

Entry list growing for 1964 Garza Fair Friday, Saturday

250 and 400 exhibits have been entered in the division for the annual Garza Fair here Friday and Saturday. The entry deadline, before the fair opens, is today.

Number of entries in other divisions of the fair also are expected to be greater than at any previous year. This includes Junior Livestock Division, judging will begin at 1:30 p. m. Saturday after the animals are weighed and stalled in the fair building. The women's department, exhibit will be placed between 9 a. m. and 10 a. m. Saturday. The exhibit building will be open to the public at 5 p. m.

The building will remain open until 9 p. m., and on Saturday will be open from 10 a. m. until 9 p. m. Added attractions at this year's fair will include a concession stand

operated by the Barnum Springs Home Demonstration Club and the Young Homemakers chapter and a popcorn stand operated by Post Jaycees.

The awards in the livestock show will include prize money from the Young Farmers chapter as well as ribbons and other awards.

In the women's division, rosettes will be awarded high point winners in the various divisions, with ribbons also to be given.

The fair is sponsored by the home demonstration club women of the county. Directors are Mrs. Alma McBride, Mrs. Lola Peel and Mrs. Loucille Morris.

Enrollment hits 1,420 mark here

Post's school enrollment figure hit the 1,420 mark this week, a gain of 16 students over last week. Supt. Barry B. Thompson reported Tuesday.

A new enrollment record was set two weeks ago when the figure went above 1,390. "Every time a new student enrolls now we set another record," the superintendent said.

This week's enrollment of 1,420 includes 322 in high school, 392 in junior high and 706 in the elementary school.

13 complete ten hour management training here

A class of 13 local merchants and store personnel completed a 10-hour management course, "New Directions in Management," in the Community Room last Thursday night.

The course was given Monday through Thursday nights of last week under sponsorship of the Retail Merchants Association of Post.

The instructor was Mrs. Mary Frances Bowden, supervisory and management training specialist of the University of Texas.

Mrs. Bowden spoke before merchants at the weekly RMA luncheon last Thursday in Levi's Restaurant and pointed out the wide range of adult training classes offered through the University of Texas Extension Service.

"Seventy-five per cent of youngsters going to school today are not being prepared to make a living," surveys show," Mrs. Bowden said. With automation and the lack of skills, the next five to ten year period will see adults "going back to school in increasing numbers," she predicted.

The speaker said that \$29 million in federal funds have recently been allocated to Texas to help train adults. She pointed out that (See 10-hour Course, Page 8)

\$73,750 damage suit filed here

Two damage suits were filed in Garza County district court here during the past week, one of them seeking \$73,750 damages as the result of an auto accident.

The big accident damage suit was filed by Mr. and Mrs. Isidoro Cisneros and Mr. and Mrs. Savino Cisneros, all of Slaton, against Danny Ray Richardson, a minor, and his father, Floy Richardson.

The suit alleges that the four suffered injuries as a result of an auto accident shortly before midnight May 23, 1964, about seven and one-half miles north of Post on highway US-84.

The suit alleges that a car driven by Danny Richardson hit the car driven by Isidoro Cisneros from behind.

Mrs. Lucia Cisneros, wife of Isidoro Cisneros, seeks \$25,000 damages for alleged permanent injuries and \$20,000 additional for loss of livelihood. Isidoro asks \$5,000 for his injuries and \$15,000 for loss of future earnings. Lucia Cisneros, wife of Savino Cisneros, asks \$5,000 for injuries and Isidoro seeks \$2,500 for medical expenses and \$250 for damage to his car.

Attend your County Fair this week

The club women and extension agents, along with several others, have been busy for weeks with preliminary work on this year's fair, and their efforts deserve to be rewarded by the interest and attendance of everyone.

November is Farm Census Month

Garza County farmers are reminded to get ready for this fall's Farm Facts Roundup—officially called a Census of Agriculture. If farmers across the nation will fill out the form, they'll give themselves a measuring rod on agricultural developments that have taken place since 1959.

Census questionnaires will be mailed out in November. Later in November, or maybe in December, you should receive a visit from a local representative of the Census Bureau. (All census details are confidential.) These enumerators or visitors will pick up your completed forms. They'll also help fill out any of the questions that

are not clear. And, incase you didn't receive a questionnaire, the interviewer will have one to go over with you.

