

Roman Announces For Commissioner

E. L. Roman, Knott, has announced his candidacy for the office of county commissioner of Howard county from precinct No. 1.

He is to be a candidate in the democratic primaries.

A soldier in World War I, Roman is 49 years of age and has resided in the county for the past eight years, coming from Lynn county where he lived for 14 years.

"This is the first time I have ever asked for office," he said, "and I will surely appreciate your vote and influence. I feel that I am capable of handling the job and will do my best to serve the people honestly and to the best of my ability."

Strikes Increasing Inflation Threats, Opine Authorities

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (P) — Government economists said today that in general current strikes are increasing inflationary pressures.

But some officials expressed the opinion widespread and prolonged work stoppages could have the opposite effect eventually and thus cause prices for consumer goods to drop.

OPA and Commerce Department analysts who asked that their names not be used said that beyond a doubt strikes now in progress are exerting great pressure on prices.

"The natural immediate tendency of families of workers out on strike," one commerce official asserted, "is to prepare for an emergency. This means that even though future income is uncertain, money available is spent to lay in food supplies, clothing and other essential items."

EX-LSU PRESIDENT GRANTED PAROLE

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 17. (P) — The New Orleans States said today that the federal parole board had granted a parole, effective Feb. 5, to Dr. James Monroe Smith, former president of Louisiana State University, who is serving a 30-month term in the Atlanta penitentiary.

The 56-year-old educator, picked by the late Sen. Huey P. Long as head of the college, has served 10 months of a 30-month term on charges of income tax irregularities and using the mails to defraud in connection with the Louisiana political scandals of 1939.

Law Uses Tear Gas To Rout Picketers

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17. (P) — Police used clubs and tear gas today in enforcing a court injunction forbidding forcible picketing of the United States Motors plant here, where CIO electrical workers are on strike in a wage dispute.

Police rushed a crowd of more than 1,200 pickets to make way for two score office workers seeking to enter the plant. Numerous arrests of pickets were made.

Robbery Suspects Hit By Charges

AUSTIN, Jan. 17. (P) — Ranger Captain Guiley Cowsett said today he will file complaints in Junction this afternoon against Frank Sanders, 30, of Llano and James Virgil Kinsey, 26, of Georgetown, charging robbery with firearms, abduction and theft.

The pair, both with criminal records, were arrested at a dance hall near Bryan by highway patrolmen as suspects in the beating and robbing of a storekeeper and the abduction of the postmistress at Roosevelt, Kimble county.

Sanders, ex-Merchant Marine, has been convicted of robbery with firearms twice in Arizona and has been on parole the past 18 months from a 15-year conviction, Capt. Fred Olson, in charge of State Police District Headquarters, said.

Kinsey, he said, has a long criminal record, served in Texas and Arizona penitentiaries for burglary and theft and has been on parole the past 18 months from a 15-year conviction. He deserted from the Army in North Carolina about the first of November, Olson said.

Vets Idled By Strike Denied Compensation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (P) — At least one veterans organization promised an appeal to congress today from a decision denying GI unemployment benefits to a veteran thrown out of work by the General Motors strike.

The ruling by Veterans Administrator Omar N. Bradley upheld the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission.

Asserting the decision may affect "hundreds of thousands" of ex-servicemen, Omar B. Ketchum, national legislative representative of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, told a reporter:

"We will introduce an amendment to the GI bill as soon as possible so veterans who do not vote for strikes, but are thrown out of work when strikes occur, may collect awards."

The veteran involved in last night's decision is John Cody of Flint, Mich., non-union employee of the A. C. Sparkplug Company, a GM subsidiary.

Ford And Union Deadlocked But Will Meet Again

DETROIT, Jan. 17. (P) — The Ford Motor company and the CIO United Auto Workers, two cents apart in their wage dispute, failed to break their deadlock in another bargaining session today but will meet again tomorrow.

Today's session, second of the three previously scheduled for this week, was described as "friendly" by participants.

After about an hour's discussions with Ford representatives today, the union group held a caucus over what a spokesman called "a top drawer secret pertaining to wages." He declined to give any details.

Shortly thereafter the bargaining session was adjourned.

The company, whose offer of a 17 1/2 cent per hour boost was rejected by the UAW, was believed to have no intention of increasing the amount to meet the 19 1/2 cent raise suggested by President Truman's fact-finding board in the General Motors Corp. wage dispute.

A similar amount was demanded by the union's Ford negotiators.

GM President C. E. Wilson denied a statement by John S. Bugas, Ford industrial relations director, that Ford's average pay stood nine cents an hour higher than GM's.

Changes In Taxes Discussed At Forum

FORT WORTH, Jan. 17. (P) — Changes in the type of taxes levied by state and local government were stressed by Charles F. Conlon of Chicago, before the opening session of the annual and valorem tax forum of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas association here today.

Conlon, opening speaker on the program, is executive director of the Federation of Tax Administrators.

Election of officers will open Friday's program. Current officers are F. N. Shriver, Shell Oil Company, Inc., Houston, chairman, and Marshall L. Edwards, Skelly Oil Company, Tulsa, vice chairman.

Most of Texas was five to ten degrees warmer today after this week's cold wave had passed yesterday.

The US weather bureau reported no fresh snow this morning. High cloud formations over part of the state indicated continued dry weather for the next 24 hours.

Every section except the Rio Grande valley and gulf coast experienced sub-freezing temperatures last night, with Clarendon again registering the lowest in the state, with 13 degrees. Yesterday the Panhandle town shivered at 2 degrees above zero.

