

Minimum Car Wage Sought

Workers Present
Proposal To
Edsel Ford

DETROIT, April 25 (AP)—The first known attempt of workers in the automobile industry to obtain a guarantee of an annual minimum wage was revealed today by the Ford Brotherhood of America, an independent labor organization.

The brotherhood's goal is at least \$1,500 a year for every hourly-rate worker in the mammoth Rouge plant of the Ford Motor company in suburban Dearborn, where it claims a membership of 21,400. During peak production periods the factory has nearly 90,000 employees.

The F. B. A. disclosed that it has been negotiating with the company the past month and, after numerous conferences, submitted written contract proposals to the management Saturday.

Louis J. Colombo, Sr., Ford counsel, represented the company in the negotiations and turned over to Edsel Ford, president of the concern, the brotherhood's proposals.

As far as could be learned, this was the first time that organized workers in the industry have sought contractual assurance of an annual minimum wage. It is known, however, that at least one other group has had this in mind as one of its ultimate objectives.

The company previously has denied charges the F. B. A. was a company union.

President Roosevelt and Gov. Frank Murphy, of Michigan, have advocated the establishment of such a plan. The president, in an address in Detroit while campaigning for re-election in 1936, urged the motor car industry to set up an annual "minimum living wage" for its workers.

William S. McDowell, Sr., brotherhood attorney, said that in return for the proposed wage guarantee F. B. A. members would sign an agreement that each would purchase a new car from the company every two years at the same price at which they are sold to dealers.

Under the plan, they would buy their cars within six months from the signing of the contract. They could either pay cash or have not more than one-third of their pay deducted as payments on an installment basis.

T&P Has Gain In Freight Revenue

CLEVELAND, April 25 (AP)—Texas & Pacific railroad freight revenue last year registered a 9.08 per cent increase over 1936, President J. L. Lancaster said in the road's annual report.

The freight revenue in 1937 was \$25,132,588. The company had reported previously operating revenues of \$20,850,071, 8.06 per cent above 1936, and operating expenses of \$20,924,145, a 7.46 per cent gain.

Net income was \$2,440,626 compared with \$2,263,973 for 1936. The funded debt increased \$275,000 to a total of \$80,337,000.

Lancaster said recent freight rate increases would mean a 6.9 per cent rise in revenue if traffic were the same as in 1937.

