Tenth Annual Roy Bass Awards

Speaker Blasts American Businesses

Keynote speaker for the 10th annual Roy B. Bass Awards banquet Monday was Ms. Alma Newsom, former communications director for the late Congressman Mickey Leland and a twenty year media professional, who blasted American businesses for its poor record on seeing that minorities have an opportunity in the workforce.

Two Lubbock businesses were praised for their efforts in the hiring of minorities. They were Dennis Brothers Printers and Eagle Picher Industries.

The awards are named for former Lubbock Mayor Roy B. Bass, who worked to break down racial barriers in Lubbock.

In her address, Ms. Newsom blasted the corporate community, claiming business has infected American workers in general with a paranoia felt by minority workers.

That paranoia, she said, teaches that "it does not pay to be loyal to a company. No matter how hard you do, no matter how hard you work... you can be cut the next day at the drop of a hat," by company mergers, acquisitions or management changes.

"It's just good business to hire minorities, and see that they have an opportunity," she said.

"The fate of your society is in your hands. It's a pretty simple choice. The choice is, companies can continue to misuse and abuse and not give a fair shake to minorities in the workplace, and therefore suffer... Or the corporate community can do like the businesses that are being honored here in Lubbock are doing," she said.

The Handicap Worker of the Year award was presented by Mayor B. C. "Peck" McMinn to Christine Irlbeck.

Ms. Joan Y. Ervin introduced the speaker, while Fulton Berry and Beatrice Narvaiz made the award presentations. Abner Eureshi, Channel 11, KCBD-TV, served as master of ceremonies.

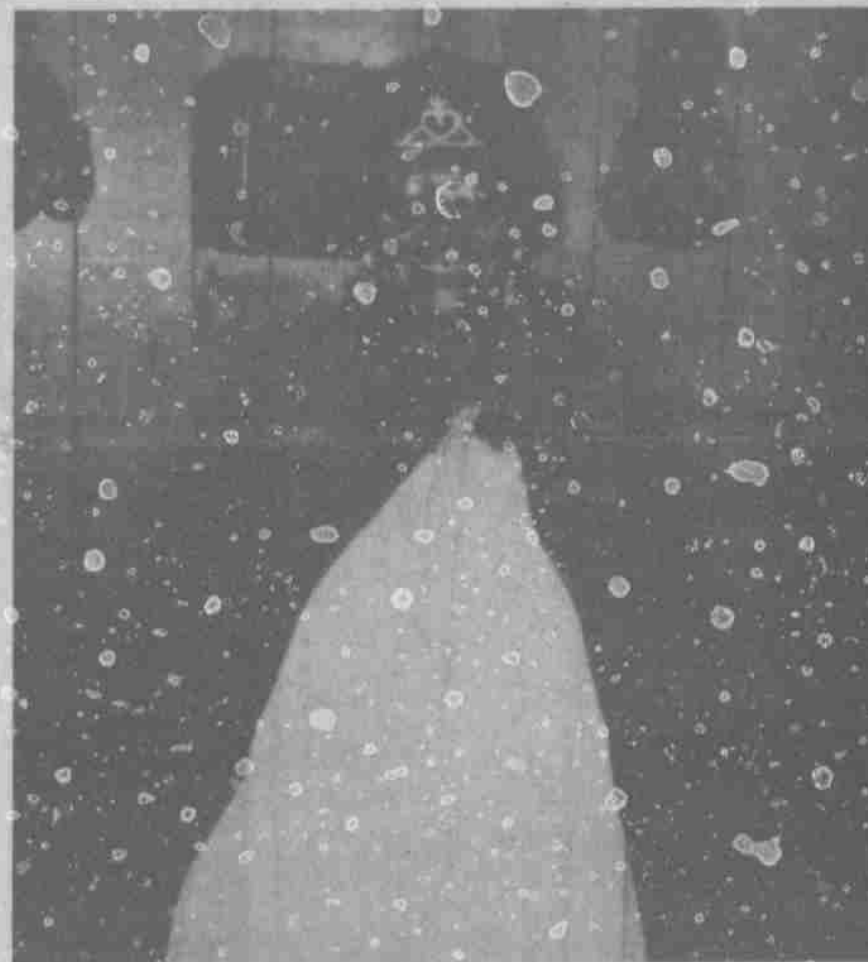

Lubbock Teacher Honored By State Bilingual Education Association

Esperanza Solis of Harwell Elementary is in Austin this week attending the Texas Association of Bilingual Education Annual Conference. Solis has been chosen as 1st Runner-up Bilingual Educator of the Year for the state of Texas, an honor for which she said, "I am both honored and humbled to be chosen from among the many dedicated teachers throughout Texas who have addressed the unique characteristics that children with bilingual backgrounds bring to the classroom." Despite the obstacles that Bilingual Education in Texas has had to face, the program has been successful in capitalizing on the extra talents and potential contribution that bilingualism can provide our society. In spite of the English-only movement, Bilingualism and in particular, Spanish, has taken on a significant position in the business world due to the need to internationalize our relationship with other societies.

Mrs. Solis has been teaching for 17 years, mostly in bilingual programs, since her graduation from Miller High School in Cor-

pus Christi and Texas A&I in Kingsville Texas. Her first assignment was with the highly successful and progressive program in Crystal City (Cristal) Texas during the height of Raza Unida activism. That program was used as a model for bilingual education in the early seventies by the Federal government due to its innovations. Solis credits her tenure at Cristal for the concepts and methodologies presently utilized in her classrooms. An example of this is the fact that this year, her first grade students, many of whom are branded "low achievers" were reading both English and Spanish within the first week of the start of school.

