Award Presentations, Contests Highlight Harvest Festival Here

A large crowd gathered at the Tahoka downtown square Saturday for the 19th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival, despite the cold blustery winds which whipped around booths and prevented some activities, including the chance for area citizens to ride in a hot air balloon. The dunking board booth was postponed until later in the day when the weather warmed somewhat, but most other activities continued as scheduled.

Highlighting the day's events were the Harvest Festival Queen and Princess contests and an awards presentation for the Tahoka Man and Woman of the Year. Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon presented Barbara Cook, a Lynn County Emergency Medical Technician and ambulance coordinator, with the 1994 Woman of the Year plaque. Barry Pittman, who is involved in many community and church activities and service organizations, was named Man of the Year.

Tahoka High School senior Susan Draper was named 1994 Harvest Festival Queen from among 11 contestants, and was also chosen Miss Congeniality by the other candidates. Susan is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milt Draper of Tahoka. She will receive a \$100 scholarship from Tahoka Chamberettes and a \$100 scholarship from the Harvest Festival Committee.

Abby Wells, sophomore daughter

of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wells of Tahoka, was named first runnerup in the Queen's contest, and Micah Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Pebsworth, also a sophomore, was second runnerup.

The 11 contestants sold 3009 tickets to raise \$3,009 for the Harvest Festival, funds which are used by the Harvest Festival Committee each year to produce the annual event. Nine Princess contestants sold 4,736 tickets to raise \$2,368 for the Harvest Festival.

Ashley McNeely, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Todd McNeely of Tahoka and a third grader at Tahoka Elementary, was named Harvest Festival Princess and received a \$100 savings bond donated by First National Bank of Tahoka.

Emily Gill, fourth grader and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stan Gill of Tahoka, received second place in the Princess Contest and a \$75 savings bond from First National Bank. D'Lynn Stone, fifth grader and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Stone of Tahoka, placed third and received a \$50 savings bond.

Many area citizens received prizes through the hourly merchant drawings, receiving prizes donated by area merchants, and several raffle drawings were held during the day including a trip for two to Mexico won by Edwin Pebsworth from the Queen's ticket raffle.

Other big winners were Dan

Stone and Jerry Reno, winners of the bicycle drawing from Princess ticket sales, and Sylvia Molina won the Texas Tech-Texas weekend package. Eddie Joe Hancock won the \$250 prize in the Cow Patty Bingo contest, and Kim Ingle won the \$100 prize when the cow "deposited liquid" on the square with her number.

Although the hot air balloon tethered rides were not available due to the windy conditions during the day, the raffle for a free-floating hot air balloon ride was held and Jeri Akard was the lucky winner.

Proceeds from the balloon rides were to benefit the Jerod Clopton Medical Fund, and balloonist Keith Anderson of Lubbock told *The News* that he was going to contact several organizations in Lubbock to seek donations to the fund which assists the Bill Clopton family of O'Donnell in medical costs for their 10-year-old son, Jerod, who is currently undergoing chemotherapy treatment for an inoperable brain tumor.

"I told Jerod, who was disappointed this morning when the winds were too strong to allow me to take up the hot air balloon, that whenever I take up the raffle winner for the free-floating balloon ride, he'd better be ready, because I was going to take him up next," said Anderson at Saturday's festival.

In other raffle drawings, Berta Tyson won the Texas quilt given by the Lynn County Pioneer Club; Jason Newdiger won the TV-VCR combination given by the Lynn County Child Welfare Board; Pat Calvillo won a Santa Claus and Mrs. Ronald Sherrill won a bedspread, both items from the Tahoka Garden Club raffle; J.P. Stice won \$50 from the Student Council bubblegum toss; and winners in the children's drawings included Jared Calvillo, Miguel Garza, Andrea Aleman and Eva Morin, who each won \$100 savings bonds donated by First National Bank of O'Donnell and the Harvest Festival Committee.

Early Voting Begins Wednesday For General Election

Early voting by personal appearance begins next Wednesday, Oct. 19 for the November General Election. Registered voters desiring to vote may do so each weekday at the Lynn County Clerk's Office in the County Courthouse between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. beginning on Oct. 19 and ending on Nov. 4.