Amarillo reported 14 degrees last night, following an 8-degree freeze the night before. Lufkin recorded a low of 20 degrees last night. Sulphur Springs and Tyler 22, Texarkana and Pampa 23, Gainesville 26, Lubbock 27, Dallas and Corsicana 28, Big Spring, Waco and Guadalupe Pass 29.

Also at freezing or below were Fort Worth, Abilene, Wichita Falls, Austin, San Antonio, Beaumont, Houston and El Paso.

NEW CLUES FOUND IN DEGNAN CASE

CHICAGO, Jan. 17. (P) — Several wisps of blond hair matching the locks of Suzanne Degnan, 6-year-old victim of a sadistic murderer, have been found entangled in a rough stairway plank at the rear of an apartment building near the Degnan home, police said today.

The building, at 8035-37 Winthrop Avenue is situated a block and a half from the apartment building at 5901 Winthrop in the basement of which police said the body of the child was dismembered.

Detective Adolph Valanis said the wisps of hair found on the stair board established that Suzanne was carried to that spot after she was kidnapped from her bed Jan. 7. It was in that area that police last week found a noose of picture wire to which another strand of yellow hair adhered. Police theorized the wire noose was used to garrote Suzanne before she was dismembered.

Valanis said that before the new wisps of hair were found Mrs. Ruth H. Erickson, of 1055 Glenlake Ave., living around the corner from 8035-37 Winthrop, told them she had seen a man apparently trying to gain entrance to the laundry room almost beneath her apartment at about 1:30 a. m. Jan. 7.

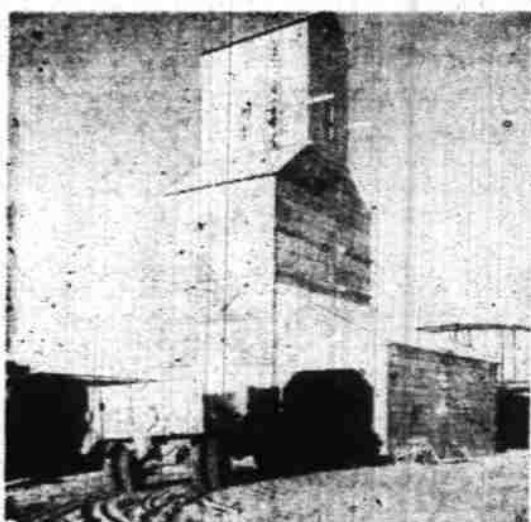

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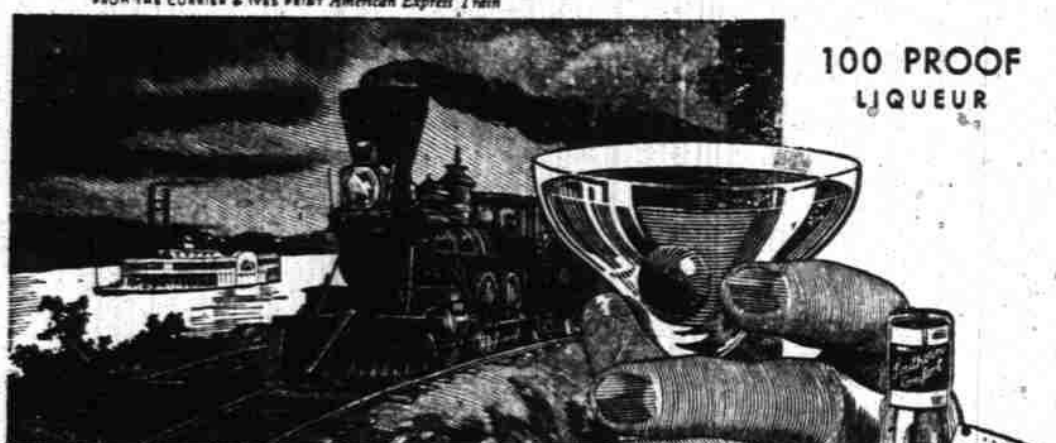

Bonilla Blames Rowdy Faction For Trouble

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 17. (AP) — Army Adjutant General Roberto T. Bonilla reported today that "rowdies" fired the first shots in the recent Leon political demonstrations which resulted in 30 deaths and injury to 300 other persons.

Bonilla, the Army's chief investigator of the incident, said rowdy elements discharged firearms "apparently in an effort to test the courage, and provoke action on the part of the guard established in municipal palace."

He explained a study of bullet-struck helmets disclosed the missiles were of a different calibre than those used by the army. Bonilla added that some of the bullets recovered were "expansion type."

Moreover, Bonilla said, nothing was found to support some reports that soldiers used hand grenades. He made no comment, however, on the use of machine-guns.

The Leon trouble developed following a municipal election, in which a government party candidate claimed victory over an independent opponent. The demonstrators protested the outcome.

Meat Shortage Unlikely Here

Local meat eaters will not necessarily be reminded of rationing again or feel any shortages resulting from the labor disputes stewing in other sections, Big Spring packing houses were assuring today.

None of the employees of the three slaughtering and packing houses here are members of a union and hence will not be bound to strike.

Vaults are fairly well stocked with all kinds of fresh meat now and will continue to be as long as local cattlemen keep bringing in their stock to the livestock auctions here—also unaffected by the strikes.

However, meatmen warned, there may be some difficulty in securing canned or cured meats once grocers' supplies are exhausted.

EL PASO TRANSIT WORKERS REJECT COMPANY'S OFFER

EL PASO, Jan. 17. (AP) — Negotiations seeking a settlement of the El Paso bus and street car operators' strike remained deadlocked today as the union and the El Paso City Lines company failed to agree on wages and length of a contract.

