# Playhouse Gazebo Wins Full House

Colorado City Playhouse staged 'The Gazebo' by Myra and Alex Coppel, to a full house in Colorado High School auditorium Thursday night.

Second production of the Playhouse, the drama drew unanimous applause, two curtain calls and much favorable comment from the large audience.

The Gazebo presentation proved to Colorado Citizens that members of the Playhouse, amateur theatrical group, are in earnest about acting and producing.

Ambitious as it was for a new group of hometown theatergoers, 'The Gazebo' comedy-mystery brought out the best in the entire cast. Rapt attention from the audience was shown from first to last line of the show. Intense listening throughout the auditorium paid a high compliment to the actors and director.

Make-up art demonstrated progress in that portion of Colorado City Playhouse development. Cal Girvin, Colorado High School senior student, looked a handsome middle-aged Harlow Edison.

Girvin's acting of the role of Edison was superb. He is blessed with both a stage voice and a distinguished stage presence. Girvin is a natural actor and even in an amateur production he performed like a "pro."

John Denton, a Sun Oil Co. employee at Silver, played Elliott Nash and turned in a creditable performance. As the action progressed Denton's volume, his ease with stage business and his assurance with his lines increased.

Mrs. J. A. Johnson Jr., cast as Matilda the maid, brought laughter with each appearance and was well-cast in her comedy role.

Mrs. Chandler, a real estate woman played by Mrs. Gwen Brown, both looked and acted the typical big city business woman. Her witty way with tart replies was well received.

Outstanding in his minor role as Jenkins, a detective, was Corydon Elliot. Elliot roared his lines like a veteran actor and his performance was the finest highlight of the final scene.

Porter Richardson, as Mr. Thorpe the cement contractor, was believably funny and completely at home with his part. Richardson, who designed, built and manipulated 'The Gazebo' it was Richardson, off-stage, rocking 'The Gazebo' and finally toppling it out of sight as the curtain closed.

"It will be my pleasure to carry out the directions of the President in making these awards to these two citizens who have served their country so well without pay or thought of pay," Colonel Schwartz said.

Presentation of the awards is scheduled at the local draft board, Room 16, Post Office Building, Big Spring, at 2:30 p. m., Wednesday.

In addition to presenting the certificates to the two board members, Colonel Schwartz will give Mrs. Millie L. Nuckolls, clerk for the Howard Martin Mitchell county draft board, a pin for fifteen years of service as an employee of the federal government. Mrs. Nuckolls was appointed clerk of the board August 3, 1950.

## Bids for Courthouse Project to Be Opened

Tuesday is the day bids for the remodeling of the first two floors of Mitchell County courthouse will be opened by Commissioners Court here.

Time set for the opening and studying of all bids is 2 p. m. Sealed bids will be accepted until that time.

Work at the courthouse is to be accomplished by county commissioners on the "pay as we go" basis. Third floor was completely renovated last year on that same basis. First and second floors are next on the program.

Work is to be let on the "turn key" with one contractor doing the entire work called for in specifications and plans prepared by the county court officials. Sub-contractors for any necessary assistance will be let by the general contractor.

County commissioners have reserved the right to reject any or all bids and to waive informalities. (Any bid on which there is an alteration of or departure from the proposal form issued will be considered informal.)

Mitchell County commissioners rejected all bids submitted the first go-round, when third floor renovation was considered. Later, Virgil Stone Construction Co. of Colorado City was awarded the contract for a bid of \$30,940 when new bids were advertised for and opened.

Architects for the plans to make first and second floors as modern as third floor is now, is Howard Allen of La Mesa.

Among plans for the updating of lower floors in the county's official building are installations for central air conditioning.

# C-City Construction Figures \$480,608

Construction figures within Colorado City's city limits totaled \$480,608 for the past twelve months, Nov. 1, 1963, to Nov. 1, 1964, city building permit records show.

Conservative estimate for the next twelve months has been put by Colorado City Chamber of Commerce at \$500,000.

Total figures for in-city construction last year, Nov. 1, 1962, to Nov. 1, 1963, hit \$510,741.

Residential construction in the twelve months just past more than doubled the figure for last year's record. The 1964 figure for residences built is \$97,165. In 1963 the figure for residential construction was \$42,541.

Commercial construction dropped a bit from the figure of last year. In 1963, Nov. 1, commercial construction figures added up to \$438,200. Nov. 1, 1964 commercial construction figure was \$363,500. (The \$30 million Morgan Creek Power Plant addition recently started is outside city limits.)

Public utilities (streets, water, sewer, lights and gas) construction here was \$19,643 this year as compared to \$30,000 the previous twelve months.

Building permits for a residence for the Don Benson family to be built in the new addition being developed by Bob Kimmel has yet to be filed. A new home for the Carl Gary family is to be constructed on Marshall St.

