Mexican Consul Gives Out List of Citizens Murdered in Texas

Contest on for Y. M. B. L. Members; Officers Named

The Board of Directors of the Young Men's Business League broke all previous attendance records Friday night when 26 directors and associate directors responded to roll call. The new directors were introduced and welcomed into the work which the directors are doing for the organization.

The election of officers was the first order of business. C. S. Guin was nominated as president, the nomination seconded and a motion made that the nominations close and he be elected by acclamation. Mr. Guin protested against his re-election, but the question was placed and carried by a unanimous rising vote. Mr. Guin now holds the unique distinction of having been elected president of the local organization for three successive years. Roy Reeder was elected first vice-president; and J. J. Beck, second vice-president. Stuart L. Williams was re-elected as secretary, the stamp of approval thus being placed on the accomplishments and policies of the business league during its two years of existence.

An outline program of work was presented to the Board for its consideration, the various projects discussed and the outline referred over to the next meeting, at which time the board members will decide upon the various things which the organization will attempt to put over during the next twelve months.

The combined question of the Runnels County Fair and a city auditorium came in for detailed discussion, several of the directors

REVOKES OPEN PORT LAW ORDER

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 18.—Gov. Neff today issued an order revoking his proclamation lifting the open port law at Sherman and Childress. A decision to leave the law into effect at these places was reached following advice from the rangers there.

The open port law will be lifted today at Amarillo, Dalhart, Gainesville, Texline, and Big Spring. The other towns still remaining under the open port law include Denison, Marshall, Tyler and Palestine.

FRENCH "TIGER" LANDS IN N. Y.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Georges Clemenceau today set foot on United States soil. "The Tiger of France" was visibly impressed by the New York skyline on one side as he entered the harbor, and the Statue of Liberty on the other side. He brings greetings from the French people to America.

Premier Clemenceau left this country more than fifty years ago as a young medical student. He has returned to win for his countrymen the sympathy of America. Thousands of persons awaited him and cheered him when he stepped ashore. Assistant Secretary of State Bliss welcomed him in behalf of President Harding, and invited him to visit the president at Washington. Mr. Clemenceau accepted the invitation with delight.

TEXAS WELL HAS A FISHING JOB

Contractor Graham, who is drilling the well near Paint Rock for the Texas Company, was in Ballinger Saturday. Mr. Graham reported that drilling was off for a short time on account of a little fishing job which he said would not amount to much. The well is down about 1700 feet.

Hits Oil Pocket In Russell Well

"We have something new in the oil game in Texas," said H. Giesecke, president of the Russell Production Company, when he returned from the Russell field at noon Saturday, where he went following a phone message notifying him that oil had been found in the new well.

Mr. Giesecke had reference to the striking of a good showing of oil in the new Russell well at a depth of 260 feet. He stated that drilling would continue until an oil well was brought in and he is banking strong on a good well at this location.

The pocket, or strata of oil, was found in a formation which promises all that the promoters could wish for, according to Mr. Giesecke, and he stated that Mr. Soles, who is in charge of the drilling, said that pay oil might now be found at any time.

The oil which showed up in the well Friday night was sufficient to cover the bit when it was let down in the well. Drilling is continuing on full time, a day and a night crew being on the job.

Puncturing of an oil pocket at a depth of 260 feet in the Russell Production Company's No. 2 well, fifteen miles East of Ballinger, created a renewed spirit of optimism in the oil game here Saturday.

E. A. Giesecke phoned his father H. Giesecke, president of the Russell Production Company, here early Friday night that a good showing of oil was found at the above depth. There were several buckets of the oil, which was declared to be of high grade and similar to that found in the other Russell wells, according to messages received here from the well Saturday.

This is the greatest find of shallow oil so far found in this county, and is similar to the first showings made in the Burk Burnett field before that field was developed. According to oil men, and those in charge of the Russell well, the prospects for striking big production in the present drilling is a hundred to one better than in the first wells.

