## Highway Project Awaits Local Approval

AUSTIN — The Texas High-  
 way Department today urged  
 acceptance by the City of  
 Wichita and Clay County of  
 plans for the construction  
 of 3.5 miles of multi-lane im-  
 provements to U. S. Highway  
 287 in the Henrietta area.  
 Highway Engineer D. C.  
 underlined the urgency.  
 It is imperative to the safety  
 and convenience of the travel-  
 ers that improvements  
 be undertaken at once on U.S.  
 287 in the Henrietta area,  
 he said.  
 Multi-lane improvements on  
 important Wichita Falls-to-  
 Fort Worth traffic artery have  
 been completed or initiated  
 on most of the route, with  
 exception of Clay County  
 section.  
 No work can be started until  
 officials act.  
 The proposed improvements  
 have been the subject of extend-  
 ed discussions between the Tex-  
 as Highway Department and  
 local authorities. The estimated  
 cost of the improvements is  
 \$2 million. The estimated  
 cost of right of way is  
 \$1 million. The Department is  
 ready to proceed with  
 multi-lane improvements  
 at a point near the west  
 end of Henrietta to a  
 near Fuller Creek. Esti-  
 mated construction cost of the  
 section is \$2 million.  
 Department also is ready  
 to proceed with multi-lane im-  
 provements from Fuller Creek  
 east to the existing multi-  
 lane highway. Cost of this 6.6-  
 mile section is estimated at  
 \$1 million.  
 Projects would require  
 a right-of-way width  
 of 100 feet.  
 Local governmental units  
 have 30 days in which to con-  
 sider the proposals. Otherwise,  
 projects will be cancelled  
 automatically.

