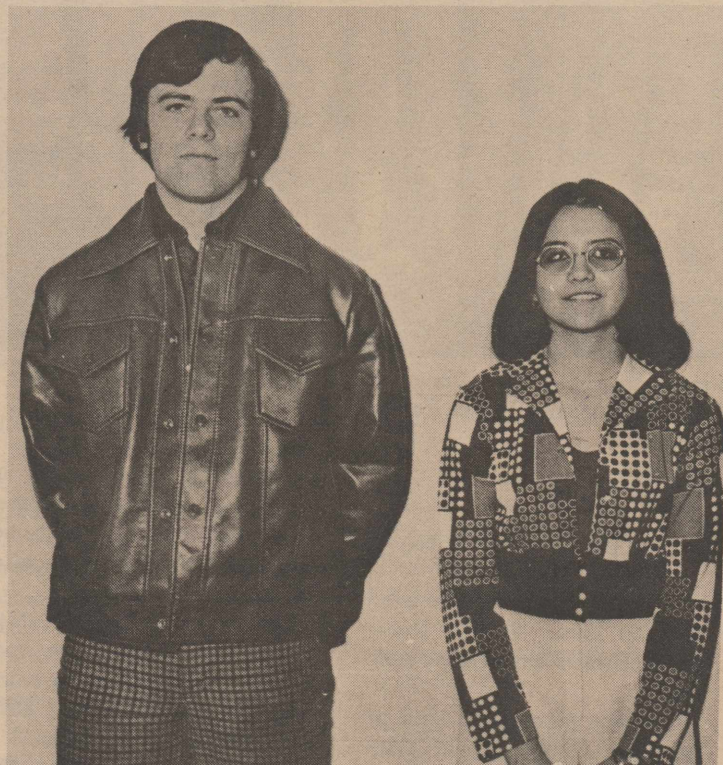

Few Voters Visit Polls, All Candidates Elected

Voters turned out in few numbers Saturday in city and school elections here. Candidates in each race were uncontested.

Thirty-three persons cast ballots in the city election returning Richard Franks to the mayor's seat and naming Aubrey Myers and L.C. McLain

as commissioners. Franks received 32 votes while McLain and Myers garnered 32 and 25, respectively. Charles Black received one write-in vote.

Unofficial results in the trustee race showed Weldon Jones receiving 33 votes; Joe Edd Carson, 31 and Deryl Clevenger, one write-in vote.

Storm Signals Told, Sounds Described

Tornado season is here and Monday found residents casting wary eyes on the clouds peeking through the heavy blinding dust storm. Alerts issued by the weather department made everyone more aware of the necessity for a

reminder of the city's storm alert signals.

Siren Signals, sounded by members of the Volunteer Fire Department who work with law enforcement officers and the weather bureau in helping keep watch over fellow citizens, are

listed here:

Three blasts of the siren signify a tornado alert and residents are urged to make necessary precautions in the event a tornado is spotted in the area. A single, long blast indicates a tornado has been spotted or indicated by weather bureau radar. This signal means that all should take protective cover.

Regular signals include two blasts of the siren as a reminder of fire practice or a meeting of the volunteer fire department members. Four or more blasts indicate a fire.

When the siren signals a fire, residents are cautioned to pull

Funeral services were held at 8 p.m. Sunday in the Church of Christ for Mrs. Myrtle Ruth Scott, 82.

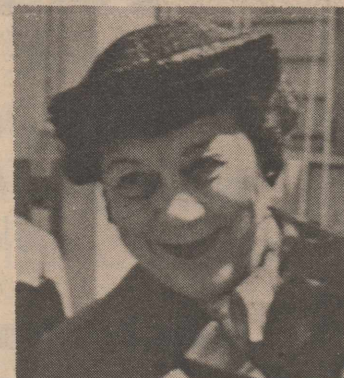

the Panhandle where she lived with an uncle, Moses "Uncle Mose" Ewers who settled near Hart.

She was married in 1919 to Iley Scott and together they farmed and ran cattle from 1920 to 1940. In 1950, they acquired a ranch near Cuervo, N.M., and lived there until 1970 when Scott was hospitalized following a stroke. They returned to Hart at that time.

In earlier years, Mrs. Scott picked cotton, shocked feed and hoed row crops. She also gardened and kept a well stocked cellar of home canned vegetables, fruit and meat to provide for her family during the eras of the Great Depression and Dust Bowl. She raised chickens, having as many as 1,000 at a time, to aid the family's income when dryland crops failed and farm prices sagged.

When irrigation came to the High Plains in the 1940's, bringing a better farm economy, Mrs. Scott turned to long dreamed to challenges and, at the age of 55, took flying lessons and earned her pilot's license.

In the 1950's and 60's, she became active in the Cowbelles, an association of cattlemen's wives and cattlemen. With growing leisure time on the remote and isolated ranch, she indulged in a life-long fondness

for reading and took up travelling. She took numerous cross country trips with her husband and then alone after his death.

Mrs. Scott visited Europe and Asia several times, took one extended around-the-world trip and, in the fall of 1973, made a drive to Florida.

Survivors include a son, Iley Stanley Scott Jr., of Lafayette, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Ola Oursborn of Willa, Okla., and Mrs. Margaret Guchanan of Dallas; two brothers, B. Dee Westbrook of Honolulu, Hawaii and Homer Westbrook of the Republic of Panama, and three grandchildren.

Texas Is Tornado Leader

Texas had the dubious honor of leading the nation in the number of tornadoes last year with 116. And another tornado season is at hand.

"Most tornadoes occur during April, May and June during the late afternoon although they can occur at any time of the year or any time during the day," points out Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Most tornadoes occur in the South and between the Rockies and the Appalachians.

