NINE DIE, MANY HURT IN BLASTS

COTTON BREAKS ON HESTER'S REPORT

ESTIMATES ON YIELD ADD TO BEARISH VIEW

HESTER SAYS 15,836,000 BALES OF U. S. STAPLE USED THIS YEAR

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—The recent tendency to increase estimates of the probable crop, combined with the New Orleans trade authority, were reflected in a further decline of about \$2.50 a bale in the cotton market today.

Offerings tapered off somewhat as a decline of 46 to 53 points from yesterday's closing quotations and afternoon rallies were not fully maintained, the market showing net losses of 58 to 42 points.

Liquidation evidently was influenced by continued favorable weather reports together with the general tendency to increase crop estimates which now are around 15,000,000 bales. With an approximate carry over of 5,000,000 bales from the last season, the indicated total supply of 20,000,000 bales apparently was more than the market could support.

October contracts which closed yesterday at 20.15 cents a pound declined to 19.62, while December, at 19.87 yesterday, slipped to 19.44.

15,836,000 Bales Consumed, Report

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 1.—The annual statement of H. O. Hester, secretary of the New Orleans cotton exchange, issued today, shows that world consumption of American cotton the past season was 15,836,000 bales, including 220,000 bales.

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MIAMI WOMAN DIES IN WRECK

DAUGHTER HURT WHEN CAR PLUNGES FROM HIGHWAY CULVERT

PAMPALA, Tex., Aug. 1.—Mrs. A. W. Chism, Miami, Texas, was killed and her daughter, Mrs. Grady Bailey, also of Miami, probably fatally injured when their automobile ran off a culvert and overturned several times near Miami last night.

Mrs. Chism died in an ambulance. Mrs. Bailey still was unconscious today and the cause of the accident could not be learned.

Blanche Chism, 11, daughter of Mrs. Chism, escaped injury.

One Dies As Crane Hits Power Line

WILLIAMSBURG, Kan., Aug. 1.—J. B. Poca, 35, of Garland, Texas, was killed and G. R. Reid, 28, of Stigler, Okla., was seriously injured here today when a boom used for loading pine on a truck came into contact with an electric power line carrying 4,000 volts.

The men were employees of the Oklahoma Contracting company of Dallas, Texas, and were engaged in the construction of a building for the city of Williamsburg.

MOODY TO SPEAK TO COTTON MEN

DALLAS, Aug. 1.—Governor Dan Moody, who was largely responsible for the formation of the south-wide cotton council, Col. J. O. Thompson, wealthy landowner and financier of Birmingham, Ala., B. Odenheim, New Orleans, president of the Lane cotton mills, and other noted leaders in the program for orderly control and disposition of the south's cotton crop will speak at the meeting here tonight of the Texas section of the national organization.

Banks, cotton factors, shippers, landowners, farmers and others directly interested in the production and distribution of cotton will attend the dinner to discuss various phases of valuation of the crop and maintenance of good prices on the staple.

The meeting here will be followed by similar gatherings in each of the other southern states.

TOTAL CHARGE OF INFLUENCE DENIED BY NUN

WOMAN ASSERTS SHE DIDN'T SAY DEATHS WERE NECESSARY

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 1.—Concepcion Aguedo De La Lata, the nun who was named by Jose De Leon, Texas, as having influenced him directly to assassinate General Alvaro Obregon, testified at the preliminary hearing of Toral today that she never told him or anyone else that the deaths of President Calles, General Obregon and patriarch Perez were necessary for a settlement of the religious conflict.

She denied that she had ever influenced Toral to kill any living creature, saying:

"I never thought that he would kill even a flea."

In speaking of the prisoner she used the intimate nickname of "Torito."

Toral's wife, Paz Martin Delcampe De La Lata, testified that the nun and a Catholic priest named Jimenez had exercised such an influence over Toral that they had distracted his attention from her. She denied having any knowledge of her husband's intention to commit the crime.

The priest, Jimenez, was mentioned frequently in police announcements respecting the investigation as one with whom Toral frequently visited. He has been sought but not found by the authorities.

Scouts Having "Time Of Lives" With Leaders Well Pleased In Encampment

ACTIVITY PROGRAM IS FULL AND 115 ARE IN ATTENDANCE

One hundred and fifteen South Plains youngsters are "having the time of their lives" in the annual Scout Camp of the South Plains area council at the Post Memorial scout camp near Post, according to word received from there today. The camp, considered the best ever held for a group of boys in West Texas, got under way Monday morning and will close on August 8.

