Austin. — Rep. Franklin Spears of San Antonio says that leaders in the banking business are blocking attempts by the Special House Committee appointed to investigate enforcement of the Texas Escheat laws.

Spears claims that officers of the Texas Bankers Association have advised members to ignore a questionnaire the committee sent to every banking institution in the state. But he says hundreds of banks and savings and loan companies are cooperating in spite of the advice.

He points out that while banks and savings and loan companies are exempt from reporting procedures set out by the 57th Legislature, they are included in the escheat laws.

House Committee's questionnaire asked for non-confidential statistical information to try to determine the number of abandoned accounts. Representative Spears says the study will be very valuable, if enough banking institutions cooperate.

Meanwhile, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson filed the first suit under the new escheat act. Suit seeks to recover \$1,094,150 in stock and dividends held for the unknown owner of a missing railroad land trust certificate.

The missing certificate was first issued in 1888, but Asst. Atty. Gen. Henry Braswell says no one has been able to establish ownership since.

Suit was filed in the 101st District Court in Dallas against Mercantile National Bank of Dallas, trustees of the Texas Pacific Land Trust, and various claimants to the missing certificate.

Wilson's suit alleges that the property should go to the State of Texas under provisions of House Bill 5, covering abandoned property, since its owner has been unknown for seven years or more.

**RACE IS ON** — Kellis Dibrell of San Antonio told Young Republicans in Austin that the Democratic primary no longer will be tantamount to election, now that the Republicans are gaining prominence in the State.

Dibrell has announced for lieutenant governor on the Republican ticket. He predicted that Texas voters will have a problem on May 5 when they're forced to choose between voting in the Republican or Democratic primary.

A Democrat, former Secretary of State Tom Reavley, was first man to announce for the Attorney General's office. Reavley, an Austin attorney, says he considers that office the largest, most varied and most important "law practice" in Texas.

**UP TO THE COURTS** — The University of Texas Board of Regents has agreed "unanimously" to let the court decide whether they should integrate dormitories.

Judge Thornton Hardie of El Paso, chairman of the regents, says a test case filed by Austin attorney Sam Houston Clinton in behalf of three Negro students has been turned over to Atty. Gen. Will Wilson. In a letter to Hardie, Clinton asked the regents to integrate the facilities and escape the suit.

Hardie has accused Clinton of filing the suit for "the purpose of publicity and propaganda."

Regents originally planned to study further integration. Hardie refused to say whether the suit has changed their plans.

Students and faculty have asked the regents for dormitory integration through campus polls.

Integration in athletics also has been at issue. The regents chairman says they do not want to do anything that would disturb the "excellent relations" U. T. has had with other members of the Southwest Athletic Conference.

**TEXTBOOKS ADOPTED** — Three "Texans for America," J. Evetts Haley of Canyon, Dr. Don Riddle of Paris and Mrs. Joan Slay of Fort Worth, appeared before the State Board of Education this week to protest acceptance of several textbooks.

Organization had previously notified the Board of objections to 25 books on the State Textbooks Committee's recommended list. They spoke out strongly against two history texts, linking the authors to subversive organizations and charging the publisher of one with cooperating with a "known subversive" in the publication of a World War II booklet, "The Land of the Soviets."

After a three-hour discussion between the "Texans for America" and board members, and statements from publishers denying the charges, Board of Education voted to adopt all books on the committee's list, except four geography books which Commissioner J. W. Edgar asked them to delete.

The Board of Education also adopted a regulation setting 18 semester hours of education courses as the minimum required for a teaching certificate in Texas.

**WATER TALKS** — Leaders in water conservation work have been in conference with the State Board of Water Engineers on the ambitious report of U. S. Study Commission—Texas.

Commission, created by Congress, contains representatives of all the Federal water and soil conservation agencies, plus a representative from each of the eight river basins covered by the study. George H. Brown of Houston is chairman of the Commission.

Comments of the 17 state agencies will be relayed to Gov. Price Daniel, who will add his own comments to the report. The Commission will then meet again to prepare a final report and forward to President John F. Kennedy for transmittal to Congress.

In all, the report suggests that nearly \$4,000,000,000 worth of dams and canals will be needed by the year 2010. Most of the work is for water supplies, which are not federally-financed.

