# RUSSIAN PARTY RESCUED FROM ICE

## GARAGE OWNER SHOT TO DEATH IN FAMILY ROW

### MOTHER AND UNCLE HELD AS CONFESSION IMPLICATES THEM

(By Associated Press.)  
BISMARCK, Mo., July 16.—Ada Biggs, 19 year old high school graduate, was in the county jail at Farmington, today after police said she had admitted killing her stepfather, William Silas Simpson, garage owner and mechanic.

With the girl were her mother, Mrs. William Simpson, and an uncle, Oscar Greenwald, who police said confessed they had loaded and fired the shotgun with which the girl had shot her stepfather.

The girl was graduated from the Bismarck high school this spring and she, her mother and uncle had planned to do away with Simpson before leaving for the family home.

Story Is Detailed  
According to stories of the trial, Greenwald and Mrs. Simpson loaded a shotgun and gave it to the girl. They cooked the weapon because she was unfamiliar with firearms.

Ada was then sent outside while Mrs. Simpson and Greenwald waited for a window. They managed to get Simpson unexpectantly before the open window, where he was shot.

Four small children of Mrs. Simpson by her second marriage were sleeping in the home at the time. The uncle had been living in the Simpson home and worked in Simpson's garage.

MANY NEW AUTOS

### INSURGENTS IN TEXAS TO SUPPORT SMITH FOR PRESIDENT

PORT WORTH, July 16.—Declaring they controlled 250,000 votes in Texas, J. M. O'Hara, organization manager of the republican state committee for an unrestricted delegation, and W. M. McDonald, negro leader of Texas negroes, today officially announced their bolt from the republican party and their intention to support Governor Alfred Smith, democratic nominee for president.

Under the leadership of R. B. Weaver, national committee chairman, O'Hara announced that he had shown in the senate investigation in Mississippi, O'Hara said, is predicted that Mississippi participation and W. M. McDonald would aid as compared to what develop in this state at the proposed senate committee probe in Dallas.

O'Hara organized the committee of which C. C. Lattin, of Port Worth was chairman, and which led the fight in Kansas City against the seating of Creager delegates to the national convention.

## SOUTH TEXAS TOWN WRECKED BY FIRE

### RIVER BLOCKED BY WINE CARGO

HAVRE, France, July 16.—The lower Seine was closed to navigation until further notice today because of the danger to ships' propellers from 4,000 barrels of wine drifting from the French steamer Moghreb, Aca. The vessel, coming from Algiers, went aground in the estuary near Montfleur.

The underwriters were offering a premium of four dollars a barrel to persons retrieving the wine.

The ship was stated to be a total loss together with the loss of the cargo which consisted of wheat and sulphate. The cargo was estimated to be worth nearly a million dollars.

### TEXAS DRIVES OPEN PRO AND CON ON SMITH

#### ANTI-AL BACKERS PLAN STATEWIDE MEETING IN DALLAS TUESDAY

(By Associated Press.)  
DALLAS, July 16.—Plans for campaigns among Texas democrats both for and against the election of Governor Alfred E. Smith were expected to be formulated within the next few days.

A statewide meeting of anti-Smith democrats will be held here Tuesday when preparations will be made for carrying the fight against the New York Governor into every precinct in the state.

With the return yesterday of J. C. Adams of Dallas, democratic national committeeman for Texas, from a national committee meeting in New York, plans for the state campaign on behalf of the national standard bearer was expected to assume definite shape soon.

Dr. Carl C. Gregory, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, South, of Dallas, added his name to that of the Texas church and political leaders who will not support the democratic nominee when he said in a sermon here yesterday that "I cannot vote for a Roman Catholic as president of the United States."

Others Refuse Smith  
Dr. Gregory's statement followed upon the heels of announcements Saturday by Alvin Moody, member of the State executive committee, Cato Sells, former democratic national committeeman, and Marshall Hicks, San Antonio democratic political leader, that they would not support Smith.

Attorneys in the case in which Thomas B. Love, candidate for Lieutenant Governor, is seeking to force the democratic committee to place his name on the primary ballot expected the San Antonio court of civil appeals to hand down a decision today.

### NEW BALUSTRADE ON CONTROVERTED HISTORIC LOUVAIN LIBRARY RUINED BY UNIDENTIFIED MAN WITH HAMMER

LOUVAIN, Belgium, July 16.—The unadorned balustrade of the Louvain University library, erected when the inscription to be placed on the library became a matter of heated controversy was demolished today.

