IN FACE OF WAR THREAT

Civil Defense Is Only Alternate, Lions Told

Ever present threat of nuclear warfare leaves citizens with no alternative except to prepare for survival through Civil Defense.

Infact, Civil Defense—working with top military leadership—has become an important part of the total defense of our nation, County Agent Jack Burkhalter told Lions Friday.

Burkhalter, speaking at the Lions luncheon in Civic House, discussed the threat which exists against people and property, then outlined recommended steps in the Civil Defense program to meet this threat.

"The U. S. has the military might to deliver nuclear weapons to the Soviet Union," the county agent said, "and, as long as this country maintains this deterrent capability, Russia is less likely to attack us."

"But such an attack is possible because Russia has these weapons too."

Burkhalter emphasized that nuclear war between the U. S. and Russia could be triggered by either: (1) an error by the Soviet Union in judging our defense strength, or (2) a small war which mushrooms.

into an all-out nuclear battle. "None of us know how many Berlings or Koreans lie ahead," the county agent said, "but in facing world problems our President's hand will be strengthened by the knowledge that we can—and will—protect ourselves from radiation."

Defense officials report that about half our nation's population and 3 quarters of our industrial strength is concentrated in special "target" centers which comprise only about 5 or 6 per cent of the total area of our country.

But by hitting our larger

cities with nuclear weapons, the enemy could create a blanket of radioactive fallout that would cover almost the entire geographic area of the nation and, therefore, affect millions of us outside the big "target" areas.

"So," Burkhalter said, "we have no alternative but to prepare for survival."

And, pointing to the fact that Civil Defense is important to total defense of our nation, he quoted top Civil Defense Director Leo A. Hoegh.

Grand Jury Delays In Juke Box Case

Mitchell County grand jury has passed for additional

study in the case of old and unused slot machines found stored in the Sport Shop.

Passed also for consideration at a later hearing was the complaint alleging embezzlement of \$114.30 from the Sport Shop.

It was the complaint against a former employee of the Sport Shop, Don Kennedy of Big Spring, which resulted of officers picking up the dusty machines.

Wayne Basden, Big Spring Attorney, legal counsel for Kennedy, told officials Thursday the machines were at the downtown store. Basden also has been legal counsel for a Big Spring firm which deals in the juke box music trade the same as the Sport Shop.

District Attorney Eldon Mahon took the slot machine case before the grand jury Thursday afternoon.

However, the DA and Sheriff R.E. (Dick) Gregory along with other state and local officers said condition of the machines indicated they had been stored out of use for a long time and may be only junk.

A delivery invoice on a box containing one of the machines was dated March 28, 1958, two years before the state law went into effect outlawing the machines.

But, who cooperated with officers when they asked to look for the machines, and what was done with the box, was not known.

You see, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has devised a method for removing moisture from telephone cables and pushing air into the cables.

This is designed to curtail trouble with phone service during rain, ice or snow storms weather which in the past has knocked out phone service, from time to time, as moisture entered cables.

Installation of the air pressure system on cables in Colorado City began this spring and will be completed this year. Key to the

pressure system is a compressor dehydrator at the Bell phone exchange, corner of Walnut and E. Fifth St.

The bubble bath for the cables is the technique for testing the cables, to determine if there are any leaks.

Three crews of workmen under contract to the phone company are in Colorado City now testing and repairing the cables where ever leaks are discovered and converting the cables to the pressure system.

They have been here already for 8 weeks and will be busy 2 or 3 more weeks with their bubble bath system.

The crews use equipment on a long pole that runs along the elevated phone cables, spreading special soap mixture along the cable sheathing. When bubbles blow into the sky, then there's sure to be a cable leak.

There's more to the pressure system in its techniques for improving phone

for better air pressure to escape.

CRADDOCK AND RATLIFF NAMED

Attorney R. H. (Harry) Ratliff and retired auto dealer and businessman J. S. (Jess) Craddock have been appointed commissioners for Colorado City Housing Authority.

Their acceptance of the non-paying public service positions was announced Saturday by Mayor Glenn R. (Bob) Robinson.

The pair was named by unanimous vote of City Council to fill the vacancies created by the resignation of Leonard Henderson, chairman of the housing commission, and Jack Jordan, commission secretary.

Colorado City Housing Authority is the agency which will construct and operate the local \$419,800 low rent public housing project. It will sell bonds to pay for the construction, then payoff the indebtedness over a long period with income from the low rent income backed by guarantee from the federal government.

Hearing Planned Monday

A delegation of city and county leaders will appear before State Board of Engineers in Austin Monday supporting the proposal for a 403,000-acre-foot lake on Colorado River in lower Mitchell County.

From Courthouse will be County Judge Elmer Martin, County Commissioners Moody Richardson of Loring, W. N. (George) Bacon of Westbrook and Precinct 1 Commissioner-elect W. M. (Marcus) Vest.

Heading the city delegation will be Mayor Glenn R. (Bob) Robinson, Councilman Sam L. (Buzz) Majors Jr., City Manager Earl Keaton and Frank Kelley, chairman of West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The group will submit resolutions supporting the application of Colorado River Municipal Water District, builder and operator of Lake-J.B. Thomas.

CRWMD is seeking approval of the state board for construction of the new dam at a site 21 miles south of Colorado City and 15 miles north of Coke County line in Section 10, Block 15, SPRR Survey.

Key cities in the CRWMD are Big Spring, Snyder and Odessa. However, other communities like Colorado City will be able to contract for water out of the new reservoir if it is built.

If granted the permit, CRWMD will have 2 years to initiate a positive start on the lake project or show cause for extending that period.

The project has been carefully studied by the water district for the last 2 years and application for the dam was filed June 11, 1959, with the state board.

City Council here Monday night unanimously approved a resolution endorsing the project. It will be presented to the board by Mayor Robinson at the same time as Judge Martin presents an earlier adopted resolution voicing support of Commissioners Court.

The city's resolution states: "Whereas, today we enjoy the most abundant standard of living ever known to man with most goods and services in record-breaking supply, yet water an absolute necessity to the most primitive way of life is becoming less plentiful as our population centers in West Texas expand, and...

Whereas, Colorado City and the West Texas area is wholly dependent for its surface waters upon the flood waters that fall on the area and this supply is now being