Chief Engineer John Vandertulip of the State Board of Water Engineers has estimated that in the next 20 years, cities and industries will have to spend \$1,000,000,000 for their share of water facilities.

## Four Uninjured Forced Landing Plane at Talco

Four people escaped injury Monday morning when their plane made a forced landing in the J. H. Weatherall pasture east of Talco.

Dr. and Mrs. D. W. Halbrook and Mr. and Mrs. Earl F. Rogers were returning to their home in Conway, Ark., from Dallas. The plane developed engine trouble southwest of Talco. Dr. Holbrook hesitated to try to land his plane in this area, due to the rough terrain, and heavy traffic on Highway 271 kept him from attempting to land on the highway.

Although the motor had failed, Dr. Holbrook was able to glide his plane to a safe landing near the Weatherall home. Another plans took the four to Conway Monday afternoon.

## Hospital Care For Aged Authorized

The Board of the State Department of Public Welfare in its regular monthly meeting, with chairman, Burton G. Hackney, Brownfield; Will Bond, Hillsboro and W. Kendall Baker, Houston in attendance, authorized the signing of an agreement between the State Department of Public Welfare and Blue Cross of Texas on Nov. 15. Texas became the first state in the Nation to insure a vast new program of health care for old age assistance recipients, with an independent health care underwriter.

In excess of 220,000 old age assistance recipients will become eligible for hospital care, physician's services in the hospital and nursing home care, effective January 1, 1962.

## Boy Scouts Goal 3860 Members

The NeTseO Trails Council Boy Scouts of America, is nearing their goal of 3,860 boy members.

Rev. W. T. Stephenson of Bonham, Council Organization & Extension Chairman, reported to the Executive Board Members Thursday night that the Council needs only 155 more boys to reach the 1961 objective. He pointed out to the group of businessmen that this would be a gain of 30% over 1960; a gain that everyone would be proud of.

R. M. "Bob" Cantrell, President, led the Board Members in a study of this year's program which proved to be one of the finest years of operation the Council has ever enjoyed. Mr. Cantrell said, "Our quality program has improved, we had our best summer camp program, and we now have 48 young men who have received the highest rank in Scouting, that of Eagle, which doubles the record year in 1960."

The Board Members approved the 1962 program of action submitted by the eight Operating Committees, with plans to broaden the Scouting Program.

The next meeting of the Board will be held at the Alps Restaurant in Mt. Pleasant on Dec. 14, at which time the 1962 officers will be installed.

## PJC Announces Building Plans; Football Dropped

Board of Regents of Paris Junior College has announced plans for a million dollar building program, including a Student Union Building, two boys dormitories and one girls dormitory.

Plans call for work on the new dormitories to begin soon and to be completed by the first semester of 1962. The Student Union building is to be completed by mid-term of 1962 at a cost of \$500,000. It will contain approximately 30,000 square feet, and will house a double-line cafeteria, a book store, recreation center, snack bar, Student Union office and various conference and meeting rooms.

Beset by huge athletic fund deficits, PJC also announced the dropping of football from its athletic program.

Heavy financial losses, estimated to be 37 per cent of tax and tuition receipts, was the primary reason for dropping the sport.

Dr. C. C. Clark, president of the college, said the athletic fund for the year ending Aug. 31 showed a deficit of \$57,721.24, of which nearly \$40,000 was from football.

Since football activity was taking one-third of the college's operating money, Dr. Clark said the Board of Regents decided PJC can no longer subsidize the program at the expense of other areas of the school.

The regents announced plans for spending \$10,000 in other facets of the athletic program, with a greater accent on intramural sports.

Expansion of the basketball schedule and more emphasis on baseball and track are planned.