An unidentified man with a hammer destroyed the balustrade which had been placed under the supervision of the rector of the university, Monsignor Ledeuere.

Whitney Warren, architect of the library, had been insistent on having placed on the balustrade a Latin inscription translated as:

"Destroyed by Teutonic fury, restored by American generosity."

### SEVEN HOUSES DESTROYED IN BUSINESS AREA

#### WALLER, WITH BRICKS, BRIGADE UNABLE TO COPE WITH BLAZE

(By Associated Press.)  
HOUSTON, July 16.—A fire at Waller, about 20 miles from Houston, which had destroyed seven business buildings, was gotten under control shortly before noon today, but firemen continued to pour water on the ruins, and on gasoline tanks, one of which exploded.

Buildings destroyed included a department store, the chamber of commerce building, a cafe, a physician's office and a feed store. No one was injured and origin of the fire was unknown.

As the bucket brigade, Waller's only fire defense, fought the flames, Mrs. Heifer, telephone operator, described it to the Houston Chronicle. The flames crept close to her office. A gasoline station was next door.

Operator Leona Beard said she was the last of her family to be broken in. "Listen, there's all I can tell you now. The fire is out before the tanks explode. No one can't tell you any more. I'm leaving."

A few minutes later she phoned that one of the tanks had exploded.

The Waller bucket brigade was aided by fire fighting apparatus from Prairie View, Hempstead and Houston. Property loss was not estimated.

### Quarter Block In Helena Is Burned

HELENA, Mont., July 16.—Fire which wiped out a quarter of a block in the heart of Helena's business section was brought under control early today after burning for more than three hours. Newspapers estimated the loss at least a million dollars.

The city's largest department store, and two large office buildings and part of a third, with a score of smaller business houses and more than a hundred offices, were destroyed.

### Shallowater To Get Candidate Program

Shallowater will be the mecca of candidates for offices in Lubbock county tonight as they appear in their first co-operative speaking program of the 1928 campaign.

The program will be held in the Shallowater community house.

Tomorrow night, the group will go to Liberty for speaking. They were scheduled to appear there on last Thursday night but were rained out.

The program tomorrow night comes as a request from the citizenship of that community. Wednesday night they will speak in the Union community, Friday night at McChung and Saturday afternoon at Slaton.

Police arrested the foreman in charge of building operations.

### It's Easy, Says Man Who Made Fortune On \$50 Job

#### SEATTLE, July 16.—Can a man accumulate a six-figure fortune on \$50 a week?

"He sure can," says David G. Younggren, who is a trainman on the Seattle municipal trolley system. He has never made more than \$50 a week but he's piled up the six-figure fortune in just a quarter of a century. He was "broke" when he landed in Seattle.

Twenty years later he sold the crop from a fruit farm he owns for \$32,000 cash. Later he sold the farm for a good deal more than that.

Younggren saved his early wages what he could of them—and started investing in real estate. The city grew and his holdings grew with it. He branched out into fruit ranches—and they grew in value, too.

Receipts? Use common sense. Working men should get over the idea of saving the rich, live simply, save modestly and invest wisely. There's no trick to it. I've always lived well, belonged to all the lodges I wanted, seen all the shows I've wanted—but I never made saloon-keepers or bootleggers rich."

Prouder than he is of his fortune, Younggren harps on the fact that no passenger, of the millions he's carried, ever has been injured. "Anybody can make money," he says, "but carrying a few million people in safety for 25 years is a good trick—if you can do it."

### AMARILLO TO RETAIN BERTH

#### FANS RAISE \$10,000 IN EFFORT AID BACKERS OF WESTERN ENTRY

(By Associated Press.)  
AMARILLO, July 16.—Amarillo business men raised \$10,000 within a few minutes here today for the purpose of operating the local club of the Western league for the remainder of the 1928 season.

The owners of the club, who yesterday surrendered their franchise to President Dale Gear, agreed to take the club back and shoulder any loss above the \$10,000.

Plans for refinancing the club for next year also were discussed at today's meeting.

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 16.—Efforts to retain the Western league baseball franchise in Amarillo, Jack Holland, president of the Oklahoma City club of the circuit, believes, can lead only to further financial loss.

While plans were going forward for a mass meeting at Amarillo today to finance the club the remainder of the season, Mr. Holland remained skeptical. Business men who may be obtaining a release from write the club's expenses, he said, would lose from \$25,000 to \$35,000.

"The Amarillo situation," he added, "is hopeless. They might as well throw their money into the river and save the suspense of losing it. Having a franchise that nobody wants they will be holding the sack when the season ends."

