Monster Man, or is it Woman, points to the clock to remind "trick or treaters" that they should start out a little earlier on their rounds this Halloween [October 31] since darkness will be here an hour earlier after the switch to Standard Time at 2 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 28.

The "monster" wishes to remain anonymous for fear foreknowledge of who "it" is will take away from its ferocity when it meets up with other youngsters in the Twin Cities on their "trick or treat" rounds. Youngsters are cautioned that they are difficult to

see on the streets after dark and they should wear something reflective or light clothing. Everyone is reminded to set their clocks back one hour to change from Daylight Savings Time to Standard Time.

# Big Crowd Attends GPI Coop Meeting

A standing-room only crowd was on hand Tuesday night at the Muleshoe Civic Center when the High Plains GPI Cooperative had its first meeting after officially receiving its charter.

Acting Chairman of the board Guy Austin of Farwell greeted the group and introduced acting board members Jerry Don Glover, Douglas Bales, Jim Owens, M.G.

Killough, Bert Williams, Tommy Wheatley, Grady Sorley and Roy Whitt.

Guest speaker for the meeting was Kenneth Spitzer of Kensal, North Dakota, who is vice-president of Grain Products International, Inc., and presently farms 4,000 acres where he raises wheat and sunflowers. During his 33 years of being a farmer, Spitzer has been actively involved in

Farmers Union, National Farmers Organization, North Dakota Alcohol Cooperative and many other such organizations. He has been trying to get favorable legislation for the farmers since 1950.

In statements to the group, Spitzer explained that the present commitments to Rus-

sia for our grain are not going to raise prices in the U.S. and that the only way, he feels, that prices can be raised is by putting farmers together and getting a good price for everyone, which is where the idea of a cooperative comes in.

Several weeks ago we expressed our amazement at the advanced accounting procedures in our neighboring hospital. We again were overcome with awe at the methods employed by the local phone company when we received their itemized statement for the simple procedure of relocating one of our office telephones.

Apparently the moguls of non-competitive businesses have discovered that while they may not raise an actual rate they can uncover a host of additional services to levy a charge upon.

They can just go to their friendly utility board and get their coffers replenished forthwith.

