Titus County Fair Now Underway at Mount Pleasant

Titus County's fair, dairy show and rodeo got underway for a four-day exhibition at Mt. Pleasant, Tuesday.

Women's Club exhibits consisting of textiles, canning, baking and displays of home-made lamps were on exhibit. Mrs. Gladys Kolander, home demonstration agent for Titus County, has charge of this division.

In charge of the dairy and beef cattle division is Titus County Agent, W. W. Grisham. Premium money this year amounts to \$1,600 for the dairy and beef division. Judging of beef cattle began Thursday and judging of dairy cattle will begin at 9:30 a.m. Friday. L. E. Stone will be master of ceremonies of the dairy show.

A posted prize of \$2,000 with all entrance fees added to the purse has been arranged for the rodeo sponsored by the Rodeo Cowboy's Association of America, with livestock from the Chester Crosby ranch in Oklahoma. Added features of the rodeo will be a cowgirl's clover-leaf barrel race—and the colorful Longview Mounted Quadrille.

Featuring the opening of Fair Week was a parade through the business section of Mount Pleasant at 4 p.m. Tuesday. Friday at noon the exhibitors' and service club barbecue will be held in Dellwood park.

Cover Crop and Seeding Program Is Announced

A campaign is underway to have as much cover crops as possible planted in this area. Protection and enrichment of the land are the principal objectives.

This fall PMA seeding program began Sept. 8, according to announcement from Albert H. Murray, administrative officer, who has advised farmers eligible to participate in the deal of the materials that will be available and the extent to which the Government will share in the cost operations approved.

Seeding Program
Under purchase orders assistance will be given as follows:

Hairy vetch, farmer's share of cost of each 100 pounds of seed, \$8.50; paid by PMA, \$9.

Austrian winter peas, farmer, \$3.50, PMA, \$3.50.

Singletary peas (scar.), farmer, \$6; PMA \$3.50.

Singletary peas (non-scar.), farmer \$5.50; PMA, \$3.50.

Yellow hop clover, per lb., farmer, 27c; PMA, 15c.

Mixed fertilizer (0-14-7) per ton, farmers, \$19.50; PMA, \$15.

Two-7 per cent superphosphate, per ton, farmer, \$18; PMA \$15.

Under prior approval only the PMA will authorize payments for seed as follows:

Pescue (pure live seed), 18c pound; reseeded crimson clover (pure live seed) 10c pound; white Dutch and Ladino clover (pure live seed), 40c pound; black medics (pure live seed), 11c pound.

On purchase order seed a complete analysis is required from the vendor.

Before prior approval can be issued an analysis report and a sales receipt showing the kind of material, number of pounds, germination, purity and weed seed, or total winter legume seed content, which ever is applicable, is required.

Much Activity at Power Plant Site

Outlook Critical Stock Producers Due to Drouth

College Station. — The drouth and price declines have and are causing financial hardships for many of the state's farmers and ranchers. The investments they have made over the years are being seriously threatened.

Right now the major problem is feed. Based upon present feed prospects, says C. H. Bates, farm management specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the outlook is critical over wide areas of the nation. The fate, he continues, of breeding herds totaling millions of cattle, sheep and other livestock hangs in the balance. More feed is needed quickly and larger feed reserves should be a must with every livestock producer.

Bates believes that livestock producers can through sound planning and courageous action do something about the present situation and by balancing feed and livestock numbers cushion in the future such situation as now exists.

Here are his suggestions for immediate action in the "help ourselves" approach. Further reduce herds to cut total feed needs for there is no place in the herd for culls. Buy now the hay or bundles and protein feeds that will be needed for prices are unlikely to be lower before spring. Wherever cropland is available, seed fall crops to provide grazing. Mixtures such as rye and vetch or oats and clovers or small grains alone will provide excellent temporary pastures provided there is rain. If fertilizers can be used, apply them generously to the fall crops to improve quality and boost tonnage. Use management practices such as weed and brush control to improve permanent pastures and ranges.

Anderson Arrests Two Near Deport

Leroy David of Ft. Worth, and a companion were arrested for drunkenness Sunday near Deport by Constable Pick Anderson. Following David's arrest it was reported the 1938 Chevrolet which he was driving had been stolen from John E. Perkins at Ft. Worth. A set of mechanic's tools and a breech single barrel shotgun, belonging to C. H. Champion of Ft. Worth, were also found in the car.