The General Election on Nov. 8 will decide the hotly-contested governor's race between Democratic incumbent Ann W. Richards and Republican candidate George W. Bush, the U.S. Senator's race between Kay Bailey Hutchison and Richard Fisher, and several other state, district and county offices.

In Lynn County, voters will also elect several county and precinct officers, including a contested race for County Judge between incumbent J.F. Brandon (Democrat) and Republican candidate Larry Hagood, and eight other uncontested positions including Sheriff (unexpired term), District Clerk, County Clerk, County Treasurer, County Commissioner Pct. #2, County Commissioner Pct. #4, Justice of Peace Pct. #1, and Justice of Peace Pct. #4.

Lynn County voters also have interest in several other races which are contested, including the race between incumbent Congressman Bill Sarpalius, Democrat, and Mack Thornberry, Republican seeking to represent this county and District 13 in Congress.

Democratic incumbent David

Counts, state representative for this district, is opposed by Republican Wilma Hogan. Both candidates have campaigned in Lynn County. Counts is scheduled to be in Tahoka next Thursday.

H. Bryan Poff Jr. of Amarillo, Democrat seeking re-election as judge for the 7th court of appeals, place 2, scored some points in two visits to Tahoka, including an appearance Wednesday. Poff is opposed on the ballot by Republican Brian Quinn.

State Sen. John Montford, who will be in Tahoka and Wilson Friday, is opposed in his bid for re-election by Republican Val Varley.

Oct. 20 Reception To Honor Counts

A coffee reception honoring State Representative David Counts will be held Thursday, Oct. 20, at 3 p.m. in the Community Room of First National Bank of Tahoka. Representative Counts will be the guest of Cal Huffaker at the morning meeting of the Tahoka Rotary Club and will meet with local business and civic leaders from 1-3 p.m. The reception will follow.

State Representative David Counts represented District 78 from 1988 until redistricting in 1992. He has

represented District 70 from 1992 to the present. District 70 includes Lynn, Garza, and Kent counties as well as Knox, King, Borden, Fisher, Howard, Jones, Nolan, Scurry, and Stonewall counties.

9-1-1 Rural Designation Data Ready

Lynn County commissioners were advised Monday during regular session of the court that Mrs. Melba Thomas has finished compiling information and maps for rural numbering and road signs and is now ready to turn the information over to South Plains Assn. of Governments.

Commissioners expressed appreciation to her for her efforts and for a good job.

All commissioners were present, with Judge J.F. Brandon presiding. Commissioners are T.A. Stone, Jacky Henry, Sandy Cox and J.T. Miller.

Wilson State Bank To Celebrate 75th Birthday

Wilson State Bank, which opened on Oct. 19, 1919 in the rear of the Wilson Mercantile Building and on Jan. 20, 1920 had stock certification of \$15,000 and has present assets of \$38.7 million, will celebrate its 75th anniversary with a reception Sunday in the lobby of the bank, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

In January 1920 officers were William Green, president; Lonnie Lumsden, vice president; J.R. Houston, cashier, and directors S.V. Houston, Ed Studeman, Philip Welhausen, William Dickson Green, J.T. Williams, H.B. Crosby, William Green, Lumsden and J.R. Houston.

Stockholders since the bank opened have been (1919) William G. Green and Lonnie Lumsden, (1924) Howard Cook, (1936) Callie Lumsden, (1937) William G. Lumsden, (1942) A.L. Holder, (1945) John M. Cook, (1959) Dan H. Cook and Nancy Cook Ross, (1961) Victor Steinhauser, (1974) Jackie Bishop, (1981) Sharon Lumsden, Sandra Smith and Sharon Bishop, (1983) Jo Ann Cook,

Stephanie Moczygemba, David Cook, D'Ana Livingston, Jay Ross, Laurie Ross, Jennifer Ross and Jeremy Ross, (1994) L. Vink Miller.

Bank presidents over the years have been William G. Green (1920-29), William D. Green (1929-45), Lonnie Lumsden (1945-51), H.G. Cook (1951-64), who had joined the bank as a bookkeeper in 1921, Dan Cook (1964-93), who started working at the bank in 1954, and the current president, Miller, who took that position in 1993.

After fire destroyed the bank and two other buildings in January 1947, a new building was completed on Main St. in March of that year. It was remodeled in 1953, and the present new building was opened on FM 211 on the west edge of Wilson May 5, 1980.

