Harris died Saturday morning in Plains Memorial Hospital after suffering an apparent heart attack. He was born Aug. 21, 1916 in Wellington. A veteran of World War II, he was a member of the Sunnyside

NFO 'Hog Lift' Ships 900 Hogs

Approximately 900 hogs were shipped from Plainview last weekend to a packer about 300 miles away in the first Texas National Farmers Organization "hog lift."

Farmers from nine counties brought their market-ready hogs to the Plainview collection point where they received "top market price with no shrink taken."

NFO negotiated many cotton contracts last fall, spokesmen say, and were able to pay farmers "top" price for their cotton. They are now contracting farmers and signing contracts for the 1971 cotton crop.

Four Rural Accidents Investigated In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of January, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no injuries.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock DPS Region for January, 1971 shows a total of 467 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 235 persons injured as compared to January, 1970 with 460 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed

and 188 persons injured.

During the year 1970, Lubbock County had 485 traffic accidents, ranking second to Parker County's 567 traffic accidents.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of January, 1971 occurred in the following counties: Lubbock, 4; Wise, 3; Hutchinson, 2; and Clay, Palo Pinto, Parker, Terry, Wichita, Childress, Potter and Sherman with one each.

Day Hospital Service Slated

A new service is being offered the people of this nine county area.

Beginning Feb. 15, a Day Hospital designed for those patients who need to learn to use their daytime hours constructively and to participate in group treatment, will begin to function.

The Day Hospital will serve as a transition between the physician's office (or hospital) and the patient's home, and will help the patient make his or her way back into the community.

The program offered will be beneficial to emotionally distressed individuals, those who have been hospitalized for an extended period, and long term state hospital patients.

Treatment can also serve patients whose psychiatric disorder has decreased ability to function on the job or at home; causes grossly inappropriate behavior; or causes difficulty distinguishing reality from what they feel is happening to them.

Day Hospital will attempt to treat irregular behavior by providing short term, intensive, reality oriented interaction with others. As his behavior becomes more appropriate, the patient finds increased acceptance, meaningful interaction with others and improved self-esteem which will enable him to return to a more normal daily living routine.

The program will begin at 8:30 a. m. and continue until 3:15 three days each week for six weeks.

Each patient will provide his own transportation and will need to bring a sack lunch.

The cost per week is \$30, payable in advance, plus the cost of supplies that patient uses, arrangements to be made with the business manager. There will be no discrimination as to color, race, creed, age or sex of applicants.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.