Forty-seven of the group are from Lubbock, 26 from Lamesa, 18 from Floydada, 16 from Slator, 10 from Ralls, 9 from Brownfield, 2 from O'Donnell and Roswell while Tarkenton is represented by one boy. Besides the boys registered in the camp there are 19 scoutmasters and workers which swell the camp attendance to 134, the largest enrollment in the history of the council.

Days Are All Busy.

Reveille awakes the camp at 6 a. m. and from then until taps at 10 p. m., after which all is quiet and lights are out, the boys are engaged in the busiest days of their lives. Breakfast comes at 7 o'clock followed by a short setting up exercise program. Following breakfast, the boys are ordered to their tents to clean up. Shortly afterwards the call is issued for handicraft and general scouting work which is participated in throughout the morning until 11 o'clock when inspection is made. Lunch comes at 12 and at 1:30 swimming and hiking are the two recreations. The remainder of the afternoon is spent in general scouting work.

Supper call is issued at 6 and at 8 o'clock, the nightly campfire program gets under way, lasting until about 9:30.

Yesterday afternoon's program for a majority of the boys consisted in a trip to Hot Canyon, about four miles from the camp.

Swimming in Two-Draw lake is carried on under the "Buddy system" which requires the constant companionship of two boys while in the water. Six life guards are on duty, two in a boat, at all times while the boys are in the water.

SPANISH SHIP STARTS JAUNT

WORLD TOUR BEGUN IN HOP TODAY BY CREW ABOARD NUMANCIA

CADIZ, Spain, Aug. 1.—The hydroplane Numancia, piloted by Major Ramon Franco Hopped off for the Azores at 7:15 a. m. today. From there he intends to continue around the world by way of the United States.

The plane was heavily laden and did not rise until the third attempt. Major Franco and Captain Ruiz De Alda, who is one of the crew, accompanied him. They were the first to span the south Atlantic by air, accomplishing the feat in 1926.

The seaplane is a 2,000 horsepower super Dornier Wal of Spanish design. It has a cruising radius of 4,000 kilometers (2,485 miles). It has shown an average speed in test of 104 miles an hour.

Equipped With Hammocks.

The plane is equipped with hammocks so that those off duty may rest. The cabin is fitted with navigation devices which Ruiz De Alda said, were similar to those in the cabin of the captain of a large liner.

Projected stops on the flight include Horta, Island of Fayal, Azores; Halifax, N. S.; New York; Havana, Mexico City, La Paz, Bolivia; Lower California, San Francisco, Port Resurrection, B. C.; Unalakleet, Alaska, and Petropavlovsk, Siberia. From Siberia Major Franco will fly to Japan, the Philippines, India, Italy and back to Cadiz.

The purpose of the flight is to prove the possibility of using the seaplane as a successful means of transporting passengers and mail across the ocean.

Flight Goes On Without Incident

MADRID, Aug. 1.—Radio advice here said that the Spanish trans-Atlantic plane Numancia now enroute to the Azores communicated with station at Lisbon and Operated at 2:30 p. m., reporting that the flight was being made without incident.

MISSING GIRL IS NOT FOUND

SEARCH FOR DOROTHY HARGROVE FRUITLESS TO PRESENT TIME

Efforts to locate Dorothy Hargrove, 14-year old daughter of Mrs. Beale Sanders, 1918 15th Street, who has been missing from her home since last Saturday, still proved to be fruitless today. No trace or information leading to her whereabouts has been found either by her mother or members of the sheriff's department who are aiding in the search for the girl.

Mrs. Hargrove stated today that she had no idea where the girl had gone. She had started from the residence Saturday afternoon to meet her mother who is an employee of a local store and that was the last word from her. The girl was wearing a yellow voile dress and a black hat when last seen. Her mother's description gives her red hair, a fair complexion and is 5 feet 6 inches high, and weighs about 120 pounds.

The girl was thought to have gone to Athens to visit with a friend but communication there shattered this theory. Her father, W. L. Hargrove, is thought to be lying in Fort Worth but efforts to locate him have also failed.