The new well is going down two miles Southeast of Well No. 1, and the lime formation in the new well which the bit has just passed thru is only 140 feet thick, while in the first well, the drill went thru 700 feet of lime formation.

"Watch me bring in an oil well thru the twelve inch casing," said Contractor Soles in a report to Mr. Giesecke, and Mr. Soles does not seem to be seeking guarantees from anyone. He is as optimistic

over the outlook as though the oil was already gushing over the top. The first well on the Russell ranch was spudded in about five years ago by the Gulf Production Company, and the history of development which has been underway in that field since that time is familiar to all who have been watching the progress in this territory.

The Russell Production Company succeeded the Gulf Production Company and is now drilling its second well, the first well being as good or better than the first well drilled by the Gulf Company which created so much excitement and for a time threatened to start an oil boom here.

Development is underway in Concho county South of the Russell field. The Texas-Meers Company have a well going down, and the Texas Company is drilling near Paint Rock. Geologists have much confidence in the territory where these tests are being made, and judging from the amount of money the larger companies are spending in trying to develop the field they have faith in finding pay oil.

Unless unexpected delays are encountered the Russell Production Company plans to give Runnels county an oil well for a Christmas present. Good time is being made in drilling, and the company has ample capital to complete the test, and is well equipped with tools, casing, etc., for doing the work.

PLANNING FIGHT ADMINISTRATION

APPROVE PUBLIC SCHOOL BOOKS

WACO, Nov. 18.—The report of the committee on text books in public schools was read before the Texas Baptist General Convention today. In the main the books being used were found to be unobjectionable.

The convention also received reports from all the Baptist hospitals and schools.

All of the above were murdered, according to the report compiled by the Mexican consulate, except one, who was wounded.

"In only one or two cases," the consul said, "were the killers brought to trial, and in those a verdict of 'not guilty' was returned."

Continuing to comment on the murder of Mexican nationals, Consul General Ruiz said, "no matter how convincing the evidence might be; no matter how horrible might have been the circumstances under which the crime was committed, the guilty parties are invariably set free by local juries."

New Stock Report Service Started By Government

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—A new livestock reporting service for forecasting current livestock production, marketable supplies and commercial movements has been organized by the Department of Agriculture. The service will cover the Corn Belt and the Western range states and will function through state statisticians already connected with the Department's crop estimate work. The co-operation of many railroads, stockyards, packing plants and producers' organizations for furnishing data as a basis for forecasting has been obtained.

The new service is part of the department's program for collecting and disseminating information bearing upon agriculture, in an effort to influence the organization of the farm business on a sound economic basis. It is believed that statistics on present and prospective livestock production and information of current market movements will enable buyers better to correlate supply with demand, thereby preventing gluts or shortages and the attending fluctuations in prices.

The following reports are proposed, to be issued from time to time: monthly reports on changes in numbers of livestock on farms, semi-annual pig surveys in March and November, monthly reports of receipts and shipments of livestock from the Corn Belt and Western states, monthly reports showing pasture and feed conditions in the range states, the condition of livestock expressed in percentages of normal, and livestock prices on the range in territory distant from markets.

Estimates of the number of cattle on feed will be made December 1st, January 1st and possibly February 1st of each year; the estimates to be confined to areas where cattle are fed for market chiefly in the Corn Belt states. Estimates on Dec. 1 and Jan. 1 will show the number of sheep

and lambs on feed; estimates on March 1 will show the probable spring movement of sheep and lambs from California, Arizona, Kentucky, Tennessee, West Virginia and Virginia. A final report of shipments from these states will be made in July or August.

Estimates will be made of the calf and lamb crop in the range states, the first report to be made about July with final revision on January 1st of each year. Plans for making similar estimates in the Corn Belt states may be developed later. A semi annual estimate of the prospective supply of cattle for spring and fall delivery will be made in February and August.