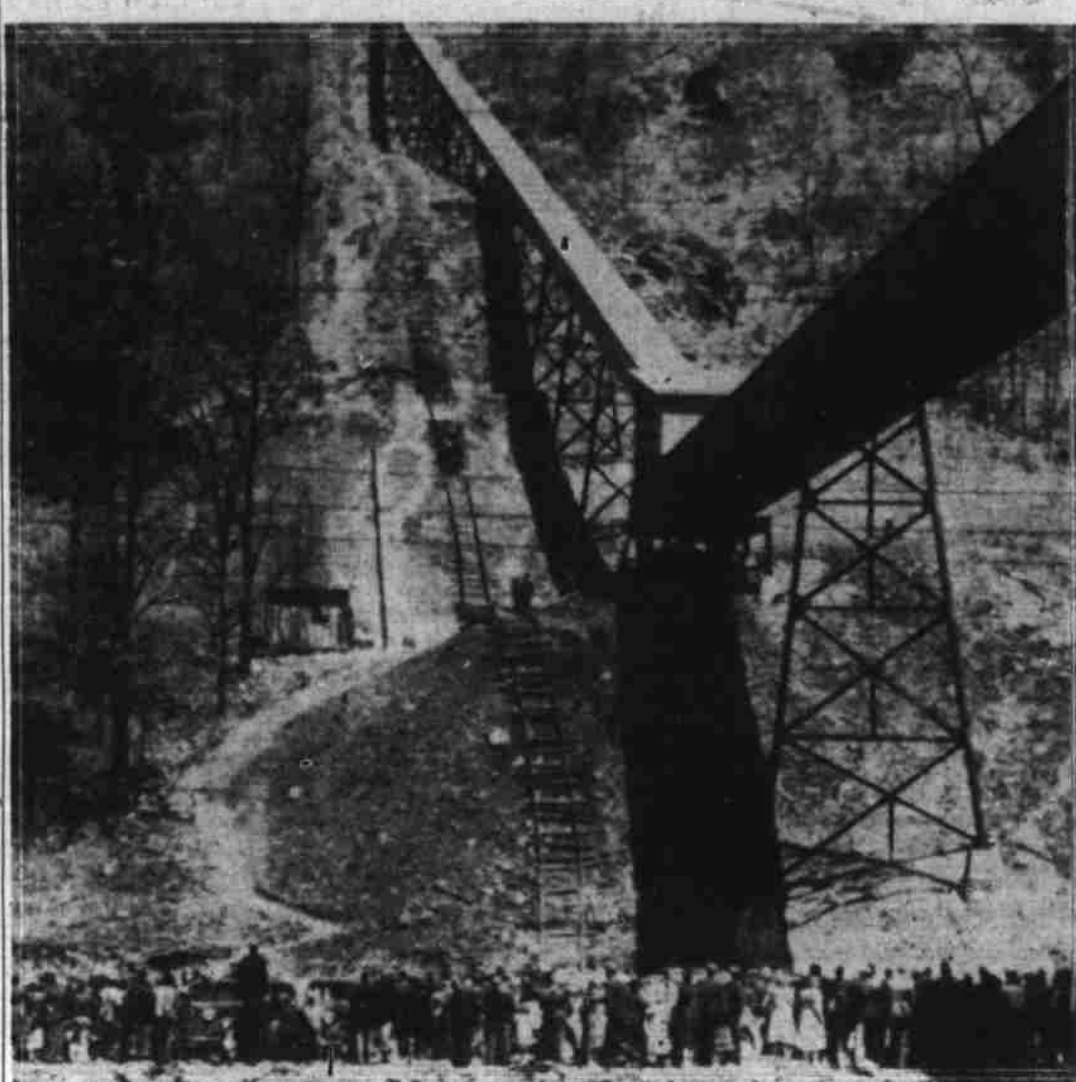

Revised Municipal Bankruptcy Act Upheld By Supreme Court

Cities Win Right For Adjustment With Creditors

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—The supreme court ruled constitutional today the revised municipal bankruptcy act which permits cities, and improvement and school districts, to agree with creditors to reduce their indebtedness in federal bankruptcy courts.

Chief Justice Hughes delivered the opinion to which Justices McReynolds and Butler dissented. Justice Cardozo did not participate.

Hughes asserted that "the bankruptcy power may be exerted to give effect to a plan for the composition of the debts of an insolvent debtor."

The court on May 25, 1936, held unconstitutional a similar act permitting reduction of indebtedness. The revised measure was passed by congress in an effort to meet supreme court objections.

Today's decision applied specifically to a plan for adjustment of the debts of the Lindsay-Strathmore irrigation district of Tulare county, California.

The original act was held to violate state rights in a five to four opinion delivered by Justice McReynolds. Present members of the court who voted with him were Justices Butler and Roberts.

Those dissenting were Chief Justice Hughes and Justices Cardozo, Brandeis and Stone.

In the revised measure, congress specified that it should not be construed to "limit or impair" the power of any state to control any municipality or political subdivision "in the exercise of its political or governmental powers."

CHILD IS FATALLY BEATEN; SUSPECT IS ARRESTED

SAN ANTONIO, April 25 (AP)—William Sullivan, 4, died in a hospital here today, victim of a brutal beating for which Cicero Tuttle, 24, was charged with murder in justice court of Raymond Gerhardt.

The child's battered body was found yesterday in underbrush beside Menger creek on the eastern outskirts of the city after an all-night search. His skull was fractured.

Tuttle, held in the state school for feeble-minded at Austin from March 5, 1930, until May 31, 1935, was arrested Saturday midnight while search for the boy continued. Several children had told their parents they had seen the child with a man.

LIBRARY OPERATING AS USUAL IN BASEMENT OF J&W FISHER

The Big Spring library is operating as usual, but at a new location. Announcement was made Monday that through the courtesy of the J. & W. Fisher company, the library will be in operation in the basement of that firm's building at 307 Main. It had been reported erroneously that the library's books were stored there.