Mr. Holland last winter attempted to drop the Oklahoma City franchise with the Western league and to obtain a Texas league franchise. He failed to obtain a release from the Western league. At that time he indicated that the Oklahoma City club also was not making money.

Dale Gear, president of the league, and four Amarillo business men, invited 20 other business men and all other persons interested in keeping the Amarillo club alive to today's meeting.

Former owners of the club have handed the franchise to Mr. Gear, saying they had put all the money they cared to into the team.

The man is charged with the theft of a hog from the farm of R. L. Smith, several miles from here.

Officers also have information regarding the whereabouts of 13 stolen chickens, a number of stolen calves and hogs. All they want now is the identification by the owners and the thieves will be arrested, they said today.

### Three Girls Drown Near San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO, July 16.—Funeral services were held today for three daughters of Pablo Garcia of Sanguero, Texas, who were drowned Sunday while swimming in the waters of the San Antonio river near their home. Thomas, 17, precipitated the tragedy when she stepped into water over her head and sank from sight. Natalia, 14, who could not swim, attempted to go to her aid and when she too sank, Valeria, 10, who also was unable to swim, attempted to rescue both. The girls' father and a cousin who were standing on the bank were unable to help them as neither of them could swim.

### THREE PERMITS FOR BUILDINGS ISSUED TODAY

#### FARM BUREAU GIN TO COST \$8,000 TO BE STARTED SOON

The issuance of a permit for \$8,000 for the construction of a gin plant for the Texas Farm Bureau gin company and two residence permits for \$5750 from the city offices today gave assurance that regardless of the approach of election time, building is to continue at its same steady pace in Lubbock.

The three permits, totaling \$13,750, sent the July building total to \$164,850. Thirty-four permits have been issued thus far this month. The year's total of 397 permits have aggregated \$1,047,108.

Construction on the gin plant will start within the next few days as a part of the material is being unloaded at the site east of the city now. Construction starts as soon as additional material arrives. The plant will represent a total expenditure of \$40,000, it has been announced.

L. A. Bacon is in charge of the construction work.

The other permits issued today were to T. R. Priddy for the construction of a 6 room brick residence on lot 28, block 14, Elwood and \$2,500 to J. A. Cockrell for a 7 room frame residence at 1906 Avenue F.

### Hoppe Must Die In Young Girl's Death

TOLEDO, Ohio, July 16.—Charles J. Hoppe, 28, must die in the electric chair for the murder of Dorothy Sielagowski, 7, his wife's cousin, whom he killed after he had kidnapped her from her bed May 29. The death penalty was announced today by decision of three common pleas judges who heard the evidence on his sanity after he confessed to the slaying. Hoppe also signed an alleged confession that killed Miss Lily Dale Cory, a Toledo school teacher, two years ago. He was sentenced to die October 26.

### Love Spurned, Man Shoots Girl, Self

ERIE, Pa., July 16.—As a result of what police termed a lovers' quarrel, Frank Miller of Grove City is dead and Mabel Hoack of Paderoe is critically wounded in a hospital here.

Police were told Miller went to Hoack's home last evening and reiterated his oft-repeated proposal. Rebuffed, he is alleged to have fired a bullet into the girl's body and then turned gun on himself.

### EIGHT ARRESTED, WARRANTS ISSUED FOR 25 OTHERS AS WHARTON RICE FARMERS TAKE WATER ROW TO COURT

The men arrested today were Will Durant, Harvey Foster, Willie Edinbach, E. D. Harris, F. O. Cobb, E. E. Wood, Walter Regan and Adolph Guest. They were placed under \$250 bond each to appear in court here August 8, when each case will be set for trial.

### GOHAM TOPAY BIG HONOR TO MEXICAN FLIER

#### CARRANZA'S BODY WILL START HOME UNDER GUARD OF HONOR

(By Associated Press.)  
NEW YORK, July 16.—The body of Captain Emilio Carranza will be started on its journey to Mexico City Wednesday by one of the largest military funeral processions New York has ever seen.

The coffin is to be borne through the streets in a gun caisson draped with the Mexican and United States flags and followed by 10,000 soldiers, marching to the beat of muffled drums. Representatives of the diplomatic and consular corps and representatives of the nation, state and city are to follow.

Leaving here 3 p. m. Wednesday over the Pennsylvania system the special funeral train will make no stops until it reaches Laredo, where it is expected at 5 p. m. Friday. There the body will be placed on the general establishment. He will be taken to the field which will be turned over to the Mexican government. A detachment of 16 non-commissioned United States army officers will act as guard of honor for the body until Mexico City is reached.

