## Champions lead sale of Cooke County Jr. Livestock projects

Jeremy Bayer of the Muenster 4-H received \$2,948 for his 1,305-pound steer which won dual honors of reserve champion steer and champion county bred steer during the premium sale of some 250 market animals Saturday to conclude the three-day Cooke County Junior Livestock Show.

Cory Schad of the Lindsay 4-H received \$1,994 for his reserve champion county bred steer. Prices include both the premium and floor amounts. Derek West's Grand Champion steer brought \$3,533.50.

More than 400 people attended the sale of 4-H and FFA project animals under the direction of local auctioneer Milton Ward.

The way the sale was conducted was changed this year, said Ward. Instead of bidding the premium per pound, the bids were in dollar amounts regardless of the animal's weight, he said.

Roy and Connie Bryant bought the \$1,500 premium on Jeremy Bayer's steer, which brought a floor price of 76.5 cents per pound. David's Discount Foods in Gainesville purchased the \$1,000 premium on Cory Schad's steer, which brought a floor price of 80.5 cents per pound.

The floor for the hogs, lambs and rabbits was set by packers. IBP of Sioux City, Iowa, set a 49-cent floor price on the hogs. Harrell Barrett set a 43.5-cent price on the lambs and Terry Barrett set an \$11 per animal floor on the rabbits. Those purchasing the premiums had the option to also purchase the animal by paying the floor price.

West's 1,300-pound black limousin steer brought a floor price of 70.5 cents per pound purchased by Gainesville Fuel and donated to Camp Sweeney. David's Discount Foods in Gainesville purchased the

premium on the animal for \$2,500 to bring the total price to \$3,533.50.

The sale price was about \$500 lower than last year's grand champion steer, also owned by West, a Valley View resident, which sold for \$4,050. That steer, however, was later disqualified and the 1990 grand champion placing was left vacant after the animal tested positive for drug usage.

Ironically, West would have been ineligible to compete in this year's show under new rules passed by the show committee last April which will disqualify any exhibitor for one year if their animal tests positive for drug usage.

All grand and reserve champion market animals were tested during this year's show and some others that randomly tested, but test results won't be complete for several weeks, officials said.

The grand champion lamb own-

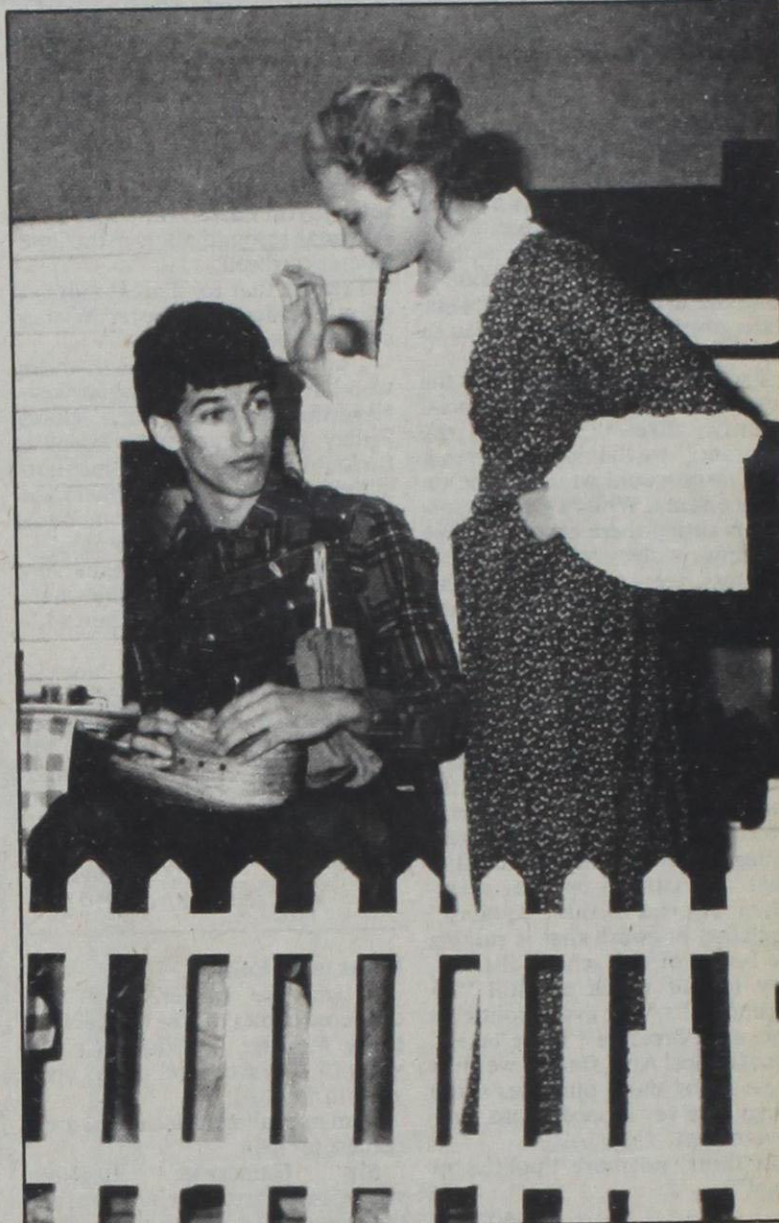
ed by Shawn Clark of the Callisburg FFA sold for \$855, with the premium bought by York Cooling and Heating. Philip York of the Valley View FFA sold his reserve champion lamb for \$506, with the premium purchased by Osborne's.