Meanwhile the heaviest vehicular traffic in recent years jammed the city's streets as private automobiles and taxicabs took the place of public transportation.

The Amalgamated Street Car, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees of America (AFL) rejected a company offer of increases of eight cents an hour. They countered with a proposal of 10 cents increase or an hourly wage of 90 cents.

When they rejected a company request for a two-year contract under such terms, the negotiations were adjourned.

Former Accident Board Member Killed

AUSTIN, Jan. 17. (AP) — T. B. Hill, former member of the State Industrial Accident Board, died early today of injuries suffered when his car was in collision with a tractor-trailer yesterday.

Hill had served seven years as a member of the board. His term expired last September.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (AP) — President Truman today nominated Brig. Gen. Butler B. Miltonberger of North Platte, Nebr., as chief of the National Guard Bureau of the War Department with the rank of major general.

Miltonberger, who would succeed Maj. Gen. John F. Williams, is an Infantry officer in the Nebraska National Guard. He commanded the 134th Infantry, 35th Division, in the last war and was its deputy commander toward the end of the conflict.

This is the same division in which President Truman served as an Artillery captain in the First World War.

GAME COMMISSION MEETS JAN. 24

AUSTIN, Jan. 17. (AP) — The Game, Fish and Oyster Commission will meet here Jan. 24 to consider establishment of a marine laboratory and to hear a report on progress in setting up the Big Horn sheep refuge in West Texas.

Final plans for the game wardens school to be held at A. and M. College under joint sponsorship of the commission and the college will also be discussed.

Edgar Bergens to Wed Again—In Church

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 17. (AP) — It will be a church wedding this time for the Edgar Bergens.

The ventriloquist and the former model and singer, Frances Westernman, obtained a license in El Centro yesterday and the bride's mother said they would wed again soon in a Methodist church here to which Miss Westernman belongs.

They were married in Sonora, Mex., last June 23.

Price Of Milk Is Advanced

Milk dealers in Big Spring advanced their price half a cent a bottle as of Jan. 10 upon receiving orders from the Dallas OPA office, officials said Thursday.

A telegram which was received here from Francis A. Weber, OPA dairy price official, stated that the half cent increase be put into effect on a temporary 90-day order for West Texas only.

Managers of Big Spring dairies believe the increase is statewide and several dealers had made the price increase before receiving the OPA order.

Milk quarts are being sold at 16 cents for one or two quarts at 31 cents, dealers stated.

The increase is to go to the producer, since he suffers most with the feed prices, a manager said.

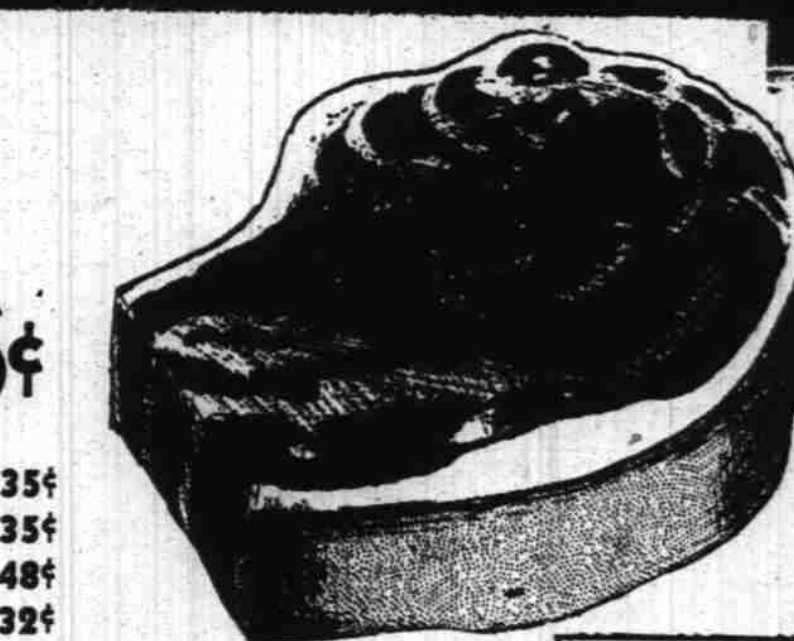

Farm And Ranch News

By WACIL McNAIR

Reporting that Texas' 1945 cotton crop was the shortest in 56 years, the Texas A&M college extension service is urging all farmers to treat seed with fungicides. Tests conducted by the service over a four-year period with treated seed showed increased yields ranging from four to 25 per cent in various sections of the state. In seasons such as 1946 when seed supplies are short, it is believed that smaller amounts of seed will be required if treatment is used.

A severe shortage of seed for spring planting is feared, as the feed industry is already feeling the effects of a short 1945 crop. Seed from late cotton in Howard county are a far cry from planting quality. Most of them are immature and those which might germinate could not be depended upon for good production. In addition to this, many farmers hope to plant at least part of their crops early this year with the idea of replanting if they don't get a good stand at first. That would

require considerably more seed if weather conditions proved unfavorable for early cotton.

It is not hard to understand why so many expect to plant earlier this year. Results of the 1945 crop proved the earlier acreage to be far better than that planted later. Of course on some farms conditions did not permit early planting. Those who could and did plant early realized more profitable results for their efforts. County Agent Durward Lewter reports that of those availing themselves of income tax return assistance through the farm bureau it was evident at a glance at their returns whether or not they had early cotton. Those with only late crops showed narrow margins of profit, and even losses in some cases, where those who planted early fared much better.

More than one farmer this week stated that if the controversial ceiling is placed on raw cotton they will not require any seed at all this spring. Most of them think that the OPA is viewing the price control problem on cotton goods from the wrong end, and they want no part of it.

