L. A. WILSON, secretary of the
Chamber of Commerce at
Slaton, was elected to head the

Following a morning program
with addresses by D. A. Bandeen,

organization manager of the United
States Chamber of Commerce, as
principal speaker, the afternoon
session was largely taken up with
round-table discussions. A discussion
on chamber of commerce work
was led by Mr. Brown, while Mr.
Evans conducted a discussion on

Increase Shown In
School Enrollment

Five Hundred More Students
In Public Schools
Than At Same Time Last
Year; Will Fill Building

Total enrollment of the Lubbock
public schools at 25,000 students more
than at the corresponding period last
year, according to an announcement
yesterday by Supt. M. H. Duncan.

The figure to date stands at 3,281
students with 395 of these having
been enrolled since the Christmas
holidays.

"We are going to have the new
school building filled before it is
completed," said Mr. Duncan. "At
this time there are 45 rooms in the
school system that are running at
half-day sessions."

Announcement has been made by
officials of the school board that
work will be begun on the new \$650,000
structure when architects have
completed drawings and plans.

Solons May Probe
Pro Enforcement

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28. (AP)—
Congressional investigation of prohibition
enforcement was discussed as a possibility
at the end of one of the worst free-for-alls in the wet and
dry controversy.

Attorney General Mitchell and
chairman Wickersham of the law
enforcement commission engaged
with proposals and opponents of
the Volstead act in congress—with
all holding their own at nightfall.

The attorney general denied a
statement by Senator Borah of Idaho,
critic of enforcement conditions,
that the justice department had investigated
the record of prohibition
administrator Herbert of the Montana-Idaho district. He also denied
that justice agents had been spying
on Borah's office.

Three women and a child were killed
here early tonight when their automobile
was struck by a Southern
freight train at a crossing.

Crowds Honor
Obscure Man

NEW YORK, Jan. 28. (AP)—
Ten thousand persons marched
three miles over wet, slippery
pavements today to honor the
memory of an obscure dead
man.

Steve Katovits' only claim to
fame was that he was shot
down in a clash between police
and striking market workers
in the Bronx, but today his
body, in a red draped casket,
and flanked by an escort
of motorcycle police, led a
procession 20 blocks long.

The people in that cortege
were communists and communist
sympathizers, poor
people, some of them a bit
ragged, who idealized Katovits
as a martyr to their cause.

Naval Meet Nears
Real Business Of
Disarmament Aim

Stimson To Call American
Experts And Advisors In
Action; Newspapers
To Be Admitted

LONDON, Jan. 28. (AP)—The
five-power naval conference tonight
approached the real business of
naval disarmament.

After the Thursday plenary session
at St. James' Palace, Secretary
of State Stimson hopes to be able
to call into action against the
definite problems of the conference
the American delegation's shock troops
of experts and advisors, who have
been making time since sessions
began last Tuesday.

Seventy-eight newsmen of
all nations, including 12 Americans,
will file into Queen Anne's drawing
room for the meeting, where
Franco-Italian differences will be
aired in the open. General summaries
and interpretations of the work
the conference has done will be
furnished as an indication of
progress to readers all over the world.

Three items will feature the
program, brought forward by France,
Great Britain and Italy.

By the adoption of the alphabetical
order of presentation, which
gives precedence to the country
proposing a question, according to
the first letter of its name, France
will lead the list and will have an
opportunity of formally laying before
the conference her plan for
limiting fleets by the global, or total
tonnage system.

NEGRO GETS DEATH

Black Must Die For White
Girl Assault

BOLIVAR, Tenn., Jan. 28. (AP)—
Less than nine minutes was required
today for a circuit court jury
here to find Carey Gunn, 21, negro,
guilty of assaulting a white girl.
The judge immediately sentenced
him to death in the electric chair.
March 18. The case went to trial
at 10 a. m. Testimony was begun
at 3 p. m., and a verdict reached
at 5:20 p. m.

National guardsmen who protected
the negro during the trial left
with the prisoner for Memphis soon
after the sentence was pronounced.

Chicago Society Woman on Stand to

film distributor. Her
testimony was given in her
\$200,000 damage suit against Mrs.
C. F. Taylor for alienation of her
husband's affections.

Letters in her husband's mail
addressed to "C. F. Taylor," Mrs.
Hutchinson said, led her to his
office building to inquire for
"Mr. Taylor." The quest took her

Horn Optimistic
Of Securing Aid
From Legislature

Shortage Of Funds In Next
Session, Pictured Unless
Current Expenses Paid;
Meet At Corsicana

Enrollment Given

Gain Of 275 Revealed Over
Same Period Last Year;
Directors Told Money Is
Needed To Meet Expenses

(By Associated Press)
CORPUS CHRISTI, Jan. 28.—Faced
by a shortage of funds in the 1930-
31 session unless current expenses
are provided for, directors of Texas
Technological college of Lubbock,
meeting here today, decided to present
their plea to Governor Moody
and the legislature during the special
session.

Dr. P. W. Horn, president, expressed
confidence that the governor
and legislature will come to the aid
of the institution so it will not be
handicapped in its work.