The library was moved last week from the federated club building, on which a deal is pending for acquisition by the county. Sponsors said that patrons could be accommodated as usual at the Fisher location, and that the library would be open each day from 1 to 6 p. m.

Mrs. Bertha Owen, WPA project representative, will be in charge. There are about 3,500 volumes available for the public's use. The library will function under this arrangement until arrangement is made later on for permanent quarters.

Heavy Rain In Oil Allowable Angelo Area Is Decreased

Crop Prospects Are Brightened, And Streams Rise

VICTORIA, April 25 (AP)—The Guadalupe river broke over levees above and below Victoria today and floodwaters were eating into the western outskirts of the city.

Anticipating a flood of major proportions, Frank H. Crain, county Red Cross chairman, and County Judge J. J. Woodhouse began organizing a disaster committee for rescue and relief work.

Torrential downpours over the lower watershed of the river sent it surging over its banks. Rainfall at Yoakum was 13 inches, and elsewhere in this South Texas area precipitation ranged from two to six inches. Five inches fell here.

SAN ANGELO, April 25 (AP)—Drenching rains in half a dozen West Texas counties yesterday brightened crop prospects and sent streams on sharp rises.

The downpours touched Tom Green, Runnels, Coke, Concho, Sterling, and Coleman counties, and was regarded as assuring a good grain crop and a good planting season.

Waters rose in the North, Middle and Main Conchos and the Colorado rivers. Small streams in all sections of the six county area were out of banks, and held up traffic in several places.

The North Concho was out of its banks for a short time yesterday morning and water was waist deep in sections of Lake View, immediately north of San Angelo.

Bridges were washed out on Lipan creek southeast of San Angelo, Ballinger, Winters, Coleman, and El Paso counties, and Bronte reported good rains. Ranchers south of San Angelo reported the fall as four to six inches.

WTCC Group To Propose Resolution

Land Vacancy Problem Discussed By Works Committee

WICHITA FALLS, April 25 (AP)—The important works committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce declared today real estate in Texas was bearing an unfair share of governmental cost and the ad valorem tax on such property for state purposes should be abolished.

Other Revenue Sources

A resolution to this effect was one of a number adopted for submission to directors of the convention which began its 20th annual convention amid a fanfare of blaring, marching bands and with thousands pouring into town for a big program of work and play.

The first resolution approved by the committee said it was impossible to give relief to the taxpayers through a reduction of local public expenditures and the state had many sources of revenue to partially ease the burden on real property.

"Property representing only one-third of the wealth of the state is carrying practically 75 per cent of the taxes levied in the state for support of state and local governments," it said.

Another closely related resolution meeting committee approval declared opposition to punitive taxes tending to stagnate oil and business development.

Referring especially to efforts to increase taxes on crude oil, the resolution stated that from time to time proposals calculated unfairly to tax capital and business were offered and the result was to confiscate business for the benefit of government.

Past proposals would have made impossible operation of 20,000 strip-wells in West Texas, it said.

Still other resolutions declared for a soil and water conservation contest, apportionment of public school funds on an attendance basis, establishment of the Big Bend park, a campaign to interest capital in West Texas, creation of a government agricultural research laboratory to be located at Texas Technological college in Lubbock and amendment of state laws to

HOBBES, N. M., April 25 (AP)—A man and a 20-year-old girl were held in the county jail at Lovington today on suspicion in connection with the three-weeks old West Texas desert slayings of Mrs. Weston G. Frone of Berkeley, Calif., and her daughter, Nancy.

They were held by local authorities pending the arrival of officers from El Paso, Tex., to question them.

Arrested in one of the city's leading hotels after officers became suspicious, the girl, a "peroxide blonde," became hysterical when questioned about the Frone murders.

They gave their address as Bakerfield, Calif., but their car carried Texas licenses and various articles and identification cards in their possession indicated that they had spent the past several weeks in or near El Paso.

WAGE-HOUR BILL HEARINGS SET

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—The house rules committee decided today to begin hearings Thursday on whether to give the wage-hour bill legislative right of way in the house.