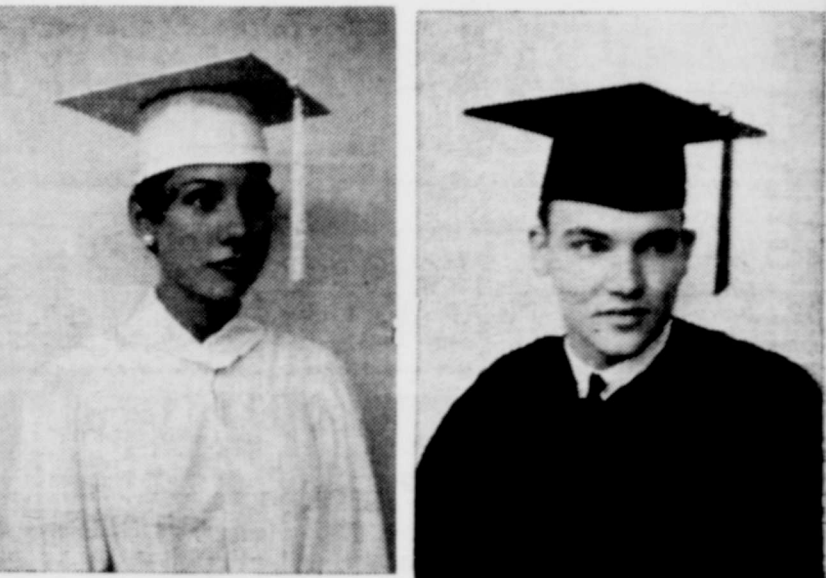

## Colonel Hendrix, Personnel Director At Sheppard AFB Transferred

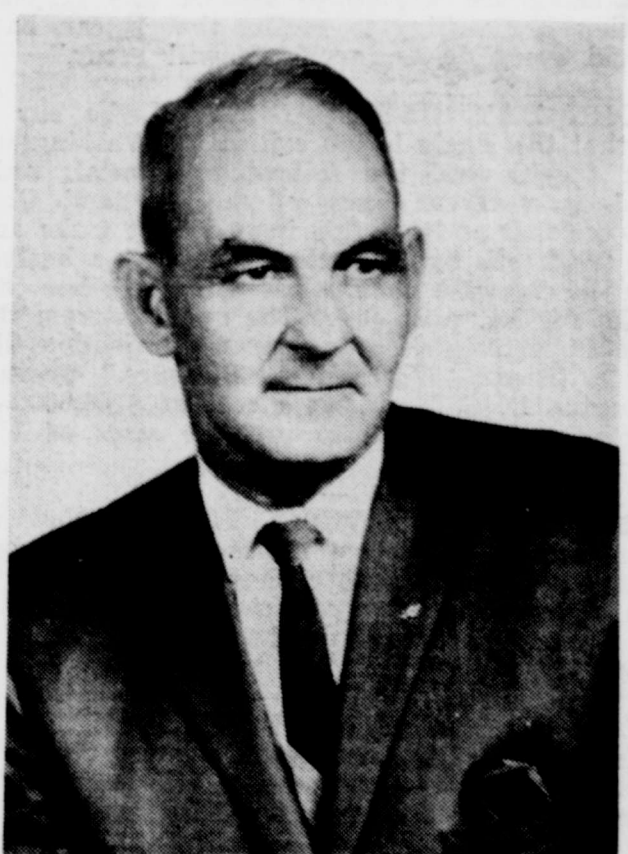
SHEPPARD AFB — Col. Wil-

## L. E. "Lefty" Ross Of Quanah To Address American Cancer Society Tuesday., May 24th

L. E. "Lefty" Ross of Quanah,  
 1966 Chairman of Crusade  
 for Texas, will address the Wich-  
 ita County Unit Annual Meet-  
 ing of the American Cancer  
 Society, Tuesday, May 24th, at  
 12:00 Noon in the Town and  
 Country Restaurant in Wichita  
 Falls, Texas.  
 Unanimously selected as the  
 top volunteer Crusader in Texas  
 this year, Ross announced Tex-  
 as' April 1966 fund raising goal  
 to be \$1,760,000. To explain the  
 crusade, in both its financial  
 and educational aspects, Lefty  
 has travelled the state, address-  
 ing over 150 county unit board  
 meetings in the past several  
 months.  
 Ross has won wide acclaim  
 for his work with voice rehabi-  
 litation. Himself a laryngecto-  
 mie—a person whose voice box  
 was removed, usually because  
 of cancer — Ross has taught  
 dozens of fellow laryngectomees  
 to learn to speak through an  
 opening in their necks.  
 As a self-taught esophageal  
 speaker and as a dedicated  
 teacher, Ross has brought vivid  
 stories to his audiences at med-  
 ical, nursing, and Cancer So-  
 ciety meetings of difficulties  
 and later triumphs following  
 his operation. He devoted most  
 of his leisure time — and some  
 of his working day — to vol-  
 untary service to other patients  
 who have faced the same opera-  
 tion and need to learn to speak  
 again.  
 Recently Ross received na-  
 tion-wide recognition as a Cita-  
 tionist of the Lane Bryant Foun-  
 dation for his outstanding vol-  
 untary community service.  
 Ross has worked in Quanah  
 and in Hardeman County Amer-  
 ican Cancer Society activities  
 for several years. Active on  
 Unit and District Level, he is  
 also a key member of the Di-  
 vision (State) Board of Direc-  
 tors. Outstanding Man of the  
 Year in Quanah, he also is active  
 in Chamber of Commerce,  
 Lions, Masons, and his church.

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**GRASSROOTS OPINION**

WEST POINT, MISS., TIMES-LEADER: "President Johnson's proposal that a Department of Transportation be created is likely to encounter some trouble so far as public acceptance is concerned at least in the early stages. It is probable that many will draw back almost instinctively from the idea of adding still another Cabinet bureau so soon after one was established for housing and urban development. . . . It is a mistake to turn to the federal government for everything. But it might be a serious mistake not to coordinate our transportation before rapidly expanding population makes the task far more difficult."

TALLASSEE, ALA., TRIBUNE: "The Nationalist Chinese have an estimated 600,000 troops and it doesn't take any Phi Beta Kappa to know that they have been kept, food and lodging, for the most part by the American taxpayers for 10, those many years. Another known fact is that they have been chomping at the bit . . . to engage the Chinese Reds in mortal combat. Why they cannot be used in Viet Nam instead of feeding American troops to the jungle hell is one of the things we will never be able to understand. And if some highly intellectual member of the Great Society can explain it intelligently to us we promise to listen to the next LBJ sob story on the tube."