Tech Budget Given Board Of Control

AUSTIN, Aug. 1.—Asking for the completion of the administration building, the erection of a library and a dairy products building to be included in the budget of the college for the next biennium, the board of directors of Texas Technological college are in joint session here today with the state board of control.

Anticipating a much larger enrollment than experienced in the past three years, the officials of the West Texas college are asking for an appropriation in proportion to the growth of the school.

The directors are also asking for the same salary scale as used in the University of Texas.

WHITE SAILS TO "PURGE SINS"

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—William Allen White, Kansas editor who has been attacking Governor Smith's candidacy for presidency, sailed with his wife today for an indefinite stay in Europe, a stay which he said he hoped would last until after the election.

"There's the longest gangplank in the world," he said as he started up from the pier to the deck of the French liner De Grasse. "It will take me 3,000 mess."

Asked concerning his plans White said he was going to Paris "with a chunk of money" and "when that gave out he could come back."

"One thing I am going to do," he added, "is to go to Bayreuth and take a big Wagnerian course in paraisal and purge myself of all my sins."

"What are your sins," a reporter asked.

"We are all sinners," he replied. "I want to be purged of my political sins and my moral sins if possible."

FOUR MILLION IS CALLED FOR BY GOP HEADS

FIGURE IS FIXED AT CONFERENCE TODAY IN WASHINGTON

(The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—A republican campaign fund of \$4,000,000 was called for today by Chairman Work of the national committee.

The figure was fixed at a conference of party leaders here, including J. R. Nutt, committee treasurer; Jeremiah Milbank, eastern treasurer; Franklin W. Ford, committee secretary; and Herbert L. Gutterman, executive secretary.

Active solicitation of funds will begin very soon, Mr. Nutt said. Meanwhile, he reported, many contributions, large and small, are coming into the republican till from all sections of the country.

The 1928 campaign of the party has been estimated to have cost a little more than \$3,000,000.

Discussing the increased fund, chairman Work merely remarked that there were 12,000,000 more voters this year than four years ago and that the increase in postage alone would require a considerable amount.

The committee's announcement said the chairman "after studying the needs and requirements of the various bureaus of the republican organization has concluded that the legitimate expenditures of the campaign will be about \$4,000,000."

No Contribution Limit.

Mr. Nutt declared that while no limit had been placed upon the amount of contributions "discretion will be used."

"We won't accept any contribution," he said.

CANADA CANAL GATE BREAKS UNDER PRESSURE; EXPLOSION ROCKS REFINERY IN INDIANA

(By Associated Press)

ST. CATHERINES, Ont., Aug. 1.—Collapse of the steel gate of lock number 6 of the New Welland Canal at Thorold, Ont., today caused the deaths of at least nine workmen and injuries to about thirty others.

About forty workmen were in the vicinity of the lock when the disaster occurred and none is believed to have escaped death or injury.

The accident was caused by the boom of one of the cranes slipping when an effort was being made to raise a 500 ton steel gate into place.

40 Or 50 Injured In Refinery Blast

VINCENNES, Ind., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Between 40 and 50 men suffered burns and four of them are in a serious condition as a result of an oil explosion early today at the plant of the Indian Refining company at Lawrenceville, Ill., nine miles west of here. The blast followed a fire at one of the steam stills and extinguished the flames.

The property damage was small, being estimated at approximately \$1,000.

Employees of the refinery answered the fire call and were mending the chemical hose when the load of the still blew out, pouring hot oil over the fire-fighters.

Thirty-six of the injured men were rushed in ambulances to the Good Samaritan hospital here after receiving first aid treatment at the company hospital. Three of the men were released after their wounds were dressed.

Officials of the refinery appealed for doctors, nurses and ambulances were pressed into service, taking the more seriously hurt to Vincennes hospitals.

Origin of the small fire which caused the explosion has not been determined.

Louis Hensley, a foreman in the refinery construction department, died from burns soon after reaching the hospital.

Doctors said there was little hope for Robert Shields and Gene Burbank, two of the volunteer fire fighters seriously burned.

MOODY GAINS ON OPPONENTS

VOTE NEAR 400,000 AS 153 COUNTIES SHOW COMPLETE COUNT

DALLAS, Aug. 1.—Returns of 1928 Saturday's primary compiled by the Texas Election Bureau today from 251 out of 253 counties in the state, including 153 complete, saw Governor Dan Moody only a few votes short of 390,000 mark. His total of 389,562 was almost double that of his nearest rival, Louis Warshaw, with 225,296.

