Southern Cross Conquers Gale, Reaching Brisbane Relief Ship Communicates By Radio With Italia

Signals Heard By Italian Craft Are Believed Genuine

Position of Lost Dirigible Given Is One of Least Known Portions of Frigid Arctic Region.

GIVES FRESH HOPE TO RESCUE WORKERS

Sealing Vessel and Crew Will Try to Work To Position by Using Sleds and Dog Teams.

ROME, June 8 (AP).—The Stefania news agency announced tonight that the Citta Di Milano, base ship for General Umberto Nobile's expedition, maintained radio communication for 20 minutes today with the dirigible Italia, lost in the polar wastes since May 25.

The dirigible gave her bearings which corresponded to a place 20 miles north of Cape Leigh Smith. The easterly extremity of northeast land. The messages were exchanged beginning about 7 p. m. Greenwich time, tonight.

The Citta Di Milano has asked the Sealer Hobby to try to work her way to the position given by the Italia with sleds, dogs and guides.

The messages were heard plainly on the Citta Di Milano and the commander of that vessel is confident they were bona fide because the sender wound up his transmission with the proper recognition signals.

The position given in the Rome dispatch, 20 miles north of Cape Leigh Smith, is approximately 220 miles from Kings Bay, the haven which the Italia was trying to reach on her return flight from the north pole. The position of the dirigible is approximately 500 miles south by east of the point where the big airship was supposed to be when

104 in the Shade And We're Willing to Believe It

No one in Lubbock needs to be told that yesterday was the hottest day of the summer thus far and one of the hottest in the city's weather history for June.

The official gauge at the experiment station said that a high mark of 104 degrees in the shade was reached during the afternoon. Unofficial thermometers reported even higher.

A variation of 42 degrees from the low of the day—62—was shown.

The weather forecast for today promised relief in the form of showers.

Bandits Hold Up Express Courier And Get \$20,000

Four Masked Men, Flashing Pistols, Terrorize Express Company Employees.

NEW ORLEANS, La., June 8.—Four masked bandits flourishing pistols and sawed-off shotguns terrorized Victor L. Ackermann, teller of the Cane Bank and Trust company and a negro employee of the American Express company late today and seized three sacks containing \$20,000 in gold and silver while the money was being conveyed to the express company.

A truck carrying the money had barely stopped in front of the express office when the bandits appeared in a closed automobile and made the seizure.

The bandit automobile skidded to a stop beside the truck and three men brandishing pistols jumped from it and rushed toward the express company building.

The door was opened by one while the other two obtained canvas sacks containing the money.

Superintendent of Police Thomas Healy took command of the bandit hunt.

WINDS HURT CROPS

Other Damage Done In Southeastern Kansas

KANSAS CITY, June 8 (AP).—High winds and small tornadoes accompanied by heavy rain, hail and electrical displays, destroyed crops, wrecked small buildings and blew down telephone poles and trees in central and southeastern Kansas last night.

A swath 10 miles wide and 20 miles long was cut off from east to west across McPherson county by hail and wind. Farmers in the vicinity of Mound Ridge said wheat was damaged from 50 to 100 percent. South of McPherson, the wheat damage was estimated at 30 to 75 percent.

Dawes, republican, if either should be nominated for president. Nor will the federation lend itself to an independent or third party movement.

Shooting Affray Victim Believed Fatally Wounded

Formal Charge of Assault With Intent to Murder Is Lodged Against Police Chief At Plainview.

\$1000 BOND IS MADE BY CHIEF OF POLICE

Statement from Murray Shows That Shooting Came After Chief Had Sought To Question Man.

(Special to the Avalanche) PLAINVIEW, June 8.—Technical charges of assault with intent to murder today were filed against Chief of Police H. H. Murray of this city following the shooting Thursday night of O. J. Thompson, of Tulsa, who is lying in a local hospital not expected to live, with a bullet wound piercing his lung.

Murray's bond was set at \$1,000. He was released this afternoon after making bond.

Thompson's condition was thought critical tonight by attending physicians. Hospital attaches where the injured man was taken offered little hope for his recovery, declaring that he was expected to live only a short time. Members of the sheriff's department visited the injured man early tonight, stating that "he would not get well."

Had Accused Daughter Chief Murray has made no statement in connection with the shooting since this morning when he declared that he opened fire into Thompson's car after he had been shoved from the fender. Murray stated that he was trying to question Thompson concerning the accounting of Murray's 20-year-old daughter on the streets Thursday. Thompson refused to answer, twice showing the police chief from the car. Thompson is the son of C. J. Thompson, Swisher county farmer. His father is at his bedside hoping for his recovery. The fact that Thompson was driving a car with an Amarillo registration tag led local officers last night to believe that he was from Amarillo.