"The Census of Agriculture is a measure of the resources on our farms and how those resources—manpower, land, crops, animals, equipment—are being used," says the Bureau of Census.

Making farm figures and projections less of the "crystal ball" game and more of a sound platform for decision-making is just one of the aims of the count taken every five years.—CD

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Something may be done about it

You'd think that after 175 years the United States would have done something about filling the office of vice president when it becomes vacant between national elections. Perhaps the reason it hasn't is because only under recent presidents has the work of the vice president become extremely important, whereas before it was not.

It may not come as a surprise, especially to students of history, but although the nation has never lacked a president since George Washington was inaugurated, 20 per cent of the time it has lacked a vice president.

Since John Adams became the first vice president in 1789, the office has been vacant on 16 occasions. Eight vice presidents succeeded to the presidency. Seven vice presidents died in office. One vice president resigned (John C. Calhoun of South Carolina in 1832 to enter the Senate.)

As vice presidents are chosen only in the quadrennial national elections, the office has been

vacant 38 out of 175 years.

Several methods have been suggested to fill the office when it becomes vacant between national elections. It has been suggested that a new vice president be picked by the president, be picked by Congress, or by the Electoral College.

A compromise method that seems to have the best chance of acceptance would let the president nominate a vice president subject to confirmation votes of the House and Senate.

The Senate Judiciary Committee this summer approved a Constitutional amendment which, among other things, would set this compromise method as the one to be used in filling the vice presidency between elections. The proposal probably will be brought up again in the next Congress. If both the House and Senate approve it by two-thirds vote and three-fourths of the states ratify it, it will become part of the Constitution.—CD

Who pays attention, anyway?

Quite a few poll forecasts were upset in 1964 primary results.

If opinion polls do have any real value it may be to inform the uninformed voter as to whom everyone else is supposedly voting for so he may be shepherded into that fold.

And if this is the result, what purpose is being served? For a democratic society to remain strong it must be the product of an informed people, not guided people.—CD

Last year (1963) his income was \$8,640, but he spent \$9,260 and, adding to his previous debt total, wound up that year owing \$30,590. In fact, he spent more than he took in in 7 out of the last 10 years. His debt now (1964) is 15 per cent greater than it was 10 years ago (1954). Meanwhile, he is paying more for just the interest on what he owes. Last year it came to \$1,000. This year it will be more. Ten years ago his interest payments came to only \$647. The payoff is that all his money comes from me: please don't urge him to spend more!

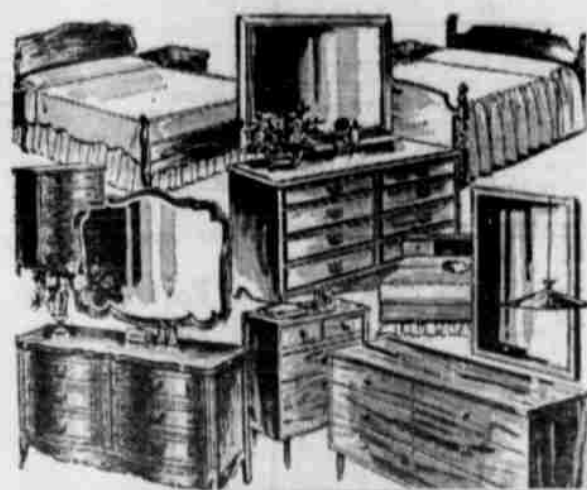

'A President's Country' is guidebook to the Hill Country of Central Texas

AUSTIN — "If you expect to find the streets crowded with swaggering gunmen or the hilltowns peopled with country bumpkins, you are due for something of a shock."

That advice for visitors comes from a forthcoming guidebook to the "Hill Country" of Central Texas—a narrow strip of land less than 100 miles long which begins in Travis County at Austin and extends westward through Hays, Blanco and Gillespie Counties to Fredericksburg.

Prepared by several University of Texas faculty and staff members and due for publication in mid-October by the U. Ex-Students' Association, the new guide book will be a handy reference for visitors touring the Hill Country and areas surrounding President Lyndon B. Johnson's ranch near Stonewall.