Ten thousand persons, many of them Mexicans, yesterday viewed the body of Mexico's "Lone Eagle," killed last Thursday night in the pine belt of southern New Jersey when his plane crashed shortly after he had taken off from Roosevelt Field for Mexico City.

No religious services will be held in this country, in line with the request of Arturo Elias, Mexican consul general in New York.

Sebastian Carranza, father of the flier, who is attached to the consul general's office here, did not visit the general establishment. He explained that he remembered his boy's face too well to wish to see it in death. He also said he would not accompany the body to Mexico City. "I hope to bury my sorrow in work here," he said.

Efforts are being made to have as many of the wholesale and retail firms of the city to make the trip. Fifty cars or more have been set as the goal.

Committeemen from the chamber of commerce will start out tomorrow to solicit cars for the trip.

The cars will leave here at 7 o'clock Friday morning, and are due to arrive in Hobbs, the center of the activities about one o'clock, visiting Hobbs, Meadow, Brownfield and Seagraves on the route. The return trip may be made by way of Lovington and Tatum, New Mexico and Plains, it was said.

## GROUP FORCED DOWN AT CAPE PLATEN FOUND

### KRASSIN, WITH RESCUED ABOARD, STARTS TO PORT TO REFUEL

MOSCOW, July 16.—The Russian aviator Chukhovsky and his four companions, who were marooned by a forced landing near Cape Platen on July 12, were taken aboard the Russian ice-breaker Krassin at 10 p. m. Sunday. News of the safety of the party came by radio from Prof. Samoilovich today.

### Ship Has Seven Rescued From Ice

MOSCOW, July 16.—The powerful Russian ice-breaker Krassin, which rescued seven of the marooned crew of the Italia last week, was pounding its way toward Adyent Bay today to fill up her bunkers with coal in preparation for further search for the missing Amfiden party and the six men carried off in the balloon of the Italia on May 28.

The Krassin, at 10 o'clock last night, picked up the Russian pilot Chukhovsky and his crew of four. The men had been stranded near Cape Platen since July 12 when they made a forced landing after sending out first word of Captains Alberto Mariano and Filippo Zappi, who had been given up for dead.

### Body Of Brooklyn Builder Is Found

NEW YORK, July 16.—Slaying of William F. Gilbride, wealthy Brooklyn builder, whose body was found in a bramble patch in East Meadows, Long Island, battered, cut, tied and wrapped in sacks, mystified police today. Robbery believed to have motivated the killing, since Gilbride carried about \$300 when he left home Friday and only one cent was found in his pockets.

Freddy Fitzsimmons won his own game at Cincinnati when he doubled in the eighth inning, scoring Mel Ott with the run that gave the Cards a 2 to 1 victory over the Reds.

Taking over the Phils. 6 to 3, for their sixth straight victory the Chicago Cubs clung to their third place

post, two percentage points back of the Giants. Bush was his hard hit, lasted until the ninth. With two out and two runs in Percy Jones entered the box to retire the side.

## Old Days

Joseph Hergeshimer, the novelist,  
is not at all sure that the great  
progress of America in the last century  
is altogether a good thing.

In his most recent book, "Quiet  
Cities," Mr. Hergeshimer discusses  
life in American cities a century  
ago. He paints also a picture of  
the color and romance of early  
Pittsburgh when it had but 1500  
inhabitants and not steel mills, of  
wartime Boston of the clipper ship  
era, of Natchez in the day when  
the Mississippi steamboat was the  
most gorgeous thing in the valley;  
of New Orleans at the time of  
French rule.

He is frank to say that he would  
rather have lived in those cities a  
century ago than live in them to-  
day; although he admits that  
probably could not exist without  
the comforts and cushions of  
twentieth century civilization. In  
the old days, he believes, there was  
more of a sheen to life; the old  
aristocratic ideal expressed itself  
in customs and manners, living  
was both more leisurely and more  
exciting, the times were simultane-  
ously more peaceful and more  
arduous.

All of us probably feel the same  
way, at times. No one can think  
of the great old plantation houses  
of the pre-Civil War south, for in-  
stance, without feeling regret that  
the old days have passed away.  
There was a savor to life then; wide,  
cool hallways, open verandas over-  
looking rolling lawns, white penciled  
rooms with great four-poster beds  
drawing rooms lit by long waxen  
tapers, peopled by men and women  
who ordered their lives by one of  
the most punctilious codes ever  
made.

