Contract Let For 2.3 More Miles City Paving Bond Election For Purchase Of Municipal Airport Site Work Starts On Highway 117 Grade From West County Line

ROAD BUILT DUE EAST FROM COUNTY LINE TO NO. 4

W. B. CURL IS SUPERINTENDENT OF CONSTRUCTION; NEW MACHINERY IS IN OPERATION AND GRADE IS BEING PUT UP

Construction work on the permanent grade of highway 117 from the Hansford county line to a distance of 17.9 miles was started on Tuesday week, the work being put under the supervision of W. B. Curl, an experienced highway builder. A detour route due east from the highway to No. 4 has been built to accommodate the work.

Work on the highway is being done by the county line and is to be completed by the end of the month. The new highway specifications are to be thirty-six feet wide to crown with a four-foot shoulder on each side. The bottom bar pit, drop pit and extending out to a gradual back slope of five feet on the one hundred foot

county road building was completely overhauled and much new machinery, including a big power take-off, a very capable man, and a direct supervisor, state resident engineer P. S. Bailey, state director, one of the county will be the finisher of the work and will work the two big tractors and other machinery that was put up for the purpose of road building.

County Tax Valuation Is \$5,739,610 For 1930

Valuation placed on property for taxation purposes, according to the report of the assessor, is \$5,739,610 for 1930, an increase of \$304,500 over the valuation of \$5,435,110 for 1929. The valuation was made against 581,404 acres of land in the county, which is \$2,400 less than in 1929, while city real estate shows an increase of \$79,540 and personal property an increase of \$67,350 in valuation. According to the rolls, a total of \$102,100.36 in taxes has been assessed for county, state and county school purposes. Of this total the state part is \$39,603.64. Ochiltree county will come in for \$51,556.59 while the county schools, outside of the Perryton Independent School district and the Huttoon Independent School district, will get the remaining \$10,840.12.

Jones has been working in the Panhandle with various county agents for the past month and expects to be in this territory for another month before returning to College Station.

WILL VOTE ON \$12,000 ISSUE NOVEMBER 22

Citizens Present Petition To City Council Asking For Bond Election

To Be Municipal Airport

Bonds To Be Used For Purchase Of 160-Acre Tract And Improving Same

At the meeting of the city council on Tuesday evening, the council acting on a petition presented, called an election to be held on Saturday, November 22, for the purpose of voting on the proposition of issuing city bonds, bearing five per cent interest, to the amount of \$12,000 for the purpose of purchasing land for a municipal airport and for improving same. The bonds to be voted on are payable serially, the first bond in the amount of \$1,000 to be paid February 1, 1932, the remainder at the rate of \$1,000 each year, the last being due and payable in 1943.

Geo. M. Perry has been named as presiding officer of the election which will be held at the city hall. His assistant judges are C. E. McLarty and Abe Green. The site to be purchased in event the bonds carry is 150 acres out of the Geo. Norris quarter, adjoining the city limits on the east. It is ideally located for an airport, being close to town, no close-in hazards, and level as a floor. The land at the present time is under contract of sale to Judge Geo. M. Perry. Mr. Perry purchased the land at the very reasonable figure of \$60.00 per acre, in order that the city could be assured of securing the location. He will turn the land to the city at no profit. The former owners, Mr. and Mrs. Norris, made the low price to the city for the reason that they were interested in seeing an airport secured.

It is thought that there will be little or no opposition to the issuance of these bonds. The Chamber of Commerce is behind the movement, the Lions Club is very much interested in aviation, the American Legion will back the airport to a man, and practically every citizen of Perryton realizes that no town is complete in this modern day without a well equipped landing field. The day of the hitch rack is gone, we now have our modern parking problems, but in the near future, it will be landing fields. Let's get ready! Vote for the airport bonds.