ABANDON UNION PACIFIC TRAIN ENROUTE TO KANSAS CITY, KEMMERER, Wyo., June 8 (AP).—Senator William E. Borah may not receive the 11 votes of Idaho's delegates on the first ballot at the republican national convention in Kansas City and it is just possible the votes will be swung not to Herbert Hoover, but to Charles G. Dawes.

Denver Lawyers Seek Disbarment Of Judge Lindsey

Acceptance of Large Fee, While Serving As Judge Is Basis for Proceeding Against Juvenile Jurist.

DENVER, June 8.—Disbarment proceedings against Ben Lindsey, former judge of the Denver juvenile court and nationally known authority on juvenile delinquency, were begun here today by Attorneys General Boatright. It was learned the disciplinary measures against the former judge were taken at the request of the Colorado Bar association.

The complaint charging "professional misconduct as a member of the bar," sets forth that Lindsey represented Mrs. Helen Wood Stokes in contesting the will of her late husband, W. E. D. Stokes, New York millionaire, and alleges "certain persons" including Lindsey received more than \$40,000 for his fees in the litigation. It is claimed the judge had no right to take part in the litigation because of his official position as judge of the juvenile court.

The complaint alleges Lindsey received \$37,500 from Mrs. Stokes and an additional \$10,000 from Samuel Diermeyer, New York lawyer, also representing Mrs. Stokes.

Still Determined Baffled, Fliers to Try Again

COLUMBUS, O., June 8 (AP).—Forced down here today by fog in their attempt to set a non-stop transcontinental record in their monoplane Yankee Doodle, Lee Schoenbar, pilot, and Harry Tucker, his passenger, announced that next week they would attempt a dawn to dusk flight from New York to San Diego, Calif.

The men declared they believed their San Diego to New York attempt had shown they could have reached New York successfully under ordinary flying conditions.

They contended with stormy weather they said, and were scolded in sight of the ground from the time they took off at 1:15 p. m. Pacific time, yesterday at San Diego. Crossing the Allegheny mountains, however, they ran into an impenetrable fog near Harrisburg, Pa., were baffled in their attempts to fight their way through the fog banks, the fliers were forced to turn back, landing here at 9:43 a. m.

Orient Railroad Goes To Santa Fe

Purchase West Texas Line Unofficially Announced At Kansas City: Price \$15,000,000.

(By Associated Press) WICHITA, Kan., June 8.—Sale of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad to the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway was unofficially announced here today as pending. Presidents of both lines, W. B. Story of the Santa Fe, in Chicago, and W. T. Kemper of the Orient, in Kansas City, refused to comment on the reported negotiations.

Mr. Kemper, however, said purchase of the Orient by the Santa Fe would be satisfactory to the Orient management.

The purchase price named was \$15,000,000.

Last week the federal court of appeals passed favorably on the plan of reorganization of the Orient of which Mr. Kemper is president and Clifford Histed is general counsel.

The road has seen its revenue remarkably increased with the opening of oil fields in West Texas. The Mexican line of the Orient, which is to be completed, to the Rio Grande by August 1, runs to Chihuahua in the heart of what is said to be the richest territory in Mexico.

Victorious Army Takes Charge Of Chinese Capital

City of Peking Falls To Nationalist Forces, Ending Two Year Drive; Order Prevails.

(By Associated Press) PEKING, June 8 (AP).—The city of Peking was taken over by the nationalist armies at 10 o'clock this morning. Complete order prevailed.

Dispatches from Peking by way of naval radio to Washington this morning told of the investiture of Peking by the victorious nationalist armies. All cable and telegraph service from the city itself has been interrupted and with the exception of brief radio bulletins and the naval dispatches little news from Peking itself was available.

According to the naval dispatches the Shanhai forces were the first in the city, their vanguard arriving as the Mukden interim garrison departed. They were given a tumultuous greeting, but order was preserved throughout.

The formal entry of nationalist troops into Peking, historical capital of China, marks one of the most dramatic events of the civil war that has been raging in China since the nationalists began a drive to the north from Canton two years ago.

Canton, almost forgotten now in the twing of the nationalist armies to the north, was the seat of the Kuomintang (nationalist) party.

Republicans To Make Demand For Relief To Farm

Legislation Like Haugen Bill To Be Demanded But Measure Will Not Be Mentioned Specifically.

(By Associated Press)

KANSAS CITY, June 8.—An orderly but insistent effort will be made by a group of middle western farm leaders to obtain a declaration from the Republican party for agricultural relief along lines of the McNary-Haugen bill but not necessarily mentioning that controversial issue by name.

The equalization fee will be defended, the leaders decided, but indications are the plan will not be designated in the plank to be submitted to the convention's resolution committee.

The essence of the tentative draft, which will be worked out tomorrow, is that agriculture is entitled to benefits of the tariff and farm leaders will argue that the McNary-Haugen bill is the best plan to obtain this.

Whether there will be thousands of farmers on hand to back up the demand still is problematical, although the farm group predicted that if the weather man is favorable an imposing pilgrimage to Kansas City will take place.