Dan Cook now is chairman of the board of directors, which includes Jo Ann Cook, Mrs. Nancy Cook Ross, Steinhauser, Jackie Bishop and Miller.

Deposits at latest report were \$32,183,701.

Pages From The Past...

Three Killed In Lynn County Tornado Draw Community Is Scene Of Disaster

Three people are dead and more than a score of others were injured by a tornado which swept across the northern portion of Dawson County and the southeastern portion of Lynn County about six o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

The dead all resided in the vicinity of Draw in Lynn County about 18 miles southeast of Tahoka. A number of those who were severely injured also resided in that community.

Scenes of horror marked the path of the tornado, which made its approach undetected by its victims until it was hard upon them.

Houses were reduced to splinters, automobiles were torn to pieces and scattered over the landscape or were twisted into almost unrecognizable masses, while some of the injured were hurled high into the air and carried many feet from the place where they were picked up by the terrific twister.

Apparently the twister first struck in the OK Community or a few miles west of that place in northern Dawson County, eight or ten miles southwest of O'Donnell. The store at OK was demolished and a number of houses destroyed. It moved in a northeasterly direction, passing within two miles southeast of O'Donnell, a residence about two miles south of O'Donnell being destroyed and some of the inmates injured. Little damage was done in the Joe Bailey Community except the destruction of outhouses and feed stacks, but the tornado struck again with full force just west of Draw.

The first residence struck and demolished was that of Allen Moore, but the family had fled from the house and were scurrying to the storm cellar when the house crashed.

There were seven persons in the McKay house when the storm struck. Mrs. McKay, it is said, ran from the house toward a storm cellar with her twins in her arms, but she was thrown down. The babies were torn from her clasp and one of them was very seriously injured. The other miraculously escaped serious injury.

April 29, 1938

Excerpts from a follow-up story on the same tornado...

A half-mile east of the Gary house was the four-room residence of E. Vandivere. His roof was gone and walls of the house so badly damaged that they planned to rebuild the entire structure. Mr. Vandivere said his wife kept telling him to look at the terrible storm cloud approaching, "but there wasn't any use to look," he said facetiously, "for we had no storm cellar." Finally, he ran out to cut off the windmill and as he turned back toward the house he was compelled to see the storm — a black wall of sand hard upon them. "Before I got to the house, car sheds and chicken houses were passing me but I managed to dodge

Burglary, Wreck Are Investigated During Week

A 1994 Toyota Camry driven by LaJuana Rimmer Ashcraft, 49, of Lubbock, Thursday struck a parked utility trailer owned by Jay Kelln of Tahoka in the 1800-block of N. 7th.

Also turned over to juvenile authorities was an incident Saturday where several O'Donnell juveniles were reported on top of a building in that city, throwing objects and putting graffiti on the building.

Judge George Hansard heard pleas from two persons in 106th District Court in Tahoka Oct. 5. Juan Rodriguez, 34, of O'Donnell, was ordered to serve 8 years in prison as his probation on an original charge of aggravated assault was revoked. Juan Felipe Charon, 20, of O'Donnell, was assessed a term of 10 years in boot camp, most of which will be probated if certain conditions are met. He had been charged with burglary.

In jail during the week were two persons for driving while intoxicated, first offense, two for application to revoke probation on charges of DWI, and one each for theft by check, public intoxication plus disorderly conduct, DWI first offense plus no liability insurance and no drivers license, and public intoxication.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED GAS RATE CHANGE

On September 20, 1994 Energas Company filed Statements of Intent to change its gas rates and service charges with the Texas Railroad Commission and each incorporated city listed below. The proposed changes will take effect no sooner than 35 days after filing.

