County Fair Awards.
The Roosevelt County Union Fair opened up Thursday, Sept. 13, with a spirit of admiration and pride seemed to parade the excellence of one and all at the successful opening of the first Roosevelt county Fair.

The exhibits were all, even the least well worthy the efforts put forth by those who were instrumental in getting the display arranged and in shape. The consensus of opinion was that no better display could be made in the old states or county fairs.

There were several beautifully arranged collections that deserve special mention. W. T. Whitlatch had two cones about six feet high, one of corn the other maize. J. B. Wade had maize arranged on the wall of the house diamond shaped. J. P. Dent, an old citizen soldier over 70 years of age had an artistically arranged cone of different kinds of produce, 13 varieties. Next in space was Vel Smith "As seen on his farm."