Officers questioned David and he is alleged to have confessed to stealing a 1941 Plymouth from a Mt. Pleasant used car dealer about six months ago. He was turned over to Titus County officers and taken to Mt. Pleasant and placed in jail to await action of the grand jury on Sept. 22.

Fire Destroys Car Near Fulbright

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed a 1948 Kaiser automobile about 9 o'clock Monday night near the home of Lloyd Cawley east of Fulbright. The car belonged to David Townes of Fulbright, and had been purchased a few days ago.

Deport Volunteer Firemen responded to the call, and soon brought the blaze under control, preventing the fire from spreading to nearby pastures.

To Seek Paluxy In Red River Co.

Cooper-Herring Drilling Company, Tyler, is taking a lease spread in the south part of Red River County near Sulphur river for the drilling of a Paluxy test. Nearly 4,000 acres have been taken out of the Bram Pea, George W. Hart, J. J. Robinett, William Thornbury, Cyrus Ritchie, B. F. Owen and TCR No. 7 surveys. Lease agreement calls for the venture to start by January.

Rain Wednesday Breaks Drouth

Drouth of several weeks duration was broken Wednesday when rain began falling about 3:45 p. m. It was the first rain since early June. A few scattered showers had fallen at various times, but not enough to do much good to crops and stock ponds. Stock water was low or exhausted in many pastures and many were hauling water in rural areas for drinking purposes.

The rain is fine on pastures and ranch land, and will put new life and growth in grasses and relieve the feed situation within a few days. Some ranchers were already feeding their winter supply of hay and feed to cattle while others were reducing their herds by selling part of the stock.

Majority of cotton farmers were not in favor of the rain. Many fields were white and a blowing or continued rains could cause considerable damage to the crop.

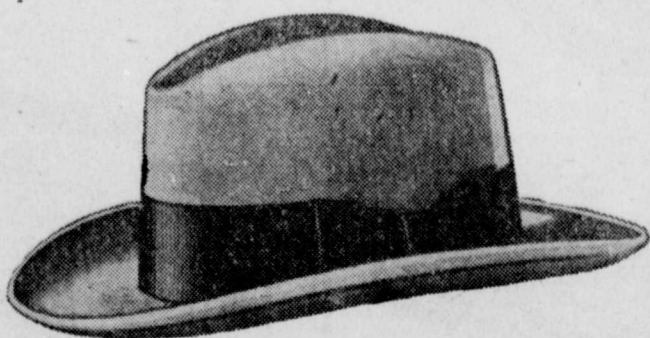

Dr. George S. Benson Writes Letter To His Congressman and Senator

Letter to My Congressman

Dear Congressman: An Associated Press dispatch in my newspaper reports that the House of Representatives has "voted tax relief to all members of Congress." As one of your constituents, I am perfectly willing to approve your action if you will vote exactly the same tax relief to all of us back home. Otherwise you and your colleagues in Congress are being unfair; you are setting yourselves up as a "vested interest," voting yourselves special tax exemptions not applicable to other citizens.

Such action is not only unfair; it is dangerous. It sets you apart from the people you represent. By escaping taxes that you have voted to levy on "we the people," you escape the financial problems that are a constantly expanding part of our lives as government grows bigger and bigger. You lose the common touch. You cease to be a true representative of the people. You become a special class. You shirk carrying your part, a citizen's part of the tax load. Thus, to you, taxes lose their true nature, their paralyzing effect, their inherent danger.

"Unrecorded" Vote

The AP dispatch says that by an "unrecorded" vote the House has voted its members and the members of the Senate permission to deduct all "living expenses" incurred in Washington when you make out your income tax return. "Unrecorded" means that no Congressman stood up to be counted publicly for or against the "Tax-Relief-for-Congressmen-Only" measure—doesn't it?