Two economists at Texas A&M college predict that farmers will receive "moderately lower" prices for agricultural products in 1946 than last year. At the same time they express belief that production costs will remain about the same. Products with support prices, such as cotton, corn, wheat, etc., are expected to suffer little, but beef cattle, sheep, fresh vegetables and fruit, which are not

covered with support prices may decrease.

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Only 17,636 Bales Ginned

County Cotton Crop Lightest Since 1939, Records Show

Howard county's 1945 cotton crop may be the shortest since 1939, according to unofficial year-end ginning figures compiled at the USDA cottonology bureau of Big Spring.

Figures tallied through the end of December showed approximately 17,636 bales ginned in the county, and although some ginning has been done since the first of the year, present indications are that a current total would be less than 18,000 bales. Ginnings for the 1939 crop amounted to 18,749.

Comparative figures show a gradual decline during the past three years, after 1942 brought a drop of nearly 20,000 bales from the previous year. In 1941 a total of 46,124 bales were ginned, and the '42 slump produced only 26,650.

About 23,000 bales had been ginned at this time last year.

County Agent Durward Lewter said this week that several hundred bales, possibly enough to increase the total to 20,000, still remain in the fields. However, it is doubtful that all will be harvested.

Farmers report that in some instances it is necessary to gather 3,000 pounds in order to gin a bale of most late crops. This is causing the labor cost of harvest to exceed returns on the cotton. Seed from late crops are also poor in quality and immature.

One man reported that he gathered three late bales and sustained a loss of \$5. With cases such as this on record it is believed that many will not bother to harvest late remnants from their fields.

The ginning figures are not composed of Howard county cotton exclusively, as several gins near the

Cafe au Lait (Coffee with Milk) Use 1½ rounding tablespoons decaffeinated coffee, regular grind, to each cup (½ pint) of water. Make by any method desired. Have ready a pot of hot milk. When serving, pour milk and coffee together into cup in equal amounts.

For Italian Cafe au Lait, pour milk and coffee together into a china pot containing beaten egg yolk, using 1 egg yolk to 4 cups coffee.

Three Year Feeding Tests With Rats Is Underway

AUSTIN, Jan. 17. (AP) — A series of experiments in which rats will be fed on a bread flour diet for three years have been begun by Dr. J. W. Winters, nutrition expert and professor of home economics at the University of Texas.

"Several generations of rats will be observed and the effects of enriched and unenriched cereal diets on succeeding generations, number of young and rate of growth will be studied," Dr. Winters said.

The Nation Today—'Running Out Of Army' Eisenhower Complains Of Fast Demobilization

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (AP) — Here is a quick look at General Eisenhower's explanation, given to Congress, for the Army's slow-down in releasing men.

1. The Army has released far more — since the war with Japan and Germany ended — than it had planned.

2. If it kept up that rate, it would run out of men necessary to carry out the Army's job.

3. Replacements for those overseas veterans — through the draft or volunteering — have not been fast enough.

The general said: "If we were to continue shipping men home at the rate we reached during the past few months, about April we would have nothing left but a woefully inadequate number of volunteers — we would literally have 'run out of Army.'"

Yet, in order to keep discharges up to a high rate, the general said the Army has done these things:

1. It has made every effort to get volunteers to replace veterans abroad.

2. It has told General MacArthur in Japan and General McNarney in Germany to cut their soldier requirements to the bone.

3. It has cut the training of new men in this country from 17 to 13 weeks.

He gave this explanation for the excitement over demobilization:

1. The end of the Army started an emotional wave to get men out of the Army.

2. The "almost incredible speed" of the War Department in releasing men between the defeat of Japan and Christmas.

General Eisenhower gave these figures to show the Army's speed:

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In demobilization: It had planned to let 2,500,000 men go between Sept. 1 and Dec. 31, 1945. Actually, in that time it released 4,165,000, or 1,665,000 more than its plans called for.

Altogether, since Germany fell last May, the Army has released 5,000,000 of the 8,300,000 men it had at that time.

By next July 1 the Army will have released another 2,750,000 men who were in the Army when Germany quit.

Thus by next July 1 the Army will have left only 500,000 of the 8,300,000 it had in service last May. All the rest will be new draftees or recruits.

Grid Post At Ohio State Becomes Hot Spot, Despite Great Elevens

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 17. (AP)—Paul Orlando Bixler, a personable young man, has become the fifth coach in 12 years to hold down what generally is regarded as one of the hottest spots in collegiate football—coaching Ohio State University.

He's going into a spot where three of his last four predecessors have quit under pressure yet under those four coaches Ohio State compiled the brilliant record of 89 victories in 17 years as against only 36 defeats and six ties and had only one losing season.

And although he'll be the Ohio State coach, it's a position in which Michigan's Wolverines seem to figure prominently. The three coaches who quit under pressure, resigned after defeats at the hands of Michigan although in the case of Carroll Widdoes, Bixler's immediate predecessor, squad dissolution has been reported as a major factor.

The situation becomes even more anomalous when it is considered most of the other major members of Ohio State's athletic family have held to their jobs for long periods of years.

Athletic director L. W. St. John, who will reach the retirement age of 70 next fall, has headed the athletic department since 1912.

Basketball coach Harold G. Olsen now is in his 24th year and track coach Larry Snyder has been here since 1932 except for the period of his World War II military service.

Starting back with Sam Williams in the period from 1929 to 1933, Ohio State has enjoyed an almost unbroken string of successful football seasons.