BRINGS TOTAL OF CITY PAVING TO SEVEN AND ONE-HALF MILES

MAIN STREET TO BE EXTENDED TO LAKE ON SOUTH; BRILLHART AVENUE TO CITY LIMITS ON BOTH EAST AND WEST TO HIGHWAY

The Lacy Paving Company, Dallas, Texas, was awarded the contract at the meeting of the city council last Thursday for the construction of 2.3 miles of additional paving within the city limits of Perryton. The paving is to be of brick on six inch, two course caliche base, same type as now being laid in the residence district. This new contract brings the total amount of paving in Perryton to seven and one-half miles.

INCH AND HALF RAIN RECEIVED

HEAVIER IN SOME SECTIONS OF COUNTY; FAIRLY GENERAL OVER PANHANDLE

The first general rain in several weeks, fell over Ochiltree county and the entire Panhandle country last Saturday evening, measuring 1.48 inches in Perryton, and varying to some degree over this section, some parts reporting a much heavier fall.

During the week much damage has been reported in the extreme western part of the Panhandle and in eastern New Mexico and Colorado and in western Oklahoma and Kansas from heavy downpours which have caused all streams to rise out of normal bounds and have caused loss to railway and wagon bridges throughout this section.

Rail traffic over section of the Ft. Worth & Denver, Rock Island and Santa Fe lines has been at a standstill but practically all lines report the damage repaired and normal traffic resumed at this date. Many bridges over the Beaver, Canadian and Cimarron rivers have been washed away or damaged.

Poultry Dates Changed

T. D. Moss, secretary of the North Plains Poultry Show, has announced that the annual show will be held in Perryton on December 15-16-17-18. Youth Dies In Hospital From Accident Injuries

Loyal McCammond, age 19, was fatally injured last Wednesday night at about 8:00 o'clock when the light coupe he was driving turned over on a curve on Highway 117, a mile east of Huttoon, breaking his neck. A passing motorist pulled the boy from the wreckage and took him to Booker where he was given medical attention and rushed to the hospital at Beaver where he died at 5:30 o'clock Monday morning.

McCammond is quite well known in Perryton and this community, having been employed during the summer at a Huttoon elevator and working for his uncle, J. L. Hurter, during the fall.

The lad was on his way to Booker and was traveling at a high rate

of speed. He applied his brakes at the curve and it is thought that they locked, throwing the car into the ditch where it rolled over three times, breaking McCammond's neck. A few minutes after the boy was taken from the wrecked car, it burst into flames.

McCammond regained consciousness in the hospital and told of the accident and it was thought that he might recover. He was awake less than two hours before his death, stating that he felt better, but he dropped back to sleep from which he never rallied.

The body was taken to Hopewell, Kans., for burial, funeral services being held there on Wednesday morning. McCammond's mother lives at Pritchett, Colo.

Large Valuation In The Independent School Dist.

Over half the acreage in Ochiltree county is included in the Perryton Independent School district according to the tax rolls, assessment being made against 318,150 acres, valued at \$7,030,110. City real estate is next in the valuation list with a total of \$1,926,100 with personal property set at \$1,837,990.

The total taxable valuation of the district amounts to \$10,793,200 according to the rolls. Based on this valuation a total tax of \$80,920.38 has been assessed against the property.

Adding this total tax to the amount collected by the Huttoon Independent School district and by the county schools, it brings the total to nearly a hundred thousand dollars, devoted to school purposes in Ochiltree county.

AUTOGIRO
Before the gas engine was invented, before anybody had ever believed the airplane possible, Thomas A. Edison invented a flying machine which was to be lifted into the air by a horizontal windmill propeller. The power derived from a series of gun-cotton explosions.

The other day Mr. Edison saw James Ray and James Faulkner land at New York after a flight from Philadelphia in a machine they called an "autogiro" which, except for the engine, was just like the early Edison dream. It is entirely possible that the autogiro, which can rise vertically, land "on a dime" and fly as slow as 20 miles or as fast as 115 miles an hour will be the airplane of the future.

LONDON
The municipality of London is still the largest city in the world, with 7,849,000 population, compared with New York's 1930 Census figure of 6,981,927. But in the area known as "circled New York" the territory included in a radius of 19 miles from the City Hall, which takes in part of New Jersey and of three New York counties not included in the city proper, there is a population about 1,400,000 greater than in the so-called "London traffic area" which extends nearly thirty miles from the center of London.