Additional funds are needed, according
to board members, to care
for actual running expenses including
faculty, class room facilities and
other essentials. Enrollment at the
beginning of the second semester
was reported to be 2,775, a gain of
275 over the same period last year.

The college lost part of the dairy
barn from fire last Tuesday and
while some insurance was carried,
the sum will not be sufficient to replace
the structure, according to T.
W. Gaston, business manager of the
school.

Resolution of sympathy and respect
were passed by the board on
the death of Dr. C. G. Connelley of
McKinney, a member. Only two

Dean A. H. Leidigh, of the school
of agriculture at Texas Tech, is expected

Dan Moody's recently appointed
committee to work out details and
organization plans for the Texas
branch of the \$30,000,000 federal
cotton cooperative.

Texas A. & M. college, chairman
of the committee, called the meeting
and Dean Leidigh left Lubbock
last Thursday night. Other members

Filipino Youths Beaten
As Racial Row Bobs Up

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28. —
Anti-Filipino racial sentiment
bubbled up today in San
Francisco with the beating of
three Filipino youths—Amelio
Bautista, Santos Bautista and
Leon Deas—before a police riot
squad rescued them.

Two other Filipinos, Jose
Francisco and Responso Peralta,
were attacked last night
while walking downtown with
two white girls, who disappeared
in the melee. Francisco told
police he recently married one
of the girls at Tijuana.

The three Filipinos beaten
today said they were in work in
front of an apartment house
when the two taxi cabs drove up.

Officials Of Air Line Flayed For
Removing Wreckage From Scene
Of Air Crash; Investigation Made

(By Associated Press)
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 28.—
While aviation officials today
sought the cause of the crash of a
Central Air Lines passenger plane
which cost five lives here late yesterday,
County Coroner Ben F. Coffey
declared that evidence, which
might have supplied the answer,
had been wiped out in hasty dismantling
and moving of the wreckage.

Officials of the air line denied
that there had been any attempt
to destroy evidence and defended
the action of employees in having
the wreckage pulled apart and taken
to a hangar shortly after the
removal of the burned and crushed
bodies of the victims.

Report Promised
E. A. Watkins, president of the
Central Air Lines, who arrived from
Wichita, Kan., to take charge of
the company's investigation, said
"it is going to be difficult to determine
the cause of the crash," but
promised a full report "as soon
as the facts can be determined."

W. H. Ellis, an aviation mechanic
and friend of the dead pilot, said,
however, that Landemann had complained
recently that he was tired
and had been flying too much.

"Everything seems to go all right
when my ship isn't heavily loaded
and the air is smooth, but when
I've got a load, it's hell," he quoted
Landemann as saying.

Richard H. Lees, Jr., supervising

attempt to cover up anything of a

Venire Exhausted By
Attorneys In Day
Of Questioning

CROSBYTON, Jan. 28.—Following
an afternoon of grueling
questioning by attorneys in which
the entire list of veniremen was
exhausted, two more jurors were
qualified to serve in the trial of Joe
Hawkins, 35, alleged slayer of his
father-in-law, S. M. Walker, 78, in
the 72nd district court here before
Judge Homer L. Pharr. With acceptance
of these only two more are required.

Judge Pharr has ordered thirty
new veniremen to appear in court
tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at
which time efforts will be made to
secure the remaining two.

C. E. Cloud and C. T. Starrett
were the ninth and tenth jurors
respectively. Others qualified included
J. G. Ferguson, R. C. Rathel, Ollie
Howard, J. P. Williams, A. A. Potter,
J. P. Walker, T. N. Richey and
H. B. Handley.

Judge Pharr stated tonight that
he hoped to complete the jury Wednesday
morning so that taking of
testimony might be started.

Interrogation by District Attorney
Durwood Bradley indicates that he
will demand the death penalty, while
defense counsel's questioning suggests
that a plea of self defense will be
entered.

Throughout jury selection proceedings
the court room has been crowded
with curious spectators. Hawkins,
from the start, calm and cheerful,
this morning went as he greeted
his aged father. His mood, however,
shortly was changed to one of
apparent indifference.

Hawkins has been held in the
Crosby county jail without bond
since October 28, when the shooting
occurred at Walker's farm, four
miles northeast of Ralls, following
an argument which is said to have
started over a dog fight.

Moody Speaks On
Prison Location

Legislature Up-To Eyes In
Penitentiary Reorganization
Consideration As
Five Measures Offered

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—The legislature
was up to its eyes in penitentiary
reorganization legislation today,
with the house following the lead
of the senate, resolving itself into
a committee of the whole to consider
the five measures on the subject
before it.

The senate has three bills under
consideration, covering six separate
and distinct plans proposed in
the eight measures before the two
houses.

Governor Moody, one of 40 persons
including former Governor James
E. Ferguson, invited by the senate
to discuss penitentiary centralization
and reform, created talk of a possible
"compromise" between factions, when
he told the upper house that while
he wanted the central plant in "central
Texas," he might give the majority
prison centralization recommendation
that it be within 20 miles of
Austin. He also hinted at other
concessions.

He said it would be all right with
him to go as far as 100 miles from
Austin, just so it was kept within
the bounds of that section known
as central Texas.