The Company proposes to increase its customer charge by 89 cents per month with no other changes to its gas rate schedules. The change would apply to General Service (residential and commercial) and Small Industrial Service. The Company also proposes the following increased service charges:

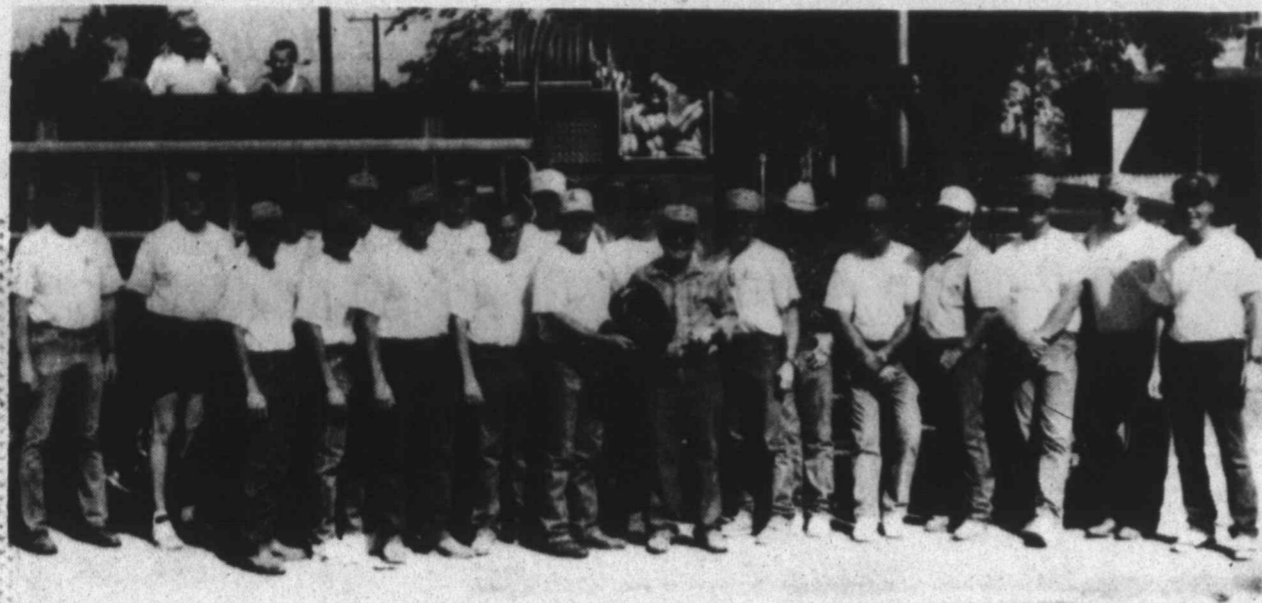

Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon has proclaimed the week of Oct. 9-15 as Fire Prevention Week in Lynn County.

Lynn County has four volunteer fire departments; in Tahoka, Wilson, O'Donnell and New Home. These volunteer firefighters are dedicated to the safety of life and property from the devastating effects of fire, often at risk of their own lives.

Gardner will present a program on fire prevention safety to Tahoka Elementary students today (Thursday).

The Wilson VFD will present a program on fire safety to students in Wilson Elementary on Tuesday, Oct. 18 at 8:15 a.m. Some of the activities will be hands-on for the children, and parents and other interested citizens are invited to attend the program. Fire Prevention Week is always the Sunday-through-Saturday period in which falls Oct. 9, date of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 people, injured countless numbers, left 100,000 homeless, and destroyed more than 17,400 buildings. More than 4,000 people die from smoke inhalation and fire each year in the United States.

In this proclamation, Judge Brandon has called upon the citizens of Lynn County to participate in Fire Prevention Week activities such as locating and eliminating fire hazards; developing a home escape plan; and as the 1994 theme suggests, "Test Your Smoke Detector For Life."

Escape plans at home, at work and at school should be practiced, including knowing two ways out, having a pre-planned meeting place outside, crawling low under smoke holding the head 12-24 inches off the floor when necessary, and making sure everyone knows never to re-enter a burning building once they are safely outside.

The Lynn County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the county, is working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

H.G. Franklin, president of Lynn County Farm Bureau said, "Fire is both friend and foe. We can't live without it, but its destructive power is a threat we must control."

The following fire prevention safety tips are offered:

- ◆ Regularly inspect your house and out-buildings for fire hazards. Check the electrical system, electrical appliances and equipment, fuel storage, heaters and heating system. Make needed repairs or replacements without delay. Avoid overloading circuits or bypassing fuses/breakers.

- ◆ Remove trash, stacks of paper and other unneeded combustibles that could feed a fire.