Nearly all representatives and Senators live in Washington year-round, only periodically visiting the district which they represent. Therefore this special exemption you're voting yourselves means, in effect, that most of the expenditures in the Congressman's family budget can be deducted. In fact, the AP dispatch says that the Income Tax people in Washington interpret the term "living expenses" in the "Tax-Relief-for-Congressmen-Only" measure to mean food, housing, transportation and "other expenses." Therefore, Congressmen might not have to pay any income tax at all.

Pity the Congressmen

We citizens know what you're up against. It's tough trying to live in Washington on \$15,000 a year, with taxes what they are and with inflation sapping the purchasing power of the dollar. But if you think living in Washington on \$15,000 is tough, you ought to come home and find out what it's like here on \$4,000, and \$5,000 and \$6,000—before taxes! The statisticians report that Federal taxes alone now are taking \$477 on the average each year from every man, woman and child. For the family of four, it averages \$1,908.

Another way to put it is that total government taxes now use up 32 per cent of the total annual income of all the people and all the companies in America! And still another way to state it is that taxes now claim an amount equal to the total income of all the people and companies west of the

Mississippi River. If you think this isn't hurting us, in spite of the allegedly painless tax extraction methods of payroll deduction and indirect taxation on consumer goods, you need to come home and look the taxpayers squarely in the pocketbook and bank account.

What About Us?

Yes, Mr. Congressman, it is high time to do something about tax relief. But with your "Tax-Relief-for-Congressmen-Only" measure you're not shooting square. Nor are you facing up honorably to a bad situation. Your trouble is that Federal taxes are too heavy. You're admitting that. You're fixing things so these crippling taxes won't cripple you.

But we citizens are in trouble too. What about us?

This letter is being mailed to my Senators too. They are hereby asked to reject the "Tax-Relief-for-Congressmen-Only" proposition. Together the House and the Senate can cut your taxes and ours too by drastically cutting down the size of the Federal government and by exposing and kicking out the grafters and the big spenders. All the people I know will back you to the hilt in this.

P. S. The time has come for sincere, honest Americans to stand up and be counted on all votes. I am writing out of deep concern for my country's future.

Stores Using Lottery Plan Must Buy Gambling Stamps

Stores participating in "lottery plan merchandising" must buy Federal gambling stamps and pay a monthly wagering levy, according to Frank J. Shagnessy, collector of internal revenue of the Northern New York district.

Listed as "lottery plan merchandising" are such enterprises as suit clubs and blanket clubs in which participants buy membership. The membership fee is applied toward the purchase of the merchandise. Members also receive a "chance" on a free award.

Under the law, each store proprietor and each employee engaged in selling under such conditions is required to obtain the \$50-a-year stamp. The proprietor also must pay a monthly tax of 10 per cent of receipts.

