ASK BIDS ON POSTOFFICE SITE

PROPERTY TO BE AUCTIONED HERE IN JUNE

HOPE TO CLEAR TITLE MUDDLE BY THIS PROCEDURE

The southeast corner of the courthouse square, proposed building site for the \$35,000 post office and federal court building here, will be offered for sale at public auction June 4.

It is by this method that the county hopes to transfer the title of the property to the federal government. According to the statutes of Texas the only way in which a county may dispose of property is by advertisement for bids and sell to the highest bidder.

According to J. E. Vickers, local attorney employed to clear the title and secure its transfer to the government, the plan will be for the United States to submit a bid for the property directly or for some person to make the purchase and then to the government. The county commissioners court reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

At a regular session yesterday, the commissioners court appointed Judge Robert H. Bean as special commissioner to advertise and dispose of the land.

The site in question extends 210 feet along Broadway and 170 feet along Avenue G. The first of a series of three advertisements asking bids on the property appeared in this morning's issue of the Lubbock Avalanche.

The sale will be made subject to the right of Lubbock county to remove the jail building, now on the property, before January 30, 1932.

R. B. Cragger, national republican committeeman from Texas, who will be in Lubbock tomorrow, will confer with the county commissioners regarding the proposed site to the government.

Originally deeded to "the public," the property was placed in the hands of Lubbock county by a deed of Judge Clark M. McMillan in the 99th district court here several weeks ago.

ROAD DISTRICT CREATED HERE

MARKS THIRD ATTEMPT TO SECURE HIGHWAY PAVING PROGRAM

Marking the initial step in the third attempt since December 1 for road surfacing in the county, commissioners court yesterday created Lubbock County Road District No. Two, including all of the county except the southeast corner, the county commissioners acted the petition presented last January calling for the new district and a party of local good road enthusiasts, headed by Charles F. Neill, chairman of the Lubbock County Good Roads association, appeared before the court. The new district excludes only about 100 acres of land, which includes Road District No. 1. Elston is the center of the excluded area.

T. Pinkston, commissioner from Elston, voted against the creation of the new district, despite the fact that a committee from that city commended this action several times.

Other than Mr. O'Neill the local delegation included: Mayor H. D. Oods, J. E. H. Hankins, G. Abernathy, W. O. Sheely, Spencer Wells, Charles Noyd, T. White, P. F. Brown and Joe Caldwell, state highway division engineer.

Delegation from the Abernathy district was also present, some of whom were wanting to know if it were possible for an independent road district to be created in their section of the county, should they so desire.

REPTILE EXPERT DIES OF RATTLESNAKE VENOM WHEN BITTEN DURING STUDIES

NEW YORK, May 14. (P)—One of the world's leading authorities on snakes is dead, victim of the infuriated mate of a rattlesnake he had captured.

Charles E. Snyder, former head reptile keeper at the Bronx Zoo, died at a hospital at Suffern, N. Y., yesterday from the effects of a snake bite inflicted earlier in the day while he was hunting snakes in the Ramapo Hills.

Snyder and a companion, Paul Snyder (no relative), were on Torn Mountain, a region known to be infested with rattlers, when the former zoo keeper came upon a large specimen.

He pinned its head with a forked stick and leaned over to pick it up. The mate of the captive emerged from the underbrush and struck his hand. One fang slashed the flesh. The other made only a slight puncture.

Snyder concentrated first-aid efforts on the open wound, apparently overlooking the smaller puncture. It was through this that the reptile had injected its deadly venom into a vein.

At a hospital, several injections of serum were made but without avail.

ROGERS CASE OPENS TODAY

AT LA GRANGE

STORMY SCENES MARK BEGINNING OF HEARING

LA GRANGE, Texas, May 14.—Exasperated by actions of defense counsel in the trial of Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers for robbery of the Farmers National Bank, Ruda, Texas, in 1927, District Judge M. C. Jeffrey today threatened to send Otis Rogers, attorney and husband of the accused woman, to jail, and on another occasion threatened to transfer the case to Brownsville.