RESCUE ROPE BREAKS

BORDEAUX, France, Jan. 28. (AP)—
The single rope which meant rescue
to 17 members of the crew of the
wrecked British freighter Knabworth
snapped tonight after three hours
others had been safely brought ashore.

Helplessly, the rescue workers on
shore watched the sailors clinging
to the rigging while the sea broke
over them. It was feared that it was
impossible they could survive until
morning.

Colvin Brown Praises Progress Made
By Chambers of Commerce in Texas

THE PROGRESS of the state
of Texas in the chamber
of commerce field, as compared
with that of other states of this
nation, is outstanding," declared
Colvin B. Brown, organization
manager of the United States
Chamber of Commerce, who yesterday
was a visitor in Lubbock as one
of the principal speakers before the annual
gathering of the South Plains Executives' association.

Mr. Brown, recognized the world
over as the greatest authority on
chamber of commerce work, during
the 15 years he has held his present
position, has averaged in travel 50,000
miles a year and visits to 1,000 chambers
of commerce.

Purpose Is Safeguard.
"The purpose of a chamber
of commerce is to safeguard and
advance the interests of a community,"
said Mr. Brown. "Progress, beauty,
prosperity are some of its objectives."
"Properly organized, a chamber
of commerce should provide the
machinery whereby the many
conflicting and half-formulated
views and plans of well-meaning
individuals can be studied, an
agreement reached concerning the
relative importance of suggested
activities and a program formulated
therein that will meet with the
support of the members. To this

Wife Of Defendant Testifies About
Slow Disintegration In Moral Fibre
Of Husband Before Typist's Murder

Former Appeals Judge Weeps As Mate Tells Story Of
His Downfall; Two Alienists Are Expected To
Testify; Claim Defeat Started Drinking

(By Associated Press)
COURT ROOM, AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—Through
the testimony of John W. Brady's wife and three other witnesses,
the lawyers defending him were against a murder charge sought today to show that within
this former jurist there had been a slow disintegration of moral fibre
and the death of a great intellect before Miss Lehlia Highsmith, 28,
whom he is accused of slaying, was stabbed to death on the night of
last November 9.

They drew out this testimony to lay a predicate for an insanity
plea, and revealed that Doctors Joe and Goodall Wooten, both alienists,
the latter the Brady's family physician, would testify for their cause.

Defendant Weeps.
Brady wept when his wife broke
down and cried as she described
him as a man once remarkably
brilliant, who through greatly
excessive drinking, had become
enfeebled physically and mentally,
had turned away a lucrative practice
and had changed every thing from
his yesterday "when we were
very happy."

The others, who went on the stand
for the ex-civil appeals court judge
were Rev. Valentine Lee, an Episcopal
minister of Dallas, who formerly
lived next door to the Bradys
here; Mrs. D. T. White, of El Paso,
Brady's sister, and Mrs. Sam Ford,
his ward until the time of her
marriage.

Defeat Stars Drinking.
Mrs. Brady said they had been
married 30 years and that years ago
he was not addicted to liquor and
was "very bright." She said his defeat
to a judgeship, which she did not
identify, 10 years ago, first
started him drinking immoderately
and that in the last two or three
years he had been using liquor "almost
continuously."

"Before he began immoderate
drinking," she said, "he was a man
of high ideals but later his moral
principles became very lax. He did
not care what anybody thought."

She testified she knew her husband
and Miss Highsmith were having an affair.
One night, she said, she went to
Miss Highsmith's room and Brady
was there. He told her, in substance,
"This is ours. Then she testified,
they both said they wanted to
"break off."

"She (Miss Highsmith) pleaded
for mercy," the wife went on.
"Both of them," the gray-haired
woman went on, "begged me to help
them. They said they wanted to be
kind to me. I put my arms around
her and told her I wouldn't push
her in the gutter."

Then, she testified, Brady and the
girl were not together again for
some time, except at the Brady
home, where the girl took his dictation.

Believes Husband Insane.
She said she believed him insane.
On the night of the killing, she
said, Brady came home "very drunk
and stumbled up stairs," to fall
across the bed. About 10:30 o'clock,
he went out again, but when he left
there were no cuts or bruises on
him. The defense will attempt to
show that sometime during or after
the stabbing of Miss Highsmith,
Brady sustained such injuries.

District Attorney Henry Brooks
did not cross examine Mrs. Brady.

TEN JURORS NAMED
Shook On Trial At Wichita
Falls For Murder

WICHITA FALLS, Jan. 28. (AP)—
After 10 jurors were selected to try
Tom Shook, former Electra police
chief, on a murder charge, a halt
was forced in his trial here today
by exhaustion of a special venire.
A recess was ordered until tomorrow
when an effort will be made
to complete the jury from 60 members
of the venire men who failed to
report at the beginning of the trial.

During questioning of takersmen,
89 prospective jurors have taken
the stand, 58 of whom were disqualified
because of fixed opinions.
The defense has taken 13 of its 15
peremptory challenges and the state
eight.

Shook was charged with the fatal
stabbing of O. E. Daugherty in
Electra in August, 1928. He was expected
to plead self defense.

