CADDO, Okla., Dec. 15.—Five men held up the Caddo State Bank here shortly before noon today, and escaped in automobiles with approximately \$10,000 in Liberty Bonds and cash. The bandits locked up in the vault fourteen persons who were in the bank when they walked in, then did their work and got away.

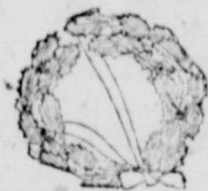

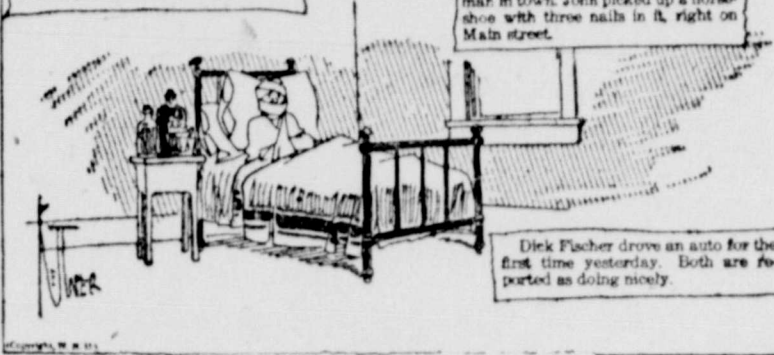

SAN ANGELO MAN MAY ASK FOR KILLED ON HUNT STATE BONUS

Hylton Nason, age 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Nason, of San Angelo, is believed to have been killed while hunting at Stillwater Crossing on the Rio Grande. A message was received at San Angelo Thursday morning, telling of the accident, and while no details were given the message indicated that the young man was either dead or seriously injured.

Young Nason went hunting with two other men about a week ago, according to the San Angelo Standard, and it is presumed that he was accidentally shot.

The boy's father left for Marathon, Texas, from which point the message came, as soon as he received the message, and carried a physician with him in the hope that his son was not dead. All efforts to get further communication from Marathon failed.

The Nason family located in San Angelo about two years ago, coming from Oklahoma, where they own valuable oil lands inherited thru government allotments, Mrs. Nason and her people being Indians.

MEXICANS HURT LABOR CONDITION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Measures to control what is said to be a vast body of alien Mexican unskilled labor in the United States, was recommended to Secretary Davis today, in a report by special agents of the department of labor.

The report sets forth that alien Mexican laborers illegally in the United States are a menace to American labor and American communities. Mexicans have been crossing the border and the Rio Grande and entering Texas illegally until there is an oversupply in that state, and serious results will follow if some steps are not taken to return them to Mexico or control the problem.

Recommendations for meeting the situation include a system of registration and a more rigid mental and physical examination and a system of selective immigration regulation through rigid examination before entry into the United States, and immediate deportation and punishment for entering this country illegally.

The recommendations suggest that such provisions be placed under a "border patrol." Co-operation of state and municipal authorities is also suggested in the enforcement of immigration regulations and judicial distribution of Mexican labor which is legally admitted to this country.

A questionnaire has been submitted to the officers of the Pat Williams Post No. 8, American Legion, to ascertain the will of the local Legionnaires on the introduction of a bill in the next session of the Texas Legislature for adjusted compensation or bonus for men who served in the army, navy and marine corps. The matter will be taken up at the next meeting of the local post, to be held Sunday at 2:00 o'clock p. m. Every effort is being made to have a full representation of the post at this meeting, and the officers urge every American Legion man to be at the hall and with his "buddy."

The state department of the American Legion will compile returns on this vote, and if favorable for the compensation, will see that such measure is offered in both House and Senate. Many new faces will be found in the next Legislature, and it is known that a number of ex-service men were elected. If you are opposed to a bonus, you will be allowed to have your say, and if you favor the measure you will have your say, so be present and vote on this important matter.

Several other matters of vital importance will also be brought up at the next Sunday's meeting of the post, in which each man should have his say, the officers state.