Rogers had been trying to find out from a prospective juror whether he would acquit a person if the preponderance of testimony showed she was insane even though he doubted her insanity.

District Attorney Fred Blundell objected on the grounds that the venireman already had answered the question. The judge sustained the objection. Rogers repeated the question.

"If you ask that question again, young man, I'll send you to jail."

County To Help Pay Expenses of Subway

The Lubbock County Commissioners' Court yesterday voted that the county would pay one-ninth of the cost of construction of the subway to be constructed under the Santa Fe tracks at the Avenue H intersection.

Two-ninths of the cost of the \$150,000 underpass will be paid by the State Highway Department and the remaining two-thirds will be paid by the city and the railway company. The city's part was provided for in the \$350,000 bond issue voted here last September.

JEALOUSY OF WIFE BLAMED FOR KILLING

PLAINVIEW WOMAN IS DEAD AFTER FRAY ON AMARILLO STREET

AMARILLO, May 14. (P)—A murder charge was filed here today against Mrs. E. M. Stallworth, alleging that she held Mrs. Grace Morrison, Plainview, Texas, while her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Levi P. Stallworth, fired three shots at Mrs. Morrison, killing her, here yesterday.

AMARILLO, May 14. (P)—Mrs. L. P. Stallworth of Amarillo, 30, late yesterday shot and killed Mrs. Grace Morrison, 35, because she believed Mrs. Morrison a rival for her husband's affections. She was in the county jail here today while authorities prepared a charge of murder.

The shooting occurred in front of a hotel. Mrs. Stallworth, with her mother-in-law, had gone to a rooming house in search of Mrs. Morrison, who was not at home. The angry wife attempted to wait for her alleged rival, but the landlady, fearing a disturbance, ordered her to leave, and the two women walked up the street together.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, May 14.—Final preparations for departure of the giant dirigible Graf Zeppelin on its second trip to America were under way here today. The take-off is planned for dawn tomorrow.

A last trial flight of one hour and three quarters was made at dusk yesterday under command of Captain Lehmann, assistant to the ship's master, Dr. Hugo Eckener. The motors functioned perfectly and everything was pronounced in readiness.

It was assumed here after taking off tomorrow morning Dr. Eckener will shape his course to Lakehurst, N. J., as far south as the Azores, or even further south, since adverse weather conditions are expected to prevail along the northern route.

Fifty-nine persons and one "lady" gorilla, "Missie" by name, who is addressed to the Chicago zoo, will make the trip aboard the ship.

Among the passengers is Captain George Hubert Wilkins, polar explorer, who wishes to make some navigational studies en route.

Seven Drown As Flood Roars Down The Trinity

LIVINGSTON GROPPES IN DARKNESS AS BOATS HUNT VICTIMS

LIVINGSTON, May 14.—The number of lives taken by a flood that suddenly roared down on Polk county yesterday from the Trinity river and its tributary creeks, remained undetermined today although the tentative death toll stood at seven. Disrupted communications prevented an accurate check.

Nearly every available man and boy in Livingston, which gropped in darkness throughout the night due to dismantled power lines, rowed over the flooded districts picking up survivors perched on house-tops and trees. Livingston itself faced a possible shortage of food and water.

HOPE TO SUBDU BLAZING GASSER

THIRTY QUARTS OF Nitro Will Be Utilized

BORGER, May 14. (P)—The blazing gasser which illuminated the country hereabouts last night in one of the oil fields' most brilliant spectacles may be subdued soon.

A switch engine on an embankment within a short distance of the well was in readiness for an attempt today to drag the white hot metal of the rig away from the hole. Orville Wineman, oil field fire fighter, then will attempt to place thirty quarts of solidified nitroglycerin in the well, later to be exploded electrically in an effort to snuff out the flame. Wineman spent last night studying the problem.

Thirteen members of the crew who suffered minor injuries when the well was ignited are recovering.

The three men, accompanied by Mrs. Dock Webster, were on their way to their homes. When they ran out of gasoline the three men left Mrs. Webster in their automobile and walked across a field in search of fuel.

Mrs. Webster, after waiting for some time, followed them, finding the three bodies underneath the wires.

