SEN. RALPH YARBOROUGH'S NEWSLETTER

As the Texas legislature opens its special financial session, once again we hear talk of doubling the \$100 annual tuition at our state colleges and universities. While this increase — which amounts to \$400 per student over a four-year period — may seem small to the well-to-do, it poses another burden on moderate and lower-income families struggling to give their children an education.

During my 11 years in the Senate, I have dedicated myself to the proposition that a well-educated America, will be a prosperous America, a productive America, a self-sufficient America. That is why I have personally worked to shape every piece of major education legislation to be considered by Congress since 1958.

While we here in Washington are working constantly to make a college education available to every qualified American, it would be most unfortunate for our state government to raise tuition costs and thus deprive less fortunate Texans from entering our state schools. Tuition, after all is only a fraction of the cost a student or his family must pay to go to college. He must pay fees, buy books and supplies, and pay room and board. It is estimated that the full cost of a four-year college education today is over \$6,000—costs which the student or his parents must pay.

Our college enrollments have

doubled from 3 million to 6 million during the past 10 years. But in that same period, enrollment costs tripled and the cost of room and board has soared. Jack Maguire of Austin, director of the University of Texas Ex-Students Association, said recently that 411,000 high school graduates in 1966 failed to enroll in college because they could not raise the money. These were capable students, all in the top one-fourth of their class.

These bright young Americans were forced to go to work without reaching their full potential. Because the price of education was too high, they will go through life earning less money and paying less taxes than if they had successfully completed college.

The federal government has done a great deal to help youngsters from underprivileged backgrounds go on to college. We have direct loan programs for the poor, guaranteed loans for students of moderate-income families and under the college work-study program, more than 15,000 Texas college students received financial support last year, holding down jobs on campus while going to school. This year, 93 Texas colleges are participating. These are students who cannot afford to go to school without working, but who are willing to work. To put still a higher price tag on a college degree would drive many of them out of school—and Texas and the nation would be the loser.

ALERT FOR SCREW-WORMS

The number of screwworm cases in the Southwest continues to increase and is the highest since 1963. Weather conditions continue to be near ideal for the propagation of this costly livestock pest. Officials of the eradication program continue to emphasize the importance of livestock producers checking their animals at frequent intervals and submitting worm samples from all infested wounds. Knowing where the new cases are permits the dropping of sterile flies at the earliest possible time, the officials said.

Sheppard To Host 1st Round Tex.-Okla. Golf Tournament

SHEPPARD AFB, Texas — Thanks to an invitation extended by Maj. Gen. John M. McNabb, commander of Sheppard Technical Training Center, the first round of the 12th Annual Texas-Oklahoma Golf Tournament will be played on the Sheppard links Wednesday.

All told, three courses will be used to determine this year's junior champ, with the Wichita Falls Country Club layout and the Weeks Park Municipal Course complementing the base course.

The 72-hole test is slated to begin on the Sheppard links and then move to the Wichita Falls Country Club for the next 18-holes Thursday. Tourney director John Stiltz then plans a 36-hole finish at Weeks Friday, June 28th.

Over 300 entries have been received so far, with qualifying rounds set for Tuesday at Weeks. Sixty-four hopefuls will comprise the eventual starting field.

The Nation Needs The Rails

A new kind of unit train may be just over the horizon. Such trains already been used successfully in some areas for the movement of heavy quantities of one item, such as coal from mine to plant. A unit train is simply a set of permanently coupled cars and engines operating as a unit, shuttling back and forth continuously between fixed assembly and distribution points. Now, it has been proposed that this kind of train be used to move California produced food items to major midwestern and eastern markets.

Here again is an illustration of how the normal technological progress of an industry works to the benefit of all of us. In recent years, the railroads have been undergoing a technological revolution that has been a substantial factor in stemming the march of inflation. They have held down transportation costs while other costs, including wages, have been soaring. They have been an economic stabilizing influence of vital importance. If coast-to-coast unit trains carrying food to eastern distribution centers prove feasible, it is not hard to visualize the cost-cutting possibilities of a steady stream of these trains moving at high speeds across the continent carrying millions of tons of products from the farms, factories and ranches of the West to the populous East.

A rail official, with good reason, has characterized the railroads as a "growth industry." He knew what he was talking about also when he said, "... the nation has long needed us. In the years ahead, we're going to make it want us, too."

SAFETY AND ABUNDANCE

Remember when that new invention called DDT came on the market? As if by magic, it cleared our homes of the disease carrying housefly. Chemical pesticides came into wide use, not only in the home, but more importantly in agriculture.

As with nearly every innovation or invention, controversy arose. Fear was expressed that pesticides were poisoning our food and posing a threat to the health of man and wildlife. Of late years, the air has gradually cleared of misunderstanding and prejudice. Chemical pesticides are now known for what they are, a revolutionary advancement in the science of agriculture.

