Abernathy To Be Honored at State Cage Tournament

'41 Boys', '58 Girls' Teams To Be Guests at Tournament

The 1941 Tiger basketball team of El Paso High School will be honored at the Boys' State Basketball Tournament in Austin, March 2, 3 and 4.

The 1958 Abernathy, Cooper and North Hopkins of Sulphur Springs girls' teams will be honored at the Girls' State Basketball Tournament in Austin, March 9, 10 and 11. These three teams won the AA, A and B basketball titles in that year.

The El Paso boys opened their state tournament play by defeating Mount Vernon, 68-28. Mount Vernon had brought a perfect no-loss record to the state tourney. In the second round the Tigers beat Jeff Davis of Houston, 37-22. In the final game the Tigers beat Abilene, 27-20, to win the title.

Jeff Davis won third place honors by winning over Waco, 50-35.

Abernathy Record Perfect

The Antelope girls' basketball team of Abernathy High brought a perfect 37 win, no loss record to the state tournament. In the semi-finals

Abernathy defeated Rockdale, 63-59. They won the title by beating Brewer of Fort Worth, 64-53, in the final tilt. Rockdale defeated Clear Creek of League City, 63-62, to win third place honors in AA play.

Cooper Won 35, Lost 3

In A competition the Cooper High School Bulldogs Girls' team brought a 33 win, 3 loss record to the meet. They defeated Central of Polk, 68-59. In the finals the Cooper girls won over Moulton, 59-53, to win the Conference A state title.

North Hopkins Scored High

The Conference B champions, North Hopkins of Sulphur Springs, won over Rankin, 83-39, in the first round. In the semi-final game they beat Sugarland, 80-76. They outscored Collinsville, 86-28, to win the title in a battle that saw Collinsville go into a stall at half time to try to stop North Hopkins from breaking a tournament record held by Collinsville.

North Hopkins jumped off to a

20-7 lead in the first quarter. In the second quarter Collinsville top point maker, Marsha Scoggin, fouled out and North Hopkins led, 54-19 at half. In the second half Collinsville went into a stall to protect its high scoring record of 83 points in a game. In the final two quarters Collinsville scored only 9 points, all on free tosses, and tried only one field goal. It was all in vain as the North Hopkins quintet bucketed 86 points to set a new scoring mark for the tournament.

Margie Guinn and Leonora Manley of Abernathy were named to the Sportswriters 1958 All-Tournament AA Team. Bab James and Brenda Holmes of Cooper won A All-Tournament honors. Miss Holmes also won All-Tournament honors in 1957.

Lou Jane Jones, Mary Parish and Shirley Gibby of North Hopkins won B all-tournament team berths. Lou Jane Jones won it for the third time.

Multi-Colored Fire Plugs Indicate Capacity

The City Water Department is presently engaged in the repainting of all fire hydrants in Abernathy. The color scheme being followed is in accordance with a national color scheme for fire hydrants.

Fire hydrants located on dead-end water lines that are capable of supplying 1000 gallons of water or more will have green barrels and silver caps and bonnets. Dead-end hydrants which produce from 500 to 1000 gallons of water per minute will have orange barrels and silver caps and bonnets. Fire hydrants supplied with water from two directions and capable of supplying 1000 gallons of water or more will have green barrels and orange caps and bonnets. Those hydrants located on a two-way water line that are capable of supplying from 500 to 1000 gallons of water per minute will have orange barrels and green caps and bonnets.

In this way the Fire Department, before connecting onto any fire hydrant in town, will know what the capacity of it is in gallons per minute or if it is a dead-end fire hydrant. A few weeks ago the Water Department tested and recorded the capacity of every fire hydrant in Abernathy.

O. B. HERRINGS AUTO WRECK CLAIMS MINISTER AND WIFE

The Rev. O. B. Herring, a former pastor of Abernathy First Methodist Church, and his wife were killed in a car accident at Fairfield Thursday. Joint funeral rites for the Herrings were held Saturday morning in Casa Linda Methodist Church, Dallas. Burial was in a Dallas Cemetery. Two daughters are included in the list of survivors.

The Rev. Mr. Herring retired in 1964 after 41 years in the ministry. At the time of his death, he was serving as minister of visitation for the Casa Linda Methodist Church. The Herrings were returning from Houston to their home in Mesquite when the fatal accident happened.

The Rev. Mr. Herring was pastor of Abernathy First Methodist Church in the mid 1930's, going from here to the church at Happy in 1937. (He was the officiating minister when Dorothy Chapman and Buford Davenport were married at 6 p. m. Dec. 31, 1937, in the Methodist parsonage at Happy. Ironically, on the day the minister and his wife were buried, Mrs. Davenport was involved in what could have been a fatal accident at 6 p. m. near the north city limits of Lubbock. The accident would have been fatal except for four factors: the grace of God; Mrs. Davenport's accurate guess that the car coming from a side street was not going to yield the

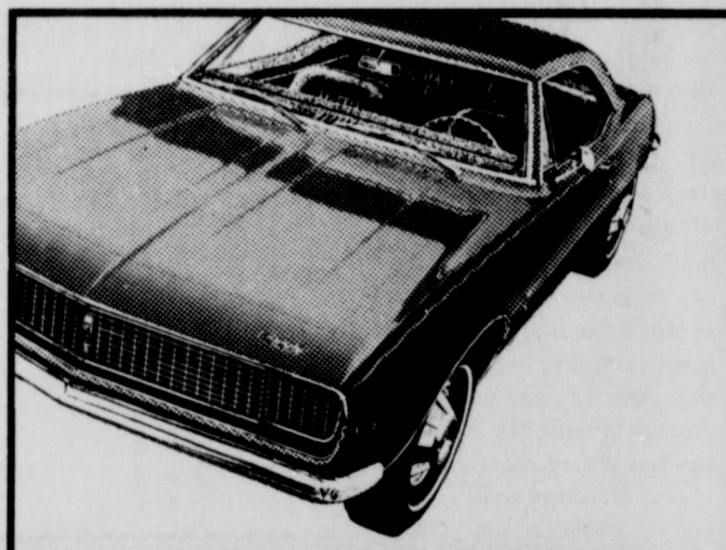
