Drilling To Start Friday on Oil Test

Drilling is scheduled to start Friday on the E. L. Wilson No. 1, oil test staked in the center of the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 45, Block M, E. L. & R. R. Ry company survey in Dawson county, on land owned by the Texas Land & Mortgage Co.

The Derrick has been completed and tools and supplies are on the grounds and the crew is ready to start. Only a few minor arrangements must be made before the drilling starts. A rotary rig is to be used and the well is expected to be drilled to the required depth in less than two months.

The new test is located about a mile and a quarter southeast of the Albaugh Robinson No. 1, discovery well in this territory, and is approximately 12 miles northwest of Lamesa.

Trading in leases and royalties has been rather brisk in this county since the staking of the Wilson test and it is rumored that several other tests are to be started in the near future.

The new test will be watched with considerable interest by the oil fraternity as it is located in strictly wildcat territory. Many major companies have considerable acre under lease in the immediate vicinity of the well and if the well happened to be brought in as a producer, this section of the state would probably see an important oil boom.

Much Interest Shown In Fair Organization

Much interest is being shown in the proposed permanent fair organization for Dawson county. Previously it has been necessary to resort to temporary organizations for holding the fairs each fall. This inadequate method of sponsoring and promoting a fair has impressed the people of Dawson county with the need for a permanent organization, consequently plans have been made to effect a permanent organization for the county and a non-profit fair corporation is proposed which involves a capital stock of \$5000 divided into 200 non-assessable shares at \$25.00 per share.

The suggestion for a permanent fair organization came to the officers of last year's organization from numerous sources from over the county and business men in Lamesa that we improve the fair facilities by organizing a permanent fair association and provide an adequate plant for holding successful fairs each year. A fair organization should be an important institution in the development of any agricultural section and since there is no better agricultural section than we have right here in Dawson county the need for an organization such as the proposed one is strongly felt. This association will be for the service of the people of Dawson county and surrounding territory and is not for the benefit of any individual but purely for the development of our entire territory and for that reason the temporary officers are seeking the support and encouragement of all the people in the county.

It is necessary to perfect our organization as soon as possible in order that definite plans can be made for our annual fair this fall and nothing means more to the success of a fair than to start early. Last year our fair made a gross return of \$2300 and the fair in general was declared a success, but if we had had better facilities and had made plans earlier it would have made a bigger success.

We may all get behind this fair organization and put it over in grand style for nothing will mean more for the development of agriculture and diversified farming than a good fair association.

Ballard School Destroyed By Fire

MAV COOPERATE WITH BOTH SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE AND 1937 FARM PROGRAM

Some Dawson county farmers seem to be of the opinion that conflicts in regulations between the Soil Conservation Service and the 1937 Agricultural Conservation Program may prevent their cooperation with both programs.

In no case is it possible for a co-operator in the 1937 farm program to be prevented from getting his reduction payments on cotton and feed by carrying out any of the practices which are advocated by the Soil Conservation Service through their local CCC camp.

In cases where terraces are constructed on a farm and the complete job is done with Soil Conservation Service equipment and labor, no payment will be made for such soil-building allowance for the farm. The soil-building allowance amounts to one dollar per acre for the acres reduced from cotton or feed crops. Therefore the farmer will incur a loss of payment on the terracing only.

Another legislative week has drawn to a close. It has been a hard week for the House of Representatives. Several major issues have been disposed of this week. I will mention most of the major projects briefly.

The House of Representatives passed my bill creating a new hospital for the insane in West Texas. The vote was 110 for the bill with no vote against it. The passage of the bill was not as easy as the vote indicates. I have worked on the bill nearly every day this session, contacting every member personally, and finally erasing all the opposition to the bill before bringing it to a vote. The hospital will cost \$817,000 and care for 540 inmates. It is to be located west of the 100th meridian. The hospital will be increased from year to year until it will house 3,000 inmates when finally completed in about ten years at a cost of some three to four million dollars with an annual payroll and maintenance of half a million dollars. This is the most important state institution created since the creation of Texas Technological College.

The House of Representatives passed H. B. 43 which liberalizes the Old Age Assistance Law to some extent. It cuts out the provision of the old law that forced the investigators to take into their consideration the financial condition of the old person's children before granting the pension as to whether or not the children could care for their parents.

The House of Representatives passed H. B. 4 which places an increase on the franchise tax of all corporations doing business in Texas. It is estimated by the sponsors of this bill that it will bring an additional two million dollars of revenue into the state treasury.

The House has passed four tax bills, including a six cent oil tax, four percent natural gas tax, a \$1.28 per ton tax on sulphur, and the franchise tax mentioned above. Up to now the Senate has refused to consider any of them in any way. If we are to have additional taxes that are needed the Senate must act at once on the above bills.

The House of Representatives Tuesday passed H. B. 600 which is an emergency appropriation for Rural Education. By my previous articles on this item appearing on March 26th, I did not intend to pick an argument with anyone interested in schools or otherwise. It seems that one county superintendent did not like my article as shown by his letter appearing in the Anton News of April 2nd, stating that I had misrepresented the facts in my article.

I have many letters in my file from school officials stating that they thought the Rural Aid Fund was exhausted and they were glad to hear that it was not.

My figures as to the fact that it would take \$500,000 to pay 87 percent of the grants this year was not too low in fact they were too high as shown by the sub-committee in recommending that \$500,000 would pay 87 percent

of all grants this year and pay \$137,000 of the high school tuition for the school year of 1935-36, bringing all the High school tuition for last year up to the 87 percent. My figures as you can see were high \$77,000, and not low as some have tried to indicate.

The House of Representatives decided to pay the full 100 percent of this year's grants for all rural purposes. It will take \$1,080,000 to do this and that amount was in the bill passed. The amount of \$1,900,000 was in the bill introduced and the above is the amount some officials said was necessary, but that amount was not necessary by some \$820,000.

This new appropriation of over a million dollars was made necessary because the Superintendent of Public Instruction did not follow the law stating that ten million dollars was all that would be available for Rural Aid this year. There is almost unanimous belief among members of the House of Representatives that the Rural Aid has not been administered properly. This is borne out in the fact that H. B. 600 was amended so as to appoint five members of the Legislature to see that the new appropriation is administered properly by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The bill also provided by an amendment for \$3,000 to provide for an audit of the funds spent in the last two years from the Rural Aid Fund to be audited by the State Auditor.

After additional information came to light Thursday following the passage of the bill the House of Representatives by a vote of 112 for, voted to investigate the expenditure of the Rural Aid Fund by the Department of Education. Charges were made that the fund has been used for the purpose of furthering political campaigns. The investigation committee is composed of Bowen Bond, Fairfield, as chairman; Howard Dawson, Rotan; Penrose Metcalfe, San Antonio; Marvin London, Montague; and Alfred Patch of Fredericksburg. They will also check into the activities of a school association headed by the former Senator Julian Greer of Elkhart, Texas.

I think it is the opinion of nearly every member of the legislature that Rural Education should be supported to the full extent of the need. Likewise it is their opinion that when the State of Texas appropriates money for Rural Education they want the money to go to the rural schools. I know that is my opinion.

The encampment is usually held in July, but to give the club members a chance to meet Miss Hill, let's change the date so she can be with us. The exact date will be announced later. The encampment will last one day and one night and each member will be charged a small fee of 15 cents each to take care of incidentals.

Farm Program Explained

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON THE 1937 FARM PROGRAM

QUESTION: Why should an operator sign a Work Sheet for 1937 even if he does not intend to comply?

ANSWER: The operator should sign first, because it is possible to earn a payment without making any reduction from the cotton and feed bases; second, because weather conditions, crop failure, and other conditions over which he has no control may place him in position to get a payment; third, because no payment can be made to an operator unless the farm is covered by a work sheet before the time limit expires; fourth, he might earn a payment without knowing that he is doing so; and fifth, because there is no obligation connected with signing a work sheet.

QUESTION: What is the least reduction from the base acreage of feed or cotton for which a diversion payment will be made?

ANSWER: A payment will be made for a reduction of one acre or more from either the cotton or feed base.

QUESTION: Can an operator change his cropping plans after signing the work sheet?

ANSWER: Yes, the operator is not in any way bound by the cropping acreages he gives at the time he signs, and he will be paid on the basis of the measurements of his crops.

QUESTION: How can an operator avoid penalties and earn full payment for his diverted or reduced acreage?

ANSWER: By planting the diverted acreage to a soil conserving crop or by carrying out one of the approved soil-conserving practices on his diverted acreage.

QUESTION: What is the rate of payment for diversion from the cotton base on any farm?

ANSWER: Reduction from the cotton base will be paid for at the rate of five cents (5c) per pound on the adjusted yield for every acre reduced in 1937.

QUESTION: What is the rate of payment for diversion from the general (feed) base acreage?

ANSWER: The rate of payment has not been fixed for Dawson county, but it is assumed that the rate will not be materially different from the seven dollars (\$7.00) per acre figure for 1936. Payment will be made at the rate to be fixed for every acre reduction from the base which is in excess of the requirements for home use.

QUESTION: What is meant by "the acreage for home use"?

ANSWER: The acreage for home use means that acreage of feed crops necessary to maintain all the people and work stock on the farm. There will be

no payment for reduction below this acreage which is figured on basis of the number of bushels grain sorghum required for each head of work stock and to supply each person with food.

QUESTION: What are the requirements for a farm to be covered by a Work Sheet in 1937?

ANSWER: All crop land covered by a work sheet in 1937 shall have had a crop harvested from the crop land since 1930 and prior to 1937.

QUESTION: What shall the operator do with land which has been placed in cultivation in 1936 or 1937 and has never had a crop harvested from it?

ANSWER: If the new land has been added to the farm in 1936 or 1937 and has never produced a crop it must be planted to a soil-conserving crop just as diverted land in order to avoid penalty. If soil-depleting crops exceed either or both the cotton and general (feed) bases the penalties will reduce the payments and even prevent the operator from getting any payment. In order to avoid penalties it must be treated the same as reduced land.

QUESTION: What would the operator gain by putting in the new land, and how could a base be established on it?

ANSWER: The operator would gain nothing except whatever grading value such new land might have for 1937. By planting it to soil-conserving crops in 1937 the land would in 1938 be classified as cropland and the community committee could take it into consideration when the bases are established for 1938.

QUESTION: Would the bases established for new land be taken off the base acreage of other farms in the community?

ANSWER: Not necessarily because the total base acreage of cotton and general (feed) crops established by the County Committee for any community, and established by the State Committee, for any county, varies in accordance with the total acreage of crop land covered by the Work Sheets and an increase of the crop land signed up would bring a proportionate increase in both base acreages.

QUESTION: When will the bases in acreages and yields be established for any farm in this county?

ANSWER: Bases will be finally established in this county for every farm as soon as the sign-up is complete. The County Quota for 1937 was received from the state office this week.

QUESTION: What are grain sorghums?

ANSWER: The grain sorghums most commonly produced in Dawson county are milo and hegari.

QUESTION: How are Grain Sorghums planted in rows classified?

ANSWER: Grain Sorghums in rows are in all cases classified as soil-depleting and will not count as diverted land even if left on the land and plowed under.

QUESTION: How are Grain Sorghums planted broadcast or seeded (drilled in rows not over 16 inches apart) classified?

ANSWER: Grain Sorghums seeded solid or broadcast and all the crop left on the land is classified as soil-conserving and will count as diverted (reduced) land.

QUESTION: What are sweet sorghums?

ANSWER: The most common sweet sorghum planted here is cane such as

red top, amber, orange, and ribbon cane. A sweet sorghum may be planted in rows and count as reduced land if all the crop is left on the land.

QUESTION: What is the classification of 100 acres of sudan planted on rented acres if the sudan is grazed and wheat planted in the fall of 1937 for harvest in 1938?

ANSWER: The 100 acres will be classified as soil-conserving and earn the diversion (reduction) payment, but will not earn the \$100 per acre soil-building payment. The wheat will be

harvested in 1938 and therefore will not be considered in 1937. Regardless of the use to be made of wheat planted in the fall of 1937 it will not be considered in 1937.

MATERNAL DEATHS CAN BE AVOIDED SAYS DOCTOR

Austin, April 13.—In Texas during 1936, 700 mothers lost their lives through childbirth and associated conditions. Fatality struck 8,000 babies under one year of age with 4,000 more stillborn. On a national basis the figures reached the tragic total of nearly 85,000. These facts become particularly distressing when it is realized that at least two-thirds of this motherhood penalty could have been avoided, states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Never before in the history of obstetrics have scientific precautions against complications been so advanced and so available as they are today. However in spite of the improvement in the techniques involved and the further development of antiseptic control, the maternal mortality figures pathetically indicate that medical knowledge alone cannot solve the problem.

"Generally speaking, innocent or wilful neglect is largely responsible for the preventable maternal deaths. It is to be emphasized that the proper time for expectant mothers to seek medical attention is when the expectancy is first realized.

"Indeed, prenatal care is the great defense against many of the conditions that cause tragedy at birth. Consequently, expectant mothers should place themselves under the supervision of a physician at the beginning of the term. If this fundamental safety rule should be adopted more generally, the present maternal mortality toll could be markedly diminished.

"As one authority aptly states, 'To cut the appalling maternity death rate

thoughtful and cooperative initiative must originate in the home.' In other words, science has done its part, now the prospective mothers must do theirs."

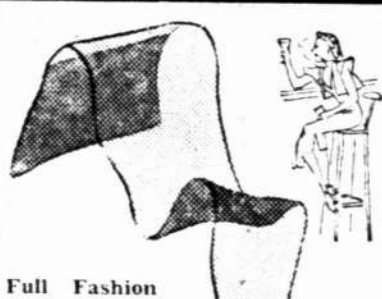

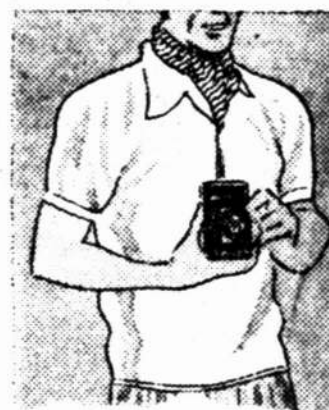