Matador Quintel Sweeps Series With Wildcats, My Dozen Club Plays Forty-Two

Abilene Christians Force Crimson Five To Step Fast In Hanging Up Ninth Straight Triumph Of Season

Purple Cagers Come Back Strong In Final Game Of Series; Clarence Hodges High Scorer With 14 Points; Pippen Leads Losers

Abilene Christian College Wildcats threw a scare into the ranks of the undefeated Texas Tech basketball team at the college gymnasium last night but succumbed to a last half rally that enabled the Matadors to sweep the two-game series, 35 to 25, and register their ninth successive triumph of the season.

Displaying a complete reversal of form in comparison with their opening night's performance, the invaders turned on the Matadors with a vengeance and forced the home-coming team to throw their machine into high gear in order to keep their season record clear.

Cats Get Tough.

The scrappy T. I. A. A. crew battled the Matadors on even terms throughout most of the opening period, taking the lead after Tech had gotten off to a flying start. So tight was the cats' defense in the first stanza that seven field goals and one free throw was the sum total of the Matadors' scoring during the period. Three times in the first half the count was tied, and only through a spurt toward the close of the session were the locals able to regain the lead. The score at the half gave the Matadors a three-point lead, 15 to 12.

Clarence Hodges, speedy Tech forward, found his stride in the closing period and led the Matadors on a spurt that left the Wildcats far behind, but the Purple-clad basketballers staged a rally in the closing minutes of play that reduced this lead considerably.

Wortham Shines.

Frank Wortham, hard-working Wildcat guard, turned in a whale of a defense game for the losers, as did Lyndell Hill, former Lubbock high athlete, who fills the other guard position for A. C. C. This pair stayed on the heels of the Tech scoring acts throughout the hard-fought skirmish.

Chep Cheevers and Brit Pippen led the scoring assault for the visitors, and played strong defensive games. Hodges' 14 points was enough to carry off scoring honors for the night. Pippen, of A. C. C. Fisher and Tadlock of Tech, with six points each, were tied for second honors.

Tonight the Sul Ross Lobos, another T. I. A. A. basketball outfit, will open a two-game series at the Tech gymnasium. The Matadors will be seeking their tenth straight victory. Starting time for the game is set for 8 o'clock.

It was found that Kattman did not enroll at the El Paso school, but worked out with the Miners on several occasions and played about five minutes with them against an independent team. Dr. D. A. Penick, conference president, ruled that Kattman's play, under the circumstances, did not affect his standing.

Kattman was a regular halfback on the 1929 Pony eleven and is expected to be a mainstay of the Methodist backfield next season. He has two more years of competition after this.