The grand champion swine owned by Jay York of the Callisburg FFA sold for \$680 while the reserve champion swine, owned by Heath Odell of the Sivells Bend 4-H, sold for \$522. The floor price on the swine was 49 cents. Roy and Connie Bryant bought the premiums on both animals, paying \$550 on the grand champion and \$400 on reserve.

The grand champion pen of three rabbits owned by Andrea Gieb of the Lindsay 4-H brought \$183, with David's Discount Foods buying the premium at \$150. Reserve champion rabbits owned by Amanda Hellinger of Lindsay 4-H brought \$133, with Albert Zimmerer purchasing the premium at \$100. The floor price on the rabbits were \$11 each.

The grand champion pen of five broilers owned by Dusty Wallace of the Callisburg FFA brought \$200, the premium purchased by Case Power and Equipment. Reserve champion Randal Paclik of the Red River 4-H received \$100 for his pen of broilers, with the Gainesville Kiwanis Club purchasing the premium.

## Dr. Juarez returns to medical practice on part-time basis

Dr. Enrique Juarez, who retired from the medical staff of Muenster Memorial Hospital on Dec. 31, 1989, will again be a part of that staff. He plans to open his office in Muenster on Wednesday, April 3.

Two doctors from Nocona were keeping office hours in Saint Jo until recently when they decided to close their Saint Jo office and have all patients come to Nocona. The Saint Jo Chamber of Commerce preferred to keep the services of a medical doctor and invited Dr. Juarez to establish an office there.

This was one of many factors that prompted the doctor to come out of retirement. He also commented that he is making adjustments after the death of his wife, Angela, and that retirement was no longer what he was looking for. "I like medicine and hope that it will give new meaning to life," said Dr. Juarez. "I want to help the hospital and my friends in and around Muenster. We have many friends and former patients in Saint Jo."

Dr. Juarez returns to practice with full privileges and will be able to perform surgery. He will keep office hours on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Shirley Endres, R.N., will be Dr. Juarez's office nurse and Ann Perkins has been hired as the secretary for the Muenster office. The office is located in the section of the Muenster Hospital that for-

merly housed Dr. Marvin Knight's office suite.

Muenster office hours beginning April 3 are 1:30 to 5 p.m. on Monday and Friday and on Wednesday from 9 a.m. until noon and from 1 to 5 p.m. The Muenster number is 759-2217.

The Saint Jo office is located on the square next to the Freight Outlet store. That number is 995-2002. Office hours will be from 9 a.m. until noon on Monday and Friday.

"I'm excited to join the staff of physicians at Muenster Hospital," remarked Dr. Juarez. "Dr. Kralicke, Antonetti, Knobles and Kozura have been doing a good job of supporting the hospital and serving the community."

Dr. Juarez and Shirley Endres said that the community is giving Dr. Juarez a warm welcome back. "We're all excited about Dr. Juarez coming back," said Herman Carroll, hospital administrator.

"He'll be a tremendous help... especially for the emergency room situation. He'll also help the Saint Jo community and bring patients from the Saint Jo area which will be beneficial to the Muenster Hospital."

All of the patient charts that Dr. Juarez had in his office are still intact in boxes so patients who did not transfer their charts need not be concerned about them.