Friends of the measure said that unless the committee granted special consideration there was little chance for its enactment.

USE OF AIRMAIL URGED DURING CHECK OF VOLUME THIS WEEK

Business men of Big Spring will be contacted Tuesday in an effort to encourage use of airmail for at least three days of this week while a check is on in towns along the line of a proposed air route from Amarillo to San Antonio.

Postmaster Nat Shick explained the nature of the check before the chamber of commerce directors Monday noon and gained their support in the move.

A count will be made Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday on the number of pieces and weight of airmail going out of Big Spring, he said.

Truth In News As AP's Aim Reaffirmed As A 'Gift' To Noyes

Retiring President Of News Service Honored

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Frank B. Noyes retired today as president of the Associated Press with a last "gift" from the membership—a pledge that the service would be rededicated "to the cause of truth in the news."

In a speech prepared for the AP's annual luncheon, Paul Bellamy, editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, praised Noyes' unbroken tenure of 38 years in the presidency now ended, and told him:

"x x x This is not farewell. It is not even an adieu. We are to have your counsel for many years more, but now is as good a time as may ever come to tell you that the members of the Associated Press can never repay you for what you have so freely given us in the years of your leadership."

"There is a gift we can give you today," he said, "which will gladden your heart more than any other, and I think I know this membership well enough to say that we will give it."

"We can and we do rededicate ourselves to the cause of truth in the news. This cause was never in direr need of defenders than today. The march of events intensifies class differences. The centrifugal forces which have split apart many a country in the past are at work among us."

"One pressure group after another takes the center of the stage, each fanned into a fierce flame of endeavor by its leaders. Who, then, shall stand for America first and his own 'ism' second? Only that one, I suspect, who can see the country whole and know it as it really is, know all its parts and their relationship to each other, know what the entire adventure is about."

"And how do we develop citizens of this order? Only by telling truth and truly what is going on. Public opinion rules a democracy and news is the raw material of public opinion."

"x x x We shall tell the truth," he added, "and we shall do it because we love and honor you and the other founders of this great free news service. We shall do it because you have been right for 45 years. We shall do it because your own consciences impel us. We shall do it because our beloved country requires us to keep the faith."

BRITISHERS STUDY PURCHASE OF U. S. AIRPLANES

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Five members of a British mission, headed by Air Commodore James G. Weir, arrived on the S. S. Queen Mary today to explore the possibilities of buying American aircraft to help speed Britain's \$7,500,000,000 armament program.

Commodore Weir indicated the mission would make a thorough canvass of United States aircraft factories to determine how many planes and what types of fighting craft could be obtained.

Asked if he had been empowered to buy planes, Commodore Weir replied: "We came over to look around, but I suppose if purchases are going to be made, our view of the situation will be given weight."

VALENCIA BOMBED, 30 ARE KILLED

MADRID, April 25 (AP)—Thirty persons were killed, including a British sailor, and more than fifty injured today when insurgent air-planes resumed bombardment of Valencia, former Spanish government capital on the Mediterranean coast. Three British sailors were wounded.

Church Group Assembling In City

District Council Will Open Tuesday Morning

From the far corners of New Mexico and from points throughout West Texas, delegates were on their way to Big Spring today for the eighth annual district council of the Assemblies of God churches, to open here tomorrow for three day's sessions.

Many of the district leaders had reached the city today, and a pre-convention session will be held tonight at the First Methodist church.

All sessions of the council proper, opening at 10 a. m. Tuesday, will be held at the municipal auditorium. The session is expected to attract hundreds of church representatives. The Texas district includes all of West Texas and New Mexico.

The district superintendent, Elder A. C. Bates of Amarillo, had arrived here Monday morning and was conferring with Rev. Homer Sheats, host pastor, on convention arrangements. One of the highlights of Tuesday's program will be an address by the superintendent, scheduled at 11:30 a. m. He will speak on "The Apostles' Doctrine in Fellowship."

Morning Program

The conference will be opened with a devotional conducted by M. E. Stubblefield of Midland, with Rev. E. R. Foster of Amarillo, assistant superintendent of the district, leading singing. A brief business session will follow, and a musical program will be presented from 11 to 11:30, this being broadcast over KIST.