Williams won 26 games, lost 10 and tied five in his five-year tenure. In two he's first three years but

the Bucks lost to Michigan in 1932 and 1933 and Williams quit. Then came Francis Schmidt and the era of razzle-dazzle football.

In seven years, Schmidt's teams won 39 and lost 16. He licked Michigan four years in a row but lost to the Wolverines in his last three years and he quit.

Paul E. Brown moved up from Massillon (O.) High School to take Schmidt's place in 1941 and in three seasons he won 18 games, lost eight and tied one. Ohio State won only three of nine games in 1943 but that was taken in stride since the team played 17-year-old freshmen and 4-F's.

Brown left on leave of absence in the spring of 1944 to enter the Navy and then resigned a year later to become coach of Cleveland's entry in the new All-American professional league.

Widdoes coached the Buckeyes in 1944 and 1945 and compiled a record of 16 victories as against only two defeats, both setbacks coming during the past season. He quit following rumors of squad trouble — and after a 7 to 3 defeat by Michigan.

An added quirk to his position is the fact his 1944 team gave Ohio State its first perfect regular season since 1920 and he was named "coach of the year" for the 1944 campaign. However, Widdoes still is a member of the coaching staff.

FORMER TENNIS STAR SUCCUMBS

Editorial-- Slogans--But Be Prepared With The News

MADRID, Jan. 17 (P)—It would be easy for the visitor in Madrid to leap to the conclusion Spain is a land flowing with milk and honey, there's such a plenitude of the good things of life available in the capital—at a price.

People of means are so accustomed to abundance that amazement was expressed by residents with whom I was lunching in a deluxe hotel because the usual succulent beefsteaks weren't available for that meal. The menu was loaded with all sorts of other food, but it happens there's a beef shortage.

What was true of good is also largely true of both necessities and luxuries in other lines. In short, up to the time Mrs. Mack and I left New York at the end of November, probably no city in America had recovered sufficiently from war strain to produce such luxurious meals as Madrid can serve.

But Spain also has her troubles and her prosperity is spotty. Among other things, the cost of living has risen so high that people of small means are having a hard time.

On the whole Spain's relative economic position among the European countries is good. She ranks well among the other neutral states of Switzerland, Portugal and Sweden.

Potentially, Spain may be better off than present conditions indicate. Last year's fierce drought not only resulted in heavy crop failures but emptied reservoirs and thus deprived the country of much water power. Furthermore, the nation's transport systems are run down, and heavy imports are needed.

Favorable weather this year will do much to improve the economic situation.

The black market is having a field day in Spain, just as it is in other European countries.

If you have the cash, you can buy most anything you want. A first class lunch or dinner is from three to five dollars, and you can spend a lot more if you add a few frills.

If you are keeping house your eggs will cost from \$2.00 to \$2.20 per dozen, butter \$2.20 a pound, rice (a staple food here) 60 cents a pound, veal \$1.30 a pound, pork \$1.25, lamb \$1.30 and so on. Clothing isn't so bad, for you can get a good tailor made suit for \$100 and a ready made one from \$30 to \$50.

Middle priced shoes are about \$19 and first class ones are \$30.

Here are some slogans.

"The chief tool of vigilance in Texas is a poll tax receipt." "The poll tax is your ticket of admittance to the voting booth." "The poll tax receipt is a badge of good citizenship." "Total exclusion faces you after January 31st unless you qualify by paying your poll tax or getting an exemption." "The good citizen votes honestly, but first he must vote; and first of all he must pay his poll tax."

And we could go on and on with more catch phrases.

But they all add up to the same thing. It is high time to qualify as a voter for 1946. After January 31 it will be too late, no matter how good your intentions were.

Whether you like the poll tax (and we have openly opposed it as a means of registration) makes no difference. This is the law and until it is changed, it is the means by which we must qualify. Even on this point, the qualified voters will be the one to force the issue.

It is to the best interest of the individual to serve actively as a citizen; it is essential to the welfare of democracy. The wider the participation, the less room for complaint in any decision by the electorate.

The ultimate job in any election, whether it is for city, school, precinct, county, state or national offices, whether it is only special issue like bonds, prohibition, amendments, referendum, etc. is to produce the vote. But the forerunner is first to get the maximum number qualified to vote. We can never persuade people to vote their convictions until they are eligible to vote.

A Valuable Service

So far as Howard county is concerned, predictions of an increasing amount of traffic accidents during 1946 is coming to pass. In and out of Big Spring, there have been a score of crashes of one character or another. Already one fatality on the highways has been reported.

Unless there is a general consciousness on the part of all citizens to drive with double care, we will be in for a tragic year. Any modern program of safety must be two fold; to impress upon the driver first of all to drive with utmost sanity, and to watch out for the other fellow who doesn't have sense enough to watch out for himself.

Any effort expended by any organization or agency in creating and maintaining this safety consciousness will be a valuable service. One life saved by it will be worth more than all the toll and disappointments which go into carrying on such a program.

With The AEF: Critics Blast Against War Correspondents Refuted

MANILA, Jan. 17. (P)—During the battle for Tunisia a skinny little war correspondent weighing 112 pounds was called on the carpet by a chunky American headquarters general in Algiers. "You're little better than a traitor to your country," the general said.

The small man's crime was that he had told fully the horrors of battle and their emotional impact on tired, dirty men.

The brass hats who worry about such matters thought this slender, middle-aged writer was hurting American morale. They were wrong. He turned out to be one of the Army's best morale builders.

That was Ernie Pyle, killed later covering his fifth campaign. It comes as something of a surprise now to read less than a year after Pyle went to his grave that Henry Louis Mencken, the oracle of Baltimore, believes correspondents were "a sorry lot" and did a poor job of covering World War II.