Other reports will be an estimate of the prospective movement of grass fed cattle from Southern Texas, in February; an estimate of the lamb crop of California in the lamb crop of California and the early lamb crop of Arizona, Idaho and Colorado, in March; a report on the condition of pasture in Kansas Flint Hills and short grass areas, in March and April; an estimate of the prospective movement of grass fed sheep from Western Texas, in March; the grass fed cattle movement from California, in May; the number of cattle which have gone from the Southern states to Oklahoma, Kansas and other Northern pastures, in June; the probable number of fat and feeder lambs available for shipment from Arizona, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico during July and August, in June; the number of grass fed cattle moving to market from Kansas, Oklahoma, Montana, Wyoming, in July; and a report of the calf crop of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, in September.

FOOD INDUSTRY IS NOW LARGEST MANUFACTURE

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The popular conception that the iron and steel industry is the largest single one in the country is declared by Agricultural Department to be erroneous. The greatest industry is that of food manufacturing. It outstrips iron and steel, the department says, as four outstrips one.

As emphasizing the need of additional food control laws, the department calls attention to the great growth in recent times of food manufacturing in factories as against preparation in homes. A few years ago, it says, most food was prepared at home or nearby and since the consumer knew about the conditions of its preparation there was little need for food laws. Today, as so much food is produced and prepared a long way from those who consume it, some sort of government control is regarded by department officers as necessary.

The meat packing industry alone, the department declares, represents a greater value than the steel industry. The total value of manufactured food products, in 1919 was \$13,391,914,000. Among the food products that make up the total, flour mill products stand next to packing house products.

Considering the size of the task the federal inspection of food is low, it was stated. The cost having been less than one-hundredth of 1 per cent of the value of those products. That the job is a large one is shown by census figures noting that in 1919 there were 67,453 establishments engaged in the manufacture of food products with an annual output value at the huge amount mentioned. These figures include manufactured goods only and do not take into account the great volume of commerce in raw foods such as milk, fresh fish, wheat, corn, oats, fruits, and vegetables. To these large amounts must also be added

the food products imported, which in 1921 amounted to \$672,975,000.

C. I. A. GIVES LESSONS ON SCOUT LEADERSHIP

(By Associated Press)

DENTON, Tex., Nov. 18.—A series of lessons will be given soon at the College of Industrial Arts and the Normal College for Scout leadership, under the direction of Miss Pauline Wherry, of the educational staff of the National Council of Girl Scouts.

Sent out by the Scout's National Council, which this year is broadening its educational program under the direction of Dr. Elizabeth Kemper Adams, a trustee of Vassar College, Miss Wherry will later give courses at Rice Institute, Houston; the University of Texas, Austin; and Southern Methodist University, at Dallas.

She is a graduate of the University of Texas and also of the University of Kentucky, and for three years was an instructor in sociology in the latter institution.

U. D. C. TO HELP NEEDY STUDENTS

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 18. The United Daughters of the Confederacy today entered upon the final day of its convention. The convention decided yesterday not to take part at the present time in the proposed Confederate memorial on Stone Mountain, near Atlanta. Individual delegates, however, pledged their support to the plan, following an address by Gutzon Borglum, who will chisel the history of the Confederacy on the mountain.

The convention adopted the educational report authorizing the expenditure of ninety-seven thousand dollars annually in aiding needy students.

G. W. NEWMAN DIES FT. WORTH

A message announcing the death of Rev. G. W. Newman was received by Mrs. Kate Cordill Saturday afternoon. Rev. Newman died in Fort Worth Saturday morning, according to the message, and the remains will arrive at Talpa over the Santa Fe Sunday at noon, and be carried to Glen Cove, where they will be laid to rest Sunday afternoon.

Deceased was one of the pioneers of Runnels county. He came to Ballinger in the early days and for many years lived in South Ballinger and in the city here. He lost his wife several years ago, and most of the time since her death he has been making his home with his children in Fort Worth. He is survived by three children.

Rev. Newman had been in feeble health for some time, but it was not known here that his condition was serious and it is presumed that he died rather suddenly. He was here on a visit a few months ago—early part of the fall, and spent several days here with friends.