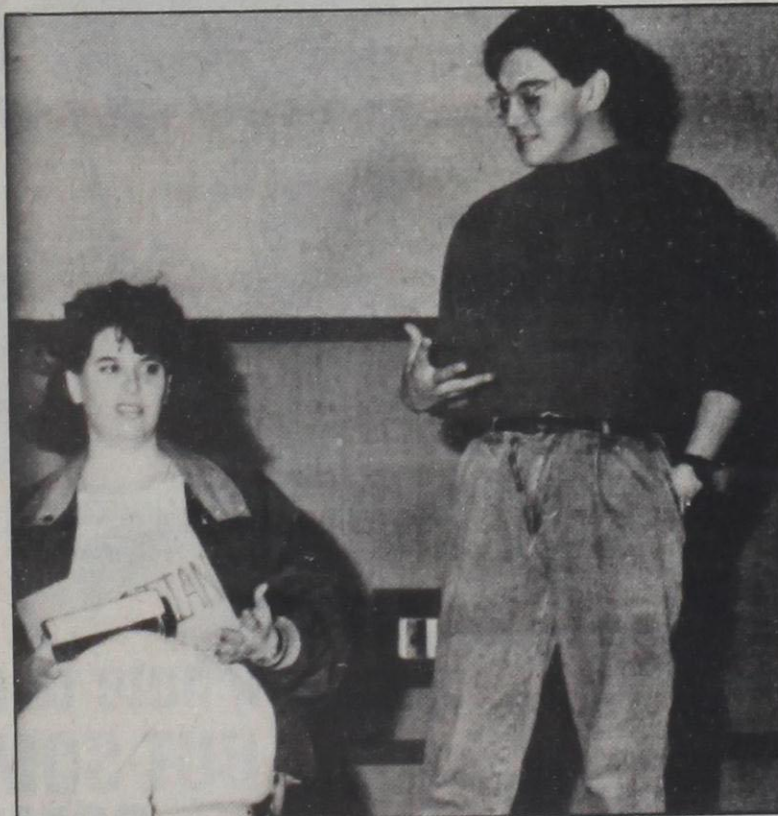

## Candidates enlist for MISD trustee election

## Muenster has partial blackout

A power outage plunged much of Muenster into darkness Saturday when moisture and dirt caused a crossbar to burn.

Alan Baldwin, Muenster local representative for TU Electric, said the crossarm burnt a primary in a neutral wire on South Main. The substation breaker opened, Baldwin said, and electricity went out along Main Street, Hwy. 82 and in some residential areas.

"It was a freak deal," he said. "This is only the second time in four years I've seen this happen in Muenster."

Power went out at about 8 p.m. The main circuit was back within about 30 minutes, and full power was restored everywhere in about an hour and a half, Baldwin said.

Joe Fenton, city manager, credited several people for their help with traffic control and other duties during the emergency: Fire Chief Herbie Knabe, Dep. Bill Bivin and Dep. Bob Stovall.

Fenton estimated that officials worked on the scene until about 11 p.m.

## Valley View makes decision on spending award money

The Valley View School District has decided how it will spend \$27,626 that the school received as an improvement award from the Governor's Excellence Committee.

School trustees approved the purchases this week upon recommendation of a committee set up to study how the money could be best utilized. The monies received from the award must be spent for education-related items and not for extracurricular activities. The money must also be spent by June 30, according to the award requirements, officials said.

Of the total amount, \$5,000 will be spent on test-taking materials, including practice TAAS test materials, achievement testing and improving test-taking skills.

Some \$2,000 will be used to purchase computer software, \$500 for computer training, \$4,000 to purchase reference materials for grades 7-12, about \$9,000 for teaching aids for grades K-6 and \$6,126 for teaching aids for grades 7-12.

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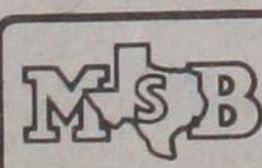
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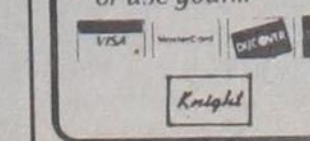

## Museum features 'Last Supper'

The Palace of Wax will premiere its wax rendition of "The Last Supper" on Easter Sunday, March 31, 1991, which will be a permanent addition to the section of the museum devoted to "The Life of Christ."

Peter Carsillo, resident wax sculptor for The Palace of Wax, has spent the past 16 weeks creating the 13 characters to be featured in the set.