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST — Bananas with lemon, cereal, cream, creamed dried beef on toast, extra toast marmalade, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Asparagus short cake, radishes, cup custards, lemonade.

DINNER — Veal and vegetable pie, new cabbage salad, strawberries with cream, plain cake, milk, coffee.

Try serving bananas in the "shell" with sections of lemon. The lemon is squeezed over the banana and the fruit is eaten with a fork.

Veal and Vegetable Pie
Three-fourths pound lean veal, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 cup tiny cooked onions, 1 cup cooked potato marbles, 1 1-2 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 2 tablespoons shortening, milk, salt.

Choose a cheap cut of veal. Cover with boiling water and simmer until tender. Let cool in the broth and drain. Cut meat into small pieces suitable for serving. Place in casserole or baking dish about half filling dish. Remove fat from broth and strain through cheese cloth. Melt butter, stir in flour and add two cups of broth, stirring constantly. Cook until thick and smooth.

Season well with salt, pepper and celery salt. Add cooked vegetables to veal and pour over sauce. Mix and stir flour, baking powder and salt and work in shortening. Add milk, cutting it into dry ingredients with a knife, enough to make a soft dough.

Roll into a sheet about one-half inch thick and cut with a small round cutter. Place over top of mixture in baking dish not letting biscuits touch each other. Bake thirty minutes in a hot oven and serve.

Notes Left Explaining
Deed: Parents Say Ill
Health Was Reason; Father
Is Prominent Man.

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—With an indicated production of 12,252,000 bushels, on June 1, the winter wheat crop was estimated by the department of agriculture as showing an increase of 3,000,000 bushels over the May report, but eye, spring wheat and oats figures indicate that these crops may set new low records.

Despite the indicated winter wheat gain, over the May report, the harvest will fall below last year's crop by 40,000,000 bushels, today's survey showed. A further decline may be expected from the department's notation that the conditions resulting from the rather general rains coming since June are not included in this report. Rye conditions were reported as indicating the third lowest yield in the department's records, and the condition of 67.9 per cent of normal the lowest ever reported any year. The indication of a 10.3 bushels acre yield exceeds only the figures of 10.2 bushels in 1885 and 10.1 bushels in 1887.

Insufficient rainfall was termed the cause of the low spring wheat indication of 79 per cent of normal, the lowest estimate recorded since that of 1906. This lack of rain was noted in all important spring wheat areas.

Twins All the Way Similarity Even to Hospital Bed

A rival for similarity to the famous Siamese twins is thought to have been found in the case of twins in a local sanitarium. The two girls, Lydia and Lillian Holt, seven years of age, of Lamesa, both developed goiteritis at the same time, and were brought together to the sanitarium here.

Upon examination of the girls, physicians said that the condition of the appendix of each was practically the same. Both girls will be operated on today and the appendix of each will be removed.

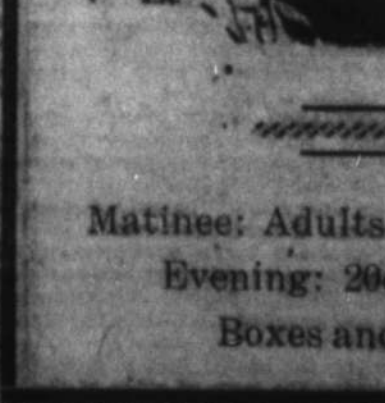

Stocks Again Go On Downward Way

Uneasiness Over Political Situation Believed To Have Started Liquidating Movement.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, June 8.—The line of least resistance in today's stock market was again downward. Pools made repeated efforts to turn the towering tide of prices by staging bullish demonstrations in special stocks, but the rallies encountered heavy offerings and the gains were not maintained. Final quotations disclosed a rather long list of net declines ranging from 1 to 5 points in the standard industrials and rails and 6 to nearly 20 points in a few specialties.

The decline took place in the face of further improvement in the credit situation. Call money renewed at 5 1/2 percent, as against 6 yesterday and 6 1/2 the day before, and time money rates ruled unchanged at 5 5/8 to 5 3/4 percent. Fears that the Chicago federal reserve bank would increase the discount rate from 4 1/4 to 5 percent proved to be unfounded. In view of the sharp decline in prices earlier in the week Wall Street was still puzzled over the gain of nearly \$100,000,000 in federal reserve brokers' loans, which was generally attributed to heavy financing in connection with the sale of new securities.

Uneasiness over the political situation was held responsible by many commission houses for the recent liquidating movement. Brokers reported a growing disposition on the part of traders and investors alike to stay out of the market, or hold commitments to a minimum, until after the presidential nominations are out of the way. In conservative banking quarters, however, the reaction is regarded as a natural correction of a top-heavy speculative position.

Stimson Faces Big Task In Philippine Island

MANILA, P. I., June 8.—What does a governor-general think about?