U.S. AMBASSADOR IS CALLED HOME

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—State department officials today confirmed the London announcement that Ambassador George Harvey had been called home. The department officials declined to make any explanation as to the specific questions Secretary Hughes desired to discuss with Mr. Harvey, but the impression gained currency that the ambassador had been called to Washington in connection with the situation as to German reparations which are now threatening a rupture between Great Britain and France.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Ambassador Harvey has been called home for consultation, it was stated at the American embassy this afternoon. He will sail for the United States on December 23rd. Mrs. Harvey will not accompany Mr. Harvey to the United States, leaving the preceding day for a visit to Madeira.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 15.—Walter Phillips, whose car was found abandoned at Cincinnati, Ohio, and which started a search in that city for Clara Phillips, was formerly a brick layer here. It is said that he left here by automobile for New York, and nothing had been heard from him until the abandoned car was discovered.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Dec. 15.—A search here for Mrs. Clara Phillips, Los Angeles escaped "hammer" murderer, was begun today. The search was started following the finding of an abandoned automobile in which was found a certificate of registration issued to Walter Phillips, 1155 Wall Street, Los Angeles.

The machine bore evidence of long hard traveling and had a pool of blood in the rear compartment. The police found a trowel, a hatchet and a hammer, on which were drops of blood, under the rear seat.

GRAPEFRUIT LEAVING RIO GRANDE VALLEY

BROWNSVILLE, Dec. 15.—Five carloads of grapefruit, averaging 250 boxes to the car, will be shipped this season from the five acre citrus orchard of a West Brownsville citizen. The fruiting is bringing \$3 a box on the trees, the picking, grading and packing being done by pickers of the Citrus Exchange.

Grapefruit from the Rio Grande valley is declared to be selling well on all Texas markets, due to the flavor of the fruit.

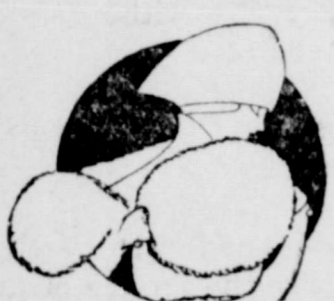

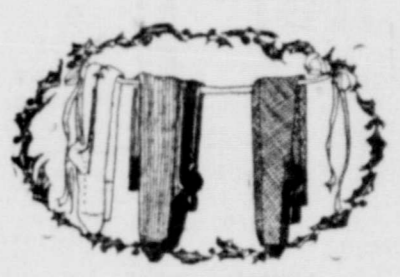

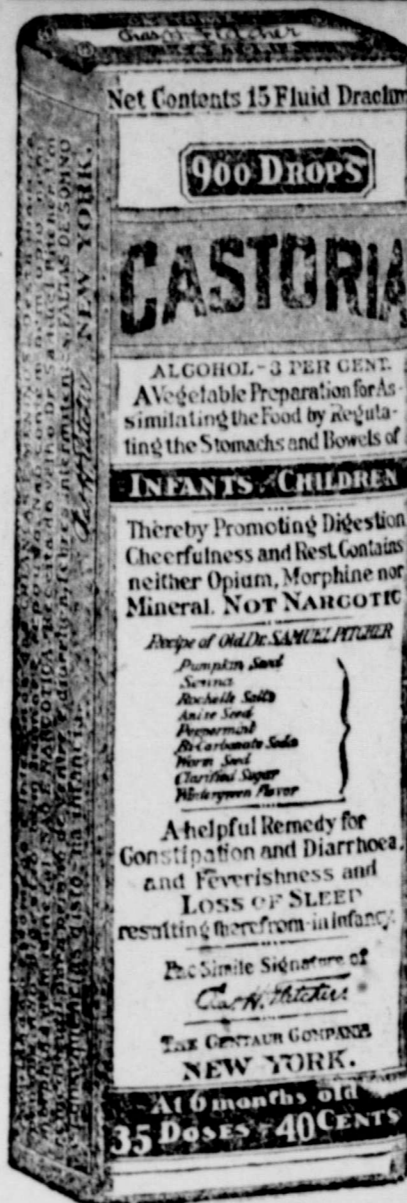