Secretary of Agriculture Orval Freeman recognized this truth most forcefully in an Address to the Agriculture and National Resources Committee of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. Of chemicals and pesticides, Mr. Freeman says, "The world can't feed a population that may reach seven billion or more in another three decades without them. We couldn't feed our own people at the lowest cost in the world — less than 18 per cent of disposable income this year — without the help of them. This is primary."

As to the environment problems created by the use of chemicals, he pointed out that the Department is making steady progress, and "Research in this field has been greatly expanded. We recognize the great danger from improper pesticide use. We're working constantly on better regulation, better instruction, and better information in using them."

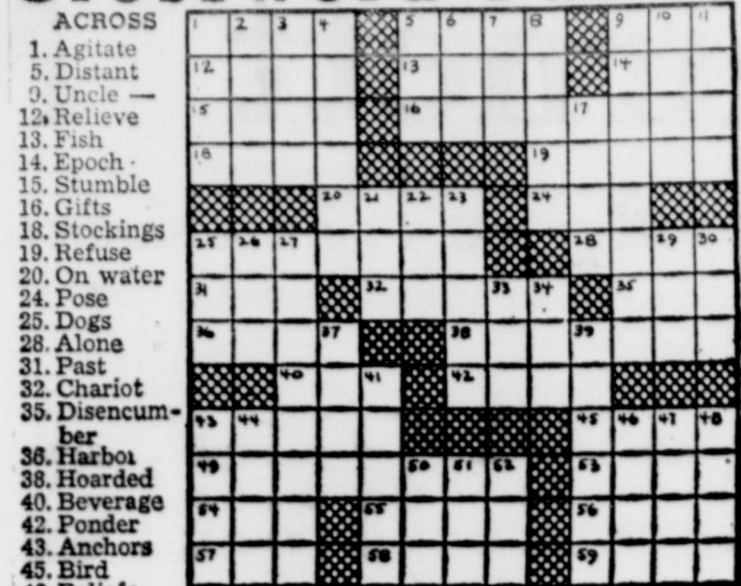
The chemical pesticide industry itself has taken the lead in pesticide use education, even as it has ushered in a new agricultural era of unprecedented productivity.

CATFISH PREFER MUD

If a man could pick exactly the right time to go catfishing, he'd say, "Give me a rising river and plenty of mud."

For some reason, known only to the cats themselves, catfish go on a feeding binge whenever rains upstream swell the rivers and cloud the waters with a curtain of mud. HOW TO FEEL AT HOME AWAY FROM HOME

Whether or not you've ever stayed at a hotel or motel, these tips may help you get the most enjoyment from the experience.

Reservations: You can call or write direct, or a travel agent can tell you about accommodations and make them for you at a hostelry of your choice. If you hope to take a trip this summer, "Discover America Vacation Planning Time," April 21-27, is a good time to see a travel agent for information.

Late Arrivals: At most hostels, you're welcome any hour of the day or night, but if you'll be much later than stated in the reservation, a "call to hold" is a safeguard as well as an appreciated courtesy.

Arriving Without Reservations: If you should happen to end up somewhere without a reservation, don't be afraid to ask about prices or even to see the room, if you wish, before taking it.

Checking In: When you arrive, go to the registration desk—in the hotel lobby or first unit of a motel. Young couples often think they'll be asked for a wedding certificate—as a rule, signing in as Mr. & Mrs. is sufficient. Don't carry your own bags to the room—that's the bellhop's job.

Tipping: Give the bellhop or porter not less than 25¢ per bag; 15-25¢ to the doorman if he gets you a cab or helps with luggage; and at least \$1.00 to



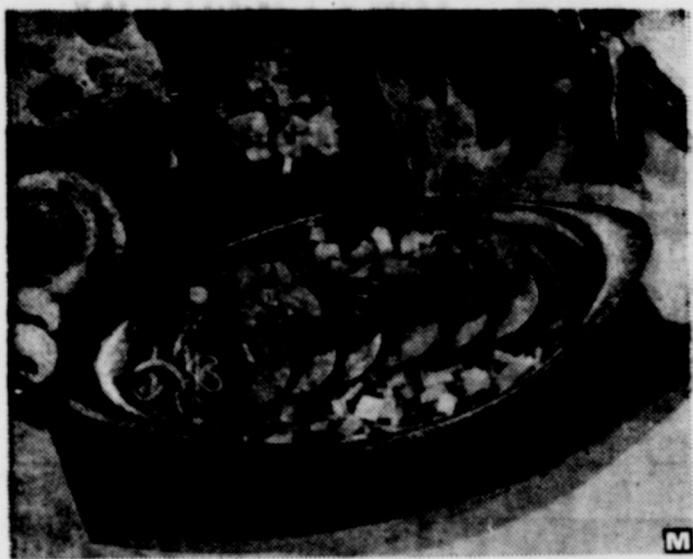
the chambermaid after a stay of a few days.

Rules and Regulations: They're usually posted in the room, but most places want you to make yourself at home, provided it stops short of running through the halls or blaring the radio into the wee hours.

Services: The nicest thing about staying at a hotel or motel is what you don't have to do—cooking, for example. Most hotels have restaurants or even room service. Services may include steno, valets, baby sitters or getting tickets to a concert or play. They'll also wake you in the morning and keep your valuables in the hotel safe.