Is he a figurehead, as the king in some European countries, or the mayor in many American cities? With little to bother about except being on time for civic and social functions at which he is honor guest?

That isn't the case in the Philippine Islands, where Governor-General Henry L. Stimson recently took executive authority over 12,000,000 native sons and daughters. For General Stimson is a very busy man.

Disputed Authority

A recent decision of the supreme court of the United States, upholding a decision of the supreme court of the Philippines, illustrates part of the continual task Col. Stimson faces. It was decided the governor general has the right to vote the government's stock in the Philippine National bank and the National Coal company. This prerogative, hitherto the governor general's, had been transferred by the Philippine legislature to boards of control named by it.

Lawyers pointed to the legislature's act as another exploitation of the Canadian idea which makes the legislature the lawmaker and executive. Col. Stimson's big job will be to lessen the friction between the legislature and the governor general's office.

Col. Stimson faces the ticklish problem of combating the propaganda set forth continually by Filipino politicians that the governor general is more or less an ornamental adjunct to government.

Government Ownership

Many companies now under partial Philippine government ownership are being sought by private individuals. It was the plan of the late General Wood to grant ownership to private interests. Col. Stimson must for his policy after studying the claims of both sides.

Consultation of the Philippine legislature before appointments of judges and provincial governors also will be asked of Stimson.

The Jones law, passed during President Wilson's first year in office, provided for a settlement of the questions of authority and ownership, but the Philippine legislature has not accepted the Jones law as final.

During the heated friction stirred up during the term of office of the late General Wood, when the fan-

ous Conley case resulted, the council of state is said to have totally abolished itself when it jointly turned in its resignation to Wood.

Corresponding to the president's cabinet at Washington the council of state is comprised of six members appointed by the governor general with the consent of the Philippine senate.

Official status of the council is now being sought from Col. Stimson inasmuch as their voluntary "abolishment" has prevented their official functioning. Colonel Stimson's training as a lawyer will not only serve him well here but it will and has pleased the natives because the men who were not lawyers had stormy careers here on the islands when they held the supreme office.

Seven departments over twenty-eight bureaus comprise the government of the Philippine Islands. They are:

Office of the governor general, which has under its immediate jurisdiction the bureau of audits and the bureau of civil service. Naturally the above office also supervises the following departments which, however, function separately:

Department of the interior—bureau of non-Christian tribes; Phil-

Sunday-School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic: The arrest and trial of Jesus.

Scripture Lesson: Mark 15:1-15.

1. And straightway in the morning the chief priests with the elders and scribes, and the whole council, held a consultation, and bound Jesus, and carried him away, and delivered him up to Pilate.

2. And Pilate asked him, Art thou the King of the Jews? And he answering saith unto him, Thou sayest.

3. And the chief priests accused him of many things.

4. And Pilate again asked him, saying, answering thou nothing? behold how many things they accuse thee of.

5. But Jesus no more answered anything: inasmuch that Pilate marvelled.

6. Now at the feast he used to release unto them one prisoner, whom they asked of him.

7. And there was one called Barabbas, being bound with them that had made insurrection, men who in the insurrection had committed murder.

8. And the multitude went up, and began to ask him to do as he went to do unto them.

9. And Pilate answered them, saying, will ye that I release unto you the King of the Jews?

10. For he perceived that for Jesus the chief priests had delivered him up.

11. But the chief priests stirred up the multitude, that he should rather release Barabbas unto them.

12. And Pilate again answered and said unto them, What then shall I do unto him whom ye call the King of the Jews?

13. And they cried out again, Crucify him.

14. And Pilate said unto them, Why, what evil hath he done? But they cried out exceedingly, Crucify him.

15. And Pilate, wishing to content the multitude, released unto them Barabbas, and delivered Jesus, when he had scourged him, to be crucified.

Time: The arrest, midnight of Thursday, April 6, A. D. 30. The trials before the Jewish ecclesiastics, early in the morning of Friday, April 7, followed by the trials before Pilate and Herod. Final decision of Pilate about 10 a. m.

Place: Jerusalem, the palace of Annas and Caiaphas. The judgment hall of Pilate.

Golden Text: He was despised, and rejected of men.—Isa. 53:3.

Introduction

"Confusion reigned the olive garden. Tramping steps grew heavier on the pathway. Lights began to burn through the trees. Armor flashed, and military commands became audible. A delegation of Jewish priests and elders, formally accompanied by a detachment summoned from the fortress of Antonia, or by a portion of the large guard posted at the temple during Passover week, advanced upon Gethsemane."

As our Lord went out to meet them, so majestic was his mien that the soldiers fell backward to the earth in absolute terror. The spell was broken by that climax of innocent treachery, the kiss of Judas. By his tender rebuke Jesus sought to save his fallen disciple even at the last, but his yearning love was in vain.

