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Wedding Wish Comes True Despite Jail Bars

They looked like any other young couple smitten with love and a June wedding date.

Informally attired, but with a note of fashion for the courthouse civil ceremony.

Excited, of course, and a bit embarrassed as most brides and grooms.

White accessories accented her aqua blue dress, mini length. Her blue eyes were radiant beneath natural blonde hair dropping to shoulder tip

from a modified bouffant.

Like the girl next door counting 20 or 21 birthdays.

Tall and thin, the black-haired neatly trimmed groom held her close as they walked. His paisley designed blue shirt, matching tie, contrasted with darker blue, striped, flared slacks.

Matron of honor, attendant and best man. All were there.

But there was a difference. Then and now.

From the ceremony which united them as man and wife, the wedding couple walked out of the courthouse and to a honeymoon — in separate jail cells.

Pauline Tourigny and David Albert Zilli said their marriage vows Friday in a ceremony before County Judge Bill F. Carter.

The wedding, with permission from Sheriff Lewis Claxton, had been the couple's wish for the 2 months they have been confined to Mitchell County jail.

When grand jury indictments last month charged them with 2 felonies — possession of marijuana and fraud — they ardently sought permission to be wed.

They told Sheriff Claxton they had been "going with each other" for about 4 years and were in love. And with court trials ahead on the calendar, they don't know when they will be together again.

And, Pauline, who is 21 and

from Massachusetts, is with child.

So, Friday, after Pauline had pressed her dress with hand iron she and David Zilli met outside their cells and, with officers escorting, walked out of jail to their wedding.

Mrs. Bill Martin, woman deputy, was matron of honor. Best man was Deputy Sheriff Bill McGuire. Mrs. Frances Hines, Judge Carter's secretary, joined the wedding party as an attendant.

The ceremony was quick, to the point as civil weddings usually are.

Judge Martin, who is sincerely serious about his religious faith, added a special prayer following the vows — a prayer toned for the future.

Everybody was happy.

Sheriff Claxton, who delayed a vacation trip until after the wedding, brought out the camera which makes mug shots of criminal suspects and put it to

making color photos of the bridal party.

They all became more relaxed as they lingered at the sheriff's office back in the jail building.

Somebody mentioned a wedding ring and, somehow, there were joking remarks about being handcuffed together for life.

"Not handcuffed the way we want to be," said the bride.

"How about a picture of me in your car waving goodbye as

I drive out of the driveway," the groom joked.

In between talk and picture making, the couple never missed an opportunity to embrace . . . kiss . . . and whisper to each other.

Within a few minutes it was over.

The bride, starting to leave, turned quickly back to the office desk, gathered up the color photographs and hugged them to her as she and her new husband were escorted back to their separate cells.

A Colorado City educator will be an official delegate to the 109th annual convention of National Education Association in Detroit, Mich., June 26-July 2.

Mrs. Gordon, who teaches journalism and supervises award-winning student publications at Colorado High, will be a member of the Texas delegation headed by Texas State Teachers Association officials -- Archie Roberts of Beeville, president; Mrs. Patsy Duncan of Amarillo, president-elect; and Mrs. Jewel Harris of Abilene, immediate past president.

Police Radar Busy

Slowdown Signal For Speeders

Colorado City's new police radar is being kept busy to slow down traffic on city streets.

It may prove to be the most effective speed deterrent yet for police.

There is no hesitancy by Chief Jesse Browning's staff, either, to put the equipment

into effect since signs were placed this week notifying motorists laws were being enforced with radar.

Thursday city police issued 4 tickets for speeding within city limits.

Friday the number increased to 10.

There is no all-out campaign against speeders. But the radar makes traffic control more efficient and takes a lot of guess work out of a policeman's decision for issuing tickets.

Speeders can be fined up to \$200 for each separate offense. The usual minimum fine ordered by Municipal Judge W. H. Brimberry is \$15.

If the speed is extraordinarily

excessive, then a violator is likely to have an additional \$1 tacked onto the fine for every mile per hour above a mark beginning at 15 miles in excess of the legal limit.

The city radar unit is designed for close distance patrol common to city police. It was obtained second-hand when the State Highway unit here had it replaced with its second long-range radar.

Thieves Going To Church-For Loot

Thieves apparently aren't hesitant about going to church — for loot.

They entered St. Luke Methodist Church this week and carted away a whole pile of dinner dishes.