WILLIAMSVILLE, N. Y., BEE: "No matter how safe a car is made from the manufacturers standpoint, no matter what is done to improve safety measures in them, the human element is unpredictable. The safest car manufactured is not safe so long as the driver does not pay close attention to his job. Human beings cannot be altered by manufacturers. They must be willing to assume the responsibility of watching their own driving and the driving of others on the highway . . . Until human beings are willing to assume this responsibility, until they are willing to realize that it can happen to each and every driver, accidents will occur."

JOHN DAY, ORE., EAGLE: "Maybe our readers think that the Eagle is too critical of Washington, D. C. But if they'll read the following editorial, which was printed in a recent issue of the Portland Oregonian, they'll see that at least this item doesn't make any sense at all. With one hand, Uncle Sam writes a health warning on the cigarette pack, while with the other he offers a smoke for its 'pure joy.' The quote is from the Agriculture Department's new cigarette promotion film, suggestively titled 'World Of Pleasure,' premiered in Washington D. C. . . . At a cost of \$106,000, Agriculture prepared the film to promote sales of U. S. tobacco abroad. . . ."

RANDOM LAKE, WISC., TIMES: "Now that the economists and politicians figure that everybody should get \$3,000 a year whether they work or not, whether they are sick or healthy, educated or illiterate, we sometimes wonder just what the heck is the use of beating ourselves to a pulp trying to make a living."

PALMER, ALASKA FRONTIERSMAN: "Today the United States government is almost totally an executive and judicial government, with emphasis on the growing power of the executive. The President also can decide today whether we will enter into a large war in Asia — a frightening thought when one thinks back to the unlimited and war-making powers of absolute rulers in western history some of whom abused that power. Humans being human, some Presidents will make mistakes or will abuse this same power, and it is surprising that more voices have not been raised in the republic against the growing foreign policy authority of the chief executive."

ROCHESTER, N. H., COURIER: "Retraining of workers whose skills are no longer needed is a fine thing. Education for the children of poor families is also needed. Federal aid, if accompanied by complete local freedom is acceptable. When it comes to the point of having to guarantee every family an annual income, then something has happened to this great nation."

TOLEDO, IOWA, CHRONICLE: "Times change. We can look back along the years to a time when we paid no income tax, and neither did our friends. Now the Tax Foundation says Americans work 2 hours and 20 minutes ever eight-hour day just to meet their federal, state, and local tax bills."

PORT GIBSON, MISS., REVEILLE: "Of the freedoms left — as we meekly bow before the onslaught of almost complete government domination — the right for a person to earn a living without paying dues to a labor union is certainly one of the fundamental rights."

**ALL IN A WORD**

WHEN SIR FRANCIS DRAKE first brought sherry from Spain to England, the name Jerez was burnt into the wooden casks. Seeing it, the English began calling this wine "Jeries". And not long after, this became the word "sherry". Every bottle of Spanish sherry is the product of many harvests, perhaps even drops from a century ago.

IN SPANISH SOIL, grapes mature under sun temperatures that may reach 130 degrees Fahrenheit. Yet this wine produces one of summer's most refreshing drinks, a Spanish Sherry Cooler. Here's how: Mix 1/2 cup dry Spanish Sherry with 1/2 cup orange juice, add a dash of bitters, pour over crushed ice and serve.

IN JEREZ DE LA FRONTERA, the lovely little Spanish town devoted to the making of sherry, a cask dedicated to Napoleon over 200 years ago remains all cobwebby and unopened in a Jerez bodega or winery. So does another cask, this one dedicated to Queen Victoria one hundred years back. Yet, if the casks were tapped today, the wine would be delightful. (This man is testing sherry for blending.)

**Voting Deadline Is Nearing On Cotton Transfers**

If you are a cotton producer in Wichita County, Howard Henderson, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, wants you to remember that May 25 is the last day to cast a ballot on the transfer of upland cotton allotments outside the county. Ballots were mailed early this month to all known cotton producers, and the referendum has been under way since May 16.

Ballots may be mailed or delivered in person to the ASCS county office, but they must reach there by Wednesday, May 25. A ballot in an envelope postmarked May 25 will not qualify as "eligible" unless it is in the county office before the close of business on that day.

The vote will decide only the question of whether a farmer in this county can sell or lease his cotton allotment to someone who would use it another county of this State. In no case can transfers be made outside the State. A two-thirds affirmative vote will permit such transfers during the next three years.