- ◆ Read and follow instructions with portable heaters. Place them where they won't ignite combustibles or be tipped over. Never use gasoline in kerosene heaters, and make certain gasoline and kerosene containers are clearly marked to avoid a mix-up. Never use a kerosene or gas-fired heater in a closed area - have ample ventilation. Be certain you use the correct grade of fuel for your portable heating equipment.

- ◆ Check your heating system prior to the heating season. Install and use wood-burning stoves as directed in the manuals or other literature. Screen fireplaces. Keep chimneys and flues free of obstructions and creosote buildup.

- ◆ Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach.

- ◆ Never smoke in bed and avoid the easy chair when drowsy. Avoid smoking when using flammable materials or in places that have readily combustible materials such as hay, straw, dry weeds, grain dust, etc. Store flammable liquids in well-marked, closed containers. Make sure your cigarette or match is "out" before discarding.

- ◆ Install approved lightning protection systems on main buildings. Inspect them annually to make sure they are properly grounded.

- ◆ Be prepared for fire should it strike. Have operating smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. Develop and practice a home fire escape plan. Teach children how to call for help. Have a water supply available to fight fire.

- ◆ Choose and regularly inspect fire extinguishers that are the right size and type for the fires that might occur.

- ◆ Consider installing a sprinkler system in all new construction.
- ◆ 1992 information indicates that every 16 seconds a fire department responds to a fire somewhere in the U.S. ...

A residential fire occurs every 66 seconds...

There is a civilian (non-fire service person) fire death every 111 minutes...

There is a civilian fire injury every 18 minutes...

It is estimated that 4,730 civilians (non-fire persons) died as a result of fire in 1992, up 5.9 percent from the

previous year, and 3,705 of those occurred in home fires, also up 5.9 percent. About 78 percent of all U.S.

fire deaths occur in home fires with a fire death every 111 minutes.

Child Welfare Board Meets

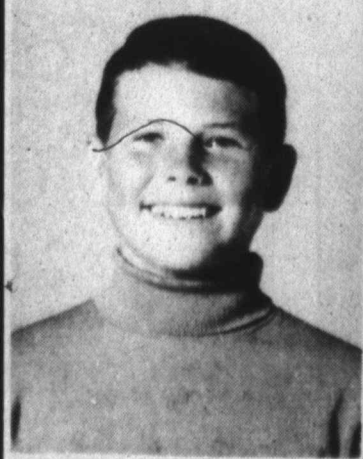
The Lynn County Child Welfare Board met Oct. 5 with all members present.

