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Flooded Shed Fixes Time

Burglars carted off about 800 dollars worth of tools and equipment belonging to Lloyd Barr, dirt contractor east of Colorado City, Interstate 20, sometime in the early morning hours of Friday.

The burglar, or burglars, entered both buildings of the Barr business. All Barr's heavy tools, a cutting torch, gauges, a grinder and a butane bottle were gone when he went to open his dirt contracting business Friday.

Barr estimates his loss at "between \$700 and \$800 in all." "And I had just cleaned up all my tools and put them back in place," said Barr who carried no burglary insurance on the property taken from his shop building.

Smaller building at the Barr business was entered when the burglar tore off a strip of tin to gain entry. Nothing was taken from the small building but the trespasser took the trouble to turn on the water and flood the place.

Judging from the unexpected flood conditions Barr places the time of entry at between 1 and 2 a. m.

Dr. Steakley, practicing dentist, and his staff moved into the attractive new building at 1602 Chestnut St. Tuesday.

Exterior of the Dental Clinic building, which faces west, is of antique brick. Trim around the numerous windows is of hand and batten. Overhanging eaves and a roof of cedar shake add to the exterior charm.

Don Hampton, architect of Hampton-Welch architectural firm in Sweetwater, drew plans for the building. Mrs. Steakley planned interior decorating.

Interior of the new building has an early American decorative theme throughout. Containing a total of 1700 square feet of floor space, the building is partitioned into 10 rooms and 2 bathrooms.

Walls inside are of ash wood paneling finished with head-rubbed stain. Floor of the spacious reception room is of quarry tile. Adjoining the main reception room is a smaller reception and reading room for children with colorful scaled furniture.

Tentative plans for the sugar beet tour set Friday, June 26, as date for visit to the beet acreages.

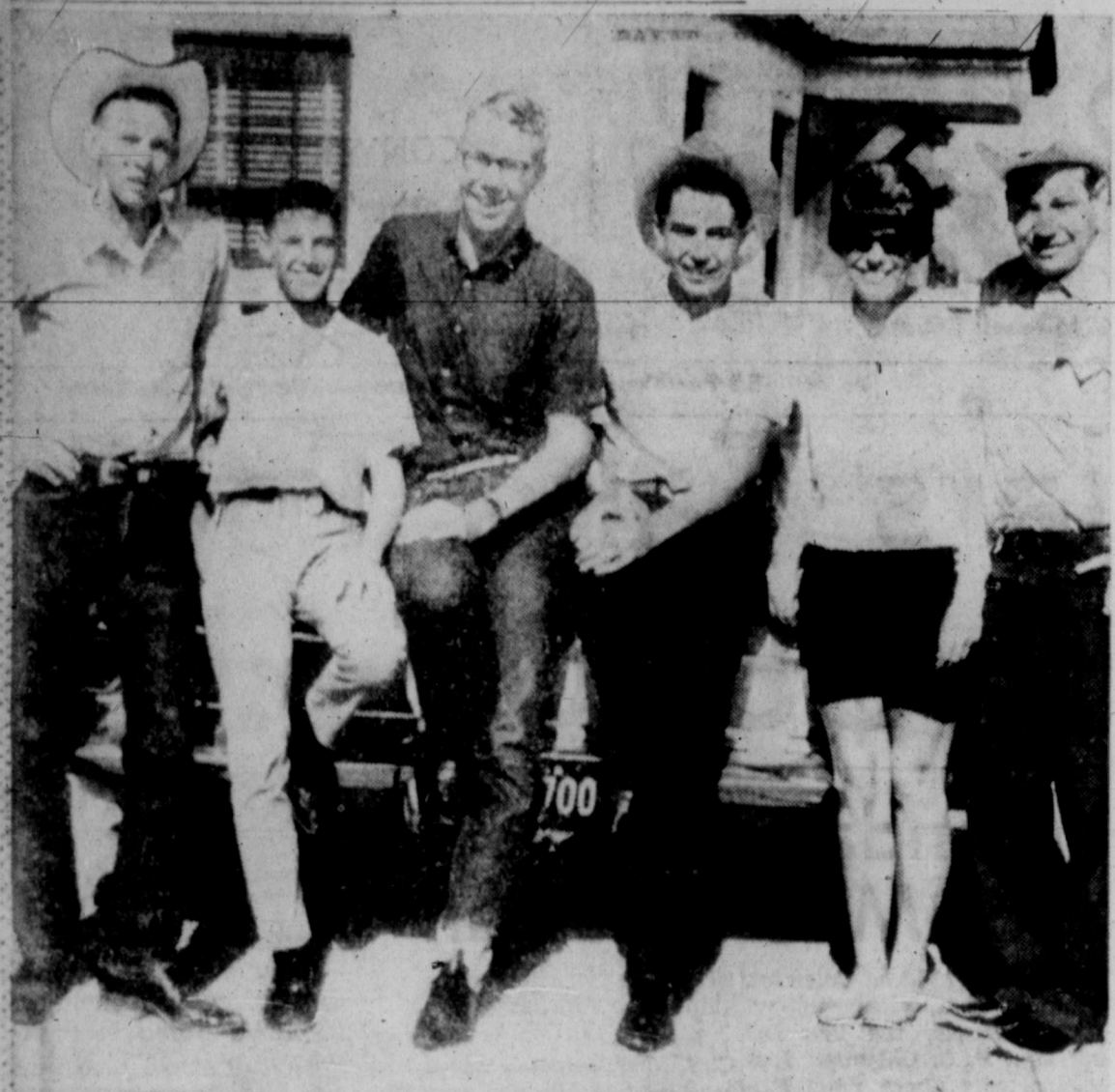