WORKMAN FRACTURES LEGS FROM FALL; BOY IS HURT

Condition of Jim McMeekan, 10 Avenue V, and Dudley Wallace, 9-year-old son of Mrs. Myrtle Wallace, 620 Avenue M, who both received serious injuries in accidents here yesterday, were reported improved today.

Although the fractures were said to be of a serious nature, the injured man was reported resting this morning.

Both McMeekan and the Wallace boy are in the West Texas hospital.

Seventeen months ago Mrs. Eva Brandon came from Quana, Texas, as a result of negotiations through a matrimonial agency, and married Rabien, April 26, last. Rabien died in agony after having received a cup of coffee from Mrs. Brandon.

MYSTERY SHROUDS SHOOTING OF EAST TEXAS FARMER; TO HOLD EARLY TRIAL TUESDAY

KAUFMAN, Texas, May 14.—L. D. Heflin, 45, Kaufman farmer, was shot to death at his farm home near Kaufman today. His son, Horace, 19, surrendered to Sheriff Frank Adams.

Sheriff Adams said murder charges had been filed against the youth for whom an examining trial was scheduled this afternoon. The sheriff was unable to give a motive for the shooting and said that the son, as well as other members of the Heflin family, refused to discuss the matter.

CURBING CURS IS PRECARIOUS

Canine Collector Dives At Dog, Through Glass

CHICAGO, May 14. (P)—Curbing the curs becomes, as time goes on, more and more a precarious profession.

It wasn't hardly a week ago that Evanston's dog catcher damaged his digits diving for a dog that turned out to be an iron ornament; and now John Sullivan, canine collector for Oak Park—another of Chicago's doggy suburbs—plunges through \$100 worth of plate glass window in an attempt to master a mite of a mutt.

Sullivan cornered the creature in front of the big show window of the Cranal Motor Car company. He sprang at the dog in the most approved fashion, but the dog sprang, too. Sullivan kept on going right through the window. He was picking glass from his clothing long after the dog was two miles away and still running.

Fortunately, Sullivan was not hurt. Someone, however, owes the Cranal Motor company \$100.

Girl Seeks To Have Marriage Annulled

Charging that because she was on the verge of a nervous breakdown, she didn't realize what she was doing when she married on February 11, a 19-year-old girl today filed a petition for annulment of the marriage.

It is alleged that the husband took advantage of her unsophisticated, innocent and confiding nature by constant persuasion and that her mind was affected by her physical condition at the time.

State Board Of Barber Examiners

AUSTIN, May 14. (P)—Meeting in its first session the house yesterday passed to engrossment a bill by Rep. M. E. Mehl, San Antonio, creating a state board of barber examiners for the enforcement of stricter professional and sanitary standards.

The bill, if enacted into a law, will require that any person engaging in the barbering practice obtain a certificate of registration, and that every shop in the state be operated under direction of a registered barber.

County To Purchase Highway Equipment

The Lubbock county commissioners court today will hear bids on about \$20,000 worth of road equipment to be used in the upkeep of the highways of this county.

Among other things the equipment will include several graders and two maintainers.

SMITH SANITY NOW ON TRIAL

JONES COUNTY JURORS MUST PASS ON PLEA IN ANSON CASE

ABILENE, May 14. (P)—Attorneys seeking to save Bill Smith, convicted murderer, from the electric chair and have him sent to an insane asylum, were granted a continuance of sanity hearing at Anson, set for today until May 31.

ANSON, May 14.—A Jones county jury was asked today to decide whether Bill Smith, convicted murderer, shall go to the electric chair or whether he shall be committed to an insane asylum.

Smith's insanity plea will be heard by Judge W. R. Chapman of Abilene, in the same courtroom in which he was sentenced to die for the murder of Jake Owens, deputy sheriff of Fisher county.

Smith was brought here yesterday by Sheriff Tom Hudson of Jones county from the state penitentiary. Upon being placed in jail he promptly tore off his clothes, clawed his mattress to shreds and crawled about the cell. He was forcibly fed.