Carsillo generally sculpts his wax figures from photographs or films, but on this project, he lacked both.

"I did not have any actual pictures to go by, but I did not want to just make up a generic face with two eyes, a nose and a mouth," Carsillo said.

Carsillo said the 12 disciples are all modeled after real people.

"This way, the characters all seem to have depth. They seem to have a life and a past rather than appear as store mannequins," Carsillo said.

The character of Judas was modeled after costume designer for The Palace of Wax, Charles Chapman.

"Nobody else wanted to be Judas, so I volunteered," Chapman said.

Rather than copying Leonardo Da Vinci's version of The Last Supper, the museum's creative team decided to use a more historical approach.

Drew Hunter, Creative Director

for The Palace of Wax, said, "We are trying to capture a more faithful rendering of what The Last Supper would have looked like during Christ's time."

"We tried to make our artistic interpretation of the event historically accurate in terms of the layout of the room, the style of the seating, the look of the dinnerware and the costuming," Hunter said.

In addition, the creative staff wanted Christ to seem friendly and personable.

"We wanted Christ to appear very human and approachable rather than like a stiff, picture postcard," Carsillo said.

Built at a cost of approximately \$40,000, the new addition will be the final phase in a section that takes visitors from the birth of Jesus Christ to His ultimate resurrection.

"The Life of Christ" is one of seven themed sections in The Palace of Wax.

The Palace of Wax is open Monday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. (the ticket office closes one hour prior to closing time).

## Deadline announced for CCC contest

Aspiring authors from Texas and Oklahoma have only about five weeks to put the finishing touches on original short stories and poems they wish to enter in Cooke County College's annual Creative Writing Awards competition for 1991.

There will be divisions of competition in both short story and poetry categories for middle school, high school and college students, as well as a non-student division for the general public. A special new essay contest has been added this year for CCC students.

Any middle school student may enter a poem and/or short story in the Jerry Simpson Memorial Division; likewise, the Brad Dill Memorial Division is open to any high school student. The Layuna Hicks Division is limited to entries by any persons enrolled full-time or part-time at Cooke County College during either this current spring 1991 semester or this past fall 1990 term.

The division open to the general public is called the "Cooke County College Creative Writing Contest" and is restricted to residents of Texas and Oklahoma who are not professional writers. It is for non-students of CCC - that is, persons who have not been enrolled at any time during the current 1990-1991 academic year.

"We're very excited about our new Jack Joyce Memorial Essay Contest for CCC students," said Coolen. "It was made possible by Ila Joyce as a tribute to her late husband, longtime editor and columnist for the Gainesville Daily Register."

This new contest is also open to CCC students enrolled during either semester of the 1990-91 academic year. It must be personal in nature and should be from 1,000 to 1,500 words in length.

Coolen stressed that entrants should adhere closely to manuscript format requirements

for their short stories and poems. Failure to do so could result in an entry's not being accepted for judging. No more than one entry may be submitted in each of the two categories of each division, and writers must exercise good taste in language and subject matter.

In all divisions, entries must be typed and double spaced. Poetry must not exceed 100 lines, and short stories cannot be longer than 3,500 words.

Also, each entry must have a title page stating the name of the specific division being entered,

such as "Brad Dill Memorial Short Story Contest," in addition to the title of the entry and the author's name, address and social security number.

Entrants are asked to include biographical sheets which give their ages and tell about their hometowns, families, hobbies and other pertinent personal information such as how long they've been writing and so on. Those entering public school and college divisions are also asked to give information about their creative writing classes and teachers.

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**THE LEGEND OF THE SAND DOLLAR**

Legend has it that these strange shells tell the story of Christ's suffering and his glory.

The five holes represent the five wounds of Christ. On the front the Easter Lily - its center, a five pointed star representing the Star of Bethlehem which led the shepherds from afar. On the back the outline of the Christmas Parthenon reminds us of his birthday. When the shell is broken open, five Doves of Peace and Good Will appear.

Because of this religious legend, this fascinating creature of the sea is often referred to as the Holy Ghost shell.

**THE LEGEND OF THE DOGWOOD**

There is a legend that at the time of the Crucifixion, the dogwood was the size of the oak and other forest trees. So firm and strong was the tree that it was chosen as the timber of the Cross. And from the Cross, it was said: "Never again shall the dogwood tree grow large enough to be used for such a cruel purpose. Henceforth it shall be slender and bent and twisted; and its blossoms shall be in the form of a cross...two long and two short petals."