Farmers are cautioned to follow all instructions in marking their ballots. The certification on the back of the envelope sent to producers must be signed or the producer's mark witnessed as evidenced that the ballot was marked by the producer personally without undue influence by any person. Ballots are kept secret, although the counting of the ballots is public.

The public counting of the ballots will take place on May 27, at 10:00 a.m. in the ASCS county office. Anyone who wishes may watch the counting.

Because the transfer of cotton allotments is so important to growers, it is hoped that a large percentage of the county's cotton producers will cast their ballots. Any cotton producer in the county who has not received a ballot by mail is urged to get in touch immediately with the ASCS office.

Living outdoors, enjoying the beauties of nature, swimming, tramping, climbing, gathering specimens of flowers, rocks or shells, watching birds and animals, taking pictures, and bragging about the whole affair after you get home, is not only a thrill and a pleasure while it lasts, but a source of happy memories afterward.

#### Picnic Food

Food on a picnic is an essential part of the fun. Marshmallows, wieners or steaks can be roasted over a fire, but other foods are necessary, too. Their preparation naturally falls upon the shoulders of the homemaker.

And if the picnic is to be fun, such preparations should be reduced to the practical minimum consistent with safety of food against spoilage, or becoming infected, and a reasonable attention to good balance of meals. This is more important on a long camping trip than on a single picnic, but even so, the picnic meal can be nutritionally sound and still be fun, and easily prepared.

#### Home Preparation

For a one day picnic, most preparations can be made at home. The only equipment required is a couple of large thermal containers or a light-weight plastic ice-chest, plus a picnic basket—either one of the completely equipped type available in stores, or a home-assembled one with paper plates and cups, plastic eating utensils, paper napkins and paper table cloths. Sandwiches can be made the night before and frozen; they will thaw just about in time to be eaten, and will be nice and fresh. Salads too can be prepared in advance and carried in plastic bags; the dressing should be added just before eating, and should be kept cool.

Vegetables which can be eaten raw, such as tomatoes, cucumbers, celery, carrots, radishes and young onions are the most practical. Apples, oranges, tangerines, apricots and berries in season help to balance the meal. Ice cream is best purchased near the picnic place. Milk can be carried in an ice-chest or large thermal container; so can iced beverages.

#### Food for Camping

For camping, the preparations need to be more elaborate. Even so, unless one is going on a safari or into the deep woods or high mountains, the more perishable items are usually available not too far from camp or trail.

If not, milk powder reconstitutes well. Butter can be kept cool in an icechest, or by wrapping in leaves or being lowered into cold water. Eggs will keep well enough with some cooling for up to three days.

Smoked meats like ham, bacon and sausages are practical. Breads may dry out, but wrapping in foil or plastic helps to keep them fresh. Soup mixes are good, and lighter than canned goods if one is canoeing and portaging; other dehydrated products likewise help to keep the load lighter.

A little study of the literature available on camping in your public library will enable you to camp, canoe, pack and tramp, and still eat well.

### SMOKING WICK

Here's how fox hunters get Reynard out of his hole. They melt paraffin, then while still liquid, add sulphur. Stir until well mixed. Put a piece of towel wicking in a paper cup and pour the mixture in. Allow to harden. Light wick, toss down hole. Out comes the fox.

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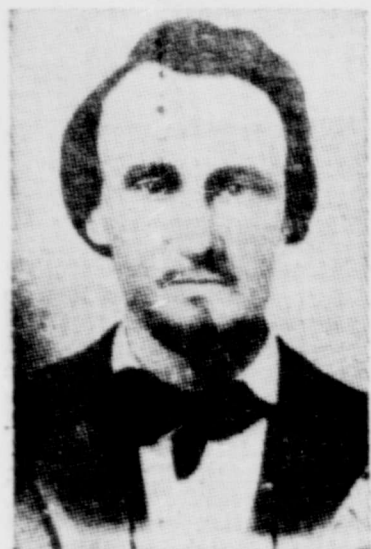
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## Texas' First Oil Well Had Trouble Finding Sponsors



The problems of raising money to make a profitable enterprise out of Texas' first oil well — drilled 100 years ago — are revealed in a biographical booklet on Lyne T. Barret published Saturday by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Publication of the booklet is one of a number of projects slated by the Association to honor the pioneer oil man whom petroleum historians credit with drilling the first Texas oil well near Nacogdoches in 1866.