Smith's sanity trial will be conducted without the principal's appearance in the courtroom, attorneys said last night. The issue will be decided on depositions and statements of Warden F. E. Harrell of the penitentiary and prison doctors supplemented by testimony of physicians here.

Smith's true name is Joyce Shepard.

REPUBLICANS CLOSING GAP

ADMINISTRATION HEADS HURRY TO PATCH DIFFERENCES

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, May 14.—Administration leaders in Congress were busy today, on closing branches in public ranks and increasing legislative efficiency of their priorities while both senate and house were aware that they were proceeding with bills containing provisions objectionable to President Hoover.

As the senate approached a vote on the farm bill containing the executive deputation plan which the president denounced, the administration leaders were considerably relieved that the flare-up over the issue of party regularity which developed out of the deputation controversy was as moderate as it seemed out to be.

Many members had expected the speech of Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa, on the subject of "pseudo-republicanism" to be a much more fiery retort than it was to the speaker of the Senate, Fess of Ohio, the whip, criticizing him and senators Borah of Idaho, and Nye of North Dakota, for their support of the deputation proposal.

While no doubt was entertained that the senate would reaffirm its position on the deputation plan by passing the bill containing it, administration leaders have counted on the house to eliminate it from the measure so that legislation more in harmony with the president's wishes can be sent to the White House for his approval.

The senate, meanwhile, is being urged on by the same group to pass the tariff bill now before the house more nearly into line with the president's desire for "limited" revision than the ways and means committee republicans saw fit to commend. At the same time, they are hopeful that, after the general debate is ended late this week, some of the administration's ideas can be worked into the measure in the ease itself through the amendment process.

Progress toward reduction of the inter-party stress over various proposals in the tariff bill was seen today in the meeting of the ways and means republicans with members of the group from ten western farm states who are dissatisfied with the agricultural schedule. Chairman Hawley had promised that such of their proposals as met with favor among committee members could be offered to the house as committee amendments to the bill with privileged status.

Women Paid Average of \$15 Weekly Here

The average salary for women employees of the city who compose about 46 per cent of local business employment is approximately \$15 a week, according to C. H. Baker of Austin, representative of the state bureau of labor statistics, who is here making an investigation of labor conditions. Special observance will be made of the labor and female working conditions and of sanitary conditions.

FORT WORTH, May 14 (P).—Although her back is broken and she is suffering with other serious injuries, Miss Nancy Sutton, 18, Dallas, victim of an automobile misadventure Saturday night, will recover, physicians said today.

WASHINGTON, May 14 (P).—Republican leaders today abandoned suggestions for an all summer recess and determined to mold the party majorities in Congress into working shape for early decisions on the farm relief and tariff issues.

President Hoover took the initiative yesterday in bringing his scattered forces in the senate together, inviting Senator Borah of Idaho to the luncheon, and the critic of the Idahoan, Senator Fess of Ohio, to dinner at the White House.

Tariff Schedules Get Close Study

WASHINGTON, May 14 (P).—Tariff schedules proposed by the house ways and means committee on building materials and sugar are receiving close scrutiny at the House with clear indications they fail to meet with the entire approval of President Hoover.

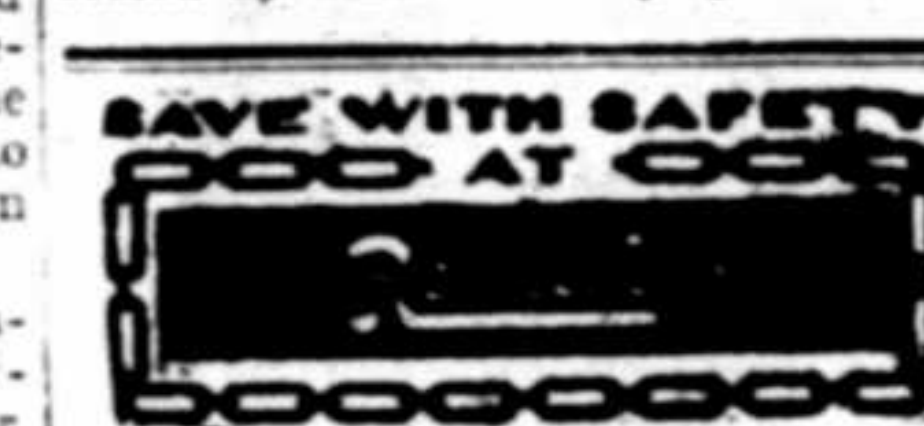
The balance of the week will be spent in the Panhandle area. While here the party will be guests of W. F. Revell, field supervisor for the company in the South Plains.