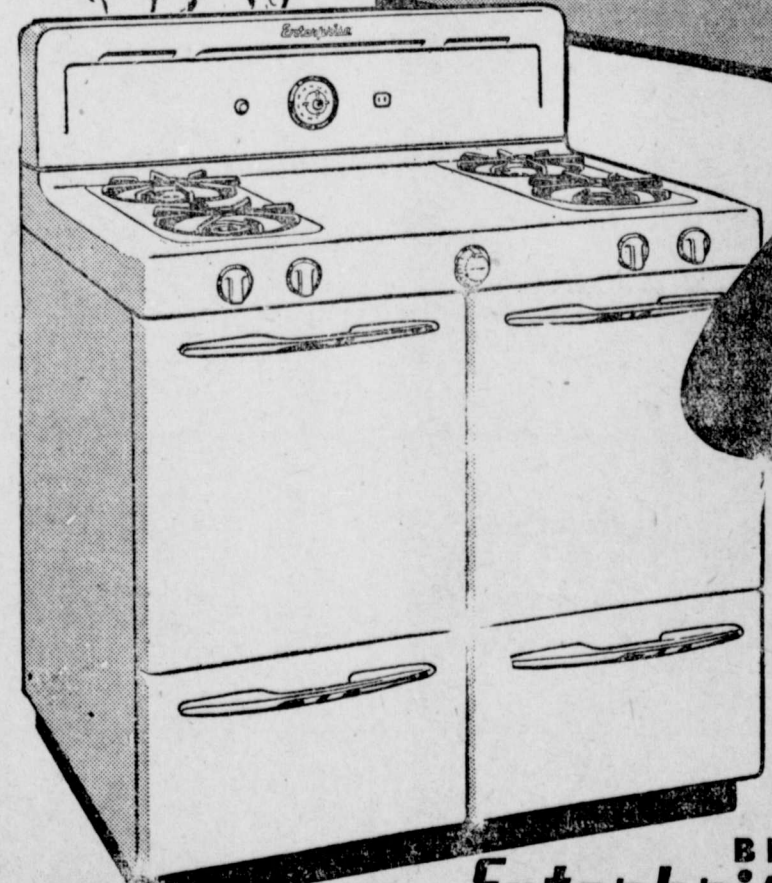

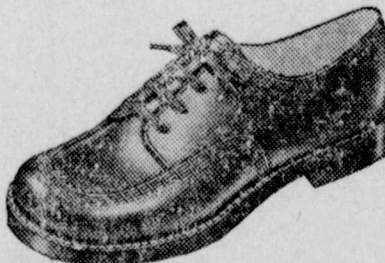

Whitewright Sun Editor Says "Good Times" Are Due Largely to Wars

(T. Glenn Doss is editor and publisher of the Whitewright, Grayson County, Sun in which this editorial appeared.)

Speaker Sam Rayburn is quoted by daily newspapers as saying the "present economic status of Texas is a result of the Democratic administration."

Sun editor has been voting the Democratic ticket for a good many years, but Sun editor is a stickler for the truth, whether it be in politics or something else. So, let's have the facts.

In the 1930 November elections, the Republicans, in power for ten years, lost control of Congress, although retaining Herbert Hoover as president. The Democrats organized the House in March, 1931, and elected John Nance Garner of Texas as speaker, in which capacity he served until he became vice-president in 1933. So, you see, it wasn't a Republican administration in 1931 and 1932, even with a Republican serving as president.

Mr. Rayburn has had much to say over the last twenty years about 5c cotton under the Hoover administration. Let's see what the record says.

In 1930, the last year this country had a Republican House and Senate and President, cotton sold in Whitewright the first week in September at 10 1/4c per pound, and cottonseed at \$27 per ton, according to the record as published in The Sun.

In September, 1931, six months after the Republicans lost control of Congress, cotton sold in Whitewright at 6.20c a pound, and cottonseed at \$10 per ton. In September, 1932, still under

the Democratic-controlled Congress, cotton sold in Whitewright at 7c per pound, and cottonseed at \$10.50 per ton.

In 1933 the Democrats also took over the presidency.

On Sept. 7, 1939, six years after Roosevelt became President and gave the nation the "New Deal," Whitewright had gained 2,085 bales of cotton, and buyers were paying 8 1/4c per pound for cotton and \$16 per ton for seed. The Sun of that date quoted other farm products prices in Whitewright as follows: Corn, 50c per bushel, and oats, 35c per bushel.

So, eight years after the Republicans lost control of Congress and six years after a Democrat became President, cotton and cotton seed prices in Whitewright were less than they were the last year under a full Republican administration, 1930.

All of which leads up to the fact that in spite of all the New Deal could do after six years, it took World War II to restore prosperity to the United States, even though it was a false prosperity, and it took the Korean war and preparations for World War III to maintain it.

If Mr. Rayburn or anybody else tells you otherwise, he is only trying to fool you. If this war and preparations for war goes on indefinitely, this false prosperity will also go on indefinitely.

And that is the real present economic status of Texas and the rest of the nation: A false prosperity paid for with the blood and sacrifices of our fighting men and a mortgage on the earnings of this and future generations.

