Dedication Set

Dedication services are planned for 10 a.m. Saturday, July 4 for an Official Texas Historical Marker commemorating the J.W. Carter Family and the 7-up Ranch. The service, sponsored by Castro Country Historical Commission and Castro County Commissioners Court, will be held on the north side of Running Water Draw on FM 1055 (from Dimmitt: six miles west on

Highway 86, then ten miles south on FM 1055 or 12 miles south Highway 385, six miles west on FM 145 at intersection with FM 1055).

Inscription on the marker reads: "The J.W. Carter Family and the 7-Up Ranch. The first permanent settlers in Castro County, the James W. Carter family moved to this area in 1884. A tent and dugout served as home until a house was constructed (100 yds w.) Their cattle, which they brought with them, were marked with the 7-Up brand. Their daughter Lizzie (b. 1886) was the first white child born to a permanent settler in the area. James Carter (1845-1916) was instrumental in the organization of the Castro County government in 1891 and served on the first commissioners court. Cart and his wife Ellen (1855-1942) later opened a hotel in Dimmitt. (1981)"

Life and legend of the Carter Family will be given by Don Nelson. U.S. Representative Kent Hance will speak the dedicatory address. Also participating in the program will be Speaker of the House Bill Clayton; State Senator Bill Sarpalius; Eddie Guffee, executive director of Llano Estacado Museum, Plainview; Judge M.L. Simpson and William C. Greggs, executive director of Panhandle-Plains Museum, Canyon. Local members of the Commission are Ruth Bennett and Marilyn Higgins.

The summer program will end July 9.

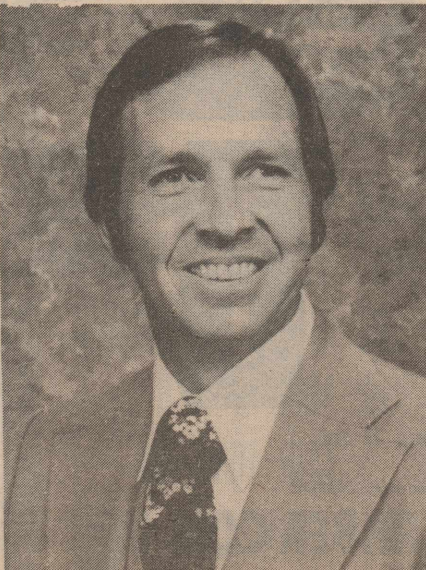
Heberto Villegas Rites Conducted

Proposed Changes Approved In Brucellosis Program

The Brucellosis Committee of the U.S. Animal Health Association, meeting in Denver June 16, approved proposed changes in the Federal Brucellosis Eradication Program that would reduce testing requirements for the intrastate movement of cattle and would raise the acceptable herd infection rates for classification as A and B areas of the state. John S. Cargile, president of Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, testified in favor of the proposals on behalf of the Texas cattle industry.

Brucellosis is a livestock disease that robs cattlemen and consumers of millions of dollars in lost beef production through cattle abortion and reduced calf crops.

The proposed amendments to the Uniform Methods and Rules of the brucellosis program were sent to the USAHA subcommittee for change of ownership test requirements for further study and refinement. These changes will be reviewed at the fall meeting of USAHA and, if approved, can be incorporated into the UM & RS before Jan. 1, 1982.

Cargile, who serves on the USAHA brucellosis committee from Texas, said that in Class B and C states, the new rules for intrastate movement would require one negative test and would not require additional testing. An educational program to encourage the voluntary retest of moving animals would be augmented at the same time.

Currently, the Western portion of Texas is classified as a Class A control area and the Eastern portion is in a Class B control status.

Under the USDA's proposed change in classification standards, Class A status would cover any state with one half of one percent or less accumulated 12-month herd infection rate, compared to the old rate of one percent or less. Class C status would encompass any state with a two percent herd infection rate or higher.

Cargile noted that Texas started an accelerated brucellosis program July 1, 1980, and that Texas cattlemen have

given the new program excellent support and are trying to make it work.

"Cattlemen by and large are not enthusiastic about the brucellosis program but have accepted it and are cooperating because they have been convinced by their leadership that it is the best solution offered today to a tough problem," Cargile said.

The proposed rules for movement in the Class B & C areas originally set for Jan. 1, 1982, asked for multiple testing that cattlemen are not prepared to accept, he said.

The revisions supported by Cargile would reduce the burden on the cattlemen and encourage compliance with the program.

Cargile also told USAHA that the number of calves being vaccinated in Texas is rising rapidly with the availability of the reduced dose of Strain 19 vaccine. Implementation of the changes will further encourage cattlemen to continue calthood vaccinations, an important step toward eradicating the disease.



Hance Calls Anti-Busing Amendment 'Right Step'

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance said the House approval of an anti-busing amendment Tuesday "is a step in the right direction, but stronger action is needed still."