Contrary to the general idea, the average height of buildings in London is higher than in New York. The many huge skyscrapers, rising from 30 to 60 stories, in New York, and counter-balanced by the tens of thousands of buildings only three or four stories high. London has only two or three buildings more than seven stories high, but very few under five stories. The London County Council recently refused an application for permission to build a new hotel ten stories tall, and fixed nine stories as the limit.

FOOD
Food fads and faddists cost the American farmer millions of dollars a year, according to Henry Stude, president of the American Bakers Association. Mr. Stude's organization is trying to get people to go back to the habit of eating bread—not whole wheat bread or Graham

bread or any kind of "health" bread but just ordinary white bread. There is a good deal in the suggestion that many persons have been frightened away from bread by the idea that it is fattening.

The craze for slenderness is not confined to women; men have been taught that fat is dangerous. The real danger is in not eating enough nutritive food to supply the necessary bodily energy.

"Eat what's set before you," was the rule for children when I was a boy. It is still a good rule. Most of us can digest anything and the wider our range of diet the more healthy we are likely to be.

WHEAT
In every state but Georgia the August price of corn was higher than the price of wheat. Such a state of things occurs only once in a long time, wheat usually being the highest-priced grain. This year there is a big wheat surplus and a short corn crop.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Federal Farm Board are advocating using the wheat surplus to feed livestock. It is figured that the food value of wheat is so much higher than that of corn that with corn at a dollar a bushel the farmer can afford to pay \$1.12 for wheat for feeding.

Many farmers have reported their experience for feeding wheat in the past, for cattle, hogs and poultry, with uniform satisfaction. Some say that it fattens hogs faster than corn does.

It would be strange if wheat should become the stock farmer's mainstay as well as the backbone of human diet.

RAILROADS
George Gould's ambition was to own a railroad system which would stretch from the Atlantic to the Pacific. He died with the ambition unfulfilled. E. H. Harriman, James J. Hill and Commodore Vanderbilt failed in their similar efforts. The Canadian Pacific and the Canadian National systems run from coast to coast in Canada, but only this year the first system under one control to cover the whole United States was completed.

In 1916 the Van Sweringen Brothers of Cleveland wanted a right of way for a trolley line to their real estate development, Shaker Heights. They could get it only by buying the Nickel Plate railroad, which they did mostly on credit. That gave them a line from Buffalo to Chicago and soon they were up to their ears in the railroad business. Now, after 14 years, they control also the Erie, the Chesapeake & Ohio, the Rock Island, the Pere Marquette, Wheeling & Lake Erie, Chicago & Eastern Illinois and Missouri Pacific.

Their 18,000 miles of road is the largest railroad system in the United States. It is capitalized at \$800,000,000 and valued at over two billions.

That is going a long way in 14 years.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Since scientists discovered that the health producing substances called vitamins come from sunlight, careful studies of the effect of the sun's rays upon livestock, as well as human beings, have been made by the Department of Agriculture. It seems to be proved that exposure to the direct rays of the sun not only keeps animals healthy but pays in other ways. Hens lay better when they have plenty of sunshine; hogs and sheep and beef cattle assimilate their food better and take on weight more rapidly; moreover, parasites and diseased germs do not multiply so freely under the rays of the sun as they do in darkness.

The part of the sunlight which carries the health giving vitamins is the short rays which are invisible to the eye, known as the ultra-violet rays. The problem of exposing domestic animals to these ultra-violet rays in the winter is a difficult one, because these rays do not pass through ordinary window glass, and in most sections of the United States shelter from the cold is more important than exposure to the sun.

ultra-violet rays pass through. If this can be accomplished, at a cost which will not be prohibitive, the progressive farmer of the future will build his barns and poultry houses with the south front of the buildings entirely of glass, like a hot-house, so that his livestock will at once be protected from the weather and exposed to every available bit of winter sunshine.

The United States Bureau of Standards has been making thorough tests of all the different kinds of glass so far produced with this end in view. One manufacturer, according to Dr. W. W. Coblenz of the Bureau of Standards, has succeeded in making glass which will let upward of 60 per cent of the ultra-violet rays pass through, and will not deteriorate with time. All of the other kinds of glass which let the ultra-violet rays through lose their quality, because of the presence of a minute quantity of iron in the glass. Only one manufacturer so far has learned how to eliminate all traces of iron.

As yet this new glass is too expensive for general use costing about \$2.00 a square foot, or about six times the price of ordinary window glass. It seems probable, however, that with increased use and larger production the cost will be materially reduced. Even at the present price, experiments which have been made indicate that the use of ultra-violet glass may be profitable, its cost being more than offset by increased egg production, speedier fattening of hogs and cattle, and, for its use in greenhouses and hot-beds offers an opportunity to grow green stuff and small fruits in the coldest regions of the year round; for it is the ultra-violet rays which give life and vigor to vegetation as well as to animals.

Of course, the same ultra-violet rays which keep livestock healthy and promote vegetable growth are equally beneficial to human beings. Hospitals, sanitariums and winter resort hotels are now beginning to enclose sun rooms with ultra-violet glass through which direct sunlight can reach the bodies of patients and visitors.

Direct exposure to the rays is essential, but the time will come when skylights or verandas enclosed with this glass will be generally regarded as an essential feature of every up to the date home, so that every member of the household can get his or her daily quota of the life-giving ultra-violet rays.

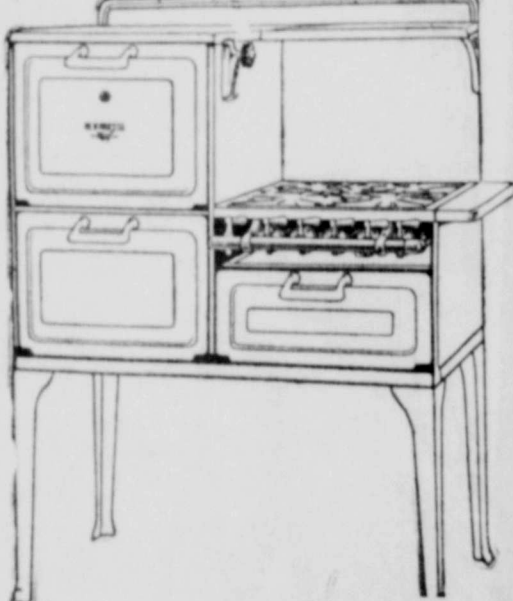

every business house and every home. will be made, also workers will visit every rural school and community in the county. The Red Cross is a work to which all should subscribe, not just the business men up and down Main Street.

The objective of the drive this year is to obtain sufficient funds to hire a Red Cross nurse to work in the schools for at least two or three months. This nurse would serve every school in the county. But to do this and carry on the other Red Cross work, it is necessary that a considerable fund be raised.

There is some misunderstanding about the Red Cross memberships.

Many people think that fifty per cent of every membership goes for national and international purposes. This is not the case as only fifty cents of each membership goes to the parent body, the remainder of the money staying at home for local Red Cross work. An annual membership is \$1.00, fifty cents going to national; contributing membership is \$5.00, only fifty cents, however, leaving the local treasury. The same is true of the \$10.00 sustaining membership and the \$25.00 supporting membership. Annual memberships costing \$1.00 can be taken out, and then any additional amount can be donated, all of the donation going to the home organization.

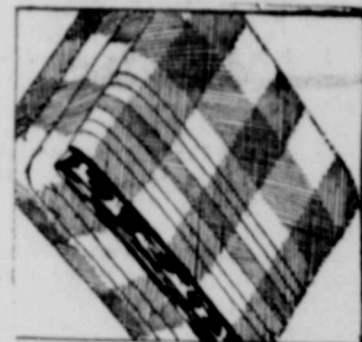