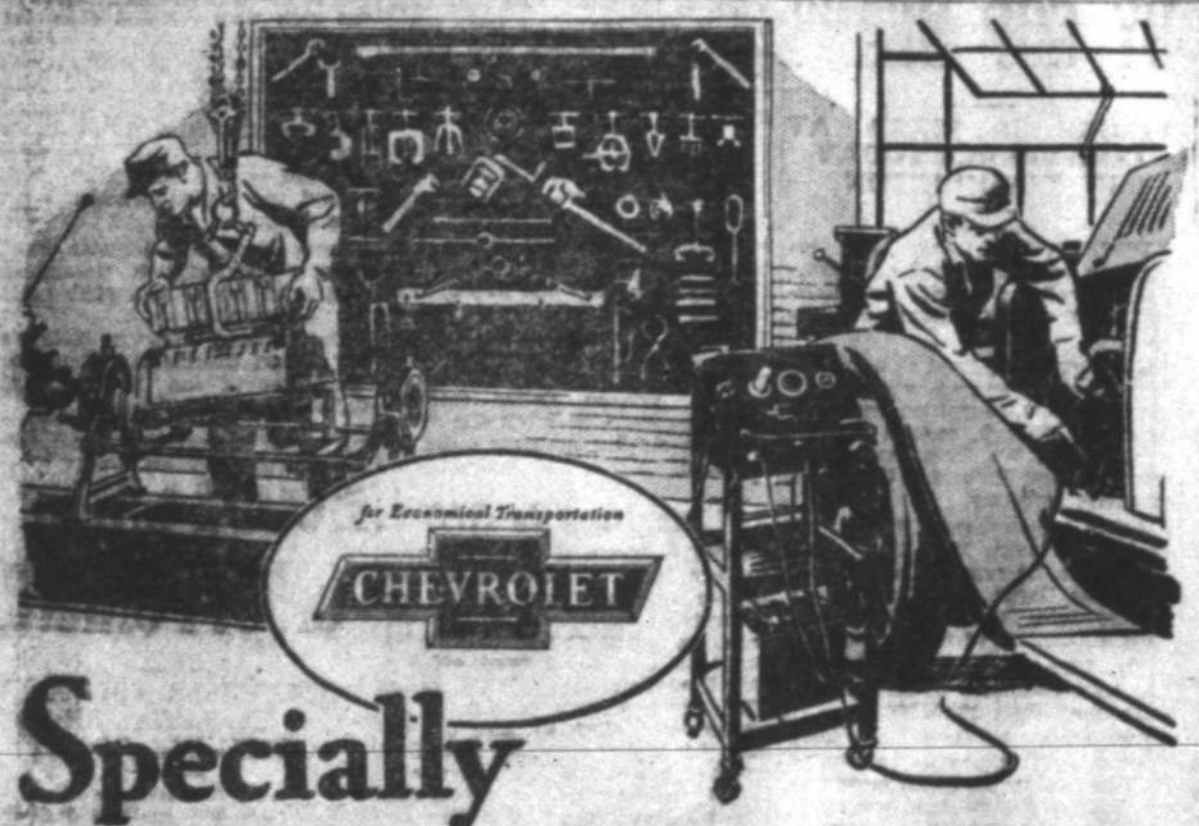

CITY PLAN, GOOD ROADS AND OTHER PUBLIC NEEDS CITED

Citing the expenditure of several thousand dollars on a city planning system as the greatest need of Lubbock, Charles E. Watkins, educational director of the American City Bureau of Muncie, Indiana, spoke to a small group of business men in the district court room last night on the importance of Community Building. Mr. Watkins' talk outlined the needs of the city and explained the importance of a city plan, city

airport, good roads, publicity campaigns and other community projects.

A city which grows without following a city plan is making a great mistake, Mr. Watkins said as he explained the city planning systems which have built greater cities of such cities as Atlanta, St. Louis, Richmond, Pittsburgh and other large centers.

Good Roads Boosted
Speaking of the building of good roads, Watkins pointed out North Carolina as an example of a state that in the face of adverse conditions, mortgaged her future for funds to build good roads. Within the past five years that state had made the most outstanding progress per capita of any state in the union.