Chief Browning believes the unit will benefit the community with safer traffic.

Getting attention most in radar patrol now are heavily traveled arteries, especially moving traffic in and out of town. However, the unit will be available for all areas and will be moved to any location where speed problems develop.

Meritorious Award To Soldier

Army Specialist 4 Stanley Moore, who returned to Vietnam June 8 after a 10-day leave here at home, has been awarded the Army Commendation Medal.

The medal is for meritorious service in Vietnam.

Moore, 25, husband of Mitchell County Home Demonstration Agent Janet Moore and son of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Moore of Route 3, was cited for skills and dedication "far above the average" over an extended period of time.

The soldier received the award while assigned as a legal clerk with Headquarters Troop, 7th Armored Squadron of 1st Air Cavalry near Vinh Long.

Moore, a 1969 graduate of McMurry, arrived here May 28 and left 10 days later to return to his unit in Vietnam.

New Rule For Catfish

Several new changes in Texas game and fish law are of special interest to Mitchell County fishermen.

Curtis Thomason, who enforces the game and fish regulations here, emphasized that four of the new changes are important locally because of the large number of persons fishing in Lake Colorado City and Lake Champion.

The new regulations — applicable, of course, to fishing everywhere in the state — specify: Possession limit of channel,

blue and flathead catfish is 50 and it is unlawful to possess any such catfish less than 11 inches in length.

Snagging or jerking fish (a method of taking fish by means of one or more hooks attached to a line and periodically jerking the line) is specifically defined as an illegal method for taking fish, artificial lures not included.

New language in the law makes it unlawful to have in possession or on board any boat or in any vehicle, any fish, other than

rough fish (and catfish where applicable) as defined, while fishing with or possessing a hoop net, trammel net or gill net.

Another change rules that all freshwater trotlines shall be identified by a legible tag bearing the name and address of the fisherman and the date the line was placed in the water.

Before taking action on the changes, the commission reviewed results of statewide public hearings conducted during May.

Postmark To Disappear

Abilene To Cancel Out Of Town Mail

Colorado City's postmark will disappear next month from mail going to other towns.

Replacing it will be "U.S. Postal Service TX 796."

The new postmark will be applied in Abilene as the Colorado City eliminates a processing step for outgoing mail.

Assistant Postmaster Wendell Thomas said processing of area mail—including Colorado City and 17 other associate post offices in this area—will begin in the Abilene Sectional Center Facility July 6.

This means all mail originating within Colorado City and the Abilene area will be consolidated at the Abilene Sectional Center. There an electronic cancelling machine will cancel and mark letters up to a speed of 30,000 per hour.

Mail addressed out of town and deposited in Colorado City Post Office and in local collection boxes now is routed into Abilene for distribution. But it is assorted and cancelled by postmark here in the local postoffice.

Beginning July 6, the Abilene Sectional Center will take over the job of cancelling, postmark-

ing and distributing. There will be one exception—metered mail for both local and out of town delivery will continue to show Colorado City postmark, according to Thomas.

Consolidation of the cancelling and dispatching at the regional level is aimed as a speed-up for out of town mail delivery. However, mail going from Colorado City to Lorraine will continue to travel past Lorraine to Abilene, then return to Lorraine after being processed in Abilene.

All mail deposited for local delivery will continue to be cancelled with Colorado City

postmark after July 6 and, of course, will not be sent to Abilene for distribution.

The new regional processing for out of town mail places more responsibility upon the mailer.

Persons mailing letters, to avoid delay, must be certain to place their mail in their correct collection box—local and outgoing.

Thomas also advised that letter writers should write Colorado City in the envelope address on all local mail instead of cutting short with only the word "city."

GOOD FATHER'S DAY TO YOU!

CHOOSING exactly the right greeting card for a special occasion is almost as important to card-lovers as is selecting just the right gift of appreciation.

Ever watch the card-lovers stand and read and read until just the right sentiment tugs the heart, or just the right light touch of humor hit the funny bone?

Personally, am usually a push-over for the more tender offerings, extolling the virtues of the person to be remembered.

Somehow or other was sorely tempted to pick one of the more amusing cards for the father of our children on his day. Some of the friskier ones seemed strangely appropriate for the half-teasing, half-loving give and take which exists between husbands and wives of long standing.