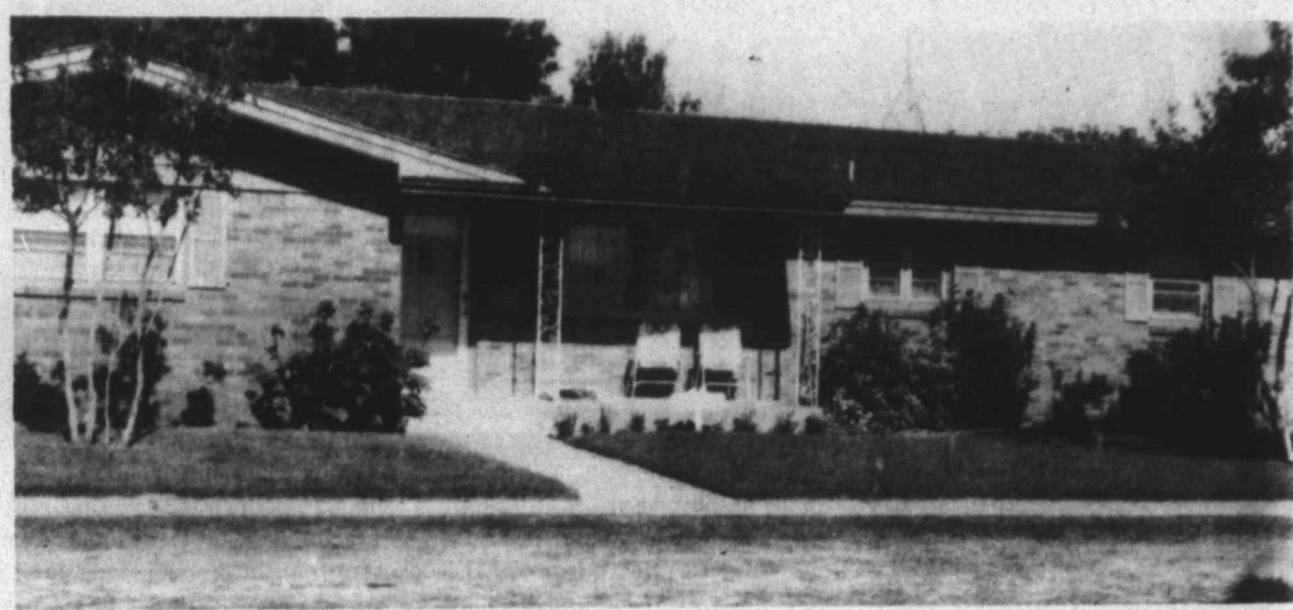

This week Tahoka should win its fourth game of the season as the Bulldogs go to Ralls to play the winless but improving Jackrabbits, who lost last week to Lubbock Christian High School 14-13.

It was a shame that late-game errors cost the Bulldogs the game Friday after Tahoka had played so well and went into the last quarter leading 13-6. But the penalty and a high snap over the head of Tahoka punter Edward Ramirez and the absence of any pass protection in the last period for Bulldog QB Wesley Solomon killed the home team's hopes of a victory and left Tahoka at 3-3 for the year, 0-3 in district 4-AA.

The first quarter was scoreless. Tahoka turned the ball over on an interception, but played strong defense and held Seagraves on downs at the Tahoka 32. After that, Solomon hit running back Monte Hale on four consecutive passes of 2, 23, 13 and 11 yards, but couldn't score. Hale sat out the second half with an injury and Tahoka completed only one more pass in the game, a 10-yarder to Matt Garcia.

Seagraves scored on a 2-yard run by Edward Cavazos with about 4 minutes left in the half, then missed a kick and it was 6-0. Tahoka drove to the Seagraves 10, mainly on running by Dustin Burleson and the pass to Garcia, but lost the ball on a fumble to leave it 6-0 at the half.

Tahoka recovered a Seagraves fumble at the Eagles 29 in the third period, and Burleson, running hard, gained most of the yards, including the final 4 for a touchdown. Gerald Cantu kicked the point to put Tahoka ahead 7-6.

Later in the third, Tahoka scored again as Ramirez took a reverse and raced 76 yards into the end zone. The point after was no good, and Tahoka had a 13-6 lead.

Twice Tahoka held Seagraves on downs in the third and fourth periods, and appeared in good shape to win the game until the fourth down punt snap gave the Eagles the ball at the Tahoka 28. Then came the interference call which appeared to partisan fans to be a denial of defensive back Solomon's equal right to the ball near the goal line. This resulted in a 1-yard run by Joe Arguijo for a touchdown which put Seagraves up 14-13 after a 2-point run.

On four consecutive attempts by Tahoka to get pass plays off, Eagle defenders came storming in untouched to smash QB Solomon for the big losses before he could even set up to throw. The last one was a 10-yard loss and fumble which set up Seagraves at the 10 for a late meaningless touchdown and 2-point conversion.

Burleson gained 85 yards on 18 carries, an average of 4.7. The best rushing average, of course, was by Ramirez, a whopping 41 yards per carry, as he had one 6-yard run to go with his 76-yard scoring dash.

Tahoka's defense held Seagraves to just one completed pass, 18 yards, and only 139 net yards rushing. Leading tackler for the Bulldogs was line-backer Jesse Perez, followed by Cantu, Chris Rodriguez, Joseph DeLeon, Clay Taylor, Drew Stone, Reggie Moore and Stephen Rodriguez.