"In the center of the outer edge of each petal three shall be nail prints, brown with rust and stained with red; and in the center of the flower will be a crown of thorns. And all who see it will remember."

## PARENTS Ask

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Parents Ask will be a weekly column, attempting to answer questions that parents in the Muenster Independent School District sometimes ask. It will try to briefly address concerns and needs of parents and students. Gwen Trubenbach, Muenster Public School Elementary Principal, will be writing the column. **Question:** How can I help the child with Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD)?

**Answer:** There are many things parents and teachers can do to help. Behavior modification techniques are frequently suc-

cessful. ADD students need a great deal of structure: Daily schedules, routines, well defined rules, rewards and consequences.

Work should be in short segments. Two 10 minute periods are better than one 20 minute period.

Alternate work with short joy breaks. Teachers or parents can help the child make a list of appropriate activities for joy breaks (sharpen pencil, stand up and stretch, listen to a record, etc.).

Frequently reward efforts to do better as well as desired behavior. Stars, stickers, smiles, hugs - anything that shows your approval.

Avoid offering long turn rewards. Remember the short attention span just cannot wait for a new bike for all A's on a report card. It is much better to rejoice over the good papers and display them on the bulletin board or refrigerator.

Avoid giving long drawn out directions. Tell them one or two things to do at a time. A third step may be added only when the child has learned to manage two. Older children may make lists checking off things as they are completed.

A timer is easy for even a young child to use to develop a sense of time...See how many you can do in five minutes. How long does it take you to get dressed?

If noise distracts the child, provide a quiet place for study. At home, soothing music may be useful.

Always talk the child through new situations. The unexpected has a tendency to over excite the ADDchild.

Sometimes parents have tried all sorts of behavior modification techniques and find the child needs more help. Then a medical doctor may prescribe medication.

Parents are often reluctant to give children medication, because there is a certain amount of risk involved.

Since there is a real disability withholding medication from the ADD child makes no more sense than withholding medication from a child that is sick. The medication is very carefully monitored for a child with ADD.

Remember, the ADD child has a real deficit. Parents and teachers will need to be understanding, fair and firm. The child should not be teased or embarrassed. The ADD child has many gifts to share, it is our job to help channel all of that energy into acceptable expression.

## Prospects fair for spring gobbler season

AUSTIN - An increasing number of turkey hunters are preparing to enjoy the spring gobbler hunting season. Hunters may take eastern turkeys April 6-21 in some East Texas counties and Rio Grande turkeys in most of the rest of the state April 6-May 5.

Don Wilson, small game program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said prospects are fair for the spring season. Production has been low the past three years, although the Hill County showed some improvement this year. "The

population is not as high as it has been in past years, but we still should have a reasonably good season."

Hunters harvested 56,391 turkeys in the spring of 1989, the most ever in Texas, while the fall of 1989-90 had 31,000 taken, he said. The 1989-90 fall season was the second lowest number of turkeys harvested since the 1980-81 hunting season when 26,800 were taken. "In 1989-90, we had pretty good range conditions and were expecting better production than what

we got." Harvest figures from spring and fall 1990 are not complete.

Wilson said, although Texas had a record harvest in the spring of 1989, it should level off, unless spring hunter numbers continue to rise. In 1981, there were 40,000 spring hunters while 1990 increased to 100,000.

This will be the second consecutive year for a 30-day spring season on Rio Grande turkeys. The Parks and Wildlife Commission authorized the longer season last year in order to give hunters a better opportunity to hunt during periods of peak gobbling activity which can vary from spring to spring, he said.

In Texas, hunters are allowed to harvest two gobblers in the fall and one in the spring, or vice versa.

## Biologists complete fall fishing survey

AUSTIN - Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fisheries biologists recently completed fall and winter gill, frame and trap net and electrofishing surveys. Listed below are the results from two area lakes.

### Lake Texoma

February gill net surveys on this lake indicated a decline in the striped population but an increase in the number of larger stripers, said Bruce Hysmith, district management supervisor from Denison.

Following a record catch of 402 stripers in 1987, the catch has remained fairly stable with 281 in 1988, 249 in 1989, and 283 in 1990 and 154 this year, he said. Biologists aren't too concerned about the decline in numbers because Texoma has had an exceptional population for the past 10 years and a leveling off was inevitable. Texoma is the only lake in the state, and one of only a handful in the country, with a reproducing population.