Entitled "A President's Country," the book describes the historical, geographical, zoological and archeological background of the land where President Johnson grew up. Jack R. Maguire, Ex-Students' Association executive director, is general editor of the volume. R. Henderson Shuffler, director of UTS Texana program, has contributed a chapter on Hill Country history. Dr. W. W. Newcomb, anthropologist and director of Texas Memorial Museum, has provided information on Indians who once roamed the hills, as well as plants and animals that now abound there. Collaborating with Dr. Newcomb were two Museum staff members, Dr. Gerald Raun, zoology curator, and Curtis Tunnell, anthropology curator.

Architecture of the Hill Country, from Southern mansions to German farmhouses, is described in a chapter by Drury B. Alexander, associate professor of architecture. Dr. Peter T. Flawn, director of UTS Bureau of Economic Geology, has written of the area's geology.

Also included is a road log with mileage reminders of sights to see between Austin and Fredericksburg.

"A President's Country" will be available in paperback (\$1.50) and hard-bound (\$3) volumes.

Texas working on plan for mentally retarded

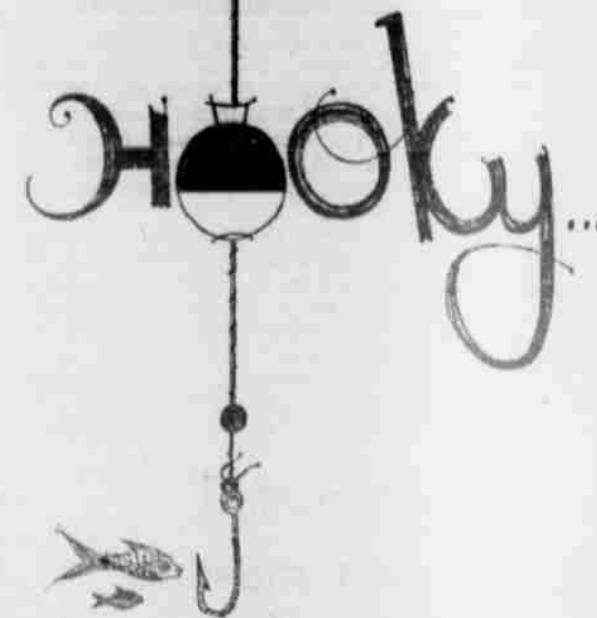
AUSTIN — Texas' highest effort to initiate a plan reaching into many communities for combating mental retardation is under way. Planning work was authorized by a special committee appointed by Governor Connally.

The goal of the committee is to measure the size of the problem, pinpoint available services and accurately forecast needs to treat and prevent retardation. A long-range study is planned under federal grants.

Mental retardation affects 300,000 Texans. Only 8,000 mentally retarded children are born each year, the committee was told.

I learned that there is very little honest joy in doing something you shouldn't be doing. I learned that we have a certain duty to God and to ourselves, and that we can't be happy when we turn our backs on it.

From then on, my Church School attendance was 100%. Now that I'm older, I try to maintain that same record. Sunday means the Church to my family.

Hospital link set up in case of disaster

AUSTIN — A new "hospital zone
support concept" which would link
all Texas hospitals in the event of
a major disaster was unveiled here.

The Texas Medical Association
and the State Advisory Committees
on Health and Medical Aspects of
Civil Defense have set up a state-
wide conference of disaster medical
care directors. They will detail
medical and health disaster plans.

The Texas Hospital Association
initiated the project for the linking
of hospital services and the hand-
ling of casualties.

In October, 1961, the Texas De-
partment of Agriculture, put into
operation such an office to serve
the needs of the farmers and ranch-
ers of Texas. The Market Informa-
tion Service, daily compiles and
disseminates market conditions and
prices on broilers and fryers in
Texas as well as carrying the re-
ports of the other major broiler-
producing states of Missouri, Ar-
kansas, Georgia, Alabama, Missis-
sippi, North Carolina and Louisia-
na. A comprehensive egg report,
covering the entire state with a
break down for prices for each
egg size and analysis of the market
in terms of movement, buying in-
terest and price trend, is being
printed each Tuesday. New York
and Chicago egg prices are report-
ed daily.