"(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

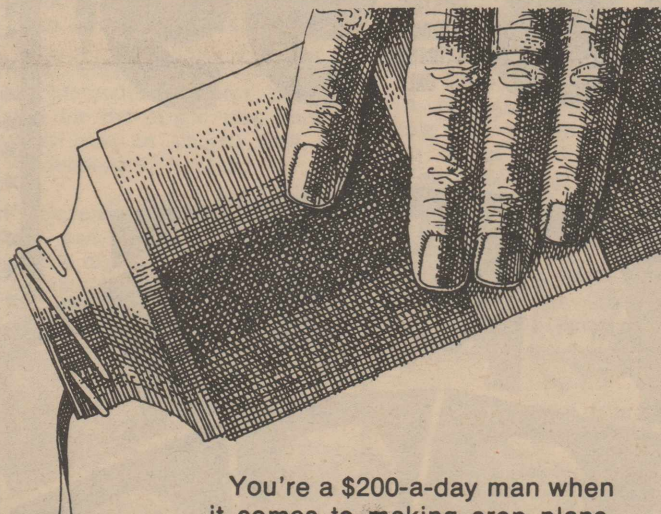

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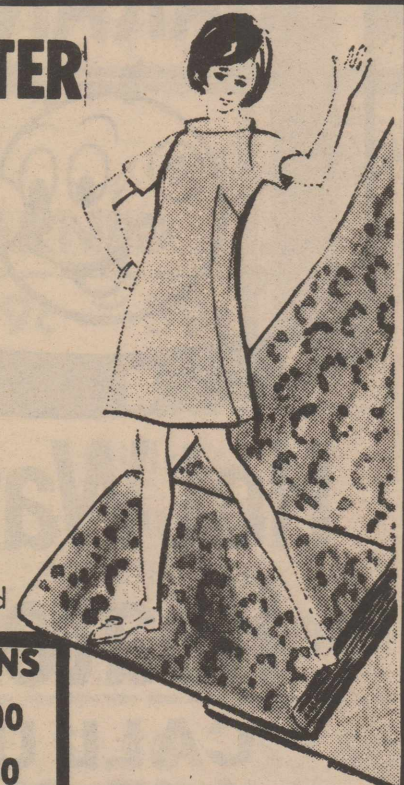
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Sunday Program

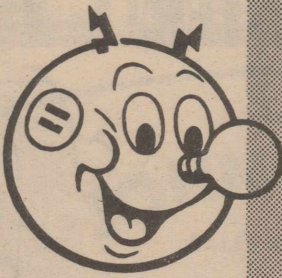

Homemakers Haven

Have you ever considered how many recipes call for pecans? There are salads, cookies, candies, pies, cakes, and many types of desserts. Some are very easy and some are complicated, but they all have one thing in common... delicious and tasty.

BLACK CHERRY SALAD

1 No. 2 1/2 can pitted Bing cherries
1/3 c. lemon juice
1 pkg. orange flavored gelatin
3/4 c. chopped pecans
1 3 oz. bottle stuffed olives, sliced

Drain cherries, add water to cherry syrup and lemon juice to make 1 3/4 cups liquid. Heat, pour over gelatin and stir till dissolved. Chill until partially set. Add cherries, pecans and olives. Pour into individual molds or shallow pan, chill until firm. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise.

BRIDE'S PECAN COFFEE CAKE

1 T. butter
1 T. sugar
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 c. crushed corn flakes
1/2 c. pecan pieces
1 c. sifted flour
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/8 tsp. mace
1/4 c. sugar
1/4 c. shortening
1/4 c. raisins
1 egg
1/4 c. milk

Prepare topping by mixing melted butter, sugar, cinnamon, corn flakes, and pecans. Set aside. Preheat oven to hot. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, sugar, cinnamon and mace. With pastry blender work into flour mixture, shortening and add raisins, seeded and chopped. Add egg, well beaten

with milk but do not overbeat. Pour into greased 6" pie tin, brush with melted butter, and spread topping over it. Bake in 400 degree oven about 30 minutes.

BANANA NUT SALAD

3 bananas
1/4 c. orange juice
1/2 c. finely chopped pecans
lettuce
Fruit salad dressing or mayonnaise

Peel bananas, cut lengthwise in half and then crosswise in half. To prevent them from discoloring, prepare salads just before serving, and coat bananas at once with orange juice. Roll in chopped nuts, pressing slightly to imbed them. Arrange on lettuce and serve with preferred dressing.

PECAN PIE

3 eggs
1/2 c. sugar
1 c. dark corn syrup
1 c. pecans
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. salt

Beat eggs slightly, add sugar, syrup, pecans, vanilla and salt. Mix well. Put into pie crust that has been partly baked. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 50 minutes and serve with whipped cream that has been flavored with sugar and vanilla.

APRICOT BALLS

3/4 c. dried apricots
3/4 c. flaked coconut
1/2 c. chopped pecans
1 T. lemon juice
1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind
1/2 tsp. grated orange rind

Wash and drain the apricots. Add coconut and nuts and put through a food grinder or blender. Add lemon juice and the lemon and orange rinds. Knead with the hands until well blended. Roll into small balls. Then roll in chopped nuts. Yield 3 dozen balls.

PECAN CARAMELS

1 c. sugar
1/2 c. brown sugar
1/2 c. white corn syrup
1/2 c. cream
1 c. milk
1/4 c. butter
1 tsp. vanilla
3/4 c. broken pecans

Stir over low heat the sugars, syrup, cream, milk and butter until the sugars dissolve. Continue stirring constantly over increased heat until a small amount of mixture forms a caramel-like ball in cold water. Remove from heat and add vanilla. Stir in broken pecans and pour immediately into buttered loaf pan, to form layer about 3/4 inch deep. When cool, remove from pan and cut into squares with sharp knife dipped in hot water.