The regulation implemented on Sept. 1, 1989, which allows a daily bag limit of 15 stripers, only one longer than 20 inches, is working, Hysmith said. The regulation was designed to limit the harvest of big stripers and encourage harvest of the abundant small stripers. This year's survey shows that 29 percent were 20 inches or longer, up two percent from 1990. Stripers 30 inches or longer almost doubled from last year, going from four to seven.

### Lake Ray Roberts

Many large crappie caught during recent trap netting surveys on this 29,350-acre lake north of Denton were equal to or exceeded the statewide average weight for their length, said John Moczygemba, assistant district fisheries supervisor from Denison.

Eleven-inch crappie, averaging .9 pound, were 24 percent heavier than the statewide average for that length and 13-inch crappie, averaging 1.6 pounds, were 27 percent heavier, he said. Although the average catch per net was only 1.1 crappie, the population structure appeared to be in good shape. Legal-sized crappie, 10 inches or longer, made up 64 percent of the survey.

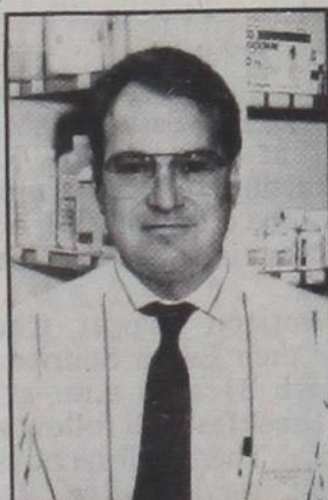

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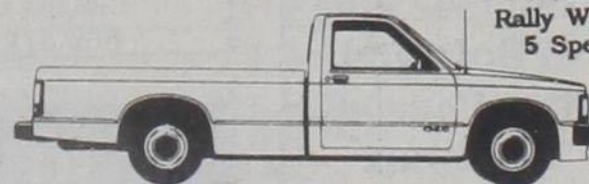

### Cattle producers benefit from first-calf research

Cattle producers who assist first-calf heifers early in a difficult delivery generally will have a more viable calf and a heifer that will breed quickly.

Larry Rice, Oklahoma State University Extension veterinarian, explains one of the most enduring myths in the cattle industry is the first-calf heifer needs more time to calve than a cow.

"While it is true the heifer needs more time to stretch the soft tissues of the pelvic canal, leaving the heifer unassisted when difficulties develop can have fatal consequences," says Rice.

As a baby calf is being born, the pressure of the uterus comes down on the calf. In addition, the cow strains, constricting the vessels of the uterus. The result is diminished oxygen supply to the calf. If this continues for a long period, the calf may be born hypoxic (without oxygen).

"When the calf hits the ground and tries to breathe, it just doesn't have the strength and stimulation necessary to pull it off," says Rice. "Also, calves depend on shivering to keep themselves warm, especially during cold, wet

weather. If a calf is born hypoxic, the animal is more susceptible to chilling and death than is a calf that had an easier birth."

Most textbooks say heifers should be assisted within two hours after either the cow's membranes or calf's feet can be seen. Research at OSU indicates first-calf heifers that calve unassisted generally do so within one hour. Rice suggests the producer provide assistance if the heifer doesn't make significant progress during the first 1½ hours after the calf's feet are seen.

Also, calves that are born in relatively short times are more likely to nurse early. This means they generally will get better antibody levels from the colostrum, according to Rice. This carries over a healthier calf that is less likely to suffer from scours and similar health problems.

Producers also should keep a record of problems they experience during the calving season, according to Rice. After calving season is finished, the producer should then examine these records and make any managerial changes required to decrease their likelihood of happening next season.

### Texas farmers shuffle deck in planning 1991 crop acreage

Farmers all across Texas are still shuffling their cards before dealing out planting intentions for the state's crops of wheat and grain sorghum.

Crop prices, changes in federal farm programs, water use and presence in some corn-producing areas of damaging aflatoxin all are playing a part in sometimes sizable shifts in crop acreage, say specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and commodity group leaders.

Crop watchers are projecting wheat and corn acreages each will drop 10 percent to 15 percent, grain sorghum acres will rise slightly and rice will remain steady.

Across Texas, acreage planted to wheat last fall is down 10 percent, reported D.B. "Bill" Nelson, executive vice president of the Texas Wheat Producers Association at Amarillo. But in the Blacklands, wheat acreage is

down 25 percent, and in the highly productive Panhandle-South Plains region, it is off 15 percent.