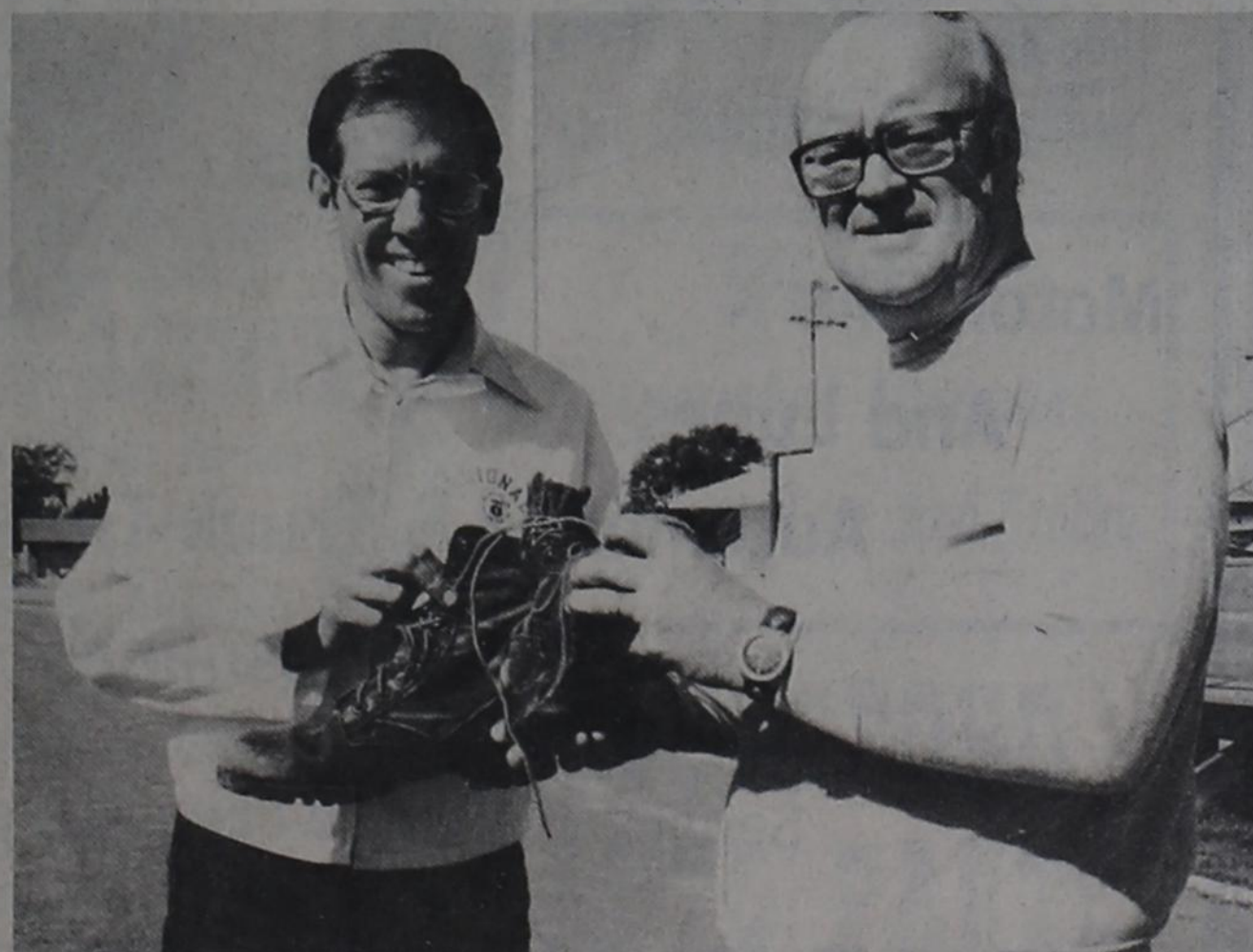

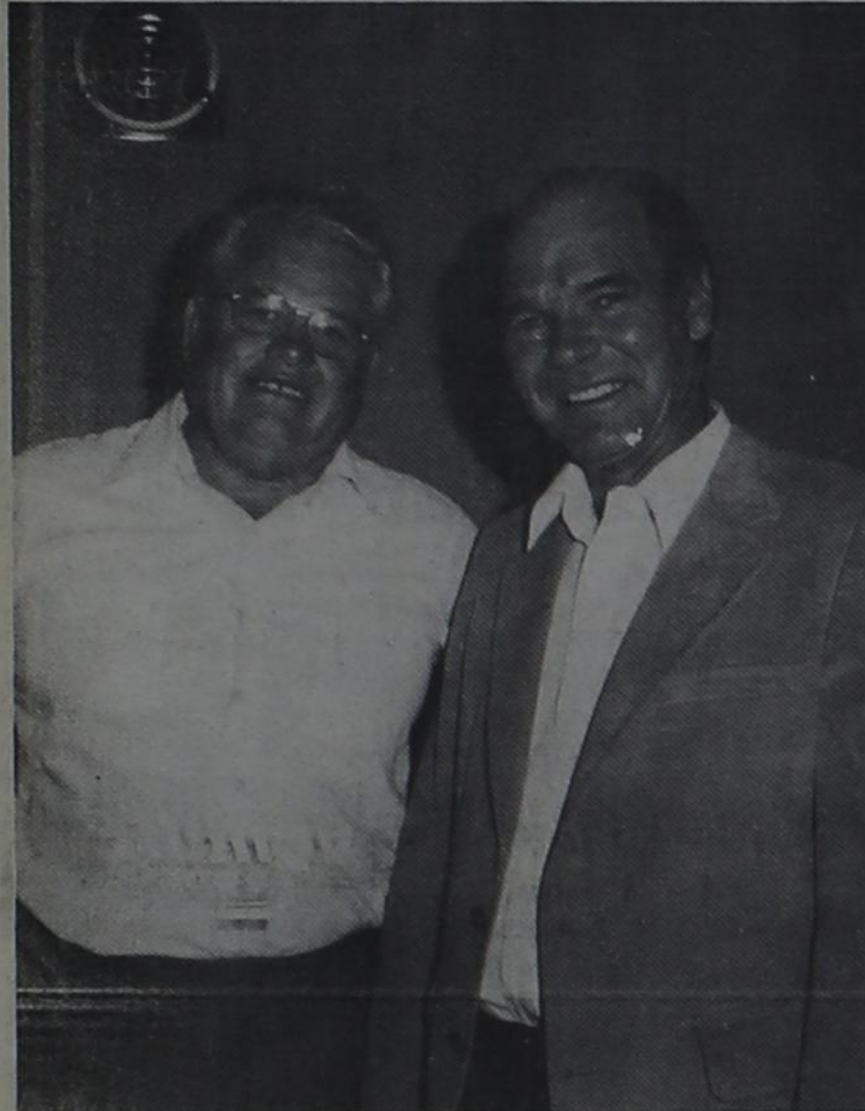

Gordon Green of Muleshoe, explained legalities of the situation as they now stood and had papers for farmers, who had previously signed up that gave them the option of staying in the coop or withdrawing their commitments.

According to Austin, only one farmer who had signed up decided to withdraw his commitment. Austin also said he thought the meeting was a tremendous success and that it was a real "shot in the arm" to see so many farmers ready to back the plan with their time and money. He said, "I really feel like this thing is going to go. In my estimation it is the only chance we have of staying on top of our energy situation."

Although they did not get all of the other 1,000,000 bushels of grain they needed to get the feasibility study into action, several farmers did sign up and still others indicated that they were planning to.

Austin urges any Texas farmer in the area who may be interested but was unable to attend the meeting to please contact him or any of the other board members for any information or help they may need in making a decision in the matter. They would like to get the ball rolling on the feasibility study just as soon as possible and the only way to do that is to get their total commitment of bushels pledged, Austin said.

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**Questions Often Asked About Your Eyes**

Q: Do you do any charity work? By that I mean, do you take care of people who need your services but can not afford to pay?

A: Yes. Our policy is the same as it has been for many years. If a person needs our services and has been certified by the School Nurse, the Welfare Department, the Lion's Club Sight Conservation Committee, or some other authorized agency and funds are not available from any Governmental Agency, we will provide our services at no charge. We will supply a frame at no charge and bill the school or Lion's Club (or other organization making the referral) for only the cost of the lenses.

Q: If I know someone, maybe a school child, who needs visual care, how do I help? What is the first step?

A: Contact the school nurse or a member of the local Lion's Club in your area. They then certify that the person is needy and refer them to us.

Q: Since the weather has had such a devastating effect on crops this year, and with the local economy in a slump, have you given any thought as to how you might help others needing your services?

A: Yes, we have. We realize that this has been an unusually bad year for our crops and that people we serve continue to need good visual care. So we have decided upon the following course of action to help our patients. From October 1, 1979 through December 31, 1979, the following policies will be in effect:

1. We will make available to our patients new, but discontinued, frames at a savings of 50%. We have many current styles to choose from.
2. On second pairs of eyeglasses only, if the frame selected sells for \$20.00 or less, we will give our patients the second frame at no charge (free).
3. If the frame selected for a second pair sells for more than \$20.00, we will make the second frame available at a savings of 50%. Many of our patients need a second pair as a "spare" or in prescription sunglasses.
4. We will make every effort to cut costs where we can without curtailing the high quality of professional visual care we continue to provide for our patients.

NOTE: If you have had your eyes examined anytime during the past year (at our office or elsewhere) and would like to have a "spare" pair of glasses or prescription sunglasses, you can take advantage of these savings.

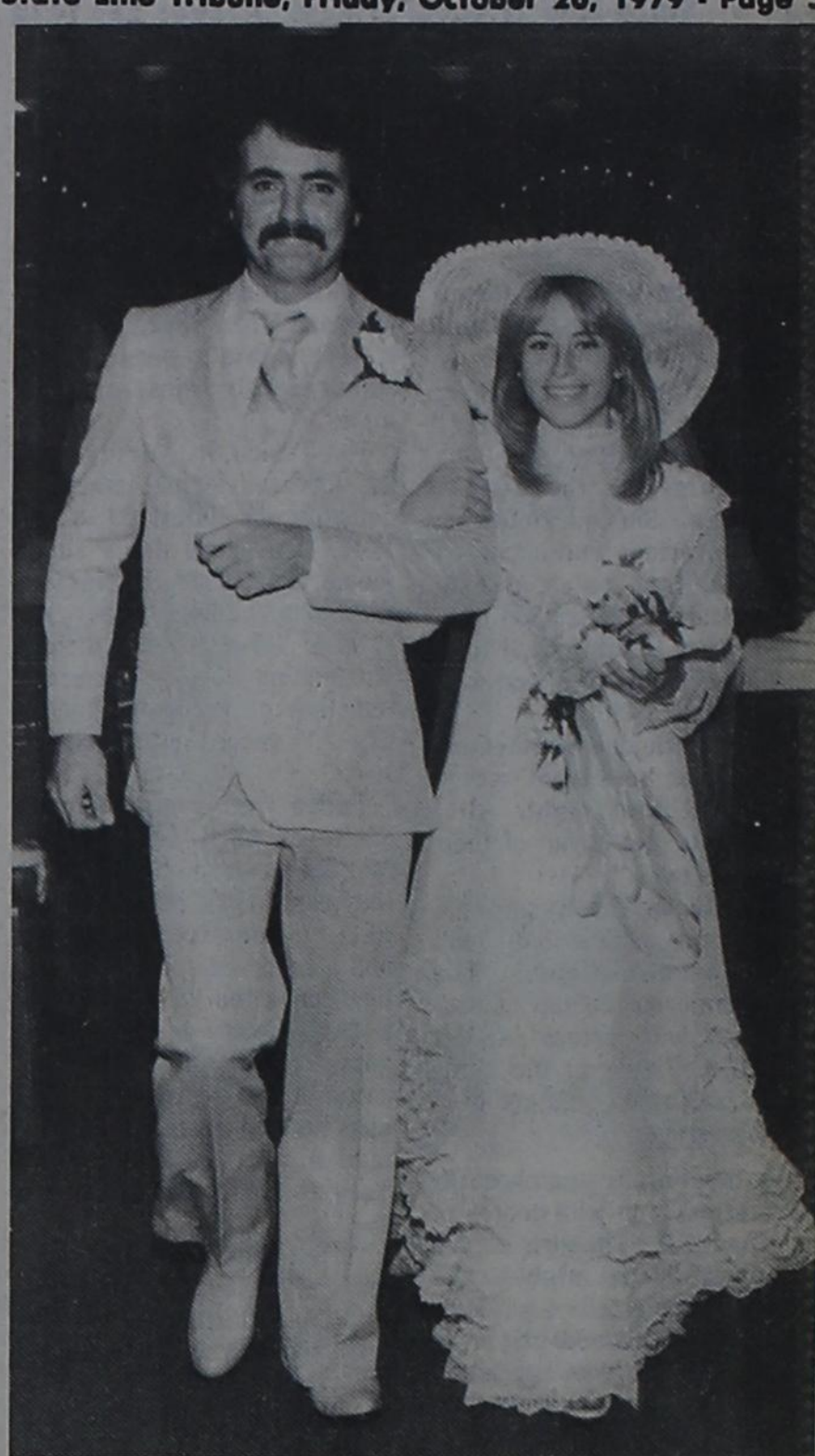

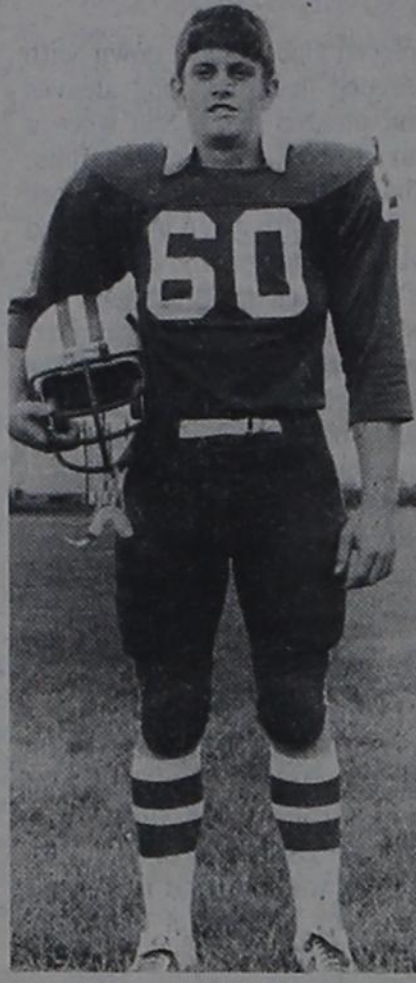
Rattlers hit very well and could beat a lot of Class A New Mexico teams, but they just couldn't keep the Wolverines down.