Departure: Check out time is usually noon. It's important to be out by then, so you won't have to pay for an extra day. When you're ready to go, call the desk, and they'll send a porter for your bags, have the bill ready—and send you on your way with a smile.

For variety that adds a minimum of calories and takes just a few minutes to prepare, try this delicious recipe:

SWISS PASTA & SAUCE

Ingredients:

- 1 can Metrecal spaghetti with meat sauce diet dinner (225 calories)
- 2 large mushrooms, sliced, or 4 small ones or 1/3 cup canned mushrooms (17 calories)
- 1 tablespoon Swiss cheese (38 calories)

Directions:

Combine all ingredients. Heat in oven (350°) or on top of range until warm and cheese has melted. Garnish with green pepper slices if desired. 280 calories

News From The County Agent

Warm weather has arrived so you need to store your winter clothes carefully so they will be in good condition.

Store only clean garments, advises Thelma Wirges, County Home Demonstration Agent. Spots and stains will be harder to remove if they stay on the garment all summer—and moth damage is more likely on soiled clothes, too.

Wash and dry thoroughly all washable garments—don't use starch. Send soiled garments to the dry cleaner, and call his attention to spots and stains and to any care instructions given on the garment's hand tags.

Miss Wirges stresses that all the garment's should be free of moths. Dry cleaning or washing will kill moths in all stages of growth. Brushing and sunning garment also rids them of moths, as well as moth eggs and larvae (the larvae do the damage to clothes).

For added protection against moths, you may want to spray the clean garment with DDT, methoxychlor, chloroform, Strobach or Perthane before storage—following directions and observing the cautions given on the container label. Directions for "moth balls", paradichlorobenzene chrysalis or naphthalene flakes or crystals, on the container suggest the amount to use, she says.

Remove plastic buttons, buckles and other plastic ornaments before storing garments and avoid using plastic hangers, the agent advises. The plastic may cause a stain or melt into the fabric, especially if the garments are stored in a warm, dry place such as an attic or if "moth balls" are put in with the clothes.

If space is available, hangable garment bags on rust-proof hangers. Put sweaters and other knitted garments in garment bags or boxes.

Tightly-wrapped paper packages, air-tight boxes or chests, or garment bags are the best storage places. Cedar chests are old favorites for winter clothing storage, but all garments must be moth-free before they are put into a cedar-chest. Cedar oil vapor does kill small moth larvae but not older, larger ones and as a cedar chest gets older, there is less cedar oil vapor.

Other winter garments need

the proper storage, too. Furs usually should be cleaned professionally and stored in fur storage vaults where the temperature is low. Summer heat in home closets tend dry the skins.

Felt and yarn hats should be brushed thoroughly and the head bands should be cleaned with spot remover. Be sure to follow the manufacturer's directions on the remover's label and use it in a well-ventilated room.

Stuff the crowns of the hats with tissue paper and place them, uncrowded in boxes. You may want to add one of the moth preventatives to the boxes.

Clean and polish leather shoes and bags, using a leather cleaner or saddle soap. Protect them from dust by wrapping or placing them in boxes. Since leather is subject to mildew, check leather items periodically during storage and provide plenty of air circulation if the storage area is damp.

Major pattern companies have revised their sizing. Although the companies follow a standard set of measurements, their patterns differ in fit.

Thelma Wirges, Extension home demonstration agent, says shoulder width and slant, shape of armholes and necklines and slant of the underarm may vary, along with ease allowed for body movement and comfort. Because of these variations, some brands will fit you better than others. While bust, waist, hip and back waist length measurements are a guide, you may need to try different brands of garments to find the best possible fit, she explains.

When selecting the size, compare your measurements with the chart and select the size which most closely corresponds to them. When you select the correct figure type and pattern size, alteration and fitting problems are kept to a minimum, says the agent.

Take snug, but not tight measurements. Use a tape measure that is in good condition.

Take bust measurements around the figure over the fullest part. The waist should be taken at the natural waistline.

Measure from the bone at the base of the neck to the

waistline for the back waist length says the agent.

For the hip inches, measure around seven inches below the waistline for half sizes, junior petite and young junior-teen; and nine inches below the waistline for misses, women and junior sizes.

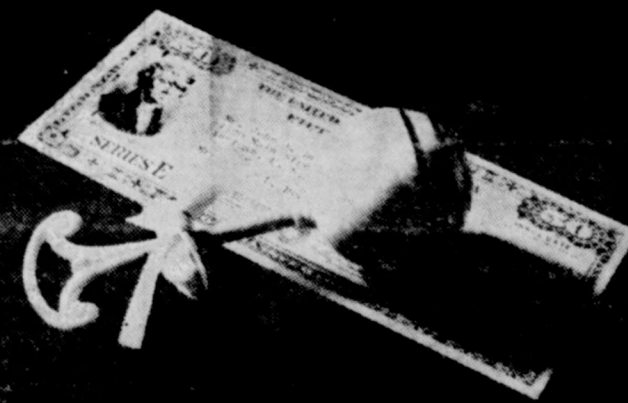

Additional amounts payable under accidental death or other special provisions are not included.