Southland Girls Have Strong Team

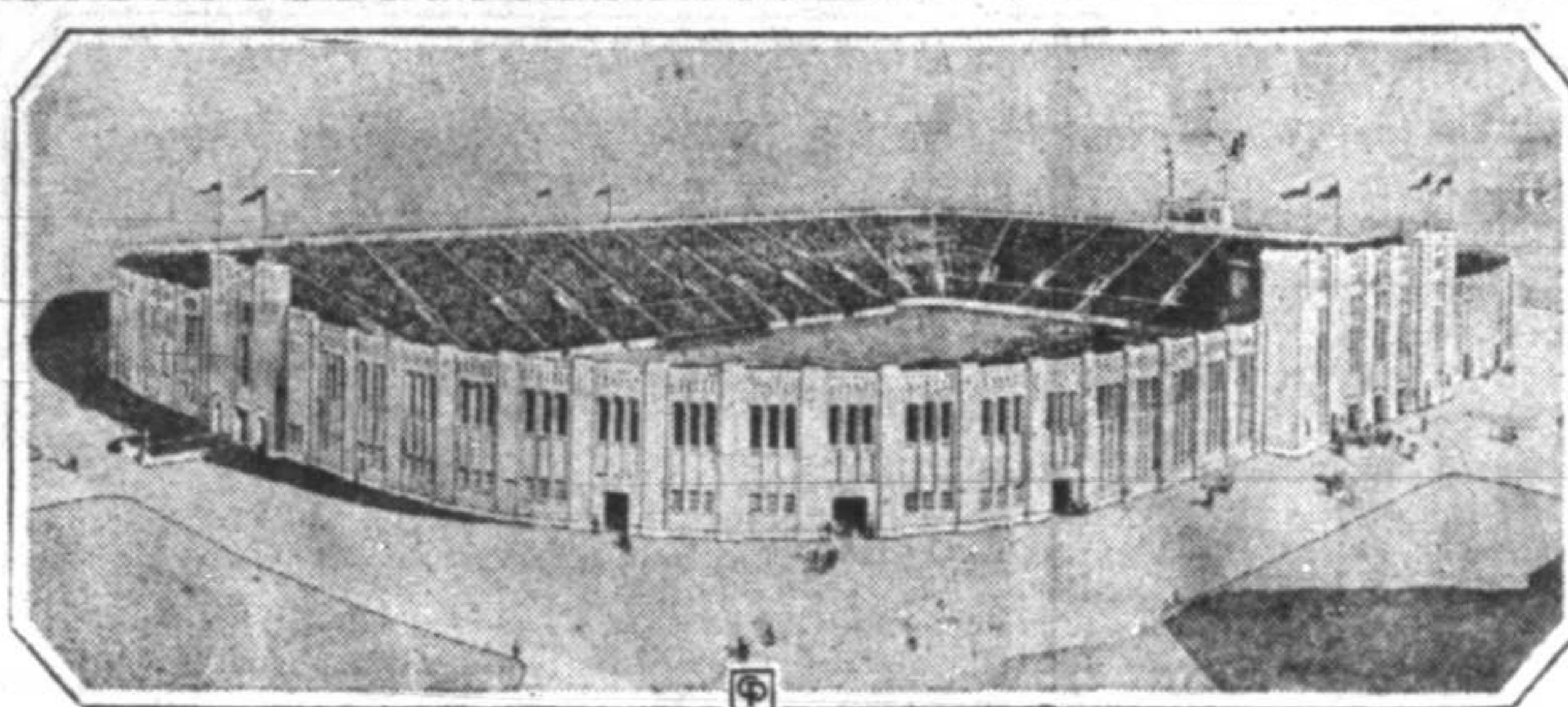

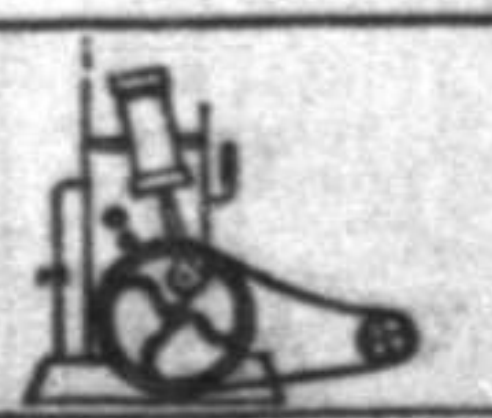

WHAT TEXAS MAKES, MAKES TEXAS!

THE SAN ANGELO Morning Times is perturbed, and correctly so, over the fact that more tourists are "going through" Texas than are "stopping in" Texas. The situation is one to which we should all pay some mind.

The Lone Star state, as a mecca for tourists and home-seekers, has never been advertised as it should be. There have been isolated cases of advertising, such as "Dallas, Incorporated," "Panhandle Plains, Incorporated," and Lubbock's own "South Plains, Incorporated." But as far as state-wide effort to attract visitors, investors and citizens from the less desirable portion of the country—there has been nothing of importance done.

Texas is, of course, a large state. On a given day it will experience, likely, several different kinds of climate, several different spans of temperature, and, mayhap, both rain and snow as well as sunshine. For this reason sectional lines have been drawn, theoretical walls have been erected between divisions of this great state and, as a result, we have several horses pulling Texas' wagon and each trying to pull it in a different direction.

What Texas Makes Makes Texas! While there are some who do not agree, development in the Panhandle will react favorably to the Rio Grande Valley. Likewise, progress in East Texas will eventually be reflected in the Big Bend country. Texas, as a state, is a unit and the dividing barriers erected within its confines are products of the mind, more than anything else.

While West Texas and the South Plains are the principal sections of interest to The Morning Avalanche, this newspaper is broad enough to realize that without the balance of Texas those two areas would be decidedly less inviting than they are today. For that reason we are willing to admit—yes, even to praise—other parts of Texas and express the wish that a state-wide campaign of publicity and advertising present the claims of all Texas and for the benefit of all Texas.

What Texas Makes Makes Texas!

The AGE OF PICTURES The relentless and daring manner in which a reporter is supposed to follow out his assignment has been the subject of story, song, play and movie. The characterization is often as much of a surprise to the flesh and blood newspaper man as it is to the public. In fiction and on the stage his powers of deduction, his bravery and his eponymy are astonishing, whereas if the truth be known he is very often a prosaic enough individual bent on doing his duty and making a living, just like his neighbors.

Journalism in recent years has produced a parallel type, without a doubt, to the "Bosch" photographer. The demand for newspaper editors and readers for pictures has made him a most important agency of the Fourth Estate. He goes where the reporter does and very often where the latter does not, for the camera can often get a story that printed word cannot tell.

The policy of tabloid newspapers, under which pictures predominate over printed news has inspired the observation that the masses can no longer understand the written word and must be given their news in pictures. This is a good vaudeville humor but diverts attention from the real purpose of newspaper photographs.

The picture, not to supplant the printed story, it emphasizes the reporter's story and gives a more graphic presentation of the news. Wider use of pictures increases the scope of the newspaper besides enabling it to better serve its readers. Perfection of the radio photograph was one of the greatest boons to journalism.

INSIDIOUS

All good Americans will view with alarm the insidious battering which their cherished traditions and customs have received in the present decade. There has been, so to speak, a boring from within. Alien practices, if they are not being forced upon this country, are at least being offered as a temptation to those who are weak.

The European style of telephone, with mouth and earpiece in a single unit, which in the movies and on the stage shifts the scene from New York to the court's drawing room in a foreign capital, is coming into wide use here. Like the Japanese beetle, it is a foreign invasion against which immigration laws and the army and navy are powerless. Will the jingoes stand for this undermining of an old established American idea by an alien idea?