TERRY COUNTY IS TEXAS' CORN CRIB

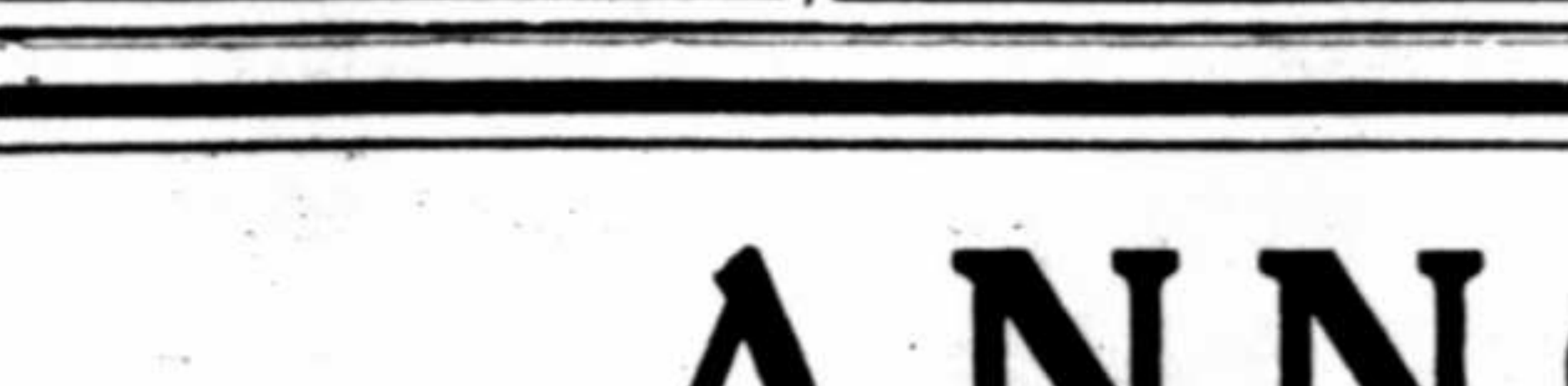

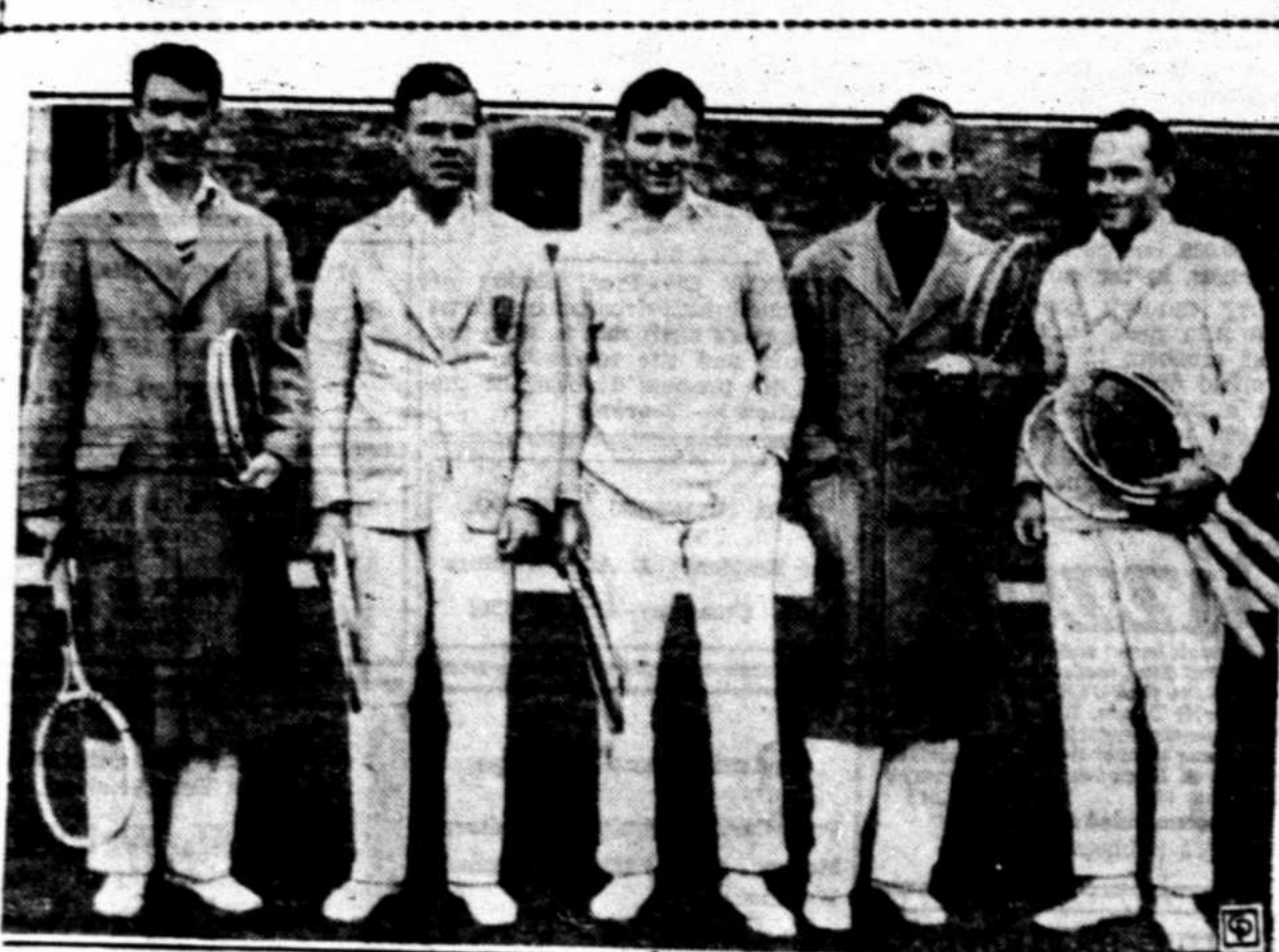

FIVE U. S. CRAFT IN
VANCOUVER PORT
ARE TAKEN

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 14.—A violation of treaty rights in anchoring in Canadian waters today was charged against five United States salmon