content. Skin should be thin and fine textured, and the fruit should be firm.

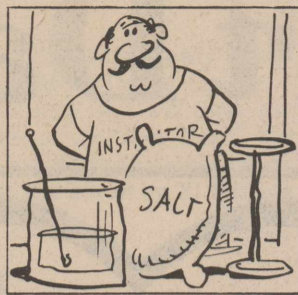
- Do you look for specials on baked goods? Day-old baked products, especially breads and rolls are easily revived with toasting or re-warming in the oven. They are often sold at half price.

that offer something better or different? For example, new Super Mott's Prune Juice contains 10 percent more prune solids than required by U.S. government regulations.

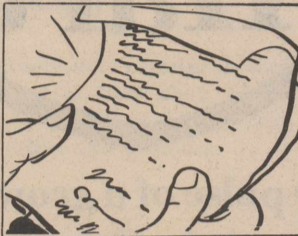

A rehearsal dinner was hosted Friday night at the community room in Munday by the groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack George.

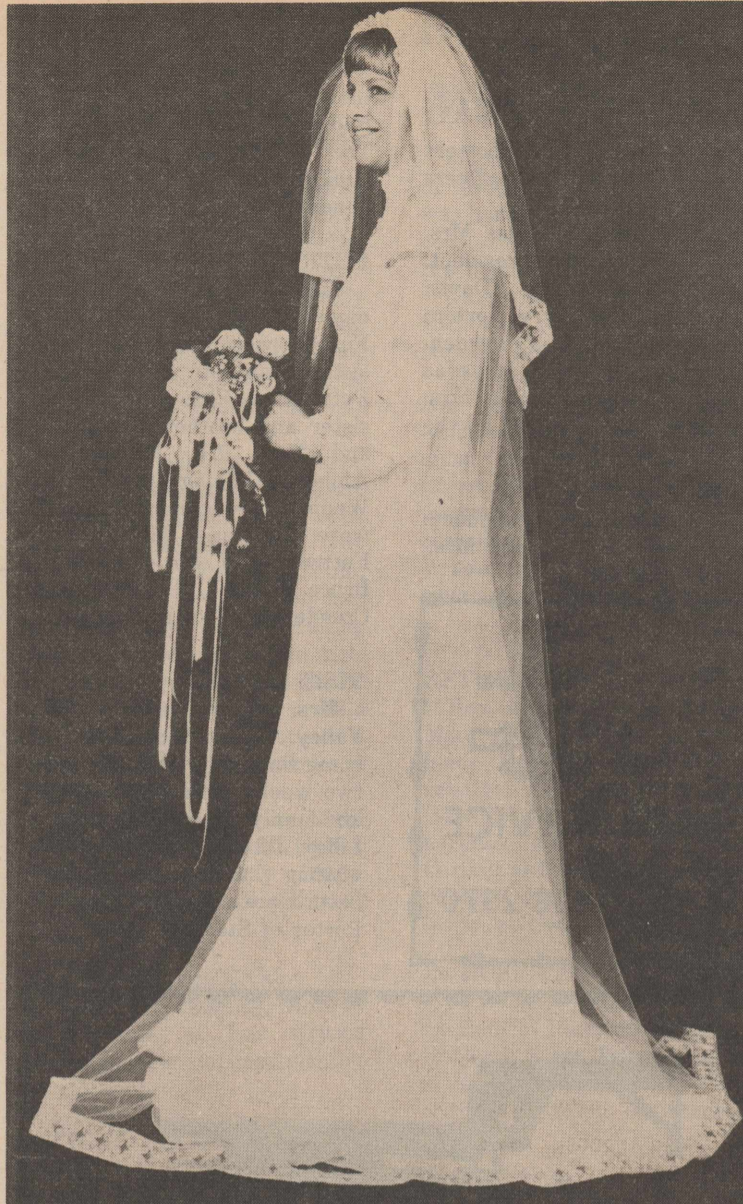

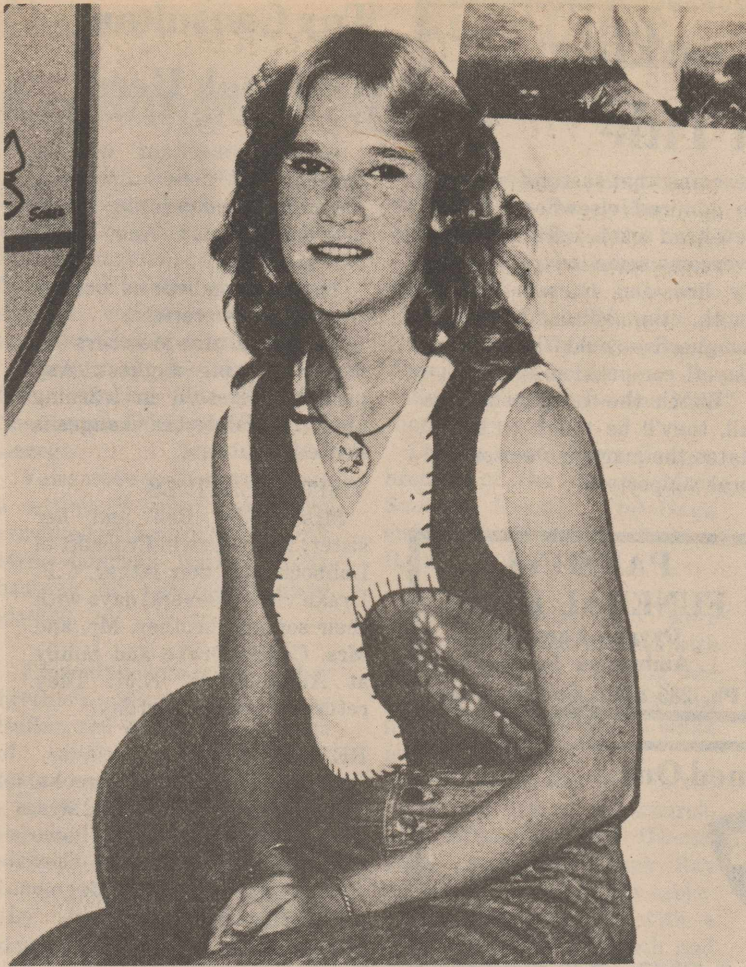

CHEESE PUFFS

2 c grated natural sharp cheese

1 1/4 c flour
1/2 t salt
1 t paprika
48 small stuffed olives

Blend cheese with margarine. Stir in flour, salt and

paprika. Mix well. Wrap 1 t dough around each olive. Arrange on flat pan. Freeze then put in plastic bag to store in freezer. When ready for use remove from bag and place on cookie sheet. Bake 15 minutes at 400 degrees. Makes 48.

Melt 2 pkg. Butterscotch Morsels. Add 1 T peanut butter. Two 25 cent cans shoestring potatoes. 1 c chopped pecans. Spoon on wax paper and chill.

FRICASEE PHEASANT

Cut in serving pieces
Roll in seasoned flour
Brown slowly on both sides in 1/2 c hot grease, turn only once. Add 1 c milk, cover tightly, bake in slow oven (325 degrees) until tender, about 1 hour. Make gravy from drippings.
