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Civic Meeting Reveals City Sales Tax Favored



Named Sweethearts

Miss Rose Ann White was presented a bouquet of roses when she was named football sweetheart at this year's banquet in Colorado High School Cafeteria. With Miss White is senior Ralph Lindsey who was named Wolverine sweetheart for 1967 football season.

Sales tax for Colorado City received strong backing from all spokesmen at a civic meeting here Tuesday night.

Meeting, called by Mayor John Chinn in Community Room at City National Bank attracted a representative group of club and civic leaders.

All members of City Council were present except R. J. Hoback who was committed to attend an agriculture

economic meeting. Also represented were the Chamber of Commerce, Junior Chamber, Jaycee-Ettes, Colorado City Industrial Board of Development, the bank, and several business firms in town.

No one voiced opposition to the proposed city sales tax either in a speech or during the informal question and answer session which climaxed the meeting. Several citizens present spoke approval with accent on "a better town."

Dr. Chinn, the mayor, opened the discussion by stating City Council's reason for the city sales tax election, set for Friday, December 15, here.

Mayor Chinn's summary stressed the economic necessity for approval by City voters for the tax. He cited the rising cost of maintaining and improving the city. He also explained the method of collecting the tax, should it be approved

by voters. Merchants would collect the 1 percent city sales tax along with the Texas State sales tax of 2 percent, he noted. Tax would start with 49 cent purchases (not to include food, prescription drugs, farm implements, poultry and animal feed, automobiles, and beer; State of Texas would reimburse the city's 1 percent share.

Mike Burt, city councilman, then spoke of the proposed sales tax for the city as "Fair to everybody." Ad valorem tax, he pointed out, have remained the same for the past 13 years while cost of operating city business has steadily climbed. Ad valorem tax is \$1.65 per \$100.00.

Paul B. Hunter, council member, discussed the time element and the immediate need for increased city funds.

During the question and answer session it was stated by city officials that the

city sales tax, if passed by vote, will add "about \$40,000 a year" to city operating funds.

Among other subjects highlighted in the discussion between council and citizens were these: increased population as one reason for rising costs; the goal of improving city recreation facilities; the next fiscal year budget, May 1, 1968-69, in-

C-City Write-Up In Texas Parade

Colorado City receives a fine notice in the November issue of Texas Parade magazine with a picture, in color, of a sign boosting Lake Colorado City, published on page 34.

In an article "The Sweetwater, Colorado City, Snyder Triangle," Texas Parade also has pictures in color of the grand march for Snyder's rodeo and Sweetwater's Pace Packing Co.

"Just" about halfway between the Trinity and the Pecos is a triangle of towns lying closer to more

different lakes than any other three towns in Texas," the article begins.

Of Colorado City, the writer says it is "Oldest town between Weatherford and El Paso. Colorado City was a ranger camp in 1877. The first business was built in 1880 and the Texas & Pacific came through the next year. By 1882 the town had been

VFW Post To Sponsor Contest For Scholarships

Voice of Democracy scholarship contest for 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students is being sponsored by Wilson Wyatt Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, at the three Mitchell County High schools.

Sophomore, junior and senior students at Colorado High, Westbrook High, and Lorraine High are eligible to compete in the contest for scholarship prizes nationally totaling \$13,500.

Deadline for entering the contest is Monday, Dec. 11, announced Don DeLaney, commander of the local post No. 9178.

Theme for the 1967-68 competition is "Freedom's Challenge." In addition to the scholarships, of \$5,000 for first, \$3,500 for second, \$2,500 for third, \$1,500 for fourth, \$1,000 for fifth, there

will be \$1,000 for each state winner.

There will be 53 all-expense paid tours of Washington D. C. awarded state winners, District of Columbia winner, for trying in the national finals.

Students entering the scholarship contest are required to write a script, "Freedom's Challenge," not less than three minutes long, nor more than five minutes long.

Porter Richardson, manager of Radio Station KVMC will tape the entries of students on magnetic tape. Winning tapes will be sent to state competition. State winners will then travel to Washington for the final round.