Yet the old days had to pass. As  
Mr. Hergeshimer frankly admits  
they disappeared before the rising  
tide of democracy and industrial-  
ization. A century ago the masses  
were submerged in order that the  
few might live gracefully and pleas-  
antly; now we are trying the ex-  
periment of giving everyone a shot  
at the pleasures of the few. For  
democracy not only means that the  
humblest may have a voice in his  
own government; it means, in this  
day of mass production, that he has  
a voice in the shaping of civilization.  
He has a right to get, or at  
least to try to get the luxuries that  
formerly were denied him. The  
Ford Motor Company and General  
Motors could not exist save in a  
democratic community; add, at the  
same time, they help to make de-  
mocracy more real every day.

We can regret the passing of Mr.  
Hergeshimer's "quiet cities" all we  
want to; but, after all, their pass-  
ing was inevitable. It is no use for  
us to mope and wish they could re-  
turn. They can't. Our wisest course  
is to face the present frankly and  
happily, resolved to remedy its  
defects and make the most of its  
good points. The past may be beau-  
tiful, but it is past.

## The Soda Fountain

And now the soda fountain, once  
the despair of dietitians and health  
authorities, comes in for a pat on  
the back.

Writing in the current issue of  
Good Housekeeping, Dr. Walter H.  
Eddy, of Columbia University, says  
that the soda fountain is now ad-  
vised to the national health, where-  
as a few years ago it was considered  
a detriment.

The reason? We are learning  
what to drink. Fountain sales show  
an increasing consumption of pure  
fruit juice and milk drinks in place  
of the artificially flavored, more or  
less mysterious concoctions of a  
generation ago. The change is good  
for us. It is helping to balance our  
diet.

War May Result From Struggle Over Oil, Dutcher SaysWith Our  
ContemporariesMUCH CHEAP LAND YET FOR  
THE FARMERS

Cheap western agricultural lands  
are becoming a thing of the past  
—that is to say, cheap lands with  
the speculative margin in them.  
But cheap land for the man who  
wants to live on it is yet available  
in the South Plains of Texas. The  
idea is current that land here is so  
high that one can not afford to buy  
it. This idea has come about  
through a common knowledge that  
Hale county and some of the ad-  
joining counties comprise the best  
agricultural territory of the south-  
west and the assumption that be-  
cause highly improved land sells  
high that all land must sell high.  
This preconceived opinion has kept  
many a prospector from stopping in  
this section to look it over. He  
has gone to places where lands are  
of reputedly lower price.

It is a significant thing that much  
of the land which has been re-  
cently sold below the market has  
been purchased by residents and by  
people who do not actually live on  
land themselves. The land has  
been bought purely from an invest-  
ment or a speculative viewpoint.

For the man who wants to secure  
a farm home no place offers greater  
opportunity now than the South  
Plains of Texas. Loan values here  
have been raised by the Federal  
Land bank and the Joint Stock in-  
stitutions as well as the other priv-  
ately owned loan companies. Many  
a good man with little capital can  
set himself up in the business of  
farming in this section today, if he  
only knows it.

Dollar for dollar in purchase price  
and dollar for dollar in productivity  
per acre, cost of production con-  
sidered, the South Plains section  
stands head and shoulders above  
any agricultural country of which  
we have intimate knowledge.—  
Plainview Herald.

There is an abundance of land in  
this country, yet. Part of the busi-  
ness there is going to be plenty for  
many years to come. Farmers can  
get homes in the South Plains for  
about as small investment as they  
can anywhere, and on easy terms.  
Improved property, of course, is  
higher in proportion to the amount  
of improvements and accessibility  
to market.

The South Plains is the coming  
center of agriculture in Texas, and  
will in the future increase each  
year in its production of agricul-  
tural products.

Washington, July 16.—War is  
probable—unless the two empires,  
through mutual sacrifice, seek to  
reconcile their many conflicting in-  
terests.

That's the report of an American  
correspondent covering the great  
international struggle for oil be-  
tween Britain and the United  
States.

Ludwell Denny, one of the best  
informed writers in Washington, be-  
comes the first American with an  
American viewpoint and complete  
awareness of American policy to  
produce a volume describing the  
exciting, warring oil war which  
threatens world peace and moti-  
vates so many of the major acts  
of foreign policy and yet nearly all  
keeps itself out of the newspapers.

"We Fight for Oil" is the name  
of the book. Aside from the fact  
that it is today the most valuable  
of contributions to the oil war liter-  
ature because it brings this con-  
stantly changing situation virtually  
to the present hour. Furthermore  
it is free from propaganda and  
traces the war's basis on all fronts.

