed — a dry, hard snow, that added to the wind, covering vehicles of automobiles and made traveling precarious.

All air traffic north was suspended because of the blizzard in Oklahoma and hazardous flying conditions in Texas. The Lone Star Gas company, which supplies much of North-Central Texas cities, including Dallas, warned the large consumers to turn from gas to their oil and coal supplies, in order to conserve gas for householders.

One death at Pampa was attributed to the storm. P. A. Parks, struck by a hit-and-run motorist last night, was left to freeze in the street. He was found this morning, dead shortly after.

The lowest temperature reported in Texas at a late hour was eight below zero, at Amarillo. Several other Panhandle cities reported below zero readings, and near zero readings were general over North Texas.

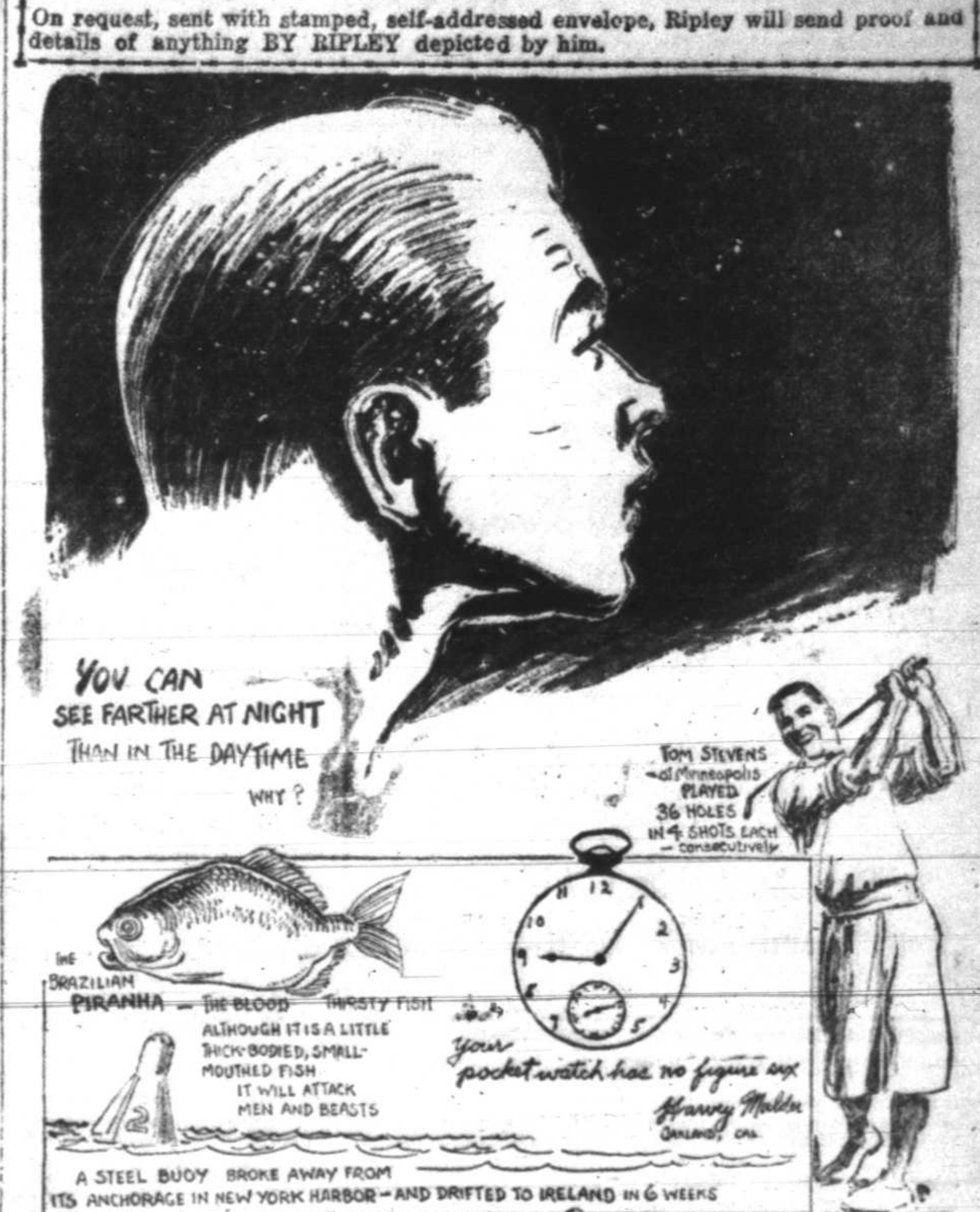

 "Teaching, preaching, healing: these were the methods for setting up the kingdom. Teaching was the new light, preaching the new power; power not of the sword but of the Word. Healing, this is what a sick world wants, this is what

the soul and bodies of men alike are crying out for. Heavenly light, heavenly power, heavenly healing—these are the weapons of the new warfare; these the regalia of the new kingdom. It is daybreak on the shores of Galilee. The Sun of righteousness has risen, and is shining in his wings."—J. M. Gibson.

Fishers of Men: (1) Humble workers, but a lofty work. (2) require tacit, perseverance, patient endurance of frequent failure. (3) workers who shall use the power that we shall not labor in vain. Two methods of fishing: with the net, catching fish in large masses; with the line, catching them one by one. Preaching and teaching: the former used to draw the crowd, would have his followers do the same.

