The teachers were defeated in games with outsiders teams Tuesday night at the Andrews Ward gymnasium. The Floydada Fire Department quintet defeated the men faculty squad by a score of 10 to 12 by scoring a basket in the last few seconds of play. Miss Norton's teams of women teachers went down in defeat before the women outsiders team by a score of 13 to 3.

In the first game the starting lineups were: F. F. D.—Bill Daily, Everett Price, guards; T. W. Whigham, center; Alva Hull and Roy Eubank, forwards; Faculty, O. T. Williams, Richard Stovall, guards; L. Barksdale, center; J. M. Teague and O. K. Davis.

The fireboys substituted Lawton Thomas and Ernest Carter. Faculty institutions included two stellar players, A. D. Cummings and Odus Stephen. This game was an interesting scrap the entire course of the struggle and with the exception of a great deal of roughness the game was well played. Roy Eubank scored a basket in the last few seconds of play for F. F. D. and gave them a two-point winning margin.

Roy Eubank of the F. F. D. team was high point man of the game with 5 points to his credit. Barksdale of the faculty was high point man for that squad.

CURED AND CANNED MEAT PRODUCTS TO BE EXHIBITED

Interest is rapidly growing in the Floyd County Meat Show which will be held here in the Chamber of Commerce building, March 11 and 12.

Some of the finest cured and canned meat products ever produced in Floyd County will be shown in the exhibits. It is believed that Floyd County farmers are as capable in preparation of canned and cured meat products as those in any section of the country, that is the purpose of the show to determine the type of products raised and produced in the county.

Further specifications as to final preparations of products for exhibit and instructions for trimming, cutting and dressing will be released soon by Miss Martha Faulkner, county home demonstration agent and S. W. Ross, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, joint supervisors of the show.

They are also anxious for exhibitors in the Floyd County Show to place exhibits in each of the 15 classes of exhibits at the Panhandle South Plains Bacon, Meat and Ham Show at Lubbock, March 24 and 25. Exhibitors will be permitted to participate in the \$200 cash awards to be given to winners.

Officials for the show have not been named to this time. Miss Martha Faulkner, through the extension department will secure the services of a woman judge and S. W. Ross will secure the services of a man judge.

T. S. STEVENSON, FORMER BANK PRESIDENT, ARRESTED FOLLOWING INDICTMENT FOR FORGERY; BOND MADE

J. M. WILLSON AND OSCAR SHURBET SIGN BAIL WHICH WAS SET AT \$1,500.00

T. S. Stevenson, former resident of Floydada and president of the Floyd County National Bank, insolvent institution of this city, and now residing in Plainview, was arrested this morning by Sheriff J. M. Wright, following an indictment returned by the grand jury charging forgery of the name of his brother-in-law, Will Smith, whose home is near Silverton, to a note for the sum of \$350.00. The note was said to have been dated July 7, 1931.

Stevenson was released this morning after making bond set at \$1,500.00. J. M. Willson and Oscar Shurbet signed the bail.

Mr. Stevenson moved to Plainview immediately following the closing of the Floyd County National Bank here on July 15 last year.

FLOYD COUNTY BENEFITTED BY GOOD RAINS

Floyd County territory was greatly benefitted by a good rain over the week end. Rain varying from three fourths to over an inch fell generally over the county. The best moisture season, for this time of the year, had in almost every section of the county.

Prospects are good for a good wheat crop following the recent rain. Reports indicate that rain received in the north portion of Floyd county was lighter than that received in the immediate vicinity of Floydada. Moisture precipitation in the south and southeast portion of the county was heavier than that here.

Travel has been temporarily halted in some sections where roads were heavy and rough. Little traveling has been done in the rural sections. The rain being neither followed by hard freezes nor warm weather was held well by the ground and a good season and much benefit was derived from it.

Cooler weather, although no freezing temperatures, was prevalent during the week end but Tuesday was warm and the skies were cleared.