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SENSING THE NEWS

As the country plunges into the election season, with candidates for the presidential nomination stepping up their appeals, there is a depressing air of staleness about many of the statements and speeches. So many of the proposals by the candidates have the smell of defeatism about them. Their ideas for running the United States during the next four years smack of philosophies that have failed.

The American people may be discerning that the country has traveled too far down one road—to a dead end. The nation needs a new start and under new leadership.

Seven years ago, when the Kennedy administration took power, the country was forced into a new path that to many citizens seemed alien and unwise. One disaster after another has struck this country since 1961. There was the Bay of Pigs fiasco, in which the Kennedy administration failed to press ahead and re-win Cuba for freedom. Then there was the Cuban missile crisis of 1962, which left the Reds firmly in control of Cuba and resulted in the U.S. quietly withdrawing missiles from Turkish soil. The nuclear test ban treaty of 1963 left the U.S. in a position where it couldn't test the super weapons that the Russians already had acquired. That treaty, surely, was one of the greatest menaces to American security.

In 1964, the Johnson administration imposed the War on Poverty on the United States. Billions of dollars were pumped into "community action" organizations, with the result that strife worsened in the country and agitation groups found an enormous new source of funds.

As 1965 began, the Johnson administration began to send large numbers of U.S. servicemen to Vietnam. The cost of the Vietnam war commenced to skyrocket, but the administration declined to press for victory in Vietnam. To this day, the administration has refused to lay waste the homefront base of the Communists in North Vietnam. It has resisted appeals from Congress that the port of Haiphong be blockaded.

The administration made the tragic mistake of allowing the war to be fought on the soil of our allies, instead of carrying the war to North Vietnam. Despite the billions of dollars

spent on the war, the administration has declined to accept the truth of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's observation that "there is no substitute for victory." The situation is perhaps even more disturbing on the homefront. Inflationary spending policies, in time of war, has damaged the dollar, to the point where a major monetary crisis threatens to overwhelm us.

The Johnson administration has failed utterly in maintaining the domestic tranquility that the Constitution seeks to guarantee. Several public figures of the administration cloth have actually encouraged the social rebellion that now causes massive upheavals in the nation's cities.

The environment of Liberalism that has been dominant in the federal government since 1961 has given the demonstrator-hoodlum elements a feeling of great confidence. They invaded the nation's capital in late April and say they will camp there until Congress meets their demands. A rabble of Vietnams and Black Power elements believes that it can dictate to the U.S. government. Who can say what will come from this rabble army of protesters that has built a shanty-town between the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial? The British once burnt the capital of the United States. This time the deed of arson may be perpetrated by the new anarchists who have been encouraged by two recent administrations to believe that civil disobedience is their right.

Never in its history has the United States been at such a pass as it is today. The arsonist and the looter openly threaten law-abiding people and entire communities. Urban revolutionaries threaten to "burn" America if they do not get their way.

If the United States does not get a change of leadership next year, if civil disobedience is not repudiated and the revolutionaries are not jailed, the future existence of the Republic will be in question. In the next election, the American people may be deciding whether they want their nation to survive as a free and peaceful land, means an empty phrase.

"Law and Order" is by no means an empty phrase. At the end of the day, every man knows whether or not he has done a fair day's work.

JEWISH MUSEUM WAS ONCE GHETTO



The finest Jewish museum in the world is located in Prague, the capital of Czechoslovakia. Covering several square blocks and including a number of centuries-old buildings, many of them synagogues, the museum area was once a ghetto. 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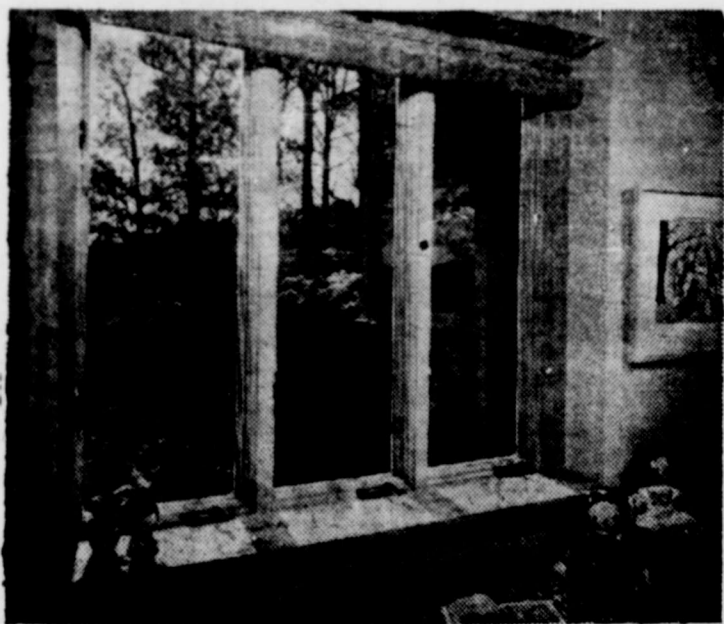

Window Styles Can Widen Outdoor View

If you're lucky enough to have a good view from more than one side of your house, don't lose sight of the advantage.

You may not want a fixed-sash picture window, or a bow or bay in every room, but there are other adaptable wood window styles that will bring the beauty of outdoors inside, and still suit the room in which they're installed.

For instance: Casement windows are an ideal way to give your kitchen a view. They swing outward at a 90-degree angle with the turn of an easy-to-reach handle, making them convenient for that awkward area above the sink. Their uninterrupted glass area affords wide visibility, especially when used as double units or in a series above the countertop. Casements are readily available at local lumber dealers in stock sizes of ponderosa pine.

Sliders open to the left and right, and are suitable almost anywhere. Like casements, they open and close easily, and have no crossbars to interfere with

the view. Awnings open upward and outward at a 90-degree angle for maximum ventilation, and come in stock sizes (some as large as approximately three by four feet) to give an expansive view.

Hoppers are similar to awnings, except that they open inward and down. Either style can be stacked three or four across and atop one another to create the illusion of a glass wall. They make an unusually distinctive window treatment used this way, especially in dining and family rooms.

Sliding glass doors in wood sash are a natural for rooms that lead to patios, decks, terraces or a rustic-view backyard. Insulating glass is recommended for glass doors because, combined with the natural insulation of wood sash and factory-applied weatherstripping, it affords the best safeguard against heat loss in winter and heat gain in summer. This assures that the room from which you will enjoy the changing beauty of the outdoors will be comfortable all year round.



Oikology, anyone? Here are a few suggestions for improving your rating in the scientific pursuit of housekeeping.

Summerizing Suggestions: For the light look of summer retire as many mini-objects (what-not types) as you can. They don't allow for a cool, spacious feeling. Replace heavy ashtrays with light sunny ones, and for containers use open-weave baskets. Clean the items you store; then wrap in plastic bags for their fall coming out.

Fireplace Spruced up for Summer? If it's not, first, take the logs, grates, grill and debris out. Sweep away what's left. Then fill a bucket with a pine oil cleaner and warm water. Apply with a maxi-brush or sponge to clean, degrease and deodorize fireplace all at once. Transform it into a miniature garden with flowers, greens or plants.

Brush-away: Assemble an inventory of basic household brushes and store them where you can find them. There are brushes for everything from basting and bottle brushes to the familiar scrub brush for cleaning and wire bristle ones for barbecue grills. Keep your brushes clean. Soak them in a pine oil cleaner, rinse, and shake off excess water. Hang them up to dry. For a new storage idea try a French butcher's rack usually used for hanging pots and pans.

FLOOR SYSTEMS TOO

While wood plank-and-beam construction is popularly associated with roof structures, it has also been utilized with increasing frequency for floor systems.

According to the Southern Pine Association, horizontal lumber beams—widely spaced—are placed above the foundation. Wood decking is then applied across the upper edges of the beams.

The decking does double duty as a structural element and a comfortable, attractive walking surface.



Policyholder Questions Answered by the Health Insurance Institute 277 Park Ave., N. Y., N. Y., 10017

Q. I just had my eyes checked by a doctor and luckily I don't need glasses. The doctor said however that it is possible that in a few years I may have to start wearing them. Is there any kind of health insurance that I can buy which will help me pay for eye examination and glasses when I need them?

A. Probably not. There are some group insurance programs which provide some benefits toward vision care, but this type of coverage as such is not general. Insurance companies have been experimenting with vision care coverage. Until sufficient experience in this area of insurance is gathered by insurers, it isn't likely that it will be generally available.

Q. Do you have any information on how many people have to enter a hospital in a year's time?

A. In 1966, the figure was about 27 million patients. That means that during the year an average of 73,694 persons entered the nation's non-federal, short-term general hospitals.

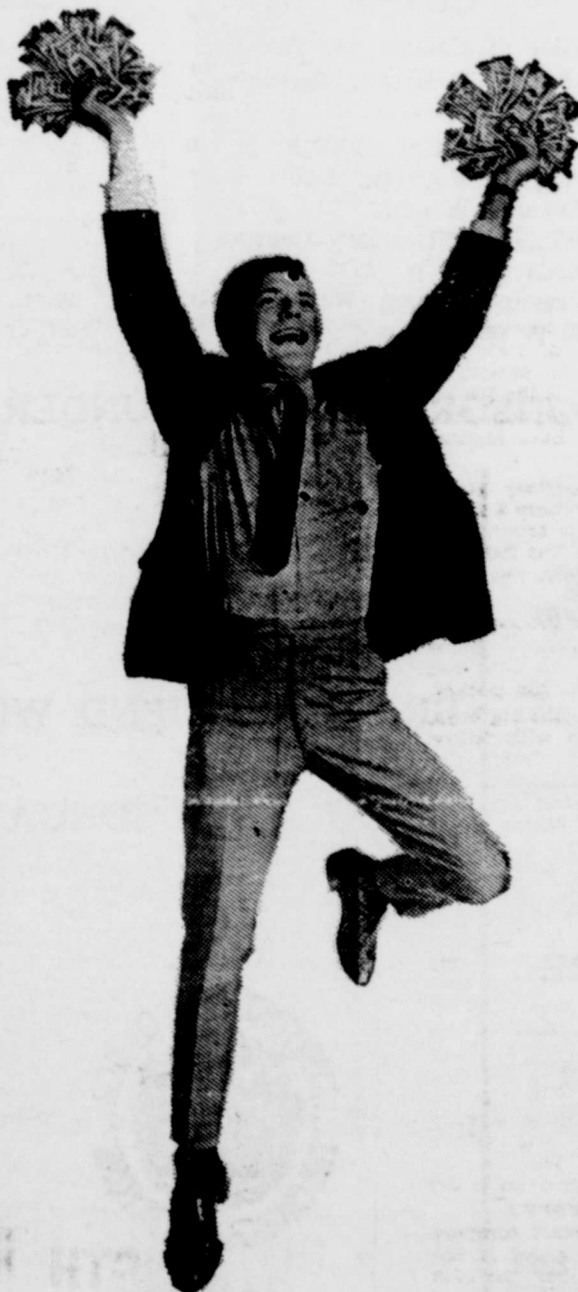

Some of the items of days gone by, the boom days of Burk-burnett, to be seen in store windows during Heritage Week were as follows:

The American Business Women's Association constructed a replica of a schoolroom at the turn of the century, complete with teacher and student. The fine display included several antique books.

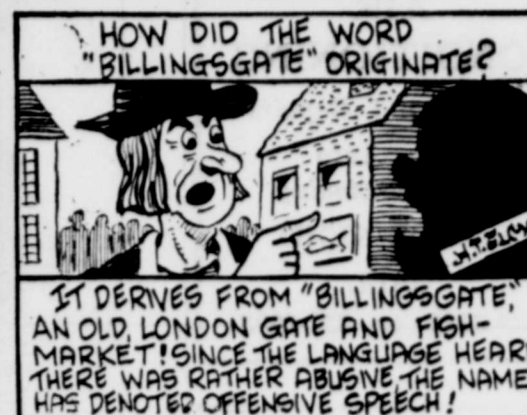
Clippings and pictures of newsworthy events, dating from 1910, were to be seen in the window of Adams Drug Store.

Handmade quilts, one with 128 diamond shaped parts set in large star patterns, and an old-time flower bouquet arrangement were contributed by the Bluebonnet Garden Club.

A hot air stove used to heat the second floor of the early home, was shown by the Burk-burnett Study Club. The stove was connected by a pipe from the first floor allowing the heat to rise to the top floor. The club also put on display other antiques.

wish to return to the 'good old days' when ladies cooked in cast iron pots, such as were exhibited by the Contemporary Study Club.

The organization also brought forth as Heritage reminders, an iron bound trunk, and a canopied doll bed which had been made in 1868.

Dress fashions of yesteryear are always fun to see and the Current Literature Club provided several, along with pictures of the well known pioneer, J. G. Hardin, and other prominent persons of the times.

A fine collection of antique were placed on view by the guns, the oldest dating to 1873, Lions Club.

The Junior University Study Club was responsible for dis-

playing the saddle bags of Dr. W. W. Gill, along with other relics.

An old cook book and home remedy book, group pictures of pioneers in the 1910 era, and antique china, were the reminiscent items shown by Postelwait Cleaners.

Rosark Office Supply Store window contained family heirlooms such as family pictures and hand painted china.

The first issue of the 6666 Star, the ancestor of the Burk-burnett Star; early church pictures, scenes depicting the early oil boom, dolls from as far back as 1870, were collected for showing by the Rotary Club.

The Senior Citizens Club contributed a wedding dress worn by a bride over 100 years ago.

The club also placed in store windows, a collection of irons, china, glassware, and old musical instruments.

An 83 year old clock, which runs still; a quilt containing hundreds and more, of half-inch squares, and an arithmetic book used in 1885, were the Theta Epsilon Sorority participation in Heritage Week.

A window display on conservation contained mounted game birds and monthly publications of the Texas Park and Wildlife Department. It was arranged by the Unity Garden Club.

YOUR PRESCHOOL CHILD

The most rapid growth in relation to size occurs in preschool children, especially from one to three years of age.

This means they need more of the body-developing foods even though their total food consumption cannot equal that of older children and their parents.

Doesn't this suggest that you'd better see that they get the most important foods in adequate amounts?

Stomachs Hold Only So Much

You will need to help your preschooler learn to like the foods that offer him the most protein, minerals, and vitamins for their weight and bulk. After all, small stomachs can hold only so much, and we must be sure that less nourishing foods, such as concentrated sweets and cookies, don't crowd out the important body-building foods.

Don't worry about your child eating some food between meals. Some children cannot hold a lot of food at any one time. Studies at nursery schools show us that if snacks are eaten far enough ahead of mealtime, the child's appetite for lunch and dinner will still be good.

Can Become Too Hungry

We have even found that if a child becomes too hungry or too tired before a meal, he may become so irritable he will fail to eat well when mealtime does come.

The rapid growth of the preschooler does, usually, slow down, often around three years of age. With this, his appetite will also be reduced. If you know this is to be expected, you will not become alarmed when it happens.

Good snacks for children are milk, fruit, vegetable relishes, juices, cheese, bread and butter sandwiches. These foods, as parts of the four food group pattern we talk so much about, will help make sure your young child is getting the nourishment he really needs.

For Forming Good Eating Habits

To help the youngsters form good eating habits early, here are some pointers: Serve small portions of foods, using manageable-size glasses for milk and juices. "Finger" foods are fun. Bite sizes of cheese, hard-boiled egg or tomato, cubes of meat, carrot strips, and small sandwiches will go "down the hatch" easily.

Keep food temperature moderate, rather than too hot or cold. Keep seasoning modest, too. Others in your family can pep up their food by using their own additional seasoning.

Don't worry if your child indulges in a "food jag" — eating a certain type of food repeatedly. If you don't make an issue of it, he should get back to a more varied diet shortly. Try disliked foods in a new way, or with a food he likes. It may help. And always set a good example by following good food habits yourself.

