For Improvement Planning Citizens Look Downtown

First step toward putting a new face on Colorado City's downtown area may have been taken Friday night.

A group of business leaders met with Nathan Kizer, planning engineer, and A. C. Carlisle, design engineer and architect, in Chamber of Commerce sponsored discussion.

This was a meeting with a two-fold target — to point out that our downtown business area, the same as in other towns, has a problem and to create interest toward improvement," said City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr.

Kizer is the Austin engineer that is preparing a master city plan for City Council and Carlisle, the designer architect, also is from Austin.

The Austin pair, introduced by Sadler, pointed the problem cities have in keeping downtown areas on the upgrade, attractive and convenient for shoppers.

They also presented drawings of a typical block with improvements that included covered walkways which not only served business patrons, but also provided a uniform look at the street level for all buildings, regardless of size and type of construction.

Planters, new sidewalks and curbs, design and decor, trees, shrubs and other improvements also were included in the block presentation.

The drawing and discussion were pointed toward creating interest in any area of improvement, not for creating an immediate plan.

Kizer emphasized that a business community must take a look at its own particular problem, study ways and means for improvement

then decide upon a plan that can be accomplished without hardship upon individuals, businesses or government.

City Manager Sadler said he was hopeful that from this meeting Friday night will come a strong steering committee of interested

citizens representing the Chamber of Commerce, business enterprises and property owners.

This type of committee needs to visit other cities who have made downtown improvements, see what the

so cities have done, study how they financed their projects, Sadler emphasized.

Then with this information we need to take at our own town map some plans and give a bonafide cost estimate and how it all will affect business and property," the city manager said.

Marine Corps 2nd Lt. Joe Biggers spent a brief four days at home this week before returning to Quantico, Va. for further training.

Biggers, son of Mrs. Emma Lee of Colorado City, completed Wallace High School in 1961 and became a graduate of Jarvis Christian University, Ft. Worth, in 1963.

The 21-year-old Marine enlisted in 1966 as a private and received basic training at San Diego, Calif. He proceeded to Aviation Operation School in Memphis, Tenn., where he was graduated fifth in his class.

As an enlisted man, Lt. Biggers was transferred to Quantico, and there was granted admission into Officers Candidate School. Of the 531 original candidates to enter OCS, he was one of the 281 Marines to complete the

Mitchell County farmers, expecting extra problems with cotton insects this year, will be able to obtain information on early season control at a meeting Monday evening.

Lyndon Almond, Agricultural Extension Service entomologist from Lubbock, will discuss early season control of boll weevil and other early insects.

The meeting will be at 8:30 p.m. in the Loraine Lions Club building, according to County Agent Bobby Lemons.

Careless worms and beet arms worms have caused damage on young tender cotton plants in some areas of the county. Several overwintering weevils have been found in cotton fields across the country.

These weevils are feeding on terminal buds and waiting for cotton squares to begin appearing, according to the county agent.

Complicating Mitchell County's cotton insect problem this summer also is the prospect for the county to be without its usual insect survey team.