trollers seized in Goose Island harbor by a Canadian patrol boat.

Major J. A. Motherwell, chief supervisor of fisheries on the Canadian Pacific coast, declared treaty provisions forbidding such boats to come into Canadian ports only for wood, water, repairs or shelter. 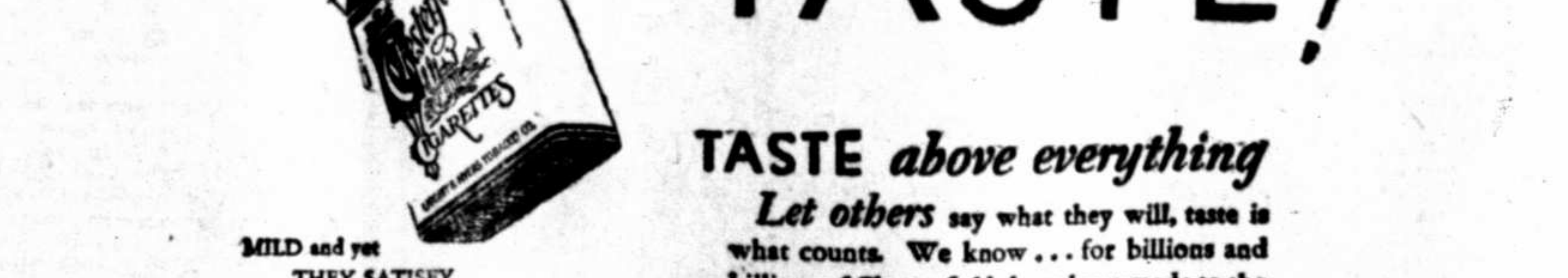

Judge Jeffrey warned.

