B. L. DeBerry, Assistant State Highway Engineer, Texas Highway Department, will address the annual Banquet introducing the new officers of the Bogata Community Chamber of Commerce on Monday evening, October 13, at Rivercrest High School Cafeteria.

DeBerry was born in Bogata and attended public schools there. He graduated from the University of Texas in 1937 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering. During World War II, DeBerry served with both the U. S. Corps of Engineers and with the U. S. Navy. Other than the period of his military service, DeBerry has been with the Texas Highway Department continuously since his graduation from the University.

His assignments have included tenures at Paris, Clarksville, Greenville, Emory, San Antonio and Lufkin. From 1960 through 1967, as the District Engineer in Dallas, he directed one of the five largest highway construction programs in the history of the Highway Department. Since January 1, 1968, Mr. DeBerry has served as first assistant to State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall in the administration of the 68-thousand-mile State-maintained Texas highway system.

A member of the American Society of Civil Engineers and of the Christian Church, Mr. DeBerry and his wife, Pauline, have a daughter, Mrs. Thomas H. Moore of Lufkin. Austin. — Higher automobile insurance rates were adopted by the State Board of Insurance, but they are not as high as had been originally predicted.

Statewide, the increase in rates on Nov. 7 will be 9.9 per cent. Insurance Board's staff earlier had recommended an 11.4 per cent increase.

This smaller increase was accomplished by accepting the recommendation of Gov. Preston Smith's study committee that the percentage allowed insurance companies for acquisition costs be cut from 25 to 22.5 per cent of the premium.

Another recommendation of the study committee headed by former Gov. Price Daniel was that the Board should include investment income of insurance companies in setting the rates.

Board Chairman Ned Price said the Board would give careful consideration to inclusion of investment income from unearned premium and loss reserves as "profit and contingencies." He added that "we may have further comment on this at a later date."

However, Price also warned that it may not have as much effect on the price of insurance as had been thought. He said "The Board has consistently recognized and considered its regulatory acts that the companies have other income than that from underwriting."

Price also said that the Board will begin, "as time and circumstances permit," a detailed study of automobiles rate-making formulae. He said the study of the present formula used in setting rates would be made during the coming year. The formula, he said, "will be reviewed with the objective of determining if rates can be made more precisely by another formulae."

**BILLS** — Governor Smith has sent Sen. Mike McKool's voter registration bill to the Secretary of State without his signature, hereby allowing it to become law. It requires that all citizens registering to vote in person must fill out a written application containing the same information as the registration certificate in order to get a certificate.

Governor vetoed a bill that would have allowed legislators to have office space in their home county courthouses. He said office rental could be provided from legislators' expense allowance.

He also vetoed bills providing for insurance protection (thru private, non-profit corporations) on bank deposits above \$15,000.

Smith said he is in accord with idea of giving full protection for bank deposits but feels that the matter should have careful study before implementing legislation becomes law.

**COURTS SPEAK** — Supreme Court handed down a roomful of cases after its summer recess. It declined rehearings in three major cases decided last July, reaffirming that:

• Sundaco Inc. of Tarrant and other counties will not get an advisory court opinion on whether its arrangement for evading Sunday closing law is legal.

• Until the Sarita Kenedy East will contest is concluded Alice National Bank will remain as executor of the \$300 million estate.

Supreme Court refused to order Limestone County court to dismiss bank robbery charges against a man there.

**FIRST CANDIDATE EMERGES** — Hawthorne Phillips, former district judge at Brownsville and now executive assistant to Attorney General Crawford Martin, has announced his candidacy for the Texas Supreme Court.

He says he will run for the seat being vacated by Associate Justice Robert W. Hamilton of El Paso, who recently announced that he will not run again, after 11 years on the bench.

**CRIME** — Judge Joe Frazier Brown of San Antonio, executive director of the Governor's Criminal Justice Council, has urged industry to take a technological hand in fighting "the ever-rising threat of crime."

He said, "In spite of the fact that our society has developed systems that take us to the moon, our approach to the Crime Control Act was still too much the old hit-'em-in-the-head night-justice philosophy, or the ignore-the-problem-and-it-will-go-away philosophy. This has got to change."

**TO AWAKEN SMALL TOWNS** — Governor Smith announced a "Texas Communities Tomorrow" program to revitalize the small towns in Texas.

Aim is to provide a central source through which small towns can get information on governmental aid available to them and to help find technical and financial know-how for improvement programs.

Most "hometowns" are "becoming crowded cities" or "are decaying into nothingness," complained the governor.

**SHORT SNORTS** Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. says there were 13,001 profit corporations chartered in Texas for fiscal 1969, an increase of 3,000 over 1968.

John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, announced that Texas peanut growers have approved a commodity check-off referendum (with an 84.2 per cent majority).