In the fall of 1989, producers planted 6.9 million acres of wheat. They harvested 3.5 million acres of that. Some producers think about 3 million of this year's 6-million-acre wheat crop will be harvested.

"That would give the state a 90-million-bushel crop," compared to the 1990 yield of 130.2 million bushels, Nelson said. "A lot depends on the weather between now and harvest."

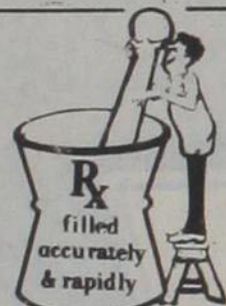
Nationwide, sorghum is expected to be planted on 12.5 million acres, an increase of 18 percent, said Jack Eberspacher, executive director of the National Grain Sorghum Association in Abernathy.

Last year, Texas producers planted 2.95 million acres of grain sorghum and harvested 2.6 million. Yields averaged 52 bushels an acre for a total of 135.2 million bushels.

Eberspacher said the anticipated increase in plantings reflects agreement on federal insurance for the crop as well as a shift by corn growers troubled by aflatoxin and other producers wanting a more water-efficient crop.

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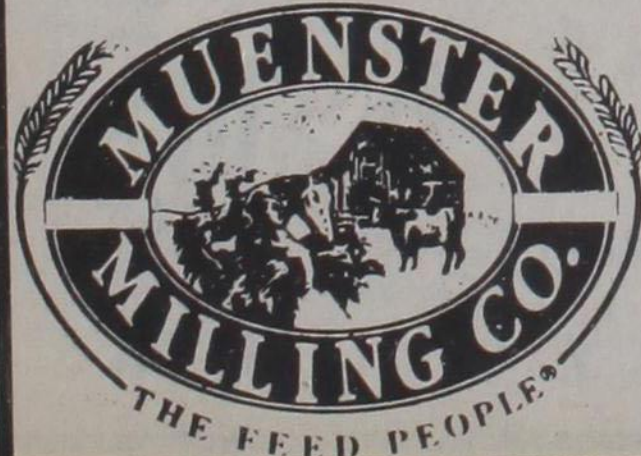
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Sherlynn Sicking waits for the judges' choice in Rabbit competition.