All The Disciples Forsook Jesus. Chap. 14:50

All the disciples forsook Christ

and fled—all, even James, who was to be the first martyr of the disciples; even John, the other "son of thunder"; even Peter, who had bragged that though all men should forsake Jesus, he would not. One young man, who had sprung from his bed when the soldiers marched by and had followed in great anxiety for Jesus, clad only in his night gown, left it in the soldiers' hands and fled naked. It is supposed that he was Mark himself, the writer of the Gospel.

Peter's Denial, Chap. 14:66-72

Peter's first temptation came when the maid who tended the door recognizing him as one whom she had seen with Christ, charged him with the fact. "Woman," said Peter quickly and anxiously, "I did not know him." Soon another servant girl noticed him and told the crowd around the fire that he was one of Christ's friends. Peter swore this time in his terror, and declared, "I do not know the man." A little later came Peter's third denial, and the cock crew the second time. Then Peter, in a flash, remembered that Christ had foretold that before the cock should crow twice that night he would thrice deny his Lord. Covering his face in shame he rushed out into the night, and there in the darkness he wept bitterly.

Christ Before the Sanhedrin, V. 1

"The chief priests with the elders and scribes, and the whole council," the council or Sanhedrin was the chief legislative and judicial body of the Jews. It had seventy-one members, including the high priest, who was its president; the chief priests, who were former high priests or heads of the twenty-four courses of priests ministering in the temple; with representatives of the elders (heads of the Jewish clans or families) and scribes (lawyers, or teachers and interpreters of the Jewish laws). All Jewish officialdom centered in this august body.

Held a consultation, and bound Jesus. This was the last of the various trials of Jesus before the Jewish authorities.

Christ Before Pilate, Vs. 1, 2

"And carried him away, and delivered him up to Pilate." The Romans had taken from the Jews the right to execute convicts, reserving that authority to themselves; therefore, though the Sanhedrin had pronounced a verdict which would according to their law be followed by death, they were obliged to turn to the Roman governor to put their verdict in force. This governor or procurator was the fifth in the series, Pontius Pilate by name.

And Pilate asked him, Art thou the King of the Jews? It is clear from this question that the Jews had shifted their charge against Jesus. Before the Sanhedrin he was charged with blasphemy and condemned on that charge; he had, it was alleged, declared himself to be the Son of God and that he would overthrow the temple and raise it up in three days. But the charge of blasphemy would have no weight whatever with Pilate, so that the Jews did not scruple illegally to change that accusation and declare that Jesus was guilty of sedition, setting himself up as King of the Jews in defiance of the Emperor Tiberius and of his governor, Pilate—a charge of which Pilate must take cognizance. And he answering saith unto him, Thou sayest. "Thou sayest" is not an evasion, but a definite, idiomatic affirmation, thus modified and explained.

Barabbas

"And there was one called Barabbas, lying bound with them that had made insurrection." Some important manuscripts of Matt. 27:16 give his name as Jesus Barabbas, a strange coincidence. The Jews were so bitterly hostile toward their Roman ruler, and of so independent and brave a spirit, that they were constantly engaged in rebellion, which the Romans put down only by constant watchfulness and strenuous efforts. Pilate knew all the time that he was sitting over a volcano. "Men who in the insurrection had committed murder." They had probably killed some Roman soldiers, an act which they would regard as a patriotic triumph. "The chief priests stirred up the multitude, that he should rather release Barabbas unto them."

Pilate's Quandary, V. 12

"And Pilate again answered and said unto them, What then shall I do unto him whom ye call the King of the Jews?" Jesus had been delivered up to him on the ground that he was seeking to raise an insurrection against Rome, and there were the Jews clamoring for the release, not of Jesus, but of the worst insurrectionist of them all! He was shrewd enough to see what this meant, that Jesus was the reverse of a seditious leader, but he was too timid and weak to act justly.

"And they cried out again, Crucify him." Pilate answered, "Take him yourselves, and crucify him; for I find no crime in him." (John 19:6)

Pilate Released Barabbas, V. 15

"And Pilate, wishing to content the multitude, released unto them Barabbas." For a moment safety, Pilate bartered away his eternal salvation. That he might be a little more popular in his tumultuous province, or at least a little less unpopular, he won for himself universal and lasting execration. And after all, Pilate's government came to an abrupt end. It is reported that Pilate was banished to Vienna on the Rhone, in the south of France, and ultimately committed suicide.

Delivered Jesus to Be Crucified, V. 15

All four evangelists use the same Greek word for "delivered." The tragic significance of the term in the life of our Lord has been pointed out: Jesus delivered him to the temple policemen; they to Annas; Annas to Caiaphas and the council, who passed him along to Pilate; Pilate to Herod; Herod back again to Pilate; Pilate to the executioners; but God, who somehow uses even the most nefarious deeds of sinful men for his own righteous ends, stopped the thing at the cross by thereupon delivering the Crucified to the whole wide world and all the oncoming ages for their salvation: "He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for us all." (Rom. 8:32)

INGENIOUS BONIFACE.