The defense attorneys took exception to that statement in the presence of a prospective juror and the venireman was excused.

Rogers said he had repeated the question because he was not certain of the venireman's answer. The other suit occurred after Blundell had taken over the examination of another prospective juror from Leo Brewster, the other defense attorney.

"Here's what the defense is trying to get at in a blindfolded way," Brewster immediately was on his feet, saying such a statement was uncalled for.

"There's been a lot of things uncalled for in this trial," Jeffrey replied.

"I object to the remarks of the court," Brewster called.

"All right, I'm sending this case to Brownsville," the court stated.

Objects to Change

Rogers then took a hand to object to the change of venue, and the judge ordered that the next venireman be called.

Not a one of the first 15 men examined today qualified, and the jury remained half completed. Most of the veniremen were excused because they already had formed opinions. Defense counsel brought out that one of them was unable to write English, and he was dismissed.

RIOTING MOBS ARE ARRESTED

250 MILL STRIKERS ARE IN CUSTODY AFTER DEMONSTRATION

(By Associated Press) ELIZABETHTON, Tenn., May 14.—More than 250 textile strikers arrested today on charges of intimidation, were released shortly before noon after Ben Allen, county attorney general, had addressed them.

They were freed without bond and Magistrate George Ryan said he did not know whether hearing would be held.

More than 5500 persons went on strike here a month ago, resulting in the closing of the American Bemberg and Glanstoff Rayon plants, which however announced May 6 that operations were being resumed gradually.

A guard named Fair arrested a crowd of strikers, charging they were blocking the road and prohibiting workers from Gap Creek from reaching the plants. Those arrested filled five automobiles, two buses and a truck.

A call for help was sent by Fair but before soldiers could arrive from the plains fields said, several scores of strikers arrived. It was decided at first to take the prisoners to Jonesboro in another county, but a delegation of strikers from Elizabethton arrived and protested.

In a few minutes the main highway was blocked for more than a mile and persons coming to Elizabethton from Johnson City were stopped, many of them being searched. A number of persons who were not included in the first group arrested were taken into custody when they argued with soldiers.

Rose May Cameron, 9, who was in bed in an apartment in the rear of the first floor of the two-story brick building, was killed.

Three employees of the St. Joseph Gas company, who were making an inspection of the building, were seriously burned.

Plan Investigation Of Indian Treatment

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP).—Plans for an intensive investigation of the government's treatment of the Indian in seven western states were announced today by Chairman Frazier of the senate Indian affairs committee.

The investigation, Frazier said, will include reservations and Indian schools in Wisconsin, North and South Dakota, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Montana and Arizona, and will be based on many letters the committee has received complaining of conditions.

Huge Fish Hatchery Planned At Angelo

AUSTIN, May 14 (AP).—Contract has been let by Will J. Tucker, game fish and oyster commissioner, for the construction of a fish hatchery at San Angelo which will cost approximately \$28,000 when completed.

The project will be the largest in the state, Tucker said. Land for the hatchery, which will cover 95 acres, was donated by San Angelo citizens at a location near the city on the Colorado river.

The hatchery will be finished within three months and fish will be ready for distribution next spring, Tucker said.

Hoover To Promote Some New Tariffs

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP).—President Hoover announced today he would promulgate tariff increases on linseed, milk, cream and window glass as recommended by the tariff commission.

The rates on linseed will be increased forty cents per bushel to 56 cents; on milk from 21-2 cents to 33-4 cents per gallon; on cream from 20 cents to 30 per gallon, and on window glass a varying increase from the present five eighths of a cent a pound to one and one half cents a pound, depending upon the size of the glass.

Cattle States To Readjust Tariffs

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP).—Representatives from 16 cattle raising and feeding states selected a committee of seven today to appear before the house ways and means committee to work out an adjustment of the proposed tariff on live cattle and to ask for a tariff on hides.