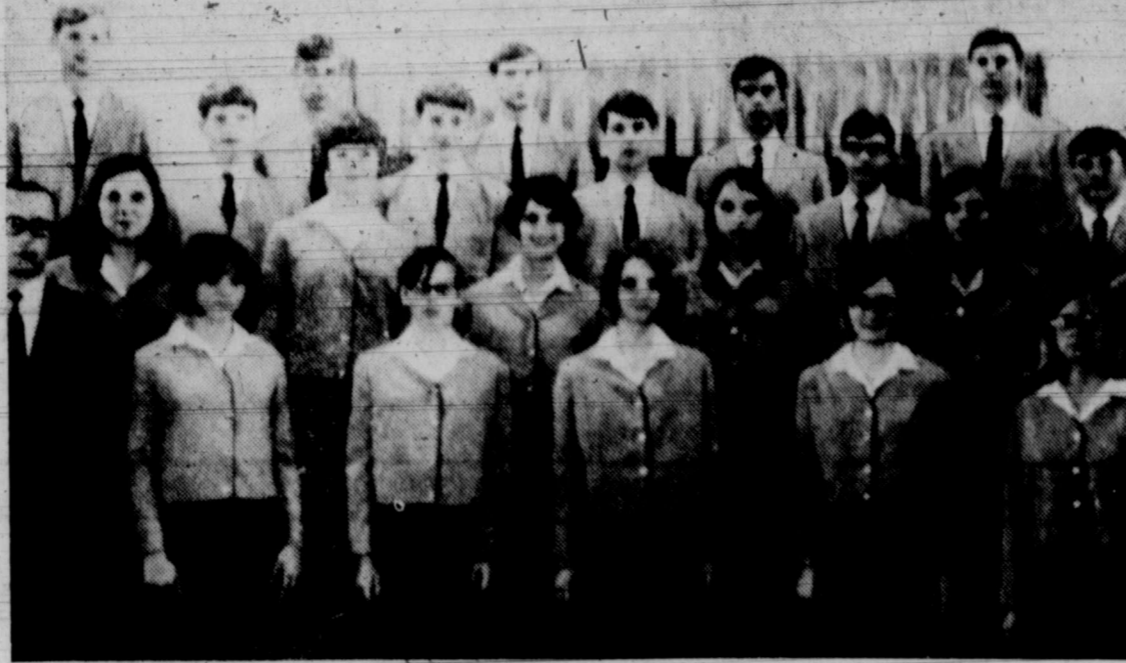

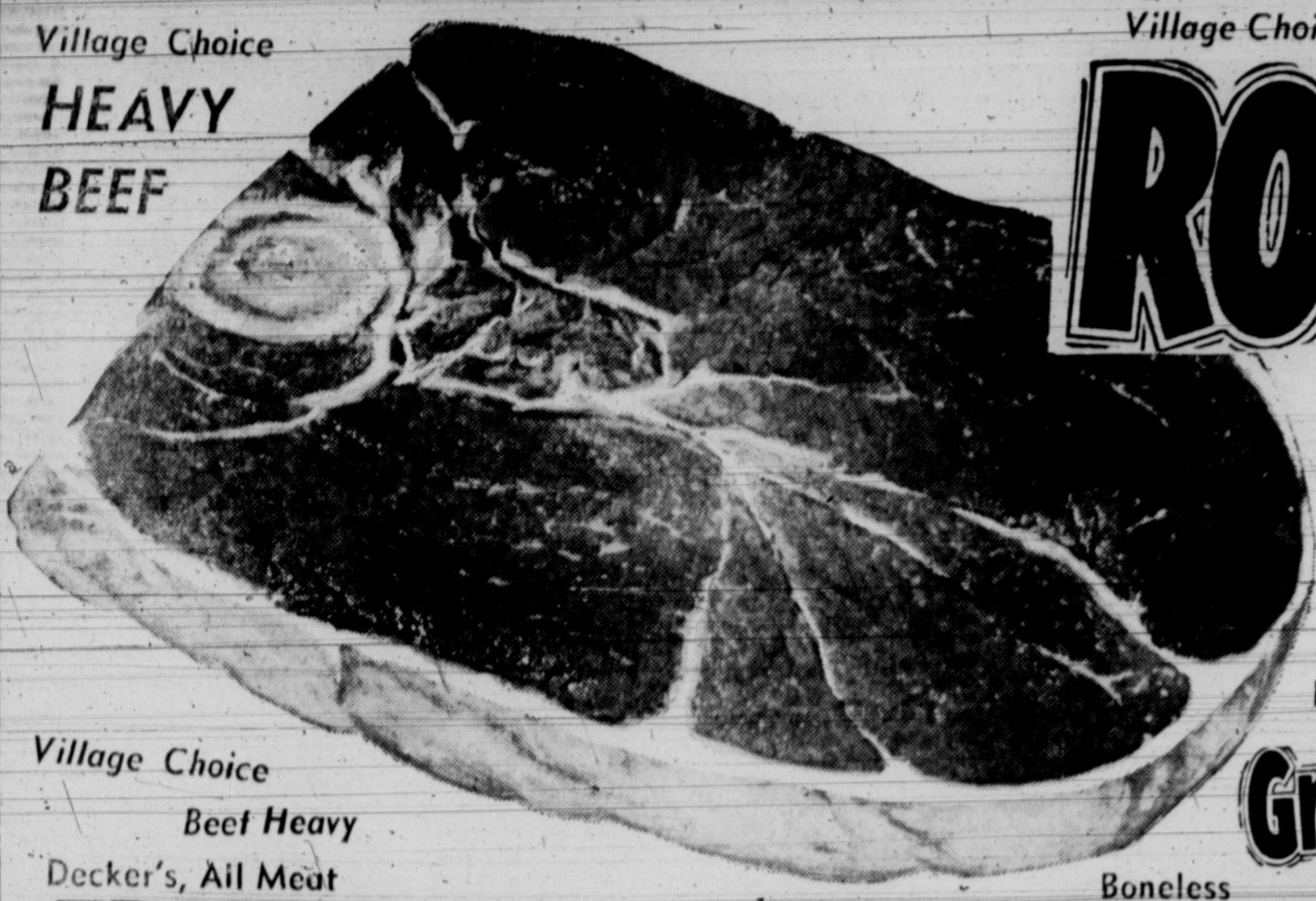

Retiring officers opened the program with a drill. Miss Shirley Gary, retiring worthy advisor, presided. Invocation was said by Wilford Oyler.