Music will be one of the highlights of the council, since many able singers throughout the district will attend.

Elder Bates' talk will climax the morning session. In the afternoon, at 2:30, Rev. B. H. Cagle of Las Cruces, N. M., will speak, and a business session will follow. The Tuesday night session, scheduled at 8 o'clock, will feature an address by J. J. Grubbs of Hereford, district secretary-treasurer, on "Evils of the Day."

Tonight's speaker will be W. A. Van Zandt of Albuquerque, N. M. The evangelistic service will start at 7:30.

Guilty Pleas Are Heard

Uncontested Cases On Court Docket For The Week

Uncontested cases loomed as the offering for the 70th district court this week as the petit jury summoned for the week was dismissed when the only case requiring a jury was passed.

On pleas of guilty, three persons received suspended sentences. J. S. Brooks pleaded guilty to driving while intoxicated and was assessed a one year suspended sentence plus a revoking of his drivers license for a period of six months. To a similar offense H. B. Beasley entered an identical plea and got the same punishment.

Sulisdio Pineda, admitting complicity in a burglary, received a five-year suspended sentence. Pedro Gonzales, charged jointly with Pineda, had been given two years in the state prison in a trial January of 1936.

Other civil cases, mostly divorces, were being heard by Judge Charles L. Klapproth on Monday. Another uncontested civil suit was slated for hearing Tuesday.

On Thursday, Judge Klapproth and District Attorney Cecil Collins go to Odessa for the first of a series of special sessions as will be necessary to clear the congested criminal docket at that place.

Prompt Action Requested Of Congress

Says Statute Could Be Drafted To Meet Court Approval

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—President Roosevelt asked congress today to remove "promptly" tax exemptions on income from all future government bond issues—federal, state and local—and on all government salaries.

Coast Viewpoint Changed

Existing exemptions, he said, resulted from judicial decisions and could be eliminated by "a short and simple statute" which he predicted the courts would uphold.

Some advocates of ending such exemptions have claimed a constitutional amendment would be necessary because of judicial decisions holding the federal government could not tax state bonds, nor the state government federal bonds.

Mr. Roosevelt said, however, that recent decisions indicated the courts were following a different line of thought from that which produced the earlier rulings.

The president's request for "prompt" action came as a surprise to many legislators and added to the problems of administration leaders trying to reach adjournment by the latter part of May.

This Session?

Senators and representatives who handle tax legislation in committees were divided on whether the recommendations could be taken up at this session.

Chairman Doughton (D-NO) of the house ways and means committee, said he did not know.

The ways and means committee logically would originate legislation on the subject.

Doughton said the recommendations could not be written into the tax revision bill, now pending before a joint conference committee. "I'll have to study over the message to see what we can do," he told reporters.

The president asserted exemption of securities from taxes, had created "a vast reservoir of tax-exempt securities in the hands of the very persons who equitably should not be relieved of taxes on their income."

"This reservoir now constitutes a serious menace to the fiscal systems of both the states and the nation," he added.

Similarly, he said, tax exemptions claimed by officers and employees of state and local governments had become "a serious defect in the fiscal systems of the states and the nation, for they rely increasingly upon graduated income taxes for their revenues."

Treasury experts have estimated that removal of security and sal-

Let Mother Be A

Want to give a tea for mother on Mother's Day?

You'll have to give thought to invitations, the manner in which the service is to proceed and the table setting.

You may convey your invitation by telephone or in writing. Visiting cards are a convenient means of sending written invitations. Write your mother's name above your engraved name. Put "Sun. May 8" (the abbreviations are correct) underneath, in the lower left-hand corner. Under that write "Tea from 4 to 7." Then write your address in the lower right corner, if it isn't engraved there.



Who Shall Pour

Tea may be served in cups passed on a tray or from a tea table. The latter is the general practice. If you have a tea table you may invite one or two of your friends or friends of your mother to pour. If there are two they should be seated at opposite ends of the table. One may serve coffee or chocolate and the other tea.