(Eds' Note: Mencken said; however, that Pyle did a good job on the kind of task he set himself to do.) Mencken, dean of American intelligentsia, soundly observes that it is "a primary duty of reporters to tell the truth until it becomes dangerous."

But in concluding that "there

wasn't much of that," he is less than fair to a good number of able and conscientious newspapermen who lie buried in soldier cemeteries today because they never quit trying to be good reporters.

Mencken says of war correspondents generally that they were "either typewriter statesmen turning out dope stuff drearily dreamed up or sentimental human interest scribbles turning out maudlin stuff about the common cold, or else to get by the censors."

There were "typewriter statesmen" among the press corps. Some did write "maudlin stuff" about the common soldier, although Pyle was not one.

But both at headquarters and at the front there were many hard-hitting newsmen who wore out their hearts or risked their lives living up to Mencken's own dictum that "good reporting is an effort to get the truth and tell it, no matter who gets hurt."

They wrote boldly, critically and fully. A lot of it died under the Army's blue pencil, but there was enough got through and it is possible to answer Mencken's complaint that he doesn't "even know yet what generals got licked" in the Battle of the Bulge.

Those of us who were there reported at the time that it was a German by the name of Karl Rudolf Gerd Von Rundstedt.

"Hamlet," Son Of An Industrialist?

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 16 (P)—Despite protests from shocked Shakespeareans, Cary Grant and Alfred Hitchcock are going ahead with their plans for a modern "Hamlet."

Their idea has already evoked the ire of disciples of the Bard, as well as 37 other people who claimed to have originated the notion of doing the classic play in modern dress. But the director and star, who are now working on "Notorious," hope to start the picture by fall, if their writers can produce a good enough script.

"It's as good a psychological thriller as any today," Hitchcock told me. "The main trouble is that there are too many deaths at the end. We would have to kill some of them off-screen, because we couldn't have so many corpses cluttering up the place."

The director said Hamlet's father might be an industrial magnate instead of king, and the locale might be England, or even Detroit. "The soliloquies might be recited on a psychoanalyst's couch and the ghost might end up on a ouija board," he added.

Leaving no stone unturned, the movies are now resorting to opera as a source for musical pictures. MGM producer Arthur Freed is planning an extravaganza which will use an opera as the basis for both plot and music.

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Washington Merry-Go-Round—

Leahy's Advice On Occupation Army

WASHINGTON.

Admiral Leahy, who since the departure of Harry Hopkins knows more about what goes on behind the scenes in international conferences than anyone else around the White House, dropped in to see his chief, President Truman, the other day.

Leahy has worried over the morale of US troops abroad and recalled a commitment Franklin Roosevelt had made to Churchill to keep more than 2,000,000 men in the American armies of occupation.

"I told Franklin Roosevelt after the Yalta conference," the White House Chief of Staff said to Truman, "that we couldn't keep that many men abroad. The country, I told him, won't stand for it."

"These are boys who were glad to fight a war to defend their country when it was in danger. But they're not a professional Army, and when the fighting's over it'll be like a football game—everybody'll want to go home."

"You can't expect boys to stay over there making \$50 a month when they know they can make \$50 a week back home."

"That's what I told Roosevelt," Leahy continued. "I'm not at all sure he agreed with me, but that's what's happening today."

"A few hot-heads and Communists are taking advantage of a situation which is ready made for them and the result is making us ridiculous in the eyes of the world."

Note—Admiral Leahy doesn't for a minute think we should get out of Germany and Japan altogether. But he does think we can curtail US forces in Germany down to what we actually need and let this Army be one of volunteers recruited expressly for overseas occupation. The same system should be followed in Japan, where an occupation force of Marines eventually could take over.

The islands of the Pacific and many other less essential areas could easily be policed by the Navy with much smaller use of manpower.

Cordell Hull's Piker

Ever since the Texas Baptist lampooned President Truman for poker-playing, everyone around the White House has been poking fun. So also is Governor Dewey.

During the last campaign, one newsmen, after writing a very complimentary story about Dewey, submitted it to him for comment. He described the New York governor as a home-loving man whose usual form of relaxation was a quiet poker game with a few friends on Saturday night.

Dewey called the author, praised his story, but finally blurted out: "Now, about those Saturday nights—couldn't you change it from poker to bridge?"

Not sensitive is Cordell Hull. Col. Harold Hinton, now returned from five years in the Army to rejoin the New York Times, is Cordell Hull's official biographer.

In writing his biography, he sent the former Secretary of State several anecdotes for verification. One was a story regarding Hull's ability as a poker player in the Spanish-American war, so the story went, Hull was so good at poker that he kept his company continually out of funds.

When the story came back to Hull, the Secretary of State had crossed out the word "company" and substituted the word "regiment."

Note—There are only 170 men in a company, but about 2,800 in a regiment.

Japs and Marines Cooperate

Two-listed Maury Maverick, retiring chairman of Smaller War Plants Corporation, gave President Truman a very disturbing report on conditions in the Orient last week.

Maverick told Truman he "was

particularly distressed about the morale of American forces in China, where they are increasingly embittered at Chiang Kai-Shek. The GI's, Maverick reported, are boiling mad over the way Chiang has insisted on retaining 20,000 armed Japanese to help put down rival Chinese factions.

When Maverick landed at the Peiping airport, he told Truman that he found 1,000 Marines on one side of the field and 800 armed Japanese on the other. The American boys, many of whose buddies died fighting the Japs, were outraged over the fact that they had to cooperate with their enemies—all for the sake of Chiang Kai-Shek. Maverick went so far as to warn that there might be instances of Chinese killing American troops because of our now being on the same side as the Japs.