PARIS.—A suburban hotel keeper keeps his house filled with newly weds and funeral parties. He watches society columns and invites the newly married to let him be their host while they find apartments, and he scans the obituary notices and orders to out-of-town-ers coming to obsequies.

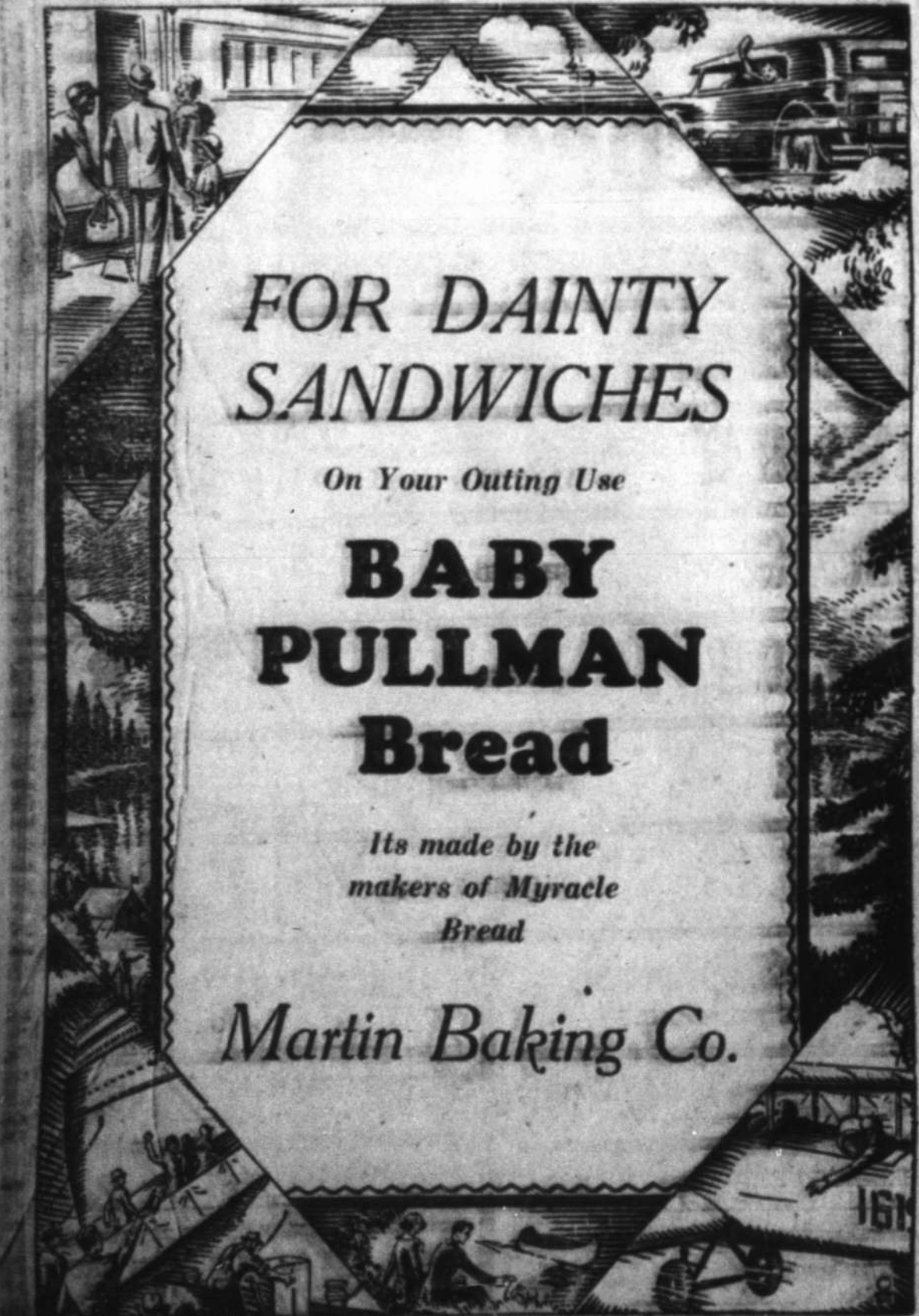

Dutch Lunch to Feature the Summer Membership Meeting of Local Retail Organization.

Lubbock merchants, members of the Lubbock Retail Merchants Association, will be given a "Dutch Lunch" at the regular summer membership meeting of the organization which will be held at the city hall, June 28, directors of the association voted yesterday at the regular June directors' session.

President Hassell was authorized to appoint a committee to work out the program and other arrangements for the meeting.

One of the principal business matters which will be taken up at the meeting will be the closing days for the remainder of the year. Several years ago, members of the Association adopted a uniform closing agreement including five days each year. Since that time, conditions have changed to affect the agreement and a number of new merchants have moved into Lubbock who are not necessarily bound by the agreement which was made before their arrival here. Directors suggested that the closing agreement be revised from year to year.