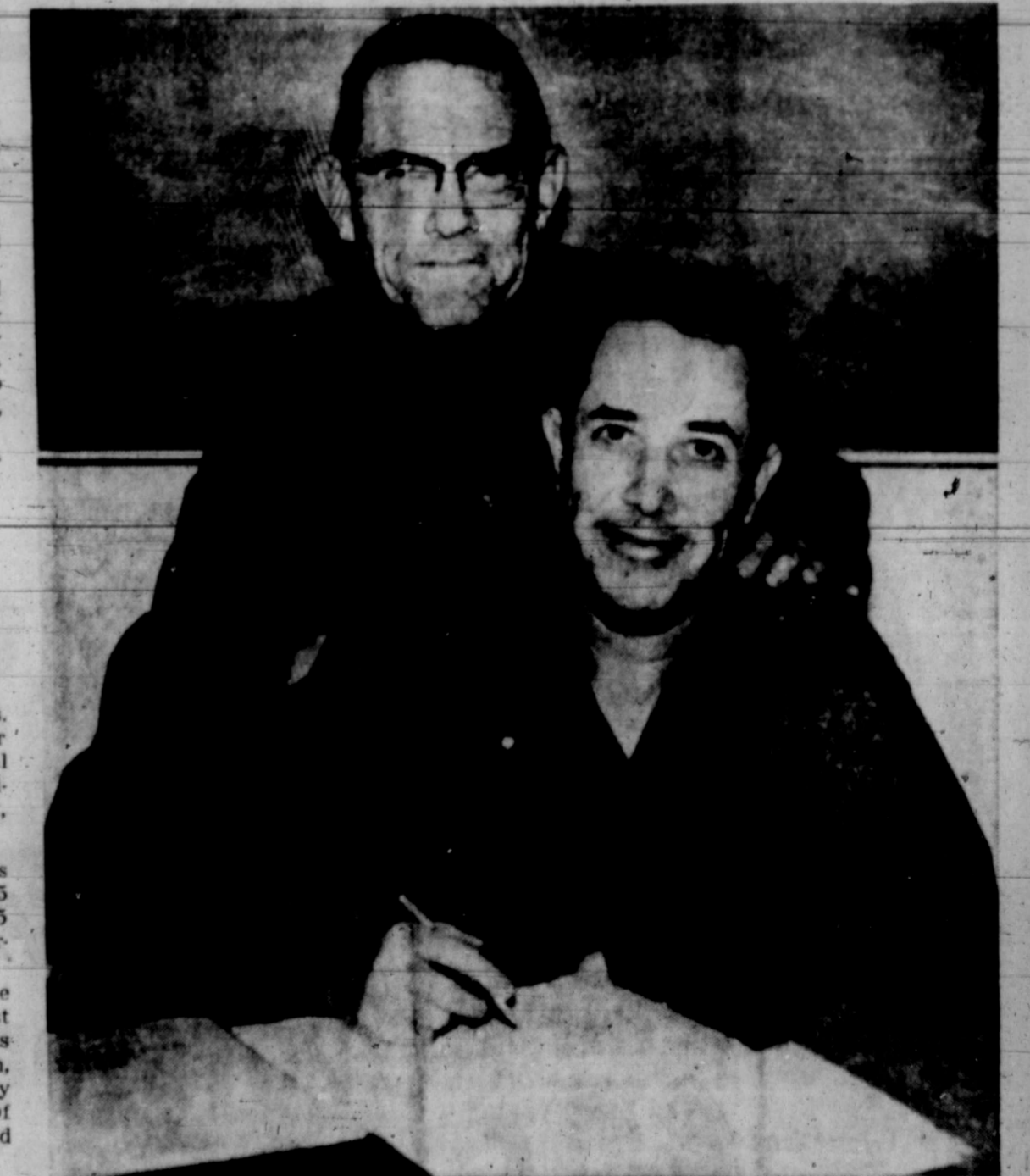
DeLaney pointed out that scripts are to be positive-for Freedom, rather than against totalitarian governments.

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Atomic Energy Lecture At CHS

A high school lecture-demonstration program, sponsored by U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, will be presented at Colorado High School, Wednesday, Nov. 20.

The program here in Colorado City will be among 20 prepared for Texas high schools during November.

Texas A&M University is assisting Oak Ridge (Tenn.) Associated Universities in presentation of the Texas programs.

Designed to foster increased awareness and understanding among secondary school students of scientific and technical information relating to atomic energy, the program consists of a 40-minute assembly presentation followed by classroom sessions with science students.

Other area schools receiving the program this month are Snyder, Coahoma, Big Spring, Post, Lamesa, Andrews, Lubbock, Denver City, Levelland, Seminole, Breckenridge, Mineral Wells, Morton, Sengraves, Jayton, and Crosbyton.

Program will be presented here by Donald V. Jensen, Youngtown University graduate who holds his masters degree from A&M and trained at Oak Ridge.