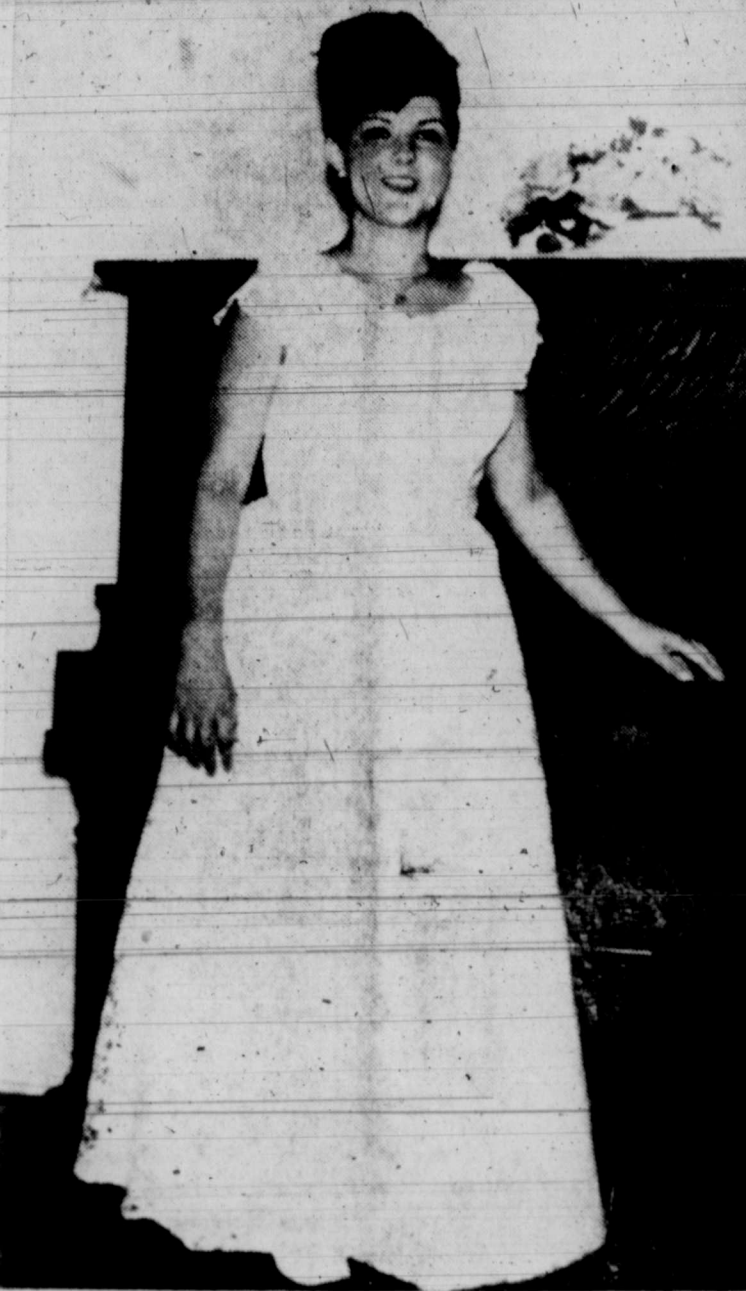

Librarian Reviews Current Books At County Library

Mrs. Ruth Dozier, librarian for Mitchell County Public Library, this week revealed brief sketches of several books which can be currently found on library shelves.

They are as follows:

"Pendulum" by John Christopher - John Christopher's novel explores an all too convincing nightmare. The sitting, England the day after tomorrow, overwhelmed by economic and political crises taken over and tyrannized by the rebellious young, by gangs of kids running rampant, imposing their will, their pop-culture motorcycle-mod culture on a frightened country. Result, the inevitable swing of the pendulum - a bloody revolt of the elders, as the age-old conflict between generations erupts, finally, into a cruel and murderous war.

"The New Year" by Pearl S. Buck - Into the life of Christopher Winters, explodes a bit of his past. The son of who he had fathered by a Korean woman he had briefly though, sincerely loved during the Korean war, and whom he thought he had successfully banish

ed from his mind, emerges as a reality he cannot sidestep.

"The Case of the Careless Cupid" by Eric Stanley Gardner - Mrs. Selma Anson, widowed and considering a second marriage, finds she is under surveillance and hires a shadow to shadow the shadow.

Then there's the suggestion raised that she had put arsenic in her husband's crab salad - as a taxidermist she had quite a bit on hand. Perry Mason again investigates, examines with polygraph and make a winning court appearance.

"The Bees: A story of a family" by Elizabeth Bow-wright Coker - A drama of one man's strong will, unshaken by age, pitted against a family heritage of greed, cruelty and hidden love.

"Farramonde" by Katherine Troy - A rambling, moated house on the English moors. Farramonde seems to guard some elusive secret from its newest inhabitant. As Lisa Delraven unravels the mystery, she comes to fear for her life. "So Young to Burn" by John Creasey - This suspen-

seful new novel of Chief Superintendent Roger West of Scotland Yard begins with a particularly savage phenomenon - with case after case of young lovers in the London parks being sprayed with liquid acid. The impetus behind these attacks appears to be fanatical moralism, well organized; and West suspects a psychiatrist named Dr. Lark who presides over a young people's club.