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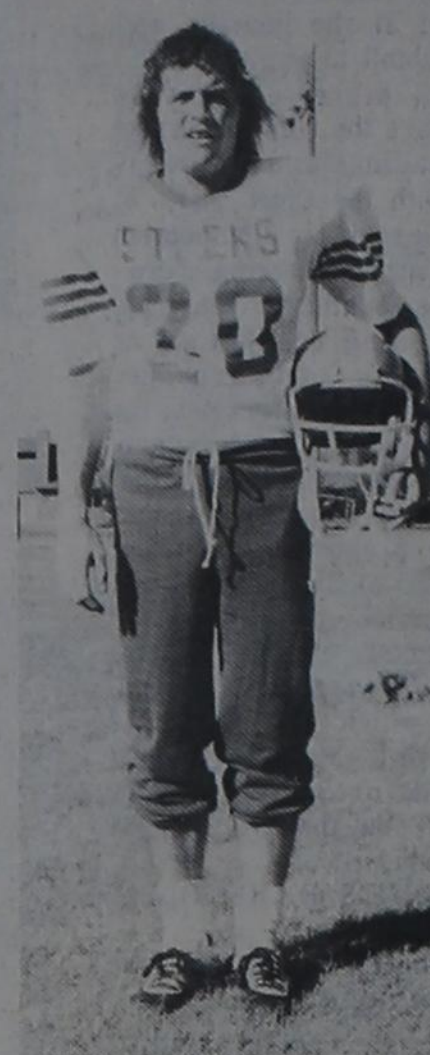

Farwell Steers finally showed up for the ball game after a dismal first half of play and scored touchdowns in each of the final two periods to give them a 14-8 victory over the Hart Longhorns in their first District 3-A action of the 1979 season as well as their first win of the year.

The Longhorns took over on their own 20 and on the first play they picked up a first down, but the Steer defense finally came to life and Hart kicked to the Farwell 25. The Steers ran two plays for seven yards, then a pitchout lost a couple of yards and Farwell had to punt it away again.

Hart's ground game moved for short pick ups until they were facing fourth and one foot and Newsom picked up the first at Farwell's 20-yard line as time ran out in the first period.

The 'Horns gained on two carries, but a penalty sent them back and on a fourth down pass attempt Byron Mayfield and Mac Langford broke up the play to give the Steers possession on their own 15.

Max Lonsdale picked up eight yards then on third down Waverly Coates ran for the first. On the next series Farwell's passing attack ran into trouble as an Owen aerial intended for Craig Kaltwasser went incomplete, Castleberry was dropped for a loss on a pitchout, and a third down pass to Castleberry was picked off by a Longhorn and the hosts were in business on their own 45.

Hart picked up two first downs, one on a face mask penalty against the Steers, and were moving in Steer territory when Castleberry intercepted. Farwell ran only three downs before punting and the 'Horns ran it back to the Steer 20

before being halted.

Hart gained a first inside the five and was knocking at the door when on first and goal the carrier fumbled and Farwell recovered.

Farwell couldn't move and Owen punted from the end zone out to the 29 where once again the Longhorns threatened; however, they also had a repeat performance of the fumble play and the Steers again recovered. On first down from his own 25, Owen took the ball and after a fake to Lonsdale ran all the way to the Hart 20 before being overtaken and dragged down.

But on third down and seven, Owen fumbled and Hart recovered on their own 26 with only a minute and three seconds remaining in the first half. Hart managed only two plays before the clock ran out to leave the teams in a scoreless tie.