Special equipment will show radiation sources, how nuclear energy is harnessed for electricity, diagnosis and treatment of disease

and life process studies using radiotopes.

In a blackboard talk to CHS science classes, Jensen will discuss in student terms atomic structure, and nuclear science careers in detail.

"As supply, shipping and recreation center of a wide ranch area, the town grew from a population of 700 in 1881 to 5,000 a year later! Saloons were all over the place. Fortunes were made and lost overnight.

"The hardy people who stayed in the town found a rewarding life in a town geared to the area agriculture and ranching until the 1920's when oil strikes brought another boom. This boom, mld by Ranger standards, led to a stable economy on a broad base of refining, agriculture oriented industries, income based on cotton, silage and forage.

"Today, a happy, vigorous citizenry some 7,000 strong will assure you that Colorado City is one of the world's choice places to live and

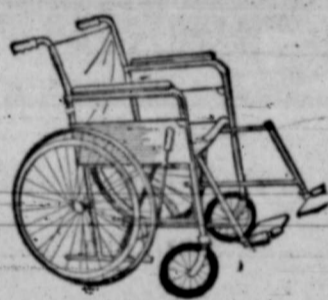

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Cotton Samples Up In Good Weather

Cotton samples classed at the U.S.C.A. Classing Office in Abilene, reached the \$2,000 mark as compared to 10,687 one-year ago. Officer in Charge B. E. Manly, Jr., reported a weekly total of 6,529 samples as compared to 6,304 for the same week last year.

Prices reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service of Abilene, ranged from as low as \$11.50 per bale above the CCC loan price for high grade, short staple cotton to as much as \$75.00 over the CCC loan price for long staple cotton.

Over the CCC loan rate. The average price for Middling, 1-5/32 cotton was 39.75 cents per pound.

Smith-Doxey receipts picked up considerably the last part of the week because of good weather, which enabled farmers to resume harvesting activities.

The grades of cotton processed by the cotton classing office improved slightly over last week. Twenty-two per cent was classed in the white category as compared to 9% for last week.

The amount of 31-32 cotton took a sharp increase from 9% to 30%. One inch staple and spotted cotton remained constant at 2%. The per cent of cotton retained in grade because of break also remained constant at 7%.

WHEREAS, Article 10666, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY TEXAS:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Colorado City, Texas, on the 15th day of December, 1967, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City of Colorado City, Texas, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City of Colorado City, Texas, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

Presiding Officers: R. B. Baker, Presiding Judge; Mrs. R. B. Baker, Alternate Presiding Judge.

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint not less than 2 clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Colorado City, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 10666, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.
 FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.
 AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article

State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given, to be published on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City of Colorado City, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election, and the by posting of such notice at the polling place, to-wit: at the City Hall of said City of Colorado City, not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the Colorado City Record is a newspaper published within the City of Colorado City, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force at and from the time of its passage.