COUNTY REDUCES INDEBTEDNESS \$9,108.38 DURING PAST YEAR

According to Floyd County's Financial Statement compiled by County Clerk Tom W. Deen, and published elsewhere in the Plainsman, for the year ending January 31, 1932, shows that the county has reduced its total outstanding indebtedness in the sum of \$9,108.38.

January 31, 1931, the County's total outstanding indebtedness was \$171,887.64, and the present report shows a total outstanding indebtedness against the county amounting to \$162,779.26.

DISTRICT COURT DISMISSED—PAVING SUITS CONTINUED

The last week of the winter term of Floyd County District Court was dismissed Monday and pending cases were continued to the next term. Jurors who had been summoned were dismissed.

Judge A. J. Fires, of the Children's district court was to preside, replacing Judge Kenneth Bain, who was disqualified in the paving cases. Judge Fires was unable to get here Monday.

Grand jury remains in session this week, although court has been dismissed.

FLOYDADA DRAMATICS RECREATION CLUB SELECTS NAME IN THURSDAY MEET

A reading was given by Billie Standiforth. Rev. I. A. Smith, of the First Methodist Church, made the main address following the reading number. The observance was closed with a song and the planting of trees by the Floydada chapter of F. F. A.

WE HAVE LIVED WELL THIS WINTER

"A well organized pantry, intelligently filled, assists the housewife in saving money by conserving food for the unproductive months, in saving time by providing a variety of nourishing foods which may be well prepared quickly, and in improving health by providing the food necessary to nourish the body," says the 4204-H Pantry Demonstrators and Cooperators who worked under the supervision of the county home demonstrators in the West Texas Plains District.

The first step in developing this demonstration was to decide what foods and how much were needed to feed the family. Each demonstrator and cooperator developed her demonstration according to the standard suggested by Dr. Jessie Whitacre, Research Division of the Texas Experiment Station, which is as follows:

1. At least 1 1/2 pints of milk daily per person; 1 quart, if possible.
2. 1 serving of butter daily.
3. At least one serving of whole cereal.
4. Vegetables—leafy or green vegetables, at least 3 times a week, preferably every day; starch vegetables, at least 1 serving per day per person (probably 2 servings); other vegetables, at least 1 serving per person per day (probably 2 servings).
5. Raw fruits, at least one serving per person each day; tomatoes or citrus fruit three times a week—more if possible; other fruits, at least 4 servings per person per week.
6. Protein, 2 servings per person each day—different kinds if possible; (protein includes meat, eggs, nuts, dried beans, dried peas, and cheese).

The average financial net profit from these demonstrations (ten counties of which were in the drought-stricken area) was \$202.38. These demonstrations were conducted in Clay, Young, Stephens, Fisher, Scurry, Knox, Baylor, Garza, Dawson, Lubbock, Hale, Floyd, Dickens, Lamb, and Lynn counties. Hockley, Castro, Swisher, Haskell, and Shackelford counties had excellent garden demonstrators, many of whom are qualifying as 4-H pantry demonstrators this year.

The year-round garden is one of the essentials of a 4-H Pantry demonstration. In order to provide a sufficient amount of leafy and succulent vegetables during the winter and early spring months, more than 1,500 hot beds have been built by these demonstrators and co-operators. The cost of these has ranged from 90 cents to \$11.20, depending on the amount of material purchased.

frames," says Mrs. Prather, Young county, Texas. "It is less expensive and more easily mended than glass if hit by hail."

"No other 18 square feet of soil on our farm produced as much as \$10.70 but the hotbed did," says Mrs. W. E. Miller of Floyd county. "And I never expect to be without one again."

Big Savings From Gardens

Mrs. E. R. Slater, Union Home Demonstration Club, Lubbock county, 4-H Pantry included 1,495 quarts of vegetables, fruits, jelly, preserves, fruit juice, and meats. One thousand and nineteen of these were vegetables raised from her one-acre garden. "My one-half acre garden, which I irrigated from the windmill, made three times as much clear money as my one-half acre in the field," said Mrs. Slater. "According to our home demonstration price list, my 1,495 quarts of canned goods are worth \$346.00. In addition to this, I have sold \$101.42 worth of fresh vegetables, and used \$10.00 worth of fresh vegetables at home, making a total value of \$628.17. The total cost, including labor, was \$80.15. This includes \$3.25 for labels; \$30.00 for cans; \$3.00 for lids; \$0.45 for seed, and \$34.45 for labor."