Russian, Colombian, Persian, Ven-  
ezuelan, Rumanian, Mexican and all  
the others.

Denny's journalistic career has  
taken him into the European and  
Asiatic war zones and subsequently  
for three years as a correspondent  
in the state department here, where  
he followed closely the concealed  
moves of this government to safe-  
guard the United States' future  
against foreign monopoly of the  
world's oil reserves.

To anyone who hasn't followed  
the war as Denny has his well docu-  
mented revelations are likely to be  
astounding.

Here's a summary  
Britain, with the Royal Dutch  
Shell company under Sir Henri De-  
terring and its its government con-  
trolled Anglo-Persian company, is  
fighting with our government and  
our Standard Oil company for the  
world's reserves. A struggle for  
world mastery is developing as we  
threaten Britain's long commercial  
and naval supremacy.

The fight centers on raw materi-  
als, principally oil, because our  
own reserves are being depleted and  
both our industrial and naval su-  
premacy now depend on it. Naval  
men regard actual war as inevit-  
able; history shows no two great rival  
empires which ever allowed them-  
selves permanent peace.

Downing street saw first the win-  
dom of helping British companies  
grab the world oil and had per-  
haps most of it before our govern-  
ment woke up. But the continuing  
foreign policy of the Wilson, Har-  
ding and Coolidge administrations  
has included belligerent further-  
ance of the interests of our oil  
companies.

Today Standard and Royal Dutch  
are still fighting, sometimes in pub-  
lic, for a lion's share of Russia's  
great reserves. Our government  
laughed its way into a share in the  
rich Mosul fields, but Britain ap-  
parently still seeks to edge us out.

duction from American fields.

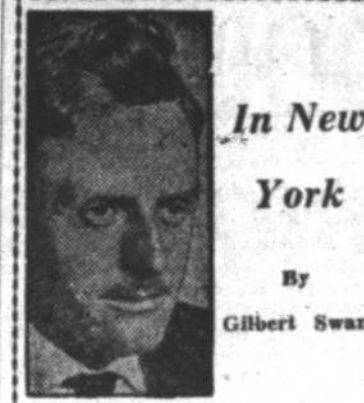
Britain is maneuvering now for

case of war.

Pointing out that petroleum has  
been lately bad odor among us  
Denney that offers these significant  
paragraphs:

"The danger point will be reached  
when near-shortage drives prices  
upward, and American automob-  
ile owners are told the British  
have cornered most of the world  
supply. What will happen when  
the enraged force of public opinion  
is added to the commercial motives  
of the oil companies and the defense  
incentives of the government?"

"Then the Ku Kluxers and Mayor  
Thompson may find a hate crus-  
ade crying for their hundred per  
cent leadership. Then all the other  
Anglo-American economic and  
political conflicts—real or imag-  
ined—can be brought out and magni-  
fied."

"The danger cannot be removed  
by denying its existence. Peace  
cannot be maintained by repeating  
the lie that 'war between Great Brit-  
ain and the United States is impos-  
sible.'"

old-fashioned!"

The "regulars" are all patroniz-  
ing the night clubs again in hope  
of being present during a raid. . . .

way hears, the Republican enforce-  
ment officers will take seriously the  
slap in the Democratic platform.

On the night it was slipped in,  
about 20 of the most prominent  
mid-town resorts were raided. . . .  
Helen Morgan borrowed a costume  
from a checkroom girl and got  
away. . . . And Texas Guinan, who  
is almost always on hand, happened  
to be at the marathon dance.

## FORMAL PROBE OF DISASTROUS FLIGHT URGED

### NOBILE AND MALMGREN TREATMENT UP FOR MUCH DISCUSSION

(By Associated Press)

STOCKHOLM, July 16.—Swedish officials today were considering what steps would be taken toward formal inquiry into General Umberto Nobile's fatal expedition to the north pole. Newspapers were reporting a judicial investigation.

The newspaper Dagbladet printed a report of which the source was not given, saying that General Nobile "is in fact the Italian government's prisoner as he is forbidden to leave the base ship Citta Di Milano before he has given the world a clear account of the Italia catastrophe and later events."

Swedish films in Spitzbergen have been ordered to clear up the mystery of Dr. Malmgren's fate. His Italian companions left him alive in the ice, but his admirers announced it had received no confirmation of the Swedish scientific death. The search was ordered on the slim chance that he might be alive.