Jesus Driven From Nazareth.

Jesus, at the time of John's imprisonment, was in Jerusalem, and immediately returned to Galilee. Matthew has omitted much that we know from the Gospels of Mark 1:15-5; 5-47, including the calling of the first disciples at Beth-abab where John was baptizing the first miracle (the turning of the water into wine at Cana), the first cleansing of a leper, the first temptation with Nicodemus, the first great ministry in Judaea, Christ's departure for Galilee and conversation on the way with the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well, the healing of the blind man, the healing of the lame man at Bethsaida, Capernaum, Christ's visit to Jerusalem at the passover, and the healing of the cripple at the Pool of Bethesda. After this he went back again to Galilee, following John's example, returning to his home town of Nazareth, but there he preached in the synagogue and refused to work miracles to satisfy the idle curiosity of his fellow townsmen, who thereupon rebuffed Him. He therefore, though it must have been very sad heart, left Nazareth and went eastward to the northwest shore of the Sea of Galilee, making His home—probably with Andrew's Peter—Capernaum, a great fishing center. This town was Christ's headquarters through all his remaining life.

The Sea of Galilee v. 18
 "And walking by the Sea of Galilee." This was so called because of the province in which it was situated. John (2:1) says, "The Sea of Tiberias," because of the city on its border. Luke (5:1) gives it the name 'Lake Genesareth,' the region at the northern end of the lake where the five thousand were fed. Josephus calls it 'The Sea of Tiberias, Chinnereth' (Deut. 3:2); Josh. 13:26—'The Sea of Slatier.' He said that two brethren, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew, his brother. "Matthew does not mean that Simon, on this occasion received the name of Peter, but that Simon is the same disciple who was afterwards famous as Peter."—Alford. These brothers were from Bethsaida, a city about two miles east of Capernaum, on the Sea of Galilee. Peter, at least, came to live at Capernaum, where Christ healed his mother-in-law of a severe fever, casting a net into the sea; for they were fishermen. The birth of the King was first announced to shepherds in the fields, so the King himself selected his immediate followers from humble, lowly men, hard workers, whose occupation made them patient, resourceful and steady. Still, in retrospect, the beginning of the Christian church have been with just such people.

"Fishers of Men." v. 19.
 "Come ye after me." Literally
 "Hereafter after me!" It was a royal
 summons, a call of authority, yet
 kindly. "And" is a word of
 "fishers of men." An utterance
 full of significance as a self-revela-
 tion of the speaker—authorita-
 tive yet gentle, indicating a poetic
 idealism, a sense of the spiritual
 tendency to figurative speech; he is tray-
 ing the rudiments of a plan for
 winning men by Christ's words
 of power. "And" is a word of
 meaning: "From he sefc h, thou
 shalt catch men," literally "take
 men alive." This is the greatest
 work that any one can do, and it
 is the work of the fisherman. "For
 ye cannot reach a thousand unless you
 can reach one. The world is never
 going to be brought to Christ
 wholesale."—Charles G. Yu. Bull

"And they straightaway left the nets, and followed Him." "Straightway," the adverb so characteristic of Mark's vigorous Gospel, is the adverb for the earnest Christian. "By the street of By-and-by one arrives at the house of C. Never." Now is always the acceptable time when one should be as to any task. "Tomorrow is the devil's word because of its effect on the mind. It is most effective temptation. Because these four fishers were 'straightway' men, Christ saw that they would make good' helpers in the work of the kingdom. The nets? They could take care of themselves. What were two nets for? They could take care of their interests of the kingdom of God? Yet a net has held many a man in its folds and kept him from following the King.

Four Disciples Called v. 21
 "And going on from thence he saw two brethren, and they were partners of Andrew and Peter (Luke 5:7, 10), and, like them, had received their call to discipleship more than a year before, at the time of Christ's baptism in the Jordan. John the Baptist became the first martyr among the Twelve (Acts 12:1), and is not to be confused with the James who wrote the Epistle, who was a brother of Jesus (Matt. 13:55) and his brother." The "disciple whom Jesus loved," writer of the incomparable Fourth Gospel, the three Epistles, and the Revelation. His disciples were all—very bold disposition, and were "sons of thunder." John was probably the youngest of the disciples and outlived the others, dying at the age of 100 years. In the boat with Zebedee, their father, he was the hus-

land of Salome, named among the women who ministered to Jesus (Matt. 27:56). This Salome was the sister of Mary the mother of Jesus, and so James and John were Christ's cousins.

Lord, would you want to be in all Galilee? Peter, who went with our Lord, told Jesus after he had said, "I will go wherever thou shalt say I shall go," "he went about doing good" (Acts 10:38). He could have accomplished much by remaining in Capernaum, teaching and healing those who came there, but he was sure to come to him from there; but he chose to go more widely more by going forth all over the land. He would have his disciples labor at home, doing intensive work, but also reaching out as missionaries to other towns and villages, as they can through their missionary gifts, to the ends of the earth. Teaching in their synagogues.

These synagogues were the "places where the Jews used to assemble for religious purposes after the return from captivity." There were many synagogues in every large town

Acts 9:2, 9). The people assembled here on the Sabbath. We may gain some idea of the proceedings in them by what is recorded in Luke 4:16.—Canon W. C. E. Newbold.