Maverick also reported to Truman that American businessmen were suffering economic setbacks in China despite our help to the Chinese government. He said that while the Chinese kept American businessmen at arms' length, the British and Russians were already on their way to resuming large-scale trade.

The Russians have already signed a secret trade agreement with the Chinese which gives them far greater trade opportunities than American business.

At the end of Maverick's gloomy report, the President explained that he was not favoring the Chiang Kai-Shek government, but that he did very much favor peace in China. He said he was aware of the dangers in China, but didn't see what could be done about it until peace was finally worked out.

Note—Since then it looks as if General Marshall finally had worked out the long-desired goal of Chinese peace. State Department experts are very much hoping the peace will be more than a temporary lull.

Capital Staff

The newly appointed Cardinals will fly to the Vatican in two special planes supplied by TWA. Cardinals-Designate Spellman of New York, Glennon of St. Louis and MacGuigan of Canada, together with the two South American Cardinals-Designate, will fly from New York, while Cardinals-Designate Mooney of Detroit and Stritch of Chicago will fly in another plane from Chicago. It may be necessary to take a third plane for the press. Ex-Congressman Casey of Massachusetts is arranging the pilgrimage. . . . Pope Plus is anxious to get the advice of the US Cardinals, especially Cardinal Spellman, for another statement on world peace. . . . GOP Senator Brewster of Maine has been trying for two months to get hold of approximately 1,500 mes-

sages exchanged between President Roosevelt and Winston Churchill during the year before Pearl Harbor. These were the messages for which US Embassy code clerk Tyler Kent was jailed when he revealed their contents to outsiders. The British alleged the "outsiders" included a White Russian in the pay of the Nazis, who immediately communicated the messages to the German legation in Dublin. The State Department so far has been sitting tight on the cables. . . . The officers' club at the National airport has a nice new set of slot machines. Here's how they got them: An Army plane flew from Washington to Biloxi, Miss., picked up five slot machines, and flew them back to Washington. For some time they sat in a plane on the field, where officers and men had a good time playing the machines.

Merry-Go-Round

Postmaster General Bob Hanes has to have a lot of his teeth yanked, but he's stalling the dentist. . . . President Truman has asked astute Roosevelt adviser Isador Lubin to return to the White House staff. . . . Bob Nathan, who resigned in protest against John Snyder's fumbling, has left for a month's rest in Florida prior to opening a Washington economic office of his own. . . . Governor Ellis Arnall of Georgia is still getting feelers from President Truman on the possibility of joining the administration. . . . Judge Sam Rosenman and George Allen are the two greatest practical jokers in the White House. Both call each other up at all hours of the night, impersonating friends and enemies. . . . President Truman longs for the good old days when he could walk through the streets without a bodyguard. . . . The only exercise Truman gets is a regular plunge in the White House swimming pool built for him by his one-time friend, New York News publisher Joe Patterson, later FDR's arch-enemy. . . . The White House is considering Anna Rosenberg for a big job in helping to keep labor peace. Mrs. Rosenberg was one of Roosevelt's most successful operatives.

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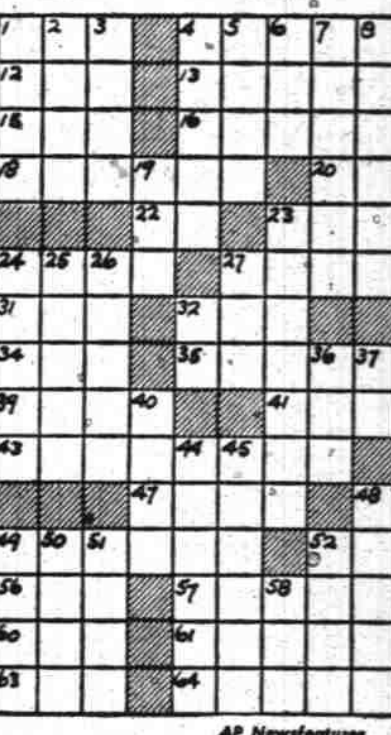

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The Woman in the Window

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For Nothing Dollar-A-Year Man High Paid On This Scale

BALTIMORE — J. Albert Ecklund, 61, retired Baltimore mail carrier, put in 6,300 working hours for free.

Ecklund volunteered for the back-breaking chore of helping to get war ration book No. 3 to Maryland citizens. The ration book is becoming obsolete as a World War I tank, but today the ex-postman is still busy filling the books away.

He refused pay, explaining that he gets a pension for his 37 years as a mail carrier.

Leo H. McCormick, Maryland OPA director, says he believes Ecklund has set a national record for voluntary hours of work.

When he started his volunteer assignment in January, 1943, Ecklund was among 300 workers preparing the ration book. Ecklund devised and put into operation the filling system which now keeps him busy long after the ration book has become extinct. His files, with a card for every ration book issued in Maryland, contain well over 3,000,000 names.

Ecklund usually works eight hours a day. But many times when things were more active, he would take work home and toil over index cards until late at night. OPA officials estimate that he has contributed well over \$8,000 worth of his time.

He says he thinks he'll have the files completed in about three months. But he won't quit then. "If they'll let me," he says, "I'd like to stay here working until the whole OPA closes down."

MEAT SHORTAGE OR COLLEGE FAD?

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 17. (AP) — Note to editors: You can dust off that "college boy swallows goldfish" headline—they're at it again.

The Jokers Club at the University of British Columbia announced one of its members would gulp a goldfish if students made their quota in an international students' fund drive.

The drive went over and engineering student Paul Chutter dipped his hand into a bowl, yanked out a wriggling fish and swallowed one.