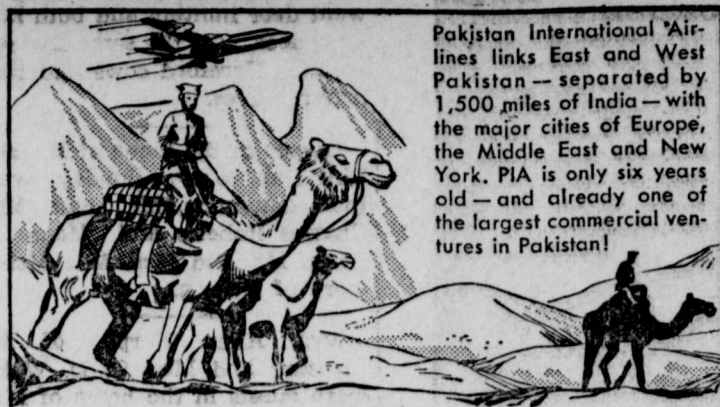

## Danny Doyle Martin Discharged From TRC, Gonzales

Danny Doyle Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charley Martin, Talco, was discharged Oct. 31 from the Texas Rehabilitation Center of Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation.

He is now a member of the Former Patients Association, made up of the more than 3,000 persons who have undergone rehabilitation treatment at the Center. This is the only such organization in the United States.

In comprehensive rehabilitation at TRC, a skilled medical staff seeks to treat the entire person. An individual program is prescribed for each patient, utilizing the types of therapy suited to his needs. The goal is maximum rehabilitation — physically, emotionally, and socially — so the person can live and work to the best of his abilities.

The Texas Rehabilitation Center depends mainly upon public contributions to maintain its program of treating persons left handicapped by such diseases and accidents as cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, polio, muscular dystrophy, spinal cord injuries, arthritis, and strokes.

Any Texan who can benefit from TRC's medical program is eligible for admission, regardless of age, race, or beliefs.

## Postmaster Urges Early Mailings For Christmas

Predicting Christmas mail this year will set an alltime high record, the Postmaster announced a 1961 "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign.

It is always a good idea, he said, to make sure that each address includes the full name, street and number, or post office box number, rural route and box number, but it is especially important to do so during the Christmas season.

Christmas cards carrying the first class postage of 4 cents or 7 cents for air mail, may include a personal message, he continued. Nothing more than a signature is authorized on unsealed cards mailed at the 3 cent rate. By typing your mailings in two separate bundles for local and for out of town with addresses all facing one way, you can greatly expedite delivery.

It is also important to plan your Christmas mailings so that those to distant points are mailed first. Try to get all your out of town cards and gifts in to the Post Office before December 10, and those for nearby points by Dec. 15, in order to avoid the

## Alcorn Figures There's Profit In Education Same As In Fertilizer

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur discusses education this week. At least that's what it sounds like he's doing.

Dear Editor: I never do object to a new idea. I don't do anything about one, haven't done anything especially about all the old ones, but I don't mind one being brought up.

Consequently, I was very interested in an economist's idea the other day that the government ought to pay college students to go to school. He said it would show a profit, that the difference in what a college graduate earns over what a non-college man earns would amount to enough to pay the government back in increased income taxes, hence the program wouldn't really cost anything. I guess it's like putting fertilizer on a crop; the cost of the fertilizer is more than made up in increased yields, if you don't mind me putting higher education and fertilizer in the same economic bracket, although understand I haven't checked with universities or the fertilizer people either about this. I got to thinking about this idea, along with another idea I also read, namely that the old

age pension level be lowered from 65 to 45.

Here's the way the two ideas would work: public schools and parents would take care of a person until he finished high school, then the government would pay him to go to college for four more years, with maybe a year or two of graduate work thrown in. Then with a year or two in the army or Peace Corps, this would get him up to the age of say 25. Then he'd be on his own till 45, and I don't think this is unreasonable. Under the free enterprise system a man ought to earn his living part of the way, just to prove the system is still sound.

Any man who isn't willing to work 20 years, provided of course he's on a five-day week, six-hour day, ain't worth his salt.

This system of paying kids to go to college would enable everybody to go and would increase the national income and raise the national educational level, although of course it wouldn't improve the athletic system any, as I understand athletes are already being paid to go to college. I guess though we could raise their pay, just to keep the thing in balance. Yours faithfully, A. A.

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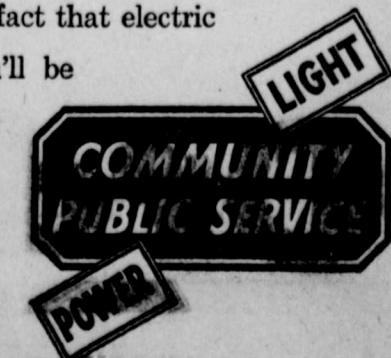
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