Written by Frank X. Tolbert, Dallas historian and newspaperman, the story which is based on some of Barret's correspondence and business papers, discloses the great optimism and disappointments surrounding this first attempt to create a Texas oil company.

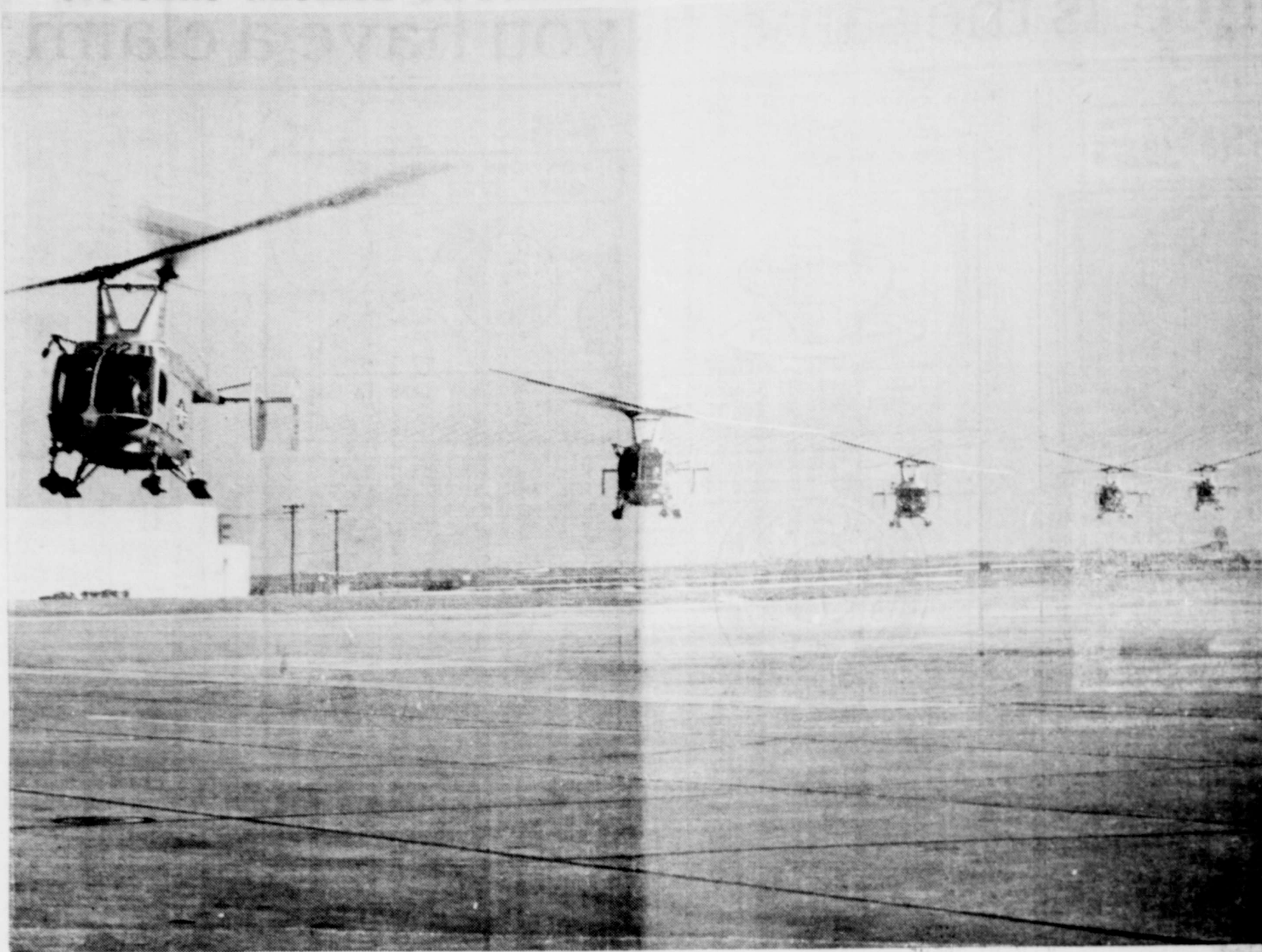
Barret obtained some \$5,000 worth of machinery from operators in the then-young Pennsylvania oil industry to develop the oil leases he held. However, following a second well, which failed to produce, his source of capital dried up. Correspondence indicates that Barret attempted to swap Texas land to the Pennsylvanians for further assistance, but they were not interested. Mrs. Barret was reported to have inherited a great deal of the land.