And when an American is deprived of his inalienable right to sleep in upper berth things have reached a pretty pass. The worst sort of suspicions are aroused. Compared with it, calling "liberty cabbage" sauerkraut during the World war was a manifestation of patriotism. But that is what two of the largest railroads in the country are doing when they substitute comparative sleepers for that other type of Pullman that is so peculiarly American. No patriot can regard with complacency any threat against the "upper."

A DREAM

Why, asks the Wall Street Journal in effect, "should we not merge some of the states for the sake of efficiency, economy and fairer representation in congress?" The Journal is both wise and sprightly. Now and then it pains its more sensitive readers by furiously chiding the Average Citizen for those weaknesses which are his peculiar and lasting charm. At the moment it is hard to tell whether it is gently kidding itself or kidding its public.

There are some thousands of reasons why none of the states, can or will or should be merged, like railroads or manufacturing plants. A few of the more important ones will do, the great majority of these days may lead, if they are not wisely directed, to division and not to unity. Outside one merger will be other groups. These groups may merge in time. In the end you may have but two rival groups covering the visible world, facing each other bulkily and lustily for absolute domination. That would be a most disquieting and ominous outcome of an excellent theory.

This theory, even when it promises nothing but good, cannot be applied to the states for the simple reason that it leans too closely toward the principle of action over which the Civil war was waged.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—All the way across the Atlantic on the liner George Washington, America's delegation bound for the London naval limitation conference never left a day pass without at least one wireless to the home folk not to be impatient—because there are lots of difficulties to be overcome, but the delegation positively is not coming back without a certain amount of bacon; more or less limitation; just how much of it is problematical but a modicum, anyway.

So DO NOT BE IMPATIENT! Now the delegates are in London—Secretaries Stimson and Adams, Senators Reed and Robinson, Dwight W. Morrow and all their satellites—and the messages are more reassuring than ever.

True, the difficulties are even worse than our negotiators expected them to be, but what of it? That delegation simply does not overcome difficulties. Only—DON'T BE IMPATIENT!

Now, as a matter of fact, who has noticed many signs of violent impatience on the American people's part concerning the outcome of the London naval conference?

I'll be darned if I have, here in Washington. It has not been mentioned in congress; at the Capitol building even the dull subject of prohibition is more talked about. The newspapers have printed a good many columns of armament limitation dispatches, but no one that I can discover has read any of them. I saw a movie of the delegates thrown on the screen at cinema theater the other night, but the audience never chirped; apparently failed to recognize the quintet—though quite a stir and hearty round of applause greeted a shot of the sea-going brewery on the George Washington.

I cannot escape the suspicion that the American public is less excited over the pending disarmament conference than the delegates imagine it is. At that, it is not an altogether uninteresting gathering, if one will take the trouble to study it. For instance, the round robin signed by 82 members of the British parliament, urging John Bull's representatives at the meeting to urge the scrapping of all warships above 10,000 tons, is worth a moment's consideration.

Inasmuch as present-day battleships are around 32,000 tons, such an agreement would mean quite a reduction.

Also, although the total membership in parliament is 615, a group of 82 is quite a sizeable block to make so radical a suggestion. They undoubtedly signed in good faith, too, for all 82 were Laborites, who are sincere pacifists. Just the same, the crafty British naval influence back of the idea is discernible.

The joker is that England, with a base handy every few hundred miles all over the world, can do very well with plenty of small ships and no big ones. If she can get others to agree to the same program, whereas Uncle Sam, with hardly any distant bases at all, has to have big vessels or they cannot carry fuel enough to travel far without putting into port to replenish—and they might be barred out of other ports than Uncle Sam's own in wartime.

Another thing that the American, British, French and Japanese delegates evidently cannot get through their noses is that Italy under Mussolini is an altogether larger caliber power than she was a few years ago.

They persist in thinking of her as next after France, and on the opposite hand, the Italians now consider themselves as big as anyone—the same people, but in a totally different frame of mind, which may be really makes them different. At any rate, they say they would build as big a navy as England's if they could afford it, adding that they positively will have one as big as France's, if it takes their last lire.

This is not in accord with any previous calculation and upsets everything. It likewise would be a great comfort to all hands if each country could satisfy itself how much aviation will effect future sea warfare. If planes actually can sink everything afloat, as enthusiastic airmen say they can, naturally there is no point in keeping up big surface fleets any longer, but most naval experts deny that they can—admitting that surface craft will be beaten without planes, but maintaining that planes will be helpless without surface craft.

No one truly knows—perhaps old-fashioned navy men are more has-beens—perhaps aviators are over-confident. Peace-time tests prove very little, it will take a war to settle the question.

Your Health

UNDULANT FEVER CHANGING INTO A MORE VIRULENT MALADY

In a survey of the increased incidence of undulant fever, the condition now quite definitely associated with contagious abortion in cattle, the British ministry of health has become convinced that the disease is actually increasing in extent and that this is largely due to the spread of the disease among the cattle.

Contagious abortion occurs in goats, cattle, sheep, swine, mules, horses, dogs, cats, rabbits, guinea-pigs, rats and mice, and cases have been found even in chickens and ducks. It is apparently the disease as it occurs in cattle, however, which is primarily related to undulant fever in man.