Rev. Newman was a member of the Christian church, and while he had not held a regular charge for several years, he frequently filled pulpits in West Texas, and had a wide acquaintance in this section of the state, and especially among the pioneers. He was a Woodman and a Mason.

He will rest by the side of his wife and baby in the Glen Cove cemetery.

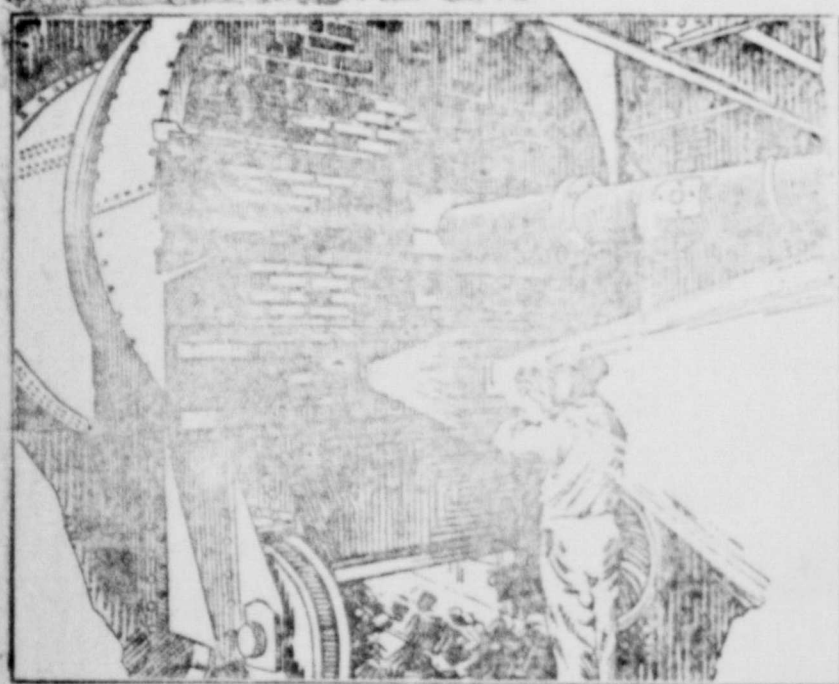

CEMENT IS PRODUCT OF FIERY FURNACE

Fierce Heat Required to Fuse Raw Materials



TREMENDOUS forward strides in American industry have developed in each branch some particular spectacular phase that illustrates graphically this development.

In steel manufacture it is the operation of the open hearth and blast furnace. In the manufacture of glass it is the glass blower who holds the interest. Shipbuilding finds its focal point in the launching of some ocean greyhound. In the manufacture of Portland cement it is the super-heating of finely ground material in gigantic kilns.

Kilns Tall as Twenty-Story Building.

The accompanying illustration shows one end of a kiln used in modern cement plants. In many cases its weight will exceed 275,000 pounds, empty. The foundations that support it are heavy enough to hold a ten-story building. One of the largest kilns, if set on end, would be as tall as a twenty-story office building and a touring car could run through it with room to spare. Not only in massive proportions is

the kiln of interest. A greater degree of heat is required in the operation of these kilns than in most any other industrial process.

"Like Looking at Sun."

Where the materials enter the kiln the temperature is approximately 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit. By the time the powdered material has completed its three-hour journey through the 125 feet or more of brick-lined "furnace," the heat has reached anywhere from 2,500 to 3,000 degrees Fahrenheit.

The workman watching through his peephole in the end of the kiln must wear smoked glasses. It is like looking at the sun. In a large plant a dozen or more of these kilns roar and revolve side by side in one great room. Estimating a single kiln's output at 25 barrels an hour, it would mean that nearly 5,000 pounds of pulverized coal had been blown into it to provide the tremendous heat necessary. It requires 200 pounds of this specially prepared coal to manufacture a single barrel of cement weighing 375 pounds.