The membership committee of the Association which was appointed a little over a month ago to serve for a term of three months or until five new members were signed up, was given an honorable discharge and a new committee was authorized. The committee, that is composed of A. O. Hunt, chairman; Albe Clem, and J. G. Anderson, secured seven new members and have a few others about ready to join the association.

PULLMAN STRIKE OFF

Porters Say Walk-Out Is Only Postponed

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP).—A threatened strike of 11,000 Pullman car porters and maids, called for noon today, has been indefinitely postponed.

A Philip Randolph, organizer of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, said that the strike was deferred on the advice of William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, who held that economic conditions were unfavorable to such a strike.

Randolph said that the strike machinery which had been set up would be held intact for strike action at some future time, unless the Pullman company consents to arbitration.

NO UNUSUAL CROWDS

Church Peace in Mexico Causes No Furor

MEXICO CITY, June 2 (AP).—Mexico's peaceful churches had no unusual crowds today when the general public learned for the first time from the morning newspapers of efforts to settle the religious question.

Previously the papers had failed to publish any foreign dispatches concerning the movement but this morning printed extensive reports from Rome and New York, having learned that this would not be objectionable to the government. No mention of the subject was made editorially, however, nor was there any news on the question from Mexico City itself.

PROBE UTILITIES

Publicity For Texas Concerns To Be Quizzed

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP).—The federal trade commission today announced additional witnesses summoned to testify in the investigation of power utilities financing under the Walsh senate resolution when hearings are resumed June 12.

Work of publicity organizations in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Mississippi will be inquired into. C. W. Davis and William Grant, both of Dallas, chairman and director respectively of the Texas Public Service Information Bureau, are scheduled to testify Tuesday on the dissemination of publicity to Texas newspapers and the placing of utility booklets in the public schools.

BREAKS ENGAGEMENT

Spanish Premier Not To Marry

MADRID, June 2 (AP).—Premier de Rivera has broken off his engagement to marry Mercedes Castellanos, says an official announcement issued today.

The decision to break off the engagement was made at 2 o'clock this afternoon and announcement of it was made at 6 o'clock this evening.

Primo de Rivera was to have been married in September, and King Alfonso was expected to be best man. The Spanish dictator last April accepted congratulations from his colleagues on his approaching marriage.

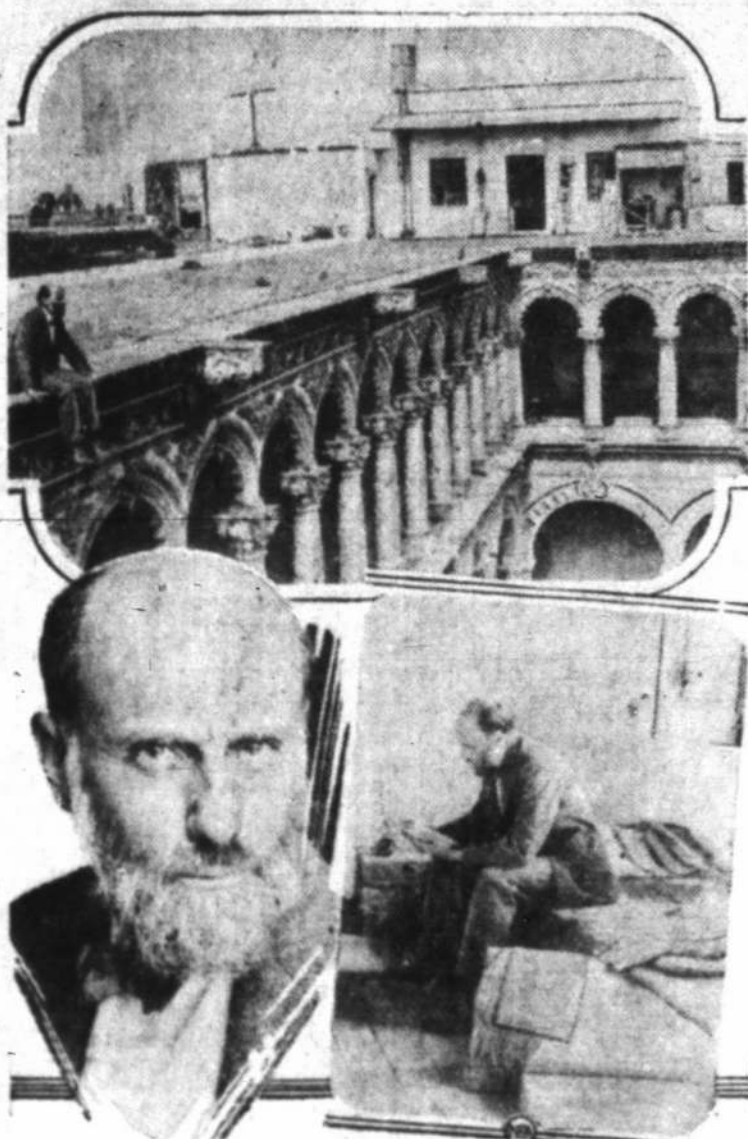
VISIT LITTLE JUAREZ

Troops Surround City of Peking

City's Walls Closed And Events Reported To Be Moving Toward Peaceful Establishment Regime.