The House Tuesday approved anti-busing language on the Justice Department authorization bill that forbids the department from bringing "any sort of action to require directly or indirectly" the busing of students to any school but the one closest to their home, except when special education is needed. This would virtually take the government out of the desegregation business, since Congress has already stopped the Justice Department practice of cutting off federal funds to schools in order to force them to implement busing.

"The effect of the language we approved Tuesday afternoon would be to prevent the Justice Department from filing or intervening in court suits

which seek to desegregate school systems by busing students beyond the neighborhood school," said Hance. "School districts presently under court order will not immediately change, but the Justice Department cannot now reinstate most of those same suits which have a time expiration date. We should begin to see relief over the next two to three years at most of the affected school districts."

Although the Justice Department could not intervene in legal battles, the bill would not prevent federal courts from ruling on busing suits brought by individuals.

"The House and Senate both passed this bill last year and it was vetoed by the President," said Hance. "I expect the Senate to again approve it and feel confident it will not be vetoed this time. Busing has not worked and should be totally eliminated."

WHAT'S GLAUCOMA?

Glaucoma is an eye disease marked by increased pressure in the eye. It can blind you. About two million Americans have lost at least some of their vision to this disease and half of them are not even aware that they have it.

It can strike anyone, and a truly sad thing about blindness caused by glaucoma is that it is unnecessary. With early detection and treatment, loss of vision can be prevented.

Lions Clubs, long known for their assistance to the blind and sight impaired, annually conduct thousands of glaucoma screenings. These screenings take little time, are painless and free of charge.

Whenever a Lions Club or other organization in your community offers glaucoma testing, take advantage of it. Young people, though not as susceptible as those over 35, should also be tested because damage caused prior to treatment cannot be corrected. That is why it is so important to have regular eye examinations that can detect glaucoma before loss of vision occurs.

Glaucoma acts by slowly destroying the optic nerve,

which results in a gradual loss of sight, most frequently in those over the age of 35. The symptoms, which occur only after some damage has already taken place, include: frequent changes of glasses, none of which is satisfactory; loss of side vision; blurred or foggy vision and the inability to adjust eyes to darkened rooms.



If blindness is to be prevented, glaucoma must be treated either medically or surgically to reduce the increased pressure. It can be controlled if detected in time. The disease cannot be cured because the underlying cause has not been found.

In addition to conducting glaucoma screenings, Lions Clubs support dog guide training, eye banks, eye research and treatment centers, used eyeglass collection and distribution centers and a wide variety of other community related activities.

Public Notice

ORDINANCE # 79

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS, REGULATING THE DISCHARGE, SALE AND DISTRIBUTION OF FIREWORKS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE FOR ENFORCEMENT.

Be it known that the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, meeting in regular session on the 25th day of May, 1981, at its regular meeting time and place, after notice of such meeting was duly posted, as required by law, took up, among other businesses, the regulation of the discharge, sale and distribution of fireworks within the City of Hart, Texas; and,

WHEREAS, after much discussion, it was decided that an ordinance should be passed regulating the discharge, sale and distribution of such fireworks;

THEREFORE, motion was made Commissioner Ronnie Truelock and seconded by Commissioner Jerri Horton and unanimously passed that the following ordinance be adopted by the Board of Commissioners for the City of Hart, Texas, to-wit:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS:

SECTION I:

It shall be unlawful for any person to cast, throw or fire any squib, rocket, torpedo, grenade cap, cartridge or other combustible firework of any kind within the city limits of the city of Hart, Texas.

SECTION II:

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association of persons, corporations or other organization to exhibit or have in their possession, with intent to give away or sale, or offer for sale, within the city limits of the City of Hart, Texas, any squib, rocket, cracker, torpedo, grenade, cap, cartridge or other combustible fireworks of any kind.

This Section shall not apply to the sale of any such article by wholesalers, to each other, or to the sale of any such article at wholesale to merchants conducting business entirely without the City, or to the sale by wholesalers for private or public demonstration, as hereinafter provided.

SECTION III:

Nothing herein shall be construed to apply to any sale, storage or use of railroad track torpedos or other signaling devices used by railroads.

Nothing herein shall be construed to apply to the sale, storage or use of flashlight combustion by photographers or dealers in photographic supplies.

Nothing herein shall be construed to prevent any public or private demonstration or display which shall be of such a character, and so located, discharged, or fired, as in the opinion of the Chief of the Fire Department, after proper inspection, shall not be hazardous to property or endanger any person.

SECTION IV:

Any person, firm, association of persons, corporations or other organizations violating any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$200.00. Each and every violation of this ordinance shall be construed a separate offense, and every day that such person violates any provision of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION V:

The invalidity of any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words shall not invalidate any other part of this ordinance. It is the intent of the City Commission, in enacting this ordinance, that the provisions are separable, and no provision hereof shall become inoperative or fail by reason of the invalidity of any other provision.

SECTION VI:

The City Secretary is hereby directed to have a descriptive caption, together with the penalty clause of this ordinance, published in a newspaper of general circulation within the City Limits of the City of Hart, Texas, for two [2] consecutive weeks, and this ordinance shall be enforceable from and after the date of the second publication or July 5, whichever occurs last.