An expert on international law said that it offered no hindrance to a formal inquiry into the Nobile expedition but that difficulties of a political nature might be encountered. He suggested that Sweden might propose a Norwegian trial of some sort since the Spitzbergen archipelago is under jurisdiction of Norway.

It was thought by others, however, that such an investigation would be hard to arrange as the jurisdiction of any country could only be vaguely defined. It was pointed out that Dr. Malmgren had been left to perish in a sort of "no man's land" and thus no country would have a clearly defined right to command a judicial inquiry.

General Nobile sent a message to Stockholm saying that he had no misunderstanding with Dr. Malmgren. He asserted that relations of the whole party were at all times frank and cordial.

### Malmgren Left In Ice Grace Alive

MOSCOW, July 16 (AP).—Statements by companions of Dr. Malmgren, who survived the crash of the dirigible Italia, that he was left alive in a grove of ice caused a storm of criticism in Russia today. A radio gram to Tass, Soviet news agency, from Prof. Semenov, head of the Russian relief expedition aboard the ice breaker Krassin said he asked the Swedish scientist's two rescued companions, Captains Mariano and Zappi, for details of Malmgren's death. He was told how they dug a grave for Malmgren and started over the ice toward safety as he waved them in crying.

"Go! Go! At the price of my life you'll save all."

Strong criticism was voiced in the Soviet press not only of the treatment of Malmgren alive, but also of general Nobile's being rescued and the conduct of the Italia expedition.

The feeling in certain circles was reflected in a poem by Vladimir Mayakovsky, noted Soviet poet, printed in the newspaper Krasnaya Pravda. A translation of its closing lines read:

"Now say you who flew how your leaders botched the job? We await Nobile's live word, why have you died? Where is Malmgren? Has he died or have they left him alive?"

Captains Mariano and Zappi and

Dr. Malmgren started from the scene of the crash of the Italia across the ice for land on May 30. In their march they suffered untold privation. For days they drifted on floating ice. Zappi was quoted as saying that several miles southwest of Brook island Malmgren was unable to march on. He told his two companions to go ahead and take all the provisions. Zappi's account continued:

Asked to Dig Grave

"Before leaving Malmgren asked us to dig a grave in the ice and he lay down. Quietly he stretched out his hand bidding us adieu and handing up his compass, requesting us to give it to his mother."

"We plodded on slowly. In 24 hours we were only 100 meters from Malmgren. He saw Malmgren raise his head. Hoping that driven by hunger he would go on with us, we waited. Realizing this, Malmgren cried:

"Go! Go! At the price of my life you'll save all."

A mile from Brook island Mariano began to drift. Again they drifted with the ice. During their wanderings they saw six airplanes, only about a mile distant but the Soviet flier Chukhovsky from the Krassin was the only one to see them.

For twelve days they had not eaten anything. Mariano felt death approaching. He begged Zappi to place his body aboard the Russian plane if the airman should succeed in landing. His ebullient life revived when the Krassin approached to pick them up.

The Krassin then pushed on to rescue the five men commanded by Lieutenant Alfredo Vigliani at the scene of the disaster. The group heard the Krassin's siren and sighted her shortly after 4:15 p. m. Thursday. They radioed their position directing the ship to them. Smoke signals and rockets were sent up by the Vigliani group. Five and a half hours after they had heard the siren they were safe aboard the vessel.

Amundsen Report Doubtful

The report received in Stockholm yesterday that Roald Amundsen and his five companions had been picked up by the Russian ice breaker Malmgren was discredited here. The Malmgren has been hampered by fog and ice in her search for the missing men and at noon reported her position but sent no word of sighting any survivors.

The Krassin was balked by fog in its attempt to search for the six men who drifted away in the balloon part of the Italia and Amundsen party. The vessel today was making its way toward Cape Platen where Chukhovsky and his four companions have been marooned since they sighted Zappi and Mariano. The Norwegian ice breaker Bregenz was also making its way through the ice to them.