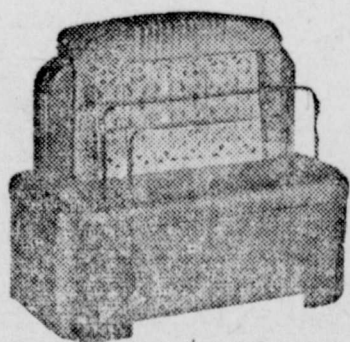

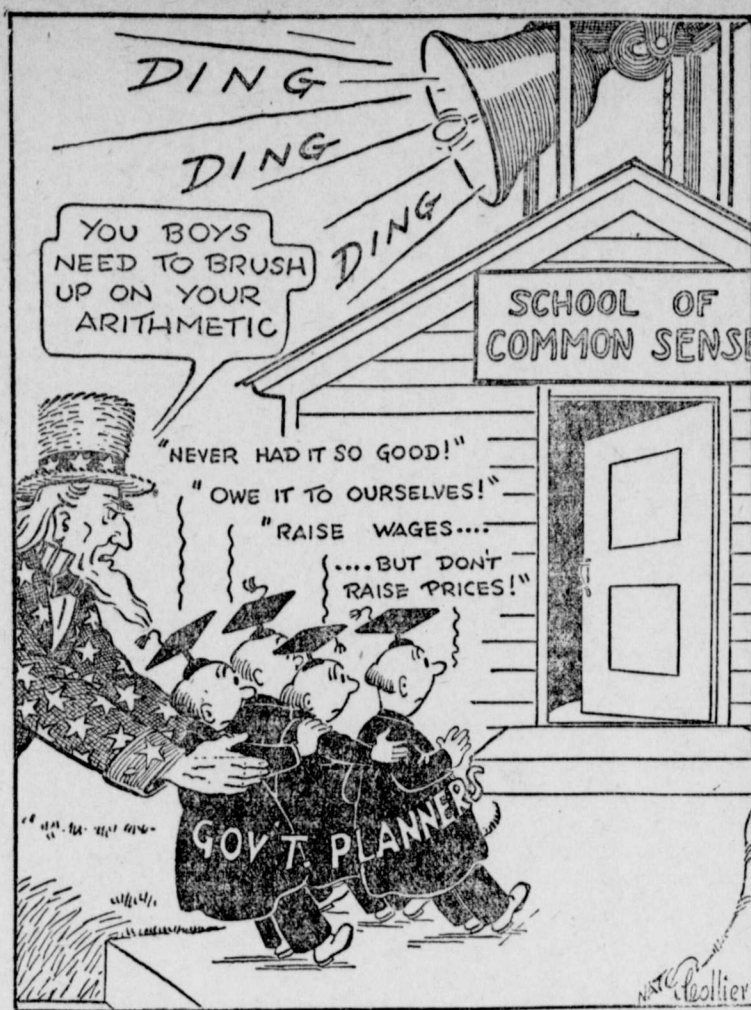

Why not hand out hay, instead, I said, and I'll admit the prospect seemed pretty good. If there's anything that stands in the way of me and my cows making it through the winter, it's lack of hay. For too long now the government maybe has been a little careless in the way it handed out money, whether it was to dig a Democratic water tank for a farmer or a Republican lake for a city group, but the mere handing out of hay, surely that ought to

stump the critics, I figured.

And since my farm out here has been a disaster area from the day I started living on it, I figured I'd qualify for some of that government hay.

But government service just ain't what it used to be. There's a joker in this hay program. They expect you to pay for it, in cash.

Thunder, it doesn't take fifteen telegrams between Austin and Washington to work out a program that says if I got the cash I can buy some hay. I been working under that program for years and I don't mind sayin it rangles. It ain't practical. They've been plenty of times when I needed hay, all right, but in ever instance I always needed cash worse.

If the government has a program where it'll arrange for me some hay strictly on a humanitarian basis, a international loan basis where the need for the loan is so great and the anguish over