SAW one bright yellow card with big red letters saying, "Have big fun on Father's Day, won't you?" Then when the card was opened there was the suggestion in red block letters, "Go tickle an elephant."

Another very fancy little number picturing a pipe-smoking gentleman advised, "Why all this fuss and all this bother?" Unfolded, the card announced wife wifely glee, "If it were not for ME, you wouldn't BE father!"

One in antique gold with silver trim was a teaser. "You have that wonderful something that makes you an ideal father," it said on the cover under a framed sketch of a father. Inside the cover there was just one word, "ME," and as an after-thought, "Happy Father's Day."

Any husband properly trained to have the right proportion of admiration for his spouse would get real satisfaction out of that one, knowing full well that mothers take all the credit for all things good and blame fathers for whatever doesn't turn out right.

ALL THE SAME, fathers of this world play an important role second to none, including mothers.

Some fathers can preach bet-

ter sermons with one look than other fathers can with volumes of rhetoric and scriptures.

Even an inarticulate father usually speaks gentleness, encouragement, and affection with his hands, his little pats, his quick embrace and kiss on the nose, likely as not.

A father may not always understand why new finery is a matter of life and death but he buys it just the same, sometimes at sacrifice on his own part.

A father understands why a boy has to stay out later than a girl and sees that sons get a fair deal on ground rules at home. A good father is a sort of moderator.

AS ALWAYS when it's Father's Day, keep thinking sweet and dear things about the father who was mine. . . mine and Frances' and Mary's and Charles', that is.

He was more like a modified example of the Clarence Day "Life With Father" head of the house.

We called him Daddy. Never saw him in a colored shirt in his whole life. Gentlemen wore white shirts in his era and for years and years they wore stiff detachable starched collars with collar buttons little girls were adept at finding under the bureau.

Never saw him unshaven in his whole life. . . in night shirt or pajamas unless he were sick in bed and helpless to defend his personal modesty and ideal of the immaculate man.

DADDY was a musician and a poet at heart and by inclination. . . a super-salesman by necessity, fate, and fatherhood.

He might not have died rich but he most certainly would have died richer had it not been for his ambition for his brood. . . piano lessons, expression, voice, college, pretty clothes, and books and books.

When he lost his temper it was time to hide in the garden. Mother always said "He isn't mad. He's tired and he doesn't feel too well." Being Mother she never allowed his progeny or anybody else to criticize his occasional tantrums--anybody except her, that is. She usually took care of the matter

and it soon became cozy and fine and funny again around the house.

REMEMBERING Daddy is to remember every lyric and melody Stephen F. Foster ever wrote. . . lines from Edgar A. Poe. . . O. Henry. . . James Whitcomb Riley. . . Longfellow. . . and a man called William Shakespeare, whom he revered.

Once in a while, driven to distraction by three daughters, one son and one wife, he'd quote the Bible though he was as likely to say it was Deuteronomy as from Proverbs which it usually was. And Mother usually told him.

One of his favorites was the old "Spare the rod and spoil the child," which he expounded while sparing the rod in exchange for oratory.

One of his handicaps, as Mother saw it, was his inclination to laugh in all the wrong places. Part of any public event appearance was her lectures to him before and after.

HE LIKED to argue politics but strictly with other Democrats. That was because he never so long as he lived in a little town ever spoke to either one of that town's two Republicans.

As much as he liked to laugh he could cry, too. Still remember that he cried when the radio announced that Al Smith had been defeated.

He cried before my first sister's wedding (but strictly in the privacy of his bath). Patriotic speeches brought tears to his very blue eyes. So did Armistice Day. He honored the flag, his "Old Glory," more

than any man ever known to me personally.

Never see the flag blowing in the wind without thinking somehow, if only for an instant, of Daddy and his flag on the porch for special holidays.

HE liked family vacations. . . trips to see the Alamo and Galveston. . . trips to the old Cotton Palace at Waco and to the State Fair of Texas in Big D.

He liked honeysuckle vines, canna lilies, dandelions, nasturtiums, roses, and the biggest vegetable garden in town.

He did not like working in flower beds and never knew him to work in his garden. "Uncle Barry", our family friend and helper, worked and weeded and watered and harvested and mended the fences. We all loved "Uncle Barry" next to Daddy. And he loved us. Especially he loved Daddy whom he called "Mr. Charlie," while he gathered strawberries for "Mr. Charlie's" family.