DIDN'T DEPEND ON HIS DEPENDENT

HONOLULU, Jan. 17. (AP) — The Navy tells of a certain unnamed sailor who asked Yeoman 2-c George Glogas of Chiloepe Falls, Mass., to help him figure out discharge points.

Texas Plan 1,500,000 New Homes In Future

DALLAS, Jan. 17. (AP) — A glimpse of Texans' buying plans in the post war years has been presented by T. B. Ferguson, vice-president of the Texas Power and Light Company.

Speaking at the Texas Hardware and Implement Association convention, he revealed that according to surveys of the US Chamber of Commerce, 1,500,000 families plan to build or buy new homes when conditions permitted.

Texas are also ready to buy 69,000 electrical refrigerators, 67,000 radios, 54,000 washing machines and 43,000 ranges.

Warm Up The Melting Pot

WASHINGTON — War-imposed restraints on immigration soon will be eliminated. In a short time a trickle of war refugees and displaced persons, pushed or yanked from their homes by the Nazis, will start entering the United States from European refugee camps.

Orphaned children probably will predominate.

Acting under President Truman's December 22 immigration directive, a government committee will give on-the-scene assistance to help speed the movement to this country of European refugees and displaced persons. The refugees will come in under existing immigration laws.

Headed by Ugo Carusi, commissioner of naturalization and immigration of the Justice department, the committee will set up five or six offices in the American zone of Germany.

Staffed by representatives of the Justice and State departments and the U. S. Public Health Service, these offices will pass on the qualifications of refugees and displaced persons seeking to enter the United States.

Why They Stopped

During the war very few persons came to the United States from Europe. The reasons: transportation shortages, closing of American consular offices and obstacles imposed by enemy nations.

In 1942, for example, about 10 per cent of the immigration quotas were used. In 1943 the figure slumped to five per cent. It rose to six per cent in 1944 and to seven per cent in 1945.

Now President Truman says the United States "shares the responsibility to relieve the suffering" resulting from the "appalling displacement of populations in Europe."

In his directive Mr. Truman said:

"To the extent that our present immigration laws permit, everything possible should be done at once to facilitate the entrance of some of these displaced persons and refugees into the United States."

The President's directive principally affects two groups:

1. Natives of Central and Eastern Europe and the Balkans, since most of the refugees and displaced persons are from these areas.

2. Persons at the Oswego, N. Y., war relocation camp.

The total annual immigration quota for the countries of Central and Eastern Europe and the Balkans is about 39,000, says the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Under the law, no more than 10 per cent of the annual quota can be admitted in any month. This limits the number of persons who can be plucked from camps in Europe and moved to this country to about 3,900 a month.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service is uncertain what nationality will be chiefly affected by the President's directive.

Some of the Quotas

A quota of about 25,900 of the 39,000 annual quota for the countries of this area is allotted to Germany. Poland has an annual quota of 6,524, Austria 1,413, Yugoslavia 845, Czechoslovakia 2,874, Bulgaria 100, Hungary 869 and Roumania 377.

Visas issued to refugees and displaced persons will be charged to the country of birth. For example, a visa issued to a Pole in Germany will be charged to the Polish immigration quota. Immigration quotas do not accumulate in years when countries fail to meet their quotas, as during the war.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service says all persons accepted must pass the physical and mental tests set out in the immigration laws. This means that persons guilty of crimes or moral turpitude or those who can't pass physical and mental tests will be rejected.

Refugees Need Sponsors

Each refugee must be supported by a sponsor. This includes guaranteeing travel cost and visa fees.

What about the Oswego refugees? Originally numbering about 1,000, they were moved there temporarily from refugee camps in Italy by the late President Roosevelt. They are described by the Immigration Service as anti-Fascists and anti-Nazi.

Many have relatives in this country. The State Department and the Immigration Service have

decided most of them would be eligible to enter the country if they were applying under the immigration laws.

So, instead of sending them back to Europe to apply for immigration visas to this country, they'll be allowed to become permanent U. S. residents (1) if they wish and (2) if they can qualify under the immigration laws.

DALLAS BUILDING PROGRAM OPPOSED BY TEXAS CIO

DALLAS, Jan. 17. (AP) — The CIO in North Texas has announced its opposition to Dallas county's \$3,000,000 bond issue for a new courthouse. It demanded that the money be spent instead for public housing.

A. R. Hardesty, CIO subregional director, said the unions acted after being assured by counsel that public bond funds could be used legally for housing.

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Mid-Pacific Commander Threatens Agitators With Courts-Martial

HONOLULU, Jan. 17. (AP) — Lt. Gen. Robert C. Richardson, Jr., today ordered court-martial for any soldier or officer in his mid-Pacific command who continues agitation on the demobilization program.

Three enlisted men were confined to quarters pending investigation.

Col. Wilson Gaddis, public relations officer, said no charges have been placed against the trio but their actions since General Eisenhower explained demobilization policy Tuesday are under investigation. Two had been active in demonstrations against a demobilization slowdown.

A directive which Richardson sent to commanders in the mid-Pacific theater stated:

"It has come to my attention that there are certain leaders of enlisted men in this command that are continuing agitation on the demobilization program despite the announcement by General Eisenhower, chief of staff of the army."

"It is directed that you take full and complete measures to instruct these leaders, both officers and enlisted men, and all under your command that further agitation will not be tolerated."

"Enlisted men have had an opportunity to present their griev-

ances which have been met by Eisenhower's announcement and no further mass meetings, agitations or like actions will be permitted. Commanding officers will court-martial offenders for disobedience of orders."

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