As each guest approaches he or she should indicate a preference for tea or coffee by moving toward the end of the table where the preferred drink is being served. The assistant hostess who is pouring will ask whether the tea is to be strong or weak, how much cream, sugar or lemon is to be served in it.

Have Supplies Nearby

Each assistant hostess should have in front of her a large tray on which are placed pots filled with tea or coffee, extra hot water and a "waste" bowl. Either on or near the tray there should be: sugar, cream and lemon slices. Cups, saucers, tea plates and the necessary silver should be nearby. (Provide both spoons and forks—if individual pieces of cake are to be served.) Napkins, too, should be placed in a neat pile or inserted between the tea plates.

The table itself should be covered with an attractive tea cloth. Flowers and candles may be added—or any other suitable decorations. And containers of sandwiches, tea cakes, cake, nuts and mints should be spread about so the guests may help themselves after they get their tea or coffee.

Mother herself may move about among the guests. Or she may be seated in a comfortable chair surrounded by other chairs in which the guests may be seated as daughter brings them up—a few at a time.

"SECRETS OF AN ART DEALER," by J. H. Duveen (Dutton; \$3).

Since this reader is no expert in the matter of art objects, it is not possible for him to say whether the material to be found in J. H. Duveen's "Secrets of an Art Dealer" is brand new, or whether it is available elsewhere. But for the general reader this will not matter, and the expert can safely be left to take care of himself.

J. H. Duveen is "Jack" Duveen, of the world famous family which has supplied so many important works to so many important people. His life has been spent in the midst of beauty, which is good. But also it has been a battle to defend himself and his clients from the sharpers who infest this land of beauty. The book is largely about the sharpers and the intrigues they have engineered. Some very important names occur, and on the whole these are used with frankness. Some of the stories are almost as priceless as the objects they describe.

Perhaps the best one, however, deals only incidentally with the crooks. It is the one which explains how it happened that Dr. George C. Williamson became not only the mentor of the elder John Pierpont Morgan, but his good friend. And the great service Williamson rendered his employer.

The whole thing started over a miniature, one of the most attractive of the elder Morgan's incomparable collection. It was Williamson's ambition to see the miniature: one day he was admitted to their presence, in London. His eye caught one supposedly by Cosway; it was not by that artist, however. And while Williamson stared at it, Morgan replaced the butler who had been keeping an eye on the stranger.

Williamson told Morgan the miniature was wrongly credited, straight out. He proved his case, and before he knew what had happened to him, Morgan had engaged him as a kind of expert-in-waiting, and to make that incredibly beautiful and useful catalogue of Morgan treasures.

There is more than this in the story, and no space to retell it here. But the point is that the collection, now sold and being sold, was one of the great collections of world history. And Dr. Williamson's amazing catalog is what represents the collection today.

WAR DECLARED ON
SPAIN 40 YEARS
AGO TODAY

WASHINGTON, April 25 (UP)—Congress declared war against Spain 40 years ago today in one of the most tense sessions of its history.

It was silence that brought about the historic vote—silence from Spain after the United States had sent her an ultimatum demanding she get out of Cuba, then torn by revolution.

The ultimatum expired on noon of April 22, but already there was a virtual state of war. On the previous day President McKinley had proclaimed a blockade of Santiago, Cuba, and of the north Cuban coast.

UNCLE SAM HIMSELF
A BIG BUTTER
AND EGG MAN

WASHINGTON, April 25 (UP)—Uncle Sam is one of the biggest of the nation's "big butter and egg men" because of his purchases of dairy and poultry products.

During the last nine months he spent about \$35,000 a day to buy perishable products, the agriculture department reported today. His operations are carried on through an arm of the Agricultural Adjustment administration, called the Surplus Commodities corporation.

The corporation steps into the markets to buy produce when prices go too low. Such purchases tend to lessen the supply and thereby cause an advance in price. Commodities bought by the corporation are distributed to needy families through state relief agencies.

COURT REFUSES TO
REVIEW ALIEN CASE

WASHINGTON, April 25 (UP)—The supreme court refused today to review a new test case to determine whether citizenship should be denied aliens who refuse to bear arms in defense of the United States.