Boy Meets Death As Boat Capsizes

DENTON, May 14 (AP).—Slipping beneath the water when a log to which he was clinging rolled over, Jesse Anderson, 19, Denton, was drowned in Lake Dallas late yesterday.

The youth and a companion, Jack Baxter, Krum, were fishing in the lake. Their boat overturned. Baxter succeeded in grasping a bridge support and was saved, but Anderson clung to a log, was carried far out into the lake, and disappeared when his float rolled over.

The body had not been recovered today.

Defunct Bank To Pay All Deposits

LA GRANGE, Texas, May 14 (AP).—Depositors in the First National Bank, which closed its doors here two weeks ago after a shortage of \$180,000 had been reported, will receive one hundred cents on the dollar, the shareholders have announced.

At a meeting yesterday the shareholders agreed to pay 80 percent of the stock into the treasury. This, with collections which have been made since the bank closed, will enable the institution to open again for business in a few days.

City Officials And Bond Issues Voted

GALVESTON, May 14 (AP).—City officials and bond issues aggregating \$2,553,000 were voted upon here today.

Two tickets are seeking endorsement of voters, one headed by Mayor J. E. Pearce and the other by Frank B. Markle.

Of the bond sums, \$2,000,000 would be expended for school expansion. The electorate also was voting on a proposal to increase the school tax from 40c to 75c.

of several people Mrs. Stallworth began shooting at a range of about three feet and fired three times, the gun being less than a foot from Mrs. Morrison's body when the third shot was fired.

Old Style Gun Used

The weapon used was an old .41 calibre single action pistol, and it was necessary to cock it after each shot. One bullet struck Mrs. Morrison in the neck, a second in the chest and a third in the arm. She died on the way to the hospital.

Mrs. Stallworth surrendered immediately to a policeman and was taken to the county jail. Her mother-in-law was held as a material witness.

Mrs. Morrison is a resident of Plainview, but had made her home here for sometime in order to be close to her 12-year-old daughter who is attending a local academy. Her husband, when notified of the tragedy at his home in Plainview, started for Amarillo immediately.

Mr. Stallworth was not in town at the time of the shooting. He is a railroad man and did not return from his run until today. Hearing snatches of conversation about the affair on the street he immediately went to the county jail. Reporters did not witness his meeting with his wife and mother.

Although the witnesses had been called, an application for a writ of habeas corpus had not been filed by the defense attorneys at 10 a. m. Thomerson said no further action would be taken until the application is filed.

Bandit Shot And Captured In Raid

TOLEDO, O., May 14 (AP).—A bank robber was shot and captured today after he had taken \$6,800 from a branch of the Ohio Savings Bank and Trust company here.

The robber, posing as a policeman, walked into the bank and forced the employees to sit down on the floor as he took the cash. As his automobile was driven away Clark E. Spiller, teller rushed from the bank and fired. A bullet hit the robber behind the ear and he was captured a short distance away when he left his machine and ran into building.

Prepared Relief Parties

Surrounding towns prepared to send relief parties with food and clothing, and medicines if needed. The most definite report of fatalities came from the Longene community, three and a half miles from here, where a family of four was swept from atop a tree just as success was in sight. A rowboat cornered by the marooned persons captured short of its goal and the occupants, who managed to escape, told

of seeing the family carried away by the rushing water.

Several families at Lamont, another nearby hamlet, late last night clung despairingly in tree tops.

Damage Tremendous

Damage in and around Livingston, Marston, Longene, Goodrich, New Willard and Lamont was tremendous. No train had entered Livingston in about 36 hours. Several of the town's business establishments and a number of residences were washed away.

While Longene and Choate Creeks, joining due to their heavy overflow, apparently supplied the chief scourge of the section, the Trinity aided in the work. The weather bureau at Dallas had predicted it would pass above flood stage from Dallas Southeast to Trinidad and fears were expressed that other sections might feel the

effect of floods.

Motorists in sections of East Texas, marooned last night by high water, were hopeful of release. Almost the entire state was drenched

with heavy rainfall. In Dallas, extensive damage was done and firemen were called out to pump water out of the basements and perform similar tasks.

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