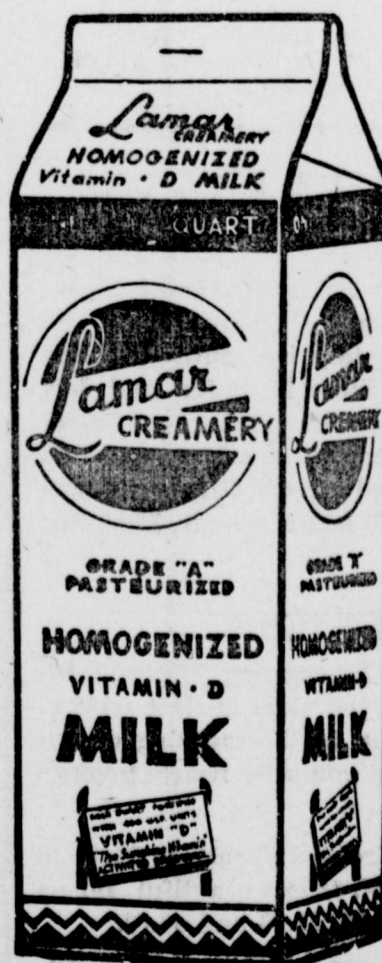

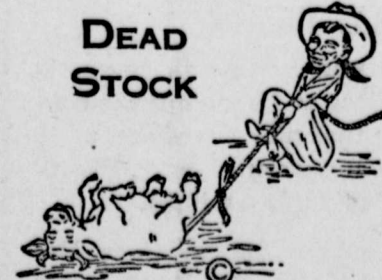

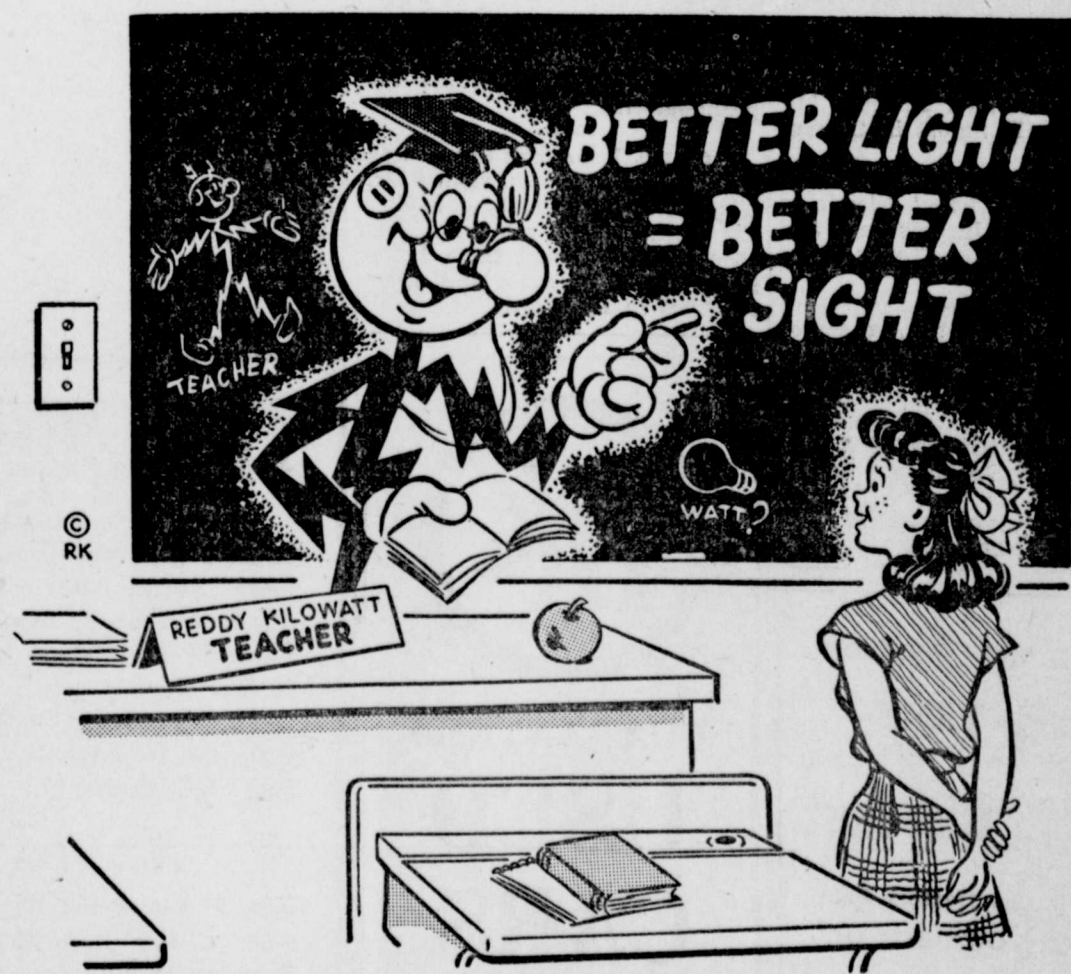