The tribunal declined to pass upon an appeal by Abraham Warrentin, a Mennonite minister of Chicago who was refused citizenship in the federal district court at Chicago because he declined, for religious reasons, to take the required oath.

Several years ago the high court refused to permit Rosika Schwimmer, a Hungarian, and Douglas C. Macintosh, a Canadian, to become citizens. Each had refused to promise to bear arms.

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ACTION ON TAX EXEMPTIONS

Elimination of the tax exemption feature from federal, state and municipal bonds and of the tax immunities enjoyed by public office holders in the United States falls in the class of those reforms which practically everybody agrees ought to be made but about which, like the weather, nobody does anything. At least, that was the situation. But now a number of people are doing something about it and the situation looks a great deal more hopeful.

Secretaries of the Treasury from the time of Andrew Mellon or before have warned that a graduated income tax law could not work fairly or successfully while a huge body of tax-exempt securities offered escape for wealthy investors in the higher brackets. Senator Harry F. Byrd has had a proposed constitutional amendment pending for some time to make the Sixteenth Amendment mean what it seemed to mean when it said income "from whatever source" should be taxed. Senator William E. Borah only a few days ago obtained adoption by the Senate of an amendment to the pending tax bill to forbid further issuance of tax-exempt bonds by the National Government. Now President Roosevelt announces that he will send to Congress a special message urging action along these lines.

Besides costing the government a revenue of possibly as much as \$500,000,000 a year, the resultant low interest on tax-exempt public securities tends to make these less attractive to small investors than to large—a situation which ought in the interest of responsible citizenship to be reversed. As for public officials, the rule under which state or municipal employees can cap federal income taxation, and federal employees escape state income tax laws, is one designed to prevent either the federal or the state government from destroying agencies and functions of the other. But there would be no such threat if such officials paid simply at the same rate as every other citizen, and there would be a considerable gain in public feelings of justice and fair play.

ETCC Meet Underway

Longview Convention Due To Attract Crowd Of 15,000

LONGVIEW, April 23 (AP)—The twelfth annual convention of the East Texas chamber of commerce with its theme, "East Texas Finds Itself" the focal point of a meeting drawing thousands of visitors here, swung into general sessions today.

Highlights of the program were the addresses by E. L. Kurth of Lubbock on "Reconstruction From East Texas Pine," and by William H. Zeller of Manchester, N. H., on "The City That Refused to Die."

The convention officially opened yesterday with a band concert on the lawn of the Gregg county court house. Last night special services were held at six churches with laymen as speakers.

Throughout the day visitors thronged into this East Texas city by train, bus, and private conveyance, to attend what chamber of commerce officials and Longview citizens believed would be one of the greatest conventions in the organization's history.

They estimated the number present would reach 15,000. Hundreds of the early arrivals drove through the oil fields.

The committee on nominations met yesterday afternoon, and last night directors of the chamber and their staffs and wives were guests of the Longview chamber at a dinner.

The speaking program of the convention will be devoted in large measure to pleading for a downward revision of taxes and to pointing out the industrial possibilities of the East Texas area.

LOANS TO UTILITIES

The latest proposal that the RFC lend money to the utilities is just another messy dose of arsenic dished out to a country whose ill-health needs immediate diagnosis and real, curative treatment.

Utilities are a 12 to 13 billion dollar industry in this country. They need about two billions of new money. One reason they need money is due to past abuses, to capital write-ups, which have, however, been drained off in the course of the last eight years. The other reason is due to perfectly normal expansion. In eight years the industry has been constantly expanding, and has, nevertheless, raised practically no new money. Now it is ready to absorb a huge amount of fresh capital and translate it immediately into constructive work that would create great activity and equal or exceed in its effects the whole pump-priming program.

Due to the fact that the utility industries turn over their money only about once in five years as contrasted with general manufacturing, which turns it over, normally, more than once in 12 months, there is many times as much capital behind every gross dollar in utilities as there is in ordinary business, and, therefore, the cost of money becomes the first or second most important item in the utilities' costs, and the price of money is a decisive factor.