Create an atmosphere that will make your farmer friend who comes out to the lane in his car to point the radiator in the direction in Lubbock, Watkins said. Make the customer feel at home. Do anything that will make him more prosperous.

He also cited the importance of building an airport here, stating that any town which does not build an airport will miss the commerce of the air which will eventually run into considerable figures.

"I understand that within your trade territory you have something like five million acres of virgin soil that is selling for men to come, build a home and make a fortune."

Boosts Publicity Drive
The speaker pointed to the advantages of an efficient advertising campaign to tell the world of these idle acres. At the close of the meeting Mayor Woods recalled work that has been done in putting over a community advertising campaign. He praised Lubbock for the team work she has and asked the citizens present to work even harder on the advertising program and on other issues.

Jim Penland of Waco who brought a speaker to Lubbock about three years ago and who was responsible for the visit of Watkins, was introduced and made a short address.

Republicans Plan Offensive On Air

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP).—Republicans are formulating an extensive aerial offensive and there are indications that Herbert Hoover may rely almost entirely on the radio in making his campaign.

Under tentative plans more than \$200,000 of the campaign chest will be allotted to radio expenses. This is in contrast with \$40,000 in 1924.

Nationwide hookups will be sought for the principal speeches with emphasis centered on the opening speech of Mr. Hoover when he is formally notified of his nomination at Palo Alto, Calif., a week from Saturday.

Cotton Markets

NEW ORLEANS TRADING

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 1. (P)—Cotton prices continued to decline today under heavy liquidation by the long interest and selling induced by lower Liverpool cables than due and continued favorable weather in the belt.

First trades showed loss of 10 to 17 points and prices continued to ease off after the start until October reached 19.25, December 19.27 and January 19.25, or 25 to 30 points below yesterday's close. Toward the end of the first hour prices rallied 9 to 10 points on covering by shorts but business tapered off at these figures with trading disinclined to enter upon new commitments in advance of Secretary Hester's annual figures which are expected to be issued during the day.

Secretary Hester's annual report about net expectations and this induced further liquidation. Before the offerings were absorbed October sold off to 19.09, December 19.04 and January 19.08, or 20 to 32 points under the previous close. A favorable weekly weather and crop report was a contributing factor to the decline.

Towards mid-session prices rallied 15 to 18 points on the announcement that the labor trouble in Great Britain had been settled and a rumor that there would be a 4 percent abandonment in acreage allowed in the next government report, although there was no confirmation of the rumor.

NEW YORK TRADING

NEW YORK, Aug. 1. (P)—The cotton market opened steady today at a decline of 16 to 20 points under renewed liquidation and more or less general selling inspired by a more optimistic view of the crop outlook, reports of continued good weather in the south, and relatively easy Liverpool cables.

Covering and trade buying on scale down orders were insufficient to hold prices at the initial figures and step orders were uncovered on the decline, which soon extended to 19.04 for December or about 37 to 32 points net lower. The market was still more or less unsettled and prices were within 3 to 4 points of the lowest at the end of the first hour.

Liverpool cables reported general liquidation and short selling in Liverpool and that cloth buyers were holding off in anticipation of lower prices.

The early break of about 20 to 23 points was followed by moderate rallies on reports that Manchester labor troubles had been settled and a less favorable weekly weather report. The season-end figures from New Orleans, placing the world's consumption of American cotton at 15,828,000 bales and the carryover at 5,296,000, caused further weakness, however, and the market was nervous and unsettled after their publication. December broke to 19.04, with active months showing net losses of 40 to 45 points before the decline was checked. The pressure subsided somewhat at these figures, and at midday the market was less active, with prices showing rallies of 8 to 9 points from the lowest.

At mid afternoon October contracts sold at 19.20, or 21 points over the low.

NOBILE PARTY ACCORDED BIG FETE IN ITALY

SURVIVORS OF ITALIA ARE RECEIVED IN ROYAL FASHION

(By Associated Press)
ROME, Aug. 1.—With the cheers of their countrymen ringing in their ears, General Umberto Nobile and five other survivors of the Italia were in Italy today while the nation rejoiced over their having been snatched from death in the Arctic. Women wept and three flowers were placed on the survivors when they reached Rome in the special car which had brought them from Narvik, Norway. Two of the rescued men did not return to Italy. Captain Alberto Mariano being left behind in a hospital in Florence, his foot and Professor F. Behounek returning to his native Czechoslovakia.