In cattle, the condition may not produce symptoms sufficient to affect the animal's general health, although it does prevent the normal birth of the calf.

It is the general opinion that cattle infect each other through eating food which has been contaminated by litter in the cow sheds or by eating grass in the meadows contaminated by the products of the disease. The germs are also to be found in the milk of an infected cow. Sometimes a cow, which is otherwise quite healthy, but which has become infected with this disease, will secrete milk containing the germs.

Apparently the human being becomes infected not only through drinking milk taken from a cow which has had the disease of contagious abortion, but also from handling infected cattle alive or dead. Sometimes farmers send to the slaughter house cows which have become sterile as the result of infection.

It is the opinion of the celebrated authority, Dr. Theobald Smith, that the existence of the disease in the United States in recent times is due to the infection of cattle with a strain acquired originally from cattle in the middle west and which became stronger in its ability to infect human beings by passing through the pig.

Years ago the famous French physician, Dr. Charles Nicolle, said that Mediterranean fever (malta fever or undulant fever), is in the course of evolution and is tending to become chronic.

It is a malady which, on account of its manifestations and its chronicity, will become one of the commonest and most stubborn diseases.

We must continually remember that diseases change exactly as do man and animals. Apparently the prophecy of Nicolle is being realized.

Claim Property Assessment In Chicago Improper

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—(P)—A resolution was adopted by the board of aldermen today holding that the assessment of property in Chicago's loop district had not been made on the proper basis. The board has decided, therefore, it announced, to make a survey of valuations for assessment purposes.

The resolution was based on an opinion by Roy Massey, attorney for the board. Anniversary Notes

MCKINLEY'S BIRTH

On January 29, 1843 William McKinley, 29th president of the United States, was born at Niles, Ohio.

As the seventh son in a family of nine children, McKinley was obliged to enter at an early age the iron industry, the trade of his father. He studied at Allegheny College, but left it to teach school.

Deserting the classroom to enlist at the outbreak of the Civil War, McKinley served with such distinction with the Union army that he was mustered out a major.

After studying law, and passing the bar, he attracted considerable attention by campaigning for Rutherford Hayes, who was running for governor of Ohio. As a result, McKinley was elected to congress and served seven consecutive terms in the lower house.

In 1891, he was elected governor of Ohio, and again his work attracted attention. When the republicans convened at St. Louis to nominate a candidate for president, McKinley was easily the choice.

The outstanding events which marked McKinley's first administration as president were the Spanish War and the subsequent acquisition of Porto Rico, the Philippines and the Island of Guam.

The president was re-elected, but his second term was cut short by an assassin's bullet. His death plunged the nation in deep grief.

The sub-committee of the South Plains Area council, Boy Scouts, is now considering several applications for the position of executive of the organization, according to an announcement yesterday.

The committee announced that the official will be named by April 1, following approval of the Dallas office of Boy Scouts of America.

L. G. H. Williams, president of the council; K. N. Clapp, scout commissioner; T. A. White, treasurer, all of this city, and J. W. Hood, of Slaton, compose the committee.

Rather, Judith answered good naturedly. "Why not? It's excitement about meeting the young man?"

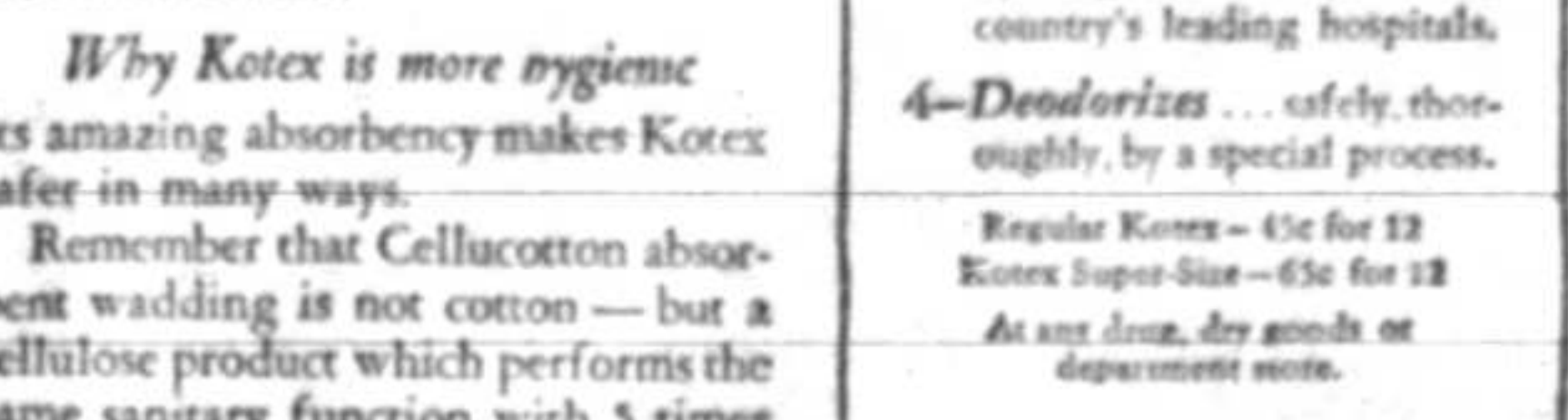

Defense Witnesses in John Brady Trial Build Up Plea of Insanity

nor any of the others called except the Rev. Lee.