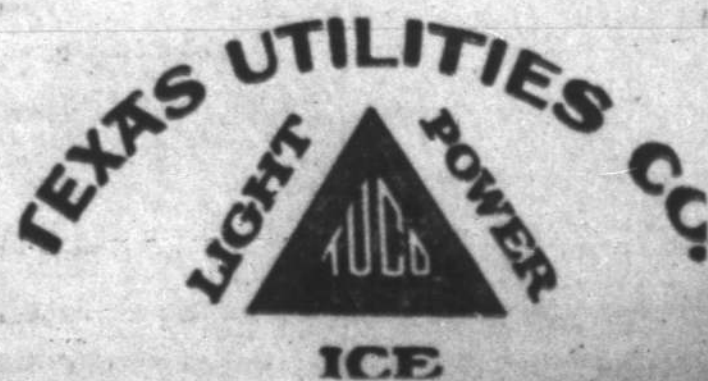

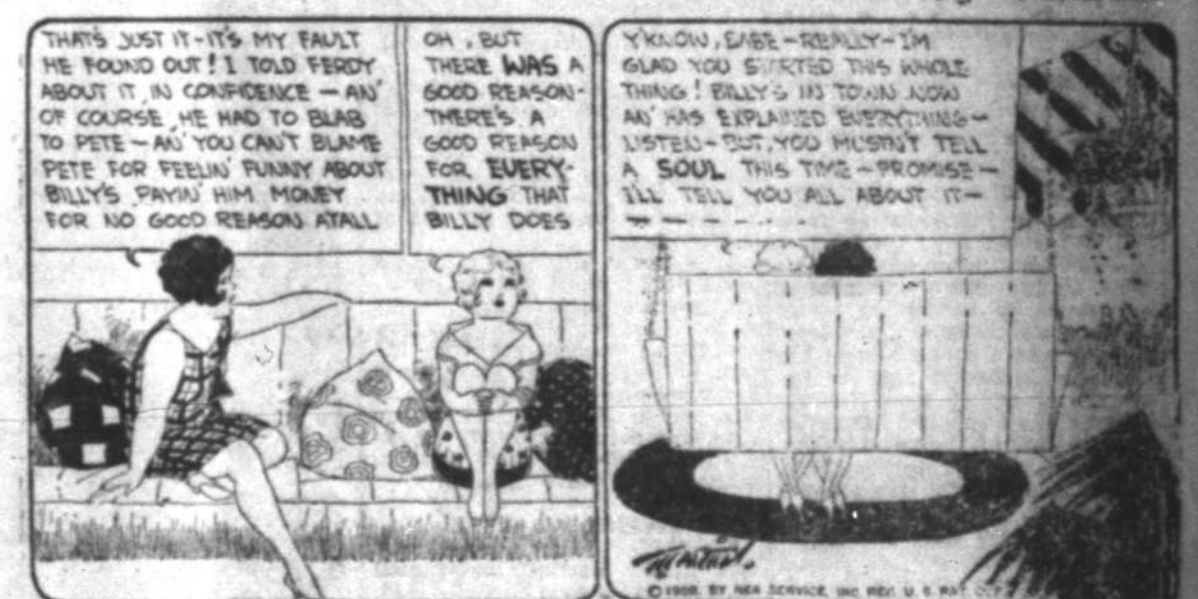

MANY DIE IN  
EUROPE'S HEATWAVE SWEEPS CENTRAL  
AND SOUTHERN PART  
OF COUNTRY

(By Associated Press) LONDON, July 16.—All parts of central and southern Europe were suffering today from a heat wave which has claimed many victims through prostrations and drownings.

Five days of high temperatures in England culminated Sunday with the mercury reaching 91. In Vienna it reached 112 and large parts of Germany, France, Belgium and Holland recorded the temperature at various points between 91 and 97.

Four deaths and eleven prostrations occurred in Belgium. There was a great increase in the number of bathing casualties in Australia, more than 100 bathers having been drowned in rivers and lakes since July. Many bathing accidents and heat prostrations were recorded in England.

VIENNA, July 16 (AP)—Thirteen persons were drowned in the Danube over the week-end and thousands of Viennese flocked to bathing resorts for relief from the heat wave which is holding central Europe in its grip.

FRANCE, ITALY  
GIVE OKEH TO  
KELLOGG PACTENGLAND, SPAIN ALSO  
FAVORABLE; REPLY  
EXPECTED SOON

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 16.—Secretary Kellogg's proposed treaty for renunciation of war today bore the approval of three great European nations.

To Germany's unqualified acceptance there was added over the week-end the endorsement of Italy and France. Neither nation mentioned any reservations or qualifications. Foreign Minister Briand declared simply that France is "entirely disposed to sign" while Premier Mussolini set forth that Italy "is disposed to proceed" to placing its signature upon the covenant.

England and Spain To add to the gratification of Washington officials, word was received that Great Britain stood ready to approve the treaty and might dispatch a note to that effect this week. Spain, too, was said to look favorably upon the American proposal.

The French and Italian notes were made public last night at the state department. In expressing its approval France reviewed the provisions of the treaty and took occasion to render homage to the church at the two services. J. D.