Received in Royal Style
General Nobile and his companions were received almost with royal honors by Prince Umberto, the Italian king's son, and other high officials in the room of the railway station reserved for the king and his family.

When they came out on the street the crowd went wild and broke through the lines of police and carabinieri. Scores of women embraced the explorers. The automobiles bearing them were able to proceed only at the speed of a slow walk toward the men's homes.

General Nobile appeared tired and his face showed plainly the hardships he had undergone. His companions, with the exception of radio operator Giuseppe Biagi, looked the worse for their experiences. Biagi was in gay good humor and seemed ready for another hazardous trip to the north.

Lieutenant Alfredo Vigliani, navigator, who was in command of the red tent encampment on the ice after Nobile was rescued, was the center of a demonstration all his own. He left the train soon after passing the frontier town of Borghetto Santo Spirito. Enroute he had to stop at Milan where the Italia started its fatal voyage.

Given Big Reception
The prefect of Milan and an enormous crowd welcomed him. Women and girls covered him with flowers. Admiral Camperio, whose wife was Eleanor Terry, daughter of Admiral Silas W. Terry, U. S. N., presented Vigliani with a basket of fruits and champagne decorated with ribbons in the colors of the Italian navy. Mingled with shouts of "Viva Vigliani" and "Viva Nobile" were cries of "Down with the jackals of the anti-Italian Press."

MOSES PLANS TO SEEK ELECTORAL VOTES IN SOUTH

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Senator George M. Moses, vice chairman of the eastern advisory committee on the Hoover campaign, now believes an intensive drive should be made to secure electoral votes for Herbert Hoover in the solid south.

Senator Moses said his change of mind had been brought about by letters he had received from the south criticizing his recent statement that it would be useless for the republicans to make a drive for electoral votes there.

"My correspondents told me," he said, "that I am crazy if I think Hoover will not get the electoral votes of the south. I am in a highly chastened mood as a result of these letters."

The bulk of his letters urging republican action came from North Carolina, Florida and Georgia, he said. Senator Moses said he was not so sanguine about Georgia but that the reaction in the other two southern states was significant.

Warning Issued On Tree Worm In City

Anticipating calls from numbers of local citizens regarding the recent appearance of little reddish brown worms on Chinese Elm trees in Lubbock, Dean A. H. Leidigh, of the Tech school of agriculture, today issued a warning to all owners of Chinese elms to be on the lookout for the worms and spray their trees. The worms cut the leaves from the trees, he said.

A rather serious infestation of these worms was noted among the Chinese elms in Lubbock during the summer of 1926, Dean Leidigh said. Early application of spraying chemicals will prevent their spread, he said. A light application of arsenic of lead is best.

As the majority of the trees on the campus are of the Chinese Elm variety, Dean Leidigh and officials of the school were on tour of inspection of the campus today in search of traces of the worms there.