THE YEARS are many, sometimes the years have been long since Daddy went away.

His going taught one thing every human needs to learn. It is this--people who are loved by the ones they leave behind never really die. They live on in the hearts of those who loved them. . . as Daddy lives on in this heart day by day and especially on Father's Day.

He was not a perfect man. But life with my father was a rare adventure. He was a perfectly wonderful father. . . he did the best he could. . . and that makes all his dear memories good.

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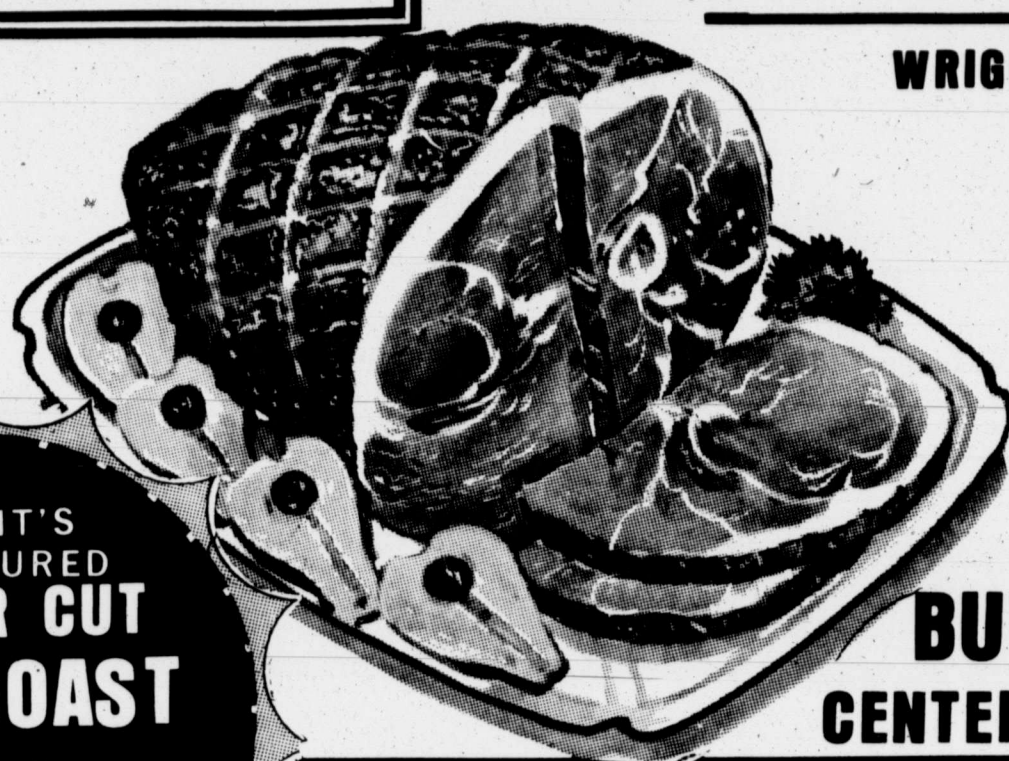

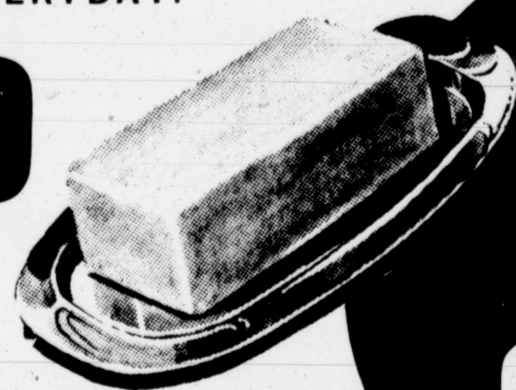

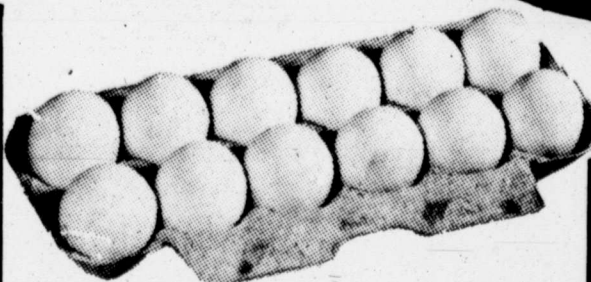