"With a total of 944 reported tornadoes in the United States last year and 361 resulting deaths, 1974 was the worst year for tornadoes since 1925," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Although the average annual number of tornadoes reported has quadrupled in the past three decades, the number of tornado fatalities has been decreasing. This is probably due to better methods of sighting tornadoes, warning systems and advance preparation for tornadoes, notes Keese.

Tornadoes usually travel southwest to northeast and stay on the ground about 10 minutes. Their forward speed is about 30 miles per hour but wind speeds in the funnel of a

tornado get up to 300 miles per hour.

"Because tornadoes are so erratic, it's hard to tell just where or when they will occur," points out the engineer.

He stresses the importance of having a well rehearsed plan for quick action if a tornado is sighted.

The National Weather Service issues a "tornado watch" when atmospheric conditions are favorable for tornadoes. A "tornado warning" is issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar.

"If a tornado watch is announced, stay tuned to a radio or television for weather advisories. A tornado warning demands action, so you should quickly move to a basement, cellar or civil defense shelter," advises Keese. "Keep a battery-powered radio handy in case power is lost."

If your home doesn't have a basement or cellar, go to the lowest level in the center of the home or get in a closet or small room or under heavy furniture, suggests the engineer. Open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes.

"Stay away from windows and buildings such as gymnasiums and auditoriums with wide free-span roofs. If you live in a

mobile home, move to a shelter area. If you are caught in open country, move away from the tornado at a right angle to its path or lie flat in a ditch or ravine," he adds. "Do not stay in your car if you cannot safely evade the tornado by driving away from it or at right angles to its path."

If you sight a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law enforcement officer, but do not tie up the phone with unnecessary calls.

"After a tornado, always wear thick-soled shoes and gloves in cleanup work and watch for broken pipes and downed electrical wires," warns Keese. "Don't light matches or smoke in or near a building that has been hit by a tornado until you are sure there are no gas leaks."

"Furthermore, stay away from disaster areas unless you're helping with rescue and cleanup operations."

LEMONADE PIE

Graham cracker crust
1 can Eagle Brand milk
1 can frozen lemonade

1 small container of frozen whipped topping

Beat milk and lemonade together until blended, beat in thawed whipped topping and pout into crust. Chill until firm.

PECAN PIE SUPRISE BARS

1 package yellow cake mix
1/2 c. butter, melted
1 egg

Filling:

2/3 c. reserved cake mix
1/2 c. firmly packed brown sugar
1 1/2 c. dark corn syrup
1 t. vanilla
3 eggs
1 c. chopped pecans

Reserve 2/3 c. dry cake mix for filling. In large mixing bowl, combine remaining dry cake mix, butter and 1 egg. Mix until mixed well. Pour into pan, spread out dough until pan is covered. Bake at 350 for 15-20 minutes in a 13 x 9 baking pan.

Meanwhile, prepare filling, pour filling over partially baked crust; sprinkle with pecans.

Free Glaucoma Testing To Be Held In Plainview

A FREE glaucoma screening will be held at the Plainview High School Cafeteria, 1500 Smyth Street, Plainview, from 7 to 9 p.m., Tuesday evening, April 22, in an attempt to track down unknown cases of glaucoma, a blinding eye disease.

The free tests screening program is open to all residents of Plainview and surrounding areas, thirty-five years of age and over.

It will be sponsored by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Plainview Noon Lions Club in cooperation with members of the Hale-Floyd-Briscoe Counties Medical Society and the Plainview-Hale County Board of Health.

Serving as volunteers in the program will be members of the Plainview Noon Lions Club and their wives; Nurses from the Nursing Staff, Central Plains General Hospital, Plainview Clinical Nurses, Plainview Public School Nurses, Plainview-Hale County Health Nurses and the Hale County Licensed Vocational Nurses Association.

Over 800 persons attended a similar screening here two years ago and since medical authorities recommend that eyes should be tested for glaucoma symptoms at least every two years, the Lions club is again staging this free service to the community.

The test, which is simple and painless, will be administered as a public service by medical doctors, members of the Hale-Floyd-Briscoe Counties Medical Society.

Just what is glaucoma? It is the leading cause of permanent blindness in the nation, according to the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

Glaucoma is a disease where damage cannot be undone once it progresses to a point of impairing vision. There is, however, effective treatment to arrest the disease, in most cases, if detected early, and

sight can be saved.

Early detection of this insidious disease is the main purpose of a glaucoma screening such as the one scheduled April 22.

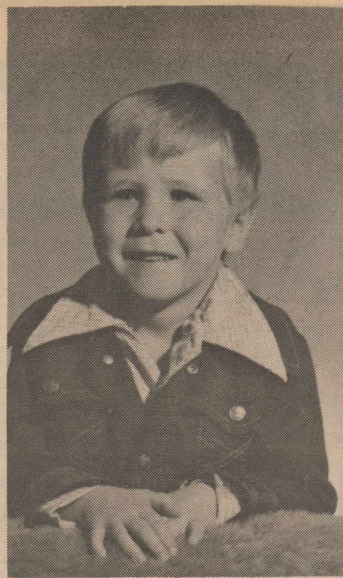
The test, which will be given to anyone thirty-five years of age and over, simply measures the pressure within the eyeball. To measure the pressure, the doctor will put a few drops of a mild anaesthetic in the eyes and place a tonometer, a special device which gauges pressure by the hardness of the eyeball.

The test takes only a few minutes, is completely painless and does not affect your vision for driving afterwards.

Remember, a few minutes of your time Tuesday evening, April 22, could save your sight.