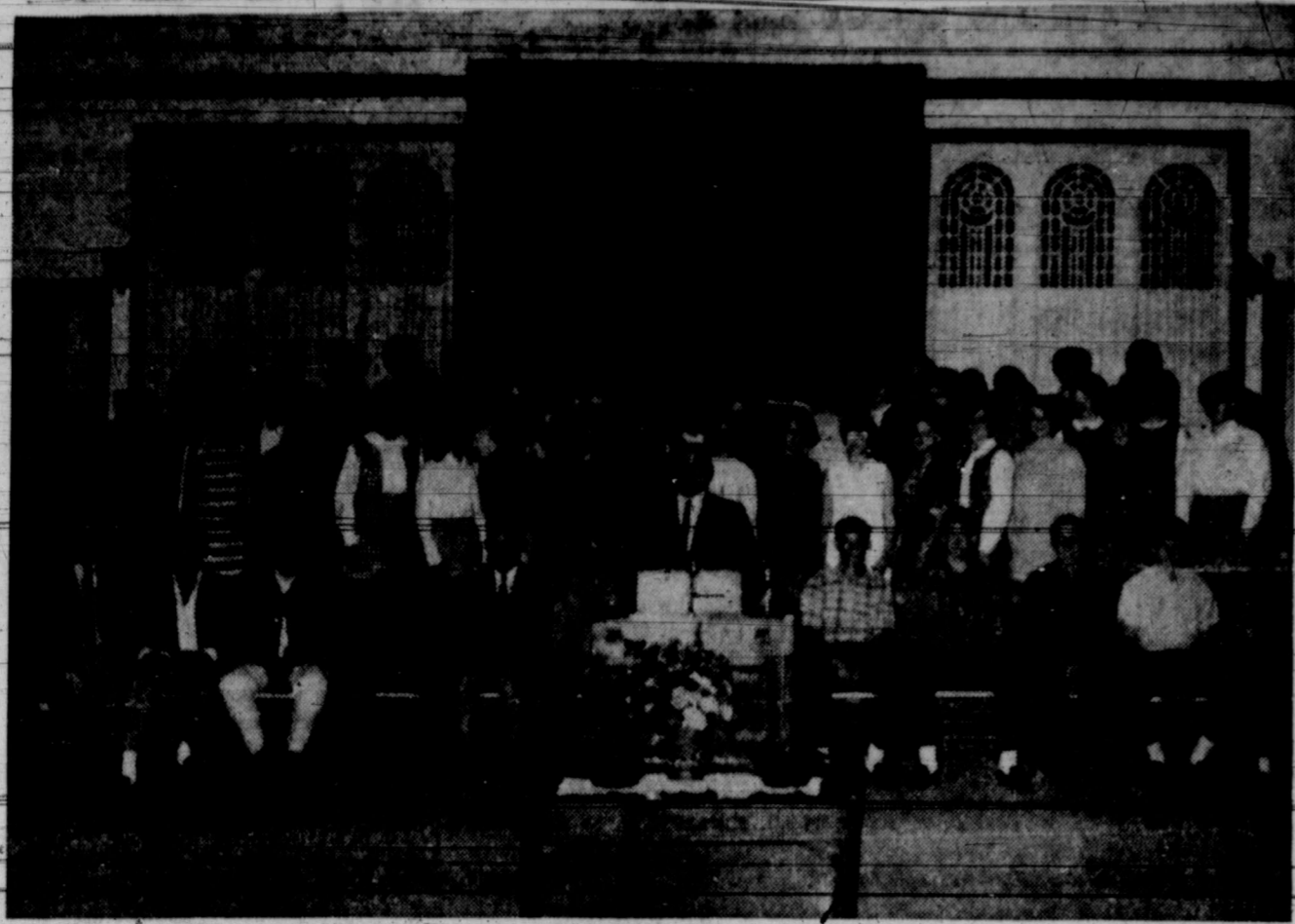

Agent Tells Hints On Turkey Buying

"It's time again to think of your holiday dinner," Miss Janice Miller, Mitchell County home demonstration agent said this week.

"If you are like most American homemakers," she continued, "you will buy the traditional turkey within the next few days."

Miss Miller presented suggestions for selecting turkeys in a release this week from County Extension office.

The local home demonstration agent said that boneless turkey is increasing in volume-boned and rolled, both cooked and uncooked.

She presented this guide for turkey size and number of servings:

Whole Turkey Weight	Approximate Number of Servings
5 to 8	6 to 10
8 to 10	10 to 20
12 to 16	20 to 32
16 to 20	32 to 40
20 to 24	40 to 50

Miss Miller recommended two procedures for thawing turkeys. They included thawing in the refrigerator in the original wrap on a tray which requires one to three days and thawing the bird in the original watertight wrap under cold running water which requires six to seven hours.

"Thawing at room temperature is now safe and practical by putting the bird in a closed paper bag," she said. "The bag keeps the temperature low enough to protect quality. Large birds should thaw for 16 hours and smaller ones for 12

TO AVOID DELAY

Correct Address On Mail For Military

Postmaster A. M. Morris is urging the citizens of Colorado City to be sure to use the correct address on their letters and packages going to servicemen overseas to avoid delays in delivery.

Postmaster Morris reported that millions of letters and packages going overseas have been delayed because

they were insufficiently addressed. One of the biggest problems he said, has been the failure of persons to include the very important 5 digit APO or FPO number in the military address. Mail not containing this number is incorrectly addressed.

Last year more than 9 million pieces of mail were

delayed in delivery. Of this number, 3 1/2 million pieces failed to include the complete 5 digit APO or FPO number in the address. This improperly addressed mail had to be sent to a military locator directory where time-consuming searches were made to determine the proper address.

"As the Christmas mail volume going overseas is expected to increase up to 30 per cent or over 4 million pounds above last year, every precaution should be taken by friends and relatives

of servicemen to address their letters and packages properly to assure rapid delivery to its destination," Morris said.

There are four essential elements to an overseas address. They are:

1. The serviceman's identity grade, full name, and service number.
2. His military unit complete.
3. Gateway post office New York, San Francisco or Seattle.
4. APO or FPO - a 5 digit number.