Parks and Wildlife Commission encountered lots of static over decisions to discontinue the late-late experimental deer hunting season in Frio County.

Texas Adjutant General Ross Ayers has called attention to a previously-unpublished poll purporting to show the National Guard in the Southwest is not as high in public esteem as units in other states and asks for increased public service activities in guard unit home cities and close review of officer efficiency and promotions by selection and retention boards.

New \$360 million tax bill went into effect October 1, when sales tax rate went up from 3 per cent to 3.25 per cent and levy was extended to alcoholic beverages.

The Rivercrest Rebels won their second game Friday night by downing New Boston, 37-13 in New Boston.

New Boston's Jerry Williams scored from four yards out. Putting on a one man show for New Boston, Williams also scored the extra point.

Levene Norman scored for Rivercrest on a 30 yard run. The kick for extra point was blocked. Joe Simpson scored for the Rebels on an eight yard run. A pass to Simpson for extra points was incomplete.

Rivercrest's next touchdown, which came 30 seconds later, was set up on a recovered fumble. Halfback George Marshall barreled over from from the seven yard line. The try for the extra point was no good and the Rebels led, 18-7.

New Boston fumbled on their own 32 and Rivercrest recovered. Simpson took the ball over from the one yard line. Again the extra point try failed and the Rebels were ahead, 24-7.

New Boston got the ball on their own 23 yard line after Rivercrest failed to make a first down on a fourth and three play.

A 41 yard pass from Williams to McClurg, and a seven yard pass to Rowe, set up the touchdown which was scored from the one yard line by Williams. Howe's attempt at extra point was wide.

Rivercrest's next score came on an 82 yard drive. Norman ended the drive with a 40 yard run into the end zone. The kick for extra point was good.

The Rebels recovered another fumble on the 30 yard line, and on the next play, Marshall sprinted into the end zone. Kick for PAT was no good, and the game ended with Rivercrest winning it, 37-13.

Rivercrest led in first downs 16-7. The Rebels made 447 yards rushing and 16 passing to New Boston's 118 rushing and 45 by passing.

## A Tribute to Dad

On Sunday, Sept. 7, at 2:15 a. m., my father, Felix Jones, passed from this life. He was 76 years old and is survived by our mother, 10 children, 28 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. I could not resist the desire to write something this week about him because in my estimation he was an exceptional man.

He was a man of few words but of great influence in every sphere of activity in which he was involved. An editorial in the leading newspaper in his home county testified of the high esteem in which he was held. It equated his influence locally with that of Senator Dirksen, nationally, who died the same day. He was respected for his sound business sense, his civic mindedness, and his high integrity.

But to me and to those who know him best, his highest glory is the influence he had upon his family and the church where he served faithfully as an elder for some 43 years.

Physically, he was a little man, but spiritually, he was big and strong. If there was ever a time when he wavered in faith, we never knew it. In his years as an elder there was never a time when the church was seriously threatened with disharmony. False teachers never had a chance to do their devious work in the congregation led by the eldership of which he was a part. He will be remembered as a man whose life was above reproach, who ruled his house well, having had his children in subjection with all gravity, who loved the church more than anything in the world and who instinctively won the respect of all who met him. He was the most dynamic song leader I have ever seen. He used to admonish the congregation to sing with the spirit and the understanding and then proceeded to show them what he meant. No one will ever sing with more fervor, spirit, and joy than he did. Because of his character and wisdom he was asked in the 30's to serve on the Board of Directors of Boles Home at Quinlan, Texas. For several years he served in that capacity.

I shall remember him most, however, for what he meant to us, his children, as a father. He and mother prepared us well for adult life. They succeeded in bringing up all of their 10 children as faithful Christians, an exceptional accomplishment for this day. He was able to do this, because first and foremost he had about the greatest Christian woman for a wife any man could have. Other factors involved were these: He always put God first. There was never any doubt in the minds of his children that the church was the most important thing in life. He was a man who gave his all for God and his family. He was a hard, persistent worker in everything he did. Also, there was an amazing consistency between what he believed and how he lived. You never had to wonder what was right and wrong and what he expected. You knew that he expected the very best you could give, because that was the way he lived. He was a strict disciplinarian; but at the same time, although love was not a word he frequently used, there was never any doubt that it was there. You saw it in his deeds.

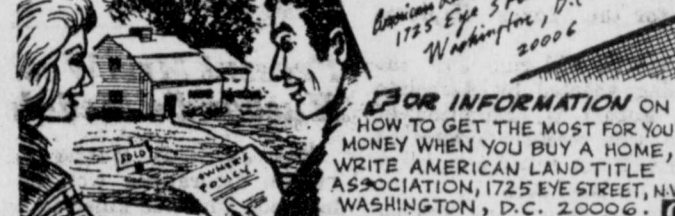