Tolbert wrote that after trips north for additional financing failed, Barret apparently never drilled another well, although he did live to see the development of great fields at Beaumont and other places in the southeastern section of the state. He had written letters prior to the drilling of his own well near Nacogdoches describing a venture planned in Hardin County. Phrases from the letter indicate his optimism: "The great excitement of this age is oil. This region of Texas will be wild upon the subject in a few months. . . a man and the money have already gone north to buy the necessary machinery to search the bowels of the earth for oil. . . None doubt that oil will be found. . . What is the use of toiling and struggling with aching brains and weary hands for bread when gold so temptingly invites you to reach out and clutch it?"

Unfortunately for Barret, according to the Tolbert account, the man who drilled the first Texas oil well was unable to clutch it.

"After he gave up his oil operations," Tolbert wrote, "Barret ran a mercantile store at Melrose and managed his wife's farms."

1 teaspoon vinegar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Heat puffed rice in large shallow pan in preheated moderate oven (350°F.) for 10 minutes. Pour into large greased bowl. Combine water, candies, syrup, vinegar and salt in small saucepan. Bring to boil, stirring until candies are melted. Stirring occasionally, continue cooking to 236°F. or until small amount of syrup dropped into cold water forms a soft ball. Remove from heat; stir in butter.

Pour over cereal, stirring until all kernels are evenly coated. With greased hands, shape to form 8 apples. Decorate with pipe cleaners and green spearmint gumdrop leaves to form apple stems and leaves.

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Contrast and combination highlight the summer season's fashion fabrics. Texture in varied surface interests are the main features, says Miss Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

You'll find both the firm, crisply defined textures and fragile, gracefully flowing fabrics as you shop for ready-made garments and for material by the yard.

Fragile voiles, gauzy chiffon and georgette, breezy batiste and lawn, dimity, dotted swiss, and chambray are some of the sheer fabrics for the feminine look.

Casings and jerseys are popular garments designed to fit the body. Pebbled, printed crepes, rayon and silk plisse crepe, and other crinkled crepes capture much attention.

Pique, ranging from waffle petit point, and birdseye to bullseye, are abundant in summer white. Floral motifs and geometric patches are raised prominently on corded pique.

Novelty knits are on the successful list. Most are tricot backed for stability and include such variations as shaker, ribbed "poor boy," lacy crochet, and Italian hand-knitted designs with jacquard pattern and ribbon detail.

Mr. Jim Roberts, clothing chairman for the Wichita County Program Building Committee and Thelma Wirges, county

home demonstration agent are taking suggestions for future work in clothing selection, construction and care. Any interested homemaker may submit suggestions.

It is time to store wool garments. Wool responds well to proper care, says Thelma Wirges.

After wearing, wool garments should be hung up to rest for at least 24 hours. This gives the fibers a chance to return to their original shape and so eliminate wrinkles. It is also helpful to brush the garment. This removes dirt and restores the nap to the fabric. Knitted garments should be aired, not brushed, and stored flat.

Pressing of wool garments should be done by placing a moistened cotton cloth over the wool before ironing, or using the "steam" setting on your iron. To avoid imprints from pocket flaps, a piece of brown paper should be laid under the flap.

Dry cleaning generally presents no problems to wool garments unless it is a poor process which has been known to shrink garments and take the resiliency out of them.

Washing wool garments, such as sweaters, socks, baby clothes, and blankets, can be done successfully with lukewarm water and neutral, non-alkali soap or detergent. There are also spec-

ial soaps for washing wool. Rough handling causes felting, so wool garments should be handled gently, and never squeezed. Then roll them in a towel to absorb excess moisture. Hot water softens the fiber and makes it shrink.

New processes and treatments and pre-shrunk wools are making the fabric more versatile each season the agent emphasizes.

### Do-It-Yourself Waffle Sundae

Next time you have friends over for a hootenanny, a small huddle, or dancing a go go, try this novel feast as a party topper. Serve one or more kinds of waffles along with a variety of toppings, and have each guest concoct his own waffle sundae combination.