Hart received the second half kick, taking it out to the 33. After some good defensive moves by Steers Boyd White and Richard Carpenter and a 15-yard holding call against the Longhorns, the Hart punter kicked from his own 10.

Castleberry took the punt for a pick up to the 46 yard line, but the Steers lost yardage on this possession and gave Hart possession on the Farwell 45. The Steer defense rallied to hold for three downs forcing Hart to punt into the Farwell end zone.

Owen, Lonsdale and Coates all toted the ball, Coates picking up 15 for the first down yardage. On the next series Coates and Owen shared carrying duties and aided by a 15-yard penalty against Hart, the Steers had another first down and were on the move. A pitchout to Castleberry was good for 14 yards and on first and goal Owen took it in nine

yards for the Steers first TD with one minute and 43 seconds left in the third quarter. Langford kicked the PAT even after a five-yard setback on a penalty for the 7-0 lead.

Hart took the kick and returned to their own 49, but the Steers held and after a fourth down try for one and a half yards, Farwell took over on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Coach Adrian said he would like to see everyone come out and support the team this week. Game time is 7:30 p.m. CDT tonight (Friday).

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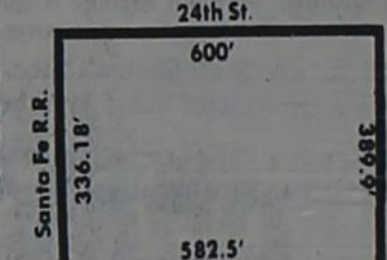

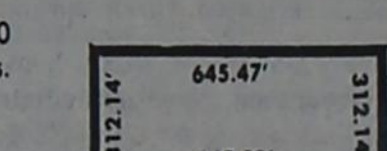

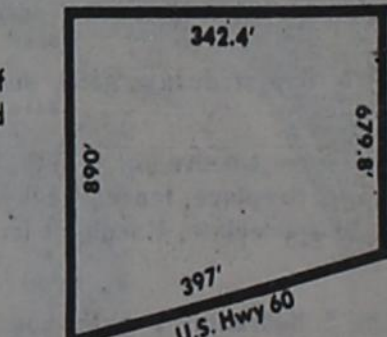

**THE ACCOMPLISHMENTS  
OF CALVARY**

Three times in Romans 5 we read  
that Christ died for us. Verse 6 tells  
us that He died for us in our weak-  
ness. Verse 8 that He died for us in  
our sin, and Verse 10 that He died for  
us in our rebellion.

First, Verse 6 says: "For when we  
were yet WITHOUT STRENGTH, in  
due time Christ died for the ungodly."  
Men sometimes try to make them-  
selves acceptable to God by human  
effort, but they never succeed. We  
can't walk or run to heaven, we can't  
even fly there, and we certainly can't  
climb there - not even by doing good  
works, for good works is what we  
ought to do, and we should not expect  
them to counter-balance our sinful  
thoughts and deeds. Anyway, Heaven  
is God's and He says we cannot gain it  
by works. "For by grace are ye saved,  
through faith, and that not of your-  
selves; it is the gift of God; not of  
works, lest any man should boast"  
(Eph. 2:8,9).

Next, Rom. 5:8 says: "God com-  
mendeth His love toward us, in that  
while we were yet SINNERS, Christ  
died for us."

Many people feel shut out of heav-  
en, not merely because of a sense of  
helplessness, but because of a sense of  
sinfulness and condemnation. To such  
God proclaims the glad news that  
"Christ died for sinners," and "came  
into the world to save sinners" (1 Tim.  
1:15). At Calvary He paid the just pen-  
alty for sin - for the sins of all man-  
kind - so that we, by faith, might be  
"justified freely by God's grace,  
through the redemption that is in Christ  
Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).

But Rom. 5:10 goes even farther,  
offering hope and grace to those who  
have resisted God's grace and rejected  
His Son, for here the greatest Christ-  
rejecter of all time, now gloriously  
saved and changed, declares:  
"When we were ENEMIES, we were  
reconciled to God by the death of His  
Son" (Rom. 5:10).

And so the helpless, the sinful, yes,  
and the rebellious, can find acceptance  
with God if only they will turn from  
their sin and failure to Him. "Believe  
on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou  
shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).