Inasmuch as world-wide monetary policies, plus those of this administration, have created the cheapest money rates in two generations, the last years, and the present moment would seem an ideal time to finance utilities, and to raise money both for bonds and preferred stocks, and for common equities.

The latter money, money that will take risks, is especially needed. The utilities don't need to increase their debts. They need to increase their working capital. The capital structure ought—so I am told by experts—to be built up of about 50 per cent bonds, 25 per cent of preferred stocks and 25 per cent of common.

But common now is only about 15 per cent in the industry as a whole. And certainly the government, which has adopted the "prudent investment" theory, ought to be logical and not encourage the industry to increase its debts!

The reason why the utility industry is suffering from capital anemia is not because money is scarce. It is plentiful. Not because rates are high. They are the lowest in history.

It is suffering because the investor, he is a large investor or a small one, won't buy utility stocks. Why should he? Would you? And he won't buy utility stocks because he hasn't the remotest idea what the government is going to do next in the power field.

All that is necessary to rehabilitate the utility industry is a government policy. Almost any kind of a policy. But a policy. A clear policy. A policy that demarcates the fields of government operation and of private operation and sets definite terms. At present if an investor buys utility stocks his chief gamble is not on the efficiency of the company's management. It's on what may be going on in the mind of the president and his advisers.

The utility problem can be solved expeditiously and easily, provided there is a desire to solve it, and not to keep alive a "power issue" for the benefit of politicians. But one suspects that the government prefers a power issue to recovery, just as French "statesmen" save the mark after the war preferred a reparations issue to recovery.

The government, if it wants solution and recovery, can take one or two courses. In areas where it is operating it can create a power pool, on the English pattern, which means, simply stated, to throw all power interests—public and private; generating plants and transmission lines—together; make a quasi-public corporation, valorize everybody's investment, and save the government from running any project like the T.V.A. at an enormous operating deficit, paid for by you and me.

Or, if the administration has decided that government should acquire large areas for public operation, then define the areas, for 10 years in advance, and establish a policy of buying out the present investors, progressively, paying dollar for dollar of invested capital. The latter course is absolutely essential, if what we are interested in is the reinvestment of private utility capital and not an investment of political demagoguery.

The government can, of course, compete in certain areas with the private utilities, and then buy them out at a third or a fourth of cost. It can bankrupt them and buy them at a fire sale. But this is an idiotic procedure. Because it will simply mean that in areas where the government is not operating, where it cannot operate, at least for many years, where private industry must, therefore, furnish the services, it will be impossible to get money. Who is going to invest in an industry that may be forced next week or next year to be taken over by the government whose stock it has bought as socialized business?

What the consumer wants is cheap power; what the taxpayer wants is public enterprises that pay for themselves without his annual subsidies; and what the private investor wants is a little security.

investment will still be protected, then he will invest. In other words, he will know that he may be compensated but not confiscated.

I may add that when the British took over certain private utilities in connection with setting up their power pool or grid, they capitalized earning prospects, a much more generous arrangement than is proposed here, and the socialist economist, Ernest Davies, in a pamphlet dealing with the problem of the transfer of industries from private to public enterprise recommends that compensation should be based on a combination of capital value plus the potential earning power of the concern.

But unfortunately our policies are made by people who are often mediocre anti-capitalists, without being anything as clear-headed as a socialist.

They seem to think that the way to socialize an industry is first to bankrupt it and then socialize the losses.

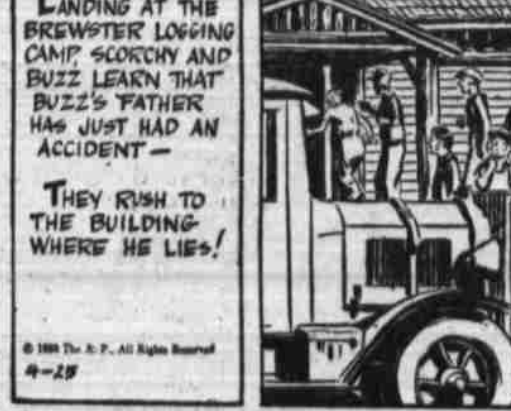