CHOCOLATE PECAN PUFFS

3 squares unsweetened chocolate
1 1/2 c. evaporated milk
3/4 c. sugar
1 1/2 c. pecans, chopped fine
Miniature marshmallows

Melt chocolate in double boiler. Stir in milk and sugar. Cook, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Drop in marshmallows one at a time, then remove with ice pick when coated. Roll in finely chopped pecans and let harden on wax paper.

FRUIT TOWER SALAD

6 large peach halves
6 lettuce cups
6 whole canned figs
12 apricot halves
6 pitted dates
1/4 c. finely chopped nuts

Arrange peach halves, cut side up, on crisp lettuce. Top with a fig and 2 apricot halves. Stuff dates with nuts, place one on each salad. Makes six servings.

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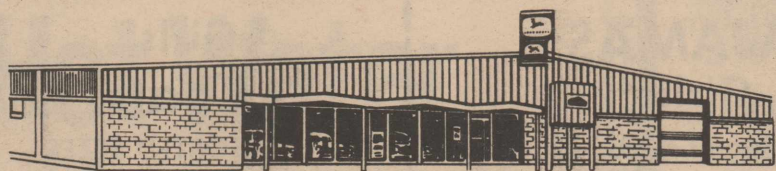

Financial Facts

Foreign remittances are a convenient way to send money abroad.

Before taking a trip you can arrange with your bank to have money held for you at overseas branches or correspondent banks, either in U.S. dollars or local currency.

When urgent remittances are desired, payment instructions to the correspondent bank are sent by cable rather than air mail. Foreign drafts are used when one prefers to forward the remittance himself or when the extra fast service provided by cable is not necessary.

Remittances in foreign currencies may also be obtained. With this method the remitter knows in advance the amount the payee will receive regardless of intervening fluctuations in exchange.

Exchange services provided by banks also include the purchase and sale of foreign currency and travelers' checks.

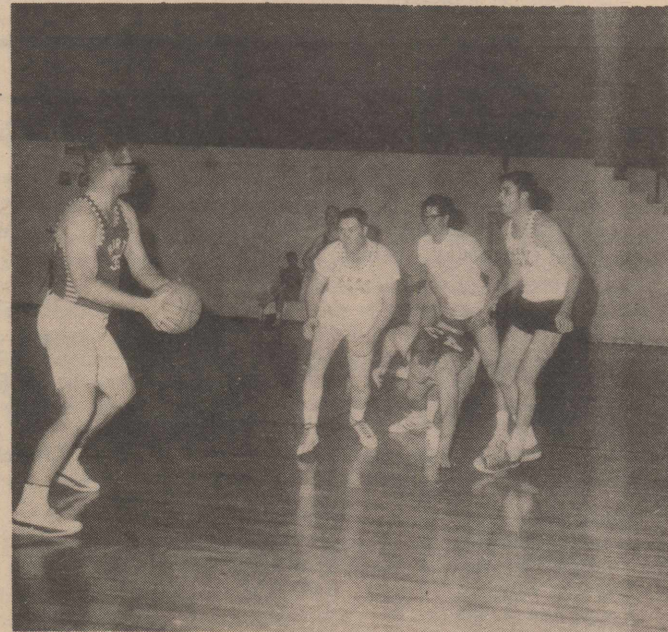

FARM PRICES AT MID-DECEMBER--Prices received by Texas farmers on Dec. 15 were 3 points or 1 percent less than in Nov. and 10 points or 4 percent below a year ago, said the Texas Crops and Livestock Reporting Service. Livestock and livestock products were 1 percent below last month and 10 percent below a year ago. Hog prices continued their downward trend. Nationally, farm prices dropped 2 percent during the month ending on Dec. 15.

TEXAS VEGETABLES -- The value of commercial vegetables (fresh marketing and processing) produced in Texas during 1970 totaled \$141,422,000 reports the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, up 16 percent from 1969. Leading crops in value of production were onions, carrots, potatoes, cabbage and watermelons. Nationally, Texas ranked third in harvested acreage, production and value of fresh market vegetables behind California and Florida.