Keeping the waffle platter filled may require a little pre-planning or pre-baking. Bake the waffles in the morning, cool, and wrap in foil. Reheat in a toaster or in the broiler at serving time.

Chocolate waffles are a favorite. With them you might serve peppermint ice cream, hot fudge sauce, or warm apricot jam.

Or try orange-flavored waffles and serve warmed maple-blended syrup or just-thawed frozen berries. Regardless of the flavor of the waffles, any of these toppings would be good: sweetened whipped cream or prepared whipped topping, honey, ice cream in a variety of flavors, grated chocolate, and chopped nuts—salted or unsalted.

For the party beverage serve a huge bowl of fruity punch. This punch keeps chilled with a floating ring of ice fruit.

### Sparkling Citrus Punch

1 lemon  
2 limes  
2 cans (8 oz. each) Awake Frozen Orange Juice  
3 cups pineapple juice  
6 cups cold water  
6 bottles (7 oz. each) ale, chilled  
Frozen Fruit Ring  
\*Or use 1/4 cup lemon juice.  
Squeeze the juice of 1 lemon and lime into a punch bowl. Add pineapple juice, and stir until blended. Then add frozen fruit ring float. Makes about 32 servings.  
Frozen Fruit Ring: sliced strawberries, canned pineapple slices, orange sections, and in 1-1/2 quart ring mold. Freeze and chill. Unmold and punch.

Where to Sit and Eat  
Beg and borrow tables in the neighborhood. Small chairs to go with the plates and cups—select!

Paper Supplies  
This includes large-sized napkins, plates, cups, and real "top party" and of stripes, polka plaids in stark black.

Clean-Up

### Cooperation for Profit

LABOR, owners, management and the public are all rightly interested in the success of every company making some useful product or rendering a service that is widely in demand. Good wages, profit enough to induce savers to invest in the company, adequate returns for management, and a good product at a reasonable price for the public, all depend upon the successful operation of these companies. Labor, owners, management and the public are all mutually and vitally interested in every important company. It would seem therefore that these four interests might agree upon policies which would enable our companies to achieve the highest degree of success.

The first essential is for each company to meet competition. It must not allow itself to be priced out of the market. All four of the mutual interests just mentioned will suffer if this happens. It should be the primary concern of all of them to avoid it. Each company must remain competitive, not only with domestic but with foreign producers. If it does not, it will lose its markets both at home and abroad. That would injure labor, owners and management. If a company cannot compete successfully, it will not last long and while it does last it will not be able to pay the best wages, to obtain capital on the most favorable terms, or to afford the most competent management. All these are indications that it is on the way out.

Both labor and management should bear the fact constantly in mind that to price their goods above the competitive level is to reduce both wages and profits, resulting in less reward both for workers and owners. What does it profit the worker to have a high hourly wage but no job, or, possibly only a part time job? And what does it profit an investor to own stock which pays nothing or a very low dividend? Management and labor will not be adequately rewarded, and the public will be inadequately served.

It is to the great advantage of all concerned that the company be successful and operate at a satisfactory profit. The several parties of interest should cooperate to that end.