Solis has also taught in the Wichita Kansas Independent School district and presented workshops in many bilingual conferences throughout the years. She holds a Masters Degree in Bilingual Education and is within six (6) hours of obtaining her administrative certificate.

Mrs. Solis expressed her gratitude to all the teachers and administrators who provided letters

It may likewise manifest itself through feelings of low self-esteem, unhealthy addictive relationships, constant people pleasing behavior, drug dependency or smoking.

BBB Report Federal Record Service Corp.

Consumers have reported receiving a letter from the Birth Records Division of the FEDERAL RECORD SERVICE CORP. in Washington, D. C. The mailing advises parents that it is very important that their children be issued a Social Card. For \$15 the firm will send a filled in application form to submit to the Social Security Administration, along with appropriate documents. Be advised that no one has to pay money to an organization to apply for a Social Security number for a child. Simply phone the Social Security Office, and you will be sent the appropriate application. Although local Social Security officials agree that a card for children should be secured as quickly as possible, paying someone to fill out the simple form is a bad deal. Even if a consumer takes up FEDERAL RECORD SERVICE's offer, they still have to take the forms in themselves to the Social Security office. Even if this offer is unpopular with the government, it is not at this time illegal.

Proposition 3 Is An Investment In All The People of Texas

Proposition 3 on the November 7 ballot is a proposal to invest in the people of who want to start small, local enterprises to rebuild the Texas economy from the ground up. It has the potential to create 15,000 new jobs in Texas food and fiber businesses that themselves have the potential to achieve half a billion dollars in annual sales. Why should Texas import grapes from Chile, textiles from Taiwan and watermelon from Florida when we can grow and process our own products right here at home, creating new jobs and expanding the local tax base for our own people.

In an ideal world, capital for agriculture-businesses should be provided by private enterprise. The problem, however is that Texas in general, and the Texas agriculture in particular, have been redlined by the major money-lending institutions in this country. There are hundreds, if not thousands of Texans with the know-how and the market surveys to show that their ideas for innovative business creation will work. All they lack is access to the capital they need to get started.

I realize these lending practices are not news to Texas' 2 million citizens of African heritage. Black business operators in both urban and rural areas know the impact of redlining on a community. Black-operated farms in Texas have declined from a peak of nearly 90,000 in 1930 to fewer than 3,000 producers today. Each time a Black producer goes out of business, the Black community loses a valuable economic resource forever. These business operators and food producers won't be surprised what a recent study by the Texas Department of Agriculture and the University of Texas' LBJ School of Public Affairs discovered. The majority of banks in our survey would not provide start-up loans for new agricultural businesses, and only 25 percent of lenders are willing to make loans for agricultural processing, marketing or new crop production. Of those willing to make agricultural loans, most are offering loans of less than three years, while the businesses requiring the loans usually need three to 10 years in which to begin showing a profit.

If you're a Supercollider or a consortium of microchip moguls, you don't have much problem getting money. But, if you want to build a redfish hatchery in Beaumont, a beef slaughter plant in Lubbock or a hydroponic greenhouse in Houston's Fifth ward, about all you get from many lenders is "goodbye and good luck."

Texas agriculture is positioned for significant growth over the next five years and Black Texans are in good position to play a major role in the agriculture industry of the 1990's. Many Black producers have not been able to afford the toxic chemicals that many of the so-called experts have claimed since World War II are necessary to produce a crop. Instead, they have learned to nurture the land by using compost and natural fertilizers, tillage, crop rotation and other sound agriculture practices. The only thing that slows the expansion of the food and fiber industry in Texas is lack of financing.

The economic potential of food and fiber processing is enormous. Texas ranks second in the nation in the value of agricultural commodities, but we process only six percent of the nation's food. If we build enough facilities to process just one percent more of the nation's food, we could earn an extra \$3 billion a year in new sales.

Since private capital will not finance this enterprise, it is time for state government to invest in the sweat, hard



work and genius of all the people of Texas. Proposition 3 can start this process without costing taxpayers a single penny. State-backed financing and business services will provide loans and loan guarantees to qualified, creditworthy applicants, who will repay the state just as they would any other lender.

The demand for Texas-produced food and fiber products is so high that hundreds of rock-solid, can't lose business proposals will be lined up and knocking at the door of the six-member Texas Agricultural Finance Authority as soon as the financing is available.

Look at what is already happening in this state. Over in the Central Texas community of Copperas Cove, TDA is working with a Black-owned business which, when funded, will specialize in processing organic produce which will be packaged for fast food restaurants in Texas. The company, Texas Hill Country Food Processors, which could be a prime beneficiary of passage of Proposition 3 on November 7, expects to create 50 new jobs in its first year and have sales of \$3.5 million. TDA is also working with Black-owned food processors in Dallas, Tyler, and Fort Worth on marketing their products across the state. These companies have the potential to help create the kind of economic base needed to deal with the severe unemployment and education problems facing the next generation of Black Texans.

There is a Spanish dicho: "El dinero es como el abono; da nada sirve si no se desparrama," or "Money is like manure; it does no good unless you spread it around." Proposition 3 will "do the right thing" spreading the money around — not to one giant project run by a huge corporation, but to hundreds of Texans from the plains of Lubbock to the sidewalks of Houston.