The pastor was the only witness who did not say he thought Brady insane. He declared that at times when he had seen "the judge" intoxicated the latter was "not rational." He told of having been called to the Brady home by Mrs. Brady and of having gone there of his own accord when he heard a "commotion." On one occasion, he testified, Brady was walking about like a mad man, kicking over furniture and muttering that somebody had "double-crossed him."

Mrs. White said that in addition to having lived in Brady's home for years, she had been with him twice in California, while relatives were ill, within the last few years.

Says Brady "silly," while they were returning to Texas and Brady, as far as she could tell, was "sober," she testified that he had said to her was "silly" and that it was difficult to get into any sort of coherent conversation with him.

"I was bitterly disappointed," she went on, "because years before he had an unusually bright mind."

Here visiting in the Brady home, she testified, he had accused his wife of telling her that he had a "girl in town," when Mrs. Brady denied this, the sister continued, Brady tried to drive her from the room.

One of the things Brady did, Mrs. White said, was to take her to the capital and "gloriously" introduce her to Miss Highsmith.

Mrs. Pondrom, who called Brady "Uncle John" and brought tears to his eyes again, said that up to the time she married and left the Brady home in 1922 "he had the highest of principles," but that subsequently in visits here she saw a "terrible change."

"I've seen him twice since" (since 1922) in a terrible condition. He was crazy—he didn't know what he was doing when he was drinking," she called out, her eyes on "Uncle John."

BODY FOUND

YUMA, Ariz., Jan. 22 (AP)—Sheriff J. C. Hunter of Yuma county announced tonight that the body of W. Paul Loveland, wealthy Pasadena, Calif., contractor, had been found in an irrigation canal at Curovas, Mexico, 24 miles south of Algodones. Algodones is on the border.

Loveland disappeared from a tourist camp here shortly after Christmas. Reports that he was seen in various parts of Arizona were investigated by authorities, always without result until his body was found in the Mexican canal.

Tech Dairy Barn Damaged By Fire

Flames Originating From Boiler Cause \$3,500 Loss Early Tuesday Morning; Two Cows, Calf Killed

Starting supposedly from a boiler yesterday morning at 2:50 o'clock fire wrecked the dairy manufacturing department of the dairy barn at Texas Technological college and ruined practically all laboratory equipment in the building, resulting in a loss of approximately \$3,500.

Firemen stated that apparently a fire had been left burning in the boiler which melted the bottom, but college officials last night were inclined to question this theory.

The dairy barn proper was saved through efforts of every unit of the city fire department, though two cows and a calf were asphyxiated by smoke and heat from the flames.

Four thousand six hundred feet of house were used by the fire fighters. One of the cows and the calf were owned by F. E. Kemp, student of McCaulley, and the other cow was owned by W. A. King, of Floydada.

No announcement has been made as to plans for rebuilding the damaged structure.

extent the chamber of commerce is a project organization, the projects determined upon forming its program of activities.

"But a chamber of commerce is much more than a project organization. The membership and public expect it to act on all sorts of matters as they arise, and most of the time is spent with matters that have no direct relation to the program.

Should Be Limited. "It is obvious that with so wide a field and with such a multitude of activities as come under the general purview of chamber of commerce work, no chamber can do everything that may be expected of it. It seems, therefore, that the chamber should limit itself to such things only as the means at its command will enable it to carry on. It would be better to have a chamber of commerce devoting itself exclusively to one single activity, if it did it well, than to scatter over a number of things and do them poorly.

"The fact is, however, that a chamber of commerce can function effectively in carrying out a general, though limited program of business and community building. To do so, however, it must provide leadership in its official personnel, judgment, fact and ability on the part of its staff, and be able to enlist the service of members."

Mr. Brown further explained in this connection that possibly the main thing in selecting activities is to discover their importance to the greater per cent of the community. "A chamber of commerce should be a business organization conduct-

ed on business lines, as far as that is possible in a voluntary association of men with conflicting views of what to do and how to do it," he continued. "There are many chambers of commerce with small staffs that are doing good work, and that have the confidence and support of their communities."

"The object of the chamber of commerce is to determine what is to be done and create the machinery to do it, not to build a machine and then try to find something for it to do."

"Before the board of directors should commit the chamber to any policy or activity, it should be in possession of all the facts. Getting at the facts in any given case affords the opportunity for the appointment of a committee that will get the facts, analyze them and report to the board. There can be as many committees as there are problems to be investigated but in each such case there should be careful selection of men who are not only qualified to do the work, but who will do the work."

"The substance of the whole subject of committees is that they should be aids and hindrances to the secretary and his staff, and that this should be in mind when making selections of men to do committee work. It is not always easy to get men qualified in every way, but they should be chosen for it would be better to have no committee in a given case than to have one that would be a hindrance rather than an aid. Certainly a committee should never be appointed unless there is work for it to do, and only then when men can be found who will take an interest."