In season the Market Information

Longer post office window hours,
expanded delivery services and

coded parcel post speedup are plan-

major new steps he has taken "for
the best Christmas mail service the
Postal Service has ever had:

1. Expanded post office window hours Dec. 5 to 26 as deemed necessary by the local postmaster.
 2. A six-day week Dec. 7-31 for parcel post deliveries, instead of a five-day week.
 3. Completion by Nov. 1 of Phase III of ZIP Code parcel handling at about 130 more "sectional center" post offices (strategically-located mail massing points), providing faster delivery up to 24 hours or more for parcels with ZIP Code.
- In Phase I and II, approximately 75 offices with receipts of \$5 million annually and above activated faster ZIP Code sorting and dispatch by Sept. 1. The 130 in Phase III includes offices with receipts of \$1 to \$5 million.
- In addition, many other sectional center offices with smaller receipts will have the program in operation by early December, in time to help speed delivery of Christmas gifts mailed with ZIP Code.

each Tuesday and has office hours in the courthouse from 9:30 a. m. until noon.

During its existence, FHA has loaned six billion dollars to over two million farm families, Stewart said.

In Garza County alone, since the early 30's, FHA has made 248 loans totaling \$2,228,585, of which 15 loans are now outstanding. Stewart said in these loans FHA has sustained losses of only \$32,528 from 73 families in a 25 year period.

FHA makes its loans to farmers and ranchers of the "family type farm" size. Stewart said. "We believe the family type farm must stay as a vital part of this country's economy," he declared.

Some of the lending programs undertaken by FHA, Stewart said in a quick rundown, includes helping young farmers to get started on a low amount of security, helping established farmers who must get larger, and aiding the farmer or rancher who has had production wiped out by the weather to get going again.

The type loans FHA makes includes operational type loans, farm ownership loans, water development and soil conservation loans, rural housing loans, watershed loans, and emergency loans.

BROWN PATCH CONTROL

Brown Patch, a disease found primarily in St. Augustinegrass, but occurs in Bermuda grass in occurring in some lawns in Post. And homeowners who anticipate the problem are urged to take preventive measures to maintain the natural beauty of their lawns.

Circular patches of brown discoloration can be noted in diseased grass, reports C. Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist, Texas A&M University. These will vary in size from a few square feet to several hundred square feet.

Brown Patch, which occurs in late September and early October, usually affects only the leaves, allowing the turf to recover. However, says Horne, under some conditions the crowns can be killed or weakened to such an extent that they are predisposed to other organisms. If the turf is killed, leaf blades will tend to collapse, giving the affected grass only a sunken appearance.

One can differentiate Brown Patch from some of the other diseases by the fact that the leaves are killed and can be removed easily from the stems. The pathologist explains that dark-colored fungal strands can be observed on water-soaked leaf sheaths when a magnifying glass is used.

Several fungicides are available for preventing the development of this disease, says Horne. PCNB (Tercator) and Acti-dione RZ have given satisfactory control in Texas. Mercury type fungicides are also effective but tend to damage grass when temperatures are high. For best results, be sure to follow directions on the label, advises Horne.

Better results will also be obtained, says the pathologist, if these chemicals are used as pre-

ventives before a serious disease condition develops.

Overwatering should be avoided, especially in the late evening, says Horne, and low spots in the lawn where water may stand should be filled.

SMALL GRAIN SEED NEED PROTECTION

Chemical seed protectants can prevent many disease problems on small grain caused by fungal and bacterial organisms on the seed coat.

With the fall planting season here, Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist, advises growers who save their own seed or buy untreated seed to apply such protectants before planting to insure a vigorous and healthy stand. Most commercial seed companies use a seed treatment.

Seed-borne fungi and bacteria destroy the seed in the soil or attack seedlings as they struggle through the soil. Such diseases are referred to as seedling blights, says Horne, and often result in a significant loss of stand.

Mercury - type seed treatments such as Cerasan and Panigen have been highly effective as protectants for small grain seed. These materials may be applied in a rotary seed treater made from a 50-gal. drum or they may be applied with machinery devised for that purpose.

Some fungi are also borne within the seed and are not affected by chemical treatment. Loose smut of wheat and barley is an example of this type of disease, the pathologist points out. A water-soak method must be used to control this condition.

Most seed - borne diseases of small grain can be inexpensively controlled with chemical seed pro-