(By Associated Press.)
PEKING, China, June 2.—(delayed)—Several thousand nationalist troops are surrounding the walls of Peking and the city's gates are closed. Events are moving toward a peaceful establishment of a new regime.

All normal communication has been broken and complete isolation is pending, but the foreign community is not apprehensive over possible consequences.

No uniformed nationalist soldiers have yet entered the city, where complete order is being maintained by local authorities.

The radio is the only dependable link with the outside world. Since Sunday rail travel into Peking has been impossible and no mail has been received. Later telephone communication was interrupted while early Thursday the last remaining telegraph line went out, believed to have been cut by soldiers.

There has been some motor travel toward Tientsin but the hazard of this transportation was illustrated Thursday when a party including Captain J. P. Ratay, assistant military attaché of the American legation, another American, Englishman and a German, whose automobile was flying the British flag while enroute from Tientsin to Peking was fired on by retreating Mukden troops 35 miles northwest of Tientsin.

Wealth of U. S., 320 Billions, Rising Steadily, According to Bank Expert

By BAYARD F. POPE
(President, Stone & Webster and Budget)

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP).—The U. S. wealth is now \$320,000,000,000.

Its wealth has increased 4,400 per cent since 1890 and is still on the rise.

Title to much of it is represented by the billions of dollars worth of securities which are exchanged in this country, the number of which is growing yearly.

In the last five years 36,963 different issues of bonds and of preferred and common stocks were purchased by an army of American investors estimated to number 15,000,000. This is an increase of more than 3,000 per cent in the last 15 years, at the beginning of which period the number was computed at approximately 500,000.

The growth in number of invested by the mass shown by the total of funds invested in securities by American purchasers in the last five years: 1923, \$4,912,760,000; 1924, \$6,044,000,000; 1925, \$6,811,810,000; 1926, \$7,213,620,000; and 1927, \$9,804,690,000.

The securities involved in these vast transactions comprised 34,995 issues of bonds at \$28,931,580,000.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

NEW ORLEANS, June 8 (AP).—The cotton market was quiet today with price fluctuations comparatively narrow, the extreme spread not exceeding 14 points. The price movement was rather two-sided. An early decline was followed by a moderate recovery which in turn gave way under liquidation and selling on fears of bearish crop statistics next week. The market closed steady at net loss of 14 to 4 points.

October contracts after easing off to 20.08, 7 points down for the day. Liverpool cables were lower than here, and there was considerable selling in New York. As a result, first grades here were a few points under the previous close. Prices, however, continued to ease off after the start on the dry weather map. July ultimately trading to 20.27, October 20.08 and December 20.06, 7 to 8 points net down.

After a period of quietness the market became steadier on buying promoted by the official forecast for unsettled weather in the western belt. Before the demand was supplied, July had recovered to 20.28, October 20.22 and December 20.21, 12 to 15 points up from the previous close. An acreage increase prominent private authority was a contributing factor to the recovery.

NEW YORK COTTON.

NEW YORK, June 8 (AP).—An early decline in response to relatively

easy Liverpool cables was followed by rallies in the cotton market today on weekend coverings, probably prompted by uncertainty of weather conditions over Sunday and talk of a better spot demand. After selling up from 20.55 to 20.74, or 3 points net higher, October sagged off under realizing and closed at 20.65, compared with 20.69 at the close of the previous day. The general market closed steady, at a net advance of 2 points on July, but generally 2 to 7 points net lower.

The opening was steady at a decline of 9 to 12 points under liquidation, combined with local Wall Street and southern selling, evidently encouraged by lower cables than expected from Liverpool and rather a favorable view of the early weather reports. Offerings were absorbed at about initial prices, and the mid-day market steadied up on trade buying and covering. Further selling seemed to be held in check by prospects for showers in the south and apprehensions that they might be forerunner of unfavorable weather over the weekend.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK.

FORT WORTH, June 8 (AP).—The cattle market here today generally was steady. Steers sold from 9.50 to 11.50, cows 7.00 to 8.50 and calves 10.50 to 11.50.

The hog trade was steady to 10c lower. The top price was 9.70, with the bulk selling from 8.85 to 9.45.

Sows sold from 7.75 to 8.25 and pigs 6.00 to 7.25.

A decline of from 75c to 1.50 has occurred in the sheep market since Monday. Fat wethers today sold from 9.00 to 9.15, fat lambs 14.00 to 15.00 and yearlings 12.00.