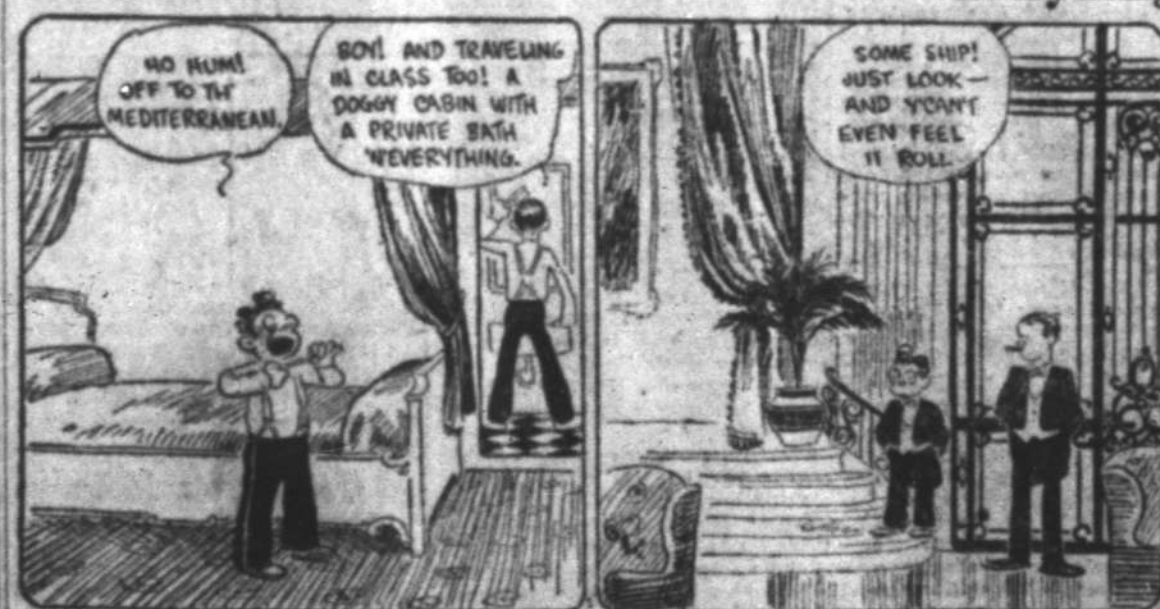

COST HEAVY IN DRY DRIVE ON GOTHAM, CLAIM

\$65,000 TO \$75,000 SPENT TO GET EVIDENCE REPORT SHOWS

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Prohibition authorities estimated today that it cost between \$65,000 and \$75,000 to obtain evidence which they believe will dry up Broadway.

Four undercover agents from Washington, whom Broadway has nicknamed "The Four Horsemen," made the rounds of the night resorts, establishing contact through the liberal spending of money.

Liberal Spenders
Coming to New York in February these four men soon became well known in the city's night life as liberal spenders, making no complaint at paying \$22 a bottle for mead, \$42 for champagne, \$25 for cocktails, \$1.75 for imported and \$1.50 for domestic ginger ale.

They were welcomed at all the night clubs. When they disappeared Broadway wondered where they had gone, but not for long. "On the night Governor Smith was nominated for the presidency at Houston federal raiding parties descended on Broadway and served warrants on the late hosts and hostesses of "The Four Horsemen."

Enter came the padlocking of the bars in six of the most popular clubs and yesterday indictments were returned against eight clubs and 31 individuals, raising the total indictments of the week to 26 night clubs and 139 individuals. One of the bars padlocked was Texas Guinan's Salon Royale.

The drive to dry up Broadway brings to light a contest among three women—Texas Guinan and Helen Morgan, two of the street's brightest lights, and Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, assistant United States attorney general in charge of prohibition enforcement.

She Directed Campaign
It was Mrs. Willebrandt who directed "The Four Horsemen" in their devastating ride through the white light district and Texas and Helen two of those who unwittingly entertained them.

Tex and Helen themselves are in direct contrast. Tex is blonde and gay and speaks the language of Broadway. Helen is dark and sad and sings plaintive little songs in a throaty voice.

Tex began life on the Texas plains, acted in some three hundred wild west movies and then came to New York. For several years now she has been urging the "suckers" (she calls them) that as they come into her club to "give the little girls a big hand." She does not drink and lives quietly in Greenwich Village with her brother and mother.

STATEMENT SAYS BAN AND ARGUMENT BEAT HER IN CONTEST

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Aug. 1.—Mrs. Edith Wilmans, defeated candidate for governor in Saturday's primary election, issued a statement today in which she charged her defeat to the fact that her name was left off the ballot in six counties and indicated that she would contest the election.

Her statement, in part, follows: "As the victim of unjust manipulation of the recent primary election by judges, executive committee chairmen and others, I have lost for the time being in the contest just closed. I know that thousands of voters stayed out of the primary fearing they might jeopardize their right to vote in the general election. These men and women, I feel sure, would have voted for me. To them I send greetings and ask that they join with me in the furtherance of a movement to punish those responsible for the loss of the valuable right of the voter to cast his vote in a state election and the loss to me as a candidate in my being deprived by their unjust manipulations of my right to the votes

which would have been cast for me. I believe a recount and the fact that the vote in numerous counties where my name was left off the ballot show that if my name had appeared on those ballots and there had been no unjust coercion used, which kept the voters from the polls that there would have been no majority in the first primary in the governor's race. "Therefore, there has been no legal majority cast for any candidate so far, and I think the courts will so hold in a contest to be filed."