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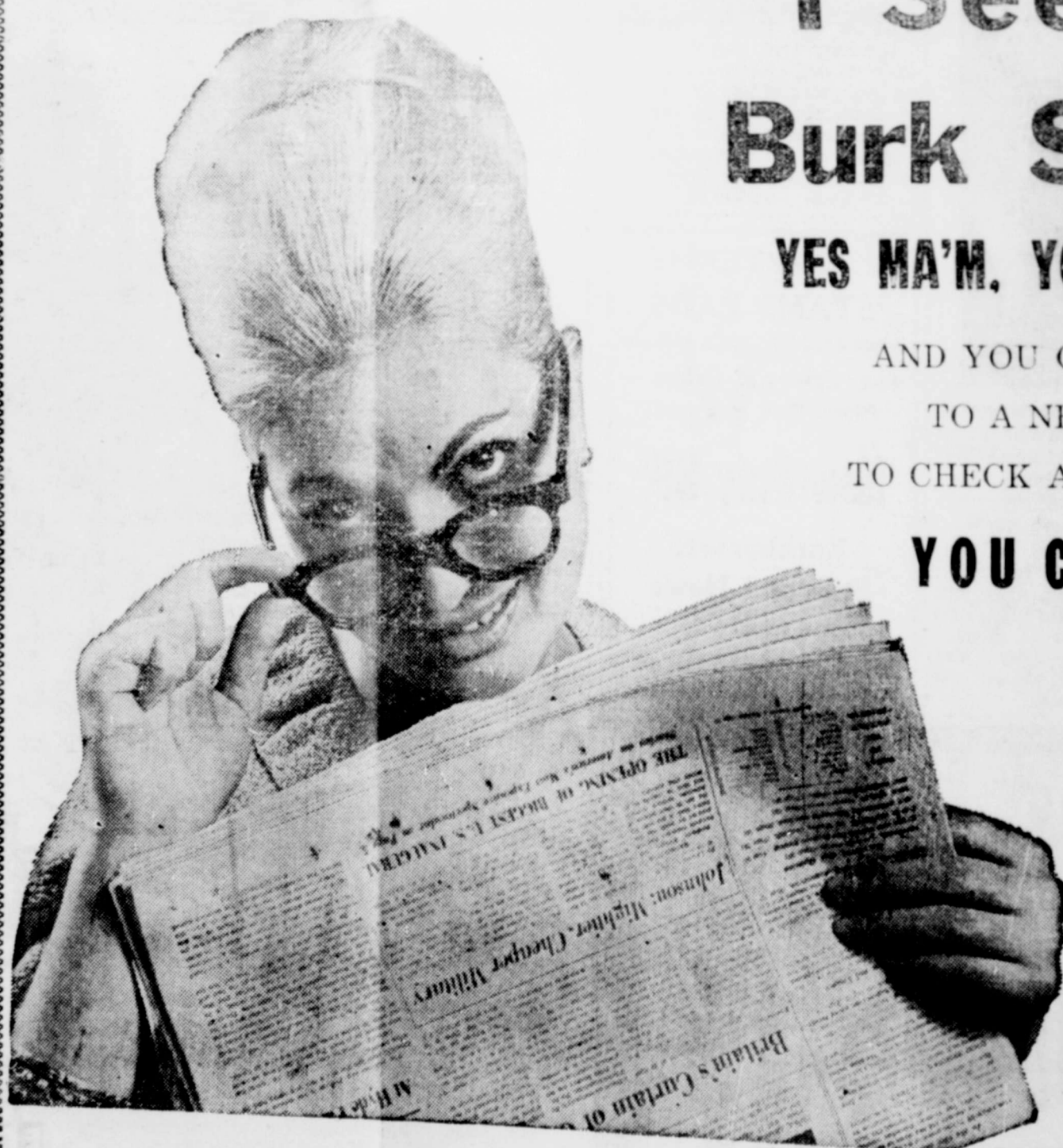

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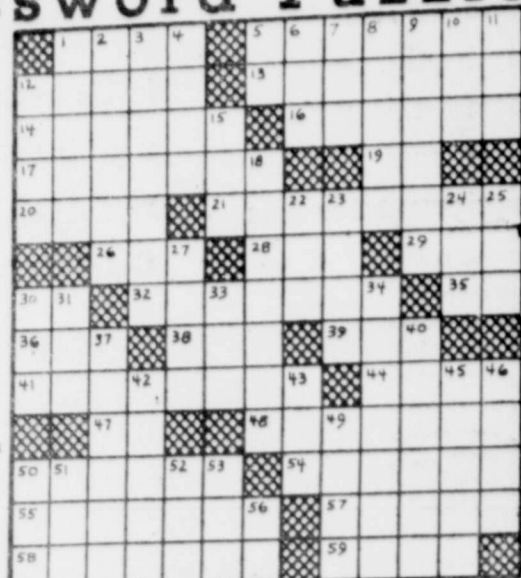

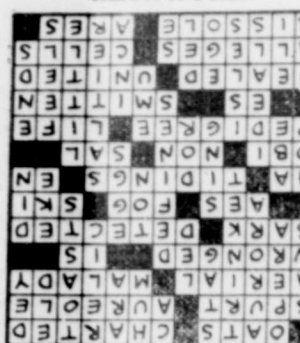