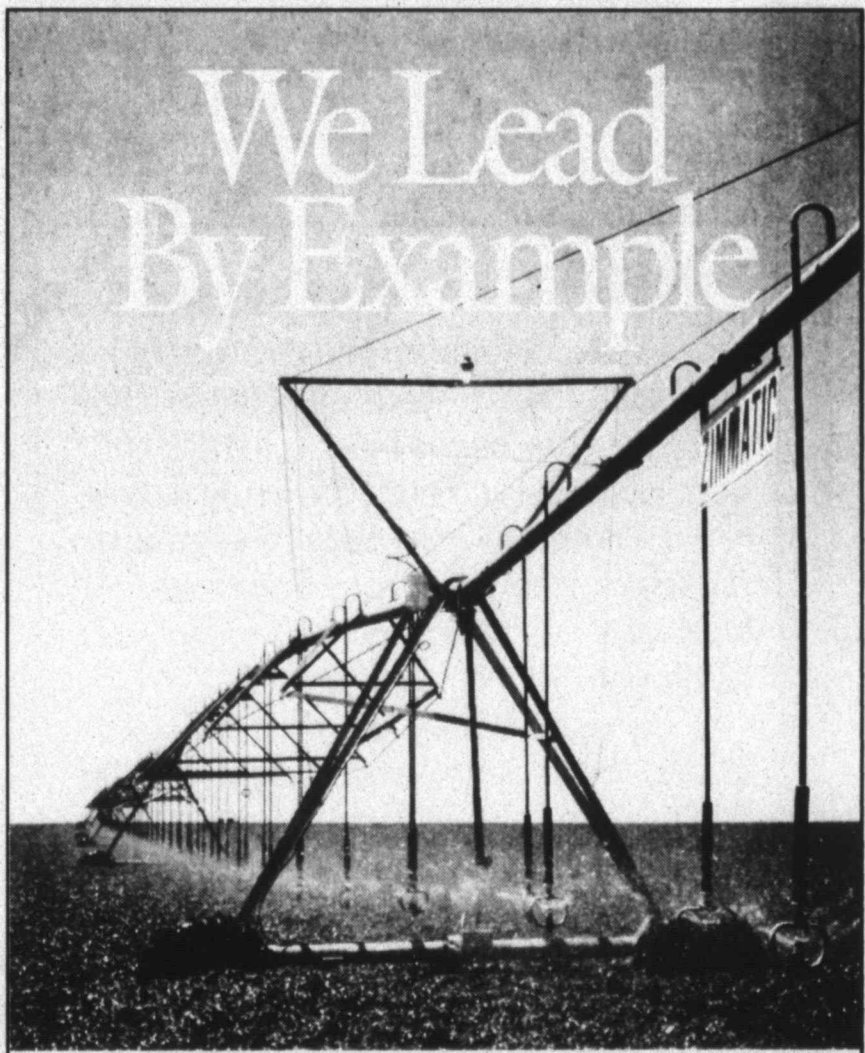



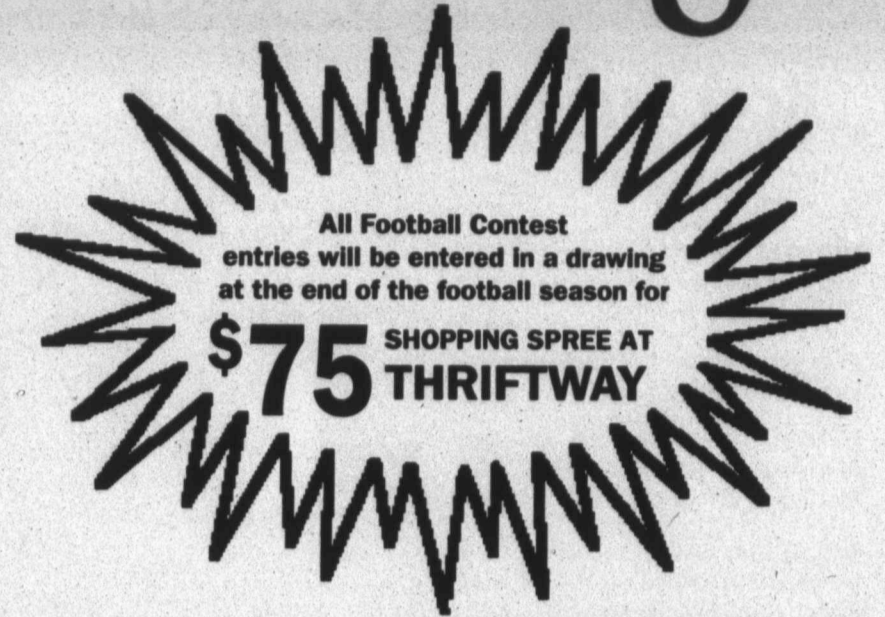