Permits for those two residences and for other to follow will be added in the construction figures covering Nov. 1, 1964, to Nov. 1, 1965, in the annual report from the Chamber of Commerce here.

Land for the church was purchased through the pastorate of Rev. Shoff and plans for the building were formulated in October 1963.

A church bus runs both Sunday mornings and evenings to transport members to and from services. The old building, owned by Central Baptists is in South Colorado City/ Present church grounds, at the new site in North Colorado City, provides generous parking facilities.

All furnishings in the interior of both church and its educational portion are new.

"We are thankful . . . for great and wonderful blessings during this time of growth and want to convey our prayers and thanks to the folks of our city who were so helpful during this building program," said Rev. Woolcock as spokesman for church members.

Central Baptist Church was organized in July 1950 with 35 charter members. Present members numbers more than 200.

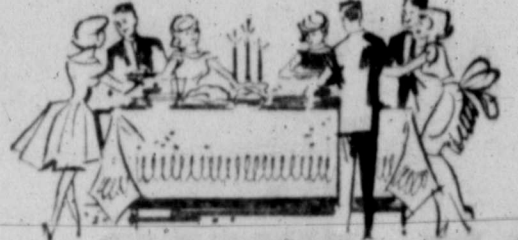

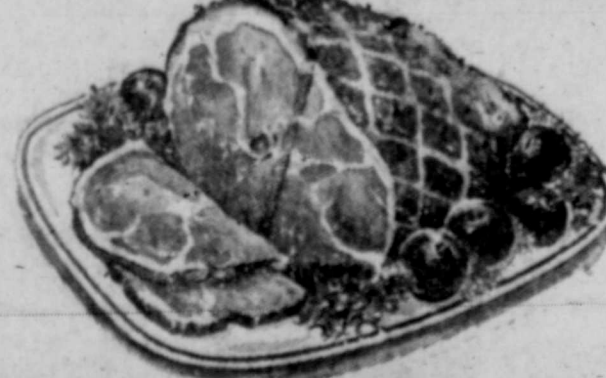

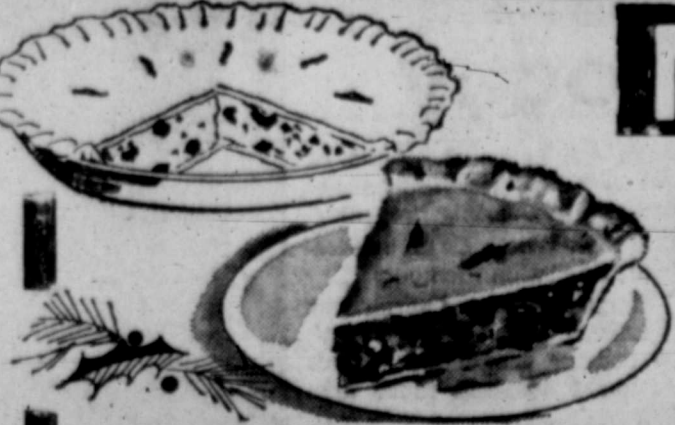

## Emotional Upheavals For American Teenagers

Teenagers are full of emotional upheavals and under tremendous pressures which are greater than those which existed in our day and parents must realize the situation.

That's what Mrs. Charles Caldwell of Midland told members of the 1949 Study Club Thursday.

During her talk, entitled, "Family Relations," Mrs. Caldwell presented a picture

of a teenager from a physical, mental, emotional and spiritual standpoint.

"Only by setting good examples ourselves could parents help their children in improving their posture faults and mental laziness," said Mrs. Caldwell.

"We must teach them," she emphasized, "to exercise their mental capacity and to help them apply themselves.

"Children learn from us and imitate us."

"Discipline," said Mrs. Caldwell, "means consistency" and children require, and want logical discipline. Because one type of discipline may be the answer for a particular stage of growth in a child, it may not be for another, so that we must always seek new ways to discipline.

"With regard to the emotional change that occurs in teenage children, in order for these children to develop self control it is necessary for parents to control their own emotions by eliminating friction and bickering in the home. Laughter in the home is absorbed by children.

"The fourth and most important aspect of family relations is spirituality," Mrs. Caldwell said. She asked "What do you know about God? Do you know him personally and does he live in your home? Use the Bible and bring spiritual strength into the home," Mrs. Caldwell concluded with, "It is really true that a family that prays together stays together."

During her talk Mrs. Caldwell related humorous episodes that occur in family routines but she always stressed the importance of love in the family relationship. "Love your child, love your teenager and love your husband in front of the children."

Mrs. Caldwell is a graduate of Rice University and the mother of two children. She owns and operates a charm school for teenage and young married girls located in Midland. She also works with the girls of Sky High Ranch in Midland, a correctional school. Mrs. Wayne Griffin was hostess and Mrs. Jerry Konecny was program leader.