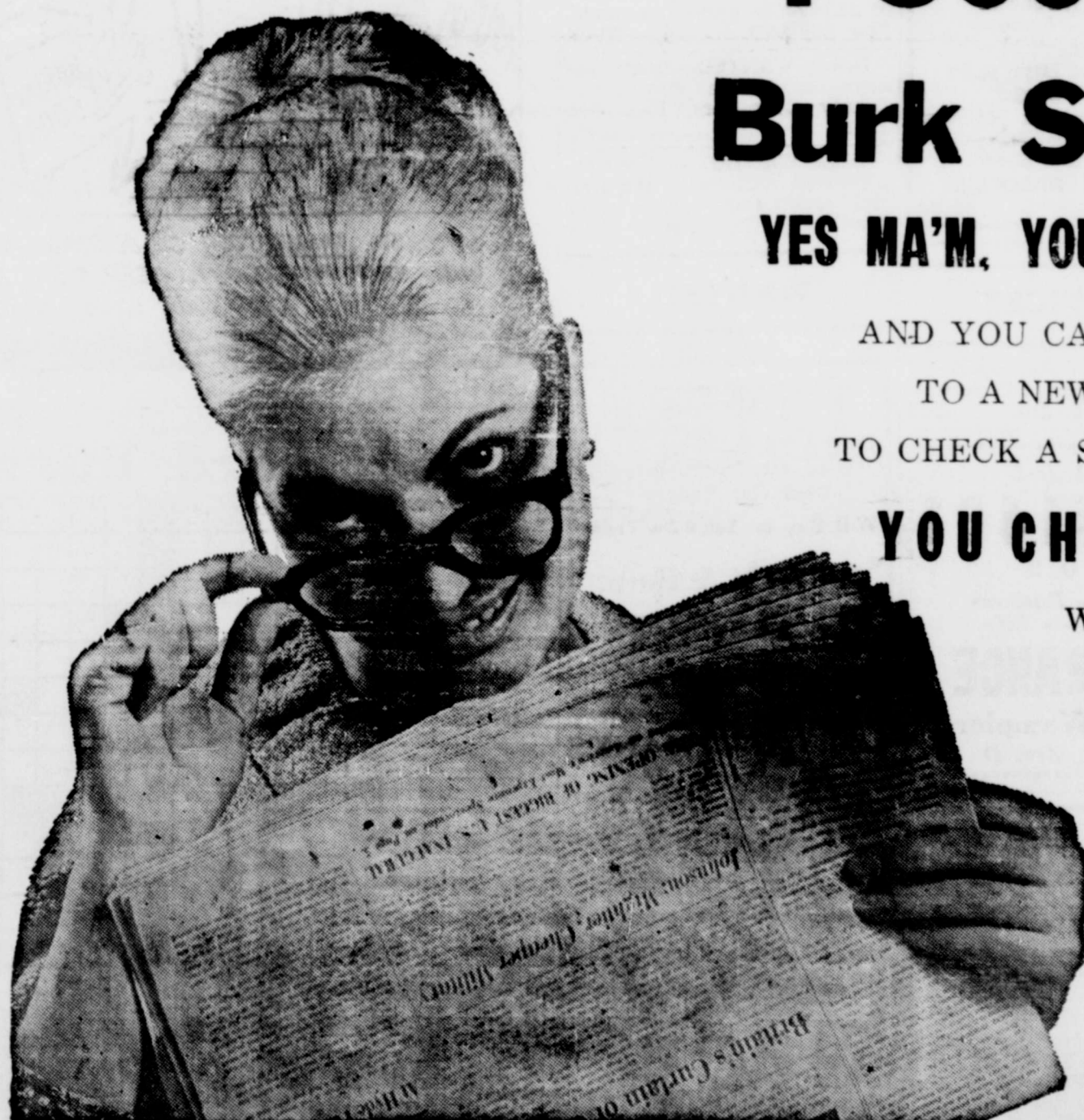

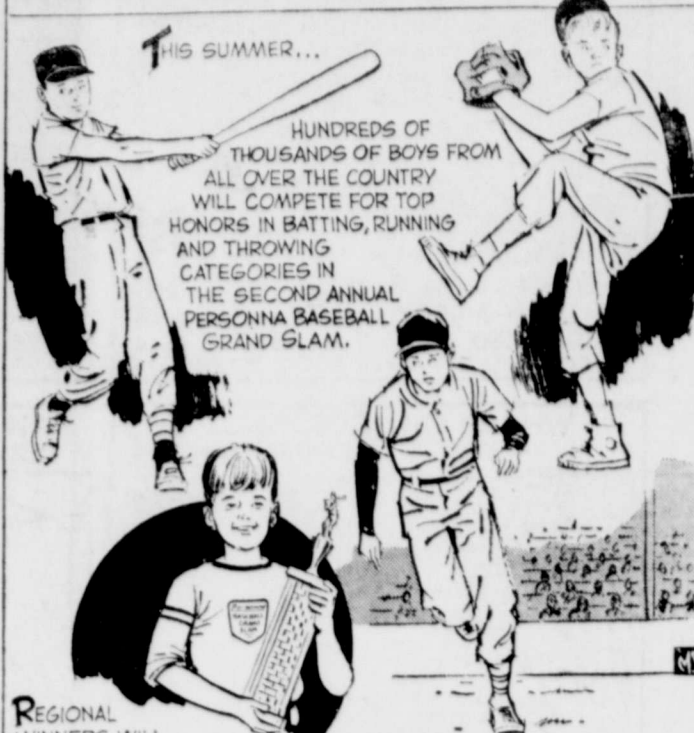

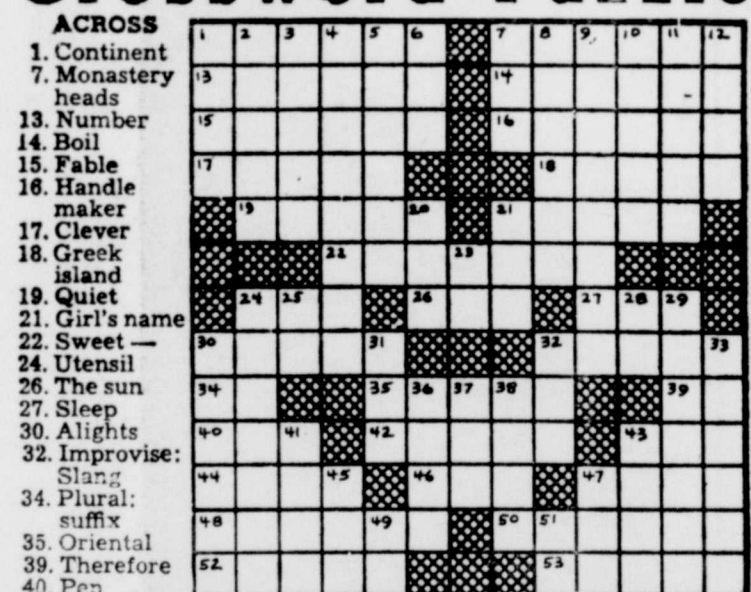

Ham Encores

The nice thing about ham — thrifty cut or picnic, it's good right down to the marrow of the bone. You use the bone of course for good old-fashioned pea soup... the drippings for American-fried potatoes. As for the leftover meat, how about ham on rye to go alongside those bowls of hot soup? Or a ham-and-cheese souffle? Or try my Hurray-up Ham Casserole which includes its own hot biscuits. Serve with Spinach-Apple Toss and you have a well-balanced meal in two easy dishes. Now maybe you wish you'd bought a bigger ham? Think about it next time.

Hurray-up Ham Casserole

1 can (3 ounces) sliced mushrooms, drained
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon New Bisquick
1 can (10 1/2 ounces) cream of celery soup
1/2 cup milk
2 cups cubed cooked ham
Biscuit dough

Heat oven to 450°. In saucepan cook and stir mushrooms and onion in butter until onion is tender. Blend in New Bisquick. Cook over low heat, stirring until mixture is bubbly. Remove from heat. Stir in soup, milk and ham. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Pour into ungreased 1 1/2-quart casserole. 2 tart red apples
8 slices bacon, crisply fried and crumbled
2/3 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
1/2 cup frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed

Wash spinach; remove stems. Tear leaves into bite-size pieces; dry and chill. Just before serving, quarter unpared apples and remove core. Slice quarters into large salad bowl. Add spinach and bacon; toss lightly. In small bowl, mix mayonnaise and orange juice concentrate; pass to spoon over salad. 8 servings.