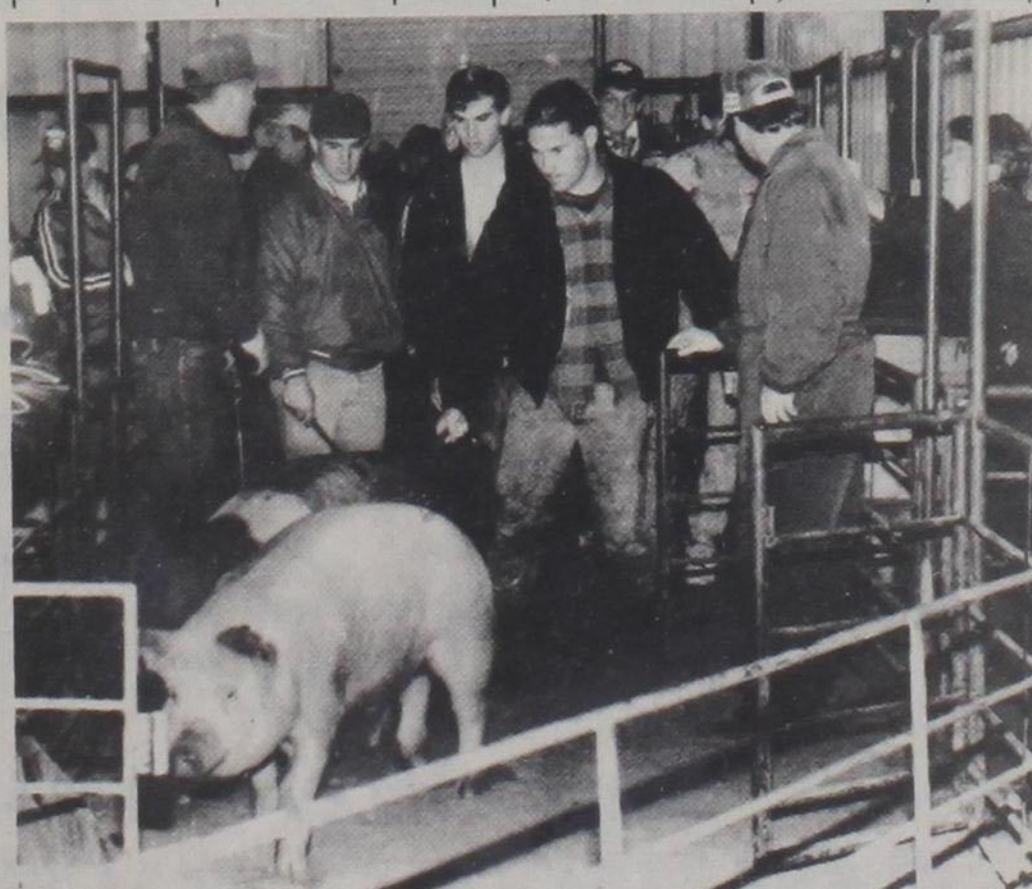

## County Agent's Report

#### Homeowners asked to join waste reduction campaign

When you hear the sound of revving lawnmowers, can the sight of bagged grass clippings be far behind?

Not only far behind, but vanished, say organizers of a new campaign called the "Don't Bag It" Lawn Care Plan.

"We will launch the Gainesville campaign at a public meeting on Tuesday, March 26," said Assistant City Manager Gene Cravens. "This is an opportunity for citizen participation in a project that can have immediate benefits for the city and individual homeowners."

"Grass clippings constitute 20-25 percent of residential solid wastes from March to September. And that's a considerable burden on disposal operations and landfill space, not to mention the homeowners who bag all those clippings."

"By adopting the 'Don't Bag It' Lawn Care Plan, homeowners can have a beautiful lawn with less trouble and expense. The resulting environmental benefits and conservation of landfill space would be invaluable."

The lawn care plan provides recommendations for proper watering, fertilizing and mowing of lawns. The guidelines were developed by Dr. Bill Knoop, a turfgrass expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

"Most people overwater and overfertilize their lawns. It's not

only wasteful, but also causes the grass to grow excessively and generates more clippings at mowing time," said Knoop.

There are brochures available on the "Don't Bag It" campaign and the makers of Bonus Crop Fertilizer and TORO lawnmowers are sponsors.

Twenty Gainesville homeowners will have the opportunity to sign up to become result demonstrators. As a demonstrator, homeowners will receive free fertilizer and follow the "Don't Bag It" lawn care recommendations.

In addition, TORO lawnmowers will give a new mulching lawnmower as a door prize to a lucky Gainesville homeowner at the Tuesday, March 26, Kick-Off Meeting.

The City of Muenster is planning to participate in the waste reduction campaign in the near future. City Manager Joe Fenton will be working with the Cooke County Extension Office to plan the Muenster campaign.

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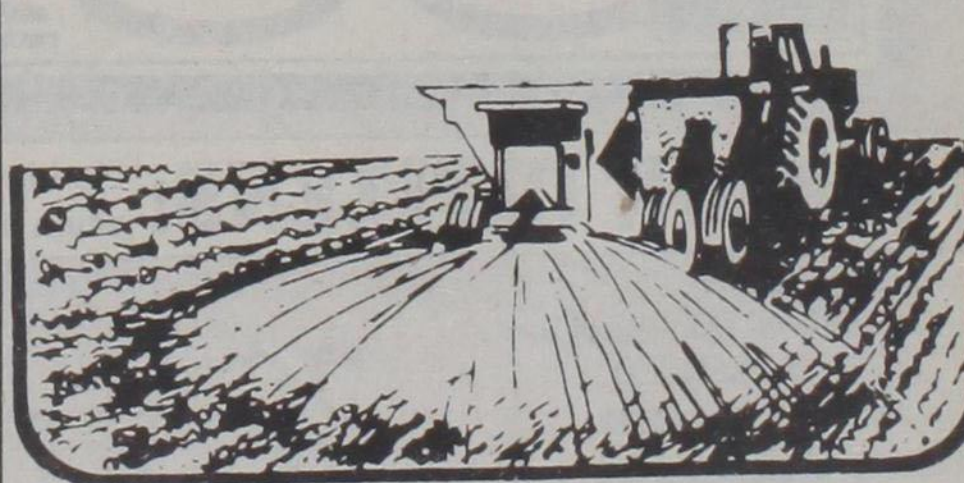