"My 4-H Pantry includes 1,475 quarts of fruits, vegetables, jelly, preserves, fruit juices, and 1,300 pounds of cured meats," said Mrs. Loo Howe, Hush Knife Home Demonstration Club, Baylor county. "I valued all the products at \$625.90. The cost was \$234.98, thus leaving a net profit of \$417.92. It is such a convenience to be able to get what I want from my well-organized pantry shelves, instead of having to hunt through boxes for it."

In other words, these demonstrators have really shown something to themselves and others. Southern Agriculturist.

SANTA FE R. R. CO. AND A. & M. COLLEGE BEGIN 45-DAY TOUR

College Station, Texas, February 24.—Telling a story of modern farming methods through the medium of specially prepared exhibits as well as in the words of speakers aboard, the Santa Fe farm and home special, operated by the Santa Fe Railway Company and the Texas A. & M. College cooperating, began a forty-five day tour of all Santa Fe lines in Texas February 15 at Navasota. The special will make 147 stops in all and a program of two to three hours will be given at each stop. Visitors will be invited aboard to inspect the various agricultural, livestock, home industries and home improvement exhibits and speakers will appear at open air meetings at the train at all stops where the weather permits. Passenger coaches will be used for meetings in inclement weather. The final program of the tour will be at Snyder, April 6.

Much in the nature of an agricultural college on wheels, the nine car special carries a message the keynote of which is more profit and better living on the farm. It will re-emphasize throughout the broad stretches of the state the benefits of improved methods of livestock raising and farming practices, tried methods of cutting production costs and making the farm self-sustaining. It tells the story, in words and exhibits, of proper care and utilization of the soil, of a well rounded farming program, of home beautification and live at home practices, including enlargement in scope of home industries among progressive farm women.

One entire car of the train is filled with farm electrification exhibit sponsored by the Texas committee on the Relation of Electricity to Agriculture in cooperation with the South west division of the National Electric Light Association. Local electric companies will supply current at the different stops for the operation of the equipment which includes poultry farming apparatus, feed grinders, cream separators, milking machine, sausage grinder, and other farm machinery as well as various household appliances.

J. F. Jarrell, Topeka, Kansas, manager of agricultural development of the Santa Fe, has general charge of the train which is being operated by the railway company. Exhibits were prepared by the Extension Service and speakers are from the staffs of the Extension Service, the college proper and other cooperating agencies and institutions.

The train contains eighteen exhibit booths and the program of exhibits and talks covers such phases as agronomy, poultry, beef cattle, sheep and goats, dairy cattle, hogs, farm electrification, feeding and clothing the family, yard beautification, rug making and home industries. Forestry and pasture improvements exhibits will be shown in East Texas territory.

Livestock car contains exhibits of Angora goats, dairy cows, hogs on self feeders, beef cattle showing advantages of creep feeding, and sheep.

Some of the exhibits will be changed from week to week to adapt the message of the train to the particular section being traversed.

Receipts from eggs sold were \$7.25, receipts from the sale of fowls were \$12.90 making a total receipt of \$20.15. Mrs. Conway's expenses were \$5.45.

The South Plains Home Demonstration Club poultry demonstrator, Mrs. J. C. Simpson, made a profit of \$11.86 on her poultry during the month of January.

1768 eggs were gathered during the month from 254 fowls. Mrs. Simpson received \$19.86 from the sale of eggs and fifty cents from the sale of fowls making a total of \$20.36. Mrs. Simpson's expenses were \$8.50.

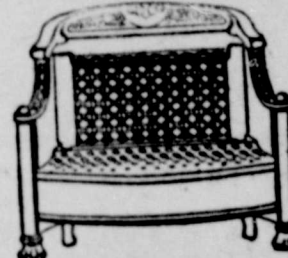
